Duerfeldt new County Treasurer

Austin Duerfeldt, 24, was sworn in Tuesday morning, Sept. 18, as Richardson County Treasurer and will serve out the term that expires Jan. 7, 2015.

Duerfeldt, a graduate of Falls City High School, is currently working toward a Masters Degree in Business Administration, with an emphasis in ag economics, at Northwest Missouri State University. He maintains a 3.67 GPA and will graduate in December. He previously earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in accounting, with a minor in commercial agriculture.

His employment history includes serving as a computer analyst and accounting assistant at Robert W. Aitken CPA in Falls City, starting in May 2008. Austin worked as a supplemental instructor and master level tutor at the NWMSU Talent Development Center from January 2009 to December 2010, and is the university farm accountant for the NWMSU Ag Dept. (since August 2011).

He is an Accounting Society member, a Certified Master Tutor (College Reading and Learning Association), holds the American FFA Degree, founded and organized the NWMSU Fishing Team, designed the school's Commodity Trading Room and is a member of the Collegiate FFA.

Austin, the son of Richard and Jan Duerfeldt, rural Falls City, will be in the Treasurer's Office most every day, as he incorporates his new duties with fall classes.

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City, County take action on budgets

The City Council and Richardson County Commissioners each took budget-related action during their respective meetings last Monday and Tuesday, Sept. 17 and 18.

In both instances, the news is good for taxpayers, as levies are largely unchanged or, in the case of the county, actually lower.

City Clerk-Treasurer Gary Jorn said the levy is "basically unchanged" from last year. The budget committee met several times, he said, and "made some cuts" in capital expenditures. One of the largest budget increases involved health insurance premiums, which increased 25 percent. That situation should improve, Jorn said. He described the budget as "pretty conservative."

The total levy for the City of Falls City, including the Airport Authority, will be 49.6254 cents per \$100 in valuation. The property tax request is \$565,163.68.

Action on the City budget and tax levy followed a public hearing. No one from the public spoke during the hearing and Council action was unanimous (Jerry Oliver was unable to attend the meeting).

In county action Tuesday, the Commissioners also held a public hearing at which no one spoke. The Journal had previously summarized the numbers. With an increase of valuation to more than \$999,500,000, the county levy will decrease by 9.65 percent to 38.9684 cents per \$100 of valuation. The county also acted on a budget that calls for less spending than last year by more than \$400,000, to \$11,483,881.20. The tax requirement for the county will fall to \$3,895,126.77, almost \$49,000 less than last year.

The City Council also acted Monday on three recommendations from the Planning Commission, all related to the Consolidated Grain and Barge terminal project that is proposed in southwest Falls City — land that recently was annexed by the City.

Attorney Mike Dunn was present to explain platting action on the Towle and CGB Additions. Following a public hearing, the Council also acted to change the zoning for the 162 acres in the CGB Addition from agricultural to industrial (also recommended by Planning Commission).

During the hearing, Dave Erwin, who manages Salem Grain, said he appeared to "once again reiterate my objections, my company's objections, my personal concern" regarding the CGB issue. He questioned the use of City and State funds for the project, describing as "curious" the incentives for a corporation that is "making over \$50 million a year." He said the incentives are being "offered under the guise of economic development," but maybe only 10 new jobs would result from the project. Erwin also questioned the investments that would be required in infrastructure, including roads and utilities. "All I ask is that you consider, as individuals: Is this really in the best interest of Falls

Furlong returns to Falls City Oct. 7

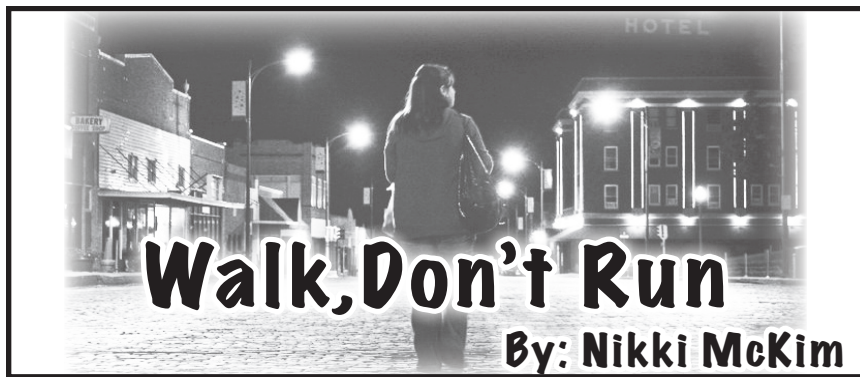
Margaret Furlong, artist and porcelain designer, will return to Falls City on Sunday, Oct. 7, to sign angels at the Falls City Library and Arts Center.

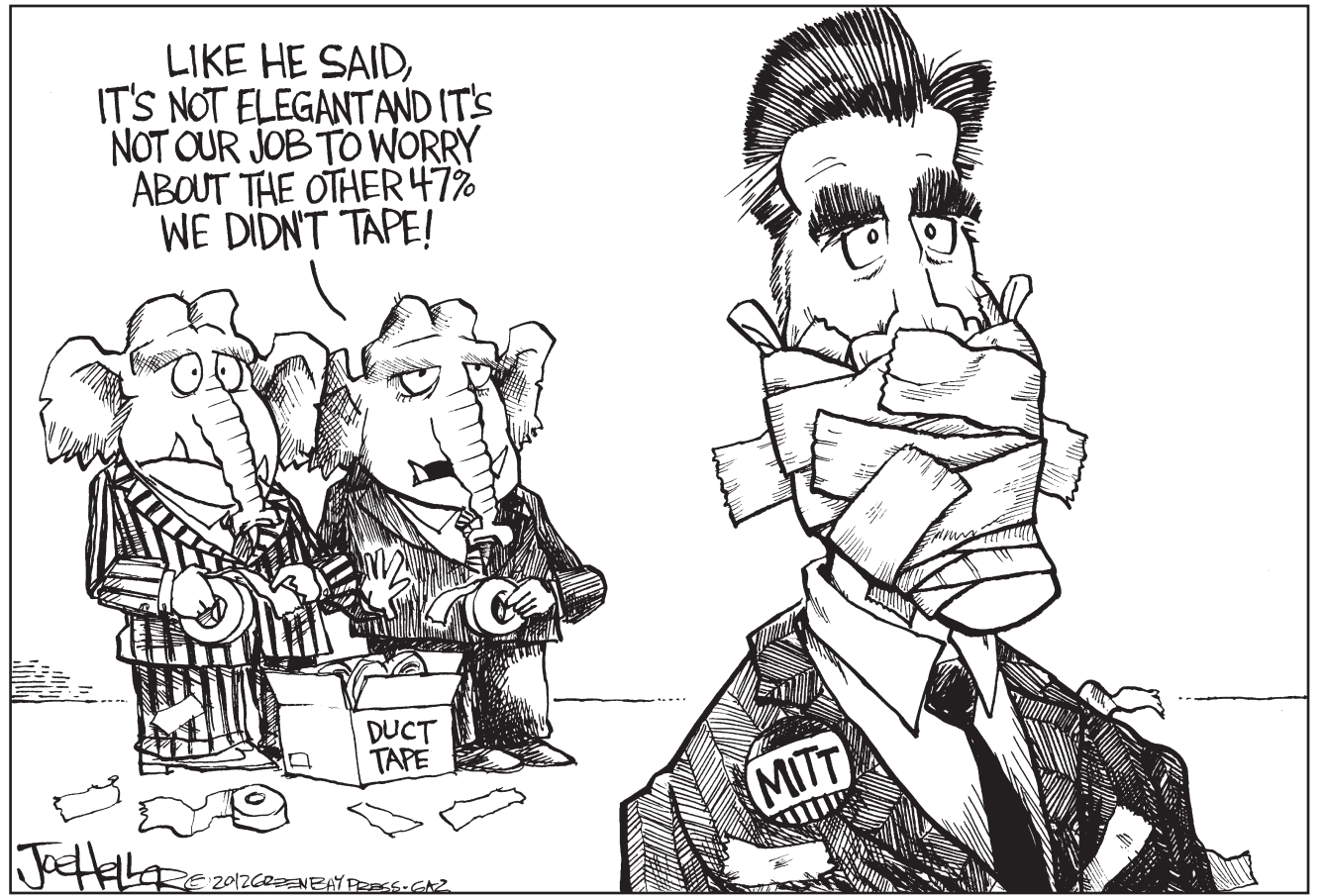

Beyond Fischer-Kerrey, a whole 'nother election

Beyond the highly publicized race between Republican Deb Fischer and Democrat Bob Kerrey for the U.S. Senate seat being vacated by Ben Nelson is a whole 'nother election.

Term limits took a bite out of the Nebraska Unicameral leaving nine fairly popular incumbents ineligible to run. This is the year for the odd-numbered of the 49 state legislative districts to be on the ballot. Those 25 races are joined by a contest in one even-numbered, District 2, where the appointed incumbent Paul Lambert must be elected to the seat he received when Sen. David Pankonin of Louisville stepped down in 2011. Lambert, the former Mayor of Plattsmouth, faces a challenge from sales and marketing researcher Bill Kintner of Papillion.

Of the 15 incumbents running for re-election, none has received more recent publicity than Omahan Brenda Council, an attorney who was elected in 2008 to the District 11 seat held for nearly 40 years by Ernie Chambers, an early victim of term limits. In fact, it has been widely believed that Chambers was the official target of the term limits law, the passage of which took many a casual observer of the legislative process by surprise.

Chambers beat Council in the primary by 149 votes and all was quiet in the inner city district until a few weeks ago when Attorney General Jon Bruning announced charges of campaign finance violations against Council.

Bruning alleged that Council misappropriated \$63,000 in campaign funds, which she spent on gambling at casinos in Kansas, and falsified campaign finance documents to cover it up. She recently pleaded guilty to two misdemeanor counts and paid a \$500 fine.

Bruning said he had enough evidence to charge her with a felony but wanted to avoid a lengthy legal battle. Council admitted she has a gambling problem, has sought treatment and paid back \$36,000 so far and promises to pay back the rest. Chambers, who spent years on the floor of the nation's only one-house legislature preying on the weaknesses of his colleagues while playing the rules book like a piano, has left this one alone. He said simply that he hoped Council would receive treatment for her problem.

So, while Nebraskans watch the Fischer-Kerrey drama play out as if two caged cats are awaiting the opportunity to blindside each other, they apparently aren't going to see fly in the most-watched legislative race. But, seasoned observers know that if the venerable

veteran Chambers is taking the high road, anything can and will happen.

Oh, by the way, there are some other interesting legislative races out there. Not unlike Plattsmouth's Lambert, Hastings Attorney Les Seiler is seeking election to the District 33 seat to which he was appointed earlier this year following the death of incumbent Sen. Dennis Utter. He is being challenged by businessman Marvin Butch Hughes who has been in the race before.

Two ranchers, Al Davis of Hyannis and John W. Ravenscroft of Nenzel, are running

for the seat in District 43 from which Fischer was term-limited. For the first time in many years, there are no farmers or ranchers running for the District 49 seat, which was once held by the term-limited Sen. LeRoy Louden of Ellsworth. The seat is no longer assigned to the Sandhills-Panhandle district. Thanks to redistricting and a shifting population base, the number is now assigned to the Gretna area of eastern Nebraska where John Murante faces Frank C. Wellenstein.

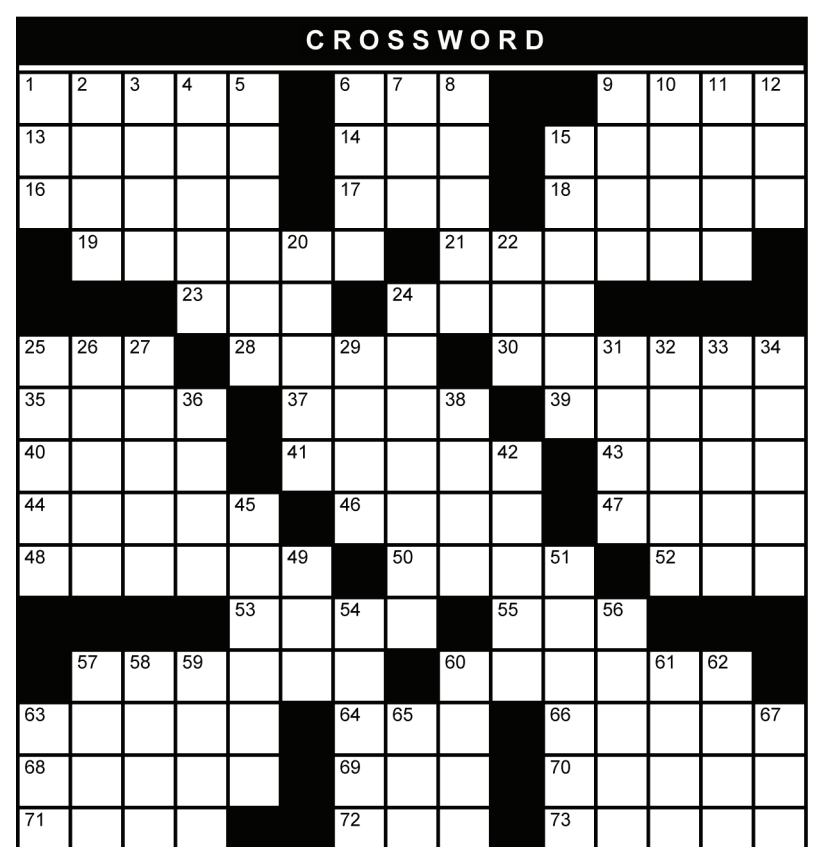
With the general election a little more than a month away, stay tuned. It will be anything but routine.

Mark will celebrate his 47th



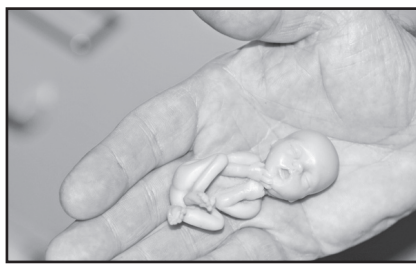

Sez I

What will CGB do for Falls City?

Regarding Mrs. Witt’s “Sez I” in the Sept. 18th edition of the Falls City Journal. This reads like an assignment for a school project, lengthy without substance. Never has anyone answered the question: *What will CGB ENTERPRISES do for Falls City?*

Did she miss or chose not to include a very interesting bit of information about two of the Corporate owners of CGB — ITOCHU CORP. and ITOCHU INTERNATIONAL? The following is an exact reprint from the Department of Justice, Office of Public Affairs — Monday, Dec. 7, 2009:

U.S. Settles with Itochu Corp. and Itochu International Regarding Defective Bullet-Proof Vests

Washington — The United States has reached a \$6.75 million settlement with Itochu Corp. of Japan and its American subsidiary, Itochu International Inc., to resolve claims under the False Claims Act in connection with the companies’ importation and sale of defective, Zylon fiber used as the key ballistic material in bullet-proof vests purchased by the United States for federal, state, local and tribal law enforcement agencies, the Justice Department announced today.

The Itochu companies imported the Zylon fiber on behalf of the Zylon manufacturer, Toyobo Co. Ltd. of Japan. The United States alleged that the Itochu companies were aware that the fiber degraded quickly over time and that the companies knew that this degradation rendered bullet-proof vests containing woven Zylon unfit for use. The government further alleged that, despite this knowledge, Itochu personnel actively participated in the marketing of the Zylon fiber and downplayed the extent of the degradation problem.

“We will not tolerate companies that put the lives of law enforcement officers at risk by providing defective material for bullet-proof vests,” said Tony West, Assistant Attorney General for the Justice Department’s Civil Division. “This agreement resolves our allegations that these corporations wasted taxpayers’ dollars by failing to address problematic vests even after they were aware of them.”

The complete article can be accessed on the Internet. The U.S. has also had settlements for over \$47 million in other Zylon cases.

What CGB may cost the Richardson County taxpayers is also on the Internet. Is it hundreds and hundreds of thousands? They very likely will receive sales tax money, Nebraska Advantage funds, and **TIF — Tax Increment Financing.** You might want to read the two-page brochure. The following is a reprint from Page 2 of the Falls City TIF Brochure:

Tax Increment Financing (TIF) is the use of new real property tax dollars created as the result of a commercial project to help support the financing of that project. TIF allows the use of the new property taxes generated by the increased value of the property to be paid to the Falls City Community Redevelopment Authority (CRA) to be invested into public improvements that are a part of the project. These taxes are redirected for the benefit of the project for a period of up to 15 years. Property taxes on the original value of the property continue to be paid to local taxing entities.

POWER ISSUE: We keep hearing CGB will be a great consumer of power from Falls City. Where is this power coming from? A few weeks ago we had rolling black outs in Falls City when OPPD had an interruption in the power supply they were furnishing to Falls City. Will new mega million dollar generators need to be purchased by Falls City or is OPPD going to furnish the power source? We have asked this over and over and no one will furnish any answers. The main problem is the officials are being so secretive about the whole CGB project.

If the local grain dealers and farm owner/operators are referred to as “little people” or the “little man,” Mrs. Witt obviously has no clue about the huge investments in facilities, land and equipment of the local businesses and farmers. There are many millionaires in Richardson County, they just don’t choose to brag about it or put it on display. They earned it — with the help of God and a lot of hard work.

You might be enlightened by spending a day or two with a member of The 21st Century agribusiness. They are highly intelligent people with multiple skills.

Falls City and EDGE are bringing new business to Richardson County - but At What Cost?

- Falls City: \$500,000 from LB840 Fund – No word if this is to be repaid or at what interest rate.
\$200,000 CDBG “Loan” which has already been promised to be forgiven.
- State of NE: \$100,000 CDBG Grant
- EDGE: \$175,000 – Disclosed by the State Economic Development Department that “someone”, presumably EDGE, has offered this amount. No word on whether this is a gift or loan.
- TIF Funds: \$5,700,000 property tax refund. CGB will be refunded 95% of their property taxes for the next 15 years.

State of Nebraska Economic Development Office Underwriting Guidelines state that they will NOT exceed an investment of \$35,000 per full-time job created. Falls City is proposing to invest \$6,575,000 to create 8 full-time positions – or \$821,875 per job. Does this make sense?

Additional costs to Falls City/Richardson County to provide utilities to new development area:

Natural gas	\$30,000
Water	\$80,000
Sewer	\$115,000
Electricity	Undisclosed (more than \$5,000,000)
Road improvements:	Undisclosed

Existing electrical lines running parallel to the BNSF main line will need to be moved. How much will this cost and who will pay for it?

Falls City has the capacity to generate 20 MG of electricity but, when corresponding with the State Economic Development Department, EDGE Director Beckie Cromer stated that it is “not cost effective to operate” the local generating plant. EDGE also stated that Falls City is willing to institute a \$5,000,000 bond to cover these costs.

Total Potential Cost = \$11,900,000. Does Falls City really need to make these kinds of concessions to A COMPANY WITH OVER \$50,000,000 ANNUAL PROFITS?

Construction on this project is slated to begin October 20th. Ask your City Council members why this project is being pushed through – seemingly behind the public’s back.

A provision in the Defense Authorization Act of 2008 authorizes military-style hand salutes for Veterans out of uniform when the Flag, carried by an Honor Guard, passes in review. This provision also applies to a salute during the National Anthem and the raising and lowering of the American flag.

The provision does not address whether head cover should be removed prior to rendering a salute. The accepted general practice is to follow the same protocol as you would if you were in uniform.

Of course, Veterans and non-Veterans alike may continue to salute the Flag by removing their hat and placing their hand over their heart. As for me, I will continue to proudly render a military-style salute.

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Emergency funds for SE Nebraska

Southeast Region A, including Cass, Johnson, Nemaha, Otoe, Pawnee and Richardson counties, has been chosen to receive Emergency Food and Shelter Program funding to supplement emergency food and shelter programs in the area.

The selection was made by a national board that is chaired by the Federal Emergency Management Agency and consists of representatives from The Salvation Army; American Red Cross; United Jewish Communities; Catholic Charities, USA; National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.; and United Way of America, which will provide the administrative staff and function as fiscal agent. The board was charged to distribute funds appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in high-need areas around the country.

A local board made up of representatives from the Salvation Army; Ministerial Associations; Government Agencies; SE Nebraska Community Action; United Way; Food Pantries; American Red Cross; and Homeless Service Providers will determine how the funds awarded to Southeast Region A are to be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by local service organizations in the area. The local board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these funds and any additional funds available under this phase of the program.

Under the terms of the grant from the national board, local organizations chosen to receive funds must: 1) be private voluntary non-profits or units of government; 2) have an accounting system; 3) practice nondiscrimination; 4) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs; and 5) if they are a private voluntary organization, they must have a voluntary board. Qualifying organizations are urged to apply.

Southeast Region A distributed Emergency Food and Shelter funds in the previous phase with SENCA and The Salvation Army participating. These agencies were responsible for providing more than 7,500 meals and rent and utility assistance to 90 households under the Emergency Food and Shelter Program.

Public or private voluntary organizations interested in applying for Emergency Food and Shelter Program funds must contact Pam Armknecht, Local Board Chair, at 402-862-2411 Ext. 105 for an application. The deadline for application is Oct. 5, 2012.

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

Cord Huettner had quite a memorable Homecoming last Friday night at Jug Brown Stadium. The Tiger senior was a homecoming king candidate, started the football game wearing his normal number '36', but finished the game with fellow senior Dakota Butrick's number '8', oh, and he had a decent little effort between the stripes for the now upstart Falls City (2-2) football team. Huettner turned in a performance that few will forget in Falls City's 54-7 Homecoming beatdown of previously unbeaten Lincoln Lutheran. The heart and soul and unquestionable leader of the Tigers, Huettner gashed the Warriors defense for 22 carries, 313 yards and five touchdowns, while also passing for a 25-yard score...in the first half. Huettner carried 10 more times for 56 yards and a score in the second half, finishing with 32 carries, a new school-record 369 yards and six touchdowns on a night that saw more than a little swagger return to the Tiger football program. Huettner's 369 yards topped former Tiger running back Dan Werner's single-game record of 317 yards set in 2005 at Tecumseh. "Cord gave a great effort," first-year head coach Darin Fritz said. "I think he surprised some people with his speed. We all know that he is a very physical runner, but when he gets a head of steam going, not many people run him down from behind." Falls City's offensive and defensive lines owned the trenches and the young Tiger secondary shut down

Finally, it is Wisconsin week for the Huskers and the Badgers ready themselves for the trip south as Nebraska awaits with revenge on our mind. We all remember what happened last October when the real Big Red made the trip north to cheese curd country and a close game turned into a rout.

The Taylor Martinez we've come accustomed to watching in big games threw back-to-back picks and just like that, a one score game quickly had ABC's producers looking for ways to keep the telecast interesting. Remember the beginning of the fourth quarter when they made all of Husker nation and many around the country watch those drunken schmucks sing, 'Jump Around'? Ugh.

Well, the Badgers come to our House of Pain - see what I did there - this weekend and they better be ready. 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FCHS softball team 16-8, closing in on school record

Falls City picked up two more wins last week to improve to 16-8 on the season and are inching closer and closer to setting a new single-season record for wins in a season.

The Lady Tigers defeated Freeman 4-1 at Morehead Field Thursday and earlier in the week picked up an 11-5 road win at St. Joseph (Mo.) Lafayette.

"Beating Lafayette was a nice victory," said Tiger head coach Joe Dunn. "We haven't had much success with this team in my 12 years."

Hits were sparse, but timely, against Freeman. The Lady Tigers were just 5-24 at the plate against the Lady Falcons.

Trailing 1-0 in the bottom of the first, senior Claire Poppe got FC on the board when she doubled to left field scoring Kirstyn Buchholz, who had reached base after being hit by a pitch. Falls City would go on to add a run in each of the third, fourth and fifth innings to keep Freeman at bay.

Juniors Allyson Scholl and Brittany Ritter were each 1-2 at the plate and Scholl picked up her third

RBI in the fifth. Poppe, Buchholz and sophomore Sydney Armbruster were also 1-2. Armbruster, junior Brooke Scheitel and freshman Avery Scott were responsible for the other three FC runs.

Falls City had the bats going against Lafayette, as they went 14-23 at the plate. Armbruster and Ritter led the team with three hits a piece. Armbruster added three RBIs to her big game and Poppe and senior Amie Wiltse had a pair each. Ritter and Scheitel each scored twice.

Poppe, who is having a spectacular year for FC, smashed her fifth homerun in the third inning and is leading the team with 30 RBIs and a slugging percentage of .905 - nearly 400 points higher than Ritter who is second with a .548 percentage. Poppe also picked up wins 15 and 16 on the mound this week.

"We are playing well, but still need to do a better job with the little things, like getting bunts down and making good throws," Dunn said. "The girls always believe they can win and that helps our chances each game."

The Lady Tigers, who are just four wins away from the single-season record for wins, faced Savannah, Mo., last night, then face a tough Leblond (14-2) team in St. Joe tonight before wrapping up the regular season Thursday at home against Syracuse. Falls City defeated Syracuse 5-4 in their only meeting back on Sept. 9.

Not to put the cart before the horse, but the 20 wins is almost a formality **IF** the Lady Tigers can win a pair of games this week. The district tournament should provide them opportunities to pick up the other two. Falls City will enter the Class C-3 District Tournament Oct. 4-5 as the No. 2 seed, behind top-ranked and 17-4 Fairbury, the tourney hosts. Freeman (6-15), Johnson County Central (1-18), Wymore Southern (13-8), Syracuse (8-11) and Wilber-Clatonia (5-17) are the other teams in the district.

Thursday's final home games begin at 5 p.m.

Lady Tigers travel to winless Conestoga tonight

Coming off their first victory of the season at the Fairbury Invitational two Saturdays ago, the Lady Tigers' volleyball team attempted to capitalize on that momentum, but fell short.

Falls City dropped a five game heartbreaker to Plattsmouth last Tuesday at the high school and then lost both matches of a home triangular last Thursday when Syracuse and Nebraska City Lourdes came to town.

The Lady Tigers (1-13) won the first two games against Plattsmouth, but couldn't hold off the Lady Devils and fell in five games (25-18, 25-23, 21-25, 17-25, 17-25). Sophomores Jillian Lunsford (13 points), Maygan Ramsey (13 kills) and Baylee Vrtiska (12 points, 22 assists) led the team offensively. Fellow sophomore, Chelsea Campbell, added 16 digs and eight points and junior Madison Olberding had 10 kills.

Falls City dropped the first match of the triangular Thursday night to C1 contender Syracuse (13-2), 2-25 and 6-25, then, after losing the first game to NC Lourdes, 14-25, the Lady Tigers bounced back and led the Lady Knights 22-17 in the second game, but couldn't force a third game, falling 26-24. Sophomore Taylor O'Brien led FC with nine points.

The Lady Tigers have a great opportunity for their second win tonight when they travel to 0-14 Conestoga. Saturday is the Falls City Invitational, which begins at 9 a.m. at the high school.

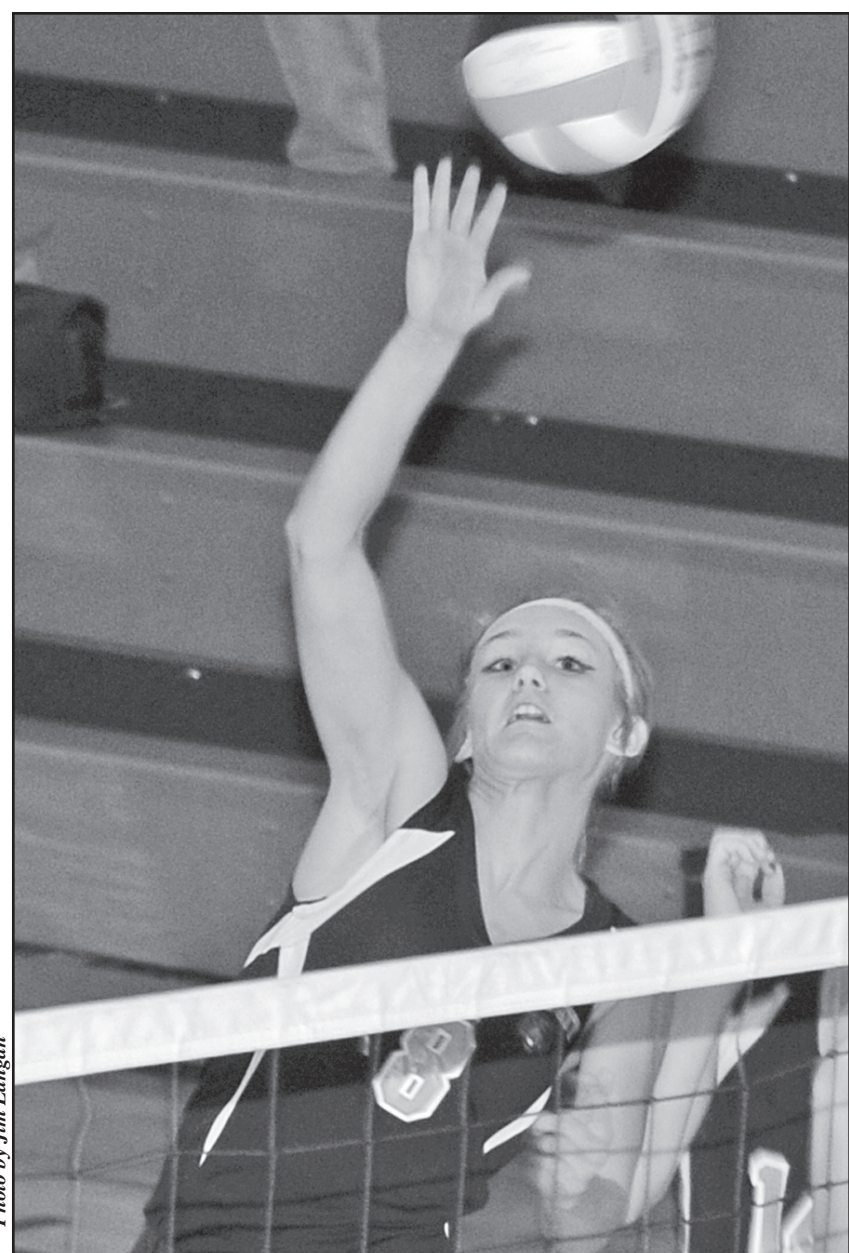

Class D2 top-ranked FC Sacred Heart continued its dominance Friday night by pitching a first shutout of the season with a 52-0 victory at previously unbeaten Diller-Odell.

The shutout was the Irish's first since a 70-0 victory over Mead on Sept. 24, 2010, and the second in the past three games with Diller-Odell. Not to pile on the Griffins, but they have been outscored 139-8 by the Irish since 2010.

Sacred Heart racked up 284 yards on 33 carries against D-O and, more impressively, the Irish defense held its opponent to just 92 yards of offense. Also, the win gave the Irish a 1-0 record in district play. District D2-1 includes Sacred Heart and D-O, as well as the Irish's next three opponents - Meridian, Sterling and Lewiston. Currently, Sterling (3-1) is the only team of those four with a winning record, but Lewiston (2-2) has won its last two games and travels to Sterling Friday night.

To say D-O struggled offensively against the Irish defense would be an understatement. D-O carried the ball 35 times for 10 yards, or 0.28 yards per carry. The Griffins had 10 possessions in the game and Sacred Heart held them to seven three-and-outs, recorded a safety, forced a fumble and turned them over on downs once.

Junior Jarod Fiegenger recorded his third blocked punt of the season when he blocked D-O's punt attempt with 2:13 remaining in the first quarter and the Griffins recovered it in their own end zone, giving the Irish two points and the ball. Fiegenger, senior Brody Chandler and junior Brandon Schawang led the defense with four unassisted tackles apiece and Fiegenger, Schawang and senior Will Burenheide each recorded two sacks.

Offensively, seniors Lane Scheitel and Lane Barnhill spearheaded the Irish attack, combining for 204 yards on 26 attempts, as well as rushing for four touchdowns. Scheitel, who scored on runs of 2, 17 and 42 yards, also passed for 59 yards and a score. Barnhill was on the receiving end of Scheitel's touchdown pass and hauled in a game-high five catches for 49 yards.

Clay Finck continued his stubborn stance - insert tongue firmly in cheek - of only catching

touchdown passes for the Irish. 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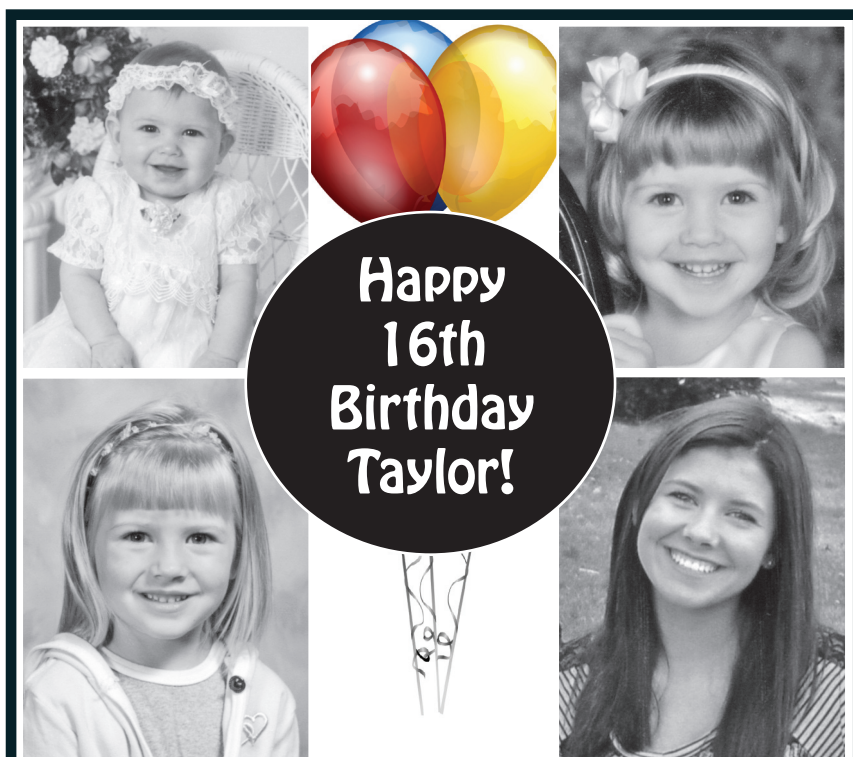



The WWII vets included Charles Schlicker, Bill Schock, Bill Huebner, Albert Rieschick, Roy Bahr, Elmer Linderman and Ernie Werner.

Abbreviated bios of the seven veterans:

Schlicker: In Company B, Falls City National Guard unit, when it was federalized in December 1940, a year before Pearl Harbor, and sent to Camp Robinson, AR; served with the Army's 70th (Trail Blazers) Division in France and Germany; Battle of



the Bulge veteran; 15 years total service.

Schock—Five years in the infantry and Army Air Corps; B-17 pilot in the Air Force in England; 13 months as a German prisoner of war.

Huebner—Thanks to the

typing and shorthand classes at Falls City High School, Bill served two years as secretary to the commanding officer at Ft. Bliss, TX.

Bahr—Served with the 128th FA Service Co. of the 6th Armored Division; in France nine

days following D Day; member of truck crew delivering supplies to battle zones; was in the Battle of the Bulge.

Rieschick—A mechanic in the Army's 484th Troop Carrier unit in Avon Park, FL.

Linderman—First post was Ft. Bliss, TX; last post was in Guam with the Army's 16th Base Post Office; in charge of Motor Pool that hauled mail from the boats at the docks to the Post Of-

fce. **Werner**—Initially in the Army, then transferred to the Air Force, serving mostly in Texas; attended radio and radar schools.

A sidelight: Huebner and Linderman were inducted together and their first stations were together at Ft. Bliss.

The presentations included some GI humor and also bits of gruesome experiences. The men responded to questions from the audience.

Following the playing of recorded theme songs of the various branches of service, there was a refreshments table and gifts were presented to the participants.

On Tuesday, Sept. 25 a book discussion will be held at 6:30 p.m. over the books "Surviving Hitler" by Andrea Warren and "The Hidden Children" by Howard Greenfield. On Saturday, Sept. 29, the movie *Boy in the Striped Pajamas* will be shown in the gallery starting at 10 a.m. The exhibition is toured by ExhibitsUSA, a national program of Mid-America Arts Alliance.
