FCPS announces hire of new South School Principal

A contract has been offered, and accepted, pending final board approval, by John "JP" Holys, for the Falls City South School Elementary Principal position.



The board will meet at 12:30 p.m. Monday, March 7, to discuss the job contract and give final approval.

Mr. Holys is the current elementary principal/Special Education Director for the Oakland-Craig Public Schools, a position he has held since 2006. Prior, Mr. Holys was a third grade teacher in the Elkhorn Public Schools. Mr. Holys was accompanied by his wife Debbie, and their two

"We are excited to have the Holys family joining our school and community," FCPS Superintendent Tim Heckenlively said.

Holys and candidates Catherine Gunderson of Kearney, Falls City native Andrew Hall, now of Schuyler, and Nathan Vitosh of Chase County, interviewed Feb. 26.

Holys will succeed Rita Johansen, who is retiring after this school year.

Escapee nabbed Sunday in Mississippi, returning to FC jail cell

Escaped Richardson County fugitive Michael Thompson, 36, was captured by the U.S. Marshalls Fugitive Task Force early Sunday Morning in Brandon, Mississippi.

Thompson, who is originally from Arkansas was apprehended in a trailer park and arrested on a federal warrant for felony escape. No one was injured in the arrest as Thompson cooperated with authorities.

Thompson waived his right to an extradition hearing which means he will be back in Falls City later this weekend. He is currently being housed in Mississippi.

Richardson County Sheriff Randy Houser stated two deputies will travel to Mississippi to pick Thompson up "some time this weekend." Thompson is scheduled to appear in county

court Monday morning. "He hasn't thrown any road blocks our way," said Houser.

It is believed Thompson had been catching rides at truck stops and authorities pinged the cell phone he stole from the jailer to help track him.

Houser and the Richardson County Sheriff's Office would like to thank the U.S. Marshalls Fugitive Task Force headed by Special Agent Bob Clark, the Arkansas State Police, Grant County Arkansas Sheriff's Office and the Federal Bureau of Investigation in both Lincoln and Omaha offices, for all their efforts in apprehending Thompson.

Inmate wraps cord around his neck, transported to St. Joe

An unnamed man, who was being booked into jail Sunday night, attempted to harm himself when he wrapped a short cord from the telephone that was in the cell around his neck.

Officers responded quickly and an ambulance was called. The ambulance transported him to a hospital in St. Joseph, MO.

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Capitol View

LINCOLN — It wasn't a bombshell but it certainly was a loud noise.

Gov. Dave Heineman said voters could be asked to eliminate the panel that settles labor disputes between state and local governments if the Legislature doesn't pass a suitable bill changing the way it operates.

Heineman said he reserved the right to decide what "suitable" means.

The state faces a revenue gap of up to \$1 billion over two fiscal years. Stuff runs downhill, so local governments are up against it, too.

The state and local governments agree the Commission's dispute-settling formula — created by the Legislature decades ago — is weighted in favor of public workers.

They want it changed so CIR decisions don't cost government so much. They want it to favor government.

What public employees and their supporters rightly suspect is that, if voters get the chance to do away with the CIR, the odds are it would happen.

The situation doesn't match the high drama and political fireworks of the situation in Wisconsin. Not one bit.

Government employees have merely benefited from the law that created the CIR, and rules under which the commission operates. Unions in Nebraska would likely get as much sympathy as a Big 12 football official if they struck against the state, a city or county. Lincoln Mayor's Plea Unheeded

Mayor Chris Beutler combined politics and an appeal to the collective conscience of lawmakers (I know, some think that's oxymoronic) when he spoke in defense of \$44 million in direct state aid to cities, counties and natural resources districts.

Make that soon-to-be-lost state aid.

"The Legislature has a real choice to make," the Lincoln mayor said. "Does it force its budget problems onto the backs of property tax payers or does it give us some options to deal with the cuts?"

As an attorney might say in a courtroom, objecting to the inquiry: "That question has been asked and answered!"

This column has covered the issue several times because it's a thing informed citizens need to know of; it might soon hit them in the wallet via higher local taxes, or in programs that might be important to them.

Cities and counties have pleaded their case to the Unicameral and the governor. They've been told to forget about it. The reality of that potential \$1 billion gap in state government revenues trumps their concerns.

The locals repeatedly noted the aid was to compensate them for the state stripping them of much of their local tax base.

The consistent response from the Tower on the Plains: You don't have to get over it. But you have to get used to it.

Dandy-Walker patient has uncontrolled seizures

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 20-year-old granddaughter was diagnosed with Dandy-Walker syndrome at the age of 2. By the time she was 12, she

had mild hydrocephalus and petit-mal seizures. We have tried antiseizure medications, which have not worked. Some meds have put her in a mental-health facility. She was also given Hal-dol, which made her catatonic. She had an acute reaction. She has a pediatric neurologist, but I feel that without any progress, this is as far as he can go. She has been going to him since she was 22 months old.

She was withdrawn from all medications two weeks ago, and all that she has been prescribed for a headache before her seizures was Tylenol and Ativan, which she takes following a seizure. She had three seizures on Saturday and one on Sunday. Thank you for any help you can provide.

DEAR READER: Dandy-Walker syndrome is a rare congenital brain malformation that involves the back of the brain and the fluid-filled spaces that surround it. The brain contains four ventricles, which are filled with cerebrospinal fluid. Features that generally occur in early infancy include enlargement of only the fourth ventricle, partial or complete absence of the portion of the brain between the two cerebellar hemispheres and the formation of cysts near the internal base of the skull. For older children, features and

symptoms can include convulsions, unsteadiness, jerky eye movements, a bulge at the back of the skull and problems with nerves that control breathing, the face, neck and eyes. The primary treatment for the condition is the placement of a shunt positioned in the brain to help drain excess cerebrospinal fluid to the peritoneal cavity, where it is absorbed into the body. Some children recover completely following shunt placement. For others, a lesser degree of progress is seen. Up to 90 percent of all Dandy-Walker patients have hydrocephalus, an increase in cerebrospinal fluid surrounding the brain.

The effects of the syndrome vary from person to person. Some children have normal cognition, while others don't. Longevity depends on the severity of the disorder. On a brighter note, research is ongoing and support groups are available.

Because you are having difficulties controlling her seizures, I recommend that a neurologist familiar with the disorder examine her. She certainly needs to have her seizures brought under control with appropriate medication. Check with your local hospital to determine the location of a teaching facility near you. Good luck.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have had vertigo for several months. I'm on Meclizine right now, but need help.

DEAR READER: Vertigo is the sensation your environment is spinning or moving around you. An inner-ear disorder, an acoustic neuroma, the sudden movement of your head in a certain direction, Meniere's disease, migraine headaches, arteriosclerosis, diabetes and more can cause the condition.

Make an appointment with your doctor for an examination and testing. He can zero in on the cause, make a referral if necessary, and get you back on track.



Get checked for colon cancer

Lincoln – This March, the American Cancer Society is encouraging all men and women age 50 and older to make getting tested for colorectal cancer a priority. Colorectal cancer (commonly referred to as colon cancer) is one of only two cancers that can actually be prevented through testing. Overall, colon cancer rates have declined rapidly in both men and women in the past two decades, due in part to early detection and removal of precancerous polyps. However, only half of the U.S. population aged 50 and older has been tested.

"We have an opportunity to significantly reduce death rates from colon cancer through regular testing," said Mike Lefler, Director of Communications for the Nebraska Region of the American Cancer Society. "However, there may be barriers to screening such as a lack of health insurance or lack of information. We hope that people will use this month – National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month – as an opportunity to talk to their doctors, family members and friends about getting tested. By doing so, they are taking a key step toward staying well."

In Nebraska an estimated 910 cases of colorectal cancer were expected to occur in 2010, and 360 deaths were expected. Colorectal cancer is the third most common cancer in both men and women. Risk factors for colon cancer include a personal family history of the disease.

In addition to testing, there are healthy lifestyle behaviors individuals can adopt to reduce risk of colon cancer. Studies show that being overweight or obese increases risk of colon cancer, and people whose diets include a high amount of red and processed meats are at increased risk. The

American Cancer Society recommends that adults engage in at least 30 minutes of moderate to vigorous physical activity on five or more days of the week; and consume a healthy diet that includes five or more servings of a variety of vegetables and fruits each day, whole grains (instead of processed grains and sugars), limited alcohol and processed and red meats, and controlled portion sizes. Cancer risk is reduced by achieving and maintaining a healthy weight.

Smoking also increases risk of colon cancer. A 2009 study from the American Cancer Society found that long-term smoking (smoking for 40 or more years) increases colon cancer risk by 30 to 50 percent. Smokers who want to quit can call the American Cancer Society Quit For Life® Program operated and managed by Free & Clear® at 1-800-227-2345 for tobacco cessation and coaching services that can help increase their chances of quitting for good. The Society also offers free online tools at cancer.org/Smokeout.

Engles, 60, served two terms as Auburn mayor and is a former member of the Auburn Public Schools Board of Education, serving for 12 years.


Engles works in insurance and real estate. He graduated from Peru State College in 1973 and is a former president of the PSC Foundation.

County enters into agreement with Humboldt, FC Police Dept.

Because of the Journal's publishing schedule, we are unable to publish a report of the Richardson County Commissioners' meeting during the week it is held. Thanks to Clerk Mary Eickhoff, the newspaper receives a draft of those minutes and will include highlights from those meetings.

Sheriff Randy Houser met with Commissioners Dave Sickel, Bill Ely and Jim Davidson when they met Tuesday, Feb. 22.

During this portion of the meeting, board members voted unanimously to enter into an agreement with the City of Humboldt for the county to provide law enforcement services to Humboldt beginning Sept. 1, 2010, and ending Aug. 31, 2013. The total contract amount is \$169,999.50, plus an additional amount of \$100 per month to be considered as a fuel surcharge for every increase of 50 cents per gallon of fuel (starting at \$3.50).

A Memorandum of Understanding with the City of Falls City was also approved. This authorizes Falls City Police officers to serve as Richardson County officers when needed.

Houser provided an update on business within his department and the jail. He also briefly discussed the STOP program and a resolution will be drafted for consideration at a future meeting to set forth the terms and conditions of a program in Richardson County.

A grievance hearing, requested by Natisha Winkelman, was conducted in public session as agreed to by all parties involved. After the hearing was closed, the board moved back into regular session and voted to deny the grievance. A motion was made to notify Nancy Ward, business representative of International Union of Operating Engineers Local 571, of the board's decision by registered mail.

Highway Supt. Scott Huppert provided an update and presented a purchase order for approval to purchase oxygen/acetylene bottles from Joy's Machine Shop in the amount of \$4,500. Huppert discussed the possibility of obtaining specialized equipment and/or tools required to complete necessary bridge repairs that comply with bridge inspection regulations. Huppert will gather more information on the specialized equipment.

Brandon Duerfeldt met with the board regarding the width and safety of the road in the Barada SE project, and Cecil Buckminster requested an update on the status for the completion of the hard-surfacing of the Preston Road.

After a public hearing, the One and Six Year Road Plan was approved, as was the corresponding resolution.

The board approved a recommendation from the Richardson County Visitor's Committee for funding of \$349.78 for the Falls City Chamber of Commerce for the Richardson County Visitor's Guides and reviewed and accepted the 2010 (year ended June 30) audit report from the Nebraska State Auditor.

Pawnee City receives \$8,000 recycling grant

Lincoln – USDA Rural Development has announced that the City of Pawnee City will receive a grant of \$8,000 that, leveraged with \$6,555 from the City, will purchase and install a multi-bin recycling trailer for the community.

"This is like a dream come true! The recycling trailer is something we have been working on for at least two years. Some of the youth who first started this in motion have graduated, but others have continued to pursue this green dream. We are excited to hear that this joint effort between our city and school will become a reality. Thank you so much," said Mayor Duane Westing, City of Pawnee City.

The \$14,555 for the recycling trailer will establish a stable, sustainable recycling connection for all citizens of Pawnee City.

More than \$381 million invested in rural Nebraska

Lincoln – USDA Rural Development in Nebraska reports a record year of program delivery with nearly \$381.4 million of investments into the state with the help of Recovery Act funding. As outlined in their Fiscal Year 2010 Rural Development Annual Report, the funds assisted in areas of housing, business and community development, energy, telecommunications and broadband.

"Nebraska communities, businesses and citizens made millions of dollars of investments in 2010, with the support and resources of USDA Rural Development," said Nebraska State Director, Maxine Moul, USDA Rural Development. "USDA Rural Development has clearly accomplished what the Recovery Act intended-- more rural residents assisted, jobs created and community facilities built, bringing an improved quality of life to rural Nebraska."

The 2010 Annual Report highlights the Recovery Act projects and others funded in Nebraska through regular appropriations.

The report shows a breakdown of \$113.2 million expended for housing, \$112.4 received for telecommunications, \$80.6 million to business and energy, \$63.9 million for community facilities and water and wastewater, and \$11.3 million for broadband.

Investment in community facilities will benefit 22 communities through \$43 million for projects such as libraries, public safety, tribal colleges, community/senior centers, ag societies, street improvements and equipment. Also, six Critical Access hospitals received funding totaling \$40.1 million, to serve 76,279 rural residents. Over the last five fiscal years, Rural Development has assisted in 20 hospital projects with \$127.9 million in loans, loan guarantees and grants.

Water and wastewater systems will be impacted by \$20.9 million that will assist 14 communities and 2,463 households.

Investments in telecommunications will note loans totaling \$112.3 million awarded to Southeast Nebraska Telephone Company at Falls City, Arapahoe Telephone Company, Glenwood Telephone Membership Corporation at Blue Hill, and Northeast Nebraska Telephone

Company at Jackson.

Southeast Nebraska Communications Inc. was awarded a loan and grant totaling \$11.3 million through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) Broadband Initiatives Program. The project expects to benefit approximately 3,000 people, 50 businesses, and 20 community institutions. In addition to the jobs this project will create initially, it will help drive economic development and create jobs for decades to come.

Impact to business saw eighteen businesses receiving funding totaling \$69.2 million to assist in business development activities. Also, financial assistance totaling \$5.9 million was provided for purchasing and installing renewable energy systems or making energy efficiency improvements for 157 ag producers and rural small businesses. Three Microenterprise Development Organizations received \$1.5 million to capitalize three rural microloan revolving funds and provide technical assistance and training to support the development and ongoing success of rural microentrepreneurs and microenterprises. Also, loans and grants totaling \$1.6 million were made to four USDA Rural Development electric program borrowers to finance business and community development projects.

Home loan programs brought homeownership to 1,204 households through \$103.2 million in USDA Rural Development funding. Essential repairs to rural owner-occupied homes were provided to 125 homeowners by financing of \$750,500. Rural Development provided affordable rent to 3,593 tenants of Rural Development multi-family rural rental housing complexes through \$7.1 million in funding. Four existing Rural Development rural rental housing complexes received \$2 million to preserve and revitalize their facilities and provide continued affordable rents to tenants.



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

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No repeat trip to big dance, but future bright for Falls City

Tiger seniors part of 66-career wins, tied for 2nd all-time

The Falls City High boys' basketball program looked to exercise some demons Monday night in Beatrice. In 2008, the Tigers entered as the favorite and looked to get to Lincoln for the first time in what was then 45 years. They faced 11-10 Lincoln Lutheran, a team they had defeated by 14 points just six weeks prior. We all know how that one ended.

The 2011 version had a different feel to it as the Tigers' role was reversed. This time Falls City was David to Milford's Goliath. The Tigers entered the contest with a 12-13 record compared to 20-3 Milford.

Unfortunately, the improbable run ended as the Tigers fell in the district final to the Eagles, 64-51. The late-season surge that had propelled Falls City into its third district final in four years saw the Tigers playing their best basketball when it mattered most. Falls City played their two most complete games last week in Johnson with victories over Syracuse (60-40) and Ashland-Greenwood (63-52). Both opponents, however, were sub-.500 teams on the season.

Milford is a battle-tested team whose only losses include Sutton (20-4, State qualifier), Hastings St. Cecilia (19-6, State qualifier) and an overtime loss at Plattsmouth just three days after the Tigers lost on the road there.

"We battled well with a stronger and taller team," said FC Head Coach Don Hogue. "We will miss our seniors. They were part of the State tourney team last year and were in the district final three of the last four years."

The 2011 graduating seniors – Logan Faller, Ethan Fritz, Trevor Harling and Jack Munford – will go down as one of the most successful senior classes in Falls City history with a 66-30 career record. For some perspective, last year's graduating class was a part of 73 victories, the 08-09 class also won 66 and the seniors on the 1963 State Champion team won 51 games.

Falls City, behind freshman Mitchell Harling's three first quarter 3-pointers, jumped out to an early 13-7 lead mid-way through the first quarter. Milford answered though and scored the quarter's final 10 points to regain the lead 17-13.

The Tigers stormed back in the final three minutes of the first half outscoring the Eagles 14-6. The exclamation point came just before the half as senior Trevor Harling made a great pass to fellow senior Logan Faller for the final bucket before the break and the Tigers entered the lockers ahead 32-30.

It was all Milford, however, in the second half. The Eagles' Coleman Dahle, a 6-4 junior, who was relatively quiet in the first half, scored 12 of his game-high 18 points after halftime. Milford outscored Falls City 14-4 in the third quarter and wore the Tigers down.

"We wore down a little bit with their physicality in the paint," said Hogue. "They were getting shots in the paint early in the game that weren't falling, but then they became easier for them as the game went along."

Falls City had some good looks around the basket in the second half, but they either just did not fall or were altered by Milford defenders.

"It was a lot like the old days of Husker football," Hogue commented. "They just pound on you and pound on you and eventually by the fourth quarter things just open up."

Milford held a sizable advantage on the boards out-rebounding the Tigers 24-14 and 8-3 on the offensive glass. The Tigers on the season did

a great job pounding the glass and finished with a one rebound per game advantage over their opponents – 22.1 to 21.1. That says a lot about a team that played with three or four guards on the court at the same time and a "big" man in Faller, who is more of a small forward, but held his own under the glass all season.

Mitchell Harling led Falls City with 14 points and brother Trevor and Faller each added 10. Faller grabbed a team-high six boards and had three assists. Trevor also dished out three assists and was 6-8 at the free-throw line.

"I'm real happy with the intensity and work ethic these kids showed all year," said Hogue. "We were really competitive at the end of the season and I wish we could have found our niche just a little sooner."

The future is mighty bright for the boys' basketball program. Juniors Josh Stoller (7.0 ppg, 2 stls) and Kenny Frederick (4.2 ppg) will be the only returning seniors next year, so youth is plentiful. Sophomore Cord Huettnner (6.6 ppg, 4.2 rpg) started every game this year and fellow soph Wade Witt (5.3 ppg, 3 rpg) developed into a

steady, consistent threat off the bench. Look for Witt to start next season. Mitchell Harling (6.3 ppg, 2.5 apg), who made his mark on Tiger basketball in the first game of the season and/or his high school career against Syracuse, will only get better and should develop into a great floor general over the next three years. That amounts to five of your top seven players returning next season. Two other sophomores – Brandt Vice and Mitchell Campbell – and three freshman – Tyler DiGiacomo, Ryan Mount, Reese Hogue – rounded out the varsity roster for the duration of the season and should be in the mix next winter. Also, the eighth grade boys, coached by Kevin Scheitel, finished their middle school careers with a 23-0 record (12-0 in 8th and 11-0 in 7th, respectively).

Without a doubt Hogue has this program going in the right direction and the team has bought into the defensive philosophy. Consistent scoring was a problem at times this season, especially after halftime, and will need to be addressed this offseason – 12 times this year FC was held below 10 points in the third quarter. If these young lads get in the gym and put in the work the second weekend of March in Lincoln is a real possibility for years to come.

First-place winners in each of the 15 categories received \$500 tuition scholarships (for on-campus classes) to PSC. PSC offers tuition through its "One Rate, Any State" program, which allows students from across the country to take classes while paying in-state tuition rates. Medals were also awarded to first through fifth-place winners in each category.

Tax check-off benefits wildlife conservation

Tax season annually provides an opportunity for Nebraskans to contribute to wildlife and habitat conservation.

Line 41 on the 2010 state income tax form (Form 1040N) allows individuals to donate all or a part of their tax refund to the Wildlife Conservation Fund.

"The check-off is one of the principal sources of state funding used to conserve more than 98 percent of fish and wildlife species that are not hunted, trapped or fished," said Kristal Stoner, of the Nebraska Game and Parks Commission.

Many of these species are exceedingly rare or experiencing serious declines. "Some of these species are listed as threatened and endangered," Stoner said. "We use Wildlife Conservation Fund dollars to recover those species and prevent future listings."

For example, the western slender glass lizard is Nebraska's rarest lizard. It had not been seen in Nebraska since 1932 until a herpetologist conducting a field survey in 2010 found three glass lizards in Franklin and Webster counties.

Check-off donations are matched to other grant sources that require a financial match before they can be used; so a donation of \$10 allows \$40 to be spent on wildlife projects.

"Without sources of matching funds like the check-off, we would be unable to use many of our federal grants."

OPPD reintroduces refrigerator/freezer recycling program

Thousands of old and inefficient refrigerators will be hitting the recycling bin soon as the Omaha Public Power District brings back a popular program. OPPD's refrigerator/freezer recycling program in 2010 took nearly 2,100 inefficient units off the grid when it ran last fall. As part of the program, OPPD arranges for the pick-up of older, energy-wasting refrigerators or freezers and pays participating customers \$35 as an incentive.

Older refrigerators can consume up to four times more energy than newer units. Operating in unconditioned spaces like a garage makes them work even harder, especially in the hot days of summer.

The program went over so well, it ran out of money with 177 units on the waiting list.

"We were excited by the success of the first program," said OPPD Vice President of Employee & Customer Relations Tim Burke. "By removing these refrigerators and freezers from the grid, we will help delay the need to build more generating units, which can be very expensive."

OPPD contracts with JACO Environmental to remove the appliances from participating customers' homes and then dismantle and recycle them. JACO's process recycles 95 percent of the material in the appliances. Even the foam insulation, which cannot be recycled, is safely incinerated through a method that generates electricity for the grid.

Some of the materials inside refrigerators and freezers pose an environmental threat if discarded in landfills.

The program covers the removal of up to two units per household. Appliances to be recycled must be in working order, with an inside measurement of between 10 and 32 cubic feet. The program will run through October, 2011 if funds permit.

2011 unclaimed property owners

In addition to the familiar Andersons and Johnsons and Petersons who populate Nebraska's 93 counties, some other big names are showing up in the 2011 list of unclaimed property owners, to be published in 16 Nebraska newspapers in March and April.

There are institutions of higher learning, major health care centers, banks and insurance companies, public and private entities, and the biggest businesses in the state, as well as hotels, restaurants, doctors' offices, and ordinary citizens. In all, the Unclaimed Property Division of the Nebraska State Treasurer's Office is holding property valued at more than \$100 million for more than 350,000 Nebraskans or former Nebraskans.

"One of my priorities as State Treasurer is to return unclaimed property to its rightful owners. I encourage all Nebraskans to look for their names in our newspaper publication or check our website at www.treasurer.org," State Treasurer Don Stenberg said.

Meaghan Aguirre, director of the Unclaimed Property Division, said that unclaimed property could be in the form of stocks, dividends, utility deposits, mutual funds, lost IRAs, matured CDs, and unused gift certificates. The property also could be in the form of court deposits, payroll wages, refunds, commissions, dormant accounts, and safe deposit boxes.

The 2011 list includes names of people and organizations with funds reported to the Unclaimed Property Division during the past year; most entries were only recently added to the list. This year's list includes an estimated 25,000 names and represents almost \$20 million in unclaimed property.

Once a year, according to state law, the Unclaimed Property Division publishes the names of people and organizations for whom the state is holding unclaimed property. This year's 28-page publication will come out March 6 in the Omaha World-Herald and the Scottsbluff Star-Herald. The tabloid publication

will be published on the following dates in the following Nebraska newspapers:

March 6 - Omaha World-Herald and Scottsbluff Star-Herald.

March 19 - Beatrice Daily Sun, Fremont Tribune, Norfolk Daily News, York News-Times.

March 20 - Lincoln Journal Star, Columbus Telegram.

April 1 - Holdrege Citizen, McCook Gazette.

April 2 - Alliance Times-Herald, Hastings Tribune, Kearney Hub, Sidney Sun-Telegraph.

April 3 - Grand Island Independent, North Platte Telegraph.

Aguirre suggests that readers look for their own names as well as the names of relatives, businesses, and friends in the tabloid publication. The names are listed by last known county of residence. All claims are verified by the Unclaimed Property Division staff. Readers who find their names or the names of their businesses or of deceased relatives should use one of the following methods to file claims:

—Call the Unclaimed Property Division at 1-877-572-9688 toll free outside of Lincoln or 402-471-8497 in Lincoln. Phone calls are taken between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. weekdays.

—Complete the claim form found inside the front cover of the newspaper tabloid and mail to the State Treasurer's Office, Unclaimed Property Division, 809 Street, Lincoln, NE 68508-1390. That form will need to be notarized.

—Check your name on the Nebraska State Treasurer's website at www.treasurer.org. Type your name in the box on the home page, or click on the Search for Unclaimed Property link in the left navigation pane. In many circumstances, owners may be able to file their claims online through the website.

Payday loan scammers use fear for own payday

Lincoln – In these tough economic times, some Nebraskans are struggling to make ends meet. Families work hard for their paychecks and look for ways to stretch every dollar. Unfortunately, scammers are finding ways to steal hard-earned cash from those who are facing financial hardships.

In the past 30 days, our mediation center has received more than 20 reports of payday loan collection scams targeting Nebraskans.

In these scams, a caller claims that the victim is delinquent in a payday loan that must be repaid immediately to avoid legal consequences. The scammers pose as representatives of the FBI, a law firm or another legitimately named agency. The scammers claim to be collecting debts for companies such as United Cash Advance, U.S. Cash Advance, U.S. Cash Net and other Internet check cashing services.

One of the most insidious aspects of this scam is that the callers have accurate information about the victims, including: Social Security numbers, dates of birth, addresses, employer information, bank account numbers, and names and telephone numbers of relatives and friends. According to the FBI, fraudsters may be obtaining the victims' personal information from completed online applications for other loans or credit cards.

The fraudsters relentlessly call the victim's home, cell phone and place of employment. They refuse to provide to the victims any details of the alleged payday loans and become abusive when questioned. The callers threaten victims with legal actions, arrests and, in some cases, physical violence if payment is not received. In many cases, the callers resort to harassment of the victim's relatives, friends and employers.

Some fraudsters instruct victims to fax a statement agreeing to pay a certain dollar amount, on a specific date, via prepaid visa card. The scammers also require a statement declaring that the victim will never dispute the debt.

These telephone calls are an attempt to obtain payment by instilling fear. If you receive a similar call, do not follow the instructions of the caller. Instead:

- Contact the payday lender directly to verify any outstanding debt.
 - Contact your banking institutions.
 - Contact the three major credit bureaus and request an alert be put on your file.
 - Contact your local law enforcement agencies if you feel you are in immediate danger.
 - File a complaint at www.IC3.gov.
- For more information, contact our Consumer Protection Division or file a complaint at www.ago.ne.gov.

Classes are set to begin soon with driving scheduled to begin on the third week of February. We currently have 36 students registered for the course; March 15th is the deadline for option enrollment students to be eligible immediately I the fall. Option enrollment forms may be obtained at either district. Students who do not have their forms signed on or before March 15th will be ineligible for varsity activities for 90 school days; Parent Teacher conferences are scheduled to be held on Tuesday and Thursday, March 15th and 17th from 5-8:30 p.m. each evening; Curriculum guide for the 2011-12 school year is being updated. We hope to start scheduling students later this month; Received \$1,000 from Sunmart for \$150,000 of receipts.

2.3 BOARD PRESIDENT'S REPORT - President Harris noted that District received thank you from the Huppert Family; reported on Labor Relations Conference that was attended by President Harris, Superintendent Heckenlively and Board Member John Martin; Thank you to the First Methodist Church for Valentine treats.

2.4 SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT -

2.4a Legislative and Organizations Report: Several bills impacting education, are addressed by the Education Committee, with a focus on school finance. A few bills we will be paying special attention to include several attempts to "adjust" the TEEOSA Act for State Aid. Allowances such as instructional time, teacher education and student growth are being considered for elimination from the formula calculation. NDE has been directed to run a model of both 235 and 236. The consensus has been that 235 is a much better across the board result than 236. No surprise there. Discussions also continues surrounding the contributions needed for the school retirement plan. With projected fund shortfalls, a consideration of up to a 1% increase in both the employee and employer contribution is being considered, bringing the contribution to a figure near 9.28%. Senator Fulton has introduced a bill that would reduce the percentage a district can budget in necessary cash reserves but would require additional state aid to make up the difference. This bill is not drawing much support out of the Appropriations Committee.

During the NASB Legislative Issues Conference in late January, Governor Heinemann urged school boards and school administrators to get involved in the discussion involving the Commission of Industrial Relations, in this period of diminishing resources. NCSA has been active in attempting to draft a compromise proposal with the NSEA but has failed to come to common ground. With this being said, NASB is urging local boards of education to adopt the attached Resolution on the CIR for helping local boards and to then forward the resolution to both our state Senator, as well as the Governor. The resolution will be presented as an action item for adoption.

The Education Jobs Fund, which is the latest round of federal stimulus dollars approved by Congress in September of 2010, has quickly advanced to select file in the legislature as LB 18. Provisions of this bill will provide the avenue for distribution of these funds by re-certification of state aid, possibly as early as April 2011. Furthermore, 2011-2012 certification of state aid to local school districts will be delayed until July 1st, at the latest.

2.4b Building and Grounds Update: The boiler vessel replacement for the High School has been contracted with Plibrico Co. at a cost of \$20,668. We are very fortunate that our property insurance will cover this unexpected expense completely, minus our \$1,000 deductible. These boilers are manufactured upon order so we are still a few weeks away from having the project completed. Additionally, Mike K. is working with the boiler manufacturer to develop a maintenance plan that will be designed to improve efficiency and prolong the life of the existing boilers in the district.

The High School Old gym remains to be replaced later this summer but prior to installation the water drainage issues on the east side of the high school will need to be addressed in or-

der to avoid a future loss.

The Project Committee recommendations will be provided at the March 14 Regular Board meeting and an action item will be included at that time to put the recommendations in the 2010-2011 column into play.

2.4c School Improvement Process: The steering committee continues to meet on a monthly basis and will be addressing key actions in the School Improvement Process. The initial steps at this point focus on examining research-based factors related to student performance and determining expectations for student learning. The steering committee, along with a smaller group of FCPS stakeholders, developed a shared vision to focus on school improvement and determined the mission and belief statements in the past few months. The AdvanceED Conference will be in Chicago, March 19-22 for 2011. We will have two members attend as we have done each year.

2.4d Staffing Planning: The interview date for the South School Principal / Assessments Coordinator position is set for Saturday, February 26, 2011 at 8:00 A.M. at the Falls City Middle School. An interview team consisting of teachers, administrators and board members will be involved in the process and selection. The final contract approval is made by the Board, although depending upon the time frame, the contract will likely be offered and accepted pending Board approval at the March 14 Regular Board Meeting.

2.4e Makeup Days: The Administrative Council recommends the following: March 11 (Spring Break) becomes a school day, if a team qualifies for the state tournament, school is held if not playing during the school day. April 25 (Good Monday). Approval of these days will be an action item.

Iron Chlorosis a problem in trees

The warm weather we have had the past few days gets us thinking about spring and our gardens and landscapes.

It seems a little early to be thinking about trees, but it is im-

portant to think about potential problems of trees before they occur. Iron chlorosis is a problem in several communities and it doesn't go away.

The most common trees associated with this condition are pin oaks and silver maples. Other trees that are susceptible are sweet gum and bald Cypress. White pine, sugar maple, red maple, sycamore, ornamental pear and some crabapple are other common species that may develop iron chlorosis. It is a disease that can be treated and it may save your tree in the long-run.

Why does iron chlorosis develop? Iron chlorosis can occur if iron is either deficient in the soil or unavailable to trees. Under most circumstances, iron is plentiful in the soils in our region and is available to trees growing in soils with a pH of 5.0 to 6.5. In soils with a pH of 7.0 (neutral) or higher, iron is converted to an insoluble form

that is less available to growing plants. High levels of copper, manganese or zinc in the soil and excessive applications of phosphorus fertilizer will also contribute to the problem.

Treatment of iron chlorosis can be expensive so if you are planting new trees, selection of trees that are less affected by low iron availability is recommended.

Iron is very important in producing chlorophyll, the green pigment in leaves. If there is a deficiency of iron, less chlorophyll is produced and a yellowing of leaves occurs. On deciduous trees, the leaf veins remain green while the area between the veins is yellow-green to yellow. Leaves that emerge later in the year may be smaller and more yellow. Under severe cases the leaves may turn white and finally brown. If left untreated, branches may dieback and the tree may eventually die after several years.

Soil testing is the easiest method to determine your soil pH and other nutrients available to the tree. This should be done before any treatment for iron chlorosis. Take soil samples to about a 6-8 inch depth at several locations around the tree and mix together. You need about a pint of soil for testing. While the University of Nebraska Soil Testing Laboratory is not open anymore, the Nemaha County Extension office has a list of commercial laboratories.

If a high soil pH is confirmed there are several methods to provide iron to your tree. Adding iron through foliar application, soil amendments, trunk injection and trunk implantation are methods of treatment. If a rapid response is needed, foliar application may be applied to the leaves when the tree is fully leafed out. Soil treatment by adding iron, in the form of ferrous sulfate and also lowering the pH with the addition of sulfur is a more permanent way of correcting iron chlorosis; unfortunately it is more difficult. You need to drill several holes in the soil, add the mixture of ferrous sulfate and sulfur and cap them off with soil. For best results, treat the soil in the spring.

Iron compounds may also be injected or implanted into the trunk to correct the problem. These treatments should be applied in May or June for best results. If you have trees that were a problem last year, be on the watch this spring and treat them if needed. Later treatments are often not as effective. For more detailed information on iron chlorosis in trees contact me at the Nemaha County Extension office at (402) 274-4755.

Reverse mortgages: Know the traps

At a time when many baby boomers are struggling to pay mortgages on homes that have lost value, the ads for reverse mortgages can sound like a lifeline.

But don't reach for one too quickly, Consumer Reports advises. Reverse mortgages, which carry huge costs, can lead to foreclosure and should be seen only as a last resort.

Reverse mortgages allow people who are at least 62 years of age to cash in some of their home equity for a lump sum or regular payouts while staying in the home. As long as borrowers maintain the home and pay the property tax and insurance premiums, the loan doesn't have to be repaid until the last borrower dies, sells the place, or lives elsewhere for 12 months. One Reverse Mortgage is a major lender, as are Wells Fargo, Bank of America and MetLife Bank.

Most reverse mortgages are insured through the Federal Housing Administration's Home Equity Conversion Mortgage (HECM) program. Recent changes in that program and heightened competition among lenders are resulting in new loan options and lower up-front costs.

But other costs have increased dramatically, and ballooning finance charges can quickly drain your home equity. You also risk foreclosure if you can't afford the property tax and insurance and can't work out a repayment plan, under new federal guidelines announced in January. Those defaults and other costs are threatening the solvency of the government insurance fund that makes the loans virtually risk-free for lenders.

That's why it's important to fully understand the complex terms of reverse mortgages. CR tells you what you need to know about three choices being promoted now:

— Fixed-rate reverse mortgages. The amount of equity you can tap from a standard reverse mortgage depends on three variables: your age, the property's value and the interest rate on the loan. Generally, the older you are, the higher the value and the lower the interest rate, the more money you can borrow.

— Like other mortgages, the reverse type comes with either a fixed or adjustable rate. The proportion of fixed-rate reverse mortgages issued in 2010 soared to 69 percent, up from 11 percent the previous year. With a fixed-rate reverse mortgage, you must take all the money in a lump sum at the outset, and interest starts accruing immediately.

Bottom line. The large up-front interest costs make fixed-rate reverse mortgages worth considering only if you absolutely must tap all available equity immediately.

— Adjustable-rate loans. The interest rate you'll pay on an adjustable-rate reverse mortgage can change every month. Over the life of the loan, rates can rise by as much as 10 percentage points. But on the plus side, you have the option to take cash in lump sums, in regular monthly payments, or through a credit line that you tap only when necessary. Interest is not assessed until you draw on the available funds.

Bottom line. The flexibility the loans offer is an advantage, but CR warns that rate hikes can send your costs soaring.

— Reverse home equity line. In late 2010, the FHA introduced a new type of reverse mortgage called a HECM Saver, which eliminates most of the 2 percent up-front insurance premium borrowers must pay on regular federally backed loans. The Saver's up-front premium is just 0.01 percent, so for a \$300,000 home, it would come to \$30 instead of \$6,000. The ongoing annual premium that borrowers must pay is the same as for a standard reverse mortgage: 1.25 percent of the loan's outstanding balance. But Saver borrowers are limited to taking 10 to 18 percent less than the standard version allows.

Bottom line. The Saver might make sense for borrowers who want to tap only a small amount of equity for a relatively short period of time, but are unable to qualify for a home equity line of credit.

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
