

Sun setting on St. Mark's Lutheran

A rural Verdon church will hold its final service on Easter Sunday after serving the community for 133 years. St. Mark's Evangelical Lutheran Church will close its doors due to lack of attendance and a drop in donations.

The large farm families that founded the congregation have all but disappeared over the years and fifth and sixth generation members have found worship elsewhere, but to those whose lives the church impacted, the memories will last a lifetime.

"I always looked forward to Christmas Eve Services with my family and getting dressed up in our Christmas outfits," LuAnn Meinheit Moon said. "It was always such a beautiful, traditional service and made me feel so warm, safe and filled with love."

Marsha (Kentopp) Niday, a Falls City High School graduate now living in Fremont, was baptized, confirmed and married at St. Mark's. Her father, the late Bill Kentopp, was at one time the church council president.

"We truly had some incredible teachers and leaders at St. Mark's. Even in this small country church, there are hundreds, if not thousands, of people who have a piece of this church in their hearts," Marsha Niday added. "I realize how disappointing--even devastating it

"We are the Church."

The road hasn't always been a smooth one for St. Mark's Lutheran Church. The contemporary building on a quiet gravel road two miles south and one mile east of Verdon has a rich history rooted in the soil upon where it sits. The small congregation that still worships each Sunday is made up of many whose ancestors help found, build or rebuild the church so long ago.

The seed of the current church was planted when a group of Richardson County Lutherans began to meet in the early 1800's in the small Harkendorff school house for worship services. Decades later, in 1882 under Rev. Gromish, the first steps towards organizing a congregation were taken in 1882 when trustees John G. Heinzelman Sr., Henry Jorn Sr. and William Oswald were elected for "St. Marien's Evangelical Lutheran Church."

A year later, in 1883, the land on which the current church sits was purchased for one dollar. The new church was dedicated the same

Former Clerk accepts plea, owes Dawson \$25,000-plus

A former Village of Dawson

Clerk who altered 21 checks totaling \$26,611.74 and used Village funds to pay personal bills was originally charged with six felony forgery counts in Richardson County District Court, but now faces

just one after reaching an agreement with the County Attorney's Office.

Jennifer L. Stutheit, 32, of Humboldt, last Tuesday pled guilty to second degree forgery, a Class III Felony, and in exchange prosecutors dropped four similar counts, as well as a fifth, second degree forgery, a Class IV Felony. She will appear back in Court May 3 for sentencing.

On the surface, it would appear Stutheit received the deal of a lifetime, as a Nebraska Auditor of Public Accounts report alleged the former Village employee between Oct. 1, 2013 and April 20, 2015 used public funds as her personal ATM

FC Sixpence awarded \$275,000 grant

The Trustees of the Sixpence Early Learning Fund steer children toward healthier, more productive life announced this week that Falls City will be one of sev- outcomes.

en Nebraska communities to receive new funding to school districts in partnerships with local licensed early care and education providers for infants

and toddlers at risk. Falls City's award of \$275,000 joins North Platte, Kearney, and a consortium serving multiple communities in the Nebraska through hubs in Chadron, Gering, and Sidney, for grants totaling more than \$1.3 million after a com-

petitive application and review process. Sixpence, a collaborative funding structure involving the Nebraska's Department of Health and Human Services, the Department of Education and private sector investors, has issued grants to community partnerships statewide since 2008, now totaling 35 communities. Traditionally, these Sixpence grants are awarded to school districts working with other local agencies that meet the statutory requirements governing the use of Sixpence funds providing either center-based or home-based family engagement programs. This latest round of grants is the first time Sixpence funds have been made available to partnerships including licensed child care providers with a different set of statutory requirements specifically supported by Nebraska's Step Up to Qual-

ity rating and improvement system. According to recent data, approximately 30,000 infants and toddlers, or more than 40 percent of Nebraska children between birth and age 3, face risk factors that threaten their chances of arriving at kindergarten developmentally on par with their peers. These children are more likely to struggle in the K-12 system, attain a lower level of education, enter the criminal justice system as offenders, develop chronic health problems and earn less as working adults. Neuroscientific, sociological and even economic evidence suggests that stimulating and supportive experiences in the first years of life encourage the emergence of cognitive skills, behaviors and character traits that drive academic success and

While child development experts agree that parents play the most important role in children's earliest learning and developmental experiences, it is also true that child care is a reality for Nebraskans who must participate in the workforce to provide for their families. The new

ship grants ensure that more

infants and toddlers are be-

ing cared for in environments that provide the kinds of early learning experiences known to narrow the achievement gap.

The FCPS administration says it's "committed to helping all children from birth through age 3 and their families achieve success through quality services in every area of the community." This is accomplished through strong partnerships with Health and Human Services, licensing specialists, Head Start and SENCA, ESU #4, Community Medical Center, the Falls City Library & Arts Center, the Ministerial Association, the SE Nebraska Health Dept., and the SE Early Learning Connection.

"This grant adds to our partners the licensed childcare providers of the Falls City community who play an important part in the development of young children," District 56 Supt. Tim Heckenlively said. "These providers will receive training, materials, and support to help them in this role. This grant will provide a coach/ teacher to offer guidance in achieving the grant goals. This grant totals \$275,000 the first year, and \$225,000 for the next two years.

"Childcare providers are professionals in their field," Sixpence Supervisor Kathy Martin said. "This grant will recognize their accomplishments, and provide them with the tools and education needed to do their jobs. We are grateful to be given this opportunity."

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Four fountains becoming a Capitol reality

Mom always said that nothing good happens fast. If she was right, this new project at the Nebraska State Capitol is going to be a doozy since it is nearly 100 years in the making.

Construction is well underway on the four courtyard fountains, which had been included in original plans for the building but were scrapped by financial concerns when the third Capitol building was constructed. It has taken nearly a decade for some forsenators and other Capi-

tol enthusiasts to see a dream come true.

Capitol Administrator Bob Ripley, who says the fountains will be done in time for the 2017 Sesquicentennial activities, likens the task to building a ship in a bottle. The fountains are being built in courtyards that are completely surrounded by building. Dirt has to be removed through the hallways of the building. Construction materials, including yard upon yard of concrete, steel and stone, have to be brought through the build-

Yes, it would have been much easier to build the fountains during construction of the original building. But, money was tight and folks were obviously in a hurry to build the third Capitol and do it right. The first lasted only a few years and had to be torn down because of inferior building materials. The second developed a huge crack in one wall, apparently because of shoddy building practices, and had to be torn down after the current Capitol was built around it.

The history of the three Capitols in Lincoln began at statehood in 1867 with a two-story building with a central cupola, made of native limestone. The second Capitol was started in 1881 and finished in 1888. In 1915, plans began for the third – and current -- Capitol on the same site. The second one was left in place and the new one built around it. Then the old was torn down and the center of the current Capitol stands in its place.

Architect Bertram Goodhue's design called for placement of a fountain in each of the four courtyards within the building, but the project - as well as a set of murals in the tower -- was abandoned during the Great Depression. Talk of the fountains surfaced again after the murals were finally installed in 1996. That left the fountains as the last original design to be completed.

Former Omaha Senators John Nelson and Scott Price were among those who pushed to make the fountain project happen. Nelson called the Capitol a state treasure that belongs to the people. He said "we owe it to the people to assure it's complete." The project became the first major one for the Nebraska Association of Former State Legislators, a group formed in 1976 that had previously only held reunion banquets. Many other former senators, including association director Vicki McDonald, stepped forward to get the project on track.

The project comes with a price. Lincoln's Kingery Construction Company won the bid for \$2.79 million. A budget bill passed in 2014 authorized the Capitol Commission to use \$2.5 million from the state's rainy day fund to install the fountains, to make improvements to support the operation and maintenance of the fountains, and do associated courtyard landscape restoration.

That money was hard fought. The Legislature had to override a veto from then-Gov. Dave Heineman who used the all-too familiar line that he wanted to use every dollar available for property tax cuts. After all, a guy's got to get re-elected. The Governor said the courtyards were rarely used. But, another

\$500,000 was added to the fund in 2015 with a transfer of money already appropriated to the Capitol Commission but unused. Heineman suggested that private donors finance the fountains.

> But, the group persisted. Former Lincoln Senator DiAnna Schimek said

it's very important that the people of Nebraska have ownership of the building. They made great sacrifices for the original construction and completing the building as it was designed will be a tribute to those efforts.

Goodhue's fountains were inspired by the cooling fountains he saw on a trip through Persia. They included dish-like, cast bronze bubblers and designs representative of the many people groups who have inhabited the state. Ripley said Goodhue's plans also called for colorful, flowering hedges. A return of that landscaping will make the courtyards more attractive and enticing to users.

Hat's off to all who are making the completion of the original State Capitol design a reality. Even if it took 100 years.

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Plea bargain includes restitution to Village

by racking up \$27,798.50 in total fraudulent charges.

Though nothing is official until the judge hands down a sentence, Assistant Richardson County Attorney Zach Blackman said terms of the agreement include repayment of more than \$25,000 to the Village of Dawson. Stutheit allegedly signed a confession dated April 21, 2015, admitting to altering bank statements and using Village funds to pay for her personal NPPD bills. She was fired from the position last spring.

Village Board Chair Bill Koch said Monday he was "glad they're going after restitution," but that the Village of Dawson incurred a \$15,000 bill from the APA for conducting the audit, thus is out about \$40,000 from the ordeal.

"I think the county's judicial system should've done more for us," he said. "We were victimized and we're not really satisfied with how the system handled this."

Koch said he will serve out the remaining two years of his term, but does not plan to run for the office again.

Other members of the Village Board during the audit period included Charles Laux, Roger Goos, Phil Fisher, Jim Nincehelser and Brian Johnson.

In its report, the APA "identified a significant number of financial transactions from the Village that are highly questionable and could be fraudulent," including:

- 21unauthorized payments totaling \$26,611.74 to the former Clerk, who "appears to have altered the copies of the checks included on the bank statements in an effort to conceal that these checks were made payable to her."

-Three personal electricity payments totaling \$832.26 to NPPD.

-\$100 in water deposits not deposited in the Village account.

-A \$154.50 money order not paid to a vendor.

The APA report also had a harsh assessment for the Village Board, noting "the Village's control environment was not conducive to fair and complete financial statements.


The Board, according to the Auditor, "failed to monitor properly the financial activity of the Village to ensure the accuracy and completeness of its financial records, failed to maintain adequate



supporting documentation for a number of transactions," making \$66,746.71 in payments with no documentation or inadequate documentation to support the expense, failed to comply with the Record Management Act and Open Meetings Act.

The Auditor's Office recommend the Board implement proper monitoring and controls over the Village's finances, including the following:

•Performing a periodic review of the Village's accounting records compared to its bank statements to ensure their agreement and that

there are no unauthorized uses of Village funds.

•Conducting an adequate review of the documentation supporting all claims presented to the Board for approval.

•Ensuring all claims against the Village are presented properly to the Board for approval by comparing the claims presented to the actual bank statements.

•Implementing procedures to ensure all amounts received from residents are properly deposited to

the Village's bank accounts. •Ensuring all claims are properly paid by warrant, as required by statute.

•Determining whether a petty cash fund is needed and, if so, officially approving the amount in a Board meeting and implementing procedures to review the documentation to support purchases made from the fund.

Janis Richardson was appointed Clerk in June 2015 and the necessary changes have been implemented, Koch said. The Nebraska Attorney General's Office is not investigating the Village, contrary to various reports.

"Please be assured that we are working towards making the corrections and implementing any and all changes outlined in your draft attestation," they replied to the Auditor's Office in a statement.

"As a result of the Veterans Choice Program, community providers have seen thousands of Veterans. We continue to work to make the program more Veteran-friendly," said Dr. David Shulkin, Under Secretary for Health. "There should be no bureaucratic burden that stands in the way of Veterans getting care."

The new call center will work to resolve instances of improper Veteran billing and assist community care medical providers with delayed payments. VA staff are also trained and ready to work with the medical providers to expunge adverse credit reporting on Veterans resulting from delayed payments to providers.

VA is urging Veterans to continue working with their VA primary care team to obtain necessary health care services regardless of adverse credit reporting or debt collection activity.





"The top yield in this year's contest – a tremendous 532.0271 bushels per acre achieved by David Hula of Charles City, VA, - is a testament to these efforts."

Farmers are encouraged through the contest to utilize new, efficient production techniques. Agronomic data gleaned from the contest reveal the following:

-Average planting population for the national winners was 40,861 seeds per acre, compared to 34,123 for all entrants.

-National winners applied an average of 364.06 pounds of nitrogen, 116.39 pounds of phosphorus and 231.78 pounds of potassium per

-Average commercial nitrogen use per bushel of yield was 0.94 pounds for the national winners and 0.89 pounds for all entrants.

-27.78 percent of the national winners applied trace minerals, compared to 38.74 percent of all entrants.

-Use of manure as a fertilizer was consistent. 38.89 percent of national winners applied manure, compared to 16.06 percent of all entrants.

-The National Corn Yield Contest began in 1965 with 20 entries from 3 states. The highest overall yield was 218.9 bushels per acre, while the national yield average was in the mid-60 bushel-per-acre range. The winners were recognized March 4, at the 2016 Commodity Classic, the premier convention and trade show of the U.S. corn, soybean, sorghum, wheat and equipment industries, held this year in New Orleans, LA.

Breezy-Hill Drive-In opened for the spring and summer season.



Cover crop/soil health field day March 30 on Jon Keithley farm

A cover crop/soil health field day is scheduled for 9 a.m. Wednesday, March 30, at the Jon Keithley Farm at 71475

As part of an NRCS Conservation Innovative Grant Project, a plot of different cover crops were drilled into prevented planted acres on the Keithley Farm northwest of Falls City in late August and early September, according to Nemaha County Extension Educator Gary Lesoing. Several different species and mixes of cover crops were planted for evaluation at the plots.

The field day will start with registration at 9, followed by discussion and field observations of cover crop plots, view of a soil pit and other cover crop fields in the area until noon.

Several Extension and NRCS specialists will discuss cover crop and soil health issues. Ag economist Jay Parsons will discuss lease arrangements for grazing cover crops; beef systems specialist Mary Drewnoski will review the potential opportunities for grazing cover crops and discuss their forage value, even on prevented planted acres; Lesoing will share recent soil health and soil chemical analysis data collected from plots this spring; and no-till specialist Paul Jasa will share his experiences with no-till, cover crops and soil

Two NRCS experts will also be at the field day to discuss soil health and cover crops: State agronomist Cory Brubaker and soil health specialist Candy Thomas.

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
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Maple Cemetery landscape efforts recognized

Salem's Maple Cemetery was recognized for its 2015 landscape efforts earlier this month at the Nebraska Statewide Arboretum Awards Reception March 4 in Lincoln on UNL's East Campus.

Award "recognizing the implementation of a landscape project that significantly improved a community landscape."

A massive tree planting operation (the original plan called for 50 trees, but overwhelming fundraising success allowed for 79) took root last spring and gave Maple Cemetery, which was decimated by a 1997 ice storm, a much-needed makeover. Other improvements included the purchase of a new lawn mower, a directory of the some 2,000 burial plots, improved drainage at the entrance, removal/trimming of existing trees and identification of burials that previously had no markers.

A fundraising campaign conducted by the Cemetery Board, a \$10,000 "Trees for Nebraska Towns" grant administered by UNL's Nebraska Forest Service and the Nebraska Environmental Trust (which is funded by the Nebraska Lottery), and a matching \$10,000 gift from an "anonymous" donor generated enough funds to

purchase the trees and make the landscaping improvements.

"Salem was a good example of what a small community could do by coming together for a project," Justin Evertson of the Statewide Arboretum/NE Forest Service, said. He noted all the volunteers who have helped water and care for the newly planted trees and said the cemetery is once again living up to its "wonderful heritage of tree planting."

Village of Salem Board Members at the time of the improvements included: Chairman Ivan Schuetz, Secretary and Treasurer Barbara Brown, Tony Brown, Anita Nolte, Richard Rowland and Marlene Schuetz.

The big donor remains officially anonymous, but it's believed the money came courtesy of comic Larry the Cable Guy, aka Dan Whitney, a Pawnee City native whose father, Thomas Von Whitney, is among those buried at Maple Cemetery. Tom Whitney grew up in the Salem-Humboldt area, was minister of the Four Mile Congregational Church in Humboldt for 12 years and the Congregational Church in Verdon for 10. The Whitney family moved to Florida in 1979, when Dan was a sophomore at Pawnee City High, and Tom died at the age of 70 in September 2004. He shares a headstone with his wife, Shirley, 78, who currently lives in Lincoln

ate Vice President of Early Childhood Programs and Sixpence Administrator Amy Bornemeier said connecting school districts with child care providers is essential in helping attain the Sixpence program's goals.

"The success of Sixpence over the past decade shows Nebraskans understand the value of programs that help parents put kids on the path to success early in life," Bornemeier said.

"Connecting licensed child care providers with school districts and other local partners allows communities to make better use of the existing resources, facilities and early childhood workers available to them."

According to Bornemeier, the new Sixpence Child Care Partnership grants also play a part in addressing the need to grow the number of skilled early childhood professionals throughout the state.

"Working with parents to support our state's youngest children's early development requires professionals who are experienced and skilled," she said. "Right now, Nebraska's skilled early childhood workforce can only reach about 7 or 8 percent of our infants and toddlers at risk. If we are going to get ahead of that problem, we need to find new ways to attract, cultivate and retain more professionals in this field. The new grant awards move us in the right direction by using Sixpence's blended publicprivate funds to deliver professional development, technical assistance and other resources to the child care providers that Nebraska's working parents rely upon."

The new Sixpence grants are also connected to the state's Step Up to Quality child care rating and improvement system, a collaboration between Health and Human Services and the Dept. of Education. It provides professional development opportunities to child care providers, assists in meeting accepted quality standards, and conducts assessments for quality improvement.

Licensed child care providers involved in the new Sixpence partnerships are required to be enrolled in Step Up to Quality and achieve a Step 3 rating on a 5-step quality scale by end of the third year of their Sixpence grant.

REPORT: Kim Vrtiska and Roger Lampe briefed the board on the latest Falls City Middle School Monsanto grant program "WATERS" Kim Vrtiska spoke on the positive educational impact he observes with the addition of classroom Google Chromebooks. The Chromebooks were selected for the project because they are the ideal tool to integrate technology into the science and math classrooms at a reasonable cost. Mr. Vrtiska also discussed how the use of a 3-D printer is enhancing the middle school science curriculum, and how 3-D printers are currently being utilized in the medical and engineering fields. 2.4a Legislative and Organizations Report:

Governor Pete Ricketts' priority for the 2016

legislative session focuses directly on property tax relief. He plans to address the property tax issues in Nebraska by tightening the lid on local government spending, state school aid, and agriculture property valuation growth. Senator Gloor, the Revenue Committee Chair, and Senator Sullivan, the Education Committee Chair, introduced LB 958 and LB 959 as the mechanism to carry out the Governor's property tax relief initiative. LB 958 Gloor, limits the aggregate statewide value increase in the class of ag land to 3% a year and could be problematic and dangerous for school districts. In recent years when FCPS was losing between \$600,000 and \$700,000 a year in state aid, the large valuation increases allowed the district to recoup the state aid loss in local revenue sources. Furthermore, a district can face financial unpredictability while supporting high-needs special education requirements/mandates. LB 959 Sullivan, moves retirement expenses into the budget base in 2016-2017 and limits a district's unused budget authority carried over into future years to 5% of the restricted budget. Furthermore, the bill removes levy exceptions that do not require voter approval such as our QCPUF and eliminates a valuable tool for school districts to address immediate facility issues negatively impacting the learning environment. LB 868 Krist, requires successful completion of a civics examination as a prerequisite for high school graduation. The proposed exam is the 100-question test the US Citizenship & Immigration Service uses. This requirement would have the potential to change high school curriculum and encourage teaching to the test prescribed. LB 883 Scheer, provides foundation aid in TEEOSA. This bill would be unfunded and if option aid is taken out of TEEO-SA, districts could actually end up getting less in state funding. The estimate from Nebraska Department of Education Finance suggests the bill would cost \$419 million in year 1. The current net option funding at \$60 million would be nowhere near sufficient to fund this bill. Furthermore, the bill calls for the creation of a citizen oversite committee, which appears to circumvent the local board of education. The board members are publicly elected officials the community has placed trust in. LB 930 Scheer, changes provisions relating to statewide assessments and college admission testing as prescribed. We need to monitor direction of the State Board of Education on this topic. Essentially replaces the 11th grade NeSA assessment with the ACT for all students as the required state assessment. The state would pay the cost of administration for the ACT. LB 1044 Ebke, terminates the Commission of Industrial Relations (CIR). Essentially this could allow teachers to strike. Also, the new negotiations timeline and 98%-102% seems to be working pretty well for this district and most other districts. Key dates to consider for making arrangements include the NRCSA Legislative Forum to be held on February 16 in Lincoln, and the Education Forum is February 23 and 24 in Kearney. The NRCSA Spring Conference is

March 17 and 18.
The NASB (Nebraska Association of School Boards) annual membership dues are included in the February claims. NASB is the one organization, which represents all Nebraska school boards and provides a voice in advocating a public education in Nebraska, and provides valuable professional development opportunities for school board members and district administrators.

2.4b Building & Grounds Update: The project committee has prioritized a draft of recommended facility improvement projects for 2016. A summary of the proposed projects with cost estimates reviewed.

year and soon an additional half acre was purchased for the cemetery that sits behind the building overlooking glorious sunsets.

Early on, growth of the con-

gregation was slow and steady, but by 1913 the congregation had out-grown its accommodations. On Jan. 6 of '13, church members authorized the construction of a new building and the old one was sold

to St. Paul's Lutherans, represented by Henry Roesch, Martin Nolte, Andrew Ketter and L.A. Meinzer, and physically moved to Falls City. It was during this time that the name of the Verdon church was changed to St. Mark's Evangelical Lutheran Church. Drawn up by Carl Buthman of Falls City and constructed by the Bohrer brothers, St. Mark's Lutheran Church was dedicated on Oct. 12, 1913, nine months after authorization and five months after the first brick was laid.

During the late 1920's and 1930's the Great Depression brought financial hardship to all people, but the people of St. Mark's hung in there; and in 1943 the Verdon Lutherans proved they could take the heat, quite literally. The church building, though, could not. On the night of Nov. 28, fire and brimstone was delivered not from the pulpit, but from an unknown origin, and completely destroyed the beautiful church. Flames couldn't destroy the people's spirit, however, as a school house once again became a temporary place of worship until the smoke-damaged basement was fixed up for the people of St. Mark's.

Twenty long years after the fire, the current church building was dedicated in 1963. It had a contemporary feel to it, as well as a finished basement, fellowship hall, kitchen facilities, Sunday School space and seating for 250 people. The congregation celebrated its 100th birthday in 1983 and dreamed of a long and bright future ahead. Sadly, that dream would only extend another 33 years.

As news of its closing made its way through the community, many of St. Mark's long-time members mourned the loss of place that for generations has brought such com-

fort and joy into their lives. "All the important things in my life have happened there," Amy Harmon, a fourth-generation parishioner who then raised a fifth generation in the church, said. "I was baptized and confirmed there, married there like my parents; my grandparents are buried there with my dad and brother. I have lots of

memories. Following Easter Sunday, a walk through the church will be accompanied by the sound of the wind whispering through the trees and the creaky unpolished floorboards underfoot, each distinctive whimper reverberating off the church's vaulted ceilings. The sanctuary has a powerful and enduring story to tell, but limited opportunities to be heard. The playground empty, the parsonage vacant and the sun, as it sets on each day, will illuminate only an honored past before darkness shrouds for good the prospect - and presumption - of a looming golden daybreak.

"All these years later I realize how it had been there for all of our families — highs and lows, just the way a church should be, Amy's husband, Matt, said. "St. Mark's was more than just bricks and mortar; it's been a community that was always there for me and anybody that crossed its threshold."

Throughout the church grounds, a crowd of memories extracted from countless churchgoers embodying 133 years of fellowship

are scattered all around - like tiny broken hearts. You read it on the tombstones in the little cemetery out back; you hear it in the trees dedicated in memory of the departed; and you feel it in the majestic building that for so many witnessed the beginning, the end and the big stuff in between. With the doors closing on this


long chapter of Richardson County history, past and present members are hoping to make the final service a happy event and celebrate the lives that happened on that piece of land located less than four miles south and east of Verdon on 710 Road.
