The past two weekends in Kearney have been good as gold for Humboldt-TR-S School Superintendent Clint Kimbrough and senior student Elliot Gonnella.

Superintendent Kimbrough, who is in the final months of his 15th and final year before retirement, on March 21 was honored as the Nebraska Rural Community School Association's Outstanding Superintendent of 2014-15 at the NRCSA Spring Conference held at the Holiday Inn and Convention Center in Kearney. One week later, Gonnella stood proud atop the podium on UNK campus as the Class C2 State Champion in Extemporaneous Speaking.

What was once a 3 1/2-hour drive turned into victory laps for the soon-to-be former Titans.

For Kimbrough, it's a fitting send-off for an administrator who led the school district during an unprecedented period of change and growth. Nominated by HTRS School Board member Neal Kanel, Kimbrough led the way as the Humboldt Cardinals became the Humboldt-Table Rock-Steinauer Titans and welcomed aboard half of the former Dawson-Verdon and Southeast Consolidated School Districts in becoming the largest geographic district in Nebraska. And, as he exits, the school is getting bigger yet - physically, as a \$500,000 privately-funded Titan Fitness Center takes shape on the northwest side of the school's campus in Humboldt.

Letters supporting Kimbrough's nomination were written by former board members Keith McKim and Ben Steffen, Pawnee City Superintendent Stephen Grizzel and HTRS Principal Lisa Othmer.

Kimbrough, Kanel wrote in his nomination letter, was able to avoid losing any teachers during the period of extensive upheaval and utilized the resources the best he could, while somehow keeping students, staff and patrons happy.

NRCSA was formed in 1979 by a group of eight administrators from Class C and D school districts who saw the need for an organization.

Critically acclaimed artist Benjamin Victor spent last week at Peru State College, sculpting an eight-foot-tall art piece to display at the recently renovated Oak Bowl Stadium.

Vice President for Enrollment Management and Student Affairs, Dr. Michaela Willis, chair of the '1% for Art Committee', said, "We are excited to have this renowned artist, Benjamin Victor, as part of this important project for our institution. As a committee, we were impressed by his representation of the subject matter, level of detail, ability to capture idea of movement and, of course, the quality of his prior work."

Nebraska's "1% for Art Law" has been in effect since 1978, and has generated over \$3 million in artwork for Nebraska's state buildings, colleges, and university system.


Projects vary in size, with figures ranging from \$5,000 to \$150,000 or more. The number of projects generated each year is dependent on legislative appropriations for new construction in excess of \$500,000 and remodeling or renovation of a public building in excess of \$250,000. Buildings meeting this criteria must be open to public access in order for a project to take effect. An Art Selection Committee, coordinated through the Nebraska Arts Council, is established for each project and determines the criteria for suitable locations, art

Paid Petition Circulator Talk Again in the Legislature

Few people argue with the First Amendment right of free speech and allowing people to petition their government.

But, bring up the issue of paying petition-circulators by the signature in Nebraska and you'll generate discussion. Such has been the case since at least 1986 when a couple lobbyists and two state senators were charged with violating the law by paying people to circulate petitions for a Constitutional change to permit a state-run lottery. A couple years later, the Nebraska Supreme Court ruled that prohibiting the payment of petition circulators "violates the first amendment and is for that reason void and of no force or effect."

Several changes to petition laws ensued. Petition circulators had to disclose that they were being paid. The proposed ballot issue – the reason for the petition – had to be clearly stated on each page of the petition. About eight years ago, payment per signature instead of an hourly wage was banned. Proponents of the ban said paying per signature would increase the chances for fraud and aggressive behavior.

Proponents of the pay-per-signature idea have long argued it makes the petition process more affordable and creates an incentive for circulators to gather more signatures. In addition, the folks who pay the circulators per signature verify that each signature is valid – from an eligible registered voter – thus providing an extra measure of validity before the petitions are filed with the Secretary of State.

Six other states, in addition to Nebraska, require circulators to disclose to potential signers whether they are paid or a volunteer. Arizona, California, Ohio, Oregon and Wyoming all require that a prominent notice be placed on the petition form stating whether the circulator is paid or volunteer. In Missouri, the circulator must file an affidavit with the Missouri Secretary of State.

In Oregon, paid circulators must carry a registration form with them indicating that they have taken the state's mandatory training program for paid circulators. Also, volunteer-circulated petitions and paid-circulator petitions are required to be printed on different colored paper.

The topic of pay-per-signature has surfaced again, in a bill (LB367) from North Platte Senator Mike Groene. The freshman lawmaker is no stranger to the petition process and has been involved in at least one lawsuit to change the situation. He says the seven-year-old prohibition violates free speech and destroys grassroots efforts to get issues on the ballot.

Groene's bill is awaiting the second round of debate after advancing from its debut on a 38-0 vote. The measure was forwarded to the full Legislature on a 7-1 vote after a public hearing in the Government and Military Affairs Committee. Perennial petition supporter Kent Bernbeck and two others spoke in support of the measure during that hearing. The director of the League of Nebraska Municipalities and the head of the Nebraska Grocery Industry Association spoke against the bill.

Committee Chairman Senator John Murante of Gretna has told his colleagues the right of citizens to pe-

tition their government is especially important in a state with a one-house Legislature where the people serve as the second house. He says the Legislature has added barriers to the petition process that have increased the price of mounting an initiative campaign. He also cautions that the state could be sued if the ban remains in place.

Federal courts have struck down bans in five states

– Maine, Mississippi, Ohio, Washington and Idaho – for violating the First Amendment. There are 24 states, including Nebraska, that allow initiative petitions.

Groene used circulators paid by the signature in a 2006 petition drive to cap government spending. The measure made it on the ballot but was defeated by voters. Groene contends that people who opposed the measure then lobbied the Legislature to approve the ban on paid circulators.


Colleague Senator Paul Schumacher of Columbus says he thinks the petition process helps keep the Legislature in line.

orms and artist eligibility.

Victor is best known for his sculpture of Sarah Winnemucca, Paiute activist in Nevada, which her home state installed at the National Statuary Hall in the United States Capitol in 2005. Victor was only 26 years old at the time, and the youngest to have a piece in the National Statuary Hall. Nine years later he became the only living artist to have two works in the Hall.

Victor grew up in California but attended Northern State University in South Dakota, studying art and sculpture. His first work to receive attention was a life-size statue of the biblical character Samson, sculpted when he was a sophomore in college. The piece earned Victor a scholarship from the prestigious National Sculpture Society in New York City. At 23, he was commissioned to produce his proposal of a trio of soldiers for the Aberdeen Regional Airport War Memorial in South Dakota.

Victor describes his talent as "A gift from God." Art critics and organizations, including the National Sculpture Society in New York City, continue to recognize the aesthetic and conceptual integrity of Benjamin's artwork.

The historic football player Victor is completing for Peru State College will be near the entrance of the Oak Bowl Stadium. The football player will not be anyone specific but an icon of past football players and future football players, Victor said.

"I don't use my face as the portrait but I use it for the expression" said Victor, as he motioned to a large storyboard with close-up photos of himself making different expressions.

"I use it for the expressions. I find the expression I wanted, then I tried to pencil in some of the indentations of the face and the shadows. I really tried to pay attention to those as I was sculpting so I didn't lose the three-dimension quality," he explained.

His favorite part of the process is anything anatomical - the hands and especially the face that holds so much expression. His tool of the trade is using large mirrors.

"I wheel them [mirrors] around so I can look at not only myself but the muscles and bones in your face but also to look at the piece, like I'll put a mirror in front of it and sometimes it will look good to you while your working on it then you'll look in the mirror and see things that are off, it's a neat little trick-tool of the trade."

His passion and drive clearly show in each of his unique and profound creations. With expressive features, exquisite detail, and thought-provoking content, this piece of work by Victor is sure to take its place among the great masterpieces of his art history.

The Oak Bowl project utilized state-appropriated monies (\$7.5 million), as well as contributions from private donors, to fund a \$9 million renovation of the Oak Bowl stadium, press box, concourse area, concession stand, restrooms and pedestrian access. As one of the largest outdoor facilities in southeast Nebraska, the lighted, turfed field is used for the college's football program, active intramural program and a variety of other academic and co-curricular activities.

SENCA Community Leader Scholarship recipients

Southeast Nebraska Community Action Partnership has announced the six area graduating seniors that have been chosen to receive the 3rd Annual SENCA Community Leader Scholarship Awards.

The 2015 recipients are: Sydney Armbruster and Baylee Vrtiska, both of Falls City High School; Alex Clough, of Palmyra; Casey McNealy and Haley Workman, both of Humboldt-TR-S; and Natalia Nolting, of Conestoga.

Each of the selected recipients will receive a \$400 scholarship to attend the selected post-secondary school of their choice.

Since 2013, SENCA has awarded up to six scholarships each year, with the desired goal of selecting one scholarship winner representing each of the six counties of Cass, Johnson, Nemaha, Otoe, Pawnee and Richardson, where SENCA services are provided. This year there were no scholarship applications received from students in three of the counties, therefore students scoring the highest from the remaining applications were chosen to receive those awards. Each year

scholarship applications are made available to guidance counselors within the six county area and are also available on the SENCA website.

The scholarship awards are heavily weighted in the area of community service and participation in SENCA-related activities such as Head Start, Youth Mentoring and the SENCA SMART Financial Literacy program. SENCA SMART (Strategic Money and Resource Techniques) is a program available to each school throughout the six county service area focusing on positive financial behaviors for participating 8th and 12th grade students.

The Community Leader Scholarship program is just one of the many programs and services that follow the agency mission of "investing in our neighbors through education and partnerships to improve lives and build strong communities in southeast Nebraska."

Tips for health coverage, taxes

This year's tax season is the first time tax filers will be asked to provide basic information regarding their health coverage on their tax returns. Here's what taxpayers need to know:

Most people just need to check a box: Most tax filers – about 75 percent – will just need to check a box when they file their taxes to indicate that everyone in their household had coverage for all of 2014. This applies to people who had health coverage through their employer, Medicare, Medicaid, among other sources.

If you had Marketplace coverage, you should have your Form 1095-A: Last year, millions of Americans used advance payments of tax credits to help lower the cost of their monthly health insurance premiums. Now that tax season is here, these individuals will need to ensure they received the correct amount of financial assistance when they file their returns. People with Marketplace coverage should have received an important statement in the mail called a Form 1095-A. If you're still waiting for your 1095-A Form to arrive, check your marketplace account – most forms are available online. You can also call the Marketplace Call Center at 1-800-318-2596.

If you didn't have health cov-

age, use the exemption tool: While those who can afford health coverage but chose not to enroll may have to pay a fee, people who couldn't afford coverage or met other conditions can receive an exemption. A tool is available on HealthCare.gov can help people who didn't have insurance last year understand if they might qualify for an exemption

If you have to pay the fee, consider signing up for coverage through the Special Enrollment Period. Tax filers who have to pay the fee and who were unaware or did not understand the requirement to enroll in coverage can take advantage of an opportunity to purchase health insurance through a special enrollment period. If tax filers do not purchase coverage for the remainder of '15 during this special enrollment period (March 15-April 30), they will risk having to pay the fee again next year for the entire year when they file income taxes.



Over the last 19 months I have logged tens of thousands of miles crisscrossing our great state and listening to the thoughts, ideas, and concerns of our citizens. Throughout my travels the number one issue I hear about from hardworking Nebraskans is the need for tax relief. Whether it's farmers and home owners seeking relief from Nebraska's high property taxes or businesses being held back by our second-highest-in-the-region income tax rates, the message is clear: Nebraskans want and deserve tax relief.

A bill scheduled to be heard before the full legislature will do the exact opposite. LB610 would increase the gas tax paid in Nebraska by 6 cents per gallon. While that may not seem like a lot, this increase would be added to the about 25.6 cents Nebraskans are already paying in state gas tax per gallon of gasoline. If this tax increase passed, state gas taxes alone would account for about 13% of the cost of fuel at today's average price of \$2.39 per gallon. At this level, Nebraska's gas tax rate would be about twice our state's top income tax bracket.

Not only does a gas tax increase impact nearly every Nebraskan, it is one of the most regressive taxes, impacting those who can least afford the most. Tax increases, like the proposed gas tax hike, take away money that low and fixed-income Nebraskans count on to pay for food, utilities, and medication.

While proponents of the gas tax increase have raised important concerns about the state of Nebraska's roads and bridges, there are alternatives our state should first explore. Raising taxes should never be the first line of defense. Right now, I am conducting a national search for a new roads director to find someone who can take a fresh look at how Nebraska can approach road construction differently. Other states have done it through ideas like public/private partnerships and working to improve operations and flexibility within the current regulatory framework.

In 2011, then State Senator Deb Fischer led the effort to pass LB84, the Build Nebraska Act, which allocated one-quarter of a percent of Nebraska's sales tax to roads construction. This was a sensible approach that provided much-needed additional funding to help ensure that our state's roads priorities receive funding and made it easier for our state to budget for roads construction. Most importantly, it was done without increasing taxes.

That is exactly the approach I plan to take with our new Department of Roads director. We will look for new ways to approach roads funding, construction, and regulation. We will also do it knowing that we have been charged with safeguarding taxpayer dollars.

I urge all Nebraskans to reach out to your respective state senator and express your concerns about higher taxes. We did not become a high tax state overnight, and we will not lower taxes all at once. But we cannot bring our taxes down if the first step is a tax increase. 

State unemployment rate drops to lowest in U.S. at 2.7 percent

According to the Nebraska Dept. of Labor, the state's unemployment rate fell to 2.7 percent in February, which is the lowest in the entire nation.

The preliminary rate was down two-tenths of a percent from January, but nearly a full percentage point, seasonally adjusted, from February 2014.

The state unemployment rate for Nebraska dropped below the 2.9 percent rate in North Dakota, making it the lowest rate in the country.

"Today's announcement that Nebraska has the lowest unemployment rate in the nation is great news for our state," Nebraska Gov. Pete Ricketts said. "We must continue to think strategically about the future. Growing Nebraska for the next generation requires careful planning so that our children and grandchildren have the opportunities they need to live, work, and raise a family."

The national unemployment rate is 5.5 percent. SE Nebraska has the highest rate in the state at 3.3 percent.


Rings can be a lasting way to show school pride. Rings sometimes become heirlooms that are handed down through the generations as kids follow in the footsteps of their ancestors.



Standardized claim, appeal forms simplifies application process for vets

Washington — With the goal of making the application process easier and more efficient for our Veterans, the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) now requires Veterans seeking disability benefits to use standardized claim and appeal forms. These standardized forms guide Veterans to clearly state the symptoms or conditions for which they are seeking benefits and provide the information necessary for VA to start processing their claims and appeals.

"This change will help VA provide faster and more accurate decisions to our Veterans, their families and survivors," said Under Secretary for Benefits Allison A. Hickey. "Standard forms are essential to better serve Veterans, build more efficiency into VA's processes and bring us in line with other government agencies such as the Social Security Administration."

The easiest and fastest way for a Veteran to submit an application for compensation is online through the eBenefits (www.ebenefits.va.gov) portal. VA encourages Veterans to work with representatives of Veterans Service Organization (VSO), or their state or county representatives, who can assist with filing electronically or in paper form. Standardized forms are a key component of VA's transformation, which will help achieve the Department's goal to eliminate the backlog by the end of this year.

There are two claim actions that now require standardized forms:

1. Veterans' or Survivors' applications for disability compensation or pension – Specific forms are designed to capture information necessary to identify and support benefit claims. * Veterans filing for disability benefits must now use VA Form 21-526EZ, Application for Disability Compensation and Related Compensation Benefits. * Wartime Veterans filing for needs-based pension must use VA Form 21-527EZ, Application for Pension.

* Survivors filing a claim for dependency and indemnity compensation (DIC), survivor's pension, and accrued benefits must complete VA Form 21-534EZ, Application for DIC, Death Pension, and/or Accrued Benefits.

2. Notices of Disagreement with any aspect of VA's decision on a disability claim – The standardized Notice of Disagreement form is used when a claimant wishes to initiate an appeal. * Veterans disagreeing with a VA compensation decision should use VA Form 21-0958, Notice of Disagreement.

* Veterans and survivors will not be required to use a standardized notice of disagreement form to initiate appeals of pension or survivors benefit decisions at this time.

VA recognizes that some Veterans may need additional time to gather all of the information and evidence needed to support their claim and therefore established a new intent to file a claim process. Applicants may notify VA of their intent to file a claim in order to establish the earliest possible effective date for benefits if they are determined eligible. An intent to file a claim may be submitted in one of three ways:

1. Electronically via eBenefits or with the support of a Veterans Service Organization (VSO) through the Stakeholder Enterprise Portal.

2. Completing and mailing a paper VA Form 21-0966, Intent to File a Claim for Compensation and/or Pension, or Survivors Pension and/or DIC)

3. Over the phone with a VA call center or in person with a public contact representative.

Veterans may appoint a duly authorized representative, such as a VSO, who can notify VA of a claimant's intent to file using any of the methods listed above. VA will provide an individual up to one year from the date they submit their intent to file a claim to complete the required application form. Veterans may wish to use this one-year period to gather evidence necessary to support the claim so that evidence can be submitted along with the application form..

VA's move to standardized claim and appeal forms will make the process easier and more efficient for both VA and the Veterans, and allow VA to establish a quicker, more streamlined benefits delivery system.

The City of Falls City Utility Department served more than 2088 customers with approximately 166,000,000 gallons of water in 2014 alone. Customers are provided high quality safe drinking water that surpasses all federal and state standards.

In 1996, the U.S. Congress amended the Safe Drinking Water Act, requiring Community Water Systems to send Annual Water Quality Reports to all of their users, beginning in 1999.

If you would like to observe the decision-making processes that affect your drinking water quality, please attend the regularly scheduled meetings of the Board of Public Works. If you would like to participate in the process, please contact the City Clerk to arrange to place on the agenda of the meeting of the Falls City Board of Public Works.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Source Water Assessment Availability:

The Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality (NDEQ) has completed the Source Water Assessment. Included in the assessment are a Wellhead Protection Area map, potential contaminant source inventory, vulnerability rating, and source water protection information. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations

establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Sources of Drinking Water:

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and groundwater. Water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

The source of water used by City of Falls City is ground water, provided by 10 wells located south of Rulo, NE.

The water is lime-softened to remove iron and manganese from the water through a lime softening filter. The lime softening filter removes fine particles which may be present in the water. Before entering the distribution system, the water is disinfected with chlorine and the naturally occurring level of fluoride is raised to aid in the prevention of tooth decay.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

* Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.

* Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

* Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from various sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.

* Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

* Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Drinking Water Health Notes:

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections.
