Msgr. Perkington praised the many successes - in the classroom and beyond - attained by the new graduates.



Irish Win It at the Wire

Two weeks ago, Sacred Heart's Doug Goltz called the 2013-14 school year the most rewarding of his beyond illustrious nearly three decades-long coaching career. Saturday, his boys not only etched those remarks in metal, quite literally, by tacking on a state track meet championship, but also added an exclamation point by winning in the most dramatic fashion. The Irish waited until the final race of the two-day event to clinch the victory, winning the mile relay by no more than a whisker. Sophomore Henry Arnold (left) crossed the finish line less than two-tenths of a second ahead of Hartington senior Patrick Wortmann. That gold medal-winning performance, the team's only one of the weekend, gave the Irish 49 1/2 points and its first outright state track title in 16 years and its seventh overall.

The Class D State Track trophy serves as the proverbial cherry on top of a treat of a year that started with an undefeated D2 State Football Championship. In the middle: A 25-5 basketball season and third-place state trophy. Hence, the group was one semifinal basketball victory shy of the coveted Triple Crown.

"Henry accelerated as Wortmann tried to pass keeping Wortmann to the outside along the backstretch, around the curve and into the final 100 meters," FCSH Coach Doug Goltz said. "They were dead even coming off the curve - they had been almost attached to each other for the entire second lap. Wortmann made one final charge but Henry was able to hold him off at the finish line," he said.

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Aquatic Park closed due to mysterious leak

Anxious young people, recently untethered for the summer months from the rigid daily obligations of an 8-3 formal education, are going to have to wait at least until the weekend before they can chill out in the chemically enhanced waters of the Falls City Aquatic Center.

The pool, which was supposed to open last weekend, has sprung a "considerable" leak that no one can seem to find. FCAC Manager Roger Lampe said he and other City employees have searched extensively for the source of the leak to no avail. However, he said Monday that, contrary to local legend, they're almost certain the leak is occurring somewhere within the circulation system, not in the actual pool structure.

City Administrator Gary Jorn said a meeting with an engineer from Schemmer and Associates, of Lincoln, is scheduled for Tuesday. Schemmer was the architect of the Aquatic Center, which opened in August 2006.

Jorn called the leak "significant," but declined to put a number on the estimated gallons escaping the pool.

Jorn said that if Schemmer can get the problem diagnosed post haste, the pool could open this weekend.

dead.


Dr. Chick James, a retired Army colonel and Vietnam War veteran, gave very impressive talks at both services.

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When I was a kid Memorial Day meant one thing, summer. It was officially time for my sister and I to walk 1 block north to my grandparents' house and practically live with them until school started. I've been extremely blessed in life to have so many real heroes around me all the time, even when I didn't know it. My grandfather was one of those heroes. I knew him as a sweet, happy go lucky, gentle man. I was too young to ask him about his military past and he was content to never discuss it. I didn't know until recently that he had been awarded several medals, one being the Solider Metal. In 1952 while in Taegu/Daegu, South Korea he risked his life while on a ration trip. A mother with a baby strapped to her back was leading her little girl across a flooded river. All 3 of the Korean civilians were swept away by the flood waters and my grandpa, 2nd Lt. William Alexander entered the water and saved all three of them. He never spoke a word of this incident.

My grandfather passed away and another hero became a large part of my young life. Stories of 1st Lt. Jacob Fritz have been widely shared. I want to share stories about "Jolly Jake" Fritz, my friend. Jake was a year ahead of me in school. We spent a lot of time together during our high school years. We drove the back roads singing and laughing, we danced many nights away in the school gym and cheered each other on in the good times and the bad. Jake had spoken of the military but, it was peace time and I was naïve. My "military ignorance" came to an end my senior year of high school and the months that followed. A passionate history teacher paired with Jacob's attendance at West Point opened my eyes to the world of someone in the military. The fall after my high school graduation I watched the events of 9/11 unfold in front of my eyes. Things like war, death and sacrifice were about to become painfully real and the world a lot more difficult.

Jake visited every time he came home. When I called him and told him I was getting married he told me he would be there. He was still attending West Point at the time and I knew his heart was in the right place but, never imagined he would be able to come. Brian and I were married at Coryell Park near Johnson, NE at 4:00 p.m. on a humid September day. After the ceremony we stayed around and took photos. As we were leaving a tall man in his full military uniform came walking up to us, it was Jacob. His grandfather had passed away and he was able to come home. He drove all the way to Johnson knowing he missed our wedding. He told me that he had made a promise and he wanted to keep it. Through his grief and pain he came to celebrate something joyous and monumental in my life. When my son was born Jake would stop by when he could. He would often come by after he dropped Ethan off for swim lessons and hang out until he had to pick him back up. On his last visit we spoke about him leaving and what he could receive in care packages. He reminded me not to send anything with coconut or pineapple. Jacob wasn't a fan of either one which was funny because those are two of my favorite things and I would have probably sent him many coconut treats if he hadn't reminded me. He was also able to meet and spend time with Alex who was only about 8 months old at that time. Soon after that visit Jacob left to go to Iraq.

We wrote each other often and he was able to call me a few times. Once such time he called just to razz me about something. Even from Iraq his laugh was booming and contagious. That was the last time I was able to speak with him. Two weeks later I woke up to the news of a helicopter crash that had killed U.S. soldiers. It made me feel very uneasy. For the very first time since he had been gone I sent him a message asking him if he was alright. He replied with a simple "I'm fine, thanks for checking." The next day he was gone. Jacob's life would have been amazing. I know he would have come back to Nebraska and done incredible things. We will never know what could have been, but I know we would have all benefited greatly from it.

A few short years after Jacob's death I started working for The Falls City Journal. I work for and with a man that needs little explanation, Mr. Bill Schock. Many of us have heard his story. I was finally able to hear much more of it this last week when Lance Schwartz from the 10/11 news conducted his interview with Bill for "Lance's Journal." Bill told stories that left us laughing and left us with tears in our eyes. I often have people come in and say "Bill is a great man, a true American hero." I agree, he is an amazing man and being able to work with him is nothing short of amazing. I don't care who you are, Bill will brighten your day with one smile. Each of these men as well as the other amazing military man who have been a part of my life are the patch work of this country. These men who have fought wars and seen unimaginable horror are some of the most wonderful, kind, and gentle people I've met. I now know the true meaning of Memorial Day. I feel it, I feel the pride, the sorrow and the sacrifice. It's no longer just the start of summer I knew as a kid. Now each year I think of them, speak of them and visit them. We honor those who gave us our freedom. We tell our son the sacrifices so many made and we finish our night with one of the most heartfelt military films of all time *The Best Years of Our Lives* and we do this because we can, because we have our freedom, thanks to the wonderful men and women in the military.



Primary election is over, can we all get along?

Nebraskans have survived what has to be one of the meanest ever primary elections, fueled in large part by more than \$3 million in campaign funds from organizations outside the state and from the personal coffers of several millionaires running for office.

The advertising in a six-man Republican gubernatorial primary and a four-man Republican U.S. Senate primary went negative early. Many of those TV and radio commercials and mass mailings were funded by Political Action Committees with agendas that would likely be a mystery to most Nebraskans. Images of President Obama, Nancy Pelosi and Harry Reid flashed across TV screens night and day as each candidate seemed to say they were best suited to fight these national figures.

Confusing at best for a freshman political science student trying to understand what that would have to do with whoever occupies the second floor governor's office in the northeast corner of the State Capitol. Probably incomprehensible for the typical Nebraskan working to keep food on the table and a roof overhead.

To say nothing of the definitions of candidates being touted as a Nebraska conservative, a real conservative or a true conservative in a state where many people would probably tell you straight up that they are personally conservative in not just their politics, but most of their lives. You don't expect much more in a state where the nationally recognized college football team runs the ball straight at its opponents more often than not.

Quite frankly, in the aftermath of the barrage of printed and spoken words, most people don't care if somebody is conservative or liberal anymore, as long as they are civil.

The Merriam-Webster dictionary defines civility as "civilized conduct; especially courtesy and politeness or a polite act or expression." The late Rodney King, the Los Angeles construction worker who survived a beating during an arrest by four police officers that resulted in riots in 1991, put it best. "Can we all get along?" he asked after a trial in 1992.

That's a good question for Nebraskans right now.

"Civility means a great deal more than just being nice to one another," says P.M. Forni, director of the Civility Project at Johns Hopkins University. "It is complex and encompasses learning how to connect successfully and live well with others, developing thoughtfulness, and fostering effective self-expression and communication. Civility includes courtesy, politeness, mutual respect, fairness, good manners, as well as a matter of good health. Taking an active interest in the well-being of our community and concern for the health of our society is also involved in civility."

Way back when, the nation's

first president George Washington said, "Every action done in company ought to be with some sign of respect to those that are present."

Forni adds that one should remember the power of words. "The thought that they might cause unnecessary hurt or discomfort should inform every conversation." He adds, "respecting others' opinions doesn't mean abandoning your own."

Singer, songwriter Emmylou Harris said, "we have to be more thoughtful and more educated and more informed. I turn on the TV and I see these grown

people screaming at each other, and I think, well, if we don't get our civility back, we're in trouble."

I also like what nationally syndicated columnist George Will has to say on the subject. "Taking offense has become America's national pastime; being theatrically offended supposedly signifies the exquisitely refined moral delicacy of people who feel entitled to pass through life without encountering ideas or practices that annoy them."

So, how about it Nebraska? Can we be civil as we head into the general election? I think we should try.



"Only one day is dedicated to honoring the ultimate sacrifices made by Americans in war: Memorial day," Retired Army Col. James said. "Why do we bother remembering? Because those sacrifices become meaningless without our recalling that the deaths of our fellow countrymen are integral to ensuring the many freedoms we enjoy today."

James, a Vietnam War veteran, was scheduled to give the keynote address at Rulo in 2013, but the service was canceled due to weather.

Upon graduating from Falls City High School in 1963, James was accepted into the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, NY. He was commissioned in 1968 and then moved to Ft. Benning, GA, for the grueling nine-week Ranger School, as well as Airborne Training. He landed in Vietnam in July 1970. Twenty-seven of James' West Point classmates died in Vietnam.

In Vietnam, then-Cpt. James was Commanding Officer of his Field Artillery Unit stationed in western Vietnam, close to the Cambodian border. James earned a Vietnam Service Medal with two Bronze SVC Stars and A Vietnam Campaign Medal with 60 Device.

Last year marked the 50th anniversary of the beginning of the Vietnam War as well as the 40th anniversary of the war's end. Americans' disgraceful treatment of Vietnam Veterans when they returned home in the late 60s and early 70s is well-documented and will forever stand as a shameful period in American history. Most of society, hopefully, may have learned from that ugly period, but that doesn't mean Americans yet give its war veterans the deference they deserve, James said.

"We watch TV shows where every vet has PTSD. Our Congress is debating veterans' benefits, retirement, and pay, while they ask these men and women to do more. Never in the field of human conflict has so much been owed by so many to so few. These are the 0.45 percent, he said, in reference to the current population of Americans

who have served in the Global War on Terror.

"Most Americans have no idea what kind of burdens our military is bearing. In World War II, 11.2% of the nation served in four years. In Vietnam, 4.3% served in 12 years. Since 2001, only 0.45% of our population has served in the Global War on Terror."

"These are unbelievable statistics. Over time, fewer and fewer people have shouldered more and more of the burden and it is only getting worse," James said.

"Our troops were sent to war in Iraq and Afghanistan by a Congress consisting of few veterans with only one person having a child in the military. Taxes did not increase to pay for the war. War bonds were not sold. Gas was not regulated. In fact, the average citizen was asked to sacrifice nothing, and has sacrificed nothing unless they have chosen to do so out of the goodness of their hearts.

"The only people who have sacrificed are the veterans and their families. These volunteers. These people who swore an oath to defend this nation. These folks have lost relationships, spent years of their lives in extreme conditions, years apart from their kids, and beaten their body in a way that even professional athletes don't understand. Then these soldiers come home to a nation that doesn't understand suffering or sacrifice. To a nation that doesn't understand that bad people exist," he said.

Several years after returning

home from Vietnam, James got out of the military in 1978 but re-enlisted with the Reserves in Ft. Riley, KS, about 10 years later. He made Major in 1994, Lt. Colonel in 1998 and Colonel in 2001. He retired in 2005.

Upon returning home from Vietnam, James attended dental school at the University of Nebraska at Lincoln, and has owned and operated his dental practice in Falls City for 36 years.

James warned against what he perceives as a growing "air indifference," particularly among young people, for our veterans.

"My point is that we need to continue to support the less than 1/2 of one percent of the population that is volunteering to serve our country even as we recognize those who have fallen," he said.

And recognizing our fallen heroes once a year is not enough.

"The widows, widowers, fathers, mothers, brothers, sisters and children of our fallen remember EVERY DAY," James said.

As he has for many years, Larry Whalen, Korean War veteran and commander of the Falls City Ceremonial Color Guard, arranged and presided over both services.

The programs at both the Jim Prater Memorial Service at Rulo and at the Steele Cemetery were similar.

Opening and closing prayers were by the Rev. Dan Gifford, pastor of Falls City Christ Lutheran Church and St. Paul's Lutheran Church, six miles north.

Lance's Journal features Bill Schock

Days before Memorial Day observances were held Bill Schock sat in the back of the Falls City Journal office and reminisced about his time in World War II. Discussing his service has become almost second nature for Bill. Visitors who are passing through town often come by to talk about his many accolades during his time in the service. This time Bill is telling the story for Lance Schwartz of the 10/11 News out of Lincoln. Last Wednesday, Lance a former Falls City resident who is now the producer and editor of the twice-weekly segment "Lance's Journal," returned to his hometown to film his widely praised feature. In recognition of Memorial Day, Lance decided to honor someone he had both admired and worked for, Mr. Bill Schock.

Bill Schock was just 22 years old when he volunteered for the draft in 1941. Bill soon became a B-17 bomber pilot and on October 8, 1943 made his first combat raid.

In the first week he was in combat, they lost 156 B-17's, resulting in about 1,500 men perishing or becoming prisoners of war. April 9, 1944 during Bill's 25th mission, he and his crew went on a bombing run to Marienburg, East Prussia. According to the historical society, it was one of the best bomb drops of the war. One the way back to England, Bill's bomber sustained a direct hit from a flak battery. The hit started a large fire and Bill bailed his crew out, parachuting into Demark. Bill and what was left of his crew found themselves German prisoners of war. Bill endured 2 days of intense interrogation. Bill relied on his faith and sense of humor to get him through the next 13 months in a P.O.W. camp. Finally May 8 brings word by radio that the war in Europe will be over at midnight. At 2p.m. on May 17th a lone B-17 appears to start moving people out. After order is restored evacuation begins, sick and wounded go first, then Britishers are loaded up. In all about 900 Kriegies or Former P.O.W.'s are flow out that afternoon. The following day 6,450 prisoners of war are evacuated, mostly Americans. The third day, the stragglers and members of the Field Force are

to go. Bill leaves Europe one year, nine months and 22 days later. At the end of June 1945, Bill arrived at Falls City's Missouri Pacific Railroad Station. He hitched a ride with a woman to the downtown area of Falls City, where he spotted his mothers car at the local Market. He walked into the store, walked up behind his mother and hugged her "Hi, Mom, I'm home." Bill Schock had returned to Falls City, Nebraska a hero.


As Bill sits in his chair carefully placed in front of the camera his emotions are on the surface. Speaking of the men in his crew brings light to his eyes and a smile to his face. Lance has more than enough information for his story but everyone in the room wants to hear more. These days Bill continues to work daily at the Falls City Journal after nearly seven decades.

Last Friday night, the 10/11 News aired this special edition of "Lance's Journal." The segment recounted Bill's heroic journey during his time in WWII. It showed us a glimpse of a brave man who served American proudly so long ago. It was a lovely tribute to a man so many people respect and adore, a true American hero.

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

"We're all rightfully very proud of you."

Accolades have steadily flooded in for members of the Sacred Heart Class of 2014. Athletic triumphs, including a state football championship, are well-documented, but dwarfed in number and consequence compared to the victories attained in the classroom. Sixteen of the 17 newly minted Irish alums were offered at least one college scholarship and six students leave high school never having earned a report card blemished by a single "B."

One of those straight-A students, Valedictorian Jarod Fiegenger, addressed his classmates and a large crowd of family and friends at the ceremony.

"We have set many goals, passed many tests, ran many races, tested many experiments, mentored many students," Fiegenger said. "I stand here before you this evening humbled and proud to have been a part of your journey. We are definitely a family; we grew closer as the years went by."

Fiegenger started at Dawson-Verdon School as a youngster, transferring to Sacred Heart in the second grade. An eight-man football player of the year last fall, he has accepted a scholarship to play football at Doane College.

"We are all very competitive," Fiegenger said. "That is why we have succeeded in so many things. We compete hard in everything that we do. Another graduate, Cassandra Bangert, sang "See You Again" at the graduation ceremony.

Msgr. Perkington told the graduates that their journey had only just begun.

"You have earned an outstanding education and that education wasn't free - you've had to earn it. You had to strive and you've learned from truly outstanding catholic educators.

"But now the questions is, now that you've received the knowledge, what are you going to do with it?," he asked.

Msgr. Perkington said the key to a successful life is in the service of others.

"We have to give of ourselves and sacrifice for others," he said. "If you achieve success for only yourself - that can't be the end of the story.

"You will always see as God sees and if you love as God loves, you will always be successful."

Sacred Heart senior Yianni Haralabidis (MIDDLE) wasn't part of the 4x400 team that clinched the Class D title in dramatic fashion at the end of the meet, but it would've been a moot point had Haralabidis not given his team 12 points with third-place finishes in the 100 (:11.48) and 200 (:23.03, personal best). Earlier Saturday, Haralabidis ran anchor in the 4x100, joining junior Sawyer Kean, senior Chaz Dunn (RIGHT) and junior Austin Malone (left), to finish second (:44.07) to Paxton (:43.91). It was

the team's best time of the year, but it had entered with the best time in Class D and aspirations of winning the event. "We scored eight points, but I think our guys were a little disappointed that they didn't win gold in that event," Goltz said. "But we at least had scored eight more points and now had 13. Even at noon (Saturday), we were not feeling very good about ourselves. A team title was looking out of reach and we were not performing as well as we were hoping." The case can be made that FCSH ultimately

won the team title on two final long jumps. Malone and Dunn were sitting 6th and 7th, respectively, with one attempt remaining (which is how the Irish, with Arnold and Malone, finished in Friday's triple jump). But Malone uncorked a 20-10 leap, good for third place, and Dunn went 20-9.75, for fourth. Those two final jumps produced 11 team points, when 6th and 7th would've given the team five. And a runner-up trophy.

You don't always need a team effort to win Nebraska High School State Track Meet Championships, particularly in the smaller classes, where it's hardly rare that 40 points - the equivalent of four gold medals - are enough in a given year. Actually, that was precisely Sacred Heart's team score the last time it won outright a Class D Boys Title, in 1998.

Furthermore, you don't need a bus load of Olympians, per se, when a single athlete can potentially win four events, each worth 10 team points. Dawson-Verdon High School, for instance, shared a crown in 2002 with three qualifiers combining for 46 team points.

But there are more ways to skin a cat (for lack of a less gruesome cliché), and the Sacred Heart boys this past weekend didn't rely on the heroics of a couple elite athletes to carry them to the infield stand. Instead, they used nearly every weapon in the arsenal, scoring a few points here and a few points there. The Irish were entered in 10 events and had 13 different opportunities to score points. In the end, they garnered nine medals and scored 49 1/2 points, beating runner-up Sterling by the title by 5 1/2 points. Many of the medals, in of themselves, weren't exactly priceless commodities - four were for fourth place or lower - but collectively, most precious.

There was one gold medal and thanks in large part to perfect timing (not unlike a three-pointer at the buzzer), its extrinsic value was perhaps worth more than its 10 points. But not

by much.

Entering the 17th and final event of the 2014 State Track Meet at Omaha Burke, the Irish, which started out Saturday with a grand total of five points, sat somewhat delicately atop the Class D team standings with 39 1/2 points, half a point ahead of Sterling and eight points ahead of Hartington. The race was supposed to come down to Sacred Heart and Hartington - and oh did it ever! - but in terms of the final standings, the Irish, barring a dropped baton or bizarre rule infraction, needed only to finish higher than Sterling to win the team title. That wasn't the most frightening notion for FCSH, which entered with the Class' fastest district time, incidentally run on the same track as Sterling two weeks ago, just six seconds faster and two medals prettier.

But the Jets, despite competing in the slow heat of the 1600 Relay, weren't going to concede anything and turned in a season-best time of 3:34.10, winning the heat by some 10-15 yards. So, speaking of heat? That performance was faster than any of Sacred Heart's times this spring, prior to districts.

"They (Sterling) knew what was on the line," FCSH Coach Doug Goltz said. "We were not only running against Hartington and the other teams of the fast heat but we were also running against Sterling's time."

While Team Irish, comprised of senior Chaz Dunn, junior Sawyer Kean, junior Austin Malone and sophomore Henry Arnold, entered with the best district time, Hartington had actually posted the fastest mile relay time in Class D this spring at 3:29.5. Their anchor, senior Pat Wortmann, was already in possession of three meet medals from the 400, 800 and mile, making them a slight favorite to win. Again, though, FCSH needed only to finish higher than 7th to erase Hartington's title hopes. The Irish had to better 3:34.1 or the team trophy was Sterling's.

"Chaz ran well, putting us in the lead," Goltz said. "Sawyer ran second and Austin ran third; both running well and giving us a lead of five-plus yards over Hartington handing off to our fi-

nal runner Henry Arnold.

"It was a two team race as the others teams were well behind FCSH and Hartington. We had not lost a 4x400 this season and usually had a good lead by the time Henry got the baton, but he would be pushed like he had never been before by (Hartington runner) Wortmann. He immediately cut the distance down on Henry and with 300 to go he made his move to pass him," Goltz said. "Henry was inside and Wortmann in lane two. Henry accelerated as Wortmann tried to pass, keeping Wortmann to the outside along the backstretch, around the curve and into the final 100 meters. They were dead even coming off the curve - they had been almost attached to each other for the entire second lap. Wortmann made one final charge but Henry was able to hold him off at the finish line

with us winning by .19 seconds. We ran 3:31.19 and Hartington was 2nd with 3:31.38. Sterling's time held up for 3rd overall. We knew if we won the 4x4 and ran faster than Sterling that we would win the meet," Goltz said.

The annual 17-event state track meet that begins Friday morning and ends Saturday night without fail will consist of a handful of interesting, unrelated storylines, a few dramatic individual displays of awe-inspiring athleticism, and occasionally a couple notable rivalries - again, they're between individual competitors and often unbeknownst to everyone else - but pivotal moments that decide team titles, if they do exist, are hard to pinpoint and even harder to try and predict. Dramatic team-oriented climactic endings like this one celebrated by Sacred Heart? Blue moon territory. And

yet, since it's Sacred Heart, and since its 2014, maybe only appropriate.

Goltz called this 2013-14 year the greatest of his sterling career weeks before Saturday's thrilling finale. And, of course, a 13-0 championship football season and 25-5 basketball campaign that finished with a consolation game victory and third place trophy are worthy of celebration and prominent positions in the memory banks of those who made them happen. But while labeling such accomplishments "routine" at a school even as tradition-rich as Sacred Heart is both historically inaccurate and disrespectful to the dedication and work put forth from these athletes and coaches, its also not a case of unprecedented success. The

new track trophy represents the first outright Class D State Track title in 16 years, yes, but it's also the seventh of its kind. And the two new championship trophies added to the case this past school year bring the grand total to 22 — 31 if you count the girls' state championships. None of them existed before Goltz arrived in the mid-1980s, so a glut of winning alone didn't likely inspire the "dream season" and "most fun ever" remarks the coach with more than 750 victory laps on the tires (500+ basketball, 250+ football) delivered at the season-ending banquet two weeks ago.

Some of it has to do with naturally forging a unique bond with a class that includes his son and coaching them beginning early in elementary school. And perhaps some has to do with the dedication, focus and overall manner in which these boys have attained their successes.

FCSH didn't win this track meet because its athletes were so superior they could show up and win with less than their very best. Quite the contrary. It was an uphill battle and the title trophy was incredibly close to finding a home in Sterling. A couple aforementioned "pivotal moments" emerged Saturday afternoon, and clutch, perhaps even over-achievements, made the difference.

The Irish scored all of five points Friday, underperforming most notably in the triple jump, where a 1st-2nd 18-point finish by Malone and Arnold was a real possibility - indeed a more realistic expectation than the 6th-7th five-point eventual reality.

"After Friday's session we left the track feeling disappointed," Goltz said. Those came in the Triple Jump going 6th and 7th where we thought we could have scored more. A jump of 42-5 was 4th place."

Neither jumper hit 42-feet, which is a little mind-boggling knowing Malone broke a 40-year-old school record in his first event of the spring at 44-7.25; and Henry went 43-11 a week earlier in Auburn to take the district title.

Furthermore, in Friday's prelims, Henry (400), senior Colin Niemeyer (300H) and Kean (100) all failed to qualify for Saturday's finals.

However, Haralabidis did qualify for Saturday's finals in the 100 and 200 - and his eventual third-place performances in both events proved enormous in terms of the team title, giving FCSH 12 points - perhaps more than they anticipated, as Haralabidis had the sixth fastest time in the 100 prelims and fourth fastest in the 200 prelims.

"At least we knew we would be able to score Saturday in those two events," Goltz said. "But after Friday - we were feeling that we might be out of it as far as the team title."

Sterling had a great first day, leading in the points with 19. They scored more than projected and still had the 800 where they had two of the top times (Trauernicht, Dirks) going in.

And Saturday morning didn't start that well, either, as Dunn ran 10 seconds slower than his district race, and finished 16th out of 24 runners in the 800.

Even the good stuff was kind of a downer. The 4x100 relay team of Kean, Dunn, Malone and Haralabidis scored eight points and set a personal-record at :44.07. So what's the problem? They didn't want second place and Paxton

ran :43.91. The Irish 4x1 team entered with the fastest district time by half a second - that's a huge cushion in that race.

"We ran a season best and scored eight points, but I think our guys were a little disappointed that they didn't win gold in that event," he said. "But we at least had scored eight more points and now had 13."

While the dramatic 1600-meter relay provided the dramatic conclusion, you could say the Irish won its track title between 1-2 p.m. in a trio of events: Long jump, pole vault and 200-meter dash.

The disappointing triple jump that saw Dunn and Malone combine for five points was playing out like deja vu. Dunn jumped well in prelims, but Malone needed his third and final attempt to qualify for finals. With just one attempt remaining in finals, it was 6th and 7th again, just like the day before.

"It looked like we were going to end up like we did in the triple jump - a little disappointed," Goltz said. "But Austin and Chaz each had a big jump on their last jump, which moved them

up to third and fourth."

In two long jump attempts, FCSH gained six team points. If the two Irish jumpers had finished 6th and 7th, Sterling wins the title. To use a basketball analogy, those clutch jumps were akin to beating the buzzer with desperation threes to end the half and the third quarter. They were that huge.

Meanwhile, Strasheim, a senior, projected to have only an outside shot at scoring in the pole vault, but quickly moved right up the board to 13-0 without a single miss. And though he didn't make 13-6, the lack of misses helped give him a tie for fifth and 3.5 more points for the team.

Now trailing Sterling by just 1 1/2 points, Haralabidis ran his personal-best 23.04 200-meter dash to get third and score six more points.

"During the 200 is when it got a little crazy - Sterling had Benson in the discus and Hartington had a thrower that had thrown 144-9 in districts. They both could score points in that event that we had no one and all three schools had a 4x400 relay team in the last event," Goltz said.

Benson eventually scored three points for Sterling with sixth place in the discus. That sent FCSH into the 1600 relay with 39.5 points, half a point more than Sterling.

After the dramatic finish and tro-

Nebraskans Flock to Canada

In 1913 Nebraska was experiencing an emigration problem, with some farm families leaving the state for greener fields to the north. The Red Cloud Chief on March 6, 1913, under the headline "Nebraskans Flock to Canada," noted that according to Canadian reports, 4,463 people had left Nebraska and Iowa for Canada during the previous year of 1912. As a partial remedy, the Chief urged the passage of a bill then pending in the Nebraska Legislature, House Roll 423, providing for the creation of a Nebraska Conservation and Public Welfare Commission, to be charged with surveying and publicizing the state's resources. It was hoped that this would help stem the tide of outward migration.

The lure of vast new lands in Canada suitable for agriculture is evident from scattered reports in the pages of Nebraska newspapers as early as the 1880s. The Columbus Journal on March 8, 1882, published a letter from Daniel M. Condon, who was then in Manitoba investigating Canadian homestead opportunities. Condon wrote that "the country is as level as the old Platte valley, . . . [T]hey claim to raise good potatoes, and oats, and that all their crops are good, but the town-lot land excitement is the biggest I ever saw or heard of. Every homesteader is getting just 160 acres in Manitoba, the same that I got the last homestead in Nebraska in 1869." The Journal remarked twenty years later, on November 26, 1902: "Manitoba claims that of its total population, 3,000 were formerly Nebraskans, who took property with them to Canada to the estimated amount of \$5,000,000."

Alberta was the destination for other Nebraskans looking for new opportunities farther north,

including Charles W. Keys, who had first settled in Sarpy County in 1856. Keys, at the age of almost seventy, left the state about 1898 following the failure of a bank at Gretna in which he had invested, returning briefly in 1901 to settle his business affairs. He told the Omaha Daily Bee on October 2, 1901, that he had decided "to take a new start in another land. . . . He is now engaged in farming and cattle raising and says that he is doing well."

U. G. Knight from Webster County also moved to Alberta. He said in a letter to the Red Cloud Chief, on June 20, 1902: "Nowhere in the wide world is the grass more luxuriant, the trees greener, or the promise of crops better, than in central and northern Alberta. . . . [A] man from Nebraska feels like he might be in a new world. . . . [W]e have no cyclones, no blizzards, no hot winds and no volcanic eruptions." Knight reported that he and other nearby settlers from Webster County were doing well in Alberta.

Not all former Nebraskans remained permanently in their new Canadian homes. Condon ended his 1882 letter to the Columbus Journal with the admonition to those thinking of following him "to stay where they are, and let very well alone, for if they ever want to think more of Nebraska, just let them travel towards the North pole as far as I have." Despite his enthusiasm for Alberta in 1902, Knight stayed there only a year before returning to the United States, where he settled in California.

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Got Weeds? Funding May Be Available

2.2 Principal Reports:

NeSA Spring Assessments have been completed and scores will be received in late summer for Reading, Math and Science. NWEA MAPS assessment is being finished and went much smoother than winter and fall assessments.

This being Mr. Valentine's last Board meeting with District 56, he stated that he appreciated the opportunity and support he and his family received with this District. The Board expressed their appreciation to Mr. Valentine for his contribution to the District and wished him the best.

2.2b J.P. Holys for South School: Mr. Holys was unable to attend this meeting and his report was given by Supt. Heckenlively. Student enrollment is 183. NeSA, MAPS and DIBELS End Benchmark have been completed by grades 3rd-5th. Assessment data will be compiled for the upcoming Data Retreat. Life Skills held their open house for two students completing their senior year in the program. Both students will continue to be served in the Life Skills program until they turn the age of 21. There will be 18 in Life Skills next Fall. Three students in the 18-21 group, 8 in Life Skills A, and 8 in Life Skills B. Parents In Education (PIE) held their Spring meeting on May 6 in the South School gym with several students receiving the Top Spot Accelerated Reader Awards. This award recognized the top ten readers with regards to our Accelerated Reading program. The Parent Connect website and the school websites were presented as an additional resource for parents. School wide Title projects were explained as part of the annual parent meetings and activities. Thank you to the PIE officers and Gail Froeschl for presenting a wonderful program. The Early Childhood Interagency Coordinating Council met on May 9 at the Grand Weaver Hotel. The ECICC is a federally mandated council whose purpose is to provide guidance to the Governor regarding early childhood services and education. Thank you to Cory and Alysia Schawang for discussion their experiences with the Early Development Network and Falls City Special Services. Thank you also to the local

panel members, Six Pence staff members Cathy Martin, Susan Johnson, and Christine Aldana, ESU 4 Services Coordinator Lori Harring, Early Childhood Program Coordinator and teacher Stacey Vitosh, Tim Heckenlively, Falls City Public School Superintendent, and Mary Jane Gist, the Family Partnership Coordinator for Head Start.

2.2c Rick Johnson for Middle School: Students of the Month for April are: Zach Beaver, Elise Nycum and Austin Babb; Students of the month for May: Kade Bredemeier, Grayson Hayes, and Katelyn Stoller. The Elks recently hosted a banquet for each of the Students of the Month for the school year 2013-2014. Calendar events were listed and can be found on the school website for the month of May. Report cards will be mailed home after May 26. The Principal/Teacher Design/Pilot Committee met with Mrs. Whisler and Mrs. Madison (ESU Staff Developers) to review and write Teacher Professional Development Plans during the afternoon of May 5. NeSA and MAP testing has been completed and scores have been shared with students and staff. Data from the testing is being prepared for the Data Retreat. The recent band, chorus, show choir, and small groups and solos gave a fine performance on April 28. The Middle School Show Choir performed for the student body along with the High School JV and Varsity Show Choirs and the High School Stage Band. The students and staff all enjoyed the great performances. RTi Team Meeting met with the ESU Staff Developers to review the Middle School Process and reviewed data of our RTi students. The Board was given a report of the data for year 1. Student enrollment is 168.

2.2d Gale Dunkhas for High School: Student enrollment is 259. Mrs. Rech and Dunkhas received training from ESU 4 staff on writing individual professional development plans that are part of the new teacher evaluation pilot. They will train staff in the fall and Mrs. Rech will be a teacher leader in the high school for staff support. ESU4 6rainer met with the administrative team to discuss professional development for next year. High Impact Instructional Practice will be implemented. Staff members will identify two elements of the Marzano framework to improve instruction and meet to discuss progress on their goals during the school year. NeSA Reading, Math, and Science have been administered. MAPS Reading, Math and Science is currently being administered. Data will be compiled for the Data Retreat scheduled for May 30. Athletic physicals will be May 14 at 3:45 p.m. High school concussion testing was conducted. The eighth grade transition activity is May 14 with students getting a tour of the High School building and an opportunity to have a question/answer session with current High School students. The High School weight facility will open on June 2. Seniors last day was May 9. Graduation will be held May 18 at 2 p.m. at Prichard Auditorium. Semester tests are May 16 and 19. Last day of school for students is May 20 with a two-hour early dismissal. The Bigger, Faster, Stronger Clinic will be held on May 21 and is open to students entering grades 7-12. The cost is \$10 per participant. Students of the Month for April are Brandon Gibson, Haley Cochran, Haley Liberty and Christian Bennett. ZNEZ

Recognition of the vocal music and instrumental students for their fine performances during the school year, at Districts, and during the Spring vocal/band concerts. Mrs. Sutton and Mr. Stutheit have worked hard with their groups and the programs have been very entertaining. We have some very talented individuals and groups. Good luck to the boys and girls track teams and the golf team and their coaches at Districts. Congratulations to all of the athletes and students for all the recognitions they have received this Spring during the various programs. Dunkhas was contacted by Mr. John Hundley who graduated from FCHS in 1964 and had not returned to Falls City since then, to be able to tour the High School. Mr. Hundley was very impressed with the school and the stadium.

2.3 Board President's Report: President Martin stated that the NASB called for any Resolutions or By-Laws that the Board members might have to offer, they will need to be discussed at the next Board meeting. The NASB School Law seminar is June 6 and encourages the Board members to attend if possible. Recognition of retirees and staff leaving the District is set for May 21. Martin stated that he and Harris worked with Mike Dunn going through the scholarship applications for the Foundation and that the applicants were very good kids.

2.4 Superintendent's Report: Heckenlively asked the Board to remember the staff and students of Sutton, whose school building was recently destroyed by a tornado that struck the town.

2.4a Legislative and Organizations Report: The second session of the 103rd Legislature adjourned sine die April 17. Seventeen senators are leaving the Legislature due to term limits, among them York Senator Greg Adams, who has served as speaker for the last two sessions. Under the time constraints of a 60-day session, all of the 105 bills designated as priority measures by senators were debated on the floor. The NCSA Final Legislative Report for the 2014 session is available for review or can be checked out from the superintendent's office. The report includes summaries of all education-related legislation passed into law, documents issued by Senator Sullivan on the LB 1103 Vision for Education Roadmap, and a complete listing of interim studies with a direct or indirect impact on public education. The first session of

the 104th Legislature is scheduled to convene Jan. 7, 2015.

The Nebraska School Law Seminar is June 6 in Kearney, featuring full-day presentations of the Nebraska Council of School Attorneys covering the changes in the laws and regulations governing schools. Board members wishing to attend will need to be registered.

2.4b Building & Grounds Update: The Board received a summary of the summer maintenance projects scheduled to be completed over the next three months.

An electrical upgrade in the High School welding shop is estimated to cost \$4,000. This upgrade is required to improve the electrical safety of the shop and accommodate the new welders being provided by SE CC. 2.4c Continuous School Improvement & District Goals: Continuous School Improvement Plan Goal: All FCPS students will increase their achievement in math problem solving across all content areas.

The NE State Council of the North Central Association and AdvanCED recently presented an award to FCHS in Celebration of 100 years (1911-2011) of continuous membership. FCHS was the 19th High School in the State of Nebraska to become accredited. NCA started in Nebraska in 1896, and the first accredited school was in 1904.

High Impact Instruction Partnership - FCPS will be partnering with ESU4 in 2014-2015 in the delivery of professional development for the instructional faculty as it relates to the Art and Science of Teaching Framework by Robert Marzano. We believe this partnership offers teachers professional development on an ongoing basis and will meet their specific needs. The focus of the professional development will be the implementation of research-based practices and strategies to improve learning experiences. The role of the administrative team will be to monitor progress on the goals established by the faculty. The role of the Falls City instructional faculty will be to implement research-based practices and strategies to support goals identified from the Art & Science of Teaching Framework. The role of the ESU4 team will be to offer support and resources to assist teachers in meeting their identified goals. The ESU4 team will meet either individually or in small groups with every teacher, six times during the 2014-2015 school year. The framework and guidance for this PD has been attached in the appendix.

Professional development learning workshops for teachers begin May 28 and occur throughout most of June. The summer professional development opportunities are primarily sponsored by ESU4 and the Nebraska Department of Education. Teachers and principals attending professional development workshops over the summer months are eligible for a \$125 per day stipend if approved and not on contract during the time of the workshop.

- Remove/ replace all interior flooring as required: remove tile from Kitchen replace with new tile: carpet as specified;
- Remove and install new cabinets and countertops as is, with the exception of the dishwasher. Eliminate the space for dishwasher replace with cabinet;
- Remove/replace existing plumbing fixtures at 2 bathrooms per existing;
- Remove/ replace existing garage doors: (2) overhead doors and (1) side entry door;
- Remove soil around the foundation at sides and rear of house to see what is necessary to repair and side the exterior of the house (where plywood is currently);

Remove/replace existing landscape wall to remove dirt from the side of the house and to repair/replace the falling landscape wall;

- Perform pressure test on plumbing to ensure no breakage in pipes;
- Repair/replace bathroom vanity, vanity light fixture, medicine cabinet and stand-alone cabinet as per existing;
- Update light fixtures whole house.

Provisions:
- The contractor shall be responsible for obtaining all permits and will contact utility providers (water, sewer, electric, gas and cable) prior to commencement of any activity involving digging to ensure lines. (sewer, power etc.) are not impacted.
- All bids are subjected to the policies and procedures of the Sac and Fox Nation Housing Authority's Procurement policy. The bid shall be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder, taking into consideration of quality and performance.

- The contract will relieve the Sac and Fox Nation of Missouri in Kansas and Nebraska Housing Authority of any and all liabilities for damages incurred by the Contractor. The contractor shall provide certification that they have \$500,000 liability insurance and Workman's Compensation coverage for any employee on the job.

- No materials shall be salvaged, stored or accumulated in the area by the contractor.
- The Contractor shall be responsible for the removal and proper disposal of all other materials not previously mentioned and shall provide the Sac and Fox Nation Housing Authority with landfill tipping receipts prior to release of payment.

- No payment shall be made until all the work is satisfactorily completed and approved by final inspection of all work completed.
- The Sac and Fox Housing Authority follows Indian Preference as outlined in Section 7(b) of the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act (25 USC 450e(b) when using Indian Community Development Block Grant Funds as defined in 24 CFR 100.48 and 24 CFR 1000.52.



Two Governors Welcome President Harrison to Omaha

In May 1891 President Benjamin Harrison visited Omaha on a return trip from the Pacific Coast to Washington, D.C. The Morning World-Herald on May 14 noted that thousands of people had turned out the day before to welcome him to the city and hear him speak on the need for foreign markets for agricultural products. Harrison and his entourage arrived by train and traveled from the depot in carriages along a decorated parade route toward a grandstand from which he delivered his address. "Along the route the sidewalks were jammed with people and every point from which a view could be obtained was taken. The windows of every block and every story were full of faces."

One political oddity characterized the official parade. Both John M. Thayer and James E. Boyd participated. Boyd, a resident of Omaha, had been elected governor in 1890, but when he tried to assume the office in January of 1891, Thayer refused to vacate it on the grounds that Boyd was not a citizen and therefore ineligible to serve. The State Supreme Court advised otherwise, and Boyd took office on Feb. 6, 1891. However, the same court rendered a decision in May sustaining Thayer, whereupon he was reinstated.

Ed. F. Morearty in his Omaha Memories, published in 1917, recalled the difficulties caused by the participation of both Boyd and Thayer in

ceremonies welcoming Harrison to Omaha. Morearty said: "A few days prior to his arrival I introduced in the city council a resolution which was adopted, which in substance placed the council on record as declaring that one John M. Thayer, being an usurper of the office of Governor of this State, that on that occasion he be treated and classed as a private citizen, and that James E. Boyd be recognized as the Governor of the State, and that he be accorded that honor. This resolution met with the hearty approval of the people of Omaha.

"On the arrival of Mr. Thayer and his staff at the depot, only shrewd diplomacy on the part of Councilman Tom Lowry, who had charge of the parade, prevented a riot, as Mr. Thayer had read of the action of the city council and, being a pompous and fiery old gentleman, he manifested a firm determination to resent what he termed an insult to his high official position. Without his knowledge he was placed some twenty carriages behind Mr. Boyd, and he never knew the difference until the day he died. Had he been in front I am confident his presence would have created a riot."

The World-Herald noted: "The admirers of Governor Boyd could not refrain from greeting him with cheers as he passed along, cheers second in volume only to those offered to President Harrison. At only one point was any demonstration made on account of Governor Thayer. This was at Sixteenth and Farnam streets, where some rash man proposed cheers for Governor Thayer, and this met with a slight hissing."

President Harrison apparently took no official notice of Nebraska's delicate gubernatorial situation during his brief visit to Omaha. On February 1, 1892, the Nebraska Supreme Court's decision sustaining Thayer as governor was reversed by the U.S. Supreme Court, which declared Boyd a citizen and eligible to serve as governor. Boyd then reassumed his position for the remainder of his term.

Sacred Heart's \$2.3 million facility expected to open by beginning of 2015-16 school year

No school day is as festive as the last one of the year and Wednesday Falls City Sacred Heart School cranked the happy knob up to 11 by simultaneously calling it good on 2013-14 and officially getting the party started on one of the biggest expansion projects in its 124-year history.

In a Groundbreaking Ceremony on the northeast corner of the school, School Supt. Msgr. Robert Roh, School Principal Doug Goltz and family members of the late Ray Finck - his surviving wife, Ruth, and grandchildren Austin and Lauren Malone and Nate Finck - put ceremonial shovel to dirt at the spot where over the course of the next 15 months a mound of dirt will transform into a \$2.3 million big man on campus. The new activity center will be open and ready for business by the start of the 2015-16 school year.

The 16,400 square foot facility (on the main level, with an additional 2,400 square foot mezzanine section), will include a full sized gym, locker rooms, weight room and a kitchen/lunch area for students, providing safe and direct access throughout campus and eliminating the need to walk outdoors or cross busy streets as they do now. The lunch/commons area will also serve as a concession area for the various activities occurring in the facility.

Wednesday's event followed a Mass and was attended by the entire student body, students' parents, many FCSH alums, community leaders and even one of the most recognizable public figures in Nebraska, Republican Gubernatorial Candidate Pete Ricketts, who happened by while out on the campaign trail.

Goltz, a Sacred Heart graduate who returned to his alma mater to



coach and teach in the mid-1980s, welcomed the crowd.

"Thank you for taking the time to join us as we celebrate the beginning of an exciting project that has involved the time and financial commitment," Goltz said. After acknowledging Ricketts, FC Mayor Tim Hersh and AHRIS Project Manager Jerry Stallbaumer each by name, he thanked his fellow members of the Building Committee, which includes Tony Ahern, Kent Bieker, Phil Scheitel, Msgr. Roh, Dr. Alan Tramp, Dan Gruber, Scott Magdanz and the late Mr. Finck, who passed away suddenly last January. There was no bigger proponent of Sacred Heart School than Ray Finck, whom Msgr. Roh credited with originally setting the whole idea in motion. "Ray was thinking Activity Center before most of us even thought about it," Roh said, later in the program.

You certainly can't get too deep into a list of people deserving credit for a building without mentioning the guys who in all likelihood, at some point, in some capacity, will lend it their name. This thing couldn't happen without avid support - support only earned by great leaders who are the best at what they do. In Goltz, Sacred Heart for 25 years has enjoyed athletic success unparalleled anywhere in the state. Five years into his career, with plenty of asphalt still separating him and a 30th birthday, Goltz had Sacred Heart experiencing unprecedented success - not just in terms of school history, but on a much larger scale. Statewide, to be sure, and even beyond when a football winning streak eventually reached and even crossed generational boundaries. The streak ended

at 87 games, long after Goltz was one of the most accomplished and recognizable figures in this state's high school sports scene, yet before he even had 10 years experience under his belt. The two decades since - the activity center interestingly will open on the 20th anniversary of that streak - have shown that seemingly impossible run was hardly a fluke or lucky run of great talent. A trophy case without a single top prize when he was hired just last weekend added its 31st. He's the youngest coach Nebraska's ever seen earn a 500th basketball victory and 250th football win. Naturally, that's a resume worthy of avid support. It's the stuff, frankly, courts are named of.

"I am the son and grandson of Sacred Heart alums," Goltz said. "I am a 1981 graduate of Sacred Heart School. I am the father of a daughter and son that are Sacred Heart graduates and have a daughter that is a currently a student at Sacred Heart. I have been a part of the Sacred Heart faculty since 1986 and as your school's Principal I am very proud to stand before you today.

This has been a long process. We first started meeting in the winter of 2009 and numerous people--too many to mention by name--have put in many hours all working towards the same goal - of building a much needed addition to our school," he said.

And Msgr. Roh, likewise, has long been one of the most respected figures in his faith and parochial education, to be sure, but even beyond that circle. That fact Msgr. Roh has been at Sacred Heart for 26 years speaks volumes about the level of reverence he's earned.

Erecting a \$2.3 million building is no small feat and it's quite astonishing placed in context of Sacred Heart's frugal 124-year history.

"Our forefathers gathered on this very ground on which we stand today," Msgr. Roh said. "They gathered here, not to build, but to plant the seeds for Catholic Education in Falls City. They were here to purchase this land and the small castle that stood on it. Judge Dundy, had just been appointed to be a Federal Judge in Omaha. The price was \$6,000 at that time..... in today's money, over \$500,000. (The good judge was not giving them a bargain.) With the title for the property in their hands, they invited nuns from Missouri to start a Catholic school. And thus Sacred Heart was born. But it lasted only one year as extreme drought and grasshoppers took care of the crops in 1892.

"A year later, a different order of sisters came and paid off the note owed to the good judge," Roh continued. "Sacred Heart was born a second time and 123 years later we stand here today.....because of the sacrifices of the Catholic people who believed that God, the Bible and God's word should be part and parcel of a school that would form and educate the heart, the mind, the body, and spirit for this life and the next."

The plan for the activity center was hatched in 2009, Tony Ahern, then-Chairman of the Planning Committee, said. The past two years was spent deciding on the proper location and size to meet the various needs for the school.

Msgr. Roh, in comments made earlier this spring at the school's activities banquet, said he was floored by the response and how quickly they met their financial goals. Fund-raising efforts began in earnest last fall/winter.

"Today is the beginning of a yearlong construction process and by mid-July --where we all stand today-- will look much different," Goltz said. "By that time the real groundbreaking will take place as shovels will be replaced by the heavy construction equipment that will build the next phase of Sacred Heart's history--the Activity Center. Our dream has finally become reality. This is a very exciting time for our school and our community."
