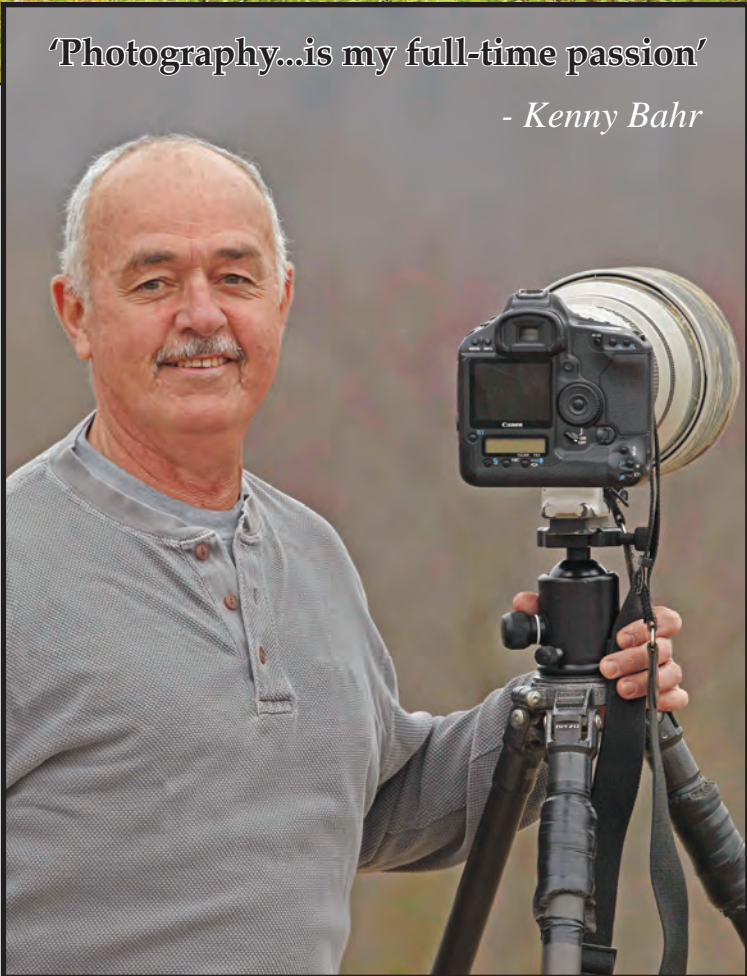

last year, was nominated by John Martin and the motion was seconded by Kathy Bartek. Martin, Bartek, outgoing President Ed Harris, Teresa Olberding and Scott Hollens all voted in Huppert’s favor. Hollens was then nominated as Vice President of the Board.

Also at last week’s meeting at the Central Office in Falls City Middle School, the BOE approved a motion to maintain a \$2,000 hiring incentive for new teachers, and, following a closed session, unanimously voted to extend Superintendent Tim Heckenlively’s contract one year, through June 30, 2014. Compensation for the additional year will be determined at a later date.

In other School Board news:

— Alternative School Teacher Charles Smith was present at the meeting and gave those present a report on the history of the Alternative School, how students are referred to the Alternative School, the various ages of students who attend the Alternative School, the work program,

and how the Alternative School works toward the future to help students who need assistance.

— North School Principal Ernie Valentine reported that Gail Froeschl worked with Nebraska Read Aloud, designated North Elementary a Read Aloud School and received approximately 80 books to distribute to students at North Elementary. He also noted that Kim Nolte will be the long-term substitute teacher in K-1 beginning Jan. 16.

— FCMS Principal Rick Johnson reported that the high school and middle school mid-winter band concert is at 7 p.m. Monday, Feb. 6, at the high school. The Richardson County Spelling Bee is at 7 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 14, at Sacred Heart School.

High School Principal Gale Dunkhas said the new laptops and I-pads are set up and ready for student use and test results from the December ACT show six seniors have achieved 30 and above composite scores, with 35 being the highest.

Body of trooper found Thursday

The body of a missing Missouri state trooper’s was found last Thursday afternoon just south of the intersection of Missouri Highways 118 and 111.

Fred Guthrie Jr.’s body was found around 2 p.m. by crews working to rebuild the highway where his abandoned truck and the body of his K-9 partner, Reed, were found.

Sgt. Sheldon Lyon, spokesman for the Missouri State Highway Patrol, told the St. Joseph News Press that the news would be a relief to Guthrie’s family and his fellow troopers.

“It is a good day for the family,” said Sgt. Lyon. “It’s a relief and kind of a joyous day for us, because we were able to locate him for the family.”

Mr. Guthrie, a combined 17-year veteran of the Missouri State

“Good evening sports fans and political junkies, and welcome to Fox News’ exclusive coverage of tonight’s event, a winner-take-all, no-holds-barred cage match in the squared circle in beautiful downtown Charleston’s Rebel Arena. The house lights are dimmed and spotlights focus as the candidates emerge from their dressing rooms, all wearing variations of red, white and blue trunks, t-shirts, ties and dress shoes with black socks. Arms are raised high, then each candidate shadow boxes his way to the ring, alternately pointing fingers at one another. A buzz ripples from the crowd. Lush is jiggling as he introduces the combatants, “Tricky” Rick Perry, Mitt “I’m so Bain” Romney, Newt “Tax This” Gingrich, Ron “Doctor Liberty” Paul and “Super Fly” Rick Santorum. The referee calls the contestants to the middle of the ring and explains the rules. Come to find out, there aren’t any. The candidates consult with their trainers for final instructions. The bell sounds.

Newt, the two Ricks and Ron immediately converge on Romney, assailing him with a barrage of verbal tongue-lashings. Mitt covers his ears, but keeps on smiling. Lush can hardly keep up, as no sooner does one insult land than another finds its mark. “Massachusetts moderate!”, Gingrich screams. “Flip-floppler!”, shouts Santorum. “Romneycare, Romneycare!”, Paul barks. Mitt is staggered as the missives fly, but rebounds when Perry howls “Remember the Alamo!”, bringing the action to an abrupt, head-scratching halt. The bell signals the end of Round 1.

The would-be presidents return to their trainers to review strategy. Paul loosens his tie, Newt enjoys a jelly doughnut, Mitt applies more hair gel and slips on a pair of “mom” jeans and Santorum dons an American flag sweater vest. “My bad,” Perry tells his trainer. “I forgot what I was supposed to say.” The trainer frantically begins scribbling crib notes on Perry’s back.

Into the ring prances a scantily clad Michelle Bachmann, carrying the Round 2 placard upon which she has scrawled “One Term President.” The bell sounds.

Mitt wastes no time, lighting into Newt with a fierce “Freddie Mac” epithet, and following with a combination of “Pelosi-lover” and “career politician.” Newt begins to whimper and goes down for the count when Romney hits him with a perfectly timed “low-down lobbyist!”

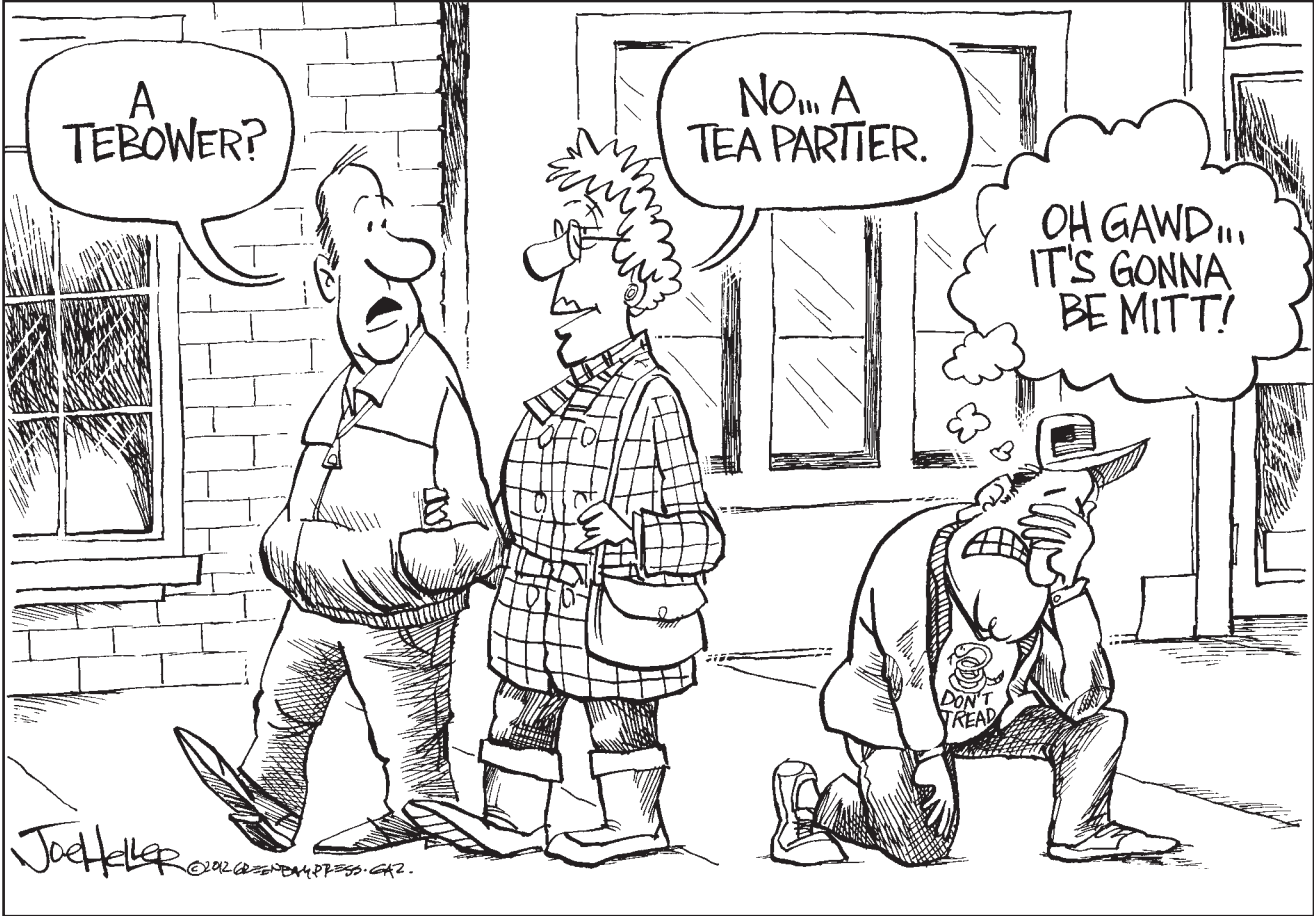

Highway Patrol and Missouri State Water Patrol, went missing with Reed on Aug. 1, 2011, while the two worked Missouri flood duty. He was found just south of the intersection where troopers had originally focused their search efforts.

Sgt. Lyon told the News Press that Mr. Guthrie had been unearthed from “several feet” of sand by a crew from Hill Brothers Construction, a company owned by the family’s friend and next-door neighbor.

Intense efforts to find Mr. Guthrie began immediately following his disappearance, but were scaled back on Nov. 14. Troopers continued to conduct foot searches, however, and were on site while construction crew began their work.

At a memorial service Dec. 14, a casket was buried that held memorabilia of the trooper, as well as the cremated remains of Reed, who was a five-year veteran of the patrol.

Final burial plans for Mr. Guthrie have yet to be determined, however, as his body will be sent to a medical examiner for an autopsy.

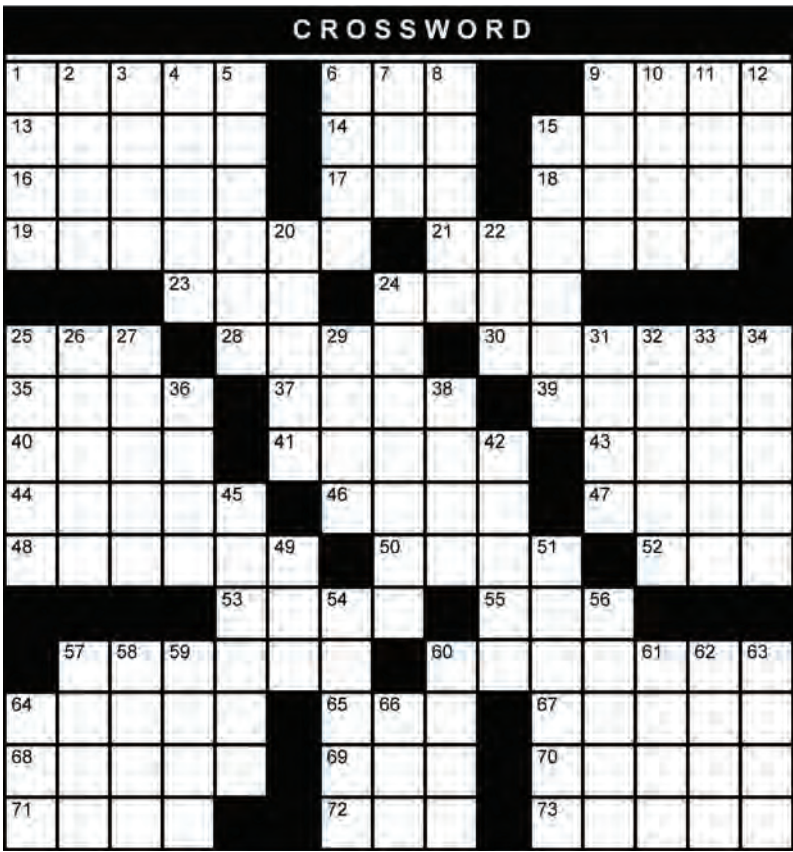

As I sit writing this message to the people of Falls City who care about their children and the future of their town, the North winds are blasting and snow flurries are swirling from a dark and gray mid-January sky. This is not the kind of weather to make you think of hot days and muggy evenings when you’re sitting on bleachers watching kids play baseball or softball. But when summer returns, those kids, who today are sitting in their school classrooms, will be excited about putting on their uniforms and grabbing their caps and gloves to once more enjoy America’s favorite pastime.

Sports have always been a very important part of my life. When I was growing up in Falls City in the ‘50s, there weren’t many opportunities for girls to participate in organized sports. The summer recreation program offered some activities like bowling, tennis, and golf. Finally, around 1963, some local women decided it was time for the girls in town to have softball leagues, one for little girls and one for big girls. Many of my peers played on teams, but my job with summer rec was to umpire. It was a wonderful experience for me that lasted several summers through my high school and college years. Then in 1972, Title IX took effect and the rest is history.

Restoring and improving the surface of the ball fields is necessary for many reasons, including safety. But there is much more to be gained from this beautification project. The girls in Falls City who participate in softball can find positive benefits from being involved in the sport. Playing with friends on a team can build good self-esteem and confidence. Getting out into the fresh air and being active helps raise the level of fitness, which leads to an increase in both mental and physical health.

It appears that the monetary goal which has been set to make the necessary improvements of the fields will be met by the end of this month, thanks to Rod Vandeberg and his hard working committee and many caring donors. And because we are meeting the goal, we are also helping our girls to reach their lifetime goal of being healthy and productive women.

Lodging tax funds available

The Richardson County Visitor’s Committee would like to inform area markets about lodging tax funds that are available for the promotion and marketing of tourism. The Richardson County Visitor’s Committee was formed to oversee the use of tax revenues when the county adopted a lodging tax. The appointees for the Richardson County Visitor’s Committee serve without compensation, except for expense reimbursement. Committee members serve for terms of 4 years.

Taxes can be collected at rates up to 4% on the rental of sleeping accommodations at both for-profit and non-profit hotels, motels, campgrounds, bed & breakfast establishments, and similar lodging facilities. The tax does not apply to room rentals for periods of 30 or more days, nor to the rental of rooms not used for sleeping accommodations (such as conference rooms and dining facilities).

Counties may use revenues in the County Visitor’s Promotion Fund

for printing brochures, erecting signs, mass media advertising, and other tourism promotion and marketing or revenues in the County Visitor’s Improvement Fund for making grants for expanding and improving attractions owned by the public for any nonprofit organization.

Any group, organization, or municipality is eligible to present a proposal to the committee for consideration. Tourism Lodging Tax Dollars Funding Proposal Guidelines and required information to apply are available by contacting the Richardson County Visitor’s Committee at the Clerk of the District Court office at 1700 Stone St., Room 301, Falls City, NE, phone (402) 245-2023, fax (402) 245-3725 or by email: pam.scott@nebraska.gov for further information.

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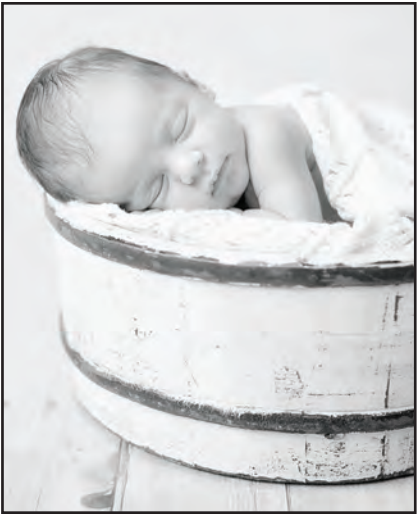

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Be aware of changes in medications

Cold and flu season is here. Before you reach for the bottle of pain reliever, there are some important changes to be aware of. All makers of infants' acetaminophen are changing the amount/concentration of acetaminophen in their containers. This is being done to make the concentration the same in all infants and children's products and to reduce the chance of medication errors, which can be dangerous and even deadly.

It is extremely important if you are dosing medication to small children and infants that you read the label carefully. You may have both older and newer formulations in your home and you need to be aware of which product you are using. The older infants' acetaminophen is three times more concentrated than the new formulation. Overdosing your young child is more likely during this period of transition.

- Some safety tips:
- Always read the label before using medications. If you don't understand the instructions or dosing, contact your doctor, pharmacist or poison center.
 - Give the amount of medicine listed on the label for your child's weight.

— The dosing devices in the infants' formulations are changing. It is important to use the syringe that came with the product and avoid interchanging it with other products.

—Keep the syringe or medicine cup with the medication in its original box.

—For children under two years of age, there is no information on the package regarding how much to give. You will need to get that information from your doctor, pharmacist or poison center.

—Adult dosing will be changing as well. The maximum daily dose for single-ingredient extra strength acetaminophen will go from 8 pills a day (4,000 mg) to 6 pills a day (3,000 mg). The dosing interval will also change from 2 pills every 4-6 hours to 2 pills every 6 hours.

If you have any questions or concerns, you can call the Nebraska Regional Poison Center at 1-800-222-1222 and immediately talk to a specially trained Registered Nurse. The poison center is open 24/7 and is a free service to the public.

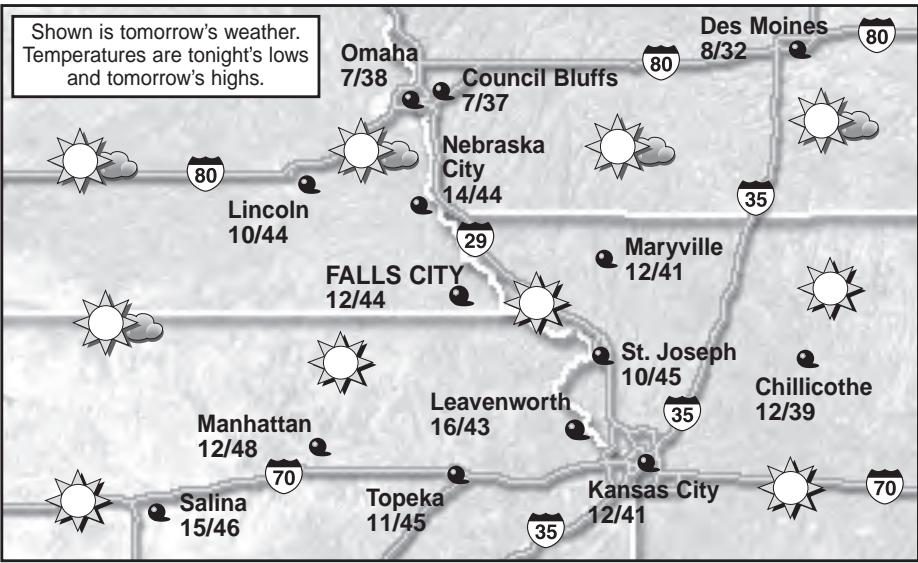

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Where is religion headed?

In the book of Jeremiah we find the prophet being commanded by the Lord in Chapter 36:2-3 to write down the words that God had spoken to him in a book that through the reading of those words the people might turn from their evil ways. Jeremiah did exactly what the Lord commanded him. This book, with its condemnation of Israel and Judah, eventually ended up being read in the presence of king Jehoiakim. After just a few pages had been read, the king became so infuriated he cut the book into pieces with a penknife and threw the pages into the fire. This account is found in Chapters 36:20-24. The concluding verse of that passage notes of the king and his court, "Yet they were not afraid nor rent their garments." Certainly a sad state of affairs when the leaders of the people so violently reject the word of God that they become enraged at its reading and seek to destroy it.

Many today are concerned that our leaders have rejected God's word in a similar fashion. No, we do not see them cutting up the scriptures and casting them into the fire, but rather we see in the laws they enact and

the lifestyles they embrace actions that speak just as loudly regarding their attitude toward the word of God as those of king Jehoiakim. Because of this apparent forsaking of the precepts of God by many of our leaders, some have come to fear for the future of the church and our freedom to worship and teach the truth as we do now. Well that very concern should cause each of us to strengthen our faith in the Lord and, as many before us have done, serve the Lord our God regardless of the consequences that may come our way.

But consider what occurred following king Jehoiakim's book burning. In Ch. 36:32 we see that Jeremiah took another book and wrote all the words the Lord had spoken to him and added many more besides those. The king's rejection of the word did not stop its proclamation. The powerful may reject it, those in authority may oppose it, but the word of God continues to work for good in the lives of men.

Many years after the life of the prophet Jeremiah, we find the account of the Apostle Peter's sermon on the day of Pentecost in Acts 2. Following the crowds plea of "Men and brethren, what shall we do?" we find Peter answering that question in v.38. The results are seen in v.41, "Then they that gladly received his word were baptized: and the same day there were added unto them

about three thousand souls." The word of God cannot be thwarted by a king's knife. They cannot be burned by any leader of man, legislated away by any government, or declared archaic by changes in societal norms. Those have all occurred before but the word of the Lord continues to be proclaimed and accepted by good and honest hearts.

So where is religion headed? Well that depends on us. Just as Jeremiah and the prophets suffered rejection and often punishment for preaching of the word, we should be prepared for the same treatment. Just as Jesus demonstrated in speaking the words of the Father regardless of the consequences, we must follow that same example. And just as Peter overcame the ridicule of the crowd on Pentecost to proclaim the good news that saves men's souls, we must have that same courage knowing that our efforts to teach and live by God's word will ultimately lead to an eternal home with God, not only for us but for those who hear us.

Religion, as it has been described in the Bible, is all about the people. The greatest obstacle to where religion is heading in our time is the same as it has been in the past. The people must know God's word. Many today "have a zeal of God, but not according to knowledge" (Romans 10:2). Many "know

God, but glorify him not as God" (Romans 1:21). Some are "tossed to and fro, and carried about by every wind of doctrine." People have been this way in the past and these problems still exist today. How have these difficulties been overcome in the past? By the word of God being "heard among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also" (2 Timothy 2:2). By heeding the exhortation to "study to show thyself approved unto God" (1 Timothy 2:15). By "desiring that ye might be filled with the knowledge of His will in all wisdom and spiritual understanding." That is the future of religion just as it has been since the days of Jeremiah.

Where is religion headed? It all depends on you.

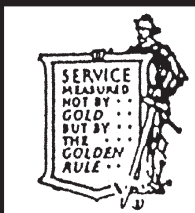

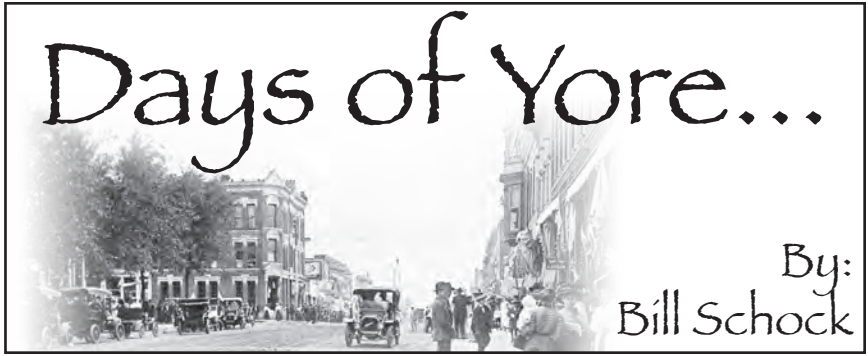
In other developments, the board:

Tigers suffer Spoofhound hangover

Two tough games on back-to-back nights proved to be too tall a hill to climb for the Tiger boys' basketball team over the weekend.

Falls City fell on the road to Maryville, MO, 56-55, Friday night in gut-wrenching fashion. Then, appeared to be mentally fatigued Saturday in a 45-28 loss to visiting Elmwood-Murdock.

The Tigers, now 9-5, were ice cold against the Knights who used a 1-3-1 zone defense to limit juniors Cord Huettner and Wade Witt inside for the Tigers. Falls City was just 8-30 from the floor and 9-17 from the free throw line. Huettner's six points were a season low for him and Witt's six points all came at the free throw line.

Falls City looked a step slower Saturday against the Knights and Head Coach Don Hogue felt the hang over from the Maryville loss may have affected his team Saturday.

"I feel the loss on Friday was the reason we were a half-step slower (Saturday)," Hogue said. "For playing a good team at home, our fire wasn't there."

Friday against Maryville, Huettner and Witt each scored 11 points in the second half to help

the Tigers rally from a 13-point third quarter deficit to take a 55-52 lead with under a minute left. Huettner finished with 17 points on 7-8 FG's and also led FCHS with four rebounds, while Witt finished with a season-high 16 points on 6-8 FG's.

Maryville's Tyler Walter answered, however, when he hit his only three-pointer of the game from the corner to even the score up at 55-55.

On the next possession, senior Josh Stoller, who has been one of Falls City's steadiest scorers this season, found a hole in the defense, drove to the basket and was fouled with 15 seconds remaining. Stoller, a 66 percent free throw shooter, was unable to connect on either of the two free throws, however, and the Spoofhounds secured the rebound.

Maryville's Payton Scarbrough was then fouled with 4.7 seconds left and made the second of two free throws to put his team up for good 56-55.

"Josh felt terrible," said Hogue about his senior guard. "He felt he let the team down. A great leader will always take the blame, but I told him and the team there were a lot of plays that didn't go our way the

previous 31 1/2 minutes prior to those free throws."

Falls City won't have any time to lick their wounds as they are scheduled to play Hiawatha this afternoon at 3:30 in the first round of the always-competitive Raider Classic at Nemaha Valley High School in Seneca, KS. The Tigers, who are the two seed, defeated the Redhawks 52-40 back on Dec. 6.

A win and the Tigers play at 6:30 Thursday night; a loss and they will play at 5 p.m. Thursday. Host Nemaha Valley (7-1) is the one seed.

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Iron unkind at MUDECAS for Irish boys

Broken wrist main injury in Wednesday crash on Chase St.

A 58-year-old Falls City man is back at home and nursing relatively minor injuries after a scary car accident on Chase St. last Wednesday morning.

Mike Schaible, 1923 Towle St., suffered a broken wrist and facial lacerations after the 2011 Mercury Sable he was driving struck two trees and a traffic sign and rolled over in the 1900 block of Chase Street at around 8:30 a.m. Medical personnel were on the scene quickly and transported Schaible to Community Medical Center. He was then transported to Omaha, where he received a battery of tests and was dismissed Saturday.

From his home, Schaible Monday said he was having coffee at Kwik Shop Wednesday morning prior to the accident and began having difficulty breathing. He attempted to drive home, he said, and remembers rolling the vehicle's windows down for fresh air as he drove north on Chase Street. "The next thing I knew, I was rolled up on top," he said. The vehicle's airbag deployed, breaking his eye glasses and cutting his face.

Schaible said he has a history of heart problems. Authorities said alcohol was not a factor in the crash.

One-year jail sentence for 2011 auto theft

Amber L. Frenzel, 29, of Falls City, was convicted of attempted theft, a class IV felony, and sentenced in District Court last Tuesday to one year in Richardson County Jail for her involvement in the theft of a vehicle from Sun Mart parking lot last spring.

Frenzel and Joshua E. Nissen were convicted of stealing a 1998 Dodge Caravan, owned by Dennis and Sherry Gibbs, on April

25, 2011. Mr. Gibbs, an employee at Harmon's OK Tire, parked the van in the grocery store parking lot and was notified by a fellow employee that two people had driven off in the van. FCPD officers responded to the call and while gathering statements, a dispatcher with the Richardson County Sheriff's Office reported that deputies in Otoe County had stopped a van with the same de-

scription. The van was identified as belonging to the Gibbs.

Nissen, 26, was sentenced in December to three years of intensive supervised probation with the Work Ethic Camp located near McCook.

Also last week, Nathan A. Purcell, 17, appeared in County Court Wednesday on three felony charges: theft by unlawful taking (\$500-1,500), operating a motor vehicle to avoid arrest and burglary, stemming from a Dec. 14 incident.

Purcell was bound over to District Court and was scheduled for arraignment earlier this morning.

Purcell is accused of leading authorities on a high-speed chase and is also a suspect in the break-in at the FC Country Club and CrossWinds Restaurant on the night of Dec. 13.

Rural Fire responds to 26 alarms in '11

The Falls City Rural Fire Department responded to 26 alarms during 2011.

The total loss of property in the district was estimated at \$48,000. One vehicle fire and two separate outbuilding structures represented the dollar loss.

The rural firemen responded to: 11 mutual aid calls to five other Fire Departments; one false alarm; nine trash and grass fires with no damage; two combine fires with no damage; two vehicle fires and two outbuilding structure fires.

Mutual aid was received three times from adjoining Fire Departments.

No personal injuries were associated with the 2011 responses.
