'The Pilot Who Wouldn't Bail Out'

"You get that way in the schools of America. You learn your duty towards others, and how to make it stick."

Vol. 149 - No. 41

Those words, written by author Paul Gallico, in the May 1944 issue of Esquire magazine, eloquently summarized the reason why Air Service pilot, Captain Bob Hartzell, was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor for feats that he accomplished in "The Flying Nightmare." Gallico's article was accompanied by a photograph of an original painting by Falls City's native son, John Falter. The painting was titled The Pilot Who Wouldn't Bail Out.

Gallico's article and Falter's original painting will both be on display from Nov. 11 through Dec. 31 in the Stalder Gallery of the Falls City Library and Arts Center. An art opening has been planned for Tuesday, Nov. 11, featuring world-renowned speaker Dr. Adrian Lewis, an expert on WWII. The Stalder Gallery will open at 6 p.m.,

with the talk scheduled for 7.

But first, let's talk about Hartzell's incredible valor when he flew a C-47 twin-engined transport ship through the valleys of the shadows of death.

Previous to Hartzell's flight, another pilot had reported that the plane Hartzell was about to fly had had problems because the engines had a nasty habit of conking out at 10,000 feet. So Hartzell and his co-pilot, Lieutenant Bob Gray, had the ground crew check out the engines at a base in Dinjan, North India, and then flew the ship through a series of test flights, and everyone was satisfied with the ship's performance. Their first flight, to Kunming, China, had proved uneventful, so Hartzell and Gray both thought that the questioning pilot had just been a yellow belly.

However, their flight back to India proved otherwise. It was a harrowing rollercoaster that left Hartzell and Gray thankful for another day, and kissing the ground


New Humane Society shelter becomes a reality

What began as wishful thinking — poodle's paradise? — on Sunday, Oct. 5, 2014 officially became reality for the fine folks of the Humane Society and the critters they care for.

With the snip of a ribbon by long-time local animal rights champion Bev Kimmel, the Humane Society opened the doors of its new facility; a 900-square-foot building equipped to provide food for the hungry, water for the thirsty, a warm bed when it's cold, asylum from an unrelenting Nebraska July, a sturdy roof when it rains and, above all, love for the unloved. What started with a couple squeaky old wheels has emerged as a sanctuary for the forsaken. The roughly \$80,000 building, located on West 14th Street, north and west of the bowling alley, is shiny and new, complete with state-of-the-art air conditioning and heating units and kennels for nine roommates. The structure is made of concrete and steel, but The Humane Society is made of so much more.

Janet "Dobey" (Falter) Haws clipped the ribbon and ceremoniously opened The John P. Falter Museum last Wednesday during a ceremony held in the front of the museum location at 17th and Stone Street.

The museum is still under construction but before Christmas will display the works of local artist John P. Falter. Haws and several others gave remarks during the ceremony, including Nebraska Gov. Dave Heineman.

"I'm always pleased to travel this great state and tell people that I was born down here in Falls City," Gov. Heineman said. "This is a very special community and this area as evidenced by what is going on here today.

You know there are a lot of people who deserve a lot of credit for why we're here today and let me just acknowledge the Falter Museum Committee, the Nebraska State Historical society, the Richardson Foundation, the Library & Community Foundation, Dobey and her committee for all they have done to make this happen, and you know we're celebrating a very special person," Heineman said.

John Philip Falter became a world renowned illustrator and historic painter, but never lost his love for Falls City. Following his death in Philadelphia in 1982, his studio 'you know, I never really left Falls City'

and some of his paintings were donated to the Nebraska State Historical Society in Lincoln. The NSHS is loaning the Falter Museum Committee his studio.

"Some of you may not know that John Falter was a chief petty officer in the Navy and he painted recruitment posters and other patriotic materials and I know that Falls City is very very proud of him and his family and let me just say from a state perspective we are very very proud. That is one thing about Nebraska that I would share with you. We have a lot of famous people in this state and really I'd say every one of you, for what you do for this

state very single day. That is why Falls City and Nebraska is such a special place to live to work and to raise a family.

"Falls City is now moving in the right direction and a lot of you have invested your time, energy

On its sports pages the *Lincoln Journal Star* recently ran what has been for me an interesting "50 Husker Football Memorable Moments" series.

I've got a Cornhusker memorable moment. Turning the clock back a heck of a long ways--October 1936)--to a game that has never left my mind in these ensuing 78 years, which was played in Minneapolis. The Cornhuskers were close to the top of the heap nationwide and so were Minnesota's Golden Gophers. Our backfield boasted fullback Sam Francis of Oberlin, KS, halfback Lloyd (Wild Hoss) Cardwell of Seward, Ron Douglas of Crete and quarterback Johnny Howell of Omaha. As a freshman I was one of the insignificant student managers so was on the sidelines with a ringside seat, trying to stay out of the way of the importants.

It was a 0 to 0 ball game late in the fourth quarter. The Huskers had to give the ball back to the Golden Gophers. Bud Wilkinson, who later became a legendary coach of the Oklahoma Sooners, caught the punt and then lateraled it to the safety, Andy Uram, who scooted (I can't remember how many) yards for the TD. That was it--a 7-0 win for the Gophers. Fullback Sam Francis, who also was our linebacker and was everybody's all-American that year, collapsed from exhaustion late in the game.

Dana X. Bible was the Husker head coach and after that year left for Texas where he became a coaching legend.

I'd guess there are very few around who would remember that hardfought, big time game and the way it ended. It has just stayed with

Lori Gottula, who frequently brightens Journal columns, is writing interesting stories about the seven of John P. Falter's great World War II paintings which will be on exhibit in the Stalder Gallery at Falls City Library & Art Center from Nov. ll through Dec. 31.

It's no secret that I'm gung ho about the history of World War II's air battles over Germany. Forth with I'm going to lay one day of it on you.

Today, Oct. 14, 71 years ago (1943) became Black Thursday, as it is forever known in the 8th Air Force flying out of England in World War II.

The bombing target on that Thursday was Schweinfurt, Germany. Three hundred four-engine B-17s and B-24s would be taking off from air bases in eastern England. It had been a devastating week for Army Air Corps heavy bomber crews. For three consecutive days the losses had been horrific: 30, 28 and 30 bombers had been shot down. Our 10man crew was "stood down" on Oct. 14 because we had run into Nazi trouble three days earlier and had to make an emergency landing at a U.S. fighter base on the English coast. So I wasn't on the mission. My 4-leaf clover was still doing its job.

The 300 bombers heading for Schweinfurt quickly ran into trouble. A number had to "abort," turn back to England because of engine or other trouble. Our fighter planes (P 47s) flying escort for the bombers also had to return to England shortly after reaching the Dutch coast because their range was limited. The attack force, now about 230 bombers, was on its own at 20,000 feet and although each bomber had 13 50-caliber machineguns, the planes, with no escort, were pretty much sitting ducks for the very efficient Luftwaffe (German air force) pilots. Schweinfurt's vital ball bearing plants were plastered but as the bombers were heading back to England with no fighter escort the German pilots again took their toll. The day's loss: 67 B-17s and B-24s.

The figures were horrific. In eight days the 8th Air Force had lost 155

heavy bombers and 1,550 crewmen.

So it's no wonder that Oct. 14, 1943, has always been known to those of us who were there as Black Thursday. That's what I'm observing up, where my remaining hair is, this day.

In checking over my figures in some of the books about the 8th Air Force I came across this account as related in "Masters of the Air," my Air Corps "bible," written by Donald L. Miller:

"After Black Thursday a story spread through the ranks of the Eighth Air Force that, although not true in its particulars, expressed the new mood. It was about a shot up B-17limping home to England. Someone on the plane radioed the tower:

"'Hello Lady Fox, hello Lady Fox, this is G for George. Will you give me landing instructions please? Pilot and co-pilot dead, two engines feathered, fire in the radio room, vertical stabilizer gone, no flaps, no brakes, crew bailed out, bombardier flying the plane. Landing instruction please!'

"The reply came a few second later.

"'I hear you G for George. Here are your landing instructions. Please repeat slowly, please repeat slowly. Our Father who art in heaven...."

One's sense of humor did wonders in that air war being fought seven months before historic D-Day at Normandy.

Term limits will be felt in Nebraska, 13 other states

Nebraska is one of 14 states where the toxic fallout of term limits will wreak havoc in November's general election. There could be as many as 17 new faces in the 49-member Nebraska Unicameral and many of them will turn to "veterans" with a whopping six years under their belts for advice.

In addition, this fledgling body will deal with the first new Governor in 10 years and that person will be a true freshman. Sounds like a football analogy waiting to happen. OK, I'll go there. Expect the new quarterback to drop the ball a few times and to throw more than his share of incompletes.

And don't look to the bench for the only grizzled veteran, Ernie Chambers. With more than 40 years in the game, he'll be in the middle of the action. He'll be the playmaker – as usual – and the other players will be trying to find ways to contain him. Interesting to note, it's all because of term limits. And, unless you haven't been paying attention, somebody once thought that term limits was a good way to get rid of Ernie.

In the 14 states with term limits, 13 of them have two houses in the Legislature. Including Nebraska, there are 63 state senators termedout, or 19 percent of the 331 total state senate seats up for election. Likewise, there are 160 state representatives termed-out, or 12.7 percent of the 1,261 seats up for election in the other 13 states. The 223 current state legislators who must leave office represent 14 percent of the 1,592 legislative seats open in the 14 term-limited states.

The 24 seats open in Nebraska include the even-numbered districts. Seven incumbents are seeking reelection. Beau McCoy of Elkhorn will be back for two more years in his odd-numbered District 39 since he was unsuccessful in his bid to be the Republican Party nominee for governor. Charlie Janssen of Fremont could be back for two more years in odd-numbered District 15 if he is unsuccessful in his bid as a Republican running for State Auditor against the term-limited Democrat state Senator Amanda McGill of Lincoln.

If any of the seven incumbents lose to challengers, the number of new faces in the Legislature will increase. More new faces means

a longer learning curve. And new faces in the Legislative branch are often met with mixed reaction by those in the Executive branch. In an officially non-partisan Legislature, there are those who count bodies by Democrat or Republican. Party faithful know exactly who needs to be where. Republicans bristle when Democrats land committee chairmanships and Democrats are constantly aware that they are outnumbered in

Nebraska. New senators rely on veteran staff to keep the momentum with constituents. But that also gives a bit too much power to paid staffers, all of whom earn more than the senators for whom they work. It also gives an edge to lobbyists and special interest groups - most of whom have been around far longer than the folks they hope to influence.

In short, I have long been of the opinion that term limits are a bad idea. The results of the pending legislative session could well prove my point. Together we'll keep tabs on the new and inexperienced.

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

and money in this community for what it means. So today in a way it's a celebration of all of that. Let me just say that not only am I proud to be from Falls City but I'm proud to be the Governor of the best state in the United States of America," Gov. Heineman concluded.

Falter Museum fundraisers successfully pushed the collection effort past the \$100,000 mark and renovation of the former Richardson County Bank building is on schedule to open Friday, Nov. 28, just in time for Santa Claus' annual visit and Falls City's downtown Christmas window opening.

The monetary target is \$225,000, which would cover the entire remodel, as well as five years of site maintainance. 



Falls City man returns to prison

A 32-year-old Falls City man is returning to prison after Richardson County District Judge Daniel E. Bryan Jr. sentenced him to serve 20 to 40 months in prison for attack-

ing Falls City Police Officers Travis Mitchell and Chuck Di-Giacomo last March.

Craig W. Hayes received three sentences — to be served concurrently after reaching a

plea agreement in August with the County Attorney's Office and entering pleas of guilty to a pair of felony charges of terroristic threats and a charge of assault on an officer in the third degree. A second charge of assault of an officer and a charge of attempted possession of a deadly weapon by a prohibited person were dismissed. In addition to the prison time, Hayes was ordered to pay court costs of \$145.

On the evening of Saturday, March 29, officers responded to an altercation involving Hayes and an unnamed person in the 400 block of East 7th and Wilson Streets. When DiGiacomo attempted to intervene, Hayes, said to be "highly intoxicated," struck the officer and attempted to take his issued firearm. Hayes' father, former Richardson County Sheriff Keith Hayes, apparently had control of his son, but released him and the younger Hayes attacked DiGiacomo, using closed fists to strike the officer. Craig Hayes then made several attempts to grab DiGiacomo's weapon and threatened to grab it and shoot him.

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DiGiacomo, according to the arrest affidavit, used physical force to control the gun.

Hayes also threatened Mitchell, who responded on backup, with bodily harm and threatened to "kill" him. The officers were not injured and Hayes was arrested at the scene.

This is Hayes' second stint in the Nebraska Dept. of Corrections.

He served about sixth months in 2002 after being convicted of felony terroristic threats and attempted robbery. He was sentenced to serve a minimum of two years and maxi-

mum of three. He was arrested, at the age of 20, in October 2001 on a myriad of felony charges, including making terroristic threats, aiding and abetting a felony, robbery and first-degree assault. During a search of his home, officers recovered a number of weapons, stolen property and a complete meth lab. At least one handgun recovered at the time appeared to be stolen.

Gunshot fired near Dawson lands man, woman in RC Jail

An incident in which a shot was fired near Dawson the afternoon of Saturday, Oct. 4, landed a man and a woman in Richardson County Jail on felony charges.

Members of the Sheriff's Office arrested 43-year old Natalie Auxier and Joseph D. Senn Jr., 74, of Craig, MO, two miles north of Falls City, near the yard waste disposal site, at about 2:30 p.m. - some 15 minutes after being dispatched to the residence of Buckley Auxier at 71265

According to the arrest affidavits, Mr. Auxier called to report that Senn had fired a handgun at him. Sheriff Randy Houser and Deputy Jeff Frederick were dispatched to the residence and en route met Mrs. Auxier and Senn, who was driving, in a southbound Uhaul truck on Highway 73 near the pumping station.

A loaded 9-mm handgun was found inside the truck, in firing position, stuffed behind the passenger seat and covered in clothing. Jail personnel later found an unspent bullet that matched the bullets in the magazine of the collected handgun in Mrs. Auxier's personal belongings as she was being placed in a cell.

Senn Jr. was arrested on suspicion of attempted first degree assault; use of a firearm in commission of a felony; terroristic threats

and carrying a concealed weapon. Natalie Auxier was arrested for possession of a concealed weapon; being an accessory to a felony and terroristic threats.

Sgt. Lewis Barker was dispatched to the residence of Mr. Auxier to collect a fired bullet casing and collect statements from Auxier as well as alleged witnesses Ron Auxier and Shaun Robertson. All three said Senn drove the Uhaul into the driveway, exited

the vehicle and exchanged words with the three men. When Senn was told to leave the property, Natalie Auxier allegedly got out of the truck and started yelling at the three men. Senn then went to the Uhaul and retrieved the gun. The three men allege that Natalie Auxier yelled "shoot him" and Senn fired a shot in the direction of Buckley Auxier. The three men ran into the house.

Senn and Natalie Auxier then drove south. Shortly after her arrest and being placed in a jail cell, Mrs. Auxier was transported to Community Medical Center for a seizure-related medical problem. The FC Sacred Heart Irish lost a second clash of the eight-man football titans in one season Friday night in Milligan, falling to 2013 Class D1 State Champion Exeter-Milligan 46-20.

The '13 D2 Champion Irish actually led the Timberwolves 20-8 midway through the second quarter after senior Austin Malone picked off a pass and took it 44 yards back to the house.

But during that second period, FCSH senior back Sawyer Kean suffered a deep thigh bruise that sidelined him the entire second half and even beyond - Kean, who was rolling along nicely with 72 yards and a score prior to the injury, will not play this week when 1-5 Sterling comes to Jug Brown Stadium. It's Homecoming Week at Sacred Heart. The final game of the regular season is Oct. 23 at Lincoln Parkview Christian. The standout running back will return by then, if not shortly thereafter, when playoffs begin and FCSH gears up to defend its state title.

And Kean, it's quite obvious, must return with all systems go for that to occur. It's a different green machine without him, not to mention a different D2 playoff field than a year ago, one that includes the Timberwolves. In Kean's absence, Exeter-Milligan senior Kyle Jensen ran wild and E-M scored 30 unanswered points to entirely flip the game. Jensen scored the first of four touchdowns with 2:13 to play in the first half and went into intermission with 53 rushing yards. The second half was a totally different story. After taking the opening kickoff back 71 yards to give his team its second lead of the night, Jensen rushed for 172 yards and two more TDs (64, 1), running behind some flat-out behemoths (6-6, 327-pound senior Broc Mueller for starters).

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

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Six of Tigers' seven scoring drives come before 2nd snap

Falls City High senior Jack Hartman contributed to three Falls City touchdowns inside of the final four minutes of the first half, helping his team improve to 6-1 with a 48-7 win over Johnson County Central Friday night at Jug Brown Stadium. Hartman rushed for two scores and 75 yards on seven carries, passed for another two TDs and 183 yards (on four perfect attempts) and had his hand in a trio of two-point con-

Just one of FC's seven scoring drives needed a third snap from center. Read that again.

The blowout victory was FC's fourth in a row and sets up the District title game everyone knew was coming: FC at 5-2 Syracuse this

The Tigers haven't been remotely tested in victory this fall, earning its six wins by an average score of 47-9. And that doesn't tell much of a story, as the varsity has been pulled from at least half those contests and the opponents currently hold a collective record of 9-33. The one real contest for Falls City came and went in Week 3, when early turnovers doomed its chances in a 34-0 loss to still-unbeaten Ashland-Greenwood.

The same is true for the 5-2 Rockets, who entered this week's Class 1 rankings at No. 10. After starting 0-2 with losses to 4-3 Bishop Neumann (30-29) and 7-0 Ashland (28-13), Syracuse, much the same as FC, ran roughshod over Lincoln Lutheran (45-0), Wahoo (45-9), JCC (42-0), Conestoga (76-14) and Louisville (35-0). Their five-game winning streak has come against opponents with a 6-29 record. With a home game with 1-6 Conestoga wrapping up the regular season Oct. 24, Falls City's season largely boils down to this matchup with Syracuse. A loss and FC likely goes 7-2 and either misses the playoffs entirely or slips in with a No. 16 seed and gets rewarded with a first-round game at Boone Central or Norfolk Catholic. Syracuse must win to secure such a reward.

Friday's game appears to be of the four-quarter variety and that will be a new experience for the Tigers. Despite holding Ashland to just 67 total rushing yards and rolling up signficant stats of their own, the Tigers trailed 20-0 in a matter of minutes in that one. And ever since, it's been far *more* lopsided. Last week, Falls City scored all its points in the first half and scored on plays of 70, 63, 51 and 43 yards. It was 30-0 before the first quarter was over.

Senior Brenden Heckenlively struck first, streaking 70 yards for a TD with 7:37 to play in the opening period. Hartman then threw to Heckenlively to make it 8-0.

A minute later, with 3:27 remaining in the first quarter, Hartman ran 12 yards for the TD. The conversion pass from Heckenlively to Hartman was no good: 22-0.

With 40 seconds remaining in the quarter, Hartman found Stoller for a 63-yard TD and then added the two-point conversion: 30-0.

Falls City, somehow, sustained a six-play drive in the second quarter, going 84 yards on six plays. Hartman found Jeremy Waggoner for a 51-yard TD with four minutes left in the half: 36-0.

With 1:28 to play before intermission, Hartman once again ran for six, this time from the 43: 42-0.

JCC got on the board on the ensuing kickoff, as Sam Sterup returned Alessandro Bosio's kickoff 91 yards for a touchdown, giving his team six points and Falls City yet another chance to score before

The Tigers didn't waste it. With 45 seconds left on the clock, Zayne Heckenlively ran it in from the five:

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Getting the Flu Vaccine: What You Need To Know

It's getting close to that time of year again—flu season is almost here! Family Medicine, Humboldt Family Medicine, and Family Practice will again be offering flu vaccinations this year. Below are some answers to frequently answered questions, if you have a further question that is not addressed below, please do not hesitate to phone either Family Practice at 402-245-3232 or Family Medicine at 402-245-4475.

Influenza FAQ:

Who should get the flu shot, what about my children?

The CDC is recommending that all persons aged 6 months or older receive an influenza immunization this year. Children that are aged 6 months through 8 years and have never received a flu vaccination in their past will require 2 doses and should receive their first dose as soon as possible and the second dose approximately 4 weeks later. If your child has received a flu vaccination in previous years, they will not require a 2nd dose.

Who's at most risk to get the flu?

Children younger than age 5 (especially children younger than 2 years of age), Adults 65 and older, pregnant women, healthcare workers, parents of young children, childcare/school employees and people with preexisting medical conditions are at most risk to get the flu.

What strains of flu does the shot cover? I've heard before it doesn't cover the H1N1 flu virus?

We use the Quadrivalent Influenza Vaccination. This flu vaccine covers four different influenza viruses; two influenza A viruses and two influenza B viruses. The H1N1 virus is covered with the Ouadrivalent vaccination, as it is one of the two different influenza A strains included.

Why should I get the flu shot?

Although flu is common, it can be a very serious disease that can led to hospitalization and sometimes, even death (During a regular flu season, about 90 percent of deaths occur in people 65 years and older). That said, even healthy people can become ill from the flu and spread it to others. Remember-when you get a flu vaccination, you are not only protecting yourself—but your friends, family and community.

Doesn't the flu shot make you sick? I had a family member/ friend that got sick from it last

The flu vaccination is an inactivated virus. This means the flu vaccine we offer is not 'Live' and will not make you sick with influenza. It may cause mild side effects such as injection site soreness, itchy eyes, cough, low grade fever, aches and fatigue. These symptoms are rare and usually very mild.

How much does it cost?


The cost of the vaccination is \$25 this year.

that they walked on.

It all started when the ground crew at Kunming loaded the transport ship with wolframite, which, according to Gallico's article, was "an extremely heavy ore used in the making of special war steels." That stuff was heavy enough! But then, a Chinese officer asked Hartzell to transport him and two wounded comrades to India. The wounded lay on stretchers and needed more intensive emergency care in India than they would receive in China.

Hartzell swallowed the lump in his throat and remembered his schooling in America, and his sacred honor to care for his fellow human beings.

"Sure, load them up," he said. The weight of the passengers, wolframite, and gasoline totaled about 7,000 pounds, on a ship whose capacity was about 4,000. Still, Hartzell and Gray managed to get the plane off the ground.

Try as he might, though, Hartzell couldn't get the plane above 13,000 feet, in an area where the snowy mountaintops soared to 10,000 or 11,000. He was worried about the "clouds with rock centers," because he never knew when a cloud might contain the jagged,

snow-crusted peak of a mountain

But that worry was nothing compared to what happened next. When his plane broke through the overcast, a fleet of 27 Japanese bombers and 17 Zeros (fighter planes), suddenly appeared.

Three of the Zeros ripped off of the formation and headed for their prey, just as a radioman at the base down below yelled into his radio, "For Chrisake, you deadheads, get out of the sky! The Japs are over us!"

According to Gallico's article, "Hartzell and Gray hauled back on the wheel, kicked rudder, and put the big ship into the nearest thing to a slow roll that an overloaded transport is capable of, and then dove into the protecting clouds."

Hartzell expected to die any minute. The headline in his hometown paper would read, "Local Pilot Dies in Mountaintop Crash."

God must've played with the ship at that point, zig-zagging the plane through the mountains and valleys like a little boy playing with a plastic toy. Hartzell missed every snow-crusted peak. For more than an hour then, he flew the overloaded plane between the protective

walls of a river gorge. And then, he decided to do the unthinkable—to turn around and go back. Hartzell laid the plane on its side in the canyon, (aging himself about ten years in the process), and headed south again. In the silence, Hartzell yelled to his crew chief, "Get your chute on and get out!" It was almost sunset, so darkness was adding fuel to the fire. Hartzell, his co-pilot, and crew chief needed to bail.

Then Hartzell turned back and looked at the Chinamen on their stretchers. Both moaned in pain. Their faces were pinched. Their eyes were filled with dread. He looked back at his co-pilot, and both swallowed the lumps in their throats. Today was the day that each would meet his Maker. Hartzell wondered if his end would appear through the clouds, or if he would even see it coming.


