

As a model for a typical drugstore of the kind in which thousands of Americans grab a quick lunch every day, John Falter chose a favorite at 20th Street and 4th Avenue, in New York. It's a spot where Falter likes to eat when working in New York. For one reason, he knows the ordering lingo and gets fast service. If he wants a CC and J, he says so, and doesn't have to waste time saying 'cream cheese and jelly." He's not so expert at this, however, as the new waitress who came to work there one day. By noon she knew the routine thoroughly, and called out, "I've got tuna plate a pair, four draws working with the cream up, a CC and J down and a stack of black and white." The newcomer's proficiency irked the girl behind the counter, "Harry," she told the counterman, "I want two pieces of whole-wheat toast." "What?" said Harry in astonishment. "All right," said the veteran, "two down brown."




your eyes at an Open House event next Sunday afternoon. The Harkendorff's will officially drop the curtain on the new event center - located at the former USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service Office building north of Community Medical Center on Old Highway 73 (officially 3423 Barada St.) — from 1-4 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 25. As many as 400 people at a time can see the big picture for themselves. From the comforts of a chair, if they choose. The Harkendorff Event Cen-

ter - named in honor of Mark's great-great-grandfather, John Harkendorff, the first white man to settle on the Muddy back in 1854 - launched in August and has received rave reviews after hosting several events, with five more as of now scheduled before the end of the year. Currently the only private venue in the area capable of hosting large wedding receptions, they also offer the center for family reunions, and anniversary, Christmas and birthday parties, to name just a few. Elegantly adorned with chandeliers or rustic wagon wheel lighting, the center offers versatility and can be arranged to accommodate smaller private dining or meeting areas, as well.

"We have the largest decorating inventory in the area," Pam said, noting that they no longer provide rental services and work exclusively out of the Harkendorff Event Center.

and table linens. A&G Restaurant is the resident caterer and Would Eye Bar & Grill handles the bar business.

Pam, who previously offered bridal rental services as "Takes Two Bridal & Event Rentals," will lend an astute hand at decorating, as will Debbie Palmer, of "Natural Designs." There is a large hardwood dance floor, warming kitchen, and a separate stocked bar area. Waiting staff members do all the setting up and, maybe most alluring, all the cleaning up.

"Anybody who has set up or taken down after a wedding knows how much work that is," Pam said. "There are no surprises - you will see it set up and you can make your own decisions. We provide a very personal touch."

The venue is handicapped accessible and includes four restrooms. Parking is not a concern, either, as the Harkendorff's have leased land to the west from CMC to provide an additional 140 new parking stalls. Merz Farm Equipment offered parking space in the rare event of overflow and the Harkendorff's expressed their gratitude to both Merz and CMC for their help.

The false impression that the building lacks adequate space for large gatherings is perhaps an honest one for those envisioning the layout of the former conservation office, which was cordoned off and allocated to multiple small work spaces. The USDA moved its offices to East 14th Street and the

PD seeks donations for Tasers, body cameras


The Falls City Assistant Police

Chief Jamie Baker is leading an effort to raise funds and equip every officer with the newest Taser and body camera on the market, submitting grant applications and asking for donations.

No money was budgeted for Tasers or body cameras this year and FCPD officers currently share

several used Tasers, donated from other departments. These used weapons are older models and can not be repaired.

Baker said he's been pleased with the response the effort has received from the business community thus far and feels the endeavor is important, noting that Tasers are a tool officers can use other than deadly force. They also help deter cases of resisting arrest.



equipment is very costly. The estimate for 10 new tasers which would cover each officer in the department is a minimum \$12,000. Baker also hopes to raise enough funds to get the newest body cameras available. If additional funding is available, Baker said the FCPD will send an officer

to Taser Instruction School. Then he or she will be capable of certifying the other officers. Any funds raised above the necessary amount for the Tasers would be used for the purchase of body cameras for the officers.



He was always been too self-conscious to play ball in front of people, but he figured if Salvy could do it and make it look so fun, he could do it too. We love this team and the nights they have given us as we sit together as a family, with our friends cheering and laughing have been so much fun. There is nothing like October baseball and this Kansas City Royals team. Give me tickets to the K over a diamond ring any day. Superstition says a day at Kauffman during the postseason is far luckier for us and the team anyway.

Say goodbye to ConAgra, but don't lament the departure

ConAgra Foods has announced it will move its corporate headquarters from Omaha to Chicago and cut at least 1,000 jobs in Omaha. The company was lured to Illinois by tax credits it will receive if it creates 150 new jobs and promises to keep them there for 15 years.

Wait, what? Does that sound familiar to anyone? Does that sound like the package that Nebraska offered to the company back in 1987 under the guise of Legislative Bill 775? Yes, it IS déjà vu all

over again. Let's review. Kay Orr was just a few weeks into her first (and last) term as Ne-

braska Governor when ConAgra CEO Mike Harper huffed and puffed and said the company would leave the state if it didn't receive tax breaks. The Omaha economy was in a funk and Governor Orr said she thought the tax break package eventually offered to ConAgra was going to boost the economy of the whole state. Most agree that the city and the state paid a pretty high price in

To her credit, Mrs. Orr admitted some years later that Harper had bullied the state to get what he wanted. The whole thing cost her a second term as governor. But she still thinks that the forever controversial business incentive package was the signature issue of her administration and the right thing to do. It kept companies in Nebraska and lured a few in. Harper's threats soured the public and painted Orr into a corner that she never escaped.

The ConAgra thing also cost Omaha six blocks of history because Harper said he didn't like the historic red brick buildings of Jobbers Canyon - a district on the National Register of Historic Places and the largest such historic district to ever be demolished. It wiped out the potential development of warehouse buildings that would double the size of today's Old Market district with businesses and loft apartments. It was the historic area where goods were distributed by rail to the West. Harper wanted a suburban type campus – the one now being vacated – along the riverfront.

Even though the tax policy led to the Governor being booed at home football games and caused groups of preservationists to march in downtown Omaha to protest the demolition, many said the city of Omaha was willing to pay to situate a major employer downtown with all the promised jobs and spin-off development.

Well, it was great for 25 years Omaha. Hope you enjoyed it. Because ConAgra's new CEO lives in Chicago and apparently thinks it will be easier to bring the company to Illinois than to move to Nebraska. And yes, another governor of another state has been lured into believing that offering tax breaks – despite a statewide freeze on tax breaks for everyone else - will somehow bolster the state's economy.

Illinois Governor Bruce Rauner says ConAgra will still benefit from the Economic Development for a Growing Economy (EDGE) program because the breaks were offered prior to the freeze. Meanwhile, back in Omaha,

Creighton University economist Ernie Goss thinks the ConAgra deal could push the Illinois economy over the edge. "Omaha and Nebraska have their fiscal house in order. Chicago and Illinois have a fiscal house that's on fire," he said. He said the move is suboptimal for all but the senior management. The city and state are impending fiscal disasters due – in large part – to special deals like the one just offered to ConAgra.

Mayor Omaha

Jean Stothert says there is already interest in developing the vacant ConAgra property. While that sounds good, the ConAgra buildings are 25-year-old buildings that probably won't last another 25 years. They can't compare to the buildings of Jobbers Canyon, which were four- to six-story, masonry structures, built strong in the late 1800s and early 1900s to serve their warehouse and lightindustry functions.

But, let's all rejoice that Con-Agra has managed to slip away without costing Omaha or the state any further incentives. Such a move would have meant more taxpayer liability for the locals and more corporate welfare for a Fortune 500 company.



Free Speech Week


The importance of free speech and the First Amendment is being celebrated this week by media organizations, schools, universities and community groups throughout the nation.

Nemaha United Methodist Church celebrating 125 years

The Nemaha United Methodist Church will celebrate 125 years of worship on Oct. 25. The church was started as a small group of people in 1886. As membership grew they began to hold regular services in Hoovers Opera House. They finally raised enough money to finance the construction of the church.

On Oct. 20, 1890 the cornerstone for the new church was laid. Bricks for the church were obtained from the kiln, which was in operation then in Nemaha. After a few months the structure was completed, and still serves the community today. In the cornerstone was embedded a holy bible, and record of church officers.

The church was named the Hortense Ritter Memorial M.E. Church, in honor of the woman who contributed so generously to its construction.

A parsonage was built to then north of the church eight years after the church was completed. In 1928 a kitchen was added on to the back of the church. In 1950 members joined together to complete a \$2,000

improvement project. The kitchen was equipped with new fixtures and cabinets, new oak sliding doors were installed between the sanctuary and the kitchen. (The doors are in memory of F.L. Woodard and Fay & Barton Kerker). A new light was installed over the picture of Christ. (The light is in memory of Mrs. Albert Allen and Donna Marie Anderson). The original oak pews were sanded and refinished, and the church choir contributed new carpeting. The parsonage was torn down in 1991, to make way for 28x40 fellowship hall that was added in 1992.

There will be a worship service at 11 a.m. Sunday, Oct. 25; with special music by "The Belles A Peeling." At 1 p.m., lunch (roast beef sandwich, coleslaw, baked beans, chips, dessert, iced tea/water) will be served (free will offering). At 2:30, the "Quartet" will perform in the Sanctuary. There will also be displays of memorabilia and a silent auction. The community is encouraged to attend the celebrations.



This test will consist of the sounding of sirens located in Nemaha and Richardson Counties, within the 10-mile radius of Cooper Nuclear Station. The sirens will sound for approximately three minutes. No action by members of the public is required for this test.



Fall is good time to sample fields for SCN

As soybean harvest is completed this fall, you may want to consider getting your fields sampled for soybean cyst nematode if you have never sampled them or if it has been a while. We have been emphasizing the importance of sampling your fields for SCN the past several years. Loren Giesler, UNL Extension Plant Pathologist and John Wilson, Extension Educator have shared at several field days that soybean cyst nematode is the most important pest of soybean in the world. It can reduce soybean yields 30% without showing any visible symptoms. It can cause significant yield loss if not kept under control. It has been moving west from the Missouri River. This pest has been identified as a common problem in Missouri and Iowa and it is being identified in more fields each year in Nebraska as well. Every county that borders the Missouri River in Nebraska is infected with SCN. Soybean cyst nematodes live in the soil and once they infest your soil, you will have them forever. Most of the soybean growing regions of the United States are infested with SCN.

The disease sudden death syndrome (SDS) has been showing up more in southeast Nebraska recently. If you have this disease, it is a good idea to test for SCN as well. There is a very close relationship between SDS and SCN. Sudden Death Syndrome is commonly found fields that have SCN. So if you have one, there is a good chance you have the other.

UNL Extension and the Nebraska Soybean Board have a program that will pay for a soil analysis for SCN. If you are interested in sampling some fields, UNL Extension in Nemaha County has instructions



on sampling for SCN, a soil probe available for use, and sample bags in our office. I am also available to sample fields in southeast Nebraska this fall. Feel free to call (402) 274-4755 or stop by our office in the Nemaha County courthouse in Auburn if you are interested in participating in this program. So if you sample your fields, what should you do if you find SCN? Soybean cyst nematodes can be controlled by best management practices and their impact on soybean production will be reduced significantly. If you do have SCN, plant a resistant variety, rotate to non-host crops, such as corn and wheat, and plant soybean varieties with different sources of resistance. You may want to consider planting these fields last and/or cleaning any tillage or planting equipment before moving on to a different field. Check with your seed dealer to determine the best soybean varieties to meet the requirements of resistance for SCN.


Nearly 169,000 Nebraskans signed death penalty petition


Secretary of State John Gale announced today that county election officials have completed their task of approving or rejecting nearly 169,000 petition signatures submitted as part of the petition drive to repeal LB 268 and reinstate the death penalty. County certifications have been received by the Secretary of State within the 40 days allowed by law.

"Having totaled the valid signatures and determining that the constitutional and statutory requirements have been met, we are confirming with petition sponsors that both goals of their petition referendum have been achieved," Gale said.

The 2016 general election ballot will allow Nebraska voters to decide if a legislatively-approved law abolishing the death penalty is repealed or retained. In addition, enough signatures have been collected to stay the effective date of LB 268 until voters decide the issue. At least 56,942 signatures were required to add the petition referendum to the ballot.



Box 310, Auburn, NE 68305 or call (402) 274-4354. The office is located at 919 - 16th Street in Auburn. ESU 4 has a home page at www.esu4.org.

During the school year, ESU 4 provided, at a minimum, the following mandated and requested services: Technology and Media services, including internet connectivity and distance learning opportunities and support, media and software library services and support. Special Education services including, but not limited to: speech-language pathology, psychology, behavioral intervention and audiology services. Also, early childhood and learning disabled services and special education administrative services. The service unit has a certified nursing staff that works with staff, parents and students regarding health issues. Professional Development services include, but are not limited to: curriculum, instruction, standards/assessment planning and development, school improvement assistance and State and Federal grant projects. ESU 4 also contracts with the State of Nebraska to provide administrative, support, and educational services for the Nebraska Center for the Education of Children Who Are Blind or Visually Impaired (NCECBVI) located in Nebraska City, NE. Several ESU 4 employees have worked and work as representatives on statewide and nationwide assignments. ESU 4 also chose to take advantage of a law, whereby insurance costs for the unit can be taken from the budget. This plan has allowed ESU 4 to get cash buildup as well as a new building for the children's special education needs. A new building was built on the site the board purchased several years ago for this purpose. ESU 4 students and staff moved into the building and began classes in January 2009. Our students love the new facility. Teachers, para-educators and parents love the building as well. The ESU 4 Learning Center is located at 1109 R Street, Auburn, Nebraska. During 2011-2012, ESU 4 & ESU 6 agreed to provide data services to each district served by these two service units. The Digital Virtual Learning Group serves 26 school districts. The school districts are able to work together in providing services, purchasing technology and have a better utilization of technology.



Protect your eyes and health from harmful "blue light"

(StatePoint) You already know to protect your eyes from harmful UV-light when you are outdoors. But did you know that another dangerous light emission is all around us -- in our homes, our workplaces and in the palms of our hands?

New research is illuminating the dangers of blue light, a high-energy wavelength of light emitted by smartphones, tablets, laptops, LCD flat panel monitors and energy efficient light sources. The majority of the public spends more than half their waking hours exposed to this light, which can contribute to eye strain and fatigue, macular degeneration and sleep disruption.

"Ten years is a blink of an eye in terms of human history, but will the last 10 years come to be known as the period that changed our vision and health?" wonders Dr. Gary Morgan a VSP Vision Care optometrist.

A whopping 83 percent of VSP eye care professionals reported seeing an increase in symptoms attributable to blue light exposure in their patients, according to a recent survey by VSP.

One of those symptoms is eye strain: blue light is myopically defocused in front of the retina, which results in light scatter that we perceive as glare. Working in a highglare environment causes the eyes to work overtime, leading to visual fatigue and strain.

But the impact of blue light doesn't stop there: major university studies have shown that the light can disrupt sleep, interfering with circadian rhythms by suppressing the production of melatonin, a hormone that regulates waking and sleeping. Chronically shifted circadian rhythms have been linked to breast cancer, prostate cancer, diabetes, heart disease and obesity.

Children are especially vulnerable to macular damage. Just as most ultraviolet exposure occurs before 18 years of age, the effects of blue light exposure are also more intense in children, since they hold devices in very close proximity to their eyes and are amongst the most active users of blue light sources.

"In today's world, children are looking at screens at home and increasingly also in the classroom," says Morgan. "There is a growing concern among eye doctors that we're going to start seeing longterm damage much earlier in life than ever before."

While it would be virtually impossible to escape blue light, as most people rely on it to live, work and play (and it is even emitted from the sun), there are steps you can take to protect yourself. Try to decrease blue light exposure throughout the day, and especially in the evenings. Before bedtime, curl up with a good book instead of your smartphone. Wear protective eyewear at the office or at home when using your digital devices.

New lens enhancements for eyeglasses, such as Sharper Image TechShield, can provide a unique defense by absorbing and deflecting incoming blue light to help safeguard the wearer against exposure.

Omaha couldn't hold Houdini either

In September 1923 noted escape artist Harry Houdini (born Erik Weisz in Hungary) came to Omaha to perform at the Orpheum Theater. While in town, Houdini also demonstrated his well-known ability to escape from a strait jacket in front of a large crowd at the Omaha World-Herald building on Sept. 5. Houdini often conducted his thrilling exhibitions at newspaper buildings, thus insuring plenty of publicity. The World-Herald announced the pending event under the headline, "Houdini Prepared If Anything Goes Amiss," and later published a description of the proceedings.

In the article that preceded Houdini's attempt to escape from a strait jacket while dangling above the crowd, the artist was reported to be optimistic. "I have never been held in my life," he said. "They say they can hold me. We'll see." While Houdini did not expect trouble, he was prepared for the worst. "My grave is ready in a Brooklyn cemetery. I have a bronze bust already made. The letters my mother sent me before her death ten years ago have been saved and will be used as a pillow for my body." Just in case something went wrong, a fire department ladder would be standing by during the exhibition to rescue Houdini if need be.

On Sept. 6, the World-Herald ran a photograph of Houdini being hoisted into the air and announced, "Houdini did it!" More than ten thousand people looked on as Omaha police officers Danbaum and Slezewski secured the artist in the strait jacket, "pulling and hauling at the straps until their faces grew red and streamed perspiration." Then Houdini was hoisted by ropes and suspended head down from the east side of the World-Herald building. He gave a few "spasmodic jerks" and the trick was over in slightly less than two minutes. First Houdini "worked loose his arms, encased in leather sheaths and pulled by straps, until they hugged his body. Then, throwing arm loops up over one foot, he tugged and wriggled until the jacket slipped over his head." Officer Danbaum expressed the crowd's sentiments when he sputtered, "Well I'll be darned!" The article went on to note that the intensity of Houdini's exertions resulted in a brief bout of faintness after he was lowered to the ground. Liberating himself from a strait jacket was not as difficult as some of his other stunts, he said, but it required great muscular strength as well as "knowing how."

During his residency at the Orpheum, Houdini performed other escapes, such as from a tank of water in which he had been lowered headfirst with his feet locked in the






