Brief agenda for City Council

Falls City Council members addressed a brief agenda when they met Monday, Oct. 15, in Council Chambers at City Hall.

Rod Vandeberg and Tony Brunette were appointed to the Citizen Advisory Review Committee and Ricky Lee Banks was appointed to the Falls City Volunteer Fire Department.

A public hearing was held on a request for a Class I liquor license for La Fiesta Mexican Restaurant at 1516 Stone. No one from the public commented and the council voted in favor of the license.

The bid submitted by James Hersh for the demolition at 721 East 10th Street in the amount of \$5,290 was accepted.

Rick Lemerond appeared before the council to note his intention to extensively remodel the property at 1502 Harlan and create a neighborhood bar that will feature games and a place for adults to go to relax. Food would not be served. Lemerond said he wanted to make sure the development met with council approval before making the substantial investment. No action was required.

A special designated liquor license for Lemerond for an Oct. 26 event at the Grand Weaver Hotel was granted.

Council members tabled action on a request from City Attorney Doug Merz and Deputy Falls City Attorney Bob Meyer (Weaver & Merz) to increase fees to \$120 per hour (plus reimbursement of expenses) for legal work for the city. Weaver & Merz staff time would not be charged.

The council moved into executive session to discuss personnel before returning to regular session and adjourning.

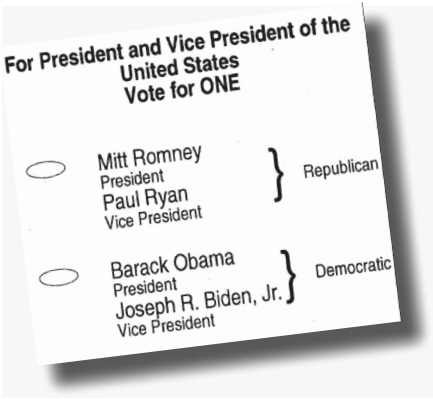

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Joy leads Stella, a community on the move

Of the villages in Richardson County, Stella is one that is moving forward. Credit a progressive Village Board that is led by Chairman Jerry Joy, who is in a tight race for the First District seat in Nebraska's Unicameral.

Joy hosted a "meet and greet" event at Falls City's Grand Weaver Hotel on Thursday evening and talked with a Journal reporter. The Journal previously endorsed Mr. Joy for the seat in the Nebraska Legislature.

Evidence of Joy's leadership is no farther away than the former Southeast Consolidated School building. When the school closed, patrons wondered what would become of it. The relatively new structure is a prime piece of real estate — a home just waiting for a new occupant.

Kevin Gardner of Nebraska City and Steve Bantz of Stella purchased the building and then started looking for prospects. Enter Joy, who, according to Gardner, "worked behind the scenes" to find business opportunities and jobs at the former school. Joy asserted a "huge influence" in finding economic development opportunities at the school building in Stella, Gardner said.

"Stella is moving," Joy said

Thursday evening. "Our biggest effort has been to promote the school and its potential." Mission accomplished.

The Nebraska Public Power District's Cooper Nuclear Station recently completed a drywell mock-up at the school and uses it for training purposes.

A public open house was held Sept. 6 to show off the mock-up, a 1-to-1 representation of a quarter section of the plant's drywell, the section housing the reactor. The actual drywell is only accessible when the plant

Monsato Fund grants FCPS \$25,000 for tech

Students are more engaged and focused on their lessons when participating in hands-on projects, according to Scholastic. Thanks to the support of local farmers and America's Farmers Grow Rural Education, Falls City Public Schools received a \$25,000 grant to purchase technology for the TAKES AIM (Technology and Agriculture Keep Expanding Student Ability and Interest in Math) project, which will offer high school students hands-on learning in math classes through the use of iPads and GPS's.

America's Farmers Grow Rural Education, sponsored by the Monsanto Fund, gives farmers the opportunity to nominate a public school district in their community to compete for a grant of either \$10,000 or \$25,000 to enhance education in the areas of math and/or science. More than 1,000 nominated school districts submitted applications. The Monsanto Fund will invest \$2.3 million into rural education through this program.

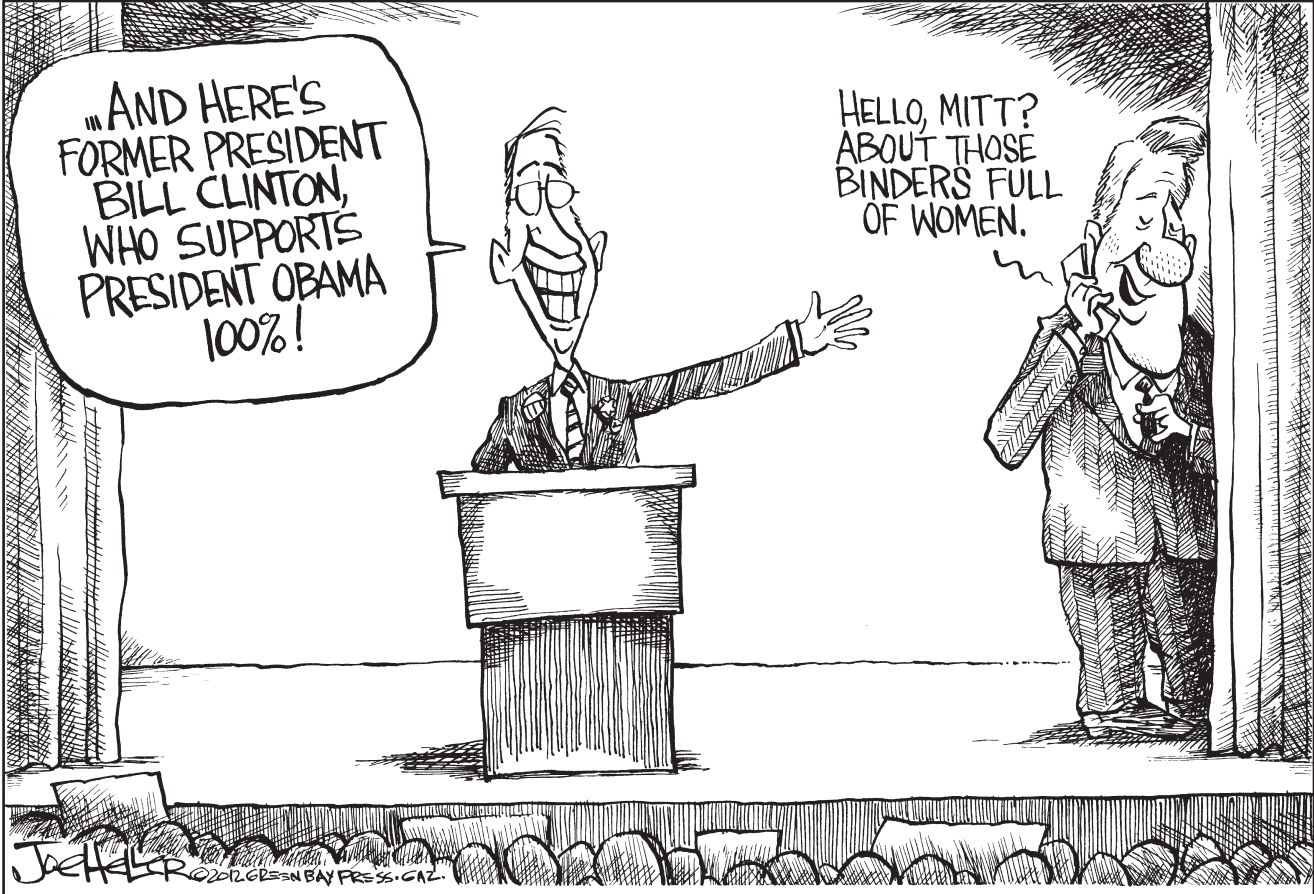

Turnback tax in news again: Why do we care?

City fathers in Lincoln hope to use some state sales tax proceeds to help pay off the Pinnacle Bank Arena that is being built in the historic Haymarket area downtown.

Under provisions of the Nebraska Convention Center Facility Financing Assistance Act, a state panel will be asked to allow the city to use 70 percent of the state sales tax from the arena and surrounding hotels for up to 25 years. The measure will likely be approved because the precedent has been set more than a decade ago by allowing the arena then known as the Qwest Center to use a similar financing arrangement. And a couple years ago, lawmakers changed the wording of the act to allow Ralston to construct and begin to pay for an indoor ice rink that is also used for other events.

The Convention Center Facility Financing Assistance Act provides a mechanism for using sales tax revenue to fund the construction or enhancement of certain facilities. Sales tax revenue generated by a qualifying facility — and by retailers within a specified vicinity — is “turned back” to assist in paying down the debt incurred to develop and build the facility.

Retailers located within 600 yards of an eligible facility will be subject to the turnback formula. Any increase in sales tax revenue from retailers that existed 24 months prior to the facility’s completion and all sales tax revenue collected by retailers that began operation up to 24 months prior to, or 24 months after completion of the facility, can be used for the turnback provision.

So why should folks in Greater Nebraska care? The Local, Civic, Cultural and Convention Center Funding Act was offered by state senators from Omaha as a perk to rural lawmakers to get them to support construction of the facility in Nebraska’s largest city. The remaining 30 percent of the funds are earmarked for statewide projects ranging from a meeting hall and library in Tobias (in southeast Nebraska), to improvements to the Community Hall in Miller (in Central Nebraska) and a new community center in Arnold (in Nebraska’s Sand Hills). The leftover 30 percent from Lincoln will also go into the pool of statewide funds.

More than 30 projects, including improvements to the Gering Civic Center (in Nebraska’s Panhandle), have been funded since 2004 from that 30 percent cut from funds generated by the Qwest (now Century Link) Center and the nearby hotels. With that facility paid off, the 70 percent share in Omaha is used for other Omaha projects with a stipulation that at least 10 percent go for programs or facilities in high poverty and high crime rate areas of the city.

State Sen. Brad Ashford of Omaha helped fashion the original turnback tax law a decade ago after visiting communities across the state. He noted that people had pride in their towns and their community buildings, but improvements were too expensive. He said the initial idea always was to include assisting other Nebraska towns with their community centers along with helping the Qwest Center pay its debts.

Ashford says it means a lot that his colleagues in the Legislature from Omaha and the rest of the state are tied together through this 30 percent fund. He says it was a real effort to capture the spirit of what made

Nebraska “Nebraska.”

The state Department of Revenue says that in Omaha, the turnback tax generates about \$3 million a year; in Lincoln it’s expected to bring in about \$1.5 million annually, which would be used to make payments on about \$24 million in debt issued by the city. Omaha voters approved a \$198 million bond to build the Qwest Center.

The turnback grants recently funded 25 smaller projects in Omaha that would either showcase important historical aspects of those areas, or assist with the reduction of street or gang violence in the target area. When the Lincoln arena is paid for, it’s assumed that the funds will be used for similar purposes in the Capital City.

Since 2004, when the Heartland Events Center in Grand Island was

the first recipient of turnback tax funds, the following communities have also benefitted: Kimball, Hastings, Arnold, Miller, Stuart, David City, Maywood, Gering, Humphrey, Papillion, South Sioux City, Atkinson, Creston, Bancroft, Firth, Kenard, Randolph, Tobias, Tekamah, Brownville, Cairo, Fremont, Odell, Beaver City, Blue Hill, Dannebrog and Stapleton.

In good times and bad, these mini-Qwest Centers help attract people to communities and enhance the local quality of life. After 9/11, people were sticking closer together and rallying around the things they had. That’s why these community buildings are so important. It’s the benefit soup supper, the Christmas program, the wedding reception — the very real pieces of our lives.

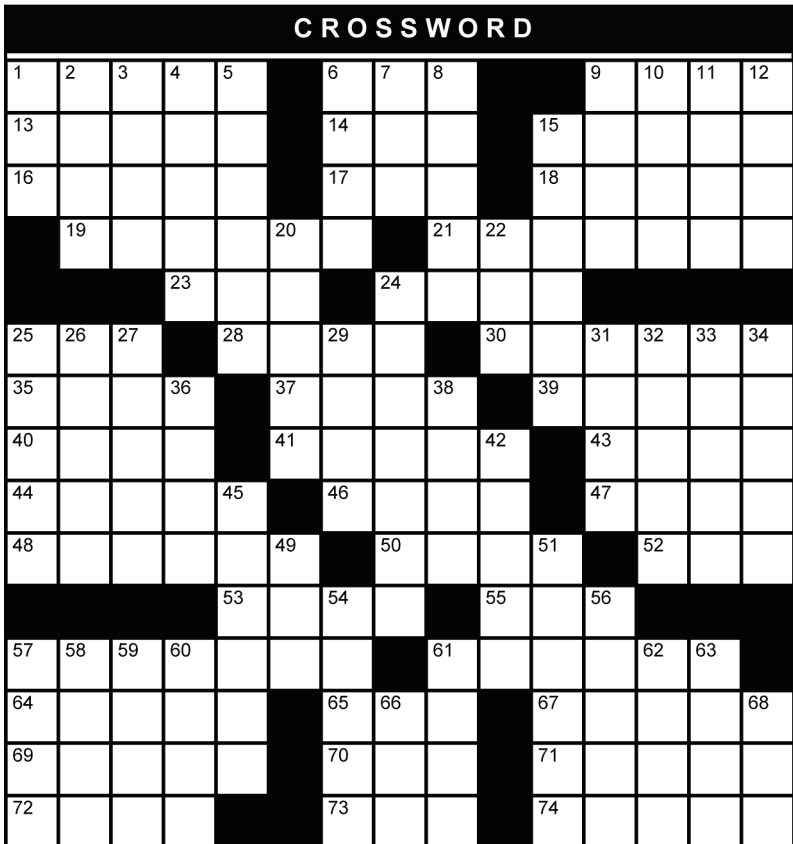

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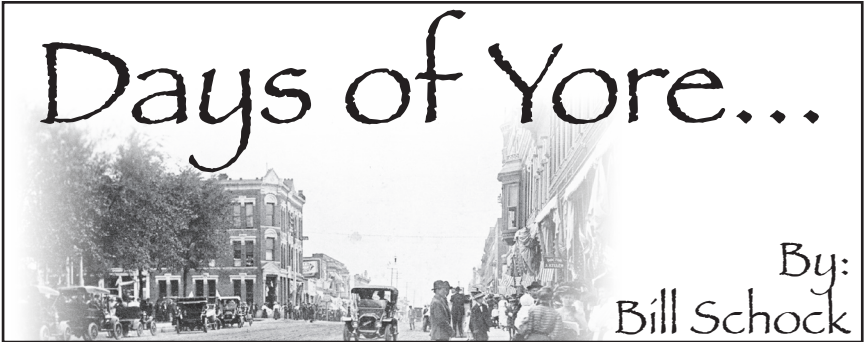

is in an outage, so the mock-up provides an excellent training opportunity.

According to NPPD Cooper, the mock-up was built to allow crews to safely rehearse work activities scheduled for the October refueling outage. This is complex work on a very large scale.

Gardner said radiation protection programs are also offered at the school, with jobs virtually guaranteed after completion. “Jerry was responsible for that, too,” Gardner said, citing his background in education.

Other programs are in the works, Gardner said, and Joy has played a role in all of them.

Gardner formerly worked at the Cooper Station, where his wife is still employed.

More is happening in Stella than at the former school, although that is a big, big plus. Joy and the Village Board have obtained \$128,000 in funding through SENDD to refurbish four homes in Stella. He and his wife, Chris, are also involved in the Stella Main Street program.

During the hot summer months, Joy has (and continues to) visited most every farm in Pawnee, Johnson, Nemaha, Otoe and Richardson counties. “I’ve heard 80 to 100 people say this is the first time a political candidate has come to their home,” he said.

It’s been a learning experience, Joy said. “I’ve learned so much about the district, property taxes and valuations,” he said.

Joy and his opponent, Dan Watermeier of Syracuse, are profiled in the “Local” section of today’s Lincoln Journal Star. The Journal will have additional coverage of Joy in next week’s edition.

project, students will go on field trips to area farms and determine the volume and weight of a grain truck, figure land grades, or estimate fencing materials needed by measuring the perimeter of a cattle pen ,” said Tim Heckenlively, Falls City Public Schools superintendent. “As a result of the project, students will become more engaged and interested in math because they will take part in activities that use math to solve everyday problems.”

After being nominated by local farmers, school districts completed an online application, and finalists were chosen by math and science teachers from ineligible school districts. The America’s Farmers Grow Rural Education Advisory Council, a group of 26 prominent farmers

from across the country, then reviewed the finalists’ applications and selected the winners.

“We would like to thank the nominating farmers for making the TAKES AIM project avail-

able for our students,” Heckenlively said. “We envision that this project’s partnership with the local agricultural industry will enrich the entire community.”

Falls City Public Schools was presented with the \$25,000 grant at halftime of its big win over Lincoln Christian Friday.

America’s Farmers Grow Rural Education started with a successful pilot in Illinois and Minnesota in 2011, in which farmers were given the opportunity to nominate a public school district in 165 eligible counties in those two states. The Monsanto Fund awarded more than \$266,000 to local schools in 16 CRDs. Now, the program has

expanded to 1,245 eligible counties in 39 states.

America’s Farmers Grow Rural Education helps farmers positively impact their communities and supports local rural school districts. This program is part of the Monsanto Fund’s overall effort to support rural education and communities. Another program that is part of

Tiger senior Cord Huettner rushed his way into the record books Friday night in Falls City High's 35-28 district title claiming victory over Lincoln Christian at Jug Brown Stadium.

Huettner carried the ball 28 times for 122 yards and two touchdowns to go along with 4-for-6 passing for 81 yards and another score and now sits atop the all-time career rushing list with 2,313 career yards, passing Dan Werner (2,191 yards, 2005-06) and Dakota Schulenberg (2,256 yards, 2007-09).

"The thing that really sticks out in my mind is his willingness to do whatever it takes to win," said first year FCHS head coach Darin Fritz. "There were some games this season that teams keyed on him so much he turned into a lead blocker. At the end of the game, the only statistic he is worried about is the final score. It's always a pleasure to coach a player like that. And from a leadership standpoint, what more could you want in a player?"

Falls City (6-2), winners of six straight and ranked No. 10 in yesterday's Omaha World Herald, rallied twice Friday night to hold off Lincoln Christian and capture the district championship. FC will host Boys Town (5-3) Thursday at 7 p.m. in the first round of the Class C1 state playoffs.

Huettner definitely didn't do it on his own Friday. Falls City and Lincoln Christian ex-

changed blows from the first whistle to the last, but ultimately the Tigers made the most plays.

None of which were bigger than sophomore running back Jordy Stoller's game-tying touchdown run at the beginning of the second quarter. The Tigers, after taking over at their own 20-yard line with 2:09 to go in the first quarter, were looking at a third down and four when Huettner found senior Codie Witt for a 51-yard gain that put the Tigers in the Lincoln Christian red zone. Huettner would then score on a 10-yard run, but because of a rarely seen offensive face mask penalty, the points were taken off the board and the Tigers were forced to try and overcome a 4th and goal from the LC 19-yard line.

Cue Stoller, who scored on a similar down and distance in the homecoming win over Lincoln Lutheran. Coach Fritz dialed up a reverse and the shifty Stoller went around the left end, made a couple defenders miss and willed his way into the end zone for a game-changing touchdown.

"At that point in the game they were still really flowing with Cord and we thought we might be able to get them with misdirection," Coach Fritz said of the play call.

"Jordy has really deceptive power for his size, he doesn't really give you a clear shot at his body and he can run through most arm tackles. The offensive line got him to the second level and his guts got him in the end zone."

Senior Brandt Vice tackled

at 7-7 and flip the momentum in Falls City’s favor.

A three-and-out by LC, followed by a bad punt, set up another Tiger touchdown drive highlighted by a perfectly executed “swinging gate” play where Cord Huettner and snapper (center) Reese Hogue were flanked by one receiver to their left and eight to their right. On second and nine from the LC 12-yard line, Huettner took the snap and headed left past confused LC defenders and reached the end zone to put FC ahead 13-7. Vice would add another extra point and the Tigers would never trail LC again.

“We kind of thought we would get a little mileage out of it (the swinging gate),” Fritz said. “They really were not high risk plays for our offense, so our level of confidence was pretty high.”

added the extra point and the two teams were nodded up 14-14 at the half.

The third quarter belonged

to the Tigers, though. Falls City held the Crusaders to a three-and-out to start the half and then marched right down the field chewing up yards and clock before junior Mitchell Harling found senior Jesse Butrick for a 14-yard touchdown pass. The drive measured 11 plays, 61 yards, more than seven minutes and more importantly had Lincoln Christian’s players gassed. Falls City would add another touchdown in the third when Huettner found Codie Witt for a great 28-yard pass-and-catch in the back of the south end zone to put the Tigers ahead 28-14.

As good teams do, though, LC bounced back and did so quickly. LC running back Ben Plambeck, who finished with 18 carries and 119 yards, took a hand off left, found daylight and scampered 31 yards for a touchdown to bring his team within seven.

On FC’s subsequent drive, the Tigers would convert on two crucial third downs – a six-yard run from their own 39-yard line by Harling and a 25-yard pass from Huettner to Stoller – to help set up a final, nail-in-the-coffin touchdown by Huettner with 5:01 left in the game. For the game, FC was 9 of 14 on third down.

The Crusaders added a late touchdown to keep it interesting, but failed to recover an onside-kick and the Tigers took knees to run out the clock.

Falls City out-gained LC

421 to 289 and held the heralded Crusaders passing attack to 5-of-18 for just 54 yards.

“To me it is really a testament to what a special team this really is,” said Coach Fritz. “The work ethic has been there since day one, and after an 0-2 start it never diminished.”

The Tigers now turn their focus to a very athletic Boys Town team. The Cowboys, a

perennial power, come to Falls City Thursday with five wins and three losses, but the losses are to three 7-1 teams: Wahoo, Pierce and Fort Calhoun. Boys Town moved back to Class C1 this season after spending the previous two in class B.

They are battle-tested and will definitely hold an edge over Falls City, as far as post-season experience goes. A year ago, the Cowboys fell to eventual state runner-up Elkhorn in the Class B quarterfinals.

Falls City last hosted a play-off game in 2007 when Columbus Scotus came to town and escaped with a 28-27 overtime victory over the Tigers, who still have yet to win a football play-off game.

The Irish, who capped off their first undefeated regular season since the fall of 2001,



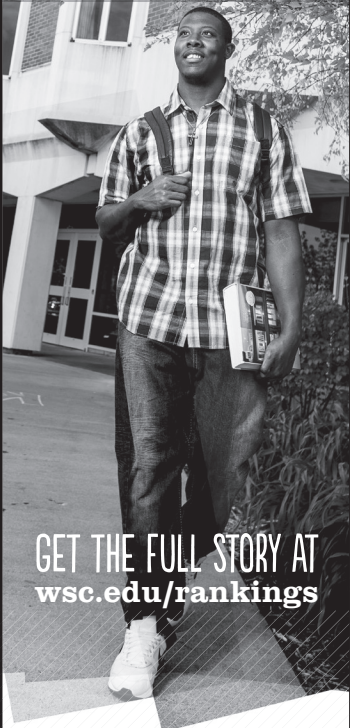

"This year's candidates truly embody the National Football Foundation's mission of building leaders through football," said NFF chairman Archie Manning, whose sons, Peyton (1997 Campbell Trophy winner) and Eli were named NFF National Scholar-Athletes in 1997 and 2003, respectively. "They are standouts in the classroom and on the field and have become leaders in their respective communities. Each school should take great pride in being represented by such well-rounded young men who will undoubtedly go on to do great things in life."

The individuals are nominated by their schools and each school is limited to one nominee each. Candidates must be seniors or graduate students in their final year of eligibility. They also must have a GPA of at least 3.2 on a 4.0 scale, have outstanding football ability and have demonstrated strong leadership and citizenship.

The class is selected each year by the NFF Awards Committee, which is comprised of a nationally-recognized group of media, College Football Hall of Famers and athletics administrators.

The NFF will select up to 16 recipients and the results will be announced on Oct. 25. Each recipient will receive an \$18,000 postgraduate scholarship and they will vie as finalist for the Campbell Trophy.

The award is named in honor of Bill Campbell, the chairman of Intuit, former player and head coach at Columbia University and the 2004 recipient of the NFF's Gold Medal. The award comes with a 25-pound bronze trophy and increases the amount of the recipient's grant by \$7,000 for a total post-graduate scholarship of \$25,000.

Former recipients of the Campbell Trophy include Nebraska's Rob Zatechka in 1994, Kyle Vanden Bosch in 1999 and Florida's Tim Tebow in 2009. Nebraska's nominee this year is Rex Burkhead.

Bruhn is a four-year letter winner at North Dakota State, including their 2011 National Championship season. He graduated from Beatrice High School in 2008.

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Phrenology: Science or entertainment?

Nebraska State Historical Society

Phrenology was a popular nineteenth-century pseudoscience that claimed a person's personality and intellect could be determined by studying the shape of the skull. It was based on the theory that the brain was divided into various organs (areas) that controlled specific elements of character.

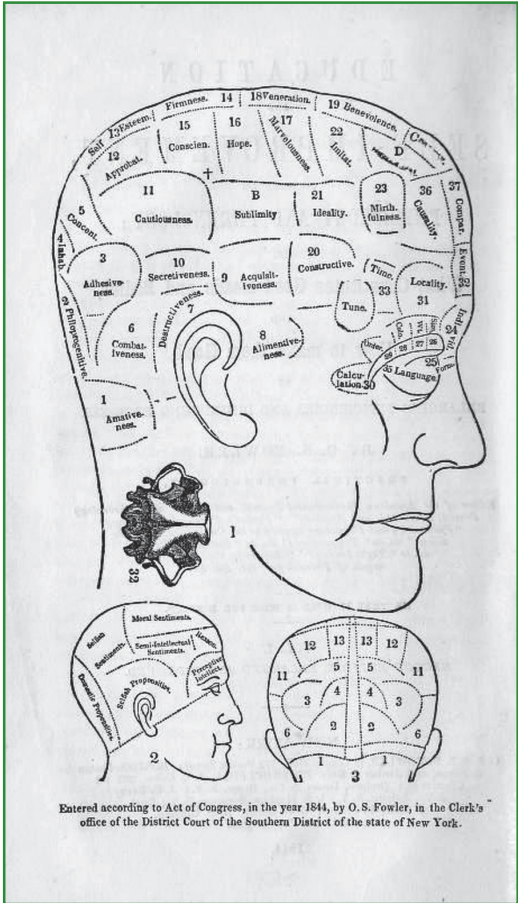
Despite its shaky scientific foundations, interest in phrenology was apparent here shortly after Nebraska became a state. The national Phrenological Journal and Life Illustrated in March 1870 reported: “For the encouragement of our co-laborers elsewhere [sic], we are enabled to ‘report progress’ for our cause in the fertile West. A new society has been organized in the young State of Nebraska, whose ‘constitution’ we herewith submit and commend. We copy it from a newspaper entitled The Orchard and the Vineyard, published in Peru, Nebraska.”

The Nebraska Phrenological Society, according to its published constitution, had for its purpose “the advancement of the science of Phrenology, and the promotion of intercourse among phrenologists, by meetings for the reading of papers, the exhibition of casts, busts, and other illustrative specimens, and by discussions and investigations, to point out the importance of phrenology as the true philosophy of mind, and its several applications in education, self-improvement, jurisprudence, and medicine, to correct misrepresentations respecting the science, and to awaken a more extended and lively interest in its cultivation.” James Pettit was president and B. L. Easley was secretary.

For the next several decades notices of phrenological lectures and lecturers appeared in the columns of Nebraska newspapers. Such events were considered educational as well as entertaining, with the speakers often conducting onstage examinations and consultations. The Omaha Daily Bee reported on January 10, 1882, the upcoming lecture of nationally known O. S. Fowler at the Academy of Music in Omaha. Fowler planned to speak on phrenology, “Health, Self-Culture, Memory, Success, Marriage, Rearing Children, etc.,” with consultations offered “as to your own children’s talents, best business, health management etc.”

As the nineteenth century wore on, however, and scientific knowledge advanced, phrenology was increasingly regarded as a fraud. The Daily Bee on April 17, 1888, remarked: “Two phrenological lecturers are examining bumps in the northwestern part of the state. An examination of their own craniums failed to reveal the possession of either brains or aptitude.” The belief that bumps and indentations of the skull were able to predict personality traits was largely abandoned after the turn of the century although a few still believe in its usefulness.

FC Library programs to address marketing local food

For those of you who are currently involved with value-added type agricultural enterprises or are interested in learning more about marketing these types of products, there will be a series of four programs scheduled for the Falls City Library and Arts Center at 1400 Stone St. this fall.

The meetings will be in the evenings of Nov. 8, 15, 20 and 27 and will be from 5:30-6:30 p.m. Cost of these programs is \$5 per person or \$15 for all four sessions.

The programs' primary focus is on marketing local food and value-added products through CSA's (Community Supported Agriculture) or Farmer's markets. On Thursday, Nov. 8, Gary Lesoing, Extension Educator from Nemaha County will discuss the differences between selling organic and/or conventional products at Farmer's Markets, who are the customers for these products, how much to charge, selling other products, such as: meat, milk, honey, eggs and baked products and what is the best marketing strategy.

On Thursday, Nov. 15, Gary will discuss Community Supported Agriculture. He will explain what are CSA's and the general principles that are followed in CSA's. Discussion will focus on: planning a CSA and finding clients, pros and cons of CSA's,

pricing, responsibility in a natural disaster, other products, such as: meat, eggs, honey, flowers and baked goods in a CSA, and best strategies for marketing.

On Tuesday, Nov. 20, Vaughn Hammond, Extension Educator at the Kimmel Education and Research Center will give a presentation about GAPs (Good Agricultural Practices) and what they are and what they mean to you as a producer.

The final program will be on Tuesday, Nov. 27, and Vaughn will discuss vending opportunities besides CSA's and Farmer's Markets. Some potential other vending opportunities include selling through food coops, marketing to grocery stores, direct marketing on the Internet and direct marketing from your farm or home.

A meeting of the City Council of the City of Falls City, NE, was held in said City on the 1st day of October, 2012, at 7 p.m. Council met in regular session. Mayor Hersh called the meeting to order and City Clerk Jorm recorded the minutes of the meeting. On roll call the following Council persons were present: Ferguson, Moore, Murphy, Oliver, Robidoux, Scholl, Sutter, Wisdom. Absent: None. Notice of the meeting was given in advance thereof by posting in three public places, a designated method for giving notice as shown by the Certificate of Posting Notice attached to these minutes. Notice of this meeting was given to the Mayor and all persons of the Council and a copy of their acknowledgment of receipt of notice and the agenda is attached to the minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated in the advance notice and in the notice to the Mayor and Council of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public. The Mayor publicly stated to all in attendance that a current copy of the Nebraska Open Meetings Act was available for review and indicated the location of such copy posted in the room where the meeting was being held.

MAYOR'S REPORT

Thank you all for coming tonight, it is important that you are voicing your opinion, for or against. Quite frankly I am disappointed that I have heard nothing but negative from the public. I am just curious how many of you have done your homework? You who are quick to judge us and play the "armchair quarterback" making statements such as, I wonder how many of you have done your homework! Falls City's motto (you might say) is that "we are open for business" Let me be the first to say it, if we say no to this project CG B, or any other business of this nature then we might as well hang a Sign up that says "Closed." You who made the comment that we should take more time and have Studies done, ask yourself this; what if it where you? Would you want us to wait any longer than necessary and wasting your time? I think not! The project started in April tell me, if you could tell me, how much more time is needed to do the proper homework. I have contacted the company itself, viewed their website and spoken to other municipalities affected by CGB. Out of all the companies in the mid-west, not one municipality had anything negative to say.I took this job as Mayor with the idea that Falls City was ready for the good change required for future growth. I made one campaign promise, and that was to listen! My platform was that I wanted to see the economic growth for Falls City; I have fulfilled my Campaign promise and will continue to listen to the people of Falls City. I believe that God gave us two ears and one mouth, which means that we should listen twice as much as we speak. What good is it, that we built a new library, Aquatic Park, renovate down town, renovate the ball fields, having EDGE and working hard to build up our infrastructure if we don't want new business in town? If you weren't aware, these things take money to operate, how are we going to pay for capital improvements? I am further disappointed that some of you would rather believe a lie and believe rumors, rather than discovering the truth. You can already see how much rumors can affect the perception of a project and how much of a poison a rumor can be. CG B is a company that has taken the initiative in finding a place that best suits their needs, we should be grateful that they see in Falls City what I have seen all along and long to see Falls City become, and that is alive! It was brought up about "Is it Moral and Ethical? I believe that when one asks this question they should first look at their own business practices and make sure of the same. Is it Ethical? Is it moral? What kind of question is that? To bring a 23 million dollar facility into our town, create new jobs, raise the tax base and improve our market-ability (just to name a small few)? You tell me where the Moral and Ethical dilemma is, because I don't see one! There were some questions regarding the power issue brought up. As we tried to explain, there is no power issue. Yes, we are working on upgrading our power just as we are upgrading our sewers, water lines, gas lines, etc. These are issues that should have been taken care of many years ago. So, again the rumor was believed and someone's perception of what was intended to be said was messed up. Someone put their nose in some ones else's business and they weren't even party to the conversation. TIF money, how much is being used. Again do your homework, TIF money is based on percentages. Is it a \$23 million dollar facility you do the math. It is no different than if Salem Grain (or any other company) wanted to build the same type of facility, going through the same steps as CGB they would use that money to move them along in their business. It was said that CGB, a multi-billion dollar company, could pay for this project in cash, why do they need TIF funds. The fact of the matter is, they don't but for them, it just makes good business since. Why not use the money that comes from your company to help your company, i.e. taxes. Yet another rumor that CGB will be getting Utility advantages form the City. Does this even make since? When has the City given away its Utility services? I don't get free Utilities and don't know of anyone else that does. The answer is NO, they don't get any kind of a break on this either. There are no secrets with this project,

yes it has been kept quite because of confidentiality statements that we must adhere to. Everything that is needed to be put to the public has been told to the public. When someone doesn't understand or doesn't like the answers given they tend to think something else is going on and like stirring the pot. I haven't received that many questions regarding the things that are (with this project) only the things that are rumors. I spend more time combating the mythical beasts of rumor than anything else. I am not confused by the plans of this project or what it can do for our community; I am for this project 100%. Let's do some looking at what this company can do for our community. They are a large grain moving business that needs employees; they use semi-tractor/trailers, semi's use fuel, maintenance, and need cleaned. This of course would mean a truck stop and this needs employees, which means more jobs for our people. This could breed other possibilities of business growth and expansion. Someone with insight should see this and start investing more into our community. They add to the property value, Utility usage, they add to the visual appearance to the City and with the visual appearance come more business because they see that Falls City is Serious about growth. In closing, how long can we go without growth and development? We have seen this City go from a population of almost 8,000 (or more) to what we are today. If this is a retirement community what is to keep the younger generation here. They need jobs, where do they go? To the bigger Cities, which have the population and jobs that a retirement community cannot offer. Which means that the children, grandchildren are in another City hours away and only come back for visits. Why not have the children and grandchildren in the same community. Why not grow and prosper as a community. Why can't Falls City get its piece of the pie. I ask that everyone hold on and see what happens when we prosper. Change happens all the time, you can either be changed by the change or do the changing yourself. For those being affected by this change, its time up your game or get out of the business.

CMC recognizes women’s health issues during Breast Cancer Awareness Month

An annual physical exam with a health practitioner can be an important—and even lifesaving—part of a woman’s health plan. “They’re more than just a pap smear visit,” says Sandy Catlin, APRN, who practices in Falls City and Humboldt. “Annual visits can address a variety of issues, helping to keep women’s bodies and minds as healthy as possible.”

New laws require that insurance companies pay for various preventative medical visits and screens with patient copays reduced or eliminated. For those without insurance, sliding fee schedules at clinics or services, such as Every Woman Matters, can help. Regardless, an annual medical visit is a small investment that can prevent much more significant problems later. Some of the more common issues a woman may discuss in an annual visit include:

Cancer

Breast cancer affects 1 in 8 women during their lives, and many of us know someone who has had it. Breast cancer is the second-leading cancer killer of women in the United States, next to lung cancer. Thanks to screening, breast cancer often can be found early, when the chance of successful treatment is best. Women should perform manual breast examinations regularly and discuss with their practitioners when it is appropriate to have mammograms. Digital mammography offers greater diagnostic sensitivity than older, film-based mammography. October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

Cancer can develop in many other parts of the body as well. Reducing risk factors can decrease—but not eliminate—the likelihood that cancer develops. Early detection through screening can make it much easier to treat some cancers. Examples of good measures include skin protection when in the sun, regular pap smears, getting a colonoscopy and ceasing smoking or other tobacco use.

Stroke and Heart Disease

Heart disease is the number one killer of both men and women in the United States, outpacing even cancer, and more than one in four deaths of women in this country are from heart disease. Most women that die from heart disease had no previous symptoms, though 9 of 10 had at least one of the following risk factors:

- 1) High cholesterol
- 2) High blood pressure
- 3) Diabetes
- 4) Smoking
- 5) Overweight or obese
- 6) Physically inactive
- 7) Alcohol use

Fortunately, even simple improvements can decrease the risks of heart disease. For instance, exercising 10-15 minutes each day has been shown to reduce the risk of dying from heart disease by half. Though more exercise is better, women can feel good with even ten minutes of daily activity. Women should also be aware of the symptoms of stroke and heart attack, especially since symptoms are often different from those found in men. Prompt medical attention can save lives and reduce damage done to heart or brain tissue, making it much easier to recover and return to normal activities.

Reproductive Health

While cramping and other symptoms are a normal part of menstruation, some women experience extremely painful menstruation. Others may have irregular cycles or very heavy or long-lasting menstrual bleeding. Women are encouraged to discuss these issues with their health care practitioners. Painful menstruation, can be caused by a variety of factors, including endometriosis, fibroids and ovarian cysts. Treatments can include therapies, medications and surgical procedures.

In previous eras, women seemingly had to choose between ongoing suffering or having a hysterectomy (removal of the uterus and often ovaries). Now, a variety of options exist. For example, Dr. Rod Warren, Board Certified Surgeon, uses specialized equipment at Community Medical Center to perform uterine ablations, a simple out-patient procedure that has demonstrated effectiveness at reducing heavy menstrual periods for many women. He is also able to use equipment to view the inside of the uterus during hysteroscopies, allowing him to remove fibroids and polyps, while often preventing the need for a hysterectomy.

Other reproductive issues can include infertility, concerns about sexual functioning and enjoyment, birth control methods and sexually transmitted diseases. Because women have different medical histories, religions, personal preferences and stages of development, it is often best to discuss these issues with a medical practitioner. These practitioners are trained to listen to women, to maintain complete confidentiality and to help identify, discuss and prescribe treatment options.

Incontinence

Urinary problems, while actually fairly common, can be very embarrassing and can profoundly impact women’s lives. Though they can occur at any age, they be-

come more likely as we age. Issues can include loss of urinary control, whether all the time or from certain actions; minor urinary leakage; overactive bladder; or loss of bowel control.

According to Mandy Bredemeier, OTR/L, at Community Medical Center, “Untimely bowel and bladder accidents can often be avoided by strengthening pelvic floor muscles. This allows patients to participate fully in their daily lives without fear of embarrassment.” Ms. Bredemeier has had great success working with patients, helping them improve lives and avoid surgical solutions. She encourages patients to speak to their practitioners or to contact her at the CMC therapy department for a consultation.

Osteoporosis

Bones can become more brittle over time. Medications and conditions can speed the process. Periodic bone density Dexascans can help assess bone strength. Solutions may include dietary changes or exercise. Protecting bones helps women avoid hip fractures and other debilitating injuries later in life.

Mental Health

Mental illnesses affect women and men differently. Disorders often affecting women include anxiety disorders, depression, postpartum depression, bipolar disorder, borderline personality disorder, eating disorders and schizophrenia. In addition, side effects from various diseases and even medications can create symptoms that affect mental and emotional health. Local resources include counselors at Blue Valley Mental Health, including substance abuse counselors, and Gayle Keller—a nurse practitioner certified in both family medicine and mental health. Primary care practitioners can also help with referrals to counselors, psychiatrists and psychologists in larger nearby communities.

Information

Women are encouraged to speak with their primary care practitioners about these and other concerns. As busy as lives are, it can sometimes be easy to put off an annual visit. These visits, however, can both save your life and help you maintain the health you need to meet life’s demands. For your convenience, all of the tests and services described may be obtained locally, or you may seek referral to an urban area.
