


The winner will be recognized with a personalized crystal award.



My family and the community lost a really wonderful lady last Sunday. My great aunt Mayree passed away surrounded by loved ones including her daughter, Margo and sister, Judy. From the time I was about five years old until I graduated high school, I saw Aunt Mayree every single day of my life. Some of you know her from the time she spent at the Dawson Cafe. I can still picture her at the grill cooking so fast, my little eyes could barely keep up. Others know her from cooking the most delicious school lunches in the world. Dawson-Verdon kids were so lucky to have her before all the restrictions went into place on school lunches. That woman could cook a pancake, butter roll, peach pie and waterdog that would knock your socks off.

I wrote about my beloved aunt about a year ago.

We all have that fun and wildly entertaining aunt in our family. You know the one I'm talking about. She is the boisterous, funny, in your face woman that you can't help but gravitate to. My great aunt was just that person. When I was a kid she lived by the saying "The higher the hair, the closer to God," she wore amazingly bright make-up and when she yelled "Nikki Lynn," I knew to pay attention.

Everyone in town knew who she was and everyone knew that she was going to tell you exactly how it is or exactly how it was going to be. I loved spending time with my beloved aunt, which was actually quite often. She was like a bonus grandma to my sister, cousins and I, and we adored her. I could tell you so many stories about this fun aunt of mine but I only have so much room to do so.

I remember listening to her jaw the old men in the Cafe who would try to give her a hard time. I was very young at the time and I fully believe that I picked up a few of her "gruff" mannerisms. As I grew up I continued to see my aunt every day. She cooked at my school and was always unafraid to announce in front of everyone until the day I graduated; "Nikki Lynn, you better behave today!" or "Nikki Lynn you don't need to eat all of that food and quit trading for more burritos, four is enough!" My aunt made the world's greatest pancakes that were the size of your head and the years she had Christmas breakfast were the among the best I remember.

When my little boy was born she started to visit us more than she had before. She would bake me a large pan of cinnamon rolls in exchange for an hour of holding and quietly staring at my baby boy. I would leave them alone and continue to do my housework and eat cinnamon rolls, but I'd still heard her whispering to my newborn and closing her eyes tight as she breathed him in.

My cousin Hannah Harmon said she would write something and put it on Facebook for all the former Dawson-Verdon kids to see that she had passed. This is what she wrote, "This afternoon our great Aunt Mayree peacefully passed. To some she was known as Mable and there are so many great memories of our sassy aunt where majority of them happen in the DV cafeteria. From her yelling our first and middle names everyday to her buying us ice cream if we ate everything on our tray. I may be a little bias, but her food was the best in the area and DV was so blessed to have a cook that cared about us kids and had the option to dip our rolls in melted butter. Every time she visited Nikki after Alex was born, she would bring Nikki cinnamon rolls. She said she knew Nikki would eat the cinnamon rolls and she could hold Alex. Just this past week I attempted to make these famous cinnamon rolls of Mayree's and failed miserably. She was my favorite baby sitter as we always played cards and watched sad movies of animals that always made her cry and then have her yell at us for making her watch a movie that made her cry (again haha). She was an animal lover-as she took care of several peacocks, cats, and dogs. The one dog I remember the best was Precious Cuddles, the meanest one-eyed dog I have ever met. I could go on and on of all the wonderful memories we have with her. She loved us DV kids."

The thing about Aunt Mayree was the way she loved all the school kids and made everyone feel special. My uncle Matt, cousins, sister and I all went back and forth last night arguing over who Aunt Mayree loved the most. Then my uncle Matt said "she had the ability to make each one of us feel like we were her favorite." His statement was so dead on, I was her great niece but she made me feel like I was her favorite person in the world and she did the same for Alex and Brian.

Our family has received so many wonderful stories about Mayree and how she made an impact on so many lives. Many said they would miss her smile and most said they would miss her cooking. It has been so heart warming to read all of the memories from so many people all over the country, we appreciate every single one.

I imagine many former Cafe customers and HTRS and Dawson-Verdon students will gather with us to say goodbye on Friday. We have a small obit running in today's paper with a longer one to follow next week. I think they needed time to narrow down everything that can be said about this lady because honestly we could fill the paper with stories of her kindness and shenanigans. If you lived or passed through Dawson in the last 30 years, you have a Mayree story and if you do, I want to hear it! To some she was an amazing lunch lady, others she was a no-nonsense force to be reckoned with at the Dawson Cafe but to us she was a larger than life presence who made growing up around her so memorable and extremely fun.

Lawmakers want to consider an old friend, school foundation aid

State senators looking at property taxes and school funding are turning their focus to an old friend, school foundation aid.

It's an idea that has been around

since 1967 when lawmakers adopted a bill sponsored by the late Sen. Jerome Warner of Waverly to provide a per-pupil amount to each district in the state despite the district's resources or needs.

Other states still use foundation aid and Nebraska did until the early 1990s.

Current Revenue Committee Chairman Sen. Mike Gloor of Grand Island says he thinks the idea has pretty strong support. Education Committee Chair Sen. Kate Sullivan of Cedar Rapids says it is an idea that could get some traction next session.

The two oversee a committee that is tasked with easing the state reliance on property taxes to fund schools. They are operating in a climate regulated by Governor Pete Ricketts who has repeatedly said property tax cuts are a number one priority.

Property taxes are levied, collected and spent locally using guidelines created by the state. Lowering property taxes shifts the source of funding for education and other programs and services to something else. Finding that something else is the trick. One option is to make cuts in said programs and services.

It's a laudable goal to look at foundation aid. In 1967, Senator Warner introduced LB448 to create the School Foundation and Equalization Act. The situation was desperate and the time was right for change in both tax policy and school finance.

Warner's plan was actually three funding programs in one. Foundation aid was based on each school district's average daily enrollment for the previous year. Lower per student amounts were awarded for elementary grades with higher amounts set aside for junior high and senior high students because educators said it cost more as the students got

Foundation aid was complemented with equalization aid meant to level the playing field (read that to overcome the urban -- rural split). The third component was incentive aid, which would provide additional resources for offering such things as gifted programs.

The key to success of a new school finance system is sufficient funding. Gloor and others have said that foundation aid today, at \$200-perstudent, could cost the state \$59 million a year. That money would come from cuts elsewhere or shifting the burden to other forms of taxation. Remember, the governor wants to reduce property taxes and lower the income tax. He has some senators in his camp chanting the same mantra.

Longtime Lincoln Journal Star reporter Dick Herman, who covered the 1967 legislative session, says Warner's plan to equalize educational opportunities throughout the state was "corrupted" by politics as senators were pressured by constituents to concentrate on reducing property taxes. Over the years, state aid to education bills have been weighted toward tax relief and haven't done much for equalization. Herman says it is unfortunate that the state failed to take Warner's view.

Warner's School Foundation and Equalization Act was amended 20 times between 1969 and 1986. The flat rate per-pupil provision under the foundation aid program was eliminated in favor of a more complex system with the grade 1-6 category serving as the base. Average daily

membership in the kindergarten category was allotted a slightly lower index, while the amounts in grade categories 7-8 and 9-12 were

awarded a higher

index, according

to a report of the Nebraska Council of School Admin-

Look for discussion of foundation aid and other concepts during a daylong public hearing at the Capitol on November 12. Some of these ideas

have already been filtered through committee work sessions. Lest you think the topic isn't contentious, the discussions were guided by staff from the Mediation Center of Lin-

Wait until the public has a chance to discuss the options, many of which would favor rural school districts or taxpayers such as farm and ranch owners who feel their property taxes are disproportionately high compared with their urban counterparts. Some districts also feel they are being left out of the current school-aid formula which directs state funds to local schools based on needs minus resources. Foundation aid is favored because it goes to every district.

Let's hope that the zeal to cut property taxes doesn't overshadow the need to equalize educational opportunities as Warner envisioned nearly 50 years ago.

Seniors to face higher Medicare premiums, deductibles next year

The last couple of weeks have brought unexpected and unwelcome news to millions of seniors and disabled people on Medicare. Their already high out-of-pocket costs are going to get higher. For some, premiums for Medicare Part B coverage that pays for doctor and outpatient services will go up as much as 52 percent. For everyone, Part D premiums, which cover drug benefits, will increase an average of 13 percent, and everyone will see their annual Part B deductible rise from \$147 to \$223.

These are not trivial amounts considering that half of all people on Medicare are living on annual incomes of \$24,150 or less. In 2010 about 7 million people covered by the program lacked supplemental insurance such as Medigap policies, which cover what Medicare doesn't. By 2013 the number of people without the additional coverage had more than doubled, most likely because they couldn't afford to buy it.

What's going on here? Weren't Medicare's costs supposed to go down thanks to the Affordable Care Act? These increases have nothing to do with Obamacare and everything to do with the laws governing Medicare and Social Security.

Each year the Secretary of Health and Human Services examines the spending for Part B services which actually has risen this past year. By law premiums paid by everyone on Medicare must cover 25 percent of the program's cost. (General tax revenues cover 75 percent.) And each year the Social Security Administration determines the cost-of-living increases for seniors based on the Consumer Price Index. There will be no increase for the coming year.

All this means about 30 percent of beneficiaries will see increases for Part B. Most people have their premiums deducted from their Social Security checks, but the law prohibits any Part B premium increase that would result in a reduction in their Social Security benefits. Without a COLA increase, a higher premium means a smaller Social Security check.

Because Medicare premiums must cover 25 percent of Part B costs, the government has to find the money somewhere. So four groups of people will have to shoulder the added financial burden.

They include those who begin receiving Medicare benefits in 2016, those over age 65 who are on Medicare but who have not taken their Social Security benefits yet; wealthier beneficiaries (individuals with incomes above \$85,000 and couples with \$170,000) and low-income people eligible for both Medicare and Medicaid. State Medicaid programs pay those increases and they, too, are grumbling.

Increases in Part D premiums stem from higher costs for both brand and generic prescriptions and particularly for specialty drugs like Sovaldi to treat hepatitis C.

Will Congress fix these inequities and find other funds to protect everyone from these increases? "It's very hard to predict what Congress will do," says Tricia Newman, senior vice president at the Kaiser Family Foundation. Newman points out this year's higher premiums and deductibles may be temporary and are expected to come down in 2017.

The other day I explained all this on a New York City radio show along with Joe Baker who heads the Medicare Rights Center, which helps beneficiaries from all over the country understand their options. Callers on fixed incomes and tight budgets drove home the point: The increases will pinch. One woman told of a \$300 rent increase she had to absorb along with higher prices for food and medicines.


Another said her husband had cancer, and the family had been socked with high medical costs. She said they had to pay a \$3,000 deductible before insurance kicked in. Most likely she meant the requirement to pay \$3,000 out of pocket before her Medicare Advantage plan pays benefits. That's a common out-of-pocket limit for these types of plans. Even if she didn't label the source of the problem correctly, she knew the family bud-

That led to a discussion of the how the COLA adjustment is calculated and whether it is fair to seniors because they spend money on a different market basket of goods than younger Americans do. They spend more on health care, for example, and less on gasoline, which is heavily factored into the cost-of-living calculations. But despite years of talk and experiments with a more accurate cost of living index for seniors, the government has yet to implement one.

Years ago, health care expert Marilyn Moon, who served as a public trustee of the Social Security and Medicare Trust Funds, urged Americans to save their money because they were going to need it for medical care when they got older. This year's situation shows how right she was.

'It's Alright: I'm a Regent!'

When it comes to conflicts of interest, the Papio-Missouri River Natural Resources District has a pretty wicked sense of humor. While board members spent countless hours crusading to have me removed from office – as of this date, I have been fully exonerated by the courts and all charges have been dismissed due to a lack of evidence - they summarily dismiss a potentially real conflict-of-interest case. I'm referring to that of University of Nebraska Board of Regents member Hal Daub. This may surprise you, but Hal Daub is a partner in the law firm Husch-Blackwell – the same firm that was hired to represent the PMRNRD in 2009 to obtain bonding revenue for 27 dams proposed by the Papio Creek Watershed Partnership at a cost of \$1

Mr. Daub has access to confidential and privileged PMRNRD information with respect to the project – information that could prove quite profitable if it ever reached the hands of certain property owners. Hal Daub, who represents a client that owns some of the property in the vicinity of Dam Site 15A. But, according to the PMRNRD's illustrious legal team made up of Husch-Blackwell attorneys, this is somehow not a conflict of interest! If that's not a conflict of interest, then what's the point of even having conflictof-interest laws? It's like asking Jesse James' brother Frank, after Jesse has just robbed a bank, if Jesse's actions were in accord with the law. What would you expect the response to be?!

The PMRNRD is subsequently using taxpayer funds to pay for streets and other amenities on behalf of Hal Daub's client, yet that's perfectly acceptable. This is not even to mention the fact that the development is located near an area where the PMRNRD has simply decided to give public land away to the University of Nebraska at Omaha for an expanded prairie reserve. I wonder who brokered this deal. Could Hal Daub be using his influence as a regent, along with privileged information as a partner with Husch-Blackwell, to benefit his client? If so, then anyone with half a brain might call that a major conflict of interest.

Under normal circumstances, the newly formed SID would pay for streets and any infrastructure improvements. However, as it stands with this bogus special-interest agreement, which was signed by Daub's mayoral protégé - Jean Stothert - the PMRNRD will pay for these costs. Why must the taxpayers foot the bill for an SID? Moreover, the City of Omaha's promise to reimburse the PMRNRD for the SID's infrastructure costs at a later date is somewhat puzzling. Ask yourself, why would the City of Omaha agree to pay for a new street that's located outside of the city limits? And, second, where will the reimbursement revenue come from? Could it be that City of Omaha officials have been systematically lying to residents about where the increased fees associated with the \$2 billion sewer separation project and/or the Legislature's Water Sustainability Funds? Could this be the reason why the City of Omaha did not include the multimillion dollar SID infrastructure project in its current budget - because the excessive sewer separation fees will ultimately be used to pay for its reimbursement, and the city's elected officials would sooner prefer that the voters not catch wind of the fact that their special-interest cronies are subject to a taxpayer bailout?





EAB moving closer to Nebraska

An invasive insect pest continues to move closer and closer to Nebraska: Emerald Ash Borer. EAB has not been found in the state, but has been verified as close as the Kansas City area.

EAB is a wood-boring insect that is one-half inch long and is a metallic green color with bronze underneath the wings. The problem with Emerald Ash Borer is that it bores into healthy ash trees. We have many native borer species, but they feed on stressed or dying trees, that is what makes EAB so much worse than normal borers and it is why it is destroying so many trees.

EAB is an insect that was first found in the U.S. in 2002, when it was found killing ash trees in southeast Michigan. Currently, EAB has been found in 25 states including Iowa, Missouri, Kansas and Colorado.

EAB feeds only on true ash trees, which means that mountain ash is not attacked because it is in a different family and is not a true ash tree. Ash trees have opposite, compound leaves with 5-11 leaflets. They have paddle-shaped seeds that stay on the tree through the fall and into the winter months. EAB has also recently been found on Fringe Tree, which is a tree in the same family as ash, but is not very common in Nebraska.

The signs of EAB infestation include suckering at the base of an ash tree, decline in the tree from the top of the canopy downward through the tree, 1/8 inch D-shaped exit holes along the trunk and branches, increased woodpecker damage, S-shaped Serpentine galleries underneath the bark of the tree. If you notice any of these symptoms in your ash tree, you should contact your local Nebraska Extension Educator.

Treatments are not recommended until the insect is found within 15 miles of the tree's location. There are chemical treatments that are effective against EAB. Homeowners can use a soil application, but this is most effective on trees less than 15 inches in trunk diameter. If the tree is larger, professional tree care companies can use a trunk injection. Wait until the insect is found within 15 miles before any treatment is done because the injections wound the tree and we want to wait as long as we can before we begin wounding our trees. A homeowner should also decide if the tree is in good health and a good location before beginning treatments. Planting ash trees at this time is not recommended.

Buy wood locally when camping and leave unburned firewood at the campsite when you leave.



Highest-grossing horror films perfect for Halloween night

Are you a scary movie buff? Do you relish in the building music and the jump-out-of-your-seat moments that unleash from you a primal scream? Many people share a love of scary movies and have made the horror genre one of the most popular.

No month of the year celebrates horror movies more than October. Each October, movie theaters, television stations and viewers count down to Halloween with flick after flick featuring gore, suspense and pure horror.

Some horror movies have had more box office success than others, and the following are some notable horror movies that put a scare in viewers and some dollars in their producers' pockets (figures courtesy of the Internet Movie Database).

- "World War Z" (\$202 million): A zombie pandemic is set to cripple the world, and one man races against time to stop it.
- "What Lies Beneath" (\$155 million): A woman believes her Vermont home is haunted by a ghost.
- "Gremlins" (\$148 million): This tale of pets that boast some unusual qualities became a cultural phenomenon in the 1980s.
- "The Blair Witch Project" (\$141 million): When three film students disappear after investigating the legend of the Blair Witch, their documented footage sheds light on their fate.
- "The Silence of the Lambs" (\$131 million): Few filmgoers can forget Anthony Hopkins' Oscarwinning turn as Hannibal "The Cannibal" Lecter, who works in conjunction with naive FBI cadet Clarice Starling (Jodie Foster) to catch a vicious killer on the loose.
- "The Ring" (\$129 million): This film is a remake of a classic Japanese ghost story and made many viewers want to avoid their televisions after watching it.

New collaboration committed to reducing death, disease associated with childbirth, 1st month of life

A new, statewide collaborative of health professionals, health organizations, hospitals and clinics has committed to reducing the death and disease associated with childbirth and the first month of life.

The Nebraska Perinatal Quality Improvement Collaborative's initial efforts will focus on: reducing the number of first-time cesareans; increasing the numbers of new mothers who breastfeed; and conducting education to prevent and increase newborn screening for congenital cytomegalovirus, an infection that occurs before birth.

Through Legislative Bill 233, the Nebraska Legislature is funding the initiative with \$100,000 a year for two years. The collaborative will provide resources to enable health professionals to provide care that will improve birth outcomes and reduce costs.

Support also comes from the March of Dimes, the Nebraska Medical Association, Arbor Health, Copic, University of Nebraska Medical Center Department of Pediatrics, Nebraska Medicine, the American Academy of Pediatrics, Methodist Women's Hospital and CHI Health.

This year, Nebraska became the 44th state to form a collaborative. Members of the statewide collaborative will work closely with Nebraska organizations, including the NE Dept. of Health and Human Services, the Visiting Nurses Association, and county health depart-

"Our new collaborative will work to ensure that Nebraska will be a state where a great life starts with healthy moms and healthy babies," said Ann Anderson Berry, M.D., Ph.D., co-medical director of the collaborative. "As health providers, we all share a common

est quality for our patients. Nebraska's mothers and babies need and deserve the attention to quality care delivery given in other states that are already benefiting from the work of perinatal collaboratives."

Dr. Anderson Berry is an associate professor of pediatrics at the University of Nebraska Medical Center and medical director of the Nebraska Medicine neonatal intensive care unit.

Robert Bonebrake, M.D., a perinatologist at Methodist Health System, is co-medical director of the collaborative and Peggy Brown, D.N.P., a women's & children's clinical quality lead at Nebraska Medicine, is program administrator for the collaborative.

"Our first initiative will support health professionals in their efforts to eliminate elective delivery in infants less than 39 weeks estimated gestational age. There are too many C-sections and resulting complications such as high wound infection rates and increased time in the hospital," Dr. Anderson Berry said. "This is of great importance to women. It will result in fewer complications and less death."

The group has a growing list of more than 90 percent of hospitals across the state committed to the

"It speaks greatly of the need and the impact it will have in Nebraska," Dr. Bonebrake said. "Collaboratives improve health care practices and patient outcomes as well as reduce costs. We will use evidence-based medicine, which we know improves health outcomes and provides the highest quality

Dr. Brown said the collaborative will share the most current and best practices. "The knowledge in medicine isn't static. We have to

to keep up with all these changes if you're a provider trying to care for three or four communities. There are limited resources and challenges. Providers can adapt these practices to their own circumstances and build on their successes."

Breastfeeding is another focus of the grant.

Dr. Anderson Berry said Nebraska is ranked 47th in rates of breastfeeding. She said if 60 percent of babies were fed exclusively with breast milk for the first six months of life, it could result in hundreds of thousands of dollars saved in health care costs in Nebraska.

"Increased rates of breastfeeding in the first year of life could prevent complications such as ear infections, pneumonias requiring hospitalizations, and colds -- because babies are getting some immunity protection from the mom," Dr. Anderson Berry said. "If we keep babies well, parents miss less work, fewer antibiotics are used and health costs are reduced."

Funding for the collaborative will pay for resources, database development, and statistical support, a program administrator with expertise in quality improvement as well as implementation and education costs. The state funding has potential for renewal.


Nebraska Statistics

-About 2,752 infants were born prematurely in Nebraska in 2013.

-According to research, the cost of care for preterm infants ranges from more than \$100,000 for extreme prematurity to \$4,500 for late prematu-

-Very low birth weight infants are at risk for costly complications, adding \$12,000 to \$31,000 to their already expensive care.

-Prematurity is costly to Nebraska. Medicaid programs bear a large burden of this cost. Collaboratives have the ability to impact this, for example, in Tennessee, where a collaborative has been active for six years, they have saved \$11 million a year in state
