

Organized by Veterans Service Officer Ralph Huettner, who emceed the program on the south side of the Courthouse, and sponsored by Rod Vandeberg, "Remembering Our Fallen," which honors the 116 soldiers from Nebraska and western Iowa who have lost

their lives in Iraq and Afghani-

Jacob Fritz, the two Richardson County soldiers who were killed in service to their country in Iraq. Their mothers, Anita Nolte and Noala Fritz, were both in attendance.

The program included song from Falls City High School choral members, the reading of 116 names by Sacred Heart and HTRS students, comments from Huettner, who read a letter

(it's not a typo)


Monday evening's city council meeting may not have set a record. But it had to be close. Council members completed their business in about four min-

After councilman Kirby Robidoux offered the opening prayer and the consent agenda was approved, the council had only one item of new business to consider. And that didn't take long.

They gave their unanimous approval to a Chamber of Commerce promotion, "Spooks on the Square," to be held from 3-6 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 30.

During the event, city sidewalks and streets in the downtown area will be used for food and other vendors and for carnival games. Hawker's permits will be waived for that Sunday only.

Hayrack rides will be available. The city will provide picnic tables and will barricade the appropriate streets.



### Hope to open 159 by Dec. 15

Keeping to their promise to get flood-damaged roads opened as safely and quickly as possible, the Missouri Department of Transportation is working to get relief for drivers in Holt County on U.S. Highway 159.

Ideker Inc., of St. Joseph, MO, won a bid in the amount of \$2,633,985.63 for a 2.2-mile repair and temporary resurfacing project for a section of roadway that runs from the Missouri River Bridge at Rulo to east of Route 111.

The contractor received notice to begin this project last Friday, and the expected completion date is Dec. 15.

"We hope to restore access to local traffic as safety allows earlier that the completion date," said Don Wichern, MoDOT's Northwest District Engineer. "Our goal is always to get these roads repaired as safely and quickly as possible so we can get them open for the public."

The encased structure is located near the north shelter and is a very attractive addition and point of interest for visitors to the site.


Curator Gerald Hopp will prepare the written program hand-outs and coordinate the dedication ceremony.

I'm told the "Remembering Our Fallen" exhibit at the Courthouse this week has been extremely well attended. The somber, reflective, traveling display includes photographs of the 116 Nebraskans and western Iowans who have been killed in The War on Terror in Iraq and Afghanistan. Sadly, photos of two Richardson County soldiers are included.

For those who have been touched by the exhibit, it would be a good idea to thank the two guys responsible for its oneweek stay here. Veterans Service Officer Ralph Huettner initiated the effort, then made all of the arrangements and put together a Sunday program to launch its opening. There were costs involved and Huettner had planned to seek donations. He contacted Rod Vandeberg, who covered all of the costs. Nice going, Ralph and Rod.

An interesting story is in the media this week, originating from Chowchilla, CA, where a former model and nanny is seeking parole from prison, where she's been serving a long term for what some would consider rather inappropriate behavior.

The woman, Omaima Nelson, celebrated Thanksgiving in 1991 in a less-than-traditional way. No turkey in the oven for Omaima. Instead, she murdered her husband, chopped him up and cooked parts of him.

Authorities discovered William Nelson's hands in a fry cooker and his head in the refrigerator. His entrails were found in his Corvette.

The motive appears to have been theft. Ms. Nelson had a habit of taking advantage of middle-aged men, although not previously to such an extreme.

She sought parole in 2006 and was denied. A good decision that, hopefully, will be affirmed in 2011.

It appears the University of Missouri will leave the Big 12 Conference for the Southeast Conference, which recently accepted another Big 12 school, Texas A & M. With the departure of Nebraska and Colorado, and now A & M and possibly Mizzou, the Big 12 would be down to, let's see, 12 minus 4. Eight! The Big 8 could be back, though not in its original

The problem for Missouri is that the Big 12 wants "binding, long-term irrevocable commitments" to the conference from its remaining members, said MU's interim president Steve Owens. That's a commitment Mizzou is reluctant to make.

If Missouri leaves, the Big 12 would have to attract new member schools or do what seems to be inevitable — FOLD.

I've mentioned before the fantastic Civil War series that appears periodically in The New York Times. Tuesday's paper included an essay by Cate Lineberry, a Washington writer and editor. The topic: "The Boys of War."

Ms. Lineberry states that "tens of thousands of boys under the age of 18" found their way to the Union and Confederate causes from the beginning, many as drummers, buglers or messengers. Many, many thousands, however, actually fought in the gruesome battles.

The most famous boy soldier was Johnny Clem (his actual name was John Joseph Klem), who was 9 when he first tried to enlist in the Union army in May of 1861. When he was rejected, he continued to try until he was accepted. Johnny Clem would have been 11 when he encountered a Confederate officer in a battle at Chickamauga, GA. The officer called on the youngster to surrender. Clem shot the officer and took off for the Union lines.

Clem was captured by the Rebels just weeks later, only to be released in a prisoner of war exchange. After the war, Clem continued to serve in the military in a career that spanned 43 years. He was a major general when he retired as the last Civil War veteran actively serving in the Army.

Clem died in 1937.

edly without lasting success. I've tried the patch. I've tried medicine. Neither has worked. Support groups aren't for me. Being told over and over that I need to quit smoking just leaves me feeling depressed and weak. Can you offer me any hope?

DEAR READER: Yes, absolutely! The fact that you've tried so hard to quit smoking is a good sign: Wanting to quit is the necessary first step. I know you feel discouraged right now. I've had many patients in exactly your situation who have successfully become ex-smokers. That's why I'm going to encourage you to

Nicotine is highly addictive. Willpower alone isn't enough when you're trying to quit. Fortunately, there are lots of tools to help you fight this addiction. Quit-smoking aids include nicotine-replacement patches, gum, lozenges, inhalers, sprays and medications. Toll-free "quitlines" can connect you to the help you need (find the quitline in your state at www.smokefree. gov).

None of these tools work miracles. Often they're more effective when combined. It's also true that one drug may work even if another one failed. So consider these options:

I know you tried the nicotine patch. Talk to your doctor about coupling the patch with a shortacting nicotine-replacement product such as nicotine gum, lozenge or inhaler. These products can help you to rapidly ease sudden cravings.

If the medicine prescribed for you didn't help, ask your doctor about trying a different drug. There are several drugs, and one may work even if another has not worked. And ask your doctor about combining medicine with a product that replaces nicotine.

You mentioned that support groups aren't for you. Did you know you don't need to join a group to be supported? While

sitting comfortably at home with your slippers on, you can simply dial the national quit line at 1-800-QUIT-NOW. If you use the Internet, check the website at www.smokefree.gov. Smartphone apps designed to support quitting exist, too. All of these options have worked for other people -- including people like you who have tried unsuccessfully in the past to quit.

There also are plenty of new treatments under development. For example, scientists are trying to create vaccines that cause a person's immune system to attack nicotine and keep it from reaching the brain. In theory, at least, this would deny you pleasurable feelings from smoking, thus helping you break the habit. There may be more useful tools to quit smoking coming down the road.

My advice? Please don't wait for exciting new treatments. Work with your doctor or a specialist in smoking cessation to tailor a plan that works for you. There are more ex-smokers in the U.S. today than smokers. And there are more effective treatments than ever before. So, please, try again. Your heart, lungs, family and friends will all thank you.



CAPITOL VIEW

LINCOLN – The competition for Republican nomination to the U.S. Senate is a little more interesting these days, thanks to the tea party.

A couple of tea parties, actually.

State Treasurer Don Stenberg, a GOP warhorse of more than 30 years standing, has been endorsed by FreedomWorks PAC, known as "a deep-pocketed Tea Party group that has promised to get involved in Republican primaries."

Word around the campfire is that this outfit might provide Stenberg with some serious money.

Meanwhile, Attorney General Jon Bruning, who already has serious money, has a tea party endorsement of his own. He was given the nod previously by the Tea Party Express.

Polls to date have shown Bruning leading Stenberg, as well as state Sen. Deb Fischer of Valentine and Pat Flynn of Schuyler.

Stenberg supporters are understandably fond of pointing out that Bruning was a Democrat back in his college days, while their boss has generally been to the right of Barry Goldwater since birth.

It had to make Stenberg feel good when FreedomWorks Executive Director Max Pappas said: "Nebraskans described Stenberg to us as 'tea party-minded before we had tea parties' ...."

Stenberg was the star of several failed Senate bids, including one in which he narrowly lost to U.S. Sen. Ben Nelson, the incumbent Democrat who is considering a bid for a third term.

If he should win the primary, Stenberg's campaign finance worries would be virtually over. The national Republican Party has made clear that Nelson is their No. 1 target in the 2012 congressional elections.

Stenberg and Bruning have earned reputations as gut fighters when it comes to politics. Their previous opponents would undoubtedly agree on the importance of a maxim central to survival in the ring – whether the political kind, or the type used for boxing: Protect yourself at all times!

The Senate race and the fight over the path of the proposed Keystone XL Pipeline have dominated political news around the Capitol throughout the summer, and there's no indication that will change before the year ends.

Whether the controversial pipeline eventually carries tar sands oil from Canada through Nebraska's Sand Hills and over the Ogallala Aquifer will be a political issue, and continuing story, for many years.

Part of that story will center on the role the Legislature chooses to play, or not to play, in the economic / environmental policy war generated by the project.

To date, the State Department and Congressional Research Service have insisted that the state has authority over routing such pipelines, if the Legislature decides to exercise it. Gov. Dave Heineman has been just as adamant in contending that he doesn't believe it.

Heineman has refused to call the Legislature into special session to work on the issue, and only a few legislators have shown an interest in having the Unicameral call itself back to Lincoln through a vote of 33 of its 49 members.

—Set ceiling fans to run clockwise, drawing air up and keeping warm air circulating;



### **ABORTION**

(conclusion of an article by Aaron Erhardt)

When Mary went to visit her pregnant relative Elizabeth, we read that the "baby" leaped in Elizabeth's womb. "And it happened, when Elizabeth heard the greeting of Mary, that the **babe** leaped in her womb; and Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit... For indeed, as soon as the voice of your greeting sounded in my ears, the babe leaped in my womb for joy" (Luke 1:41, 44). That is the same word (**brephos**) used in the next chapter to describe a child after birth. And this will be the sign to you: You will find a babe wrapped in swaddling cloths, lying in a manger." (Luke 2:12). Hence, God views those in the womb and those out of the womb the same — in both cases, both are babies!

Personhood was never measured by age or stage of development in scripture. From the moment of conception in the depths of the womb, one was recognized as a human being created in the image of God. That is why to be pregnant was to be with child.

"Now the birth of Jesus Christ was as follows: After His mother Mary was betrothed to Joseph, before they came together, she was found with child of the Holy Spirit" (Matthew 1:18). The angel Gabriel told Mary that her relative Elizabeth "conceived a son" "Now indeed, Elizabeth your relative has also conceived a son in her old age; and this is now the sixth month for her who was called barren" (Luke 1:36).

Many passages that indicate God has a special relationship with the unborn. "Your hands have made me and fashioned me, an intricate unity... Did you not... clothe me with skin and flesh, and knit me together with bones and sinews? You have granted me life and favor, and Your care has preserved my spirit" (Job 10:8, 11-12). "For You formed my inward parts; you covered me in my mother's womb. I will praise You, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made; marvelous are Your works, and that my soul knows very well. My frame was not hidden from You, when I was made in secret, and skillfully wrought in the lowest parts of the earth. Your eyes saw my substance, being yet unformed. And in Your

book they all were written, the days fashioned for me, When as yet there were none of them" (Psalm 139:13-16). "Then the word of the Lord came to me, saying: 'Before I formed you in the womb I knew you" (Jeremiah 1:4-5). Definitely, a prebirth relationship exists between the Creator and his creation.

Some argue that abortion is not murder because the fetus has not yet received the "breath of life" spoken of in Genesis 2:7: "And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living being." However, that passage speaks specifically about Adam, one who sprang into existence fully grown having been formed from the dust of the ground. That was a unique situation. The rest of us receive the "breath of life" long before we begin to breathe independently of our mothers. We breathe (i.e., receive oxygen) through our mothers while in the womb!

No conception ever occurs that is not the result of God's creative purposes. "And I will bless her and also give you a son by her; then I will bless her, and she shall be a

mother of nations; kings of peoples shall be from her" (Genesis 17:16). "For Sarah conceived and bore Abraham a son in his old age, at the set time of which God had spoken to him" (Genesis 21:2). "So Boaz took Ruth and she became his wife; and when he went in to her, the LORD gave her conception, and she bore a son" (Ruth 4:13).

God's word teaches that life begins at conception long before the body is formed. Abortion robs God of His glory and the child of his life! Therefore, we must not tamper with what God has done.



### Curfews not made to be broken

DEAR HARRIETTE: I have a teenage niece who constantly comes home hours past her curfew. Recently, she came in at 11 p.m. on a school night. She doesn't seem to understand why she has to have a curfew. A few days ago, there was an incident in our neighborhood in which a couple of people got shot. The police blocked off a few streets in the neighborhood to find out what happened. During that time, we were not able to find our niece. We tried calling her cellphone, and the calls went straight to voice-mail. Two hours later, my niece showed up back at the house like nothing happened. Her mother was furious because she wasn't able to find her.

My niece's behavior really concerns me, because she thinks she is invincible at her age. Can you offer some advice on the importance of having a curfew? -- Cheryl, Queens, N.Y.

DEAR CHERYL: Many teenagers attempt to push the boundaries of their rights. It's part of growing up. So parents and guardians must manage boundaries for the safety of the children. In this case, your sister and you should sit down and talk to your niece about what's happening in the neighborhood and the importance of always being in touch. You should also reinforce that curfews exist to help people manage their time and responsibilities, as well as to promote safety. Adults self-impose time limits on their schedules. Curfews exist to help children learn how to do that.

Regarding the cellphone, your sister should make it clear to your niece that if she does not answer the phone when her family calls, she will lose phone privileges. She must learn that consequences are real.

Regarding her curfew, the next time she refuses to honor it, immediately take away other privileges. It could be the cellphone, the TV, going out with her friends -- something that you can reinforce. She has to suffer to recognize that it's time to change her behavior.

DEAR HARRIETTE: My sister and her children are planning to go back to church, and they haven't been to church in a long time. When I asked my teenage niece why they hadn't attended in the past, her response was that she didn't like the way parishioners expressed themselves. I would like to know if there's a way I can introduce God to them without all the unnecessary drama. -- Nicholas, Staten Island, N.Y.

DEAR NICHOLAS: Decide that you will not be part of the drama. If you have an active church life and your family is interested in going to your church, select people you think they would like to meet and introduce them. Very often, the way people are welcomed into an experience makes all the difference in how comfortable they feel. Introduce them to your minister and ask him or her to shepherd them a bit. If there is a Bible study class, recommend that they go to that. If they immerse themselves in God's teachings, they can better steer clear of any uncomfortable social dynamics.

### More than 100 participate in Life Chain

A silent prayerful protest against abortion was held Sunday afternoon along Harlan Street in Falls City.

About 103 people stood quietly from 2:45 to 3:45 p.m. in silent prayer holding 18" X 22" signs saying "Abortion Kills Children", "Adoption: The Loving Option" and "Jesus Forgives And Heals." The chain stretched on both sides of Harlan Street from 14th Street to 23rd Street.

The Life Chain is nationwide pro-life event held annually on the first Sunday in October. It was begun in 1987 by Please Let Me Live, a prolife group located near Sacramento, CA. 

### NATIVE GRASSLAND PROTECTION AGAINST INVASIVE WEEDS PROJECT

Earlier this year the Five Rivers Resource Conservation and Development, Inc. announced that it would receive \$39,000 from the Nebraska Environmental Trust for the "Native Grassland Protection" against Invasive Weeds" Project. This money is being used by the Five Rivers Weed Management Area (WMA) to utilize a cost share program that would assist in making effective weed control affordable for landowners, land managers and other entities. This program is still available to landowners/managers on a rating basis; dependent on severity of invasion, type of invasive weed(s), native prairie in an identified Biologically Unique Landscape, and cash match (minimum requirement of 25%). The fee for the chemical and application minus the cash match would be funded through this grant. A ten (10) year maintenance agreement will be required on any entity acquiring grant funds.

The WMA consists of 9 counties in Southeast Nebraska (Saline, Jefferson, Gage, Pawnee, Johnson, Otoe, Cass, Nemaha and Richardson). If anyone is interested in applying for grant funding to control Sericea Lespedeza, St. Johnswort, Garlic Mustard, Cutleaf Teasel or Caucasian Bluestem, please contact Lyle Weber, Chairman of the Five Rivers Weed Management Area at 402.821.3326 or salineweed@diode.com or feel free to contact your local Weed Superintendent in your County. The first three rounds of applications have been reviewed and rewarded, however additional funding remains and applicants are encouraged to apply as soon as possible for the remainder of this year and/or the beginning of next year. Applications will be reviewed on a monthly basis at our Five Rivers WMA meetings.





The Titans travel to Weeping Water tomorrow night. Weeping Water (2-3) is coming off a victory against Palmyra last Friday.



### Don't wait to begin bat exclusion

Bats typically are considered a frightening animal, perfect for Halloween displays, but the University of Nebraska-Lincoln's wildlife damage project coordinator said now is a good time to get rid of bats.

Bats can accidentally enter homes when they are looking for shelter in high, hot areas during the evening. In homes, these conditions are found in attics.

Nebraskans may have experienced some bat problems in their homes during the summer months, but Stephen Vantassel, coordinator for UNL's Internet Center for Wildlife Damage Management, said waiting until after August to get them out is important. He said people shouldn't wait too much longer,

"You can probably go all the way through October," Vantassel said. "Bats don't move when the temperature is 50 degrees Fahrenheit or lower. Bats don't move when there aren't any bugs. If you see bugs outside, chances are you'll be able to do your exclusion; otherwise you'll have to wait until next spring."

holes to get inside homes. They get in through pre-existing holes of at least 1/4 inch in diameter. Vantassel said it's important for homeowners to identify every opening bats can use to fly in and out either by watching them fly through at dusk or finding grease smudges around holes when looking on a ladder.

Once exit holes are identified, Vantassel suggests installing a one-way door over them and sealing all other potential exits. Bats will be looking for a way to get out, and the one-way door provides a way for them to get out and sealing unused holes prevents their ability to get back in. He said the key is to seal your home while still providing the bats a way of escape.

"Make sure that you never trap the bats inside of the house because they will come into the living space," Vantassel said.

Homeowners run the risk of a potential rabies exposure if that happens, according to Vantassel, in which case everyone needs to be interviewed to ensure there was no contact with the bat. He said to assume there was contact unless proven otherwise, especially if people were asleep.

Vantassel suggests capturing bats and then contacting medical professionals to determine what should be done with them.

"If they decide the bat should be released, take it outside and release it," Vantassel said. "Otherwise, if they think the bat should be tested, you have the animal there to get it tested in the lab. If it turns up negative, no one needs rabies shots and it saves people a lot of money and a lot of pain."


