CMC granted \$400,000 from Helmsley Trust

Patients at Community Medical Center will soon benefit from access to the latest computed tomography (CT) diagnostic technology made possible through a grant from The Leona M.and Harry B. Helmsley Charitable Trusts Rural Healthcare Program.

The Trust has awarded Community Medical Center \$400, 000 for a new 64-slice CT scanner. CT scanners provide es-

sential diagnostic images of structures inside the body. A new CT scanner will allow for faster scans that produce high-qual-y images, allowing medical staff

ity images, allowing medical staff to quickly determine health status and course of treatment while giving patients access to up-to-date healthcare technology close to home

"We are deeply honored and delighted to have received this grant, allowing us to upgrade our CT imaging technology, which supports our protocols for stroke and brain injury and lets us perform new tests that patients previously needed to drive hours to receive," said Ryan Larsen, CEO of Community Medical Center." Middle School 8th graders donate more than \$1,000 to RCCFI

Falls City Middle School's 8th grade students learned a whole lot about both history and benevolence at Chautauqua Night Oct. 29, each portraying historical figures and helping collect \$1,050 for the Richardson County Cancer Fund, Inc.

Language arts teacher Kory Huppert and American history instructor Jack Munford assigned their students *Time Magazine's Most Influential People from Around the World* and the pupils portrayed influential people such as actress Emma Watson, singer Adele, Russian President Vladimir Putin, pro tennis player Roger Federer, soccer players Pele and Lionel Messi, and many others.

The students "worked diligently researching and recreating a historical figure," Mr. Munford said.

A donation allowed spectators to observe the students' individual performances.

So far I have saved over \$650. It may not sound like much, but to us it's quite a bit. For years Brian has tried to bribe me with shopping sprees, sweet Royals memorabilia and a chance to go to the Turner Classic Movie Film Festival if I stop smoking. I always knew that I would have to stop smoking on my own terms, if I really wanted it to stick-and so far it has.

At the end of August when I was only a month into being smoke-free, I mentioned to Brian that I could finally pay for that TCM Film Festival trip with all the money I was saving. I had thought about it, but put it in the back of my mind. As luck would have it only a few days later I was contacted and told that it would be very easy for me to obtain a press pass to the festival if I was interested. I immediately called my friend from Detroit who has attended the last two festivals with a press pass.

I have known Angie for nearly ten years now. We found each other online when I was working to raise money for the Harold Lloyd birthplace. My favorite silent film star was born in Burchard, NE and the home has been struggling to stay maintained for years. Through my classic film obsession I have met the most amazing people who share that passion. Angie in Detroit; Cohen, Kathy and Dan in Missouri; Will in New York City and Jessica in North Carolina. They all helped in any way they could with the tiny home in Burchard and we raised enough money and awareness to keep the home maintained for another year. We also all share a love of writing. Every spring I see all the photos from my friends who attend the Mecca of classic film festivals and my heart breaks. What I have that the others don't is a husband and child. I don't have the money to jet off and spend a weekend with Alec Baldwin and Robert Osborne.

When I spoke with Angie, she filled me in on what all comes with the press pass. Full access to the films shown at the festival, the press line and access to a few parties. As long as I wrote about it in my column, I could go. I got a little too excited about the idea of really getting to go. I have wanted to attend this festival for years and consider it number one on my list of things to do before I die. I knew I had to talk it over with Brian. It wouldn't be fair for me to fly alone to California alone on what would be considered my dream vacation. Have I ever told you how amazing my husband is? Because he is pretty great. He told me that with the money I had saved by not smoking, I could pay for my meals and plane ticket to attend. So every week I took that money and put it away. This week I finally have enough to purchase my plane tickets. The last week of April I'll be boarding a plane, alone to fly to Hollywood for six days.

In those six days I will be too busy to visit the beach or the Hollywood sign but I will get to do things I never imagined I'd get to do. The festival packs more than 100 screenings into 82 hours. There is no time for lunch or dinner so I have been advised to pack a lot of candy and snacks in my bag and plan on a diet consisting of mostly popcorn. This is the only downfall for me. I had imagined if I ever went, I would eat every meal at Pink's Hot Dogs (just like Orson Wells), Musso and Franks or In 'N' Out Burger. I hope I get to at least have one In 'N' Out burger while I'm there, I feel if I didn't it would be a crime and I don't know if could ever forgive myself.

Films will be shown in the historic Egyptian Theatre, TCL (Formerly Grauman's) Chinese Theater and Disney's El Capitan Theater. There is a space called Club TCM at the Roosevelt Hotel where fans get to interact and watch interviews with classic film stars. In the past, such celebrities as Lauren Bacall, Maureen O'Hara and Shirley Maclaine were interviewed. Some films are shown poolside at the Hollywood Roosevelt Hotel and each year, attendees are invited to watch a classic handprint ceremony. Being with the press, I'll get to carry my camera everywhere I go and nobody can get mad at my constant photo taking.

This year's Festival theme is *Moving Pictures*. Announcements will be made over the next few months as to what celebrities will attend and what films will be shown. In a mere 169 days I'll be boarding an early morning flight to Los Angeles where I'll meet up with Angie and drive to our beautiful Hollywood Boulevard apartment where we will shower, brush our teeth and sleep. I've been told to plan to spend about five hours a day in our apartment and 19 hours in line or watching movies.

I'm so wildly excited for this adventure and getting to share it with all of you. I've never wanted to go to Paris or Hawaii-I've wanted to attend this festival instead. I'm incredibly scared to jet off all alone without my fellas, but I know it will be an amazing adventure. When I go on trips I love the journey before the adventure. The butterflies I get when they advertise the festival is like falling in love. I've already started to pack a few things here and there and I check my phone daily to see how many days I have before I get to go. I feel like a kid again counting down the days before Christmas and I have never been happier. Now does anyone have any idea how to dress for California in late April/early May?

Wind Farms expand, but can they survive political wrangling?

Nebraska ranks high in wind energy potential, but lags behind neighboring states in turning that into electricity generation. So what's the hang-up in an age of increasing oil prices and an emphasis on a clean environment?

The amount of wind-generated electricity has more than doubled in Nebraska in the last three years. But a bill to offer more incentives to wind-energy developers stalled in the Legislature this year. Governor Pete Ricketts says wind-generat-

ed power costs at least twice as much as electricity from coal-fired plants and the state has an obligation to maintain affordable rates for Nebraskans. He does

admit that generating and exporting the energy would provide the best opportunity to expand wind power.

Now the Environmental Protection Agency is requiring big cuts in future carbon emissions from power plants through the Clean Power Plan proposed by the Obama Administration. That would normally be seen as a boon to the wind-energy interests, but Ricketts and Attorney General Doug Peterson have added Nebraska to the list of states suing the EPA to halt the plan.

Nebraska is required to submit a plan, written by state experts, that outlines how it will reduce carbon pollution by 40% by the year 2030. The lawsuit filed by Ricketts puts Nebraska at risk of accepting a plan written by the EPA, according to officials of Bold Nebraska, a group that has been battling construction of the Keystone XL pipeline.

Still, developments such as the proposed 200 wind turbine Grande Prairie wind farm in north central Nebraska's Holt County move forward. The project, being built by Berkshire Hathaway Energy -- or BHE Renewables – will employ 350 construction workers and provide 15 full time jobs when completed. It will spread over 54,000 acres of farm and pasture land stretching from the Sandhills to the Niobrara River.

Some have complained about the aesthetics, the tall white towers breaking up the views of rolling hills by day and the flashing red lights by night. Some say they are noisy. Others express concern about electromagnetic forces.

Even others worry about migratory waterfowl who use the same swath of energy-producing wind in their annual migration across Central Nebraska. A University of Nebraska-Lincoln wind energy and wildlife expert says the bird migration corridor narrows in Nebraska and millions of Sandhill cranes, whooping cranes and other shorebirds are concentrated in valleys and wetlands along the Platte River. Kearney touts itself as the Sandhill crane capital of America. Kearney is a little more than two hours south and west of Holt County. Wind turbine blades can spin at 200 miles per hour, enough to kill a bird or a bat that might hit it.

The university expert says that turbine pads and roads can also impact species like elk, mule deer, and swift fox, by eliminating or damaging their habitat. Particularly in continuous prairie or grasslands like those found in Nebraska.

So far, there aren't many studies on the long-term or cumulative impacts of wind farms on native wildlife. Migrating birds and endangered species are federally protected. That means

heavy fines and jail time for killing or harming them. But a spokeswoman for Edison Mission Energy, which has built four wind farms in Nebraska since 2009, doesn't think that has hampered Nebraska's chances yet. Nebraska Game and Parks has an obligation to review wind farm plans.

Holt County Economic Development executive director Nicole Sedlacek says the Grande Prairie project will be a big economic boost. The increased traffic of construction

> crews is already being felt and is exciting. But she also worries about where the workers will live. Housing is an issue in rural Nebraska, so the project adds a layer of challenges to the situation. She has turned to colleagues

for support.

Once completed, BHE says the company will pay landowners \$2.5 million a year in lease payments and about \$2 million a year in tax payments to be spread around the schools and local governments in the project area.

The Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality and State Energy Office have been tasked with drafting Nebraska's state plan to comply with the Clean Power Plan rule, and have said they will host public hearings in the fall to gather citizen input on the state plan. Groups like Bold Nebraska say they will continue to educate and mobilize citizens so their voices are a strong part of the State Plan.

Wind energy seems to be a good deal for Nebraska. Let's hope it doesn't get bogged down in partisan political wrangling, which has yet to serve the state – or the nation – well.




Operation Christmas Child helping children around the world

necessary, including by helicopter, boat, dog sled or elephants.

Another unique aspect of Operation Christmas Child, is that every child, along with the shoebox, is given a book in their they own language called 'The Greatest Journey." The book tells the story of Jesus Christ.

"The fact that someone they don't even know sends them a shoebox filled with gifts allows them to hope and gives them a glimpse of the love God has for them," says Karen Berry, local coordinator for Southeast Nebraska.

Operation Christmas Child is a project of the International Christian Relief Organization, Samaritan's Purse, headed by Franklin Graham. While Samaritan's Purse works to meet critical physical needs, such as clean water, health care and food, Operation Christmas Child addresses the need for which children are just as desperate, the need to have hope and feel loved.





FCSH junior fullback Austin Ahern worked up quite a sweat last Wednesday on a warm, windy day at Jug Brown Stadium, rushing for 147 yards and scoring on runs of 10, 4 and 32 yards to lead the Irish to a 34-26 Class D2 playoff victory over Randolph. Ahern had just one carry in the first round win over Emerson-Hubbard and had taken 17 handoffs for 152 yards in the previous 10 games this fall. By more than doubling that workload in a single afternoon — carrying Cardinal defenders up and down the Jug Brown turf all day — Coach Doug Goltz gave No. 2 Humphrey St. Francis one more thing to think about entering today's 3 p.m. quarterfinal at Humphrey.

Despite long, colorful history with Flyers, SH enters uncharted territory at Humphrey

Exactly 200 miles separates Falls City and Humphrey, homes to the two most time-honored and traditionally rich 8-man football programs in Ne-

Both FC Sacred Heart and Humphrey St. Francis are separated by a nearly four-hour bus trip, but the Catholic schools do have much in common. The Flyers are competing in the state football playoffs for the 33rd time, while the Irish are making a 32nd trip, which includes an ongoing state-record 28-straight. Coincidentally, if not for an St. Francis anomaly in 1994, the two schools would currently share that

record. Both unlike their 9-1 marks this fall, the two schools do not share that record, or many others. As good as St. Francis has been throughout the years, Sacred Heart has been better. In the team's seven-game playoff rivalry, dating back to 1989, FCSH is 5-2 against the Flyers and won the last meeting 51-30 in the 2013 state semis. The Irish have seven state championships and have never lost in the finals, while St. Francis has three titles and played second fiddle four times. Adding some more fuel to the fire, in the first four times they played, the Irish defeated the Flyers by an average score of 54-17. There's the history lesson for

The point being but there was a time — way back in the 20th Century — when the physical 200-mile divide paled in comparison to the rift that developed as a result of a one-sided rivalry. You could also say FCSH was just a stones throw from Humphrey SF. But only because actual stones were probably thrown.

None of that has particular bearing on today's 3 p.m. Class D2 semifinal game at Humphrey, aside from the fact Sacred Heart has NEVER played a football game at St. Francis. The worlds always collided in Jug Brown

There are folks at St. Francis who literally have waited for today their entire lives. And, in terms of quality football, they won't be disappointed. The final score? We'll see.

For the second week in a row, the Class D2 top-ranked (yet fourthseeded) Irish found themselves trailing a visiting underdog after a half of football as they vanished underneath Jug Brown Stadium, trailing fifthseeded (but unrated) Randolph 12-8 in the second round warm but windy Wednesday in Falls City. It's a locker room, not a phone booth, but FCSH, as it did in Round One against Emerson-

Recruiting Report

It's been a rough fall, no doubt about it. I considered writing this column about Tim Miles and NU basketball, or maybe John Cook's volleyball squad making another NCAA run, or even Darin Erstad's interview with the Dodgers and what that might mean to NU baseball. However, football is still "the straw that stirs the drink" in Lincoln. Then the Michigan State miracle happened and the Earth was put back on its axis. So...let's talk about recruiting; specifically visitors to Lincoln during the last three home contests.

Committed QB Patrick O'Brien (6-3/230) of San Juan Capistrano, CA, made his official visit to Lincoln for the Wisconsin game and reaffirmed his decision to be a Husker. In fact, shortly after returning home, O'Brien was Tweeting with other high-profile California recruits in an attempt to entice them to visit Lincoln. He and '17 five-star CB Darnay Holmes (5-11/185) of Calabasas (who also visited Lincoln that weekend) reached out to Rivals 100 WR Theo Howard (6-0/175) of Westlake Village, CA. Howard has taken official visits to UCLA and Texas A&M, and it's not likely he will trip to NU. However, seeing O'Brien and Holmes "working" other recruits bodes well for NU's chances to eventually land both of them.

Other Wisconsin official visitors included OL commit **John Raridon** (6-4/271) of West Des Moines, IA, and uncommitted prospects in WR CJ Riley (6-5/188) of Coconut Creek, FL, and **LB Jaleel Laguins** (6-1/210) of Watkinsville, GA.

Raridon spent his time building relationships with current players and coaches as well as recruiting the other targets on campus. It would be a shock if he didn't sign with NU in February. Riley was impressed with the atmosphere on game day, and also connected with freshman WR Stanley Morgan, Jr. Riley would fill the need for a big-bodied receiver in NU's class, and coach Keith Williams is pursuing him hard. Duke, NC State and Pittsburgh are his other top schools. Laguins committed to Georgia in August, but wanted to follow up his unofficial visit last spring by seeing Game Day in Lincoln.

He told Husker Online, "It was so amazing just to go out there and see how strong the fan base was and everything.'

Laguins remains committed to Georgia, but is also considering NU, LSU, Florida and Auburn.

The Wisconsin game also included a number of unofficial visitors, including athlete Isaiah Simmons (6-3/212) of Olathe, KS, TE/WR Noah Fant (6-5/210) of Omaha South (who is committed to Iowa), and top '17 targets in the aforementioned Holmes, Rivals 100 QB Tristan Gebbia (6-3/180) and WR Keyshawn **Johnson**, **Jr.** (6-1/195) all of Calabasas, Calif.

NU has been after Simmons since January, competing with offers from Missouri, Iowa, Arizona State and others. He's a high priority within the 500-mile radius of Lincoln, and the visit certainly helped the Huskers' chances. Fant was a surprise visitor after pledging to the Hawkeyes on Omaha radio in August. NU continues to recruit Fant, as does Arizona State, Notre Dame, Michigan and Michigan State. His eventually signing with Nebraska is a long shot at best. Gebbia made his second unofficial trip to Lincoln after also attending NU's satellite camp in southern California this summer. He told to Husker Online that he was impressed.

"I was blown away with all that Nebraska has to offer, and I'm looking forward to the opportunity and chance I have to go to a school like that.'

Holmes was on his third visit to see NU, and loved the atmosphere and the fact that fans already knew who he was. Holmes also gave Husker Online his thoughts on Husker Head Coach Mike Riley.

"I think he's a great coach. He's probably one of the best coaches in college football from my vantage point..."

This was Johnson's 4th trip to Lincoln, and his interest level continues to be extremely high. Initially Johnson intended to make a commitment before his senior year, but recent comments seem to indicate he might be deciding much sooner. Alabama, Clemson, Ohio State and USC make up the remainder of his top 5.

Gebbia, Johnson and Holmes all rank among the top 250 overall prospects in the 247 Sports composite rankings, with Holmes coming in at No. 7. They have many options, but taking multiple trips at their own expense shows how serious they are about NU.

Due to the early kickoff time, the only official visitor for the Northwestern game was committed **TE Jack Stoll** (6-5/225) of Aurora, CO. The loss to the Wildcats did little to dampen Stoll's enthusiasm for signing with NU, as he told Husker Online, "I would say that I just made the right choice. It just seems like a place I will definitely be able to call home next year, and where I will be able to grow as a football player."

Huskers committed **DB DiCaprio Bootle** (5-11/170) of Miami, FL, **LB JoJo Domann** (6-1/208) of Colorado Springs, CO, and lineman **Boe Wilson** (6-2/277) of Lee's Summit, MO, made their official visits for the Michigan State game. Nebraska also hosted two Michigan pledges in LB David Reese (6-1/238) of Farmington, MI, and RB Kingston Davis (6-0/242) of Prattville, AL, along with Louisville WR commit **Desmond Fitzpatrick** (6-2/189) of Waterford, MI.

Rounding out the official visit list were **RB Tre Bryant** (5-10/198) of St. Louis, MO, and DBs Lamar Jackson (6-2/206) of Elk Grove, CA, and Markell Simmons (6-1/200) of Pima (AZ) CC.

Bryant decommitted from Kansas State on Wednesday before the visit to Lincoln and said publicly that he was still weighing the Wildcats along with offers from Minnesota, Missouri, Northwestern and NU. However, that was a smoke screen that was lifted Sunday after his visit.

"I told Coach Mike Riley and Coach Reggie Davis the Thursday before my visit that I was committing," Bryant told Husker Online. "I really like the offensive system and I think that I am a good fit. I can really envision myself there in their offense. We run a similar offense. They said that if I am ready to go then I can come in and play."

Not only is Bryant a top prospect himself – 247 Sports ranks him the No. 7 run-

re-emerged onto the field as a better version of itself and outlasted the quick-strike Cardinals in a 34-26 victory. SH's bulk up front — 265-pound senior Reggie Johansen, 200-pound junior Michael Keithley, 240-pound sophomore Theo Rohrer and 298pound junior Bryant Jorn — followed by the pounding of Ahern was akin to a boxer taking body blows for nine rounds. At some point, you can't lift the gloves.

The Irish scored on its first four offensive possessions of the second half — a 40-yard TD pass from Bailey Witt to Noah Keller, a Witt-to-Emerson Keithley TD strike (coming on fourth down and tying the game at 20 with 5:01 to play in the third quarter), Ah-

ern's four-yard burst (capping a punishing nine-play, 78-yard drive), and then came the devastating right hook. After a mishandled long snap, FCSH took over at the Randolph two-yardline with a 26-20 lead and less than eight minutes remaining. Ahern's 32yard rumble came on the first snap of the drive and was followed up by Christian Harring's two-point conversion run. It was a 14-point game, and while Randolph maybe weren't out for the count, the ropes were holding them

"We've been playing pretty good football I think," Coach Doug Goltz said. "I think our kids just thought they could show up against Emerson-Hubbard and just do enough. We didn't really move people and control the line of scrimmage like we did last week."

Randolph picked their poison on the option, opting to crash down on Witt, who was generally eager to hand it to Ahern, who often had room to run. And then made more room.

"He definitely got the ball more than he has all season, but their scheme was to take Bailey, we got the linebackers blocked and kept going with the dives."

That, coupled with the fierce wind and a practical "box-in-one" on senior receiver Henry Arnold, took FCSH's fastest player out of the mix in terms of touches. His brother, Sean, a sophomore, injured his foot in the first quarter after just two carries and didn't return. He will play today.

FCSH wasn't perfect - their effort was riddled with penalties: 11, to be exact, 77 yards worth — but they showed they have a lot of weapons, overcoming the flags by grinding out 13 of their 18 first downs after halftime, and are as balanced and deep as probably anybody in Class D2.

Both teams lost early in the second -SH to North Andrew in the opener, and St. Francis, the preseason favorite in D2, in Week 3 to CWC. They haven't been challenged since.

"They're quick and physical," Goltz said. "And this team expects to win every game - they expect to win the championship every year. I think our guys think that way, too."





ning back nationally and the No. 2 player in Missouri – but his high school also sends multiple players to Power 5 schools annually. In 2014 two players signed with Arkansas and one with Duke, following one each to Iowa and Missouri in '13.

Reece would be an early enrollee, counting towards 2015's scholarship limit. Although he's committed to Michigan, the Wolverines have told him that they cannot accommodate his intention to enroll in January. He and Fitzpatrick are also close friends, as are their respective families.

Reece left Lincoln impressed, telling Rivals.com, "They set the bar pretty high. I had a great time, they showed me everything, answered all my parents' questions about academics to life after football to what I would be doing when I get there in January. Lincoln is a beautiful place. The athletic director knows all the deans in the Business School. They are building a brand new Business School and they actually want their athletes to succeed there."

Reece still has official visits scheduled to Florida (Nov. 27) and Texas (Dec. 12), and is also considering Louisville and Kentucky along with Michigan.

Fitzpatrick was also excited about the Huskers.

"This was by far my favorite visit," he told Husker Online. "I loved everything about it. Just watching and being a part of that crazy crowd was sweet."

He remains committed to Louisville, but admitted there's a lot to think about. He plans to visit Louisville, Indiana and Illinois before a final deci-

Jackson has been considered a lock to either USC or UCLA, however recently he's taken official visits to both Arizona schools, Utah and Michigan. NU was able to secure his fifth and final official visit, and he saw an

"It's definitely an opportunity," Jackson told 247 Sports. "That's my assessment of the situation. They think I can come in there and help make an impact. Right now Nebraska is not the best team, but their fans are there every week. They'll support and sell out every home game. That's just big. Really once recruiting picks up and Coach Mike Riley can change the program they're going to blow up.'

Simmons seems to have narrowed his list to NU and Utah although TCU and Oregon State are still in the picture. He told 247 Sports what his main decision criteria are.

"Coaches and academics. I know both coaches are great. I know the academics at Nebraska are great, and if the academics at Utah don't match Nebraska, then it's Nebraska. If it does match, then we'll see. Academics is the main thing for me and Nebraska really helps its student athletes. They put a lot of work into them."

Simmons will have three years of eligibility remaining and plans to enroll in January at whichever school he chooses. He would provide immediate depth next fall.

Wilson, Domann and Bootle all solidified their pledges to NU, and several of the prospects in town mentioned Domann actively recruiting

Davis had not commented as of press time. He has an official visit planned for Michigan Nov. 28 for their tangle with Ohio State. Pulling him away from the Wolverines will be a tall order.

The Michigan State game weekend may have turned the fortunes of not only the season for the team, but also the recruiting class for this coaching staff. Coach Riley mentioned a commitment during his Monday press conference prior to Bryant's pledging on Thursday. Word had not leaked on who the silent commit is as of press time, but the class continues to grow with prospects that will be given every opportunity to make immediate impacts next fall.

Five simple steps to keep pets healthy over the holidays

Resist Those Pleading Eyes - According to veterinary nutritionist Dr. Dottie LaFlamme, high-calorie tidbits contribute to caloric overload and bad habits, while lacking necessary nutrient balance.

"Just one teaspoon of beef fat can contain almost twice the calories a small dog should consume in daily treats," LaFlamme notes, adding that feeding from the table also promotes begging behavior. "If you must give pets a treat, feed it in their bowl after the meal to help with portion con-

Avoid Holiday Hazards - The holidays can be toxic to pets. Chocolate poisoning is one of the most common accidents during the holidays, according to veterinary critical care specialist and toxicologist Dr. Justine Lee. Other food foes include grapes, raisins, bones, unbaked yeast bread dough, alcohol and xylitol, a common sugar substitute.

Likewise, "Potpourri liquid contains detergents that can cause severe ulcers and burns in a cat's mouth, while tinsel can act as a severe linear foreign body when stuck in a cat's stomach and intestines," she ex-

If you're hosting, ensure houseguests pet-proof pill bottles.

Take Preventive Measures - Owners often experience a false sense of security about parasite prevention when the weather turns cooler. However, the holidays are no time to take a break from heartworm prevention, even though heartworms are spread by infected mosquitoes, says veterinary parasitologist Dr. Patricia Payne. Why? Because preventives work retroactively on heartworm larvae acquired earlier in the season.

"There's no way to accurately predict past or future transmission, so the American Heartworm Society recommends year-round heartworm prevention for dogs and cats," she explains. "Make sure to put a reminder on your holiday calendar to give routine monthly preventives to pets."

Give the Gift of Activity - "When we removed hunting from pets' daily lives, we reduced their physical and mental activity," explains veterinary behaviorist Dr. Jacqueline Neilson. "When pets lack mental stimulation, they can become bored and depressed, and often create their own stimulating activities, such as chewing items or barking at passersby.

Beat this concern with food puzzles and toys that require pets to work, play or "hunt."

"Consider your pet's personality when choosing holiday gifts," says Neilson. "If your dog likes to chew things, a food toy that needs to be squeezed between the jaws may be ideal. Herding breeds may prefer a toy they can nudge."



"Your pet will appreciate a safe haven while traveling," says Dr. Robert Stannard, who recommends adding a favorite blanket to provide a sense of familiarity.

Travel bowls, favorite toys and medications are necessities, not luxuries. Just be careful not to overfeed.


"Like us, pets can get motion sickness," says Stannard. "Don't feed your pet right before leaving, and limit food during travel to help prevent digestive upset."



General John A. Logan gets a bath

John A. Logan, namesake of Logan County, Nebraska, was a Union general in the Civil War and is credited with the establishment of Decoration Day in 1868, a holiday now known as Memorial Day. He was also a founder of the Grand Army of the Republic, the Union veterans' organization that had "posts" in many Nebraska communities. Logan later became a U.S. Congressman and Senator from Illinois. It turns out that he made at least three visits to Nebraska.

The first was in 1872, when Logan spoke at Nebraska City on behalf of Ulysses S. Grant's second presidential campaign. Logan had served under Grant during the war. According to J. Sterling Morton, Logan came to Nebraska again in the fall of 1880. His most memorable (though uncomfortable) visit must have been in September 1883 while he was returning to Fort Niobrara after an inspection trip to the Pine Ridge and Rosebud Indian Reservations in Dakota Territory.

The Valentine Reporter of September 13, 1883, related that Logan and other dignitaries got an unexpected bath in the Niobrara River: "Last week when the Senatorial party was returning to Fort Niobrara from their visit to Rosebud and Pine Ridge agencies, the carriage occupied by General Logan, Senator Cameron, Capt. Woodsen, and Mrs. Maj. McGillycuddy [wife of Pine Ridge Agent Valentine McGillycuddy] broke down just as the party entered the river near the mouth of the Minnechaduza [creek] and, in consequence, all hands got a splendid ducking.

"It was truly a picturesque sight to observe General Logan splashing around in the water up to his waist, his head bare and his long black hair tossing in the breeze with Mrs. McGillycuddy perched upon his shoulders expecting at every move on the part of the general to loose [sic] her balance and fall headlong into the watery waste. . . .But after waiting an hour and no boat in sight, they began looking around for other means of escape when they made the discovery that they were less than four feet from the shore, which they succeeded in reaching without difficulty.

"A representative of the Reporter happened to be near as they emerged from the water, and he says it was as good as a circus with all the modern attachments to watch them endeavoring to straighten out their tangled locks and rid their clothing of the muddy river water and all the time wondering if 'some newspaper man would get hold of it'.... We expect when they return to Washington, they will have considerable to say about the delightful bath they took in that beautiful rivulet up in Nebraska but they'll never tell just how it happened. P.S. Our informant says that Logan was all broke up over the affair for it took two solid hours to arrange his moustache so to make himself presentable in public. It resembled an Indian scalp lock when he emerged from the river."

Perhaps having Logan County, Nebraska, named in his honor in 1885 helped to erase the senator's unpleasant memories of his Nebraska mishap.

NRD accepts tree orders thru February 2016

It's fall, and the weather is beginning to feel like it; so that reminds us that it's a good time to place your order for conservation trees from the Nemaha Natural Resources District. As usual the NRD offers a variety of conifers, deciduous trees, or shrubs from which to choose. Though the seedlings won't be delivered until next spring, orders must be placed well in advance. In fact, if you wish to have the NRD plant your trees, your minimum order of 200 trees must be placed by Dec. 31; and if your ground is currently in sod, it must be tilled yet this fall to be eligible for the NRD's planting services next spring. NRD staff are happy to meet with you to help you decide what to plant and how to lay out your plan.

If you will be planting your own trees, orders will be accepted until March 1, 2016, or until inventories are depleted. To ensure availability of the species you want, place your order early. Nine conifers, nine deciduous trees, and twelve types of shrubs are offered this year. New species added to this year's inventory include Bald Cypress, Canaan Fir, Eastern Larch, Hackberry, Pecan, Nannyberry, and Ninebark. All species must be ordered in lots of 25/species. The cost is \$0.90 per seedling, plus a \$3 handling/packaging charge on all orders except those that are planted by the NRD. Machine planting costs the District \$1 per tree. Prices are subject to state and local sales taxes based upon point of delivery. Advance payment for trees and/or planting is required before seedlings will be reserved. Orders will be available for pickup in April 2016.

This initiative is one of many that aims to improve healthcare access and health outcomes across the upper Midwest.

The funding initiative was the result of a survey of Critical Access Hospitals in the Rural Healthcare Program's sevenstate funding region. Capital equipment, particularly CT scanners, was identified as a top need by many hospitals. In addition, a new Medicare policy will go into effect Jan. 1, 2016 that may reduce reimbursement for certain studies on CT scanners that do not meet specific radiation dose
