Ballpark pledges hit \$1.125 million

If this Ballpark Improvement announcement seems to have been a long time coming, it is because your small fund-raising committee has been quietly going about its business of visiting with those people and organizations who we believed might make major “leadoff” gifts or pledges to the project.

Having now almost completed this initial phase of our campaign, we are gratified and elated to give you this first report with, hopefully, additional announcements to follow shortly.

First though, I would like to re-enumerate our actual cash needs (budget), which is \$1,765,000 after the City makes approximately \$200,000 of “in kind” contributions, which the Mayor and Council have already agreed to do.

So, here are the “early returns” and, I must tell you, they are absolutely incredible and almost hard to believe!

Our “leadoff” pledge of \$400,000 came from The Richardson Foundation with funds received from the Francis Fiedler Estate in memory of the Fiedler Family;

\$200,000 by Ed and Sandra Hartman who have chosen naming rights of Field D at Dallas Jones Memorial Park;

\$150,000 pledged by First National Bank, which has chosen naming rights for Field C at

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‘Fabric, legacy, service’

Frank Hutchinson III, the guest speaker at Falls City’s Veterans Day program held Friday, Nov. 11, at 11 a.m. at Falls City High School, spoke of “fabric” and “legacy” and service to community and nation.

The son of a decorated U.S. Marine Corps officer and Vietnam veteran, Hutchinson, of Austin, TX, is the founder and executive director of A Veterans Voice Foundation and, as such, donates his time to speak across the country and internationally — literally giving a voice to veterans, most recently of the War on Terror, but also all who have, are and will serve their nation.

He was introduced Friday by Sherry Maddox, the wife of the late Marshall Maddox, who served his country in Vietnam and his community as mayor and, among many other things, the man who worked so hard to make Veterans Day a special local event. Since his untimely death, Mrs. Maddox, a 30-year speech language pathologist who is in her second year as a member of the Falls City Public Schools faculty. She is a member of the VFW Auxiliary. As emcee, Mrs. Maddox introduced patriotic performances by the Falls City High School band, the combined choruses from Sacred Heart High School and FCHS, the Falls City Ceremonial Honor Guard, who posted and retired the colors, representatives of veterans’ organizations

and auxiliaries, and the Rev. Dan Gifford, who offered the opening prayer and benediction.

Hutchinson was invited to speak in Falls City by his friend, Lt. Col. (Ret.) Terry Flynn, an Iraq War veteran who is involved with A Veterans Voice Foundation and other veterans’ organizations.

Hutchinson began his talk with the sounds of military aircraft, saying they represent the “sounds of freedom.” For many in the world, he said, the military are the only link to this country.

Small town America — towns like Falls City — make up “the fabric which holds this nation together,” Hutchinson said. He spoke with conviction and reverence about all veterans who have sacrificed in service, some, like Marine Sgt. Nick Nolte and 1st Lt. Jacob Fritz, making the “ultimate sacrifice” in Iraq.

“This community lost two young men who clearly understood the sacrifices,” said Hutchinson. “They understood the values they grew up with” and the importance of those values. “Jacob and Nick understood the legacy” and the leadership required, he said.

Hutchinson spoke about that legacy and how he began to

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Gravestone restoration at Rulo Cemetery

For Jeff Moyer, owner and operator of 4 State Service of Salem, the job at hand has been one of re-leveling, re-setting and repairing.

The location is the Rulo Cemetery, which is in need of attention as many of the historic gravestones have experienced damage after years of tough Nebraska wind and weather. Several have fallen over, while others are about to. Still others show the wear and tear administered by

the years.

Moyer and his crew, Cody Hull and Dillon Lotter, were forced to bring their work to a halt last week when the weather took a sudden change. But they are making good progress, evidenced when a Journal reporter stopped by last Tuesday afternoon.

Moyer said he has been contracted to mow the cemetery, but that

funding is just not sufficient for the gravestone repairs. So he is donating his time, effort and materials for the job.

The Salem man’s business is multi-faceted. In addition to commercial mowing and gravestone restoration, he also offers computer and web services, wind and solar power design and installation and custom contract work. 4 State Services can be reached at 402-245-0878, or at the website 4stateservice.com.

Moyer became involved in the gravestone restoration business after purchasing Palmer and Sons from Steve Palmer. Palmer is known in this area after restoring the Harris Cemetery at Barada, among others. But after Hurricane Katrina hit New Orleans and south Louisiana in August of 2005, Palmer decided to sell his restoration business and go south to help with the enormous needs of that area.

Gravestone restoration is a part-time business for Moyer. Still, he has accomplished a lot in just a few years, restoring gravestones at the Fricke Cemetery, a Prairie Grass cemetery in the northwest portion of Richardson County. He has also restored the Verdon Cemetery and Tecumseh Cemetery, as well as the Wilcox Cemetery at Burr.

Moyer recognizes the historic nature of an old cemetery, and the respect that should be afforded to those who rest there and their

Jerry Sandusky, the former defensive coordinator for Penn State’s football team and accused pedophile, curiously resigned his position in 1999, while in his mid-50s. He had twice been named the top assistant coach in college football and was reportedly next in line for the top spot at Penn State when Joe Paterno decided to hang it up. Of course, Joe never decided to hang it up. That was decided for him. And Sandusky never took another coaching job. He just sort of faded away, apparently not even contacted when coaching vacancies, both college and pro, went vacant. The top defensive coach in college football “retires” at age 55 and no one comes calling? Instead, Sandusky volunteers with a high school program or two and devotes his time to a foundation he helped organize that reaches out to boys in need of a second chance. Young boys.

By all appearance, a number of those boys (currently eight), got no second chance at all. Instead, they allegedly were subjected to the most abhorrent, repugnant behavior imaginable. They were forced to suffer, some for years, at the hand of a perverted man disguised as a friend and mentor. The mental suffering will never end for them. One of the victims told his mom, “You just can’t tell Jerry no.”

This is not the first time and it won’t be the last. The way the nightmare was handled is not unique, either, as institutions scramble to save reputations by sweeping unwanted truths under the rug. The trust they have accumulated and the good works they do cannot be undermined by the actions of one or a few, they reason.

The abuse by Sandusky reportedly took place over a span of about 15 years, but how can anyone really know for sure, except for his victims, some of whom likely won’t come forward only to re-live it all again. It is hard to believe that this awful man preyed on just a handful of children. The number of victims could be staggering.

But it is fairly safe to say that by 1998, Sandusky’s pedophilia was known — or at the very least suspected — by some, including college administrators, coaches and staff members who frequented football offices and complexes at Penn State and elsewhere in the college football world. The list would have included Paterno, who no doubt encouraged Sandusky to retire after the ‘99 season.

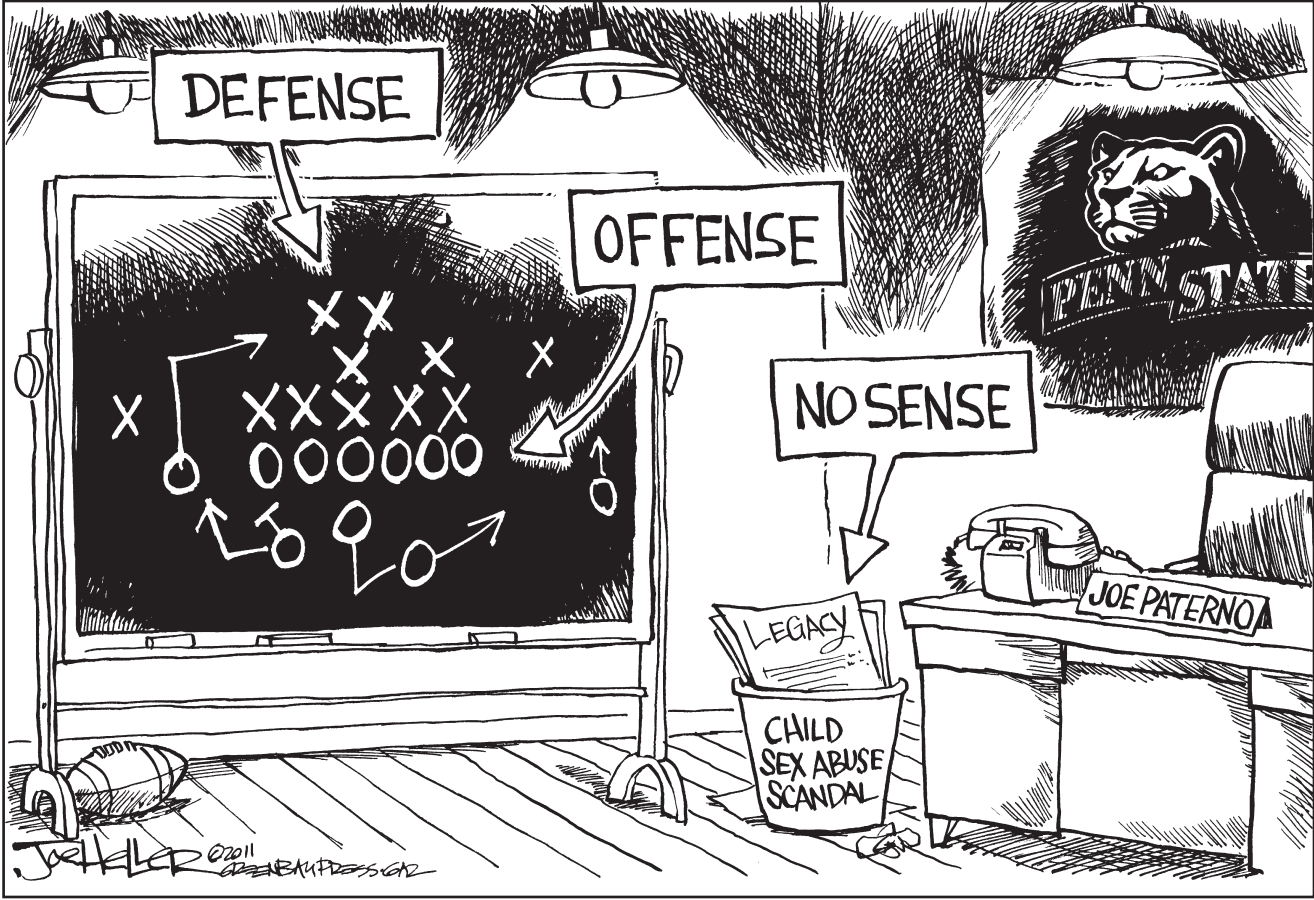
Sandusky was not, however, banned from athletic facilities. It was in the shower at one of those complexes that a grad assistant (a former Penn State quarterback and now assistant coach who is on administrative leave) said he witnessed Sandusky raping a boy of about 10 in 2002. Rather than put a stop to what he was seeing, the 28-year-old grad assistant ran and told his dad, who counseled him to contact Paterno. Paterno told a superior, but just how graphic that conversation was is being questioned.

From what I’ve read, no one at Penn State took the story to the authorities. And no one even thought to find out about the boy-victim.

All anyone did was to ban Sandusky from bringing kids to the athletic facilities.

The scandal has brought Penn State to its knees, literally. Witness the prayer session led by Husker assistant Ron Brown before Saturday’s NU-PSU game. Paterno, 84, has been fired after 60 years in the football program. The university president, athletic director and another administrator are out. Some of them face charges. Civil lawsuits will follow.

Paterno ran a clean program. That is, he didn’t cheat, his teams excelled and players graduated. But he and most likely every coach in the football program, as well as many, many others, knew of the horrors perpetrated by Sandusky. They did nothing to stop it. Basically, they looked the other way while young lives were being destroyed in the cruelest of ways.



Lifestyl changes can lower high triglycerides

DEAR DOCTOR K: I have healthy cholesterol levels, but my triglyceride level is high. What are triglycerides? And how dangerous is it to have high levels of them?

DEAR READER: Triglycerides are a type of fat. They are important because they provide energy the body needs. Our bodies convert food we eat into triglycerides. They get bundled together into small packages and travel in the blood.

Blood triglyceride levels rise rapidly right after we eat. Levels drop over the next few hours.

families. When the Journal visited last week, Moyer, Lotter and Hull were working on several gravestones, re-leveling their bases, mixing concrete to re-set them and figuring out ways to repair those in need. They had blocked out an older part of the cemetery for that week’s work.

A number of gravesites are extremely old, documenting the earliest settlers to arrive in the Rulo area. Dr. J. H. Davis is buried in the Rulo Cemetery. The Journal was unable to find information about Dr. Davis after searching Edwards’ Richardson County History.

Dr. Davis grave has a unique stone as it actually covers the grave; it never did stand. It reveals that the doctor died on April 15, 1860 at the age of 26 years, 2 months and 28 days.

Moyer and his crew will make as much progress as possible this year, then return to the site as time allows after the winter months.

The blood carries the packages of triglycerides to our cells, where they provide energy. Triglycerides that aren’t immediately needed for energy are transported to fat cells for storage.

So, you need triglycerides. But high levels of triglycerides in the blood are not good for the arteries. People with high levels have a higher risk of stroke and heart disease. This is particularly true for women after menopause.

Although some doctors may disagree, I think your blood cholesterol levels are a more important influence on your health than your blood triglyceride levels. High levels of total cholesterol and of LDL cholesterol (the so-called “bad” cholesterol) probably put you at higher risk than high levels of triglycerides. But this is no reason to ignore high levels if you have them.

You’re more likely to have high triglycerides if you are obese, drink too much alcohol or eat a diet high in saturated fats. High triglyceride levels also run in families. Although we don’t yet understand the details, your genes are likely to affect your triglyceride levels. Some people appear to be born with genes that cause their triglyceride levels to be high. They have to work harder than other people to keep their triglycerides down. Other lucky people appear to be born with genes that protect them from having high levels.

Various medical conditions, including poorly controlled diabetes and chronic kidney or liver disease, can increase your

risk for high triglycerides. So can certain medications such as prednisone, thiazide diuretics and some beta blockers.

I recommend you try to lower your triglycerides to a normal level, below 150 milligrams per deciliter. Lifestyle changes are perhaps the most powerful treatment available. Adopt a diet that emphasizes whole grains, fruits, vegetables and healthy fats. Also, get at least 30 minutes of moderate- to vigorous-intensity exercise most days. And keep your alcohol intake to a minimum.

If lifestyle changes don’t work, or if your triglyceride levels are very high, you may need medication. Triglyceride-lowering medications include niacin and fibrates.

Your doctor will determine whether you need medication. Even if you do, you almost surely will need to make lifestyle changes, too. Work with your doctor to figure out the right prescription for you.

NPPD approves rate increase

Nebraska Public Power District’s Board of Directors last week approved a 6.5 percent average rate increase for both its wholesale and retail customers. The increase will take effect Jan. 1, 2012.

NPPD’s wholesale customers include rural public power districts and municipalities, while NPPD’s retail customers are those that receive an electric bill directly from NPPD. NPPD began communicating and the need for the increase with many of its customers in early 2011.

Of the 6.5 percent rate increase, 4 percent is due primarily to a 75 percent increase in coal transportation costs next year.

“Fuel prices NPPD pays to generate electricity at its power plants continue to rise,” said President and CEO Pat Pope. “While NPPD is fortunate to rely on a diverse mix of fuel sources to produce electricity, fuel costs have risen more than 50 percent in the past five years and fuel transportation costs are rising significantly in 2012.”

The remaining 2.5 percent of the 6.5 percent increase is due to an increase in annual debt payments for necessary capital investments in electric system plants and facilities.

“In the past five years, NPPD has invested more than \$1 billion in new or existing plants and facilities,” said Pope.

NPPD’s rates are set to cover costs. Revenue received is used to pay operating expenses and make necessary investments in maintenance, construction and system upgrades. The rates do not include a profit margin.

“Keeping rates low and electric service reliable are important components of NPPD’s mission,” said Vice President and Chief Financial Officer Traci Bender. “

To minimize the rate increase in 2012, NPPD has heavily scrutinized capital and expense budgets and have either cut or reduced costs. The District is also evaluating inventory levels while reducing travel, training and outside services, and staff, where possible.

Based on preliminary data from the U.S. Department of Energy’s Energy Information Administration, the average per kilowatt-hour for NPPD customers is 7.35 cents, compared to the national average of 9.88 cents.

The actual percentage rate increase amounts in 2012 will vary depending on the type of customer class (i.e., residential versus commercial) and the amount of power used during a month’s time. The increase to NPPD’s approximately 70,000 retail residential customers, using 1,000 kilowatt-hours per month, equates to an estimated \$9 monthly cost increase.



Capitol Commentary By Charlie Litton, Nebraska News Service

LINCOLN—When the first two weeks of the Nebraska Legislature’s special pipeline session drew to a close, it remained difficult to guess what the end result will be of all this bickering. But common themes are beginning to emerge, and they might give us some insight on

what to expect as the pipeline debate continues.

From the beginning, including Gov. Dave Heineman’s call on Oct. 25, lawmakers have been extraordinarily cautious about what to expect. Boiled down to most basic terms, they all seemed to be saying: “We’ll try, but don’t get your hopes up.”

It would be easy to look at that sentiment with a cynical eye and suppose the special session is little more than political grandstanding for elected officials who are only thinking about getting re-elected.

In truth, Nebraska senators have a very thin margin of error if they enact a law that would stop, delay or reroute the Keystone XL project—TransCanada’s controversial 1,700-mile, 36-inch pipeline that proposes to pump oil through the Sandhills and the massive underlying water table on its way to Gulf Coast refineries.

The governor’s call was superficially vague, asking senators to look into legislation that related to oil pipelines. And to do so in a legally and constitutionally sound way.

The problem for senators is they can’t enact a law specifically designed to stop TransCanada because the courts generally frown on laws that don’t apply to everyone equally. So a law that says, in effect, “TransCanada Shall Not Pass,” would likely be deemed unconstitutional.

Of course, lawmakers could get around this by enacting a law that applies to all pipelines, which sounds simple enough. Only, the governor’s call was specific to legislating “oil” pipelines, which limits the Unicameral to that small corner of the pipeline sandbox.

A lot of lawmaker chatter in committee meetings revolves around this sticky issue. It seems the growing consensus is that a law specific to oil pipelines of a certain size, say 30-inches, might be enough to avoid the dreaded “special legislation” tag.

It seems a certainty that some form of oil pipeline legislation will emanate from the special session, most likely a “Frankenstein” bill that draws elements from all five of the pipeline-related proposals.

Such bill might include a permitting process through the Public Service Commission, with a final approval from the governor’s office. And that approval process might very well include routing requirements that make the Sandhills and other areas strictly off-limits. It’s also possible that companies would be required to post a hefty clean-up bond, while following new, more stringent rules about securing rights from private landowners, commonly referred to as eminent domain law.

Such a bill would go a long way to address most of the concerns from Nebraska pipeline opponents. But the big mystery remains whether a new law would affect the Keystone XL project. The best guess at this point is that question will be at the center of debate when these bills reach the Unicameral floor.

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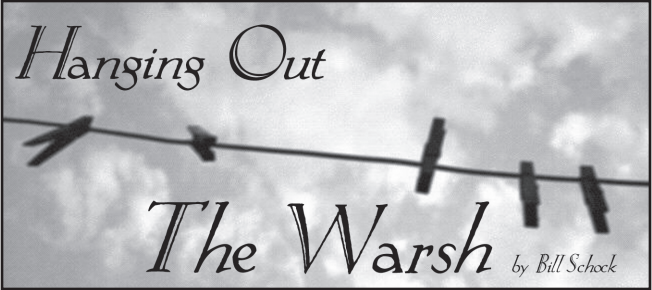


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What a Veterans Day!

And it all was in charge of Sherry Maddox, who took over the tremendous job after her husband, Marshall, passed away after organizing it for many years. Sherry is a speech/language pathologist in the public schools and has been for the past 30 years. She is an active member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary. Sherry has two sons, Alex, a junior at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, and Wade, a junior football player and wrestler at Falls City High.

Terrific job, Sherry!

It all began with an excellent program on the 11th hour of the 11th month of the 11th year and high school and middle school students from both Falls City High and Sacred Heart, in attendance and participating in the FCHS gym. And where you find a better Veterans Day speaker than Frank Hutchinson of Austin, TX, a man who has, among his prestigious efforts, scaled Mt. Everest? Being a friend of Frank's, Ret. LTC Terry Flynn of Falls City, that's where you get him.

Then came the parade down the Main Drag at 1:30, led by members of the Falls City Ceremonial Guard and the VFW Auxiliary color guard.

What makes a better parade more than bands? Sacred Heart and Falls City High School bands marched and played in perfect weather conditions. Wanda Jones took over for Del Bowers and arranged for some of the old and new vets to ride in cars with the guys' names on placards. There were motorcycles, some of whom are members of the Patriot Guard who keep the peace and more so when idiots show up at funerals for Armed Forces men and women killed in Iraq and Afghanistan.

And what could be more enthralling than having every elementary kid in the public school and Sacred Heart marching along carrying miniature flags and shouting "USA! USA! USA!" If that doesn't give you goose bumps, nothing will.

Approximately 75 veterans and their wives showed for the annual Vets Day supper, this time at St. Paul's Lutheran Church, 20th and Towle. Sherry Maddox was the emcee and the Rev. Andrew Chavanak prayed the blessing. Frank Hutchinson again was the speaker, relating to his audience the extremely hazardous and frigid 30 days it took for him to climb Mt. Everest in 2009. That 's 29,029 feet up into the sky, pardners, were the temps hits 50 below. He narrated some beautiful color slides taken on the perilous climb. There were emotional moments as he recalled teammates and the very professional Sherpas, ("incredible human beings," he called them) who make it all possible.

Much of the talk was included in his morning's presentation at the High School. Think of this: On the South Col (26,000 feet), climbers enter the death zone. There are only two or three days at this altitude for making summit tries. Clear weather (which they didn't always have) and low winds are critical factors in deciding whether to make a summit attempt. And long the way Frank had become seriously ill. 'Reminisce' showcases artists

Friday evening, Nov. 4, the Richardson County Arts and Humanities Council hosted approximately 40 people for the opening of "Reminisce," a juried art show and competition that showcases local and regional artists. The show will hang in the Stalder Gallery of the Falls City Library and Arts Center through December, and it can be viewed during regular library hours.
Since the show was also a juried art competition, Juror Karen Kunc spent 1 1/2 hours alone with the artwork in the gallery to decide on the awards. Karen is a UNL professor of art and is also a printmaker.
According to gallery curator Christina Wertenberger, Kunc delivered an amazing talk about the art and congratulated the artists in the exhibition for "putting themselves out for the public to see." She then presented the following awards: 1st place, Virgil Brackhahn of Beatrice for his woodcut "Nemaha Brewery," 2nd place, Heath Miller of Lincoln for his painting "Mike Ditka," and 3rd place, Christina Wertenberger of Falls City, for her drawing "Shadows of my Past."
The award for Best use of Theme went to Bill Coulter of Brownville for his painting titled "Who Knows?" Honorable Mention honors were given to Harlan Schuster of Sabetha, Tootie Ebel of Falls City, and Ken Anderson of Peru.
The idea for a local artist exhibition grew from Falls City's connection to two nationally-recognized artists. The late John Falter and the late Alice Cleaver were both natives of this community. Falter's "Falls City Christmas" painting, and Cleaver's "Aunt Nettie" portrait will both hang in the gallery through the end of the year. Both are on loan from Nebraska galleries. The Falter piece is owned by the Nebraska State Historical Society, and the Cleaver work is on loan from the Museum of Nebraska Art (MONA) in Kearney.
According to Wertenberger, the "Aunt Nettie" portrait was recently refurbished by Mary Schafer, conservator at the Nelson-Atkins Museum in Kansas City. The restoration was part of the "adopt a painting" project sponsored by MONA. Local art enthusiast (and Humanities Council supporter) Merle Stalder sponsored the painting's restoration. He also arranged for its exhibition in Cleaver's hometown, a contribution for which the council is most grateful.
Wertenberger also stated that Merle revealed two interesting side-notes regarding the painting. Alice Cleaver used a yard stick from the Falls City Art Shop as her stretcher bars for the canvas. When restoring the painting, Schafer was able to keep the original stretcher strips, and she showcased them with plexi-glass on the back of the painting.
Secondly, Merle noted that Stella residents Christina Joy and Jan McMullen deserve recognition for possibly identifying the "Aunt Nettie" in Cleaver's painting. According to Merle, the ladies researched the painting after he approached Jan about the woman's identity. Through their research, they determined that the woman is Nettie Montgomery, the wife of a doctor who practiced in Stella. She would have possibly known Alice Cleaver and the two would have been peer artists.
The painting came to MONA through Robert Tynan Jr., who was from Stella but lived in Chicago. It is believed that his father bought the painting from Nettie's estate. On Robert Jr.'s passing, his widow considered giving "Aunt Nettie" to the Chicago Art Institute, but instead gifted it to MONA.
The "Reminisce" exhibition will be on display through the month of December. Various artworks are for sale by the artists, and replica post-cards have been printed, and are for sale in the library's gift shop.

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Lime can help production

In a previous article this fall we discussed soil-sampling fields, especially if yields were either lower or higher than expected.

The pH of your soil is also very important and crops may respond favorably to lime applications. Have you checked the pH of your soil recently? Sometimes by raising the pH of your land, you may increase its productivity by increasing the availability of some of the nutrients. Many of the soil nutrients, such as phosphorus, potassium, and nitrogen are more readily available to plants when the pH is neutral, or around 7. Some legumes are very sensitive to pH. If your salt pH is in the 4.5-6 range, soybean yields may increase up to 15% by raising your pH between the 6-7 range. Legumes in pastures such as alfalfa and red clover are more productive, are easier to establish, and can be maintained easier at pH levels closer to 7.








An on-farm study conducted in eastern Nebraska from 1995-2005 showed the benefits and profitability of the addition of lime to a low pH soil in a corn-soybean rotation. By 1999 costs of lime application were recovered through increased crop yields, with a cumulative net return of \$137 per acre by 2005. With no-till, it is recommended to apply one-half of the recommended lime amount on the surface, soil sample 4-5 years later and determine if more lime is needed at this time. If a field needs 4 tons/acre, apply 2 tons/acre, then check after 4-5 years and apply the other 2 tons/acre if the pH is low.

The other concern is if a tenant is cash renting land and pays for liming. It is important that the tenant have an agreement with the landlord if the rent is terminated prior to getting full benefit of the lime, which may be up to 6 years or longer under no-till conditions.

In certain no-till cropping situations where soil is very acidic, below 5.0, it is advisable to apply all the lime and till it in. If you do not want to till the soil, do not apply too much lime at one application. This may cause a very high pH on the surface and interfere with the activity of your herbicide. It can also cause an iron chlorosis problem in soybeans, limiting the uptake of iron in the high soil pH on the soil surface. I have seen this occur on a Missouri River bottom field in Missouri. Liming of soil is a long-term investment. If lime is applied on the surface in a pasture, hay field, or in a no-till system, it may take a few years before it works down into the soil. It is important to keep records on when lime and other nutrients were last applied. 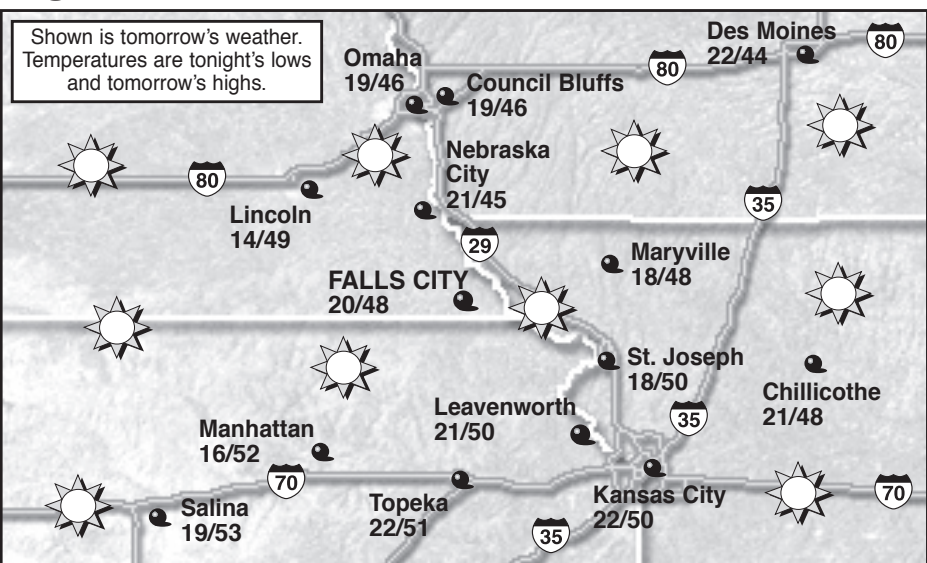

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“Soldiers of Christ”

Have you ever taken a second to think of all the different ways a Christian is described? When one reads the New Testament, he can not help but to be struck by the many different ways God chose to describe His people. In one passage, Paul tells Timothy to be a good soldier, “You therefore must endure hardship as a good soldier of Jesus Christ. No one engaged in warfare entangles himself with the affairs of this life, that he may please him who enlisted him as a soldier” (2 Timothy 2:3-4). Christians are soldiers in God's army. But what does that mean?

Being a good soldier of Christ means that we realize **we are in a war**. “For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this age, against spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places” (Ephesians 6:12). The war of a Christian is not a physical war, fought against men and machines, but a spiritual war, fought against the evil forces of this world. Anyone who stands against God is the enemy. The weapon a Christian is to use

in battle is “the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God” (Ephesians 6:17).

Being a Christian soldier also means, as Paul stated in 2 Timothy 2:3, that **we will endure suffering**, “You therefore must endure hardship as a good soldier of Jesus Christ.” Paul tells us that all who follow Christ will suffer persecution, “...all who desire to live godly in Christ Jesus will suffer persecution” (2 Timothy 3:12).

Being a soldier of Christ also means that **we must stay loyal to our commander and no other**. One tactic that an enemy may sometimes use is to give orders to units in the opposing army attempting to mislead them. Satan is working that way against God's army. Satan has his military give false orders to believers. We see this conflict through the huge number of denominations and divisions in the world. The sad fact is that these denominations are following men and not Christ. Of those who do such, Jesus says, “In vain they worship Me, teaching as doctrines the commandments of men” (Matthew 15:9).

Soldiers of Christ must make sure that the orders that we receive are from our headquarters (heaven). **Our orders come from the Bible and nowhere else**. “All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and

is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness, that the man of God may be complete, thoroughly equipped for every good work” (2 Timothy 3:16-17).

Finally, to be a soldier in God's army, **we must “enlist”** in His army. Salvation is found by being in the Lord's army: His church. When 3,000 were baptized on the birth day of the church, the Bible says, “There were added unto them in that day about 3,000 souls ... And the Lord added to the church daily, such as were being saved” (Acts 2:41,47). Again, in Ephesians 5:23, Christ is called “the Savior of the body” (and the church is that body, Ephesians 1:22,23). It is not the church that saves, **the church is the saved, and Christ is the Savior**.

How then, do we become a soldiers for Christ? In order to do that, we must hear the Word of God. “So then faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God” (Romans 10:17). We must believe that Christ is the Son of God. Jesus said, “If you do not believe that I am He, you will die in your sins” (John 8:24). We must repent of our sins. “Repent, and let every one of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins; and you shall receive

the gift of the Holy Spirit” (Acts 2:38). We must confess our belief in Christ. “For with the heart one believes unto righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation” (Romans 10:10). And we must be baptized into Christ. “For you are all sons of God through faith in Christ Jesus. For as many of you as were baptized into Christ have put on Christ (Galatians 2:26-27). “Repent, and let every one of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins...” (Acts 2:38). “And now why are you waiting? Arise and be baptized, and wash away your sins, calling on the name of the Lord” (Acts 22:16).

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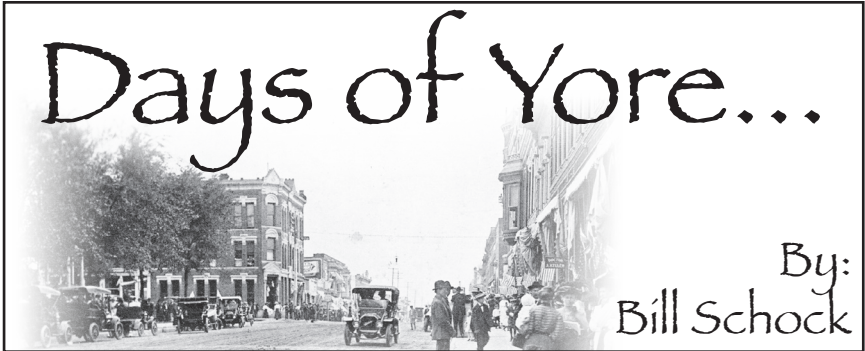

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Nebraska leaving MoRAST

Gov. Dave Heineman has announced Nebraska's departure from the Missouri River Association of States and Tribes because remaining in the association is not in the best interest of Nebraska. Since his announcement, Iowa has also departed the organization.

"Our highest priority is protecting our citizens' homes, farmers and ranchers, and businesses along the Missouri River," said Gov. Dave Heineman. "Our efforts must focus on flood control as the highest priority in operation of the Missouri River mainstem system. I believe it is currently in Nebraska's best interest to engage more directly with those states and federal partners through other means."

Governors and representatives from Missouri River Basin States recently held two meetings in Omaha to discuss issues and concerns related to Missouri River flood control. The result of those meetings was to form a Missouri River Working Group to coordinate and actively address matters pertaining to Missouri River flooding. These Governors and their representatives have stated a clear consensus that flood control must be the highest priority in operation of the mainstem system. MoRAST is made up of representatives of both a water management agency and a fish and wildlife agency. Through discussion related to this year's historic flooding, concerns have been raised that MoRAST may not prioritize protection of citizens' homes, farmers and ranchers, and businesses.

Youth Corn Challenge

Today’s agricultural world faces several challenges, one of them being the decline of our most valuable resource, the future workforce. While Nebraska’s population under 18 years of age grew between the years of 2000 and 2009, this increase was seen in only 10 of the 93 counties. One strategy to keep youth in rural communities and involved in production agriculture is to involve them in projects that encourage active participation and demonstrate the wide array of careers related to production agriculture.

UNL Extension and the Nebraska Corn Board have teamed up to offer the first Innovative Youth Corn Challenge contest. This contest, open to 4-H members (age 10 and older as of Jan. 1st) or FFA members (in-school members), will guide youth through all aspects of corn production, as well as the agricultural careers related to corn production. Youth will be challenged to implement a production practice different than normal to determine if they increased their yield. Economics and sustainability of the practice will also be considered. Yields, cropping history, and production information will be collected in the Corn Yield Challenge management summary.

Goals of the contest are: achieve new, innovative, and economically feasible crop production

methods to improve yields; provide research data for producers to implement in their operations; distribute data to corn producers, researchers, and agri-businesses for decision making purposes; introduce youth to a variety of agronomic professionals, including corn producers.

Youth will work with an adult mentor throughout the process.

Mentors can be extension faculty, ag teachers, or other qualified agronomy professionals.

Cash prizes and plaques will be given to the first, second, and third place teams. First place will receive \$1,000, second place will receive \$500, and third place will receive \$250. A data completion and innovation award will also be given.

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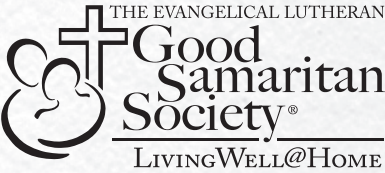

Feeding 7 billion people incredible challege for ag

Take it from a guy who helps feed the world: There’s nothing quite like surveying a field comprising a healthy new crop breed your research team helped create and recalling, years earlier, “when you held all the seed of it in the palm of your hand.”

P. Stephen Baenziger, University of Nebraska-Lincoln small grains breeder, brought his passion about his work to a talk titled “Setting the Stage: Why Agriculture?” Baenziger was the second speaker in the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources’ Heuermann Lecture series, which focuses on meeting the world’s growing food and renewable energy needs while sustaining natural resources and the rural communities in which food grows.

Baenziger has been the front lines of that work his entire career, including 25 years at UNL. He inherited and built on a grains-breeding program that has produced wheat breeds now planted on 66 percent of Nebraska wheat acres, as well as in nearby states. He emphasized Thursday, as he has throughout his UNL career, that this work is achieved by a skilled team.

think about how he could honor it. “I believe in what they are doing,” he said of the men and women serving in the military. His thoughts led him to a 2009 climb of the world’s highest peak, Mt. Everest. Details of that climb can be found in a related Veterans Day story in today’s Journal, and from an interview to be published next week.

He said Mt. Everest is “one of the holiest places on earth” for millions of people, and, for him, “the closest place to God.”

Hutchinson carried on that climb were two leather-bound volumes, one containing the names of service members who lost their lives in Iraq and Afghanistan. The other, a tribute of all of this nation’s warriors who have served in the conflicts. The volumes made it to the peak, but Hutchinson was not the carrier for the “final push.”

“These men and women who serve the nation have carved



their names into the granite of history,” he said. Hutchinson’s ongoing efforts “are not about

me,” he noted, while urging all in attendance to “share the story” he told.

“Serve your community,” the speaker urged. “Reach out to the veterans in this room.” He said service to community and nation can come in many forms. Hutchinson said he had visited the War Memorial on the Richardson County Courthouse lawn. He suggested all do the same and “run your fingers over the names” of those who have made the ultimate sacrifice.

“We can all do that,” he concluded.
