# Council meets for just five minutes

During a 5-minute meeting Monday, Nov. 19, the City Council held two public hearings and approved Chamber of Commerce requests for the Nov. 23 Christmas Window Opening celebration downtown.

No one from the public spoke during either of the public hearings, one regarding a mid-project review of Phase II of the Downtown Revitalization Project. This hearing was required to meet HUD requirements. HUD funds are incorporated in the project through a Nebraska Department of Economic Development CDBG grant in the amount of \$350,000.

The second hearing also in-

volved HUD requirements — a mid-project review of the Owner Occupied Housing Rehabilitation Grant (again, through a NDED CDBG grant). A total of \$250,000 in CDBG funds was awarded to the City of Falls City for the rehab projects.

Chamber of Commerce/Main Street Falls City Executive Director Eric Barr appeared before the Council to inform them of the planned Nov. 23 activities. The Council voted to approve the Chamber request.

At the outset of the meeting, Mayor Tim Hersh thanked all of the candidates who sought elected positions on the Council during the recent election. He offered his congratulations to those who won seats.

# State Board of Ed Award to Kathy Bartek

Falls City Public School Board member Kathy Bartek, a 24-year veteran of the District 56 BOE, has been awarded the Ann Mactier Leadership for Learning Award by the Nebraska State Board of Education and the Nebraska Association of School

The award was presented at the 2012 State Education Conference at the Embassy Suites Conference Center in La Vista Nov. 16.

For a majority of her school board career, Bartek has also offered wisdom, support, and good humor to the Nebraska Association of School Boards. She has served on just about every committee NASB has ever called together, and she ultimately served as the organization's President in 2000.

Kathy, who earned another term by district voters earlier this month, was heralded for her work with school districts of all sizes, as a long-time participant in the Greater Nebraska Schools Association and the Nebraska Rural and Community Schools Association. She continues in her commitment to quality local leadership as a charter board member with the Nebraska Public Leadership Foundation. Currently, Kathy is the only Level IX (accumulated points for board member activities) school board member in Nebraska.

Bartek's professional and volunteer contributions to the Falls City community were also cited, including her work with the "Good Beginnings" program, providing services to new mothers and their babies. Her many civic and volunteer activities which contributed in schools and communities. She leads the adult diabetic education program in her community. She has been a Sunday School teacher, served on her local Chamber of Commerce, and participated many years in band, chorus and the Tiger Booster Clubs.

Many people who have worked with Bartek have been moved by her presence. On their nomination forms, school board leaders from throughout the state have expressed their admiration. Kathy Danek of Lincoln says, "Kathy has provided a calm sense of leadership, a compassioned will to get things accomplished, a friendly hand to new board members – both locally and statewide – and

a voice for Nebraska's school children."



A night for shivering while waiting for Santa to kick off the 2012 holiday season in downtown Falls City awaited folks Friday night during the annual Christmas Window Opening, Nov. 23. Santa and his elves arrived on a horse-drawn sleigh, then

made their way to the Santa house on the northeast corner of 17<sup>th</sup> and Stone. Sleigh rides continued through the evening. A hardy bunch of holiday hopefuls braved the cold temperatures and brisk winds to attend the event.



I continue to read the "Disunion" stories that appear regularly in the New York Times as that newspaper commemorates the 150th anniversary of the most savage and costly war in this nation's history, the Civil War. Written by historians, the accounts are fascinating and informative and, frankly, very sad. I recall being in classrooms at Northwest Missouri State, where the chairman of the history department provided various explanations for why the nation went to war against itself. In the end, the reason was slavery.

One of the most recent accounts, written by Terry L. Jones, is entitled "Under the Knife." The topic: battlefield surgery. Most specifically, amputations. There were a lot of them.

I'd always presumed that anesthesia was unavailable on Civil War battlefields, but according to Jones, that was not necessarily the case. Chloroform was available and was routinely used, on both sides of the battlefields. Surgeons would use a scalpel to cut around the damaged limb, then apply the bone saw. In an account in his article, Jones notes that Confederate Maj. General Richard S. Ewell was fighting with his troops on Aug. 28, 1862, during the Second Bull Run campaign in Virginia. A ball hit him in the left kneecap, causing extreme damage. His leg was amputated the next

After sedating the Major General, a scalpel was used to cut around the leg just above the knee. Ewell did not respond to this procedure. Then came the bone saw. According to Jones, the Major General then "stretched both arms upward and said: 'Oh, My God!""

During the war, Jones reports, 250 Confederate generals were wounded and 24 experienced amputations. Ewell survived and later returned to duty with an artificial leg.

Most soldiers — on both sides — did not survive wounds to the chest, head or stomach. So surgeons largely attended to damage to limb bones. While "resections," which at least preserved the limbs (although they were largely limp and useless), were performed, amputation was common. Speed was of essence to avoid blood loss. According to Jones, the average amputation at the knee took three minutes.

Because of lighting and ventilation needs, most amputations were performed outdoors and were witnessed by thousands of soldiers, Jones' account states. In many cases, the amputations were witnessed by those next in line. Amputated limbs were thrown into growing piles. Jones' account notes that after the Battle of Fredericksburg, in December 1862, "Union surgeons performed almost 500 amputations."

The nickname "Saw-bones" quickly became used to describe Civil War surgeons. In fact, they were employing amputation in an effort to save lives before infection set in.

About three out of four soldiers survived amputations, Jones asserts. The author points out that survival was often random, citing two Union soldiers who experienced finger wounds in the Atlanta campaign. One treated himself by cutting off his finger with a pocket knife, wrapping the stub in a handkerchief until it could be dressed. The other went to the surgeon and had his finger amputated. Gangrene set in and the soldier's arm was amputated at the shoulder. He died soon thereafter. The soldier who had cut off his own finger survived.

Jones states that amputation was the "most common Civil War surgical procedure." Approximately 30,000 were performed by Union surgeons. During World War II, slightly more than 16,000 amputations were performed by U.S. surgeons.

Certainly warfare has changed, dramatically, since the Civil War. But we witnessed in Vietnam, and later in Iraq and now Afghanistan, that enemies have embraced the effort to maim, not necessarily kill. As barbaric as it is, a soldier returning home with a significant, life-altering injury is intended to send a message. And it's effective.

# Means was catalyst at 2<sup>nd</sup> Battle of Wounded Knee

Dogs were treated better than Native Americans in Nebraska towns bordering the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation, said American Indian Movement leader and activist Russell Means sometime before the 71-day siege of Wounded Knee that began Feb. 27, 1973, a little more than a month after a Unity Conference held in Scottsbluff.

Means, 72, who died Oct. 22 of complications from throat cancer, had also led a group of 200 Native Americans to Gordon, NE, a year earlier following the death of Raymond Yellow Thunder. The 51-year-old Oglala Sioux had been abducted and beaten by two white men in Gordon and then paraded, half-naked, around an American Legion dance, stuffed into the trunk of a car and later abandoned at a Laundromat. His body was found and police arrested brothers Leslie and Melvin Hare, but released them without bail. AIM's call for justice was heeded and the brothers were tried and convicted and served prison time for the murder.

Throughout 1972, tension mounted with the election of Dick Wilson as President of the Pine Ridge Reservation. Wilson, an outspoken opponent of AIM, hired a private army called the Guardians of the Oglala Nation, or GOONS. The group was linked to beatings, acts of terror and even the death of AIM supporters. A riot on the steps of the Custer County (S.D.) Court House resulted in several injuries and a lot of property damage.

Following the Scottsbluff event, AIM turned its caravan of some 200 cars toward the Pine Ridge with an initial plan of going to town and removing the corrupt Bureau of Indian Affairs officials from office, Means and others said. The movement started on a Sunday night after dark and the Associated Press Bureau in Omaha received a tip that something was going to happen. AP editor, Ed Howard, called me (I was working as a reporter in Scottsbluff) and asked me to confirm the report. I checked with law enforcement in South Dakota who said they had seen movement toward Wounded Knee, the small hamlet that had been the site of a massacre of some 300 members of Chief Big Foot's party in 1890 at what some incorrectly called the Battle of Wounded Knee.

Moments later I received a telephone call from Leroy Casados in Alliance – one of the attendees at the Scottsbluff Unity Conference -- asking me to join him and several others as they drove his van to South Dakota. I declined the offer, but let the AP know that the siege had begun. I opted to head to the area by light of the next day and convinced a pilot friend to fly me and a TV reporter and cameraman to Gordon where we could rent a car for the drive into Wounded Knee on the Bigfoot Trail.

AIM leaders had scrapped the Pine Ridge plans because, as one said later, "they had the place completely fortified and had Federal Marshals and BIA pigs all around it, and sand-bags on top, machine guns, and fortifications all over the town. So in order to avoid that kind of pitched battle, we decided to come to Wounded Knee, because of its historic significance to our people, naturally, and the fact that it lies right in the heart of the Pine Ridge Reservation."

The trip from Gordon to Wounded Knee was uneventful. When we got to a spot on the Big Foot asphalt where we knew we could see Wounded Knee over the edge of the road, we stopped our car and got out to take pictures. We were confronted by heavily armed federal marshals who told us to leave the area immediately for our own protection. Staring down the barrel of what I later learned was a military assault rifle I complied and returned to Gordon.

Still wanting a look at the hamlet, I asked the fixed base operator at the Gordon Airport to fly me over Wounded Knee in a Piper usually used for aerial tracking and hunting of coyotes. He obliged and I began taking photos with my 35 mm camera. When I noticed puffs of white smoke, I asked the pilot what they were.

'They're shooting at us," was his unusually calm reply. I don't recall asking who "they" were, and I still don't know if it was the government or the Native Americans doing the shooting. He landed the plane at the Pine Ridge Airport as he noticed bigger aircraft coming from Denver with national TV crews sent to cover the event. He said he wouldn't charge me for my flight if I helped him convince some of the newcomers to take a dangerous and - I'm guessing "costly" -- flight over the area.

# **Guest Editorial**

Welcome to the 2011-2012 State of the Schools Report.

The State of Nebraska conducts statewide reading, math, science and writing assessments so parents, patrons, school boards, su-



perintendents, principals, teachers and students can review and compare the results of the state assessments from one district to the next. This data is very helpful in improving both student and school academic performance.

In the spring of every year, students are tested in grades 3-8 and 11. The results of the state assessment are then reported to the public in the State of the Schools Report, which includes NePAS (Nebraska Performance Accountability System) data and No Child Left Behind Adequate Yearly Progress data. This report provides K-12 Public School information for the State of Nebraska as

well as for individual school districts and school buildings. The full report can be found at: http://www.education.ne.gov/

The basis of the new accountability system is NeSA statwide test results, which indicate student learning based on state standards developed to measure college and career readiness. Our overarching goal for students is that they will be college and career ready when they graduate so they have a successful work, military and/or college experience.

The purpose of NePAS is to inform policymakers, the public, and school officials about school district performance. The new accountability system provides information about the progress of districts by looking at state test scale scores in a category called STATUS. As well as IMPROVEMENT and GROWTH.

NePAS ranks school districts by the following grade-level configurations:

- NePAS Elementary Grade-Level Configuration; Grades 3-5
   NePAS Middle Grade-Level Configuration; Grades 6-8
- NePAS Secondary Grade-Level Configuration; Grades 9-12
- NePAS District-Level Configuration; Grades 3-12

It's important to understand that districts are ranked, not school buildings or individual grades. Multiple measures of rankings are involved to provide more comprehensive information because using only one ranking to make a judgment about a district is discouraged just as we discourage making judgments about a student on just one test score. In Falls City's case, the NePAS grade-level configuration match our local configuration.

In order to provide a summary of the State of the Schools Report as it relates to the Falls City Public Schools, NeSA district-wide assessment information indicates:

- Falls City High ranks in the top five C-1 high schools in Reading.
- We now have three years of reading data and Falls City High is one of only eight C-1 schools to demonstrate improvement and growth in scores every year.
- FCPS elementary and high school students exceeded the state average in performance IMPROVEMENT for both reading and math when comparing 2012 to 2011.
- Seventy-eight percent of FCPS students are meeting or exceeding the state reading standards, compared to 67% in 2010.
- The state writing scores for grades 4, 8 and 11, which were initially released last May, indicate an average of 74.74% of FCPS students met or exceeded the state writing assessment, as compared to a state average of 72%.
- Nearly 77 % percent of FCPS students met or exceeded the state science standards, compared to a state average of 67%. Science standards as well as the state's science test have been revised, increasing the rigor of the standards and the tests with the goal of ensuring Nebraska students are career and college ready by the time they graduate from high school.

The assessment results prove that FCPS students are continuing to improve their scores in reading, demonstrating a top strength for the students of the FCPS. Not only did our students show improvement, but they rank among the top schools in reading performance. An example would be Falls City High, ranking 20<sup>th</sup> out of 227 districts, and the elementary ranking in the top half of districts as well. These particular strengths can be attributed to key instructional strategies being implemented that include increased time of instruction in reading, comprehensive and frequent data analysis through Response to Intervention, professional learning communities, a rigorous core curriculum, strong parental support, and the district school improvement goal of improving literacy skills for all students.

Math and science are also a top strength for the students in the Falls City Public Schools. The elementary and high school, far exceed the state in growth and improvement in math and science skills. Improved curriculum materials, more time spent on teaching math and science, and parental support are key instructional strategies impacting the achievement gains.

A primary area the district must improve is middle-level achievement. For two consecutive years the middle school has not met the state goals in the reading and math subject areas considering all the eligible groups in the middle-level grades configuration. Additionally, the middle school is identified as being in need of improvement at this level. We are currently taking a straightforward approach to improve the content delivery, increased exposure to core curriculum, professional development, and intervention practices based on current and frequent performance data analysis, and improvement is expected.

Another area of focus as we move forward will be to address the high school graduation rate, which is now calculated on a four-year cohort method. Providing increased support, academic options and services to at-risk youth in our community continues to be an increasing challenge. Locally, our faculty and administration work closely with students, parents, and the legal system, when necessary, to improve a student's chances of successfully completing high school and earning a diploma.

Reading, writing, mathematics and science are essential skills in the workplace and at college. The board of education, administration, faculty, and staff work extremely hard to ensure our students graduate with strong skills that will help them become innovative, resourceful, resilient, and responsible citizens.

# Election results, revisited

The Journal delayed its publishing day until the Wednesday after the election, providing as much up-to-date information as possible. Then, we forgot to provide the final numbers. Thanks to County Clerk Mary Eickhoff for the reminder.

A total of 61.67 percent of registered voters in Richardson County cast ballots. As expected, the Romney/Ryan ticket garnered the majority in the presidential election, with over 65 percent. Deb Fischer earned just over 62 percent of the county vote, and Congressman Adrian Smith registered almost 67 percent of the vote.

County Commissioner Chairman David Sickel received 71.57 of the District 2 vote and James Standerford earned the District 3 Commissioner seat with 53.98 percent of the ballots cast. Jerry Joy of Stella, who lost a close race to Dan Watermeier, prevailed in the county at 56.40 percent.

Former Nebraska Senator Lavon Heidemann easily won the vote for University Board of Regents, with more than 77 percent of the local vote. Ted Godemann, Norm Fritz and Charles Duryea were the Nemaha NRD board leaders, and Lana Willman received nearly 100 percent of the votes for ESU District 2 board membership.

Elected to the Noxious Weed Board were Eldon Snoke, Dan Wittwer and Darren Eickhoff. School board balloting was close. For District 56, top votegetters were Ed Harris, Kathy Bartek and Scott Hollens. In the HTRS District, the winners were Rock Herr, Mike Bredemeier and Sandy Stalder.

Mike Dougherty won the Council seat in Falls City Ward 1. Angie Nolte prevailed in Ward 2, Steve Scholl in Ward 3 and Jim Wisdom in Ward 4. Ed O'Grady earned election on the Falls City Airport Authority board

The ballot issue regarding a burning ban in Falls City was narrowly defeated, by about seven percentage points.

In Humboldt, Jason James prevailed in the race for Ward 1 Council. In Ward 2, the winner was Crystal Dunekacke.

Seats on Village Boards were won by Steve Darveau, Randy Handley and Cortisa Handley in Barada, Phil Fisher and Anna Burns in Dawson, Glen Kelley and Kraig Coonce in Rulo, Ron Chandler, Mary Jane Wessel and Trudy Rowley in Salem, Gina Steele, Deb Shafer and Nathan Handley in Shubert, Adam Stanley, Heath Stanley and Allen McNeely in Stella, and Bill Guilliams, Gary Cochran and James Cockerham in Verdon (an automatic recount was held Nov. 9, with no change in votes).

Voters opted to dissolve the Weed Board by an overwhelming majority.

# How fast is your Internet?

People often complain about their Internet service, but no one ever does anything about it. Well, here's your chance: Nebraska's Public Service Commission wants Nebraskans to take a simple, fast online test that will capture their current Internet speed into a statewide database.

This information could help both policymakers and Internet consumers improve service, PSC officials say.

A website, broadbandmap. nebraska.gov, is part of the Nebraska Broadband Initiative, which aims to increase broadband access and adoption, especially in unserved or underserved areas. The PSC contracted with BroadMap to collect, verify, report and map broadband availability by location throughout Nebraska.

Site visitors will find instructions for conducting a test of their broadband Internet service speed at the time the test is conducted. It takes only seconds and results will appear and be automatically added to a report compiling broadband service speeds across Nebraska.

There's also a place for site visitors to provide feedback on their Internet access.

Commissioner Rod Johnson, chairman of the PSC, said the goal is to capture the current state of broadband availability in Nebraska.

"We're collecting data about availability of broadband by location," he added. "We're also working on projects that influence adoption of broadband. One important use for this information is to be able to incent providers to go places that are unserved or underserved."

Johnson noted that most households in Nebraska do have at least one option for highspeed Internet service, though "sometimes it's not the option consumers want."

Various funding options exist for providing or expanding the availability of broadband service, including state and federal grants, but having valid, upto-date information is critical to targeting that funding, Johnson

"As you make any policy decisions around broadband, the best decisions are made when you have the most important current data about it so you're not funding something that's not necessary or overlooking a spot that needs assistance," said Anne Boyle, PSC vice chairwoman.

Both commissioners noted that consumer input can help

the PSC make corrections to the data used to produce its map of service providers available in Nebraska.

Much of the state has at least five providers of broadband access available. Informed consumers can make the best decisions, Johnson and Boyle said.

The State Broadband Initiative grant program is administered by the National Telecommunications and Information Administration. Partners with the PSC include the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, the Nebraska Information Technology Commission's Community Council, the Nebraska Department of Economic Development and the AIM Institute. They are working to develop and implement statewide and regional planning efforts to increase adoption and acceptance of broadband services across Nebraska.

As with every NWCA training, superintendents answered morning and afternoon roll call. Each day ends with an exam that superintendents must complete and pass to obtain the hours needed.


The one remaining opportunity for continuing education hours for this year is the Nebraska Association of County Officials Conference in Kearney in December.

The Falls City Rural Fire Department was called out shortly after 3 a.m. Friday to the house located about five miles northwest of Falls City at 64703 708 Road.

The home is owned by Marvin Arnold, who rents the house out to Tom Vitale and his family. Seven children and two adults were sleeping in the house when, according to Vitale, an electrical fire erupted in the kitchen, which is located on the first floor.

Four children were asleep upstairs, but scrambled out to safety with the help of 12-yearold Blake Vitale. The FC Middle School student pulled children ages 10, 9 and 8 down a flight of stairs and out of the house.

The elder Vitale was asleep in a bedroom adjacent to the kitchen, as were two five-year-olds and a two-year-old infant. He was able to get all the kids out of the burning building, but said the kitchen ceiling collapsed just as they were flee-

Firemen were on the scene until about 8:20 a.m. and were called back due to a flare-up later in

The family was only able to get out of the house with what clothing they had on. The American Red Cross was called to help the family with clothing and immediate needs.

Fourteen members of the FCRFD responded to the call along with a tanker and two firemen with the Verdon Rural fire Dept. and one Shubert firefighter.

# Review Medicare, drug coverage options

Filling the gaps in Medicare coverage is not a one-size-fits-all proposition. Instead Medicare offers people a number of options to meet their healthcare needs. And those on Medicare have from now until Dec. 7 to assess the coverage they have and decide whether they should make changes for the coming year.

Each fall during open enrollment some 50 million Medicare beneficiaries get the chance to choose new coverage to plug the gaps in Medicare and review their prescription drug benefits. Medicare doesn't cover everything. There are deductibles for hospital and doctor services and a lot of coinsurance to pay for physician visits, outpatient hospital care and lab tests—20 percent of the bill to be exact. So most people buy insurance to cover those expenses.

In the last five years the options for doing that have multiplied making the task of choosing a plan much harder. Joe Baker, who heads the Medicare Rights Center in New York City, says that about one quarter of beneficiaries don't even know about open enrollment, and others are scared or confused by all the choices. What to do?

If you have a retiree plan from your employer, you probably want to keep it. Although rarer than they used to be, they do a great job of covering the gaps and usually offer very good drug coverage. Next come the traditional Medigap policies, still the gold standard for most people. Designated by letters of the alphabet, each one offers somewhat different coverage. The most popular plans, F and C, cover just about all the gaps. Seniors still must buy separate prescription drug coverage, but Medigaps allow you the freedom to choose your own doctor and there aren't a bunch of rules about staying in a network of providers to get care.

In the last few years private insurers have begun selling Medicare Advantage (MA)

plans, which are managed care plans with lots of rules about which doctors you can use. They often include drug coverage and may offer extra benefits like gym memberships or some dental or vision coverage. They may be cheaper than a Medigap policy, which makes them attractive. However, only about 12 percent of Nebraskans have bought these plans. "Cheaper doesn't mean better coverage," Baker cautions.

When you choose a Medicare Advantage plan, you give up your traditional Medicare benefits, which are instead provided by the insurer. (The federal government gives them money to do that.) Even though benefits must be equivalent, in a technical sense, you may find accessing those benefits is another matter. "All of the MA plans have their limitations," says Bonnie Burns, a policy specialist with California Health Advocates, a Medicare advocacy group. "Some are very structured; others are more generous. With a Medigap plan you just go to the doctor when you need to. With an MA plan you would need permission to go to the doctor."

Baker says people who are new to Medicare---those in their 60s---choose Medicare Advantage plans because they are relatively healthy and don't think about the time when they won't be. Then they get sick and find their MA plan doesn't provide the coverage or let them see the doctors they need. They can go back into traditional Medicare

during a special window between Jan. 1 and Feb. 14, 2013, but buying a Medigap policy to go with it could be dicey because companies don't want people with preexisting conditions. The Obamacare law that lets people with preexisting conditions buy insurance no matter how sick they are doesn't apply here.

If you now have a Medigap policy with stand-alone drug coverage, as most Nebraskans do the next few weeks to assess whether the drug benefits still work for you especially if your medicines have changed. Is the plan making you try cheaper drugs first? Do those drugs work? Can you afford the copayments? Some are very high. Are all your medicines covered?

I have always thought choosing Medicare coverage comes down to your tolerance for risk. You can pay a higher premium each month for more freedom to choose your health care and have no surprises when you do get sick. Or you can take a chance with an MA policy. Pay less up front and hope you have no large medical bills. But if you do, know that some things might not be covered, and you'll have to pay out of pocket.

- Sometimes You Gotta Get Dirty to Get Ahead: Go for it! Work hard, sweat, dive for a ball, slide into base-throw yourself into the game! If you aren't willing to get your hands dirty and get into the thick of your interests or projects, you likely won't complete them to the best of your ability.
- Hard Work and Practice = Improvement: Teach an athlete that he/she can improve at anything with hard work and practice. Skills won't get better without hard
- There is No "I" in Team: Working together is key, even if it means sacrificing yourself for the benefit of your team. Teach an athlete not to be upset if he/she is asked to sacrifice bunt to advance a teammate ahead. Even though personal stats won't show it, the athlete made a huge contribution to the team. Learning how to work as a team is a valuable lesson to the student athlete that will carry throughout his or her life.
- You Win Some, You Lose Some: Baseball is a long season filled with many ups and downs. Student athletes will learn not to expect to win every time, and how to learn from mistakes to improve for the next game. This is also an opportunity to teach athletes about how to win and lose graciously.
- Respect: Participating in baseball (as in all sports) will be a lesson in learning respect for coaches, teammates and opposing players.
- Dedication and Commitment: The long season of baseball requires dedication and commitment. If a student athlete stays with it and sees it through to the end, a sense of accomplishment will be achieved. Student athletes will find dedication and commitment come into play in many areas of his or her life, from school to career and even marriage and family.
- Making Friends: Being a part of a team gives the athlete a sense of belonging and an opportunity to make friends.
- Community Bonding Time: Baseball is a great way for the community to bond. Falls City has built a beautiful facility that the whole town is proud of.....let's give our talented student athletes the chance to utilize it!

## New Commits

Defensive end **Randy Gregory** (6-6/235) of Arizona Western CC was commit No. 14 for Nebraska's 2013 recruiting class. Gregory visited for the Michigan game and chose the Huskers over Arkansas, Iowa, Missouri, UCLA and others.

An explosive pass rusher with long arms, Gregory should provide immediate depth next fall.

Running back Adam Taylor (6-2/200) of Katy, Texas visited Lincoln for the Minnesota game and shortly afterwards became pledge No. 15.

Taylor's story is an interesting one. He had an offer from LSU prior to injuring his knee as a junior. The Tigers said that his offer was still valid and that they wanted to see him at camp last. Word is that when Taylor tried to commit after camp, LSU wouldn't honor the offer.

Alabama, Florida State, Oklahoma and Wisconsin did offer, however, and Taylor chose Nebraska. A downhill runner with 4.5-second speed, Taylor's high school team is the undefeated No. 1-ranked team in Texas' largest classification.

## **Losing One**

While gaining two commits, NU also lost one as defensive end Christian LaCouture (6-5/275) of Lincoln Southwest flipped to LSU. While NU had recruited him as a defensive end, LaCouture had seemingly outgrown that position and rumors are that the staff wanted him to move to tackle. Apparently that didn't please LaCouture so he chose to go elsewhere. The bottom line is that if a player doesn't want to be at Nebraska then Bo Pelini and staff don't want him there. A parting of the ways was better for everyone involved.

## **Saying Good-bye**

After the blowout loss to Ohio State, NU head coach Bo Pelini uttered "win out" challenge to his team. They've responded with six straight victories to earn a trip to the Big Ten Championship Game Dec. 1 in Indianapo-

Much of this winning streak falls squarely on the shoulders of the Huskers' senior class. Before the Penn State game NU said good-bye to 29 seniors. Guys like Rex Burkhead, Will Compton, Baker Steinkuhler, Cameron Meredith, P.J. Smith, Daimion Stafford, Eric Martin, Brett Maher, Kyler Reed and Ben Cotton made their last Tunnel Walk at the Old Grey Lady on Vine.

Have they been the most successful Husker class in history? Not exactly, however they have an opportunity to be the class that "righted the ship" by winning the school's first conference title since 1999.

A rematch with Wisconsin stands in the way of that title and a trip to the Rose Bowl. Given what this team has faced this year to just earn the trip to Indy, coming back from double-digit second half deficits four times in conference play, I expect another victory over the Badgers. Prediction time: NU 34, Bucky 24.

## Replacements

Many of the players who will replace those seniors on the field next year are already in the program; however some positions will also require immediate help as younger players haven't progressed as hoped. Specifically the Huskers need immediate help at tight end and on the defensive line.

At tight end NU has Greg Hart (6-5/225) of Dayton, Ohio committed. Their top target has long been **Beau Sandland** (6-6/250) of Pierce (Calif.) Community College.

Sandland has narrowed his list to five – NU, Oklahoma, Arizona State, Texas Tech and Miami. He has official visits remaining to Tech and Miami, but his top choices are the other three schools. Many recruiting experts believe NU is the team to beat because of the opportunity to play immediately. Sandland graduates in December and will go through spring practice with whichever team he chooses. He's one of NU's top priorities and has been for

If Sandland gets away, Omaha North's Casey Sayles (6-4/260) may get a late offer and would likely decommit from Ohio and sign with NU.

On the defensive line NU's depth is inexperienced, so junior college targets are being pursued. Hutchinson, Kan. C.C. teammates Toby Johnson (6-4/305) and **Ben Bradley** (6-2/315) were unofficial visitors for the Penn State game, while **Kyle Peko** (6-2/295) of Cerritos, Calif. CC visited officially. The week prior for the Minnesota game NU hosted Lavon Hooks (6-4/295) of Northeast Mississippi J.C. and Quincy Russell (6-3/311) of Trinity Valley, Texas C.C. officially.

Johnson was regarded as the top Juco DT before injuring his knee late in the season. He's still a great talent, and NU will continue to push for his pledge. Georgia and Tennessee are the top competition, and Johnson will also visit Miami in December. He and Bradley have expressed a desire to play together at their next stop, which might hinder NU's chances as apparently they didn't offer Bradley after his unofficial visit.

Hooks may be NU's top target after racking up 16.5 sacks and 22 tackles for loss this season. Arizona State and Miami are also in the mix, and he Hooks is set to visit Miami the same weekend as Johnson and Bradley.

Russell was recruited by NU coming out of high school before signing with Texas. He ended up at Trinity Valley due to academics, and seems to have narrowed his choices to Nebraska and Oklahoma. A December graduate, Russell's decision should be coming soon.

Peko will choose between NU, Michigan State, Utah, Washington and

Nebraska also continues to target high school linemen. Kyle Shortridge (6-2/273) of Loxahatchee, Fla., who visited NU in August, decommitted from Purdue after the Boilers fired coach Danny Hope. Another possibility is Maliek Collins (6-2/285) of Kansas City, Mo.

Another recent visitor was former NU commit **Tre'vell Dixon** (6-1/195) of Baldwin, La. Dixon committed as a safety before former defensive backs coach Corey Raymond left for LSU. Early this fall he reopened his recruitment, but NU never gave up on him.

Dixon is now being recruited as a wide receiver, and may also visit Arizona State and TCU. NU has put itself in solid shape with this electric athlete and should be among his final choices.

Finally, NU made the top three for Rivals 250 defensive back Dashon Hunt (5-11/175) of Thousand Oaks, Calif. Also in the mix are Oregon State and Boise State. Hunt will wait for the Dec. 30 Offense-Defense All-American Bowl in Houston, Texas to make his choice, but NU winning the conference and playing the Rose Bowl less than an hour from home town would certainly help the Huskers' chances.

# Falls City buzzed by a Black Hawk

It had been awhile since Falls City got buzzed. So U.S. Army Black Hawk helicopter pilot CW3 Josh Hersh took care of that.

A couple of weeks ago today, as the workday was winding down, Josh wound up his aircraft, left Brenner Field and headed straight for Harlan Street — on the deck. Customers filling their tanks at Sapp Bros. wondered if an invasion was underway. No, this wasn't an assault. It was a pilot flying his final mission.

As Josh flew south and neared the city limits of his hometown, he took the Black Hawk vertical (dramatically), achieved flight altitude and headed back to base at Ft. Riley. Mission accomplished.

Josh, the son of Jim and Lois Hersh, graduated from Falls City High School in 1990. Eighteen days later he entered the U.S. Army and has been in military service ever since, a total of 22 1/2 years. After his final "signout" at the end of this month, Josh will be "officially retired," he told a Journal reporter while meeting with family and friends at the local airport.

After retirement from the Army, Josh plans to "go fishing" and "look for a job in the IT world." He said he has "feelers out there." His "passion" is to "work with computers," said Josh.

For his final flight, Josh was granted permission to incorporate a training mission with a couple of special stops. He and his crew first put the Black Hawk down near West Point, where they visited Josh's sister, Beth Hersh. Then it was up and down again with the landing at Brenner Field, for a visit with family and friends.

Following his induction into the Army and basic training,

Josh served in military intelligence, but decided flying helicopters would be "more exciting and more fun." Additionally, serving as a pilot provided more opportunities for promotion.

He completed flight school and has been up in the air ever since. The Black Hawk Josh flew to West Point and Falls City is the medivac version. He has also flown the VIP version and, before that, the air assault Black Hawk, including a total of 39 months in combat in Iraq and Afghanistan.

"I've been lucky," Josh said of those combat missions, where mortars fired from below and missile launchers failed to find their mark.

The Sikorsky Aircraft Black Hawk has been in service in one form or another for more than 30 years. It's described as "versatile, dependable and rugged." Depending on the configuration of the aircraft, the price tag per unit ranges from about \$6 million to more than \$10 million. So Josh has been piloting an expensive piece of technically advanced machinery for the past 13 years.

The Black Hawk, Josh said, typically cruises at 120 knots (173 mph) but is capable of speeds of 159 knots (183 mph) up to, but never to exceed 193 knots (222 mph). Josh said he once flew a Black Hawk at that "never to exceed" speed. The aircraft generally cruises at about 10,000 feet, but can reach altitudes of 20,000 feet, where the conditions "get pretty cold," Josh explained. Depending on configuration, the Black Hawk can carry up to 11 soldiers, not including what typically is a four-man crew. The medivac unit that buzzed Falls City had a three-man crew and will soon be deployed to Afghanistan, without Josh. The Black Hawk's specs call for it to fit into a C-130 transport plane with some alterations.

Josh's brother, Tim Hersh, is the Mayor of Falls City. The pilot/brother was asked what he thought of that. "Is that a political question?" Josh asked. Not at all, a Journal reporter responded. "I'm proud of him," said Josh. From the looks on the faces of his family and friends at Brenner Field a couple of weeks


