

Fiery crash takes life of HTRS junior

A 16-year-old Humboldt-TR-S High School junior was pronounced dead on the scene of a fiery threecar auto accident Saturday afternoon on Highway 75 at the junction of Highway 62, four miles west of

According to members of the Richardson County Sheriff's Dept., Devon Lee Hunzeker, son of Aaron and Melinda Hunzeker, of Humboldt, was traveling westbound on Highway 62 in a 2000 Pontaic Grand Am, failed to stop at the intersection and entered Highway 75. His vehicle was struck broadside by a northbound semi tractor trailer driven by 55-year-old Cheryl Van Briesen, of Ashton, IA. As the collision occurred, both Hunzeker's car and Van Briesen's semi struck a southbound 2008 Ford Ranger pickup, driven by Richard "Andrew" McMullen, 79, of Stella. McMullen was attempting to turn east onto Highway 62.

into flames and was split in half. The young man was ejected from the car, which came to rest alongside McMullen's Ford pickup in the northwest ditch of the intersection. The semi came to rest approximately 500 feet north of the point of impact on the southbound shoulder, facing north.

Both McMullen and Van Briesen were transported to the Nemaha County Hospital in Auburn, then McMullen was later flown to Lincoln Bryan West Hospital for non life-threatening injuries.

The call came in at 2:58 p.m. Also responding to the scene were members of the Richardson County Emergency Management Agency, Humboldt Fire and Rescue and the Nemaha County/Auburn Ambulance crews. The Nebraska State Patrol Troopers and NSP Carrier Enforcement assisted with the accident investigation. Crews were on the scene for some four hours.

Alcohol was not believed to be a factor, and Devon Hunzeker was not believed to be on his cell phone, either, as a phone was later retrieved from his front pants pocket.





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Water main break on Harlan relatively easy fix

A Sunday afternoon water main break in the intersection of 16th and Harlan Streets sent City officials scrambling and City workers punching in overtime, but was quickly diagnosed and remedied by the end of the workday Monday.

Falls City Utility Supt. Alan Romine said City crews cut an approximate 12-feett by 6-feet hole in the concrete and, depending on the weather, it could be all patched up before the end of the week. Regardless, the highway will remain

open. "We'll see, but it doesn't seem like it washed out too badly," Romine said. "I don't think we lost more than 100,000 galons of water, which isn't much when you consider our overall daily usage. I know we've had worse, that's for sure."

The main broke Sunday afternoon and workers quickly slowed down the gusher to manageable levels. The break was pinpointed to within "three to six inches" Monday, concrete was cut and the leak was fixed.

"It happens every once in a while," Romine said. "The ground shifts and you break pipes. It took

The southbound lane was closed Sunday night and throughout Monday. "We didn't want heavy trucks driving on it," Romine said.


Romine said despite five City workers putting in overtime, \$3,000 lost in water and the concrete work, which is never inexpensive, the total bill should remain under \$10,000.

By the time we parked we were odorned with five "We Believe" signs and four blue and white pompoms. We skipped the tailgating and practically ran to the stadium entrance. We walked in and like so many others around us we just stopped, looked around and took it all in again. This was a World Series game at Kauffman! The last time this happened I was two-years-old and lived in Texas. So in my lifetime I don't remember ever seeing a World Series in Kansas City. Brian was nine and remembers watching the '85 series but never dreamed of getting to witness one in person.

The first thing I wanted to do was find Nick Swisher — current Cleveland Indian, former Yankee — who was commentating with Big Papi, Frank "Big Hurt" Thomas and Gabe Kapler for Fox Sports. I've been a big Swish fan for a few years and wanted to go stare at him for an uncomfortable amount of time. As we stood taking photos and listening to their predictions another couple our age stood behind us. I heard the man say, "Hun, we're really at the World Series, THE WORLD SERIES!!!" Brian and I said the same thing to each other and strangers throughout the night. We made our way to our seats and came across a few "K celebrities" such as the two grown men in cat onsies and my favorite Kauffman stadium fixture, Kaycee, the "W" guy. It was such a fun atmosphere with the excitement, awe and media presence.

We made it to our seats in time to see some presentations and the National Anthem. Our boys were out to prove they deserved to be there and that's what they did. Billy Butler came through and ripped one out into left field. Lo-Cain blew through third to score and take the lead. Salvy smashed one to center field, scoring two. This moment forever etched in my mind as the moment I got far too excited and my phone ended up in my cup of Coke. In the excitement I grabbed it and dried it the best I could, all while trying to see what was happening on the field and praying I didn't lose all of my photos from the day. Then came Omar Infante, who shocked us all with a home run. It was during this home run that I managed to get my phone to come back on and record Salvy scoring a run and things getting testy. Giants' pitcher Hunter Strickland appeared to yell at Salvy as he was going from third to home plate. As someone who was in the stands we were totally unaware of what was happening. We watched the dugouts clear and the umpire wave his arms, all while we were oblivious to what was happening.

Then my phone went totally dead on me. Panic set in. I wanted to re cord every moment of that game and since I couldn't I did the next best thing; I went and bought a \$17 Royals batting helmet full of nachos. It was the World Series, so a \$17 helmet of nachos made sense to me. We devoured our nachos and watched our boys win 7-2.

It was everything I wanted it to be and there was no doubt in my mind that these guys would be back in Kansas City for Game 6 and 7 to win the World Series. The next five games we watched both horrified and excited. Then came Game 7. The champagne was chilled, the confetti was out and the fireworks were ready. We were ready to see these guys win the World Series.

Then they didn't.

There were anger and tears in our home. Just like that it was over. We had breathed and lived the Kansas City Royals since August. What a ride it was! We had a blast sitting around as a family watching these guys. We cheered together, we laughed together and we ended up heartbroken together. But what were we to do now? Now we come home and feel lost. With no game on or games to look forward to we have no clue what to do with ourselves. I wouldn't have traded one moment of this series for the world, well maybe game 7, I would trade that ending.

Now back to our regularly scheduled lives. Work, Thanksgiving, Christmas and winter. I guess we have a long five months to go until Opening Day. Until then I will continue to go over and over in my head and out loud to anyone who will listen how Gordo should have gone home, Joe Buck is a nightmare and Mad-Bum is my new enemy.



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Welp, the election is over, now what!

The election is over, the results are well - known,

The will of the people has surely been shown.

So let's let bygones be bygones and evil thoughts pass,

They're newbies, they ought to go to class.

A new Governor, a new Attorney General and a new Auditor, as well as a large number of State Senators. Let the learning curve begin and keep an eye on what promises to be as big a roller coaster ride as the election. There's a lot of leftover business for all ... in fact, there's plenty to go around.

The operative word here is NEW. A double-digit number of brand new smiley faces in the George W. Norris Legislative Chamber. For the most part they'll be learning from colleagues who have 2-6 years of experience. It's likely that one of them will make the not-sowise statement that they have come to Lincoln to set Ernie Chambers straight. Yes, it happens with every new crop. Hasn't worked yet, never will.

On their desks will be a hefty report from a special investigative committee looking at the broken Nebraska Corrections System. There'll likely be a few other reports, as well, but this one has had the most press and will likely generate on-going public comment. There's also a report from a national group addressing over-crowding issues. That's serious since Nebraska is well beyond the brink of a federal mandate to require construction of


a new prison. It's not just the Legislature's problem. A lot of this will ultimately fall in the new governor's lap come January 2015.

The Corrections issue alone -with its sub-parts: the early release of prisoners by department officials who ignored a Nebraska Supreme Court ruling; the release of Nikko Jenkins in spite of his pleading for mental health help and the four subsequent murders he has been convicted of in just a few days after his release; problems with the work release program that let inmates drive prison vans, one of which was involved in a fatal crash - could eas-

ily occupy an entire session. Then, there's the seemingly unwieldy Department of Health and Human Services and its noncompliance issues, which have cost the state millions in federal dollars. Add a subset of that with the expected debate over expanded Medicaid. Throw in the failed privatization of foster care and the lingering problems with the Beatrice State Development Center and you've got another major issue that's fes-

Don't overlook the as-yet unsettled issue of the Keystone Pipeline project. A district judge has ruled that the Governor and the Legislature violated the constitution in passing a law governing that project. Oh, and the Fremont Anti-Immigrant Ordinance which has caused the feds to raise an eyebrow about sending dollars their way.

Like I said, that's a pretty full plate - even for a veteran politician. Just enough to make it hard to



Welcome to the 2014 State of the Schools Report.

The State of Nebraska requires every public school in the State of Nebraska to conduct standards-based reading, math, science and writing assessments (NeSA) in grades 3-8 and 11. The results of the state standards assessments are helpful to teachers, administrators, parents, patrons, and school board members in evaluating and improving both student and school academic performance. The State of the Schools Report, published by the Nebraska Department of Education, provides K-12 Public Schools and the general public information for all Nebraska public schools as well

as for individual school districts and school buildings. The full report can be found at: http://www.education.



In order to provide a summary of the State of the Schools Report as it relates to the Falls City Public Schools,

our top strengths based on the data include:

- New test results show FCPS students scored higher on their 2014 state reading and mathematics tests higher than in previous years.
- FCPS students exceed the state average in mathematics and science achievement.
- Falls City High School's graduation rate exceeds the state graduation rate by nearly 2% at 90.14%
- Falls City High School's overall ACT composite score for 2014 improved by 1.4 points over 2013, and is currently .5 above the state average composite score and 1.2 points above the national average composite score.
- Attendance rate for FCPS ranks above the state average at 96%, largely as a result of parental support and student responsibility.
- Early Childhood Education programs demonstrate 3-year old & 4-year old children involved in our program outperformed their peers across the State of Nebraska in social-emotional, language, and mathematics developmental expectations.

The assessment results prove that FCPS students are continuing to improve their scores and achievement in the core academic areas. Not only do our students continue to show improvement and exceed academic expectations, they rank among the top schools across the State of Nebraska in mathematics and science achievement. These particular strengths can be attributed to key instructional strategies being implemented that include the district-wide Continuous School Improvement goal "All Falls City Public School students will increase their achievement in math problem-solving across all content areas". Additionally, data-driven decision-making and parental support are key instructional strategies impacting the achievement gains.

The areas most in need of improvement for FCPS as defined by the results of the State of the Schools Report 2014 are the achievement of special education students and students that are considered highly-mobile, which is defined as the frequency of their families repetitively moving in and out of school districts on a frequent basis. We are taking a straightforward approach to improve the content delivery, increased exposure to core curriculum, professional development, and intervention practices based on current performance data analysis, and improvement is expected.

Providing increased support, academic options and services to atrisk youth in our community continue to be increasing challenges for our school district. Locally, our faculty and administration work closely with students, parents, and local/state agencies, when necessary, to improve a student's chances of successfully completing high school and earning a diploma.

Although our students continue to show academic improvement and proficiency, and our students are earning their all-time best scores in reading, mathematics and science, parents and patrons however, may be questioning how the federal government can consider our elementary school in need of improvement when they are improving. The federal school accountability system is misleading and flawed. The federal system mislabels schools. According to the requirements of the federal No Child Left Behind policy, every student, regardless of disabilities, language deficits, or other circumstances, must be proficient in reading and math as measured by the state tests. The federal expectation that 100% of all students are proficient on the state assessments just isn't practical.

The Nebraska Department of Education also does not agree with current federal policy, and does not believe that all of our schools are low performing.

Under the federal law No Child Left Behind, 480 Nebraska schools and 52 districts were designated in need of improvement because 100 percent of the students were not proficient as required. As a result, federal sanctions will be applied to 265 of those schools and to 50 districts. Sanctions requiring districts to set aside funds, offer school choice or tutoring or to restructure. Congress was scheduled to reauthorize the law in 2007 but that has not occurred, frustrating educators and policy makers in many states. In the meantime, the Nebraska State Board of Education and the Nebraska Department of Education have been working on a new state accountability system, A QuESTT.

In summary, academic proficiency is essential in life, the workplace and at college. The District 56 Board of Education, administration, faculty, and staff, combined with overwhelming parental and community support, will continue on our mission to ensure our students graduate with strong skills that will help them become innovative, resourceful, resilient, and responsible citizens.




HTRS Mock Trial teams advance to regional finals

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

There's a theory among sleep scientists that people who experience recurring dreams have some sort of trauma in their past they are trying to deal with. Those dreams, then, become nightmares when they cause strong feelings of fear, sadness or anxiety.

Traumatic events cause nightmares. On that note, sleep tight, Stuart.

The FC Sacred Heart football team and its fans may not be overly excited about a six-hour bus ride north Wednesday that once the wheels finally come to a stop for the 3 p.m. kickoff they will be in considerably closer geographical proximity to Rapid City than Falls City. Boredom, not fear, is Wednesday's Irish enemy.

Fear undoubtedly lies in the hearts of the Stuart Broncos, who know that bus will eventually hit its brakes. Nobody knows like Stuart that Sacred Heart can turn any eight-man football field into their own private Badlands.

"They just got us in such a big hole.

Then it just snowballed on us," Stuart Coach Lance Howitt said 11 months ago, after his team surrendered 56 unanswered points in a 63-14 FCSH Class D2 State Championship victory at Memorial Stadium.

"We only have one senior. The other kids have got to learn from this," Howitt went on to say.

Better yet, learn to forget it. All of

The Irish scored eight-straight touchdowns during one stretch of the game, converted 8-of-9 third downs and committed just one penalty to win the storied school's first state football title in 19 years and seventh overall. Though they've now reached the state playoffs an ongoing state-record 28 consecutive seasons and only two schools - Creighton Prep and Humphrey SF - have appeared more times, that was Doug Goltz and Sacred Heart's first appearance at Memorial Stadium. Perhaps even its finest moment.

"It was pretty flawless," Goltz said. "We didn't make many mistakes. I can't say enough."

To be sure, Stuart is a year better and much has changed for Sacred Heart in 11 months, notably a stack of very heavy letterjackets. FCSH is the seventh seed and, frankly, the team had two big games this season and lost them both. But two guys who accounted for five of those Irish state championship touchdowns last November seniors Sawyer Kean and Austin Malone - will be on the bus to Stuart this November. Kean just rushed for 203 yards and scored three times in the 52-13 opening-round victory over Emerson-Hubbard and Malone ran and threw for four himself. Coach Howitt need not worry about his team learning from that game - in their minds, anyway, they know these guys far too well.

"We have a lot of kids out and have experience," Goltz said. "We aren't as deep as I'd like us to be, but our JV has gone 21-0 the last three years. We're not as good as we were a year ago, but how good is the field? I think a lot of teams aren't as good as they were a year ago. I still think we're capable of getting to the finals. I think we have the skill players and the size, too. We just have to get hot and get on a four-game run to get to the finals."

The aforementioned lack of depth

took a major hit last week when junior end and defensive back Henry Arnold suffered a broken right fibula in the first quarter against Emerson-Hubbard on a 48-yard interception return. And FCSH saw what can happen without Kean on the field in a 46-20 loss to Exeter-Milligan on Oct. 10. The Irish led 20-8 before he got hurt.

FCSH is a totally different team with a healthy Kean running the ball and Goltz said they're a different team than they were in week one, when a group of first-time starters surrendered a 48-34 third-quarter lead in a 56-48 loss to North Andrew, MO.

"I think our kids really learned more from those losses than they did any of the games we won," Goltz said. "I know our line is a lot better than it was the first game of the season."

The Irish are big and strong up front and also platoon more than you might expect. Seniors Logan Scheitel (220) and Ben Mullins (205) don't really come out, but 272-pound sophomore Bryant Jorn has become mostly an offensive lineman as the season has progressed, while 248-pound junior Reggie Johansen has taken over at defensive tackle. Furthermore, junior Bailey Witt, who was injured all last year, has emerged as the team's top downfield threat (he caught two passes for 43 yards Thursday) while 217-pound sophomore linebacker Austin Ahern strictly hits people on defense.

"A lot of teams this time of year are ready for football to be over," Goltz said. "Our kids got a taste of what it's like to make a deep playoff run last year and I know they want that. They know what it took, now it's just a matter of doing it," he said.

When Falls City High Head Footbal Coach Darin Fritz sat down Monday to discuss his third Tiger team, there were countless directions from which to start the conversation.

Obviously, there were the eight wins against two losses this fall, the second district title in three seasons and the third consecutive winner and playoff qualifier. It's a record he is - and should be - proud of, but framed by him in the context that his ultimate goal for all his players is that they enjoy the overall experience. Nobody likes to lose, so, yeah, it's important to celebrate more Fridays, probably, than you evaluate. At the end of the day, though, just one team can celebrate a state title. So since a season-ending loss is part of the experience, there's more to it than just touchdowns, turnovers and final scores.

He could've gone off about an

8-1 district championship season being rewarded with a trip to none other than Norfolk Catholic - and the ensuing 35-6 loss - in the first round of the playoffs. Of course it wasn't "fair" and Falls City had "match-up" issues with Catholic. Who doesn't?! The coach didn't convey bitterness about the draw actually, he tipped his cap: "That's a very good football team," he said.

Norfolk Catholic is a perennial state title contender and has been Nebraska's Class C football bully for much of the past 20 or 30 years. They opened up a 21-0 lead in the first quarter, led 28-0 at half and put up its final tally with a 67-yard touchdown pass on the first play from scrimmage in the second

Falls City got on the board with 6:12 to play in the game on a oneyard run by senior Brenden Heck-

On eight of 10 nights this fall it was Fritz' football team putting up the gaudy numbers on the scoreboard and on the stats sheets. They scored more more than 36 points per game and nearly doubled up the op-

position with almost 4,000 yards of total net offense in '14. That despite the varsity starters playing perhaps the equivalent of six full games of the 10-game schedule. The blowouts did no favors to guys trying to pad the stats, needless to say. They simply couldn't get the touches. And just think: The Four-Headed Senior Monster of Heckenlively (8.6 yards per carry), Jack Hartman (6.3 ypc), Jordy Stoller (9.8 ypc.) and Weston Witt (7.3 ypc.) had the potential to roll up HUGE individual numbers, yet none even got to 1,000 yards rushing. Hartman, who took over the "spin" back position this fall, could've realistically become Falls City High's first-ever 1,500-1,500 dual-threat quarterback, but came up 250 yards shy of 1,000 yards rushing and 66 shy of

Stoller, a four-year starter, perhaps the most dynamic offensive weapon FC's had in the modern day, and easily the most scouted Tiger receiver ever, caught just 21 passes this fall. And just one of several asked to check his ego at the door and sacrifice individual glory for the good of the whole.


They did that - they always did what he asked them to do - and that's what Fritz said he'll remember most about a special class that has played its last football game in orange and black.

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

Phyllis Dorste Reimer


Phyllis Dorste Reimer, 82, passed away Monday, Oct. 27 2014.
