# FC man, 62, electrocuted after accident

A Falls City resident died Wednesday morning as a result of electrocution, after the pickup he was operating crashed into a power pole south of Rulo.

Charles E. Furrow, 62, was pronounced dead at the scene at 703 Trail near the intersection with 664 Road in rural Richardson County. The first Iowa Tribal Police Officer to arrive at the scene found Furrow laying face down underneath the power lines, then radioed for assistance and started CPR. Efforts to revive Furrow were not successful

A witness told the Richardson County Sheriff that Furrow's pickup truck and trailer skidded off the icy road and struck a power pole. The power pole fell across Furrow's trailer and two lines were suspended approximately two and four feet above the ground. The witness said that Furrow exited his vehicle and stated that he was not injured.

After the witness notified authorities of the accident, Furrow said he would return to his truck to stay warm and the witness left.

Charles E. Furrow was born Sept. 15, 1951 at Table Rock to the late William J. and Vera I.

When I lived in Moberly, MO, my best friends were all golfers and each of us was struggling to make ends meet on skimpy salaries. I was the lucky one because, as golf coach at Moberly High, I got to meet my kids at the Country Club course for spring and early summer practice. That meant I also swatted some golf balls most every day, which gave me the advantage over my golfing buddies.

None of us could afford to join the Country Club in Moberly, so we either paid green fees at the local public, sand green course, or drove 30 miles to Columbia to play. That's what we did most Saturday mornings when the weather allowed. We'd take turns driving south, leaving as early as possible so that we could get on one of two courses, the Municipal or University. We didn't have to worry about electric or gas carts because we couldn't afford them, either, and, besides, they weren't available at either course. The University course, located not far from the Mizzou football field, was a bear very hilly and forested, which amplified the humidity not untypical of central Missouri.

I think each of us looked forward to Saturdays in the summer. We were very good friends, young and competitive. But not so competitive that we couldn't leave our matches on the course. Those days were the best I ever had playing the game, although the foursome after moving back to Falls City was very, very close.

My dad, Bill Schock, taught me how to play the game, just like James (Bo) Dodson's dad taught him. Dodson, an editor and golf writer and not to be confused with Dr. James Dobson of Focus on the Family fame, occupied an entire Wednesday for me last week. His book, *Final Rounds*, is about as good as it gets. And it's not just for golfers (or in the case of my dad and I, former golfers). It's a true story about relationships — specifically fathers and sons.

Friend John Weaver loaned me the book when we met in Lincoln for the UCLA football drubbing of the Huskers. I brought it into my house the next day and put it on a stack of "books to read." Then I kind of forgot about it.

I don't work on Tuesday afternoons and Wednesdays anymore. Guess you could say I'm semi-retired. So on those hours off, I'm usually looking for something to do and, especially in cold weather, that involves reading between and around loads of laundry and other mundane, dreaded household chores. Last week, Final Rounds registered in my memory, I located it and, after reading the morning paper and Tuesday's Journal, sat down with a full cup of coffee to give it a look. I could not put it down. So much registered with

It's the story of a wise father, tabbed by his son as Opti the Mystic, his love of golf and the lessons he taught his son, both on and off the golf course. After attaining success in his career, son Bo invites his elderly dad, who served in England during WWII, on a playing tour of some of the most famous, historic golf courses on the British Isles. Dad accepts, but complications arise. Still, the golfing trip of a lifetime takes place. More lessons are learned.

I remember a Saturday morning in Missouri when my parents were visiting. My dad accompanied our group to Columbia for a hot, hot round at the Municipal course. Again, no riding carts — you either carried your bag or towed it on a Bag Boy. I don't remember what our conversations were about that day, but I do recall how well my dad got along with the other guys, all very much his junior. We all had a great time and were very grateful when the round ended to stop by a local establishment for a frosty mug or two. It was a good, good day.

Wish I had thought of a golf tour to England and Scotland during the days both Bill and I were playing. Instead, we settled for the occasional round at the Falls City Country Club and workdays spent here at the newspaper, where we both can be found most of the time. Honestly, I wouldn't trade that for a golf fling in England.



# It's that awkward time of the year

We've entered that awkward lull in news in the Capital City - the few cold weeks between the regular Cornhusker football season and the beginning of the Legislature. The discussion of the 8-4 Husker season will only last a couple weeks. There will be a slight bump during the revelation of bowl game assignments, but it's hard to get too excited about playing the Little Sisters of the Poor in the Spam and Cheese Casserole Bowl.

Excitement about the Legislature's short session – Jan. 8 to April 17 – will be minimal at best. There is a primary election in May that will determine the Nov. 4, 2014, pairings in the nation's only non-partisan unicameral legislative body. The primary race for U.S. Senate and Governor will draw a little more interest with large numbers of Republicans in both races being narrowed to just one who will face off with the Democrat of

Seventeen state senators will be going home to stay in April because of term limits. Of that number, nine are Republicans, seven Democrats and one Independent in the officially nonpartisan offices. Only the party faithful keeps track of those affiliations. Another seven state Senators face re-election. The earliest that senators or senate hopefuls can file for the \$12,000 - a - year job is Dec. 1. There are already at least a dozen people who have indicated they will run and many more are probably waiting even though political analysts and lobbyists will tell you that those who announce early stand a better chance of making it because they have more time to take the pulse and the contributions - of their constituents.

State Senators up for reelection and the handful running for higher office will watch their words and their votes carefully, making it difficult to have spirited debates or even meaningful discussions of the 406 carryover bills from the 2013 session, let alone the anticipated major tax bills that lame duck Governor Dave Heineman will likely push. You might remember that senators Charlie Janssen of Fremont, Tom Carlson of Holdrege and Beau McCoy of Elkhorn are seeking the Republican guber-

natorial nod. Senator Annette Dubas of Fullerton dropped out of the race with former UNL Regent Chuck Hassebrook of Lyons for the Democratic Party governor's candidacy. State Senator Pete Pirsch of Omaha is running for state Auditor. Incumbent Auditor Mike Foley has joined the race for the GOP nod for gover-

Look for veteran lawmaker Ernie Chambers of Omaha – the Legislature's senior member (38+ years) who has already sat out his mandatory four-year term limit abstinence – to have a heyday with all of his colleagues who are running for something else. It's one thing to please potential voters. It's quite another to avoid the wrath of Ernie who likes to talk about the Repellicans and the Demagogues. One can only speculate if he'll weigh in on the Pelini saga – but it's important to remember that Ernie has pushed before to allow colleges to pay football players.

Yes, it's going to be a long cold wait, but the drama unfolding January 8th just might be worth it!

# Strength of Small Business

On a recent trip to Wahoo, I stopped in a local store in the center of town. The owner of the business was kind enough to show me around his newly rebuilt building and store. A fire destroyed the former site and he took the opportunity to rebuild a very modern meat locker with an old fashioned feel. Charlie and his staff process animals for farmers and hunters, and he customizes other meats for retail. I bought one of the specialty products, some "jaternice" Czech sausage. You could see the pride that Charlie and his employees - some young and right out of school - have in their work. He told me that it's tough and "not a way to get rich quick." It's steady,

Charlie is a small business entrepreneur. His efforts are the heart of America's economy. It's impressive to see someone with great pride working hard to provide good products and help others along the way.

Recognizing the importance of small business to the American economy, "Small Business Saturday" - which last Saturday resulted in an estimated \$5.5 billion at local small businesses across the U.S. - was established four years ago. When I first heard of the idea for a "Small Business Saturday," I was intrigued. I called the CEO of American Express, who sponsors the initiative, and learned the concept originated from an entrepreneurial young employee. It has been embraced as a national celebration of independent businesses, reminding Americans preparing for the holiday season that shopping locally is good for everyone involved.

America embraces small business, but small business is not easy. It's hard work. A number of years ago, I gave a speech about what it takes to be successful in business. It takes knowledge, education, access to capital, access to technology, labor, and low regulatory barriers to entry. But perhaps most of all, it also takes sheer will and desire to see the idea through, no matter how hard it gets.

Many small business efforts fail, but many others succeed. Those that do are critical to our nation's economic well-being. America's 28 million small businesses create two out of every three net new private sector jobs, with half of working Americans either owning or working for a small business. In Nebraska, small businesses employ nearly 400,000 persons, with most of the employment coming from firms with 20 - 499 employees.

We need to creatively encourage and support small business owners. This week, the House of Representatives passed the Small Business Capital Access and Job Preservation Act. The legislation will help open new doors for small businesses to secure capital needed to get off the ground.

Another important idea is identifying entrepreneurs at a young age so natural skills and abilities can be directed and young people encouraged to develop innovative ideas. It's promising that the Lincoln public school system, in partnership with Southeast Community College, established an educational track focused on entrepreneurial skill development in young people.


In a recent meeting with the head of Gallup, it was pointed out that there are outstanding ways to measure one's intellectual capacity and athletic ability, but there is no standard by which we identify entrepreneurial talent. Embedded in this observation may be an important public policy consideration. Elevating entrepreneurial potential in society is a key to fighting economic malaise, stagnation, and lagging opportunity.

It's very exciting to watch persons who have a gift or a unique talent use their own two hands to produce goods or services that benefit the community as a whole. Not only can persons find great meaning in life through these endeavors, America's economic wellbeing depends on a revival of the "git-r-done" attitude of small business.

# FCPS, HTRS earn Sixpence grants

The Falls City and Humboldt-TR-S school districts are among eight in the state of Nebraska to receive Sixpence Early Learning grants that will benefit at-risk babies and toddlers. The Falls City and Humboldt-Table

The Sixpence program is designed to meet the developmental needs of at-risk children, from birth to age three. The grant is for a total of \$250,000.

Judi Carter and Kathy Martin wrote the grant for the Falls City School District.

With those funds, District 56 will hire one person full-time and one part-time person who will go into homes of qualifying children from birth to three years of age and provide curriculum that will help prepare the children for pre-school. Mrs. Martin will supervise the grant.

Carter says the program will go beyond working with the children, but will also provide monthly training for parents in things like car and home safety. Carter says there are four ways a family can qualify for the program offered through the grant. That includes those who qualify for free or reduced lunch, nonnative English speakers, if the baby is born prematurely or with a low birth weight, or if the parent is not a high school graduate or is under 20 years of age.

Sixpence programs are now serving approximately 500 babies and toddlers in 25 Nebraska communities and their families. The grants are funded through a combination of public and private dollars.


Guilliams placed first in the small bus division, earning \$250 and an engraved clock. She also took home the traveling trophy for small bus driver of the year. It was Guilliams' fourth first-place finish. She's also previously finished second four times and is a past Driver of the Year recipient, recording the highest overall score. In addition, the Roadeo Committee awarded Guilliams for exemplifying good sportsmanship during the event, presenting her with a colorful beach bag cooler and a tropical houseplant.

Frederick was second in the van division and came away with \$150 and an engraved keyring that features the state seal. It was the second runner-up finish for Frederick, who this year also earned the Most Spirited Award.



# An Honest Day's Pay

My father was a laborer and a union member. His philosophy of the employer-employee relationship was summed up in a simple phrase: "An honest day's pay for an honest day's work." It summarizes perfectly a relationship in which neither the employer nor the employee takes advantage of the other. Neither party is "getting away" with something.

In healthy workplaces, there exists a so-called "psychological contract" between employer and employee. The good work and loyalty of employees should be reflected in turn by both job and financial security from the employer. In short, it is an even trade when there is fair compensation for good work.

For large systems to function well over time there must be structural assurances for both employer and employee that a steady, competent work force is supported by a fundamentally sound compensation system. An important part of that compensation — and of the "psychological contract" — is a provision for financial security in retirement.

Retirement benefits are sometimes regarded as things that are simply "given" to the employee. The reality is that employment benefits are earned. Employers are not in the business of providing social welfare for employees. The hard-nosed business decisions on employee benefits are based on comparability and market price for labor. The fact is that benefits are aptly named — not because they benefit only the employee, but because they also benefit the employer. Labor is a commodity. When an employer "buys" labor, the price is based on the market. Retirement benefits are a part of the buying price — part of the total compensation to buy the services of the employee. Without a strong benefits package as part of total compensation, employees can simply go elsewhere in a competitive labor market, and that includes the very best and most qualified teachers.

#### **Political Design**

The public consensus is that for-profit companies operate within the labor market and know what it takes to attract, hire, and retain quality employees. There is much less understanding of the situation for public employers, who also draw their employees from a competitive labor market. An important element of the total compensation for public employees is the provision of retirement benefits. Properly constructed retirement systems — systems constructed on actuarial principles and not on politics — are sound arrangements that are designed with rigorous actuarial assumptions. Where we have seen public retirement systems falter or fail, it is primarily because of political and not actuarial design.

Recently, there has been a political call to end the practice of teachers and administrators who, having retired under Nebraska's retirement provisions, decide to return to their profession and continue to work. Any misinformed political move to end this option is based on incorrect information. Teachers and administrators who decide to return — or are called back — to service after retiring are not improperly rewarded by the system. Retirement benefits are part of total compensation: an honest day's pay for an honest day's

#### **Segments or Continuous?**

Teacher retirement benefits are determined by the number of years worked and an average salary calculation. There is no undue benefit to those who have retired and return to work. In fact, the amount of retirement benefit for these educators may be less than if they had simply continued to work for the same accumulated amount of time. Simplistic political slogans like "double dipping" are misapplied and meaningless in this situation.

Teachers earn their pay whether they work continuously for 30 years or whether they work for periods that accumulate to 30 years. Who cares? Choosing to work in segments instead of a continuous career offers no monetary advantage. Politicians who suggest otherwise are flat-out wrong. Teachers can tell when students...or politicians...have not done their homework. Doing the homework — checking the facts — might prevent both blatantly misinformed proposals and real damage to a system that works.

# FCPD Chief Caverzagie to retire

Falls City Police Chief John Caverzagie has submitted his notice to Mayor Tim Hersh of his intent to retire at the end of the month after 35 years as a member of the FCPD. He was appointed Chief in 1997 by then-Mayor Marshall Maddox.

SH juniors Abby and Elizabeth Magdanz traded threepointers to account for SH's first nine points and went on to combine for six first-half threes. Abby finished the night 4-for-5 from downtown and Elizabeth was 2-for 3.

Unfortunately for Sterling, the intermission didn't affect SH's rhythm, as the Lady Irish connected on 10-of-11 field goal attempts, including three more three-pointers, and outscored the Jets 22-3 in the third quarter.

Senior Ashli Jordan, who missed all three shots in the first half, knocked down a pair of threes and scored 12 second half points.

Meanwhile, Sterling senior Jordan Lempka failed to get it going and quietly finished the night with 10 points. SH's guards harassed the young backcourt of Sterling and kept the ball away

Dunn added nine points and junior Austin Malone led the Irish with eight rebounds.


The Irish struggled from from behind the arc and finished 1-for-9, but converted 15-of-23 two-point field goals.

'We played well for three quarters and then had five very poor offensive sets to start the fourth," Milam said. "To many mental mistakes versus a good team like Syra-







Annual non-resident fees are \$10, child/student; \$20, one adult; \$25, family.



# CSP sign up deadline Jan. 17

LINCOLN – Nebraska landowners and operators have until Jan. 17, 2014, to sign up for the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) at their local USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS)

CSP is a voluntary program that provides financial and technical assistance to help farmers and ranchers conserve and enhance soil, water, air and related natural resources on their agricultural and forestry land.

CSP applications are accepted at any time. However, only applications received by the Jan. 17 cutoff date will be considered for the current ranking and funding period.

Craig Derickson, NRCS state conservationist in Nebraska, encourages Nebraska farmers and ranchers to not miss out on this opportunity. "The Conservation Stewardship Program is unique. CSP participants will receive an annual land use payment for the environmental benefits they produce on their operations. Under CSP, participants are paid for conservation performance — the higher the operational performance, the higher their payment," Derickson said.

According to Derickson, CSP has been a very successful program for Nebraska's farmers and ranchers. Over 2,000 CSP contracts occur in all 93 counties and cover 4.8 million acres in Nebraska.

"CSP is popular in Nebraska because farmers and ranchers don't have to take land out of production to participate. CSP helps conserve natural resources on working lands. Keeping land in production while protecting natural resources creates a winwin for all Nebraskans. CSP makes it possible to produce crops and livestock while also improving water quality, soil health and wildlife habitat," Derickson said.

CSP is available statewide to individual landowners, legal entities and Indian tribes. Eligible land includes cropland, grassland, prairie, improved pastureland, non-industrial private forestland and agricultural land under the jurisdiction of an Indian tribe. Contracts are set at five years and include all the land controlled by an operator.
