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Life-long Falls Cityan, beloved school teacher passes away Sunday

Diana Kottich, an elementary school teacher to hundreds of Falls City children for all or part of five separate decades, after a courageous and extended battle with cancer passed away Sunday morning, Dec. 14, 2014 at Community Medical Center. She was 58.

Memorial Services for Mrs. Kottich will be held at 11 a.m. Thursday, Dec. 18, 2014 at St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church, 20th and Towle Sts., with Rev. Andrew Chavanak officiating. Inurnment will be at a later date. The family will receive friends from 6-7 p.m. Wednesday at Dorr and Clark Funeral Home.

In lieu of flowers, the family prefers memorials to the Richardson County Cancer Fund or the Richardson Foundation.

Diana Merz was born and raised in Falls City, attended FC Public Schools and graduated from FC

High School. After college, she married another life-long Falls Cityan, Stephen Kottich, and they came home to work and raise a family. Mr. Kot-

tich succeeded in business, was a popular mayor and is, to this day, a prominent community activist. Meanwhile, they raised two daughters and while Mr. Kottich led on main street, Mrs. Kottich led in the classroom, making an immeasurable impression on generations of young people. Diana educated chil-



dren inside FCPS' North and South Elementary School buildings at various grade levels for more than 30 years. Her career spanned from 1979 to 2012, when illness forced


her retirement in January of that year.

Her popularity was palpable. Upon being diagnosed with ovarian cancer, friends and family

launched "Team Diana," and Falls City was quickly painted teal, the color designated to promote ovarian cancer awareness. Teal "Team Diana" T-shirts, with the words "Pray-Hope-Believe" inscribed on the front, were sold to benefit the

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This may be remembered as the Orthopedic Year for the Bob and Lee Ferguson family.

The past six months there have been four knee and one hip surgeries for four family members.

Son Nick, a special education instructor in the Springfield-Platteview school system, started it all out by having his right knee replaced by Dr. Daniel Samani at the Community Medical Center on June 2. Then after recuperating at his parents' home Nick went back to CMC and had his left knee replaced on July 7. Of course he was back in the classroom when school opened.

It was Lee's turn on Sept. 3, when Dr. Samani gave her a new left knee on Sept. 3. Like Nick, she was a quick recuperator.

Joining in the fun, Bob went a bit further. A left hip which had been replaced 40 years ago was giving him all sorts of trouble so he had a complete replacement by Dr. Todd D. Sekundak at the Immanuel Medical Center in Omaha. The new hip of 40 years ago had forced Bob to limp ever since. The new hip took care of that but it is taking some time to adjust.

Son Don was the last of the Fergusons, for this year anyway, to fall in line by getting a new right knee, courtesy of Dr. Samani on Nov. 20 at CMC.

All are doing fine but any marathon running will have to wait.

The fall issue of "On Point, the Journal of Army History," includes a four-page article with pictures, concerning the Army career of Col. John L. Schock, a native Falls Cityan who grew up on the farm of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Schock Sr., southeast of town. He was older than I and was a second cousin whom I barely

The family called him Lloyd rather than John. He was on his third tour of duty in the Philippines when World War II broke out and he was on Luzon when the American forces were forced to capitulate on April 9, 1942.

The article noted: "The next few years would be miserable beyond comparison. In the coming months and years the prisoners would endure the Bataan Death March, starvation, disease, torture and execution...thousands died from disease....When the Japanese moved him to Bilibid prison for a short time, Schock became commander of the hospital. Contemporary accounts describe Schock as taking over the management of the hospital in addition to his other work and ably kept things moving."

"On 13 December 1944 approximately 1,620 Americans and Allied POWs were taken from Cabanatuan and Bilibid prison camps to be transported to Japan....As the Japanese consolidated the POWs onto the Enoura Maru, American bombers attacked the ship on 9 January 1945, disabling the ship and killing an additional 300 POWs."

The survivors were placed on the Brazil Maru. "Conditions on the ship remained horrible and worsened as the ship entered the colder climate near Japan. Weak, chronically malnourished and with very little clothing many POWs had no chance....Col. Schock, Dental Officer, died in our bay. Investigations after the war determined that Schock was likely buried at sea."

Students and faculty passing through the dental training section of Willis Hall of the U.S. Army Medical Department Center and School at Ft. Sam Houston, Texas, can view a small plaque that reads: "In Memory of Col. John L. Schock, DC, 1891-1945."... "Schock's career paralleled the beginning of Army dentistry with numerous achievements and postings."

The author, Nolan Andy Watson, wrote that while researching (in Falls City) he received information and help from Mrs. Jo Ann Auxier of the Richardson County Historical Society, where there is a Col. Schock exhibit.

If you watch the tv film, "Unbroken, A World War II Story of Survival, Resilience and Redemption," revolving around the life of Olympic distance runner Louis Zamperini, on Christmas Day you will see the horrific life of those Americans held prisoner by the Japanese. The book is available at the FC Library and Arts Center and after you've read it the story is going to stick with you for a while.

Three Falls Cityans died or were executed in Japanese prisoner of war camps in the very early days of WWII. They were Bernard Sandford, Rex Gordon Graden and John Wiezorek. All were serving in the Army in the Philippines.

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More revelations in Department of Corrections mess

Just when you thought you'd read everything there was to write about problems with the Nebraska prison system, new revelations indicate a nagging intrusion from the governor's office.

Parole Board Chairwoman Esther Casmer of Omaha has told a special

legislative committee investigating the scandal-plagued Department of Corrections that she felt threatened by comments from Gov. Dave Heineman's Chief of Staff Larry Bare. Both Heineman and Bare deny pressuring the Nebraska Parole Board to release unqualified - and sometimes violent - prisoners to relieve overcrowding.

Casmer's allegations were corroborated by retired board member James Pearson of Lincoln, a former state trooper. Both said that former corrections director Bob Houston would visit Casmer's office frequently and that he indicated he was visiting with Bare daily. Bare also met with Casmer and Pearson at least once. Nebraska's prisons have long been overcrowded and the state could be forced by the United States Justice Department to build more rooms to accommodate the overload. The state could also be sued by any number of inmates on a basis of cruel and unusual pun-

ishment. For his part, Bare has said he never threatened Casmer with losing her job if a parolee messes up and gets arrested and imprisoned again. He said he urged the board to work more efficiently. But Casmer claimed that Bare made it clear that the board was not paroling enough prisoners. As a result, prisoners were often let go before they had completed their rehabilitation. In some cases, prison rules were changed or overlooked to get more

inmates out the door. The whole thing drew public attention earlier this year when it was learned that prison officials had mistakenly miscalculated sentences of several hundred inmates and released them from custody too soon. That was followed with revelations that inmate Nikko Jenkins was denied the mental health treatment he repeatedly sought and was paroled anyway. He is awaiting sentencing on a conviction that he killed four people in Omaha within days of his release. Several high-ranking prison officials retired rather than being fired for the mess.

Some lawmakers and Democratic Party officials had called for criminal charges against those responsible, but Attorney General Jon Bruning and Lancaster County Attorney Joe Kelly concluded that there was an abundance of ineptitude, incompetence and neglect, but no criminal intent. Boy, that's reassuring.

I have seen the Nebraska Parole Board in action. Esther Casmer is a tough cookie and not afraid to stare tough guys down and tell them they aren't ready to leave. Even Heineman admitted that she's a strong woman. Likewise, Pearson is a stand-up guy. I can't imagine that they made any of this up. But, with Heineman leaving office in a few weeks -- and taking Bare with him – it's a moot point.

The chair of the special legislative committee, Sen. Steve Lathrop of Omaha, is term-limited and won't be back. Here's hoping someone else on the committee will pick up the ball and keep the pressure on the Legislature and the Executive Branch to find a solution.

build more beds, maybe they will finally take a look at alternative programs to deal with certain offenders. It's working in Texas and other states. There is an urgent need to change the culture of the system as well as the people responsible, from judges and prosecutors down to the folks that run the prisons.

Sorry Pete Ricketts, the mess is going to fall in your governor-elect lap. Do the right thing.

Medicare will pay for obesity counseling, really?

It's amazing how much we talk about making people healthier. Consider all the discussion in America about overweight people who are stigmatized for making poor food choices. Think about the warnings that obesity is a leading cause of preventable death. So it's puzzling that Medicare offers an obesity counseling benefit that must be one of the best kept secrets outside of Washington.

Three years ago Medicare announced with some fanfare that it was adding coverage for obesity counseling sessions to help seniors lose weight. Some 30 percent of people in this age group are obese, and studies have shown that regular counseling sessions in a doctor's office increase the chances an overweight person will drop some pounds.

Medicare was eager to add obesity counseling to the growing list of preventive services it covered, and the head of the agency told the press in 2011, "It's important for Medicare patients to enjoy access to appropriate screening and preventive services."

That was then. This is now, and the government doesn't seem interested in promoting or publicizing obesity counseling. Very few seniors are enjoying this preventive service so widely touted three years ago.

My colleague Phil Galewitz at Kaiser Health News has reported that fewer than 1 percent of Medicare's 50 million beneficiaries---about 120,000---have used the benefit. If 30 percent are obese, that means about 14.8 million seniors are waiting to be counseled. Maybe you're one of

Seniors with a body mass index of 30 or more are eligible for one, 15-minute, face-to-face counseling session per week for one month, and then every other week for another five months. If you lose at least 6.6 pounds during those six months, you can have a monthly counseling session for another six months.

The benefit sounds like a pretty good deal, but it's darn hard to find out about it. Here's where good intentions collide with the realities of the medical marketplace. Medicare requires that primary care doctors provide the service during a separate visit not at the same time a patient comes in for other services.

Dr. Reid Blackwelder, who chairs the board of the American Academy of Family Physicians, told Galewitz it was a burden to bring patients in for a separate visit. "It's not the best use of my time," he said. Medicare pays doctors about \$26 for a 15-minute counseling session. Family docs, who are near the bottom of the physician income ladder, can make as much as four times that amount providing other services.

Medicare rules also won't deliver reimbursement to those who know most about the disease, providers like obesity medicine specialists, psychologists and diabetes nurse educators. Go figure! Whatever Medicare may have been thinking, the agency's solution means the providers most knowledgeable about the problem aren't paid to do the counseling.

Nor does Medicare seem to be interested in letting those millions of overweight beneficiaries know about the sessions. There has been no publicity, nothing on Twitter or other social media, no push similar to what the government has done to get people to sign up for Obamacare insurance. The only publicity has been a mention in the Medicare Handbook sent to beneficiaries at the beginning of the year, which few probably have read. On page 52 of the 152-page 2014 Handbook, a mere seven lines offer a bare bones description of the benefit and tell seniors to talk to their doc-

Since it seems pretty clear doctors aren't going to talk to their patients, I asked Medicare about what plans it had for publicizing the benefit more widely and why it hadn't done more to tell people about it. A communications official said, "We have published quite a bit of information about this benefit" and directed me to a bunch of publications like the "Medicare Quarterly Provider Compliance Newsletter," which is like reading a book in Turkish for you and me.

So it looks like anyone who qualifies for the benefit has to ask for it. That might be something for your to-do list for the new year.


Sing, for a fine program on Sunday at the high school auditorium.

Measurements of the amount of 4He – a helium isotope much more common on Earth - in the Antarctic ice strongly suggest a change of origins in terrestrial dust between the last Ice Age and the interglacial warm period we currently live in.

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
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

Troublesome stats: County will provide \$766,595 to SCC in '15, then grads will work elsewhere

Falls City EDGE Tri-State Labor Basin Committee Chairman Charlie Radatz threw some startling numbers at Southeast Community College representatives at a public meeting held Dec. 3 at Falls City High School.

Through his research, Radatz reported that Richardson County taxpayers will provide \$766,595 in property taxes to support SCC in 2015, yet of the 1,770 students who recently graduated from SCC, eight took jobs in Richardson County.

"Career academy programs work better to prepare high school students for more comprehensive manufacturing and welding programs at SCC than they do to prepare them for existing job openings," Radatz said,

A small number of former Falls City residents who receive training at vocational schools in larger cities return to Falls City. Many who leave will never return, resulting in migration of rural students to urban areas.

"Our committee examined post high school plans of graduating seniors and found only a small number were taking manufacturing employment after high school and an equally small number were enrolling in community colleges to prepare for manufacturing employment. The general consensus drawn was that efforts are needed to make students understand the financial and self-fulfillment benefits of such careers and that career counselors need to provide appropriate guidance for those with an aptitude for such work," he said.

The SCC Strategic Planning Committee organized the public meeting to seek input and feedback from community members regarding the future direction of the college.

Radatz, the retired owner of KTNC Radio 1230 in Falls City and current member of the EDGE Board of Directors, addressed the SCC Board of Trustees, President Dr. Paul Illich and members of the college staff.

Radatz explained to the board that EDGE was formed in response to the difficulty experienced by local manufacturers in recruiting employees, particularly welders. Also mentioned were both healthcare and education institutions' difficulties in attracting highly skilled professionals to the rural community.

"Of particular concern to us is the problem manufacturers have in finding skilled workers to fill existing openings, a problem that has also delayed expansion plans and made it necessary for some manufacturing to be outsourced. Quite basic welding skills are mainly what they require. But programs to provide that training need to be offered at very little cost or entirely publicly funded. A fee-based welder training program gained little or no response until the cost of tuition was underwritten by EDGE."

"Community-based educational opportunities are needed. SCC campuses are located 75, 90, and 120 miles from communities in the southeast corner of our state. It's not practical for a commuting student from Richardson, Nemaha, Pawnee or Johnson County," he said.

Radatz said it's important young people understand there are excellent employment opportunities available in manufacturing in rural southeast Nebraska. SCC, he said, needs to help get the word out.

"Career educational opportunities are needed to meet the needs of employers in the rural counties in the southeast corner of the SCC district." Radatz said. "A public relations campaign is needed to make young people understand modern manufacturing is not like the 'sweat shops' of the past, but is work offering great financial and personal rewards.

"We stand at the threshold of opportunity," he added. "We need only to join hands and work together to again make rural Nebraska the place where the 'Good Life' can be enjoyed."

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Strategies for last-minute shoppers

Holiday shoppers tend to fall into three distinct camps. There are those people who have completed all of their shopping and wrapping even before November ends. - · Ship to store. Some shoppers like the convenience of ship-tostore services. This enables a person to purchase a gift online but avoid shipping charges by having the item made available at a store location. In-stock items are typically ready the day of purchase, and this helps you avoid crowds and impulse buys, as online purchases are typically available at special pick-up locations in the store that allow online shoppers to skip long lines at the registers.
- · Avoid gimmick gifts. Skip the "as seen on TV" aisle at the store or trendy infomercial gifts. Such gifts may suggest to their recipients that you waited until the last minute to buy the gifts and then really didn't have any good ideas.
- · Expect extra charges and factor such charges into your budget. Procrastinating may work for your schedule, but expect to pay more if you shop online and require shipping. You will probably need to expedite shipping if you expect to have gifts delivered on time. Verify the delivery date before making any purchases. Paying more for shipping may outweigh the hassle of driving to store after store searching for gifts. Online retailers like Amazon may even offer selective delivery on Christmas Eve.

· Check store hours. Some stores offer extended shopping hours to meet the needs of last-minute shoppers. You may be able to visit early morning or late at night to skip the crowds. Certain department stores time sales with these extended hours, such as "early bird" or "night owl" specials, so you may even be rewarded for procrastinating.

Shop smaller retailers. One way to avoid the hassles that often come with holiday shopping is to patronize smaller, independent shops. Chances are the crowds will be smaller at these shops and you may have access to a more unique selection of gifts than you would find at the nearby mall.



"Team Diana Merz Kottich" joined Facebook on March 28. A week later, it had some 600 fans.

"I am quite impressed with the activity this page has gotten in just the past two hours," the "Team Diana" administrator posted that day in March. "Let's see where these shirts are being worn. Please feel free to post pictures and comments to Diane via this page."

Among the ensuing posts:

"We love you!"

"Diana, you were the coolest and most loving teacher ever! When I grew up I wanted to be just like

"Blessed with the greatest aunt!"

"Love and hugs to you, Diana!" "Five Generations Supporting Team Diana!"

Supporters posted from Biloxi, Mississippi, to Kearney, Nebraska; from New Orleans to Las Vegas; from eastern Iowa to Memphis. Without question, however, all that love originated in Falls City, Nebraska, where 613 "Team Diana" shirts have been sold.


"Wreaths Across America" was started in 1992 by Morrill Worchester, owner of the Worchester Wreath Co., of Harrington, ME. Finding themselves and nearing the end of the holiday season, Worchester decided to honor our country's veterans. With the help of Maine Senator Olympia Snowe, arrangements were made for the wreaths to be placed at Arlington Cemetery in one of the older sections of the cemetery that had seen a drop in visitors with each

passing year. The annual tribute went on quietly for several years, until 2005, when a photo of the stones at Arlington, adorned with wreaths covered in snow, circulated around the Internet. The project suddenly received national attention. Thousands of requests were made from people wanting to help at Arlington, to emulate the project at their National and State cemeteries or to simply share their stories and thank Morrill Worchester for honoring our nation's heroes. Unable to donate wreaths to each state, Worchester began sending seven wreaths to each state: one for each branch of the military.

In 2006, simultaneous wreathlaying ceremonies were held at more than 150 locations around the country. The Patriot Guard Riders volunteered as an escort for the wreaths en route to Arlington. This began the annual "Veterans Honor Parade" that travels the east coast in early December.

In 2008 Congress unanimously voted Dec. 13 as "Wreaths Across America Day." The wreath laying ceremony is held annually, on the second or third Saturday of Decem-

Falls City High School senior heavyweight Jeremy Zimmerman finished runner-up to two-time Class B State Champion Matt Clark of Syracuse Saturday at the Crete Invitational.

Zimmerman, who finished fifth in state in Class B a year ago, avenged a 2013 loss at the Crete Invite by defeating Class C sixthranked Blaine Paup of Central City, 1-0, in the semifinals.

Zimmerman was then pinned by Clark, who had to cut 20 pounds after football season to make the 285-pound limit, in 1:00, as the Syracuse big man — a Nebraska football recruit — closed in on the state record of 47 consecutive pin victories. Clark entered the season riding a streak of 38 consecutive pins, dating back to 2013. The record was set by Mike Shoff of Cambridge in 2012.

The 6-foot-5 Clark is currently the sixth-ranked heavyweight in the nation by Intermat and No. 1 in Nebraska's Class B. He was 49-0 a year ago, 46-2 as a junior and 31-14 his freshman year.

Zimmerman, 41-11 as a junior, remains unrated at 5-2 on the young 2014-15 season. He also finished second at the season-opening Raid-



RECRUITING REPORT

New Coach

Just five days after **Bo Pelini** was fired as head coach of Nebraska, AD **Shawn Eichorst** announced former Oregon State HC **Mike Riley** as the new man in charge. Riley came from WAY OFF the radar, and there were reports of an offer rejected by Arkansas' **Bret Bielema**. However if you believe NU Chancellor Harvey Pearlman's comments in the *Omaha World-Herald* this past week, Riley was Eichorst's only target.

"Mike Riley was the first choice. We never talked to Bielema... Here's a coach who — not saying anything about Bret — but he left Wisconsin last year for Arkansas. If he came here, do you think we'd have much confidence that he would stay?"

Transfers

Roster attrition is common with a coaching change, and it's already begun in Lincoln as redshirt freshmen TE **Greg Hart** and **LB Courtney Love** were granted their release to transfer to Kentucky.

Apparently both requested the opportunity to look around right after the Iowa game, before Pelini was fired, and were given permission. Neither played much this past season, however with the coaching change opening up competition it's somewhat disappointing that they would not stay through spring practice to see what might happen.

Recruits Meet Riley

Nebraska only graduates 12 seniors and expects to lose another three to five players to attrition or early entry into the NFL draft. With Hart and Love already gone and junior DE **Randy Gregory** is consistently mentioned as a top 10 overall draft pick that leaves roughly 18-to-21 roster openings.

Reaction from recruits to Pelini's firing was not positive, however once Riley was on announced and prospects had the opportunity to speak with him things turned around quickly. Here's a breakdown of the players who were committed to Pelini's staff.

Solidly on board:

— Colorado DBs **Eric Lee** (5-11/180) and **Avery Anderson** (6-0/170) committed to Nebraska back in February 2014, and have been instrumental as "peer recruiters" ever since. Retaining them would certainly go a long ways towards keeping the rest of the class intact. Riley made in-home visits and after those meetings both players reaffirmed their pledges to NU.

"We won't be taking anymore visits and we're 100 percent committed to Nebraska and that's all we're focused on right now," they told *Husker Online*.

—After talking with Riley via phone Dec. 10 and hosting him for a visit Dec. 12, WR **Stanley Morgan** (6-0/185), of New Orleans, told *Husker Online*, "I feel great about my decision to go (to Nebraska) and I'm ready to get working."

—Denton, TX, TE **Kevin Dillman** (6-4/205) told *Rivals.com* that the new staff wanted him as an h-back type of player and that he was solidly committed to that idea and would be making an official visit to Lincoln in January.

—Atlanta DB **Aaron Williams** (6-0/185) had scheduled an official visit to Notre Dame after hearing of Pelini's dismissal; however after an in-home visit with Riley he told *Husker Online*, "I'm comfortable with the situation, it's going to be something new, but I'm comfortable with it. I told coach that I'm fully committed... I'm still graduating early and I'm staying with Nebraska."

In good shape:

—NU's highest-priority targets are defensive linemen **Carlos** (6-3/270) and **Kahlil** (6-3/270) **Davis**, of Blue Springs, MO. A report by the *Kansas City Star* on Dec. 9 quoted Carlos as saying that he and his brother were no longer considering Nebraska. Shortly after that report, the twins' mother told *Husker Online* that the report was false and that Nebraska was very much still involved.

Riley scheduled an in-home for Dec. 10, stopping at Blue Spring HS, as well, to meet head coach Kelly Donohue. He also reached out to the twins' uncle – former Husker **Lorenzo Hicks**. The home visit couldn't have gone much better, with both players saying that they felt very comfortable with Riley and that they "are going to still listen to what other coaches have to say, but we're staying committed to Nebraska." They are planning an official visit to Missouri in January and possibly a trip to Oregon as well. Another trip to Lincoln in January could eliminate the Missouri and Oregon trips, though.

DE **Reuben Jones** (6-4/225) of Lakeland, FL, had picked up offers from Iowa and Louisville in the week following Pelini's dismissal, and was considering a trip to Louisville. A Dec. 11 visit from new defensive coach (and likely defensive coordinator) Mark Banker helped, but he's still considering other schools as well.

"This isn't the same Nebraska coaches, so it's a whole different deal with different people recruiting me now. So I am evaluating Nebraska just like it's another school," Jones told *Husker Online*.

RB **Kendall Bussey Jr.** (5-8/198), of New Orleans, was already wavering from his NU pledge before the coaching change. He made a number of unofficial visits this fall, including to Tennessee and Texas A&M. Bussey officially opened his recruitment up on Nov. 30, only to later tell *Rivals.com* that he was still committed to NU.

After Pelini's dismissal, Bussey's father told *Husker Online* that his son was, "still committed to Nebraska, but will be reopening things up a little while the coaching search takes place." A call from Riley Dec. 9 helped them understand where Bussey would fit in the offense, but they remain "committed but open."

Omaha commits **DaiShon Neal** (6-7/245) of Central and **Michael Decker** (6-4/288) of North were among the first to comment after Riley's hiring, with Neal telling 247 Sports, "(Banker) told me how he would like me to play as a true freshman and not redshirt." *The World Herald* later reported that Neal had hosted an Oregon coach for an in-home visit and would be taking an official visit to Oregon in January, however, so his status is somewhat tentative.

Decker has been quiet, but his HS coach was contacted by new NU assistant **Mike Cavanaugh** who assured him that Decker was a priority for them.

Class D2 No. 1 FC Sacred Heart earned a pair of lopsided victories last week on the road, beating South Holt, MO, 66-21 Tuesday and winning 63-42 at Friend Friday.

Sacred Heart won't play for the home crowd until Saturday, when they host St. Joseph (MO) Leblond - Falls City High's opponent tonight (Dec. 16 in Missouri). The Irish first make a trip to Humboldt Friday to face the 3-1 Titans.

Johnson-Brock's Ben Bohling led all scorers with 18 points.






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
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Unbeaten Tigers to St. Joe tonight

"Nebraska is really in the mix for Jalin now," Breeze told BigRedReport. com. "He is close to committing. I think that he just needs to come home and think about things."



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
