Falls City native dies in fire at N.M. residence

A 51-year-old Falls City native and school teacher in Shiprock, N.M., was killed in a duplex fire early the morning of Dec. 10.

Scott Schwarting, the son of retired Falls City businessman Larry and Marlene Schwarting,



had taught school in New Mexico for more than 20 years. He was a 1980 graduate of Falls City High School and went on to play baseball at Peru State College. He also coached Elks Midgets and Le-

gion Juniors Baseball in Falls City. "He was a pillar for this school," Principal Max Perez said.

After the tragedy, counselors met with teachers and students at both the middle school and the local high school, since many of the students there knew Schwarting, said a school official.

When fire crews arrived on scene early Tuesday morning (Dec. 10), they found an active residential structure fire and used fire suppression and conducted a search and rescue operation, according to a news release from the San Juan County Sheriff's Office.

Firefighters discovered that the fire extended to the attic of the duplex structure, and, during overhaul, they found Schwarting's body, according to the news release.

"He was found in the main living area of the duplex. According to our findings, it appears that the fire originated in the area," San Juan County Sheriff's Office Detective Tim Nyce said in the news release.

Further investigation by the sheriff's office and investigators from the San Juan County Fire Department revealed no signs of an accelerant and nothing to suggest foul play. The cause of the fire is still under investigation.

School Supt. Don Levinski said in a press release that the district's prayers are with Schwarting's family, students and staff.

Dorr and Clark Funeral Home, of Falls City, is in charge of arrangements. A service will be held in early January.

Scott Allen Schwarting was born Aug. 9, 1962 at West Point, NE. He attended school in Boyden-Hull, IA, and Fremont before the family moved to Falls City. He

Of cowboys and Christmas season miracles

Do you hear what I hear?

s it floats from heart to heart during this Christmas season.

Every one of us, no matter our station in life, has the desire and ability to give. We give of our time and skills, or if we can, we give monetary donations to causes that touch our hearts. If you have a cause that's worthy of your time and/or money this season, and you can only give there, then please give with a joyful heart, and just read this article for the inspiration that I hope it will provide. If you are looking for a cause to which you can give, I hope you'll be inspired to help out a young man who has become special to two of our own here in the Falls City area. His story is incredible.

Brad Thomas, a young man from the Broken Bow area, met locals Sissy Georges and her mom, Angel Ralph, after Brad and Sissy were featured in

separate segments of Lance's Journal on KOLN/KGIN television in Lincoln. Listen closely. It's the spirit of giving Lance, a native of Falls City, featured Sicey's story in January of 2012 and Brad's later that year.

Lance and I are personal friends, so through that connection, Sissy and Brad became friends. The two talked on the phone for nearly a year, and met for the first time in July of this year.

So let me tell you why this connec-

tion is so special. As many of you know by now, Sissy Georges is a local woman who has overcome blindness to become a barrel-racing champion. She breaks and trains horses, and is a certified equine sports massage therapist. Although Sis has no sight in her right eye, and sees only bits and pieces with her left, she was raised as if she could see, so she does her chores, takes care of her horses, and rides them daily, to keep them fit and strong. Sissy's horses are her wheels, her ticket to freedom, in her life. They're as important to her as the air she breathes.

(I have been telling Sissy's story for stages of the fourth draft of a book about her life. We hope that this is the

Brad's story may be a bit less familiar to people in this area, except those who had the goof fortune of catching his segment on Lance's Journal over a

year ago. I'd like to tell it again here, just in case you missed it.

Brad is a real-life cowboy. He gets in seven davs a week at his Sumner, NE, and drives 35 miles from his trailer to the Darr feedlot in Cozad, where he works as the head pen rider. There, he rides his horse for 14 hours a day. On the days when the weather

Man's home burglarized while family holds his visitation at funeral home

The home of the late Harry Marrs and his wife, Theresa, was burglarized while she, family members and friends attended a visitation service held at a local funeral home.

Mr. Marrs, 60, who lived at 1007 E. 11th Street in Falls City, died Dec. 11. His funeral was Saturday, Dec. 14, at Dorr and Clark Funeral Home. When visitation was held the Friday evening before the funeral, someone broke into the home through a sliding glass

Both Mr. and Mrs. Marrs, who survives, have had health issues and were prescribed narcotic prescriptions. Those prescriptions had been recently filled and all were taken, as well as approximately \$2,500 in life savings stored in a safe.

Since the prescriptions had just been filled, insurance would not pay for replacements.

Son Dan Marrs, Burlington, KS, said the home had been thoroughly "gone through" by the burglars. Both of his parents, he said, were disabled. Replacing the prescriptions for his mother was expensive, he said, considering as well that the couple's life savings had been stolen.


Dan Marrs said the Falls City Police Department responded to the scene of the burglary Friday night and continue to work with the family in pursuing those responsible.

Anyone who saw any suspicious behavior at 1007 E. 11th that night is urged to contact the FCPD. Dan Marrs said he is offering a \$1,000 reward if information leads to an arrest and conviction.

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Being a peace officer is not an easy job. The demands vary, I suppose, from routine to crisis. It has been my experience that Falls City Police Officers get the job done. And Chief John Caverzagie has a lot to do with that. John is retiring at the end of this year. Finding a replacement for him will not be easy, because John has handled the job with a calm competence and expertise that is to be

For many years, part of my job was to cover police — and sheriff's — news. I would visit those departments every weekday. Sometimes I'd pick up an accident report and virtually nothing else. But at other times, the news was much more consequential. John, and his Assistant Chief, Duane Armbruster, always gave me the news in a smart and legally-structured way. I never had to worry about violating some sort of information requirement, not because I was so smart, but because they were (and are).

"Caver," as he's known, has been the head of a department that is professional. I'm not sure a higher compliment can be paid. And something else. If you were in trouble, or had some sort of problem, you knew you could count on John and his officers. They were always there and not intent on issuing a citation. Their job, as conveyed by their chief, was and is public safety. That will continue.

I hope John and wife, Claudia, have a great time in the years to come. Ride that Harley without a care in the world, you two! You deserve it. And thank you from this writer and this newspaper. We will miss you, John. Thanks for helping me along the way.

I promise this column will not become sort of book report (see Final Rounds last week), but when one spends most of his time at home reading, well what the heck do you expect? Falls City is written by Kit Wilson and is available at the Falls City Library and Arts Center, where I'll donate my copy.

Wilson's book draws heavily on the two "hostesses" that he knew and were working Braniff Flight 250 that encountered violent weather on Aug. 6, 1966, and then fell to the ground in a fiery crash north and a bit east of Falls City. Forty-two people, including the entire flight crew and 38 passengers perished. That date coincided with Bill Schock's birthday. He was called from a celebration that night and reported the tragedy for days in the pages of the Journal. The photos he took from the crash scene are hard to look at. Victims were taken to Prichard Auditorium, where a makeshift morgue was set up. I had just graduated high school and was married with a daughter, Amy, who was less than a month old and a bit on the cranky side. We had our hands full and didn't learn of the crash until the next day.

The book, which could well become a screenplay, is told from the perspective of the hostesses, two young women who were attracted to "The Golden Age of Flight," when Braniff demanded style and dressed their hostesses accordingly. Wilson's story is told from a unique viewpoint. Each chapter is led with descriptive phrase and I thought those introductions were outstanding. The entire book is good, very good, and would be especially interesting to those who were here at the time, or who have a curiosity about this tragedy. It would also translate to the screen in what could be an excellent story, based on fact, as related by this author. I hope it works out for

Several weeks ago I wrote about birds, or the lack thereof, as reported by a "birder" who lives in east Falls City. In that column, I mentioned Arley Minshall of Salem, who creates some very, very neat bird feeders and bird houses. We included a photo of some examples of his creativity and craftsmanship. A week or so later, Arley stopped by our office and presented me with a Husker-themed feeder, that I was proud to put up for the birds that visit my neighborhood. And they are visiting. I just wanted to express my thanks to Arley for his gift - a Christmas one - to me. I will treasure it for a long, long time and appreciate it forever. It was not expected, but has, and will continue to be, much enjoyed.

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The importance of being vetted

"Haste Makes Waste." I have that reminder on a slug of 72point lead type made on a Ludlow by the first publisher for whom I worked after leaving journalism school 44 years ago.

It showed up on my desk at the Nebraska weekly where I worked after I failed to catch a page proof that resulted in the same grocery store ad running on the back of both sections, at the expense of the second grocery store whose ad didn't appear. It required a 100-mile round trip to the printer to run the second section again. The newspaper delivery was delayed several hours. I learned my lesson. Now I take time to make important decisions.

Perhaps I "vet" those decisions. We hear that word often these days, usually the present participle "vetting" and usually in terms of politics. It means to make a careful and critical examination of something or someone. Synonyms include: examine; scrutinize; investigate; inspect; look over; screen; assess; evaluate; appraise.

Sounds like a lot of work. It was originally a horse-racing term referring to the requirement that a horse be thoroughly checked for health and soundness by a veterinarian before being allowed to race. It is a figurative contraction of veterinarian dating back to the mid 17th century and became a colloquial abbreviation in the 1860s with the verb form meaning to treat an animal.

So what does this have to do with government and politics aside from the fact that one often encounters the south end of a north bound horse in such environs. Vetting a candidate is the process of subjecting a person to a series of tests and evaluation before offering them employment. This includes the analysis of a candidate's background to determine if they are well-suited and up to the task.

Vetting – or the lack thereof - has made political headlines nationally for years. The selection of running mates or party candidates has been heavily impacted by some of those decisions. It is almost a given that such activity takes place in the political arena. Almost.

One is left to wonder if that happened in the case of Patrick Shannon, the Omaha man who was named by the governor to replace Senator Scott Price who resigned and moved out of state. appointment Shannon's nouncement was negated about four hours later when Governor Dave Heineman's office announced that Shannon had withdrawn his name from consideration due to personal, family medical reasons.

Not troubling on its face. Stuff happens. But then came press reports that this man was the same person who had been fined by the Nebraska Accountability and Disclosure Commission for campaign violations during his failed 2004 bid for the Legislature. That triggered criticism from the state Democratic Party (Heineman and Shannon are both Republicans) who sent out a press release saying it was disappointed that the governor cares more about appointing political allies than lawabiding ones.

Shannon is a disabled veteran whom the governor's office called a "fiscal conservative that recognizes the need for tax relief and tax reform." The governor's press release also said he is prolife and opposes Medicaid expansion and taxpayer-funded benefits

for illegal immigrants. In case you missed it, those are exactly the governor's views as well.

So, was Shannon vetted? When asked that question, the governor's office declined to

The governor has since said he'll consider candidates for the seat and make a decision on the appointment soon. The Legislature convenes Jan. 8 and the appointee will serve until January 2015. The seat goes up for election to a two-year term in November 2014.

Let's hope we've all learned the consequences of haste.

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Falls City PS, HTRS receive early childhood grant

The Trustees of the Sixpence Early Learning Fund announced last week that Falls City Public Schools and Humboldt-TR-S will each receive grant awards totaling \$250,000, beginning Jan. 1, 2014, and going until June 30, 2015. Sixpence awarded grants to six other communities to fund high-quality early childhood programs serving at-risk infants and toddlers across the state.

Sixpence grants are intended to build new early childhood programs, or expand existing services to reach more of the state's youngest, most vulnerable children. The FCPS grant was written by Kathy Martin, who will be the supervisor of the Sixpence project, and Judi Carter.

"Sixpence is about helping Nebraska's parents provide safe, stimulating and supportive environments and relationships for their children during the critical early years of life," said Amy Bornemeier, grant administrator for the fund. "It's especially important for families who face significant challenges in providing those kinds of experiences for their youngest children."

In Falls City, the Sixpence grant will be used to provide home-based education for birth to age three children and provide training for parents. The Parents as Teachers curriculum will be used as two family educators/home visitors, who will be hired by FCPS, and Supervisor Kathy Martin work with the families to provide early childhood education for the young children. Children (birth to age three) will be recommended for the program based on four criteria:

- 1. Children whose family income would qualify them for participation in the federal free or reduced lunch program.
- 2. Children who were born prematurely or at low birth weight as verified by a physician.
- 3. Children who reside in a home where a language other than spoken English is used as the primary means of communication.

than eighteen or who have not completed high school.

Superintendent Tim Heckenlively said, "The Falls City Public School District is excited to partner with local agencies in expanding early childhood learning opportunities for infants, toddlers and families living within District #56. Through funding support provided by the Sixpence Early Learning Fund and a match of local, state and federal dollars, the Falls City Public School will expand services for infants and toddlers age 0-3, and their families. The early childhood program will provide the kinds of high quality, early learning services that will positively impact families and close the achievement gaps within our school district."

Partners in the Falls City grant are Southeast Nebraska Community Action (SENCA) Head Start, Community Medical Center, Educational Service Unit (ESU) 4, the Southeast Early Learning Connection, Southeast District Health Department, Richardson County Health and Human Services, Falls City Area Ministerial Association, Falls City Library and Arts Center, and the Southeast Autism Spectrum Disorder Network. FCPS will work with the grant partners to provide services for children and families who qualify for the program.

Sixpence programs address the specific needs of children and families in their own school districts, providing an array of services and resources such as high quality child care, and specialists who work with individual families to improve parent-child interactions.

"Sixpence aims to prepare more of Nebraska's at-risk children to enter the K-12 system on par with their peers, reduce the achievement gap, and improve their chances for lifelong success," said Roger Breed, who recently retired as Commissioner of the Nebraska Department of Education.

"Sixpence is an innovative, results-driven 4. Children whose parents are younger model for early childhood development in

Nebraska," said Bornemeier. "It represents a collaboration between the Nebraska Departments of Education and Health and Human Services, and private investors at the state and local level. Our partners and investors demand a high degree of accountability for the dollars we invest."

Grantees are held to a rigorous evaluation process, and match their grant awards with local funds. Bornemeier noted that each community was required to provide matching funds to show a local commitment to this level of early childhood education.

"Sixpence grantees demonstrate a strong community investment in the development of their youngest children," said Kerry Winterer, Chief Executive Officer of the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services. "DHHS is emphasizing the use of community-based services to address family circumstances before they become more serious and result in encounters with law enforcement and the courts. The Sixpence program will help to provide critical services early in children's lives so they have an improved chance in life."

Taxable sales down slightly in county, FC

Net taxable sales in Richardson County and Falls City were down slightly in August in comparison with a year ago, according to the report of the Nebraska Department of Revenue.

County sales totaled \$3,957,451 compared \$3,960,139 in 2012, a decline of 0.1 percent. However, motor vehicle sales in the county jumped 26.5 percent, from \$1,687,852 in 2012 to \$2,134,477 this past August.

Nemaha County's net taxable sales dropped 7.7 percent, from \$3,258,388 in 2012 to \$3,008,341. Motor vehicle sales jumped from \$1,198,447 to \$1,500,791, a gain of 25.2 percent. Auburn's net taxable sales dropped 8.5 percent, from \$2,710,074 to \$2,480,037.

Otoe County had gains in both categories. Taxable sales climbed from \$12,042,829 in 2012 to \$12,677,208. Motor vehicle sales had a 19.1 percent jump, from \$2,784,305 to \$3,315,115 in August 2013. In Nebraska City net taxable sales totaled \$9,185,170 in 2013, against \$8,960,791 in 2012, an increase of 2.5 percent.

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



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

It is believed that this excellent photo was taken in the early 1940s when, as Bob Ferguson, a longtime Missouri Pacific employee noted in a recent talk before Historical Society members, over 2,000 Falls Cityans lived off MoPac paychecks. The majority of the railroad families lived south of 14th Street so their

breadwinner could walk to work—with his lunch pail in hand. There weren't two or three cars in every family in those days, and in many instances not even one set of wheels.

The Missouri Pacific became completely dieselized in 1953 and it was the end of steam engine photo ops with a story to tell such as this.



is gorgeous, he takes off his cowboy hat and looks up toward the sun with gratitude. But he also rides in the wintry snow, bone-chilling cold, breath-taking wind, and scorching heat (he has every other weekend off).

He rides to check the 40,000 head of cattle at the feedlot. If one of the herd is sick, hurt, or in trouble, then he and his fellow pen-riders set to work. The cattle are Brad's livelihood. But his horses are his life.

Obviously, then, horses were

the connecting factor for Brad and Sissy. They found a common bond — someone who understands why horses are so important.

But Brad and Sissy share more than just a common interest in horses. They also understand that stares of little kids in the grocery store, the appreciation for those who treat them just like everyone else, the need for independence, and the sense of freedom that they get from being in the saddle.

They understand each other

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because both have disabilities. And both have overcome those disabilities with jaw-dropping determination, and "I can do it myself" attitudes. Sissy is legally blind, but still became a barrelracing champion. She works with her horses every day. Brad lost both of his arms in a farm accident when he was five. He hoists his saddle onto his horse using his chest and a stub on his left shoulder. He cinches the saddle with his teeth, climbs up with incredible leg strength, and rides all day just like the other pen riders and cowboys do.

In addition, he cares for his mother, who has diabetes and has lost most of her own sight. (Another bond between Brad and Sissy.)

Thirty-five years ago, Brad was a "normal" kindergartner when he fell into a grain auger. When the ambulance arrived, the paramedics gave him very little chance for survival. They lifted him onto a gurney, slid him in the

back of the ambulance, and climbed in beside him. His mother jumped in, too. As the ambulance sped to the hospital, Brad slipped away.

Brad's mom had been taking classes to be an EMT, so she shoved a paramedic out of the way, performed CPR on her own son, and brought him back to life. After he lost both arms, she vowed to raise him like a "normal" child. Brad was about horses all of his life.

He refused to feel sorry for himself, and refused to let others do for him what he could do on his own. He learned to open doors with his feet, open packages with his teeth, and drive with the stub of his arm.

He found a way to do everything that you and I can do, and even some things we can't

But because of all of the ripping and tearing and bending and twisting, his body is worn out. He's caring for his mom now, too, and that adds additional

stress. He's only 38, but his teeth are worn down to stubs, his truck won't start sometimes, and his back is giving out. Yet still, this man refuses to ask for help, and according to Angel and Sis, is usually the first in line to help others.

He doesn't know it, but Sis and Angel have vowed to put him on the receiving end for the first time in his life. Well, not the first time. Last summer when they visited, they hauled several round bales of hay along. The hay bales were donated by local farmers Jerry Howard, Jim Schawang, Thomas Georges, and Boone Scholl. Russell Heineman provided the trailer to haul it, and Matt Bauman helped with gas.

They and many others have pledged more help, and Jerry Kennedy said he will haul a semi-load of hay. But the girls aren't stopping there. Those of you who know Angel know that, when she is on a mission, things happen. Angel and Sis don't think small. They dream big. I know Brad, too, and I dream big as well.

We want to find a donor who will give a four-wheel-drive truck, to which a remote starter can be affixed, and more user-friendly wheel can be installed. Angel wants to gather enough money to buy Brad some new teeth, or find a dentist who will donate his time to make that possible. We also hope to provide some hay and other necessities that will make his life easier. None of us expects all of this to come from this area, but hope that the people here in our hometown will open their hearts to a stranger, and then Brad's home folks will open their hearts to their neighbor and friend.

Brad is not a charity case, nor would he want to be. He is a determined, hard-working young man who has overcome incredible obstacles without ever asking for a handout. In other words, he's good people — just like the people here.

Must be 21

FC hammers Auburn for 21st-straight time, dating back to 2005

For decades Falls City High School hasn't competed in an athletic conference, the place, let's face it, where rivalries naturally germinate and, if nurtured precisely and consistently with just the right amount of bad blood, bloom.

It's a natural occurrence. You can't, for instance, manufacture bad blood by mixing a color challlege with the persistence of Father Time. Hence the end - for the immediate future, anyway - of the some 40-year Falls City-Hiawatha basketball series Tuesday was as scintillating as Kevin Scheitel and a handful of plastic mistletoe, watered down with 37 free throws and a 68-61 FC victory.

And since it takes two to draw bad blood, the Auburn-Falls City rivalry is currently withering on the vine, as the Tigers beat the Bulldogs Friday night for the 21st consecutive time, dating back to January 2005. The one-sidedness of the series was illustrated quickly, as FC jumped out to a 23-5 lead and sent Auburn back ho-ho-home with a 64-28 gift. The Bulldogs can in theory return it Feb. 7 in Auburn, but Don Hogue's Tigers long ago got stingy on refunds. No refunds, no rivalry.

Stingy is Falls City's modus operandi. The now 3-0 Tigers, in their first home game of 2013-14, forced 28 Auburn turnovers (seven different Tigers recorded steals, led by junior Jack Hartman, who had four) Friday and limited the Bulldogs, which improved to 3-2 Saturday with a one-point win at stillwinless Elmwood-Murdock, to a woeful 12-of-51 shooting performance from the floor. No Bulldogs scored in double figures, but again, that's just what you'd expect from the Tigers' defense.

Last week Falls City added solid offense to its repertoire and the combination of the two was encouraging to Hogue and FC, whose Christmas list is full of Ws, nothing

What's not to like?

Friday, senior guard Mitchell Harling drained 4-of-6 three-point attempts en route to 18 game-high points, and the team made 7-of-15 threes to go with 13-of-16 free

Tuesday, it was senior Tyler Di-Giacomo striking from long range, making 4-of-7 threes and all four of his free throws in scoring a gamehigh 18. Junior Jordy Stoller added 15 points on 7-of-8 shooting from the field and the Tigers collectively hit 8-of-16 from three-point land. That's 15-of-31 for the week in an area that's for years been a thorn in FC's side.

Free throws, too, were a strength all week. Tuesday's 22-of-31 shooting from the stripe (Harling and Ryan Mount each went 5-of-6; and senior Reese Hogue hit 4-of-6, to go with a team-high six boards) was followed up by 13of-16 shooting on the home rims. Mount, who's athleticism and size often get him to the rack, made 6-of-7, bringing him to 11-of-13 on the year. Harling (15-of-16), Stoller (14-of-17) and DiGiacomo (6-for-6) have FC making 78 percent of their foul shots thus far.

They needed them Tuesday to potentially avoid upset at Hiawatha. The Tigers opened up a 38-26 halftime lead, but saw it dwindle down the stretch as the officiating grew tighter as the game progressed.

"We felt kind of handcuffed," Hogue said.

But FC nailed it down at the line. Reese Hogue, after missing a couple early in the fourth, made both ends of a pair of critical 1-and-1's and Harling made his five in the final period.

The Tigers are home again tonight (St. Joseph LeBlond), and Saturday (3-1 Class B Plattsmouth). The Blue Devils opened the year with a 23-point win over Auburn and have since beat Nebraska City and Schuyler while losing to Nor-

Big Red Recruiting Report

Recent Pledges

With the regular season over Nebraska's coaching staff hit the road hard recruiting with junior colleges as a primary focus. Results have been positive.

Following official visits for the Iowa game, DT Terrell Clinkscales (6-4/315) of Dodge City (KS) CC and CB Byerson Cockrell (6-2/185) of East Mississippi CC both joined NU's class.

The nation's No. 1-ranked junior college DT, Clinkscales should compete for playing time right away. He turned down 30-plus offers, including Alabama, Auburn, Ohio State and Oregon, to join Bo Pelini's program. NU's history with defensive linemen played a part in his decision.

"It was a big factor," Clinkscales told HuskerOnline.com. "I feel like they develop great d-linemen. Plus with Coach Rick (Kaczenski) and the way he coaches those guys up I know he can get me where I need to be.'

Cockrell pledged shortly before his team won the JUCO national championship. He talked with HuskersIllustrated.com about the opportunity for playing time next "I really liked the game and the facilities because I wasn't expecting that, because I'm not from here," he said. "Most importantly I could have a lot of playing time... I

was talking to the coaches today about the coverages, drills they do. I feel like that's something I can do." Defensive end **Joe Keels** (6-4/280) of Highland (KS) CC remained committed to Wisconsin after visiting NU in November, but the Huskers continued to pursue him. Clinkscales also got in Keels' ear, and on Dec. 10 Keels flipped from Wisconsin to

This is a big win for the Huskers not only because Keels provides immediate depth on the defensive line, but also because they effectively stole him from the division rival Badgers. I expect Keels and Clinkscales to compete for playing time im-

mediately in 2014. NU also added another JUCO pledge in November with receiver Robert Lockhart (6-1/185) of Hinds (MS) CC. The Huskers pursued Lockhart out of high school, before he signed with Virginia Tech. He never made it to Blacksburg, though, instead

becoming a student at Miami before transferring to Hinds. NU beat out Ole Miss for Lockhart's commitment this time. He will have two years of eligibility and a redshirt season remaining at Nebraska.

It wasn't all JUCO guys, though. High school defensive end Darius Slade (6-5/237) of Montclair, NJ, has long been leaning to Michigan St., but recent inhome visits with Nebraska's staff have him thinking hard about the Huskers. He's also considering Penn State, but this seems like a two-school race. The Spartans' recent Big Ten championship plays in their favor; however Slade likes how NU uses Randy

I thought that this one might come down to the impression NU's coaches made on Slade's parents on a Dec. 11 in-home visit, however Slade announced that morning that he would make his commitment known at a ceremony that day at his school. With Pelini and defensive coordinator John Papuchis set to visit that evening, things looked positive. In the end, it was his talks with the head coach that swayed Slade to NU.

'From the outside looking in, most people think coach Bo is not a great guy or not a great coach, but when you get a chance to meet him and talk to the players, they all have great things to say about him," Slade told HuskersIllustrated.com. "He's a great coach. He cares about his players and has their back 100 percent...

In addition, LB Jaevon Walton (6-0/236) of New Orleans chose NU over Missouri and others. Walton is a bit "under-the-radar", but NU has had success with players like him recently. Players such as Ameer Abdullah, Cethan Carter and Maliek Collins were all ranked and recruited very similarly to Walton. Whether Pelini's staff has hit the jackpot again remains to be seen, but Walton looks the part and shows up well on film while playing for powerhouse Edna Karr HS in New Orleans.

Official Visitors

During the last official visit weekend (Dec. 14) before the dead period in recruiting begins, the NU coaches brought multiple prospects to Lincoln.

Running back Brandon Powell (5-9//167) of Deerfield Beach, FL, is someone the Huskers have been recruiting since the summer. Initially committed to Tennessee, Powell flipped to Miami in August but has continued taking visits.

'With Nebraska, they've been on me ever since I first committed to Tennessee a long time ago and since I've committed to Miami they still haven't given up on me," he told HuskerOnline.com. "They're still coming after me hard and that's why I have a lot of interest in Nebraska right now."

Word from recruiting experts is that Nebraska has jumped to the top of Powell's

Another player NU has long coveted is athlete Kalen Ballage (6-2/216) of Falcon, CO. Ballage can play a number of positions after starring at running back in high school. With his size and 4.37-second speed in the 40-yard dash, he's a top-250

Just days before his visit, Ballage committed to Arizona St. Washington is also in play with new head coach Chris Peterson from Boise State, and NU should stay in it to the end with Ron Brown as his lead recruiter. This could come down to Signing

Receiver Erik Lauderdale (6-2/200) of Saddleback CC in Mission Viejo, CA, was the third official visitor. He's also considering Oregon, Florida, Tennessee and Arizona State. The Ducks have a pretty solid lead for his pledge, especially with QB Marcus Mariota coming back for another season. A visit gives NU a chance, but they'll have to knock it out of the park to sway him – especially with a visit to Oregon yet to come.

Two late additions to the weekend were quarterback/athlete Coltin Gerhart (6-1/216) of Murrieta, CA, and JUCO DB Kweishi Brown (5-11/180) of Grossmont

Brown has Arizona State at the top of his list and is also considering West Virginia and Washington. He was originally committed to Arkansas, but decided to reopen his recruitment mid-fall. Brown is more of a true cover cornerback than the other JU-COs the Huskers are pursuing. He will graduate in May with two years of eligibility remaining plus a redshirt year if needed.

Gerhart is committed to Arizona State as a safety, but Nebraska offered him as a quarterback. He is the brother of Minnesota Vikings running back Toby Gerhart and current Arizona State offensive lineman Garth Gerhart.

Watching highlights from his senior season, Gerhart shows good pocket presence, above-average arm strength, fairly good touch, and good speed. He's not "Taylor Martinez fast", but then only about 1-percent of athletes have that type of explosiveness. Gerhart looks to be faster than the QBs currently on NU's roster, and he runs an offense similar to what Tim Beck calls in Lincoln. Stealing him from ASU would be a solid coup. Oklahoma, BYU and Duke have also offered him.

Another factor in Gerhart's recruitment is that he literally grew up in the same neighborhood as Taylor and Drake Martinez, and his father coached Taylor Martinez in high school for two years. While that won't be a deciding factor, the relationship will allow for a predetermined level of trust during his visit.

Change in Plans

Nebraska is also heavily involved JUCO defensive back **Josh Keys** (6-2/180) of Mississippi Gulf Coast CC, who visited during the Michigan State game. As the weekend began, NU was considered the leader for Keys' pledge.

NU had been his only official visit, and the recent change in visit plans by fellow JUCO DB Danzel McDaniel (6-2/205) of Dodge City (KS) CC seemed to indicate that Keys would commit. Then Keys unexpectedly took an official visit to Southern Miss. for the weekend, and then even more inexplicably committed to Texas Tech!


Word among recruiting experts indicates that Keys' decision could be good news for NU. The extreme change in direction might mean that the Huskers feel confident about other targets.

Not all Roses

Defensive back Chance Waz (5-11/173), who we mentioned last time might flip from Colorado to Nebraska, did indeed flip after the Iowa game. He stayed committed to NU for a full two weeks, but decommitted after receiving an offer from Baylor who he mentioned as his "dream school." It's just a matter of time before he commits to the

Lady Irish tie state record with 15 three's in win over South Holt

Top-ranked Falls City Sacred Heart's torrid start to the season continued last week as the Lady Irish tallied three wins – all by double figures – and improved to 4-0.

The wins came Friday at Wetmore, KS, 55-31, Thursday in FC over Hiawatha, KS, 64-46, and in FC Tuesday over South Holt, MO, 69-31.

Tuesday's victory was the most impressive, as FCSH drilled 15 three-pointers to tie a Nebraska state record for made three-point shots in a game. Lincoln Southeast made 15 in 1999 and 2008, and Minden knocked down 15 threes twice in 2011. The Lady Irish's previous best was 12 made three-pointers in a game in 2005.

Through four games, the Lady Irish have averaged 61 points per game, won by an average of 27 points and drained 37 three-pointers at a rate of nearly 47 percent.

Junior Abby Magdanz connected on 6-of-8 from behind the arc against South Holt, while senior Ashli Jordan made three treys in the first half and two more in the second half to lead the Lady Irish. Magdanz and Jordan finished with 20 and 17 points, respectively, against South Holt.

The backcourt duo have been lights out through four games, combining for 24 made threepointers and each are connecting on better than 52 percent of their attempts from downtown.

Freshman Haylee Heits also finished in double figures with 12 points and added seven rebounds, while junior Elizabeth Magdanz added eight points, six rebounds and five assists.

Last Thursday, **FCSH** knocked down 9-of-20 from behind the arc and outscored Hiawatha 22-5 in the second quarter to open up a 40-18 lead. Jordan connected on all three of her three-point attempts during the second quarter run and sophomore Maggie Goltz score eight of her 10 points in the second half. Jordan led five FCSH players in double figures with 18 points, while adding seven team-high rebounds to her night. Elizabeth Magdanz, Abby Magdanz and Heits added 12, 11 and 11 points. Abby also dished out seven assists and recorded three

The Lady Irish cooled off a bit from long range Friday at Wetmore, but made up for it on the defensive end. FCSH made just 3-of-16 from downtown, but forced 30 Wetmore turnovers and held the Cardinals to 30 percent shooting from the floor.

Goltz finished as the only player in double figures with 14 points. Heits and senior Emma Schock each added points, while Jordan scored nine, pulled down 10 rebounds and dished out seven assists.

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
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FCSH makes smooth transition, off to perfect 4-0 start this winter

The Falls City Sacred Heart boys' basketball team improved to 4-0 on the season with three wins over out-of-state foes last week.

Saturday at Wetmore, KS the Irish defeated the Cardinals 59-46 behind 15 points and 10 rebounds from senior Matt Goltz, who finished 5-of-8 from the floor and 5-for-7 from the free-throw line. Senior Chaz Dunn added 13 points, five rebounds and five assists, while seniors Colin Niemeyer and Jarod Fiegener chipped in nine.

The Irish were 51-25 winners over visiting Hiawatha, KS Thursday night at Prichard Auditorium, as they raced out to a 26-4 halftime lead. Dunn made 2-of-3 three-point shots and led all scorers with 15 points. He also led FCSH with five assists and four steals. Goltz added 11 points, eight boards and six blocked shots. Hiawatha connected on just 11-of-43 field goals (25.6 percent) and was out-rebounded 35-24.

FCSH had their best offensive performance of the early season last Tuesday as they overmatched South Holt, MO, 77-22. The Irish opened with a 23-4 first quarter, then led 35-16 at the half before posting another 23-4 quarter in the third. FCSH finished 6-for-12 from behind the arc and 33-for-57 from

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the floor overall. South Holt struggled against the Irish pressure and turned it over 37 times.

Dunn, Niemeyer, Goltz and senior Eli Ramer each finished with 13 points. Junior Logan Scheitel led FCSH with six rebounds, while junior Austin Malone joined Dunn with six steals each. Malone and Dunn also dished out eight and seven assists, respectively.

The 50-percent success rate from downtown was by far the best for the Irish, who have combined to go 5-for-28 from the three-point line in their other three contests, as they try and play catch-up after early practice time due to their state championship run in football.





The RtI use this data to progress monitor and select intervention plans for the at risk reading students. Walkthrough Observations continue and Formal Evaluations have begun. All Probationary Teaches have received their first semester evaluation as per District policy. Year 3 Cycle Certified staff will receive Student Learning Objective training on Dec. 11. Fourth grade will complete their mid-year MAPS testing by the end of December and 3rd and 5th grades will complete their mid-year MAPS testing in January. Three 4th grade teachers and one 3rd grade teacher attended an Analytical Scoring Workshop annually

hosted by ESU 4. At the November

Professional Learning Community Day (PLC) South School teachers reviewed Chapters 5 and 6 in the Art and Science of Teaching that aligns with the pilot teacher evaluation model. The winter concert for band and chorus was Dec. 2 with Mrs. Sutton and Mr. Stutheit showcasing some of the quality work being done throughout the first semester. Staff continued on the elements discussions from the "Arts and Science of Teaching" that is core to our new evaluation system. We are again going to use some homeroom Silent Structured Reading time to work on Reading Strategies. The meeting was concluded with Positive Behavior and Intervention Support items. Students in grades 6 thru 8 are participating in the pencil/ paper part of the Geography Bee this week. Twenty-eight students will be participating in the oral part of the competition on Dec. 11. Mr. Munford and Mrs. Boatright are in charge of this event. At the November Professional Learning Community Day Problem Solving PowerPoint and rollout plan for School Improvement was discussed. Teachers spent time in groups working through a curricular problem and working through the steps. Winter MAP testing and dates were discussed. Staff continued on our elements discussions from the "Arts and Science of Teaching" which is core to our new evaluation system. The 8^{th} grade students raised \$814 dollars at the recent Chautauqua and have voted to donate this to the Team Jack Foundation in Atkinson, NE. The money is then sent to Dana Farber Cancer Institute/Harvard Medical School to help fund translational and innovative pediatric brain cancer research. Over \$4,100 charitable dollars have been raised for local and world causes since 2008. Boys' basketball, coached by Kevin Scheitel and Jason Vitosh, is off to a great start with 30 seventh and eighth grade boys participating. The Teacher/Principal Evaluation Webinar for pilot schools was held on Dec. 4. The topic was Student Perception and Stakeholder Surveys. Student enrollment is 167.

2.2d Gale Dunkhas for High School reported on the following: Student enrollment is 256. At the November Professional Learning Community Day (PLC) the High School staff received hands on app training on eBackpack which will be the primary app used by staff and students to exchange assignments and homework electronically. This app exports grades directly into PowerSchool. Dunkhas plans to attend the State Principals Conference in Kearney on Dec. 12-13. We are currently registering students and making necessary changes to their second semester schedules. Winter sports have begun with 24 participating in girls' basketball, 33 in boys' basketball, and 17 in wrestling. Sixty-four students are scheduled to take the ACT exam on Dec. 14 at FCHS. High School Students of the Month for November are Cody Schawang, Taylor O-Brien, Carter Hunzeker, and Sydney Brewer. Congratulations to Madison Buckminster for being selected as the 2013 Hugh O'Brien Youth Leadership representative from FCHS, Jordan Phroper was selected as alternate. Acknowledge Kris Simon and the One-Act students for their performances; Vince Dean for being selected as "outstanding actor" at Districts; Alisha Sutton and the chorus students and parents for the Madrigal Feast; and Kent Stutheit and the band students for participation during the soup supper. Important dates: Dec. 18, two hour early out for PLC; Dec. 19-20, Semester Tests; Dec. 20 is the end of the first semester and dismiss for Christmas vacation; Dec. 22 thru 26 is the 5-day NSAA moratorium; school resumes on Jan. 6; Jan. 7 is eBackpack training for students during study halls; Administrative Rounds begin where ESU 4 trainers and administration observe teachers teaching in their classrooms and give ideas and discuss

what was seen during the observation. 2.3 Board President's Report: Hollens expressed his appreciation to Judi Carter and Kathy Martin for receipt of the Early Childhood Sixpence Grant. Martin stated that we were one of 10 districts to receive the Grant. Hollens reported that he attended the Band Soup Supper which was very good and well attended, that he was unable to attend the Madrigal Feast as it was a sellout but has heard many good comments about it, he attended the FCMS winter concert which was great, and he wished all those participating in winter sports to have a successful season.

2.4 Superintendent's Report:

2.4a Legislative and Organizations Report: There were many good sessions and speakers to choose from again this year at the annual NASB/ NASA State Education Conference. This conference continues to be a primary board development opportunity. Heckenlively commended the Board members for their attendance at the conference.

LR 208: Representatives from several education organizations testified in support of LR 208 Dec. 4, in support of Sen. Kowalski's second attempt to

make it easier for all districts to fund safety and security improvements. It's believed that the need is real, and it's the funding source and budget authority that must be dealt with. It is also possible that short of amending TEEOSA to accomplish this, other approaches such as a categorical, noncompetitive grant process may work. There will obviously be more to come on this resolution.

Actuarial Report for School Retirement Plan: The passage of LB 553 (2013) has had a positive and significant impact on the state retirement plan through increased state contributions along with provisions to decrease liability to the plan. According to the report, the funded ratio for the School Plan remains at around 77%. Naturally, the higher the funded ratio, the healthier the retirement plan. The funded ratio is the ratio of the actuarial value of assets to the actuarial accrued liability. They appear confident that the funded ratio could be increased to 80% or higher within a few years so long as the economy and state investments continue in a positive trend.

Upcoming legislative and organization meetings include the NASB Legislative Issues Conference, Jan. 26-27 in Lincoln, NRCSA Legislative Forum on Feb. 19 in Lincoln, and the NRCSA Spring Conference, March 20-21 in Kearney. I will take care of registrations for board members wishing to attend these functions.

2.4b Building & Grounds Update: A technician from Plibrico Co. performed maintenance on the district's boilers at each building in late November, as per the service agreement with Plibrico Co. It was determined that one of the two heat exchangers will need to be repaired later this month at the Middle School. The estimate on the repair is \$8,072, plus the cost of the heat exchanger, which is pending warranty by the manufacturer.

Cost estimates for the 2014 project list are near complete and a Project Committee meeting needs to be scheduled with the intent of prioritizing the projects to be completed in 2014.

2.4c Continuous School Improvement & District Goals: Continuous School Improvement Plan Goal: All FCPS students will increase their achievement in math problem solving across all content areas.

The AdvancED Continuous Improvement Steering Committee met Nov. 13. The committee reviewed a Problem-Solving video presentation that was drafted by Mr. Vitosh, which will provide a uniform method of delivery to all instructional faculty. The committee also reviewed and approved the use of the Problem-Solving Evidence Document that will be utilized to collect documentation in the implementation of the problem-solving strategies at each building.

The District 56 goal of investing in technology that supports student learning will continue to be addressed through the iPad Bootcamp, scheduled for Dec. 9, 11 and 18. The Bootcamp starts at 6 p.m. each evening in the FCHS auditorium with a short presentation and question/answer time. Participants will then move to appointed areas to hand out the iPads, create an apple ID and download apps. Monday is for Juniors and Seniors and their parents and Wednesday will be for Freshman and Sophomores and their parents. The 18th is for anyone unable to make it to either of the first two Bootcamp

sessions Heckenlively spoke to the Board and presented them with a Bond Refunding Analysis. Heckenlively was contacted by Cody Wickham of D. A. Davidson and he stated that the market is right for refunding some of the bonds which are scheduled to be paid off in 2019. If the Board decides to refund the bonds, this would be the third and final time it could be done. Heckenlively contacted Bruce Lefler of Ameritas, who has all of the bonds and he agreed that it is a good time to look at refunding. Discussion was had by the Board and it was the consensus that Heckenlively contact D. A. Davidson regarding the refunding of bonds. Heckenlively will prepare the necessary documents and it will be placed on the agenda as an action item for the January meeting.

The Sixpence Grant for children from birth thru three years of age is a sixty page grant application created by Judi Carter and Kathy Martin. The first six months, January thru June, will be for \$75,000.00 and from July thru June will be for \$150,000.00.

First, (and I am glad a committee is in place and moving ahead as I speak) you need to do this project and you need to do it ASAP! You have the land and I know you have the "means" to get this project done. And, while there are many excellent reasons for doing this project, the big-

gest reason I see is the safety hazard of so many people walking back and forth to O'Connor Hall! That just needs to stop . . . and as quickly as possible!

But my next reason is this. Msgr. is close to may age and, unfortunately, we all know that means retirement in the not-toodistant future. And, while Msgr. has told me his retirement is not imminent, I think this project needs to be completed while he is still in charge so he can "cut the ribbon" of a wonderful new and much needed Activities

Thank you for reading this letter and, as always, I will be pleased to help Sacred Heart School in any way I can!
