## Strong attendance numbers correlate with good marks in reading, writing, math

A recent State of the Schools Report suggests Falls City Public School students are in attendance nearly 96 percent of the time and are indeed learning their reading, writing and arithmetic.

Under AQuESTT, Accountability for a Quality Education System Today and Tomorrow, FCPS earned the top (out of four) classification of "Excellent" in writing, as 78 percent of local youngsters meet or exceed the state standard requirement, which is four percent above the state average. Likewise, 78 percent of FCPS kids meet or exceed reading standards, though AQuE-STT rated District 56 as merely "Great" (the second classification). "Good" and "Needs Improvement" round out the rubric.

Other notable results include:

- 72 percent meet or exceed the state math standards, compared to 76 percent in 2014. The district AQuESTT math status is "Good."
- 76 percent of FCPS students meet or exceed the state science standards; again, AQuESTT gives a grade of "Good."
- Overall, FCPS' AQuESTT classification status of "Good" is determined based on the average NeSA score in the district for the

## Justice and Education

In 2007, the Nebraska State Supreme Court made a decision on a lawsuit challenging the adequacy of funding for a quality education for students in public schools. The Court determined that schools have a duty in "providing free instruction," but rejected the idea that there is any judicially enforceable standard of quality education. Local critics protested the decision that education in Nebraska didn't have to be good, it just had to be free. The court could require education to be free, but could not require it to be of high quality? Is that justice?

Peter Marcuse, editor and contributor to the book, "Searching for the Just City" (2009), proposes a simple definition of justice. The application of law requires "equality, equity, and fairness." Justice is not only a product of the legal system. Justice is also dependent on our political system. Is it enough that students are guaranteed access to our schools by the law, or should there also be a positive recognition — as in a "Just City" — that access to a school is not enough for educational success? Consider an obvious example. In

1954, the US Supreme Court declared that

segregated schools were unconstitutional. Nearly a decade later, a significant number of schools had not yet accepted black students. In fact, in 1963, nearly 99 percent of black students in southern states were still in segregated schools. Court decisions and law enforcement officers were not sufficient for desegregation. Social and political support — and change — were equally necessary.

#### **Significant Dividing Point**

The idea that there are other actions — political decisions that really determine whether citizens in fact have access to the fair treatment promised under the law challenges us to think far beyond the legal system. In the example of education, equitable treatment includes more than establishing the legal right to access. The 1954 Supreme Court did its part. Are we doing ours? Some would argue that the legal right to attend a public school is the great equalizing element for students. It is necessary, but not enough. Justice requires that students attending our schools have an equal opportunity for education. This concept may be the most significant dividing point between the elite 1 percent and the other 99 percent in America. Justice in public education means that every student needs a network — a community — of services and opportunities to grow and develop as a student prepared to take full advantage of what schools offer. Do all students in our communities have the benefit of quality pre-schools, health providers, public transportation, safe communities, computers, libraries, museums and art galleries? Do their parents have access to good jobs and affordable housing? If justice is not found in the social, economic, and political structures of daily life for both adults and children, it has little chance anywhere else.

### **The Toughest Opponent**

The metaphor of the Just City is not only about cities. It should challenge us to reflect on our own community schools. How would our schools be dif-

ferent if they were politically structured as sites of economic and social equity? The fact is that students in Nebraska do not have equity in resources or in educational opportunity. The structural system of funding schools is determined Nebraska State Education Association politically. The economic inequity for students across Nebraska - and the resulting educational disparity — is a result of political and social forces.

This is about fair and adequate distribution of public resources. Look carefully at your community schools. The hard fact is that being fair to all students — giving more resources to some students or some schools — takes tax money. Tax decisions are the toughest opponent of the aspirations of courts and the law. The politics of taxation and resource allocation are concrete examples of the opportunity for substantive justice for our children. Do the children in your community go to school in a 'Just City'?



## Where's the peace & joy in border closings and gun-free zones?

Whatever happened to peace on earth, good will to men?

Is it just me, or has the world gone crazy? Are we really talking about closing the borders to keep folks from other countries out? Stop, consider your ancestry. If the border had been closed in 1902, I wouldn't be living in America right now. We all came from immigrant stock.

Yes, we ARE operating in a new era of fear. It's difficult to accept people who don't look like us, talk like us, dress like

us or act like us. In the wake of the San Bernardino shootings, there's a renewed call for more vetting. There has to be a way to reduce the risk.

I don't mind the airport scanning and the TSA bag checks. I had to fly to the East Coast a few weeks after 9-11. Seasoned travelers said to avoid the Boston Airport "because it's a crime scene." The airline routed me from Minneapolis to Boston to get to my destination in Providence. They gave me a voucher to take a taxi from Boston to Providence.

No, I didn't hail the cab that was driven by the guy with the beard and the turban. And there were a couple other "suspect" looking drivers that I didn't stop. I finally found a guy that looked like me, the poor devil.

So, I'm guilty. I've been there. I will also admit that I befriended Jim Brady before he was announced as President Reagan's White House Press Secretary and was in frequent contact with him. After he was wounded in the assassination attempt on Reagan, I supported the Brady Campaign against gun violence.

I grew up with a dad and other family members who liked to hunt. I spent many an early Saturday or Sunday morning hunkered in a duck blind on the North Platte River east of Gering. My wife has advanced bars on her marksman award. We know and respect guns because we grew up that way.

I am concerned now about some of the gun talk I hear. "The gunfree zones are what's killing us," says state Senator Tommy Garrett. Nebraska law prohibits concealed guns in a wide range of places: colleges; churches; schools; sporting events; hospitals; banks and bars. Garrett's staff is drafting legislation that would eliminate most of those gun-free zones, allowing people with concealed-carry permits to take their firearms almost anywhere in the state, while retaining exceptions for police stations, courthouses, jails and prisons.

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln Faculty Senate has approved a resolution supporting a continued ban of weapons on campus. That is seen as a formal response to Garrett's proposal. Faculty Senate President John Bender says they prefer the status quo when it comes to weapons on campus. They want the University of Nebraska-Lincoln to have the authority to restrict weapons on campus.

Garrett says the state already takes steps to ensure concealed-carry permit holders are responsible, through required background checks and firearms training. He claims that these folks are not criminals, wackos or mentally unstable people. He characterizes them as law-abiding, Godfearing American citizens.

Good for them. But how many criminals, wackos or mentally unstable people have we heard about who still manage to get their hands on guns and wreak havoc on others similarly situated as well as those law-abiding, God-fearing American Supporters of less restrictive gun

control laws say that recent college shootings could have had different outcomes if some of the students had been armed and could have fired back at the perpetrators. The University of Nebraska has historically opposed efforts to allow concealed

own behalf, UNL

Police Chief Owen Yardley says allowing concealed guns on campus would complicate things for police and potentially endanger more people. Reports of armed people on campus always put officers on alert and it would be confusing and difficult to sort out the good from the bad. To say nothing of the alcoholism and mental health issues among students. Neither one of those situations mix well with gunpowder.

Never say it can't happen here. The robbery of a US Bank branch in Norfolk in 2002 and the assault on Von Maur at Omaha's Westroads Mall in 2007 claimed multiple victims.

The whole thing, Garrett says, is a sad commentary on our times. I agree. But as we discuss the issues, let's be rational and reasonable and be sure we aren't making things worse.

### Small Business Q&A

Q: I have a few employees within my business and I think they could be more productive in their jobs. How should I handle this conversation? - Crete, NE

A. It appears like a conversation defi-

nitely needs to occur, but you should be clear on what you want and how you are going to communicate it. If you have reservations about productivity concerning employees, communicating a clear and consistent message is essential. Do these employees know your vision specifically? Do they know the specific activities they need to contribute too within the organization to help achieve that vision? Do you know the metrics that contribute to this vision? Do they know these metrics and why they are important? Are you holding them accountable to these metrics? I would suspect your employees want to be "productive" in their jobs but might be unclear on the specific activities they need to achieve to help the business. If you have any high productive employees, I would highly recommend recognizing these employees within the business. Sometimes just recognizing positive behavior, helps with other employees to achieve more. As a business owner, you should be clear on what you want from employees and how their actions are important within the business. Be clear and consistent with what you want. If it gets achieved, recognize it and reward it in public and let everyone know it in the business. If it consistently doesn't get achieved, recognize it in private and allow the employees who don't agree with your vision to move on to something that is a better fit.

Q: I want to expand my business, but my funder is asking for projections or forecasts for my business. How do I accurately predict or "project" what is going to happen in my business? -York,

A. Many times funders want to get a better idea of what you plan on achieving with the change in the business. In this case, you feel expansion is necessary to achieve your business's goals. I would suspect your funders want to better understand these goals and how the expansion will help in achieving them. Usually providing financial projections allows funders to better understand specifically how these goals translate to their return on funding the expansion. Most of time the business owner is the expert concerning the market, the customers, pricing, marketing, costs, and the internal operations of the business. Will this expansion allow the business to increase sales through volume or pricing? Will the expansion increase or decrease costs? Do you need to hire more employees? How much time do you anticipate this hiring and training will take? Will the expansion involve increase rent? By how much? Obviously many of these questions are important to the success of the expansion and the funder is trying to get a better idea of how these factors will affect its success. Remember you are the expert in your business, not the funder. Explaining these factors to the funder will allow them to better understand how your business works and how it will function in the future. Although accurately predicting these factors is a challenge, you are essentially translating your expectations of the expansion in financial terms. I would suggest first listing your unit volume on a month to month basis after the expansion occurs. For example, let's say in month one you expect to sell 150 units of your product or service. I would then list the price at which you are selling. If you expect to sell 150 units for \$10 per unit, your projected revenue will be \$1500. I would then list the costs associated with month one operations. If, after the expansion, your month one costs are \$3000, you will have negative cash flow of \$1500 in month one. This might be a concern for a funder depending on how many months of negative cash flow your business plans on incurring compared how long it will take to "break even" of the initial investment of the expansion. I know this may seem like a guess or predicting the future on your part, but this will allow the funder to better understand your expectations as compared to their expectations of funding the expansion.

## Judge hands down lengthy probation term, 21-year-old Verdon man avoids prison term

A 21-year-old Verdon man found guilty in November of three Class II Felonies last week was sentenced to four years probation and ordered to pay fines and costs of more than \$4,000.

Phillip A. Doerr avoided a potential prison term after a jury found him guilty of assault in the first degree, use of a deadly weapon to commit a felony and possession of a firearm during the commission of a felony stemming from a June 26, 2013 vehicle collision in Falls City. He was accused of intentionally causing a two-pickup accident near 14th and Fulton Streets by ramming, at a speed of up to 55 miles per hour, the vehicle of 36-year-old Timothy Wittwer, of Falls City, in what prosecutors described as a case of "road rage." Doerr was driving a Ford F-350 Super Duty truck when it collided with Wittwer's Chevy S-10, causing it to roll twice; Doerr's truck rolled onto it's top and struck a light pole. Doerr exited the rear cab window largely unharmed; Wittwer was treated for possible spinal and neck injuries.

It was previously reported in error that Class II Felony convictions are punishable by a mandatory minimum sentence of one year in prison without eligibility for probation. State Statute 28-105 reads that felonies are "divided into nine classes...distinguished from one another by the following penalties which are authorized upon conviction" and names the minimum for Class II Felonies to be one year imprisonment. Furthermore, "a person convicted of a felony for which a mandatory minimum sentence is prescribed shall not be eligible for parole."

But the State Supreme Court

several times has ruled the Legislature's "Criminal Code" serves as a guideline and does not supersede the Court's discretion. A 1972 (State v. Cottone) judgment made it most clear: "This section lists grounds to be considered by the sentencing court, but specifically provides it is not to control his discretion." And most recently, in 2001's State v. Swails ruling: The section "does not impose a mandatory minimum term of incarceration for persons convicted of a Class II Felony."

Tuesday, December 22, 2015

District Court Judge Daniel E. Bryan handed down a lengthy probation term that will include 150 hours of community service (minimum of five hours per month) and the successful completion of a victim impact panel and anger management classes. Doerr was fined \$2,000, plus Court costs of \$536.22, and must pay an additional \$1,470 in probation fees.

Doerr, who operates a local contracting business and also performs tree and snow removal, initially was not issued a citation at the scene, but later that fall was charged with felony assault in the second degree. That was dismissed, but an arrest warrant for Doerr was issued more than six months later, again for felony assault in the second degree. That was amended, and the two others added, later in 2014.



# Lady Irish 26-0 thus far in 2015

FCSH senior Maggie Goltz scored 20 and eclipsed 1,000 career points Saturday afternoon, leading the topranked Class D2 defending champions to a 43-27 victory at St. Joseph (MO) Leblond. Junior Haylee Heits was completely dominate inside, grabbing eight offensive boards and a dozen overall, while blocking four shots.

Goltz becomes the ninth member of the 1,000-point club at Sacred Heart, joining '15 FCSH graduates and four-year starters Abby and Elizabeth Magdanz as the newest initiates. Katelyn Wheeler owns the all-time school record with 1,408 points and Goltz could feasibly catch her, though the point guard would have to practically double her shot attempts and average 20 points per game.

It likely means little, as long as each game is a victory. And that's the way its been for going on 12 months now. FCSH lost to Sutton in the first round of the Freeman Holiday Tournament on Dec. 30, 2014 and since then, they've run off 26 consecutive wins and need one win tonight and a championship at Freeman to post an 29-0 banner 2015.

"We're very good defensively," FCSH Coach Luke Santo said, "that's a big part of it. We have four starters that are six-feet tall - and our sixth is, too - it's just unbelievable for a Class D2 school. They're so long that teams can't shoot over us and they get frus-

That may be putting it mildly; FCSH is off to a 6-0 start in its title defense and its last five opponents haven't even put 30 points on the board. Over the course of the entire last year, only three of the 26 opponents reached 40. Those are crushing defensive numbers.

The team lost the four-year starting Magdanz twins, both 1,000-point career scorers, but regained Heits, who missed all of last year with a knee injury, and are much improved in the frontcourt with her hitting the boards.

"She's very strong - it's great to have her back," Santo said. "Haylee has real strong hands and has good footwork, too."

Elmwood-Murdock, a Class C2 school, was a 19-win team a year ago and is traditionally a pretty tough out, but they aren't bringing a very expe-

FCSH senior Maggie Goltz has made A LOT of shots during her basketball career - 1,000 points worth - but it's hard to fathom any single bucket having had a higher degree of difficulty than this particular shot she willed through the net during the second half of the Lady Irish's 43-27 win at St. Joseph (MO) Leblond Saturday afternoon. After taking Emily Madden, a 5-4 senior, on the baseline, the 6-1 point guard picked up her dribble with her back facing the glass, and was buried under the obstruction by what seemed to be a good two feet. With a nine-inch height advantage on her defender, the only thing, really, in Goltz' way was the wrong side of the glass. A drop step left and some amazing hang time somehow gave her an unobstructed view of the iron, which is generally all she needs. The All-Stater who scored 30 in her first state tournament game as a freshman, finished with 20 points on 8-of-12 shooting and pulled down eight rebounds, recording three steals and two assists in her team's victory. She becomes the ninth Lady Irish player to go over 1,000 points in her career, following directly behind the Magdanz twins. Katelyn Wheeler's school record of 1,408 career points scored appears to be safe, for the moment.





current year. Scores from all four NeSA subjects (reading, mathematics, science, and writing) are combined.

• Attendance rate for FCPS ranks above the state average at nearly 96 percent, largely as a result of parental support and student responsibility, District 56 Supt. Tim Heckenlively said.

"The particular academic strengths, reading and writing, can be attributed to key instructional strategies being implemented that include the implementation of proven teaching strategies, datadriven decision-making and parental support, and key instructional strategies impacting the achievement gains," Heckenlively said.

"The subject areas that did not show a marked overall improvement from last year were math and science. An emphasis on math and science will continue to be a focus area for improvement gains. Our district

demands strong skills in these areas. Academic proficiency is essential in life, the workplace

and at college. The BOE, administration, faculty and staff, combined with overwhelming parental and community support, will continue on our mission to ensure our students graduate with strong skills that will help them become innovative, resourceful, resilient, and responsible citizens," Heckenlively said, in summary.

In other news from the Dec. 14 meeting of the District 56 BOE:

-Second grade teacher Kim Oliver, accompanied by students Ella Glathar, Jack Holys, Emma Dean, Braxton Harmon and Blakely Sells, entertained those in attendance at the meeting with an engaging demonstration the iPad accessory, OSMO, and how it can be implemented into the classroom or home environment. Children can practice math, language arts, and writing concepts through an iPad and the interactive OSMO accessory. The Higher Learning Commission, which accredits four-year colleges and universities in 19 states, has adopted a regulation that only college teachers may teach dual credit courses offered in high schools. While this regulation is on hold, allowing for their members to appeal, the NE Rural Commu-

### The history behind beloved Christmas songs

Holiday traditions vary from family to family, but one component of the holidays that seems to be universally enjoyed is a good Christmas song. Music is piped throughout malls and stores to entertain shoppers, and favorite tunes may be on the radio or streamed through a digital music service as families decorate their homes.

Many people may love Christmas songs and carols, but not everyone shares the same favorites. Thankfully, there's no shortage of material when it comes to Christmas songs,.

In 2014, Time magazine researched records at the U.S. Copyright Office to determine the most popular and most recorded Christmas songs since 1978. when copyright registrations were digitized. The following are some of the more beloved holiday tunes and a bit of history about each song.

• "Silent Night": One of the most rerecorded songs in history (733 versions since 1978), "Silent Night," was composed in 1818 by Franz Xaver Gruber and put to lyrics by Joseph Mohr. It was first performed on Christmas Eve at St. Nicholas parish church in Oberndorf, a village in Austria. Today's version is a slow lullaby, but it's believed the original was a dance-like tune in 6/8 time.

• "Silver Bells": Now a Christmas classic, "Silver Bells" originally was written for the Bob Hope film, "The Lemon Drop Kid." Songwriter Jay Livingston wanted to title the song "Tinkle Bell," but his wife dissuaded him from using the word "tinkle."

• "White Christmas": Irving Berlin believed his song "White Christmas" would be an instant hit. His prediction was correct, especially after singer Bing Crosby recorded it.

• "Jingle Bells": Although it has become one of the more popular Christmas songs, "Jingle Bells" really was written for Thanksgiving. It's also one of the oldest holiday songs of American origin. James Lord Pierpont, the song's author, was inspired by the famous sleigh races of Medford, Massachusetts.

• "The Christmas Song": This classic Christmas song was written in 1944 by Bob Wells and Mel Tormé. It's usually subtitled "Chestnuts Roasting on an Open Fire." The song was written during a heat wave as a way to think cool thoughts. It only took 40 minutes to write the music and some of the lyrics. Nat King Cole's rendition of the song is among the more popular versions. Christmas songs are enjoyed and performed year after year. Popular songs continue to endure and attract new fans.







## Computers, related technology to be a 'qualified higher education expense'

Just in time for holiday giving, Congress last week approved legislation that includes computer equipment and related technology and services as "qualified higher education expenses" for beneficiaries of state-sponsored 529 college savings plans like the Nebraska Educational Savings Trust, State Treasurer Don Stenberg said Mon-

The new tax law, "Protecting Americans from Tax Hikes Act of 2015," which was passed Friday by Congress, is expected to be signed by President Obama.

Among other provisions, the new tax law makes the purchase of laptops, computers and related technology and services a "qualified higher education expense" when purchased for use primarily by the beneficiary of a state-sponsored 529 college savings plan like NEST at an institution of higher education, Treasurer Stenberg said.

The change is retroactive for NEST account owners who purchased these kinds of items from Jan. 1, 2015, on, Stenberg said. NEST accounts can be used at fouryear colleges, community colleges, technical schools and graduate pro-

nizing that laptops, computers and related technology should be considered qualified expenses, just like tuition, fees, textbooks, supplies and equipment, and, in some cases, room and board," Stenberg said.

Treasurer Stenberg also reminded account owners that contributions to NEST accounts must be postmarked by Dec. 31 to qualify for the 2015 tax year state income tax deduction. The maximum deduction is \$10,000 for a couple filing jointly or for a single tax filer.

Account owners who contribute to their accounts electronically have until 10:59 p.m., CT, on Dec. 31 to make their contributions.
