

'Ridiculous case' ends with 'not guilty' verdict

A 20-year-old rural Verdon man last Tuesday (Dec. 3) on his own free will walked out of the Richardson County District Courtroom after 12 of his peers found him "not guilty" on two felony counts.

It took the jury, which was handpicked by prosecuting and defense attorneys throughout the day Monday, about one hour to find Phillip Doerr, 20, not guilty of making terroristic threats and using of a firearm to commit a felony. The trial started at 9:30 a.m. and, after taking an hour for lunch, wrapped up at 5 p.m. Everyone, including Doerr, headed for home by 6. Doerr walked - and walked tall, vindicated by a verdict he said he knew was coming.

"I figured, with such such a ridiculous case, there was no chance of losing," he said.

That's not to suggest the stakes weren't high: The firearm charge, a Class II Felony, is punishable by up to 50 years in prison.

Doerr, who owns and operates a concrete contracting business, but also does some work in tree and snow removal, as well as housing rentals, was accused of pointing a black pistol at Alex Reed, 20, as the two men allegedly drove separate vehicles on Harlan Street on the afternoon of Friday, June 6. Reed said he turned off the highway, but Doerr then supposedly made chase for an undetermined period of time.

Reed called police to report the alleged incident, but Doerr, who spoke with The Journal last night (Dec. 8), wasn't arrested at the time and said he turned himself in

to the County Attorney's Office the attorneys with the Nebraska At-expensive route. following Monday only after hearing speculation that he was being sought by authorities.

"The accusations made against me were never investigated before I was charged," Doerr said. "Nobody called me and not once was I given the opportunity to rebut the accusations. They never asked me about a gun - even at trial no one asked me if I had a gun."

Greg Ariza and Kale Burdick,

torney General's Office, served as special prosecutors in the case.

Doerr, who was represented by Nebraska City-based lawyer Timothy Nelsen, said prosecutors at one time suggested a potential plea bargain (this was the first criminal case tried by a jury in Richardson County District Court in more than three years), but Doerr said he was never open to copping a plea. That certainly would've been the less-

"This all has cost me about \$30,000, but I'd hate to see how much taxpayer money has been wasted. \$30,000 for me, but it cost multitudes more to the taxpayers."

Doerr said he is currently "consulting with my attorneys about future lawsuits."

"Maybe the police should focus on arresting known criminals instead of persecuting a local business owner," he said.

Sunday was Pearl Harbor Day. It was observed matter of factly, remembered vividly by a few of us real old ducks, but for the most part had very little meaning for the younger generation.

I'm going to speak for what it meant to about 110 Richardson County men who were members of Company B, 134th Infantry, National Guard, which had been federalized a year before and were serving at Camp Robinson, Ark. They had been joined by around 20 young men from the county who had been drafted to serve what was to have been one year.

The afternoon of Dec. 7, 1941, about a half dozen of us Company B guys were attending a movie, "Sgt. York," (a World War I legend) at a Little Rock theater. Suddenly the screen went blank and the manager appeared on the stage with the startling announcement, "Pearl Harbor has been attacked by the Japanese! All Camp Robinson men are to report back to camp immediately!"

We left the theater, asking anyone on the street, "Where the heck is Pearl Harbor?" MPs on the street gave considerable strength to the get-back-to-camp immediately order. The group I was with took time to dine at a chicken-in-a-basket eatery.

Back at Camp Robinson our first sergeant, George Smedley, a World War I vet, called a company formation and looking like he had seen a ghost, announced loud and clear: "Men, we are at war!" None of us wanted to hear that.

On Monday in the 134th Infantry headquarters where I was on duty as a company clerk, I heard President Roosevelt's "day of infamy speech" over the radio, along with the declaration of war with Japan. Over 2,400 American servicemen had been killed. The next day Germany declared war against the U.S. and it became World War II.

The IIO Richardson County men who had been playing soldier for a year in the fields and wild and woolly woods of Arkansas and in the Louisiana Maneuvers, now were really honest-to-goodness soldiers--in for the duration.

There is no way I can describe the bedlam that ensued in the Company B area. Orders came down to prepare to move. Latrine rumors prevailed--we were going here, there and everywhere. Telephone lines back to Richardson County were swamped. It was a week like no other.

Then on Sunday we were on an antiquated troop train headed west, we thought to California. Four days later we unloaded at Ft. Ord, Calif., and on Christmas we were on the beach, in the rain, loaded rifles at our side little prepared to thwart a Japanese invasion which the high brass thought was a good possibility. It never happened.

Then the 134th Infantry's assignment was to guard aircraft factories and air bases in California. I left Company B to join the Air Corps. Company B finally wound up at Camp Rucker, Ala., in very realistic combat training. Then it was to England to train and await D-Day in France on June 6, 1944. A month after D-Day the company was in France fighting the Nazis at historic St. Lo and eventually going along with Gen. George Patton to participate in the horrific Battle of the Bulge. When the war ended in Europe our county guys had to pass some time as occupation troops before heading home after giving almost five years of their prime time to their country.

Every single one of them sure remembered Pearl Harbor Day.

The names of Company B guys won't be familiar to most but I want to throw a few of them at you anyway. They deserve to be remembered.

Five of them won Silver Stars, the third highest decoration for heroism in combat: T/Sgt. Cecil Eckley, T/Sgt. Paul Forney, Cpl. Bob Godfirnon, Pfc. Mike Helton and S/Sgt. Gene Weick.

Six were killed in action: Leland Thacker, Dawson; Ralph "Whitey" Bowman, Berkeley Chesley, Eugene Prater, Allison "Speed" Babb and Donald "Doc" Jones, all of Falls City.

I don't know the exact number but over 3,000 Richardson County men and women were among the 17 million Americans who served in World War II.

But the guys in Company B were among the relatively few who were in uniform on Pearl Harbor Day.

On Dec. 7 President Roosevelt told the world to "Remember

Pearl Harbor!"

How can we not? It set the world on fire. It impacted the lives of 17 million Americans eventually in uniform.

It truly was a day of infamy.



Football Is A Religion to Some Nebraskans

University of Nebraska football is a religion for many residents of the Cornhusker state. They think red, they see red and they bleed red. As the fan base goes, so goes the sentiment surrounding the game played by a group of unpaid college students, some of whom parlay their experience into well-paying jobs with professional sports teams.

There is no doubt that Nebraska football is big business for the University. The Husker faithful can buy season tickets, but large cash contributions (over and above the ticket price) are also required to secure those tickets from season to season. Because of the passion and the big money, Nebraska football is often the subject of constant analysis ... sometimes to the point of overanalysis.

Controversial head football coach Bo Pelini pulled the Nebraska program out of the depths of mediocrity with at least nine wins a season for a 67-27 record over seven years. His last win was a hard-fought overtime battle with Iowa the day after Thanksgiving. The victory came on the heels of back-to-back losses that caused more than the usual buzz about the fiery Pelini who was often shown on national television losing his temper at a player or an official.


His supporters remained passionate about the coach's right to vent a little. His detractors remained embarrassed by the actions and created a rumbling that eventually caught the attention of the "higher ups" at the University. When the big givers decided they could raise sufficient funds -\$7.65 million – to pay off Pelini's remaining 51-month contract, they told Athletic Director Shawn Eichorst to pull the plug.

For the two years that he has been AD at Nebraska, Eichorst has been something less than a household name. In fact, until he did the dirty deed, it's likely that a number of Nebraskans could not have picked him out of a police lineup even if the "suspects" were wearing nametags.

So it was, that on a Sunday morning when many folks were already at church, Eichorst met with Pelini and fired him. The media quoted the AD as saying "We weren't able to win enough games that mattered." On the last day of the month with the temperature around 13 degrees outside Memorial Stadium, Bo Pelini's fiery career as a Husker coach came to an end. At 9:43 am, Eichorst sent an e-mail to the coaches and players announcing his decision.

Was this a matter better suited to a personal meeting among Eichorst and the players and coaches? If the Huskers had played their last season game on Saturday, one might understand the Sunday morning meeting. But it doesn't seem that a decision had to be announced on a holiday weekend on a Sunday morning.

And now the days of specula-



Knowing Our Letters

A survey of students this month at a college campus revealed that many did not know who won the American Civil War, but could correctly identify both the current and former wives of actor Brad Pitt. Should we really be concerned about such sensational reports? The answer is yes. When significantly more teenagers are reported to be able to name the Three Stooges than the three branches of our government, we should all worry. In the last two decades, studies by the National Geographic Society, the National Constitution Center, the National Conference of State Legislatures, the American Council of Trustees and Alumni, the National Association of Scholars — and many others — all point to important problems in the foundational knowledge of what author and professor Mark Bauerlein calls, in a 2008 book by the same name, The Dumbest Generation.

Our language reveals the relationship that exists between learning and reading. It was once common to call an educated person "well-read." The word "read" is still a synonym for study or interpretation. The word we often use for knowledge and skill is "literate," derived from the Latin word for letter.

The simple fact is that reading is critical to the acquisition of knowledge. The effects of a non-reading culture are obvious and dangerous. If a democratic society depends on an informed electorate, we may be living on borrowed time.

'Pointless Babble'

Reading broadens our understanding of the human condition — of who we are and how our experience is the same or different from both friends and enemies. It helps us situate our history and our culture. And reading gives us practice in analyzing the claims of truth or fact. The great works of fiction are stories — lenses — that help us see and understand the world in critically different ways. Or course, reading does not have to be of 1,000 page literary tomes to be important. On the other hand, it can't be the stuff of 140 characters that defines much of the "pointless babble"

How do we encourage reading in a society that now questions the future of books and newspapers and can't even spare the time to look at "page 2" of a web search?

The Story of Family

As I write this essay, I think of the sheaf of letters that my great-great grandfather wrote home from the battlefields of the Civil War. I know who won the Civil War. I am connected to that answer by these letters and the knowledge that my forebear died in that war. I know he left a widow and 7 children and because of his death almost exactly 150 years ago, my understanding is deeper about how the death of every soldier today affects a family forever. All families have a similar sheaf of letters. They are from the battlefield, the hospital, college, former lovers or former foes, from lonely children, or aging parents.

These letters are the literature - the story - of every family. One question is why they are usually hidden away in a cedar chest or in the back of a drawer. The more immediate question is why such letters are not being written today. Tweets, emails, texts, and Facebook posts are temporary and usually too shallow to be the kind of important lens on humanity that other writing — and reading — offers. A friend of mine writes a letter to each of her children on their birthdays. These letters are "keepers," not temporary deletes.

Our society is losing its interest in reading and, consequentially, is less informed, less analytical, less insightful, and more easily distracted from important issues. Letters to friends and family are perfect ways to deeply explore real issues between people who care about each other. These letters will be read — and re-read. What will be the next letter that you will

was started in 1992 by Morrill Worchester, owner of the Worchester Wreath Co., of Harrington, ME. Finding themselves with a surplus of wreaths that year and nearing the end of the holiday season, Worchester decided to honor our country's veterans. With the help of Maine Senator Olympia Snowe, arrangements were made for the wreaths to be placed at Arlington Cemetery in one of the older sections of the cemetery that had seen a drop in visitors with each passing year.

The annual tribute went on quietly for several years, until 2005, when a photo of the stones at Arlington, adorned with wreaths covered in snow, circulated around the Internet. The project suddenly received national attention. Thousands of requests were made from people wanting to help at Arlington, to emulate the project at their National and State cemeteries or to simply share their stories and thank Morrill Worchester for honoring our nation's heroes. Unable to donate wreaths to each state, Worchester began sending seven wreaths to each state: one for each branch of the military.

In 2006, simultaneous wreathlaying ceremonies were held at more than 150 locations around the country. The Patriot Guard Riders volunteered as an escort for the wreaths en route to Arlington. This began the annual "Veterans Honor Parade" that travels the east coast in early December.

In 2008 Congress unanimously voted Dec. 13 as "Wreaths Across America Day." The wreath laying ceremony is held annually, on the second or third Saturday of Decem-

The UAV takes images of a field in order to find out if the crop has disease, insect damage, or fertilizer deficiencies. Solutions, based-off that information, are then offered to producers and their operations. Stevens' business partners include her sister, Laura Thompson, currently a UNL Assistant Extension Educator, and brother-in-law, Nathan Thompson.

Stevens is currently a teacher's assistant for Ag & Horticulture Associate Professor Dave Lambe and his business plan writing class, focusing on student ideas and entrepreneurship.

and Health and Human Services.





Eight months and 0:2.7 seconds later, Falls City High Head Basketball Coach Don Hogue got what was rightfully his: Career Win No. 200.

Hogue's 16th Tiger team Friday night in front of a large crowd captured the milestone win for their coach and did so, perhaps appropriately, in gutwrenching, dramatic fashion, beating preseason Nos. 9 and 10 in Class C1 by the state newspapers and coming off a 24-3 District Title-winning '13-'14, didn't shoot well at all, got in foul trouble and surrendered six three-pointers and 21 points to Rocket guard Tanner

And, now, maybe, only a 0:2.7-second horrific moment in time is what keeps Falls City dreaming about winning state tournaments - instead of expecting to win them.

But it's worth noting that a program that went 47 years without a state tournament berth and generations without winning a single district game, now expects to run over Syracuse and beat Wahoo - Wahoo! - sickening flukes aside.

"I was so excited in 2010 to have the first state berth in 47 years because it was always, 'can we get to state?'," Hogue said. "Now we've been to three District Finals in four years. We expect to be there. They're expectations, not

that level," he said.

The Tigers improved to 2-0 Saturday with an expected 58-25 route on the road at Tri-County. FC owned a ridiculous 33-16 rebounding edge, though the shooting (9-of-17 at the line; 26-of-56 from the floor) again wasn't up to par (though with a 30-6 halftime lead, Hogue emptied the bench early). Still, the Tigers made nearly 70 percent of its free throws a year ago and it had a big role in those 24 wins. At 24-of-48 on the year already, FC finds itself in an early hole in trying to make 70 per-

"We lost four guys in a seven-man rotation," Hogue said, "Syracuse had four back - we knew it wouldn't be easy."

FC senior Jordy Stoller scored six of his team-high 17 points in the overtime to lead the Tigers Friday, and seniors Jack Hartman and Zach Jordening each pulled down 11 rebounds as FC owned the glass. Sixth-man Kyle Leafty, just a sophomore, scored 10 in his varsity debut, and then followed it up with 11 points and 13 boards Saturday. Junior Trent Pentecost, another "new" regular in the rotation, scored 11. Ten different Tigers scored points in the game.

FC hosts Atchison, KS, tonight and travels to Auburn Friday. And they expect to get both of 'em.





Students

Twenty students from across Nebraska, including Avery Scott of Falls City High, are being honored by Secretary of State John Gale for their work during the primary and general elections. Each student will receive a \$50 gift card by the Nebraska Bankers Association, which along with the Secretary of State's office, sponsors the Youth Election Service program.

"The purpose of the program is to spark an interest in the election process among young people," Gale said. "However, in many cases these students are providing a real and measurable service to the county officials and the various precincts in which they work."

Youth age 14 to 18 work at least four hours during each election in order to qualify for the drawing for 20 gift cards, worth \$50 each. Gale said many students go above and beyond.

One hundred and sixty-eight students from 25 counties took part in the YES program, with the largest majority coming from Holt (31 students) and Richardson (31 students) Counties. In all, students worked around 865 hours between the primary and general elections.

How to prepare for cold weather power outages

Cold weather can bring wind, snow and ice. But cold weather also might be the culprit behind power outages.

Sudden power outages can be inconvenient and troublesome. The potential danger of a power outage only escalates when one happens during the winter. It is relatively easy to recover from a short-term loss of power, but extensive power outages can compromise human health and safety.

Relatively recent storms such as Hurricane Sandy illustrated just how challenging it can be for people to go without power, particularly today, when many people have grown accustomed to having everything available at the flick of a switch.

Heavy, wet snow can weigh down power lines or cause branches to break and damage electric cables. Poor road conditions can make it challenging for power company crews to arrive in affected areas and make repairs, which can lead to prolonged power outages. Men and women must prepare for blackouts at any time of the year, but especially so when the temperatures dip. Here's how to prepare for an extended power outage.

Keep your home well-stocked with safety devices. Purchase flashlights and batteries and keep them in an easily accessible location. Solar-powered rechargeable batteries last longer than more traditional batteries, and if you pair them with LED flashlights, you can extend the usage time and have more light when needed. Store bottled water and nonperishable foods in a pantry or in the garage. Fill gas cans with gasoline and store in a safe location. Many portable generators require gasoline to run, and gas pumps may not work during a blackout.

Have an alternative heat source at the ready. When the power goes out, so do furnaces, which usually require an electrically powered blower or pump to work. If you have a backup generator, you may be able to plug in a space heater to warm one room in the house. Otherwise, a fireplace can provide some heat. If you do not have power and no other heating source, make arrangements to leave your home and stay with relatives or friends.

Assess your water needs. Homes that receive water from a municipal water source should be alright in terms of supply during a power outage. Those who have well water and rely on septic systems will probably find themselves without water during an outage. These systems require electricity to pump water into the home. Store barrels of fresh water to use for washing. cooking and flushing toilets. FEMA recommends storing a three-day supply of water, or roughly three gallons, per individual.

Keep important papers handy. Make a folder with copies of phone numbers, policy account numbers, banking information, and similarly valuable information. Remember, during a power outage you may not have computer access, and your mobile phone will only last as long as your next charge. Keep physical documents handy in case you need to leave home or contact service providers.


Create extra insulation. Use plastic on windows to keep out some of the chill. Wrap pipes with newspapers or insulation to help safeguard against freezing. Block drafts at the bottom of doors by using a door sock or rolled up towel. Keep the entire family in one room to maximize body heat.

Dress appropriately for the cold. Wear layers to keep warm and pay attention to your extremities, which are most susceptible to frostbite. Watch for signs of hypothermia such as uncontrollable shivering, memory loss, disorientation, incoherence, slurred speech, drowsiness, and apparent exhaustion.

Don't overlook entertainment. Keep books, puzzles, arts and craft supplies, cards, and board games on hand.

Have an evacuation plan in place. Know where you will go if you cannot stay in your home. Find out if a friend or family member has room for you. Hotels and motels are another option, but they may be booked during an outage.

Power outages can occur at any time but are especially common when snow and ice accumulates. Preparing for such outages in advance is paramount to your health and safety.




