CGB construction a boon to other local contractors

In her fourth quarter report, presented to both the City Council and County Commissioners, EDGE Executive Director Beckie Cromer noted the impact construction of the CGB grain terminal complex is having on the area economy.

Consolidated Grain and Barge broke ground on the \$23 million facility in December and construction continues in south Falls City, just west of Highway 73. The facility is expected to be completed in the fall of this year. Mrs. Cromer's full report was provided in EDGE's first newsletter of 2013.

The project has kept local concrete trucks and workers from Southeast Ready Mix/Concrete Industries and Compass Pumping and Conveying, Inc., very busy. In addition, Snethen Farms, Donnie Stevens of Triple S Construction, Kaster Trucking and Huettner Trucking have hauled tons of dirt and rock. Airlando has also been involved in the project and is currently providing warehouse space during the construction.

Mrs. Cromer said construction workers have moved into the area on a temporary basis, which has resulted in rentals and increased use of hotel and motel rooms, and additional traffic in a variety of businesses. CGB is working with Staffing Services' Falls City offices to "recruit workers from the construction trades to assist in the development," Mrs. Cromer wrote in the newsletter. When completed, the CGB terminal, which will make use of convenient rail service directly adjacent to the building site, is expected to create "a minimum of eight new jobs," Mrs. Cromer wrote.

She described the decision by CGB to locate here as a development that "will serve as an economic driver for the area and have a far reaching positive impact on the economy." Mrs. Cromer listed several of those

impacts, including:

—Jobs with good salaries and benefits, creating employment opportunities and attracting new families to the area.

—Increased property tax base, benefiting the City, County and schools.

—The ripple effect of a major construction project to area businesses.

—A large new customer for Falls City Utilities.

—Increased truck traffic that will result in more business for service stations, convenience stores and restaurants.

—Better utilization of Falls City's rail asset, which could provide the local railroad workforce a better chance of working in Falls City.

—The potential for better grain prices and reduced costs for farmers.

—The potential for future expansion at the site and ancillary businesses that could be drawn to the area.

The newsletter spotlighted a number of developments and activities on the economic front, including one at Merz Farm

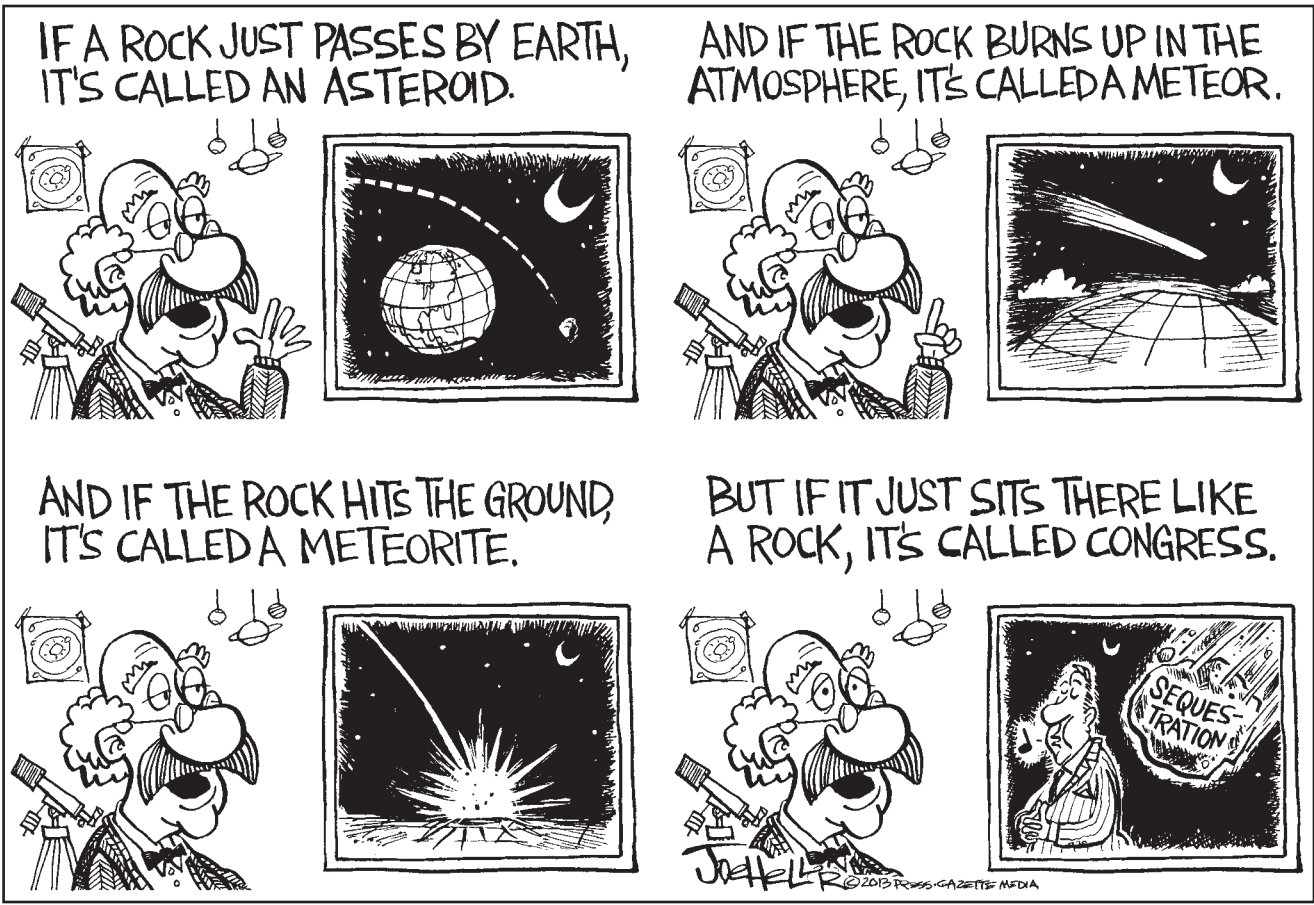
In seperate statements issued Monday, both Nebraska Senator Deb Fischer and Governor Dave Heineman applauded Johanns’ service.

Governor’s tax reform bill gets mixed reviews

Taxes, it’s all about whose ox is getting gored.

In its simplest form, Governor Dave Heineman has proposed two bills to eliminate state income taxes and make up the lost revenue by eliminating \$2.4 billion in sales tax exemptions. Proponents told the Legislature’s Revenue Committee that such a bold move would result in job growth. Opponents say there is no evidence, not even anecdotal evidence, that such a move results in job growth.

The idea comes from Americans for Prosperity and several of Heineman’s Republican colleagues who are governors of other states with similar proposals. The major thrust comes from the privately funded Tax Foundation, a self-proclaimed conservative think tank. That group’s fiscal analyst Joseph Henchman says studies show that taxing consumption or sales, instead of income, leads to more economic growth.

Conversely, the Nebraska-grown think tank, Open Sky, says there is no evidence that such a plan works. They note that those involved with agriculture, manufacturing, hospitals and university students would wind up falling victim to the removal of exemptions that would tax them more heavily.

After more than nine hours of testimony, and 50 opponents to the plan, the Governor has declared himself open to all tax reform options...as long as tax reform can happen this session and doesn’t involve a scheme to raise money just to spend on favorite programs.

Some question the urgency from the term-limited governor who only has two years left in office. Others applaud him for at least getting the discussion started. Revenue Committee Chairman Sen. Galen Hadley of

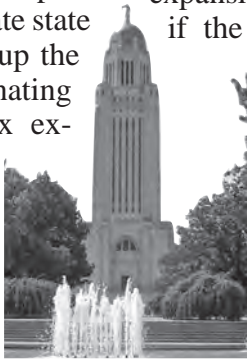
Kearney said his committee has two major Heineman options (LBs 405 and 406) to consider and must decide whether it (tax reform) can be done this year.

Major Nebraska corporations have said they would reassess expansion plans in Nebraska if the Heineman bills pass.

Three major chambers of commerce (Lincoln, Omaha and the Nebraska State Chamber) said they don’t support the bills because of the negative impact on industry by the elimination of sales tax exemptions on machinery and the manufacturing process. The

same goes for production agriculture, which could lose sales tax exemptions on equipment, water and the energy to apply that water to crops. Hospital and dormitory room costs would also lose sales tax exemptions.

Saying he couldn’t testify at the hearings, veteran Omaha lawmaker Ernie Chambers cautioned his colleagues that he wasn’t out of the loop on the topic. He said if the bill makes it to the floor for debate by the full Legislature, he would tie up the rest of the session rather than see it advance. If anything has been made clear by his 38 years in the Legislature, it is the knowledge that he does have the ability to do just that.

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‘Thinking about health’

How the hunger/obesity paradox affects America’s bottom line

A year ago I found myself in a bread line at Lincoln’s Center for People in Need - not to pick up food - but to talk to others who were there to find something to eat. A 65-year-old woman explained that she had had a triple by-pass three months before she went on Medicare and that saddled her with a half million dollars in medical bills. Her income around \$1,000 mostly from Social Security did not stretch far enough to whittle down her medical debt, pay the rent, buy gasoline, pay for her Medigap insurance premium, and still buy groceries.

“I don’t have enough money to buy food,” she said. “That’s why I come here. Anything helps out. I don’t hardly eat any vegetables. The only vegetable I buy is brussels sprouts in a package with sauce. A package costs \$1.28.

“I’m a diabetic,” she added. “I have to watch what I eat.” Like most of us, she liked meat once in awhile. Usually the Center has none to give away. On this day, though, the woman was lucky; the Center could offer a choice of smoked turkey breast or seasoned beef rib roast. She took the turkey.

Most of those in line were hardly skinny. Many were overweight or obese like 65 percent of the people in Nebraska. But in a survey of its clients over age 60, the Center found that about 40 percent sometimes had trouble buying enough food.

Pockets of hunger exist all over America—in rural and urban areas, in poor immigrant communities, among the elderly where the young old and the old old are on waiting lists for home-delivered meals, and among children. The USDA says that nearly 17 percent of America’s kids under age 18 live in households where they don’t consistently get enough nutritious foods.

What explains this paradox?

I phoned Nebraska’s chief medical officer Dr. Joann Schaefer who said that when people don’t know where their next meal is coming from, they tend to overeat fearing that it may be a long time before they eat again.

“Combine that with high calorie dense foods, and it’s a double whammy,” Schaefer said. “And when you do get another meal, you over eat again. That can be a very dangerous cycle to be in.”

Roberta Duyff, a St. Louis nutrition consultant and author of the Complete Food and Nutrition Guide puts it this way. “It’s about the choices available. People may be getting their calories met, but are they getting their nutrients met?” The predicament of the Lincoln woman suggests they are not.

As many Nebraska communities begin addressing the obesity epidemic, it’s important to keep in mind the hunger/obesity paradox. That paradox helps boost the amount we spend on health care to nearly 18 percent of Gross Domestic Product, threatens the stability of government health programs like Medicare, and contributes to high insurance premiums the rest of us pay, its important to keep in mind the hunger/obesity paradox.

The overweight hungry face the same challenges to lose weight as those who carry around too many pounds and have no problem finding enough to eat. But telling someone to join a gym, eat more fruits and vegetables, and buy more lean meat and less cheap junk food is not likely to have much effect when people have little money.

“It’s hard when \$6 will buy a dozen tacos on Taco Tuesday,” says Schaefer. “It’s a hard sell to say to someone you should make your own (meal) with rice, beans, and meat. You can’t make a meal for \$6 so you turn to the tacos.”

Fast food doesn’t explain the whole problem, though. In future columns I’ll explore more about the obesity dilemma and how it affects America’s health care bill.

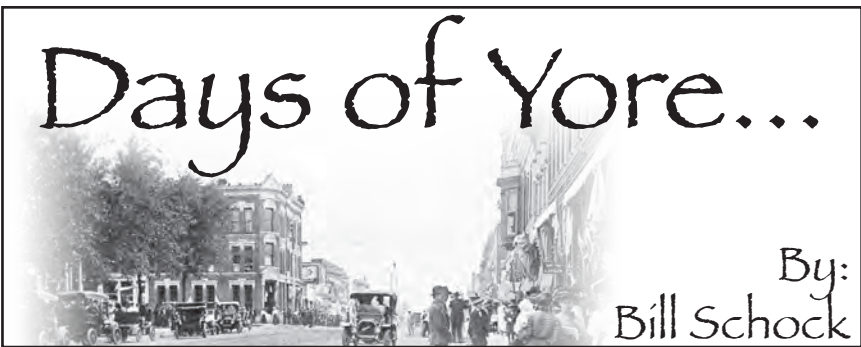

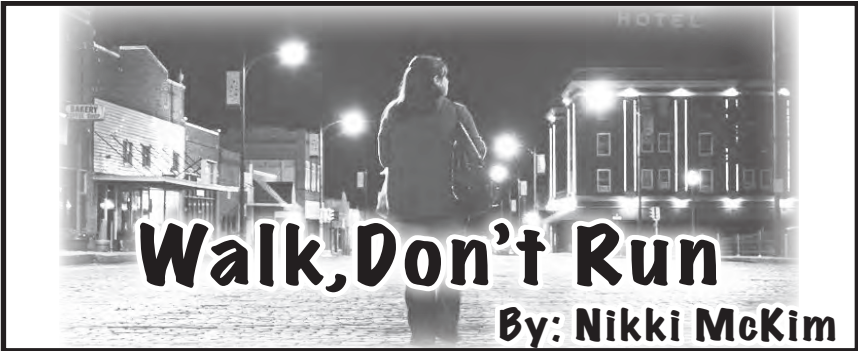
Historical Society

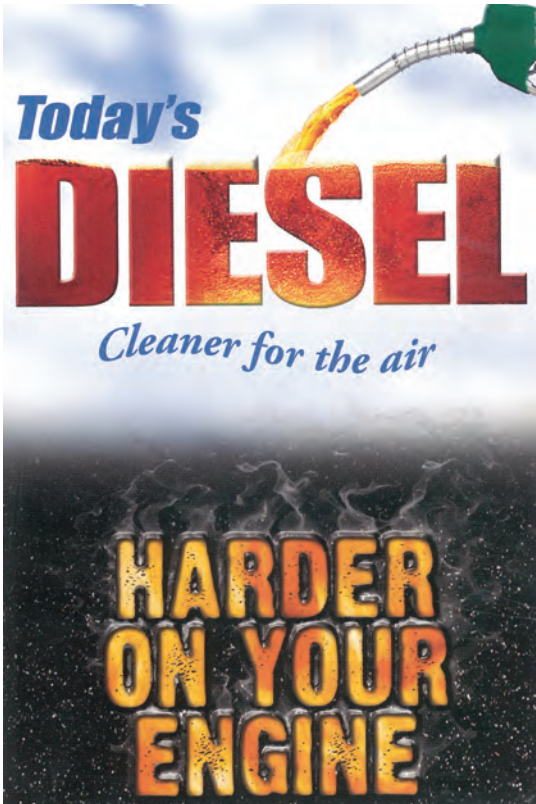

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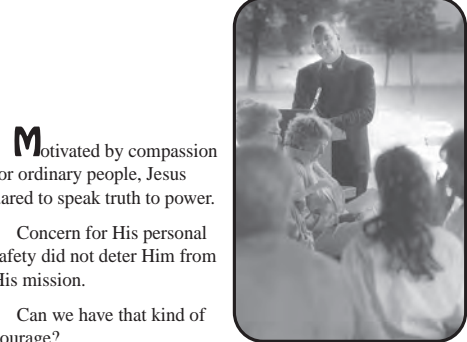

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Nobel Peace Prize Laureate to speak at PSC

Dr. Shirin Ebadi, the first Iranian and first Muslim woman to win Peace Prize

Nobel Peace Prize Laureate Dr. Shirin Ebadi, the first Iranian and the first Muslim woman to win the honor, will speak at Peru State College at 7 pm. Monday, Feb. 25 in the College Theatre as part of the institution's Distinguished Speaker Series. The public is encouraged to attend the free event.

Ebadi's presentation is titled *Iran Awakening: A Story of Revolution and Hope*.

As a woman in Iran, Ebadi's life has paralleled the dramatic changes within her country. Her call for dissent and support for human rights has rung clear during the political and religious upheaval in the Middle East.

Making history as the first woman judge in Iran, Ebadi was stripped of her basic rights by religious revolutionaries, whom she once supported, who declared women unfit to serve as judges. She fought her way back as a human rights lawyer, defending women and children in controversial, politically charged cases. She has been arrested and has been the target of assassination, but through it all, Ebadi has spoken out with quiet bravery on behalf of victims of injustice and discrimination.

Defying government obstacles, Ebadi created one of the first independent, non-governmental human rights organizations in Iran: The Society for the Protection of the Rights of the Child. She is the author of *Iran Awakening: One Woman's Journey to Reclaim Her Life and Country and The Golden Age*.

A towering figure with a commanding voice that will



not be silenced, Ebadi courageously champions democracy and basic human rights for women, children and all individuals. Her influence extends far beyond the borders of her country, inspiring hope that Islam, democracy and all human rights can co-exist despite the challenges faced in these turbulent times.

Peru State established the Distinguished Speaker Series in fall 2010 as part of the college's commitment to student engagement and success. The intent of the Series is to bring diverse, nationally and internationally recognized speakers to southeast Nebraska to enrich the educational experience of students while also providing surrounding communities opportunities to engage in interesting and relevant topics. Speakers are encouraged to connect with the community in a variety of ways during their visits through classroom discussions, guest lectures, meet and greet receptions, and a keynote address.

Commissioners, Sheriff Houser, architects tour Armory building

Sheriff Randy Houser and the Richardson County Commissioners conducted a "pre-proposal" walk through of the Armory building with architects interested in submitting a proposal for the renovation/construction of the facility into a law enforcement center and jail.

The walk through took place during the Commissioners' Feb. 12 meeting.

Architectural firms that have shown an interest and participated on that Tuesday included Carlson West Povondra Architects, Treanor Architects, Prochaska & Associates, Archi-etc and Joseph R. Hewgley & Associates.

Al Provondra had met earlier with the board to review the proposal for the Armory.

When the building was purchased by Richardson County, the initial, stated intent was to convert it to a jail and/or law enforcement center. Since the purchase, the building has been used for storage and part of the space has been rented for storage.

During his meeting with the board, Sheriff Houser explained the ramifications of LB 1184 that was passed during the 2012 Legislature. The bill involves child advocacy requirements. Sheriff Houser said he believes the legislation may require a deputy to make two to three trips per week. He requested that the board consider hiring an additional part-time deputy to comply with this requirement.

The Sheriff said his wife, Julie Houser, has been working on a temporary, part-time basis in his office the past week to assist with the clerical duties and to become informed of the procedures so that she might fill in when clerical staff is short due to illness, vacations, etc.

Correspondence was reviewed by the county's legal counsel, Dave Partsch, regarding the validity of the recently approved Falls City EDGE agreement for funding. Commissioner Jim Standerford made a motion that the agreement entered into with EDGE on Jan. 8, 2013, is valid and that the claim submitted at the Jan. 14, 2013, meeting for \$10,000, for one-half of the annual funding, be approved for payment. Chairman Dave Sickel and Standerford voted for the motion, Commissioner Jim Davidson had excused himself earlier in the meeting.

In other developments, the Commissioners:

- Participated in a quarterly safety meeting with Highway Supt. Scott Huppert, Matt Cromer of the Road and Bridge Department, Sheriff Houser, Tammie Beckner, representing Courthouse maintenance, and EMA Director Jim Gerweck.
- Huppert said work is being done to improve radio communications. He noted the condition of sidewalks around the Courthouse and that repairs need to be made on those surfaces. Comments were made about the snow removal around the Courthouse and that the cooperation with the removal of snow by the City of Falls City on the Courthouse side streets has improved.
- Cromer reported that improvements have been made to the county shop yard with an extensive clean up. He said the cleaning of the trucks and other equipment is improving, the tire truck has been repaired and is operating well and requested that some improvements need to be made to the outer county shop building and yards.
- Sheriff Houser said that radio communications are being addressed and are improving to a degree, but communications continue to be a problem. Many different possibilities are being reviewed to remedy those problems, he said. The Sheriff said maintenance on patrol units continues, but recommended that two new patrol vehicles be purchased this year.

Gerweck said some minor improvements have been completed to improve radio communications, but that some areas need more remedies. Gerweck said the dress rehearsal for the July 23 Cooper Nuclear Drill is set for May 7.

- Reviewed construction projects with Huppert.
- Approved the continued participation for funding with Johnson, Nemaha, Pawnee and Otoe counties to complete a FEMA-approved hazard mitigation plan with Richardson County to contribute to the local matching funding for the grant application of approximately \$5,800.
- Voted to advertise for sealed bids to be received by March 5 at 11 a.m. for the mowing and maintenance of the Courthouse yard for the 2013 season.

Tough go of it for Tiger trio at State Wrestling

The 2013 NSAA State Wrestling Championships came and went quickly for three Falls City High wrestlers all wrestling in their first state tournament.

Tiger senior Wade Maddox (152 pounds) joined junior Chase Thompson (182) and freshman Morgen Valentine (120) as first time participants at the CenturyLink Center (formerly Qwest Center) in Omaha. Maddox and Thompson each finished 0-2 in Omaha, while Valentine was the only Tiger to record a victory at the state tournament and finished 1-2.

"I thought we came to compete both days," Falls City High

head coach Roger Windle said. "I know Morgen and Wade were frustrated losing their first-round matches. They thought they had matches they could win last night (Thursday) and they competed and lost in the closing seconds of those matches."

Maddox, who finished 31-14 this season, lost a 7-2 decision to the eventual fifth-place finisher, Derek Lonowski of Hastings Adams Central and was pinned in the waning seconds of the first period of his match on Friday with Tristan Donelson of Scottbluff.

"I thought Wade was in control of the match and then he just got caught in a situation he had never been in all year," Windle said of Maddox's match with Donelson. "He should have been moving a little bit more, but just didn't realize what situation he was in once the Scottsbluff kid got him on his back."

Valentine (26-12) was defeated in a 17-10 decision by Joseph Horky of Fairbury in his only match Thursday evening. On Friday, he defeated West Point-Beemer's Hunter Schroeder, 7-4, in dramatic fashion, as he scored four points in the closing seconds to escape with a victory.

Valentine lost his second match Friday to Gretna's Trent Boyer, who defeated Valentine 9-1 in a major decision. Boyer, a junior whose style is very different from Valentine's according to Windle, also defeated Valen-

tine at the district tournament.

"The Gretna kid's style frustrated us a bit," Windle said. "We're just not as foot-quick as this kid and just frustrated us a bit. I think he's a little stronger and was able to get our head down at times. Morgen has a tough time wrestling from that position, knowing when to get our head back up and moving left and right so we can finish take downs."

Thompson had the toughest match of the first round and was pinned by eventual runner-up Austin Fehlhafer. Thompson suffered a 15-0 tech fall defeat in his second match and finished his season with a 21-16 record.

"I think this was a new experience for Chase, who I know was happy to be hear, and I think he'll learn from it and come back strong next year," Windle said.

Falls City scored one team point and finished tied with Omaha Gross Catholic in 40th place. Omaha Skutt Catholic won their 15th Class B State Championship in 16 years with 146.5 points. Scottbluff (119) finished second and Plattsmouth and Syracuse tied for third with 90 points apiece.

The three-day total attendance at the CenturyLink Center was 40,649.

Falls City High knocked down 7-of-8 fourth quarter free throws and edged the Fairbury Jeffs, 61-60, at Fairbury Friday night in the two teams' regular season finales.

The Tigers (21-3) finished 10-of-14 at the line for the game, but held a five-point advantage at the stripe in the game's final eight minutes to help them escape with their first win at Fairbury since 2007. The Jeffs were just 2-of-5 at the line in the fourth and 8-of-16 in the game.

Tiger head coach Don Hogue said his team knocked down some shots in the first half which allowed them to attack and get to the free-throw line later in the game.

"We were good from the line and we continued to attack them in the second half," Hogue said. "The guys are confident in our shooting. We shoot a lot in practice and try to shoot some when we're tired and that has helped."

Tiger junior Mitchell Harling led the way with 20 points, including 2-for-3 from behind the arc. Senior Cord Huettner scored 15 to go along with seven rebounds and sophomore Jack Hartman scored seven of his 12 points in the fourth quarter, including 3-of-4 FT's down the stretch.

The Tigers continue to take good care of the basketball and committed only seven turnovers Friday night. "I felt we weren't as good as a team, defensively. We gave up some dribble drives and we didn't pinch on those like we have in past games."

"We need to just get back to what we do best and that is pressure people and not allow straight line drives. We need to battle with post players and supply great ball pressure, so they don't get easy passes into the post."

They're in, but don't tell coach

Though it lacked the drama of one year ago, the FC Sacred Heart Lady Irish basketball team for a second consecutive year advanced out of the subdistrict and in the process sent bitter rival Sterling packing.

The Lady Irish captured a 47-29 victory over the Lady Jets last Thursday at Beatrice High School. The win was substantially anticlimactic and predictable, as Sterling essentially resembled Sterling in name only — 6-2 junior all-stater Jordan Lempka was out with illness and the team, as was the case since the first week of January, was also without senior guard Jena Nieveen (knee).

Sacred Heart's cakewalk through the subdistrict (FCSH slipped past Parkview Christian 64-15 Tuesday) is likely its last comfortable stroll to victory lane. There still is, however, and contrary to vehement denial from the coaches, a slight bit of yawn factor affiliated with this Friday's D2-1 District Final showdown between the 23-3 Irish and 22-3 Deshler (7:30 p.m. at Norris Middle School in Firth). And it has nothing to do with what happens on the court - it should be a great game. The reality, though, is that the only tangible thing Sacred Heart is playing for Friday is a district title plaque. Period. And while plaques are cool, FCSH has always and will always covet the big shiny trophies bestowed at the Devaney Center. With the No. 1 seed in the D2 State Tournament a mathematical certainty even in the event of a loss to Deshler, Sacred Heart ultimately opens a three-game season and begins its quest for a state championship at 9 a.m. Thursday, Feb. 28, at Lincoln Northeast High School.

The trip to state will be Sa-

cred Heart's 16th in the past 18 years. The Lady Irish last won a state title in 2000 and last advanced to the Devaney Center in 2007, in Luke Santo's first year as coach. FCSH finished third the following year, but three trips since (2009, 2010, 2012) have been bounced out early with first-round losses. A year ago, Wynot used superior depth and humbled the Lady Irish 55-31 en route to a second straight D2 title. The Blue Devils graduated five seniors last spring, but are 22-3 and No. 2 in wildcard points. Like FCSH, Wynot is guaranteed a return to Lincoln regardless of the outcome of a tough district final test against 16-2 Osmond.

Sure, first things first — there are plenty of intangibles to consider and Friday's game does mean *something*. For starters, the Lady Irish have won 18 consecutive games, dating back to Dec. 28, 2012. So even though the team, which has no seniors and starts two sophomores and a freshman, bounced back (that's putting it lightly) from both an 0-2 start to the season and that holiday tourney loss to Friend, how it would respond to a loss

at this point is a mystery.

Certainly, Santo prefers to keep it that way.

"We addressed (the wildcard) one time last week and in my mind it doesn't even exist," Santo joked. "I know everybody talks about it, the players and parents talk about it, but we're going to try and focus on winning. Everything is going so well, we have all this momentum and we don't want it to end. You want all the confidence you can get going into Lincoln."

FCSH is certainly shooting like a confident team. All five starters - freshman Maggie Goltz, sophomores Abby and Elizabeth Magdanz, and juniors Ashli Jordan and Emma Schock - make more than 40 percent of their field goals and the numbers have only gotten better in February. Furthermore, a fair share of the buckets are medium- to long-range jumpers. Abby Magdanz has hit 46 threes (39.3 percent) and Goltz (20 threes) is at nearly 42 percent from behind the arc.

Against Sterling, Goltz finished with 11 points, 10 rebounds and four blocks; while Abby Magdanz had 12 points and four steals and Elizabeth Magdanz went 4-for-4 at the line and scored eight. Sterling's Kelsy Heusman drained a couple threes in the opening half and Erika Goracke had another, but the outcome of this one was never in doubt. Goltz and Abby Magdanz alone outscored the entire Sterling team 12-10 in the first quarter.

"I feel bad for Sterling," Santo said. "I guess that's part of sports, but it's not fair to look down the bench and see two all-state-caliber players sitting on the bench for a subdistrict final."

Of course, that's not to suggest FCSH wouldn't have beaten a Jet team at full strength, as they did by 17 points in January.

"We don't need to apologize because we beat them with Nieveen and Lempka," Santo said.

If nothing else, Friday's game with Deshler will provide FCSH with a taste of state tournament-caliber competition - something the subdistrict tournament did

Good fortune was not on the side of the Falls City High Lady Tigers’ basketball team last Tuesday in the Class C1-1 sub-district in Johnson.

Louisville defeated the Lady Tigers 49-37 at Johnson and went on to defeat Syracuse, 48-45, in Thursday’s sub-district final. The Lions (11-12) and Lincoln Christian (16-9) will square off Friday night at Nebraska Wesleyan.

Louisville, a team that dur-

ing one stretch this season went 6-for-46 at the free-throw line, knocked down 17-of-21 fourth-quarter free throws and benefited from a few questionable calls, most notably a 10-second backcourt violation against the Lady Tigers. 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Behavioral health consumers satisfied

Lincoln—A recent survey shows improvement in how children and their parents feel about services received from the state’s public behavioral health system.

The annual survey of consumers conducted by the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services’ Division of Behavioral Health shows increased satisfaction in access, treatment planning, cultural sensitivity and services.

The public system includes the state’s six behavioral health regions, which offer direct services, and the Lincoln Regional Center, a state psychiatric hospital. The survey asked about both mental health and substance abuse services for children and adults.

“Parents reported that they were quite satisfied with the services their children received,” said Scot L. Adams, director of the Division of Behavioral Health. “The results show that services improved their kids’ quality of life.”

Families can access services through the Network of Care website, www.dhhs.ne.gov/NetworkOfCare or by calling the Family Helpline at 1-888-866-8660.

- Of 248 youth and their parents:
- 92 percent responded favorably to cultural sensitivity, a four percentage point increase over the previous year;
 - 87 percent of youth caregivers responded positively about access for their youth, almost a 12 percentage point increase;
 - 86 percent responded positively to participation in treatment planning, a four percentage point increase;
 - 79 percent indicated that they were satisfied with services, an increase of 9 percentage points; and
 - 72 percent of youth caregivers said that services improved their quality of life, similar to the response in last year’s survey.

A consumer survey of 2,153 adults found that 84 percent were satisfied with services, the same as last year. Eighty percent of adults said that services improved their quality of life.

- Other findings:
- More than three-fourths (77 percent) were satisfied with their level of involvement in treatment planning;
 - Another three-fourths (74 percent) responded positively to questions on outcomes;
 - 86 percent responded positively to the questions related to quality and appropriateness of services;
 - 80 percent thought services were accessible; and
 - Most felt that services improved their level of functioning (76 percent) and social connectedness (75 percent).

The survey also asked respondents about their health. More than a third of mental health consumers (40 percent) said they smoke every day. Of substance abusers, over half (56 percent) reported smoking every day.

More than one in six (16 percent) adult mental health consumers reported a diabetes diagnosis, nearly twice the rate of the general population, and were one-and-a-half times more likely to be obese.

“We’ll use the results of the survey to guide program decisions in the future, to integrate services with primary health care, and to improve the quality of services available,” Adams said.

Equipment. With several core employees in their fifties, Mitch Merz said, retirements will impact the business in the future. The idea is to prepare now by adding young workers at Merz Farm Equipment.

Merz attended an EDGE-hosted Talent and Innovation Initiative workshop and learned about the InternNE program, which translated into \$10,000 in funding to hire two interns, Dusty Metzner and Jesse Vollmer. Both are enrolled at Southeast Community College, Milford. The program provides financial assistance to companies willing to give paid internships to college juniors and seniors, or those at least halfway through community college programs. When the two interns complete their programs in September, they will have full-time jobs at Merz Farm Equipment. A second round of internships at Merz Farm Equipment is underway for 2013.

FC Rec pancake fundraiser Sunday

Falls City Recreation will hold its 14th annual pancake feed on Sunday, Feb. 24, in the commons area of Falls City High School. This will be a free will offering event and pancakes and sausage along with drinks will be served from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. This pancake feed replaces the door-to-door residential collection that Falls City Recreation used to conduct. Profits from this pancake feed along with the business fund drive done in early summer are the main public fundraisers for Recreation programs.

On an annual basis, it takes over \$30,000 to run the current programs, which consist of girls' softball leagues, boys' baseball leagues, a tee ball league for 4-6 year olds, swim team, Red Cross swim lessons, a soccer program in the spring, and a fall boys' flag football league. These various programs had over 1,300 participants last year. Of the cost to run the programs, approximately 50% comes from participant registrations with the City of Falls City providing approximately 15%. The balance comes from donations by the public and other civic, church and fraternal groups and the local business community, along with other fund raising events that Falls City Recreation undertakes.

In addition to the annual program costs, Falls City Rec, in conjunction with the City of Falls City, undertakes the improvements and upkeep of the ball facilities. The soccer and flag football programs continue to grow and get larger and these games will again be held on the new Thomas Field. This is all made possible by the generosity of everyone that has made a donation of money or time to the Recreation program, all of which benefit the youth of the Falls City area.

Author to review narrative about adored grandmother

It's a fortunate grandmother who has a granddaughter who can put fond memories and words together like Barbara "Jo" Cecil.

Such a talent produced *Anna Margaret Christy—Her Story*, a narrative written by Anna Margaret's granddaughter, Jo Cecil, who grew up in Shubert, had a very successful run as executive director of the Falls City Chamber of Commerce and later served as president of the Bellevue Chamber of Commerce, where she resides. Her parents were the late Vern and Ruby Lewis, prominent Shubert residents.

Jo fitted into a new calling as an author when she began to have some time on her hands. She keeps a reader's interest on high as she expounds on the history of a pioneer woman who came to Richardson County from Illinois with her parents in a covered wagon in 1869 at the age of three.

Her father, Henry Clay Christy, had been told by a friend who had been in this area, "It looks like some of the richest soil on this whole continent and is just waiting for someone to come and farm it....You can buy land for a dollar or two per acre." From the railroad.

Although her grandmother was in her 80s, an adoring young Jo absorbed the stories of her life and does a great job of elaborating on them.

Anna Margaret was teaching school at Gooseberry Creek School in Otoe County at the

age of 16, then was a school-teacher in western Nebraska, married Wilmot Fish, whom she had met when she was riding a train on which he was the handsome, young conductor, lived on a farm near Shubert, gave birth to nine children, became a widow in 1926, moved to Lincoln to manage apartments while a son attended NU, then returned to the Shubert area. She is buried at Prairie Union Cemetery, rural Shubert.

The book's 218 pages share more than a smattering of Shubert history and names. It is available on amazon.com.

Jo is coming to the Falls City Library & Arts Center at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday, March 6, to talk about her book. The public is invited.
