## Court stays execution of Mike Ryan

The Nebraska Supreme Court stayed the execution of Michael Ryan on Thursday, less than two weeks before he was to be the state's first condemned inmate put to death by lethal injection.

Ryan was scheduled to die March 6.

The Supreme Court's one-page ruling said a lower court challenge over how Nebraska obtained one of its lethal injection drugs needs to be resolved before the execution can take place.

Jerry Soucie, an attorney who represents Michael Ryan, filed a 116-page motion for post conviction relief in Richardson County District Court Feb. 13. In the motion Ryan alleges the state of Nebraska misappropriated the drug Thiopental that would be used in his execution. Ryan is asking the Richardson County District Court to vacate his sentence of death and impose a term of life in prison without parole on his 1st degree murder conviction.

Soucie claims in the document that "none of the grounds for relief alleged in this motion could have been raised in any previous proceedings" because lethal injection did not exist as a means of execution during any of Ryan's prior legal proceedings.

Judge Bryan took the matter under advisement and could either grant an evidentiary hearing or dismiss the motion.

Ryan, 63, was sentenced to death 1986 for the torture slaying of James Thimm.

## Flood of '11 pushes Rulo Bridge project back to late 2013

The historic flood of 2011 set the new Missouri River bridge construction project back approximately 8-12 months, according to Project Manager Mike Habegger of the Nebraska Department of Roads.

Mr. Habegger, who is overseeing the construction project for the state, said the new timetable for a completion date, weather permitting, is late-2013. Habegger stressed, however, that extra crews have been brought in and since the first of the year have been working seven days a week to make up for time lost.

Cramer and Associates, Inc., of Grimes, IA, the contracting company in charge of the main span of the bridge, has upped the number of crews working on the bridge from two to four.

Habegger is optimistic about the new 2013 completion date considering the forecasts released by the National Weather Service on Feb. 16. In the report, the NWS states the "the risk of flooding from late winter into spring is presently near to below normal at most locations." It also states that mountain snowpack across the headwaters of the Missouri River is at 84 percent of normal compared to last spring when snowpack totals were over 100 percent. Also, the plains snowpack is virtually non-existent.

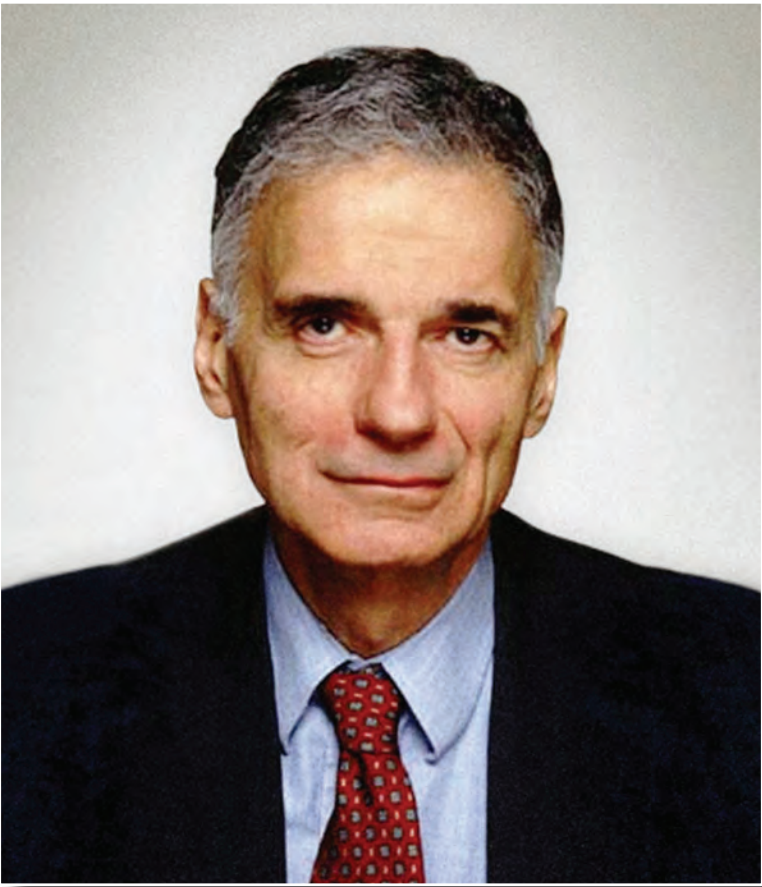
Habegger noted that Pier R2 on the bank of the river on the Nebraska side was poured last Thursday and the first pier towards the center of the river on the Nebraska side was poured Friday. Habegger also noted that the approach on the Nebraska side is scheduled for completion by the first of May, weather permitting.

"The crews are working really hard and we're making pretty good progress," said Habegger.

The \$25 million project calls for a total of 12 piers and the bridge will be 2,400 feet long when completed. For some scope, consider Pier R2 will be 78-feet tall, will require 1,280 cubic yards of concrete and contain 123,000 pounds of steel. Crews dig 40 feet and then drill another 100 for each shaft. The shafts contain approximately 320 tons of concrete.

The current bridge, built in 1938, was originally not even scheduled for replacement until 2014, so even with the setbacks caused by the 2011 flood the new bridge should be ready for use before then. Most of the credit goes to the contractors and their crews, but also to the letter-writing campaign initiated by Mitch Glaeser in 2007. In three years, 1,600 letters were written and the attention of elected representatives in the tri-state area was caught. Pressure was added to expedite the project and Nebraska Governor Dave Heineman was in Rulo to break ground in the fall of 2010.

The new bridge will "enhance the economic opportunities" for residents of Southeast Nebraska, Northwest Missouri and Northeast Kansas, Heineman said. He commended those from all three states who were involved in bringing a critical problem to the attention of state and federal officials.



## Ralph Nader to speak at Peru St. March 26

Ralph Nader, former Green Party candidate for president and consumer advocate, will speak at Peru State College at 7 p.m. Monday, March 26 in the College Theatre. The event, part of the college's Distinguished Speaker Series, is free and open to the public.

Nader replaces Anthony Shadid, *New York Times* Beirut Bureau Chief and two-time Pulitzer Prize-winning author, who passed away suddenly while on assignment in Syria. Nader is a close friend of the Shadid family and will share some stories about Anthony Shadid during his presentation, titled *Social*

*Justice and World Affairs.*

Honored by *Time* magazine as "One of the 100 Most Influential Americans of the Twentieth Century," and recently as "One of the 100 Most Influential Figures in American History" by *The Atlantic*, Nader has devoted his life to giving ordinary people the tools they need to defend themselves against corporate negligence and government indifference. With a tireless, selfless dedication, he continues to

# Ralph Nader to speak at Peru St. March 26

expose and remedy the dangers that threaten a free and safe society.

The subject of the critically acclaimed documentary *An Unreasonable Man*, Nader penned the introspective book *The Seventeen Traditions* about the earliest days of his own life, where he revisits 17 key traditions he absorbed from his parents, siblings, and the people in his community, and draws from them inspiring lessons for today’s society. Nader recently released his first novel, *Only the Super-Rich Can Save Us*. The book presents a “practical utopia,” outlining the lasting improvements to society that America’s most powerful figures could achieve if they pooled their resources toward a singular goal.

Nader’s foray into public life began in 1965 when he took on the Goliath of the auto industry with his book *Unsafe at Any Speed*, a shocking exposé of the disregard carmakers held for the safety of their customers. The Senate hearing into Nader’s accusations and the resulting life-saving motor vehicle safety laws catapulted Nader into the public sphere. Working with lawmakers, he was instrumental in creating the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), and the Consumer Product Safety Commission. Laws he helped draft and pass include the Safe Drinking Water Act, the Meat and Poultry Inspection Rules, the Air and Water Pollution Control Laws, and the Freedom of Information Act.

Working to empower the average American, Nader has formed numerous citizen groups, including the Center for Auto Safety, Public Citizen, the Pension Rights Center, the National Coalition for Universities in the Public Interest, and the student Public Interest Research Groups (PIRGs) that operate in over 20 states. In his latest citizen initiative, he is working with alumni classes, including his own at Princeton University and Harvard Law School, to expand their efforts beyond parties and reunions to community projects that systemically advance social justice.

Successfully predicting the current financial crisis years ago, Nader has outlined a 10-point plan for recovery. His plan involves sweeping reforms for the financial and housing markets, as well as increased public accountability for any institution seeking a bailout. Nader has also defended the integrity of public office by rallying against the laws allowing multinational corporations to make unlimited donations to political campaigns.

Believing that Republicans and Democrats are so close ideologically he calls them “tweedle-dee and tweedle-dum,” Nader organized the Green Party’s first presidential campaign in 1996 to challenge the “duopoly” of the two-party system. He received 700,000 votes on a limited campaign budget of \$5,000 and he ran again in 2000, receiving 2.8 million votes. His goal is to build the foundation of a third political party and create a robust progressive political movement that rallies around issues rather than empty slogans and figureheads.

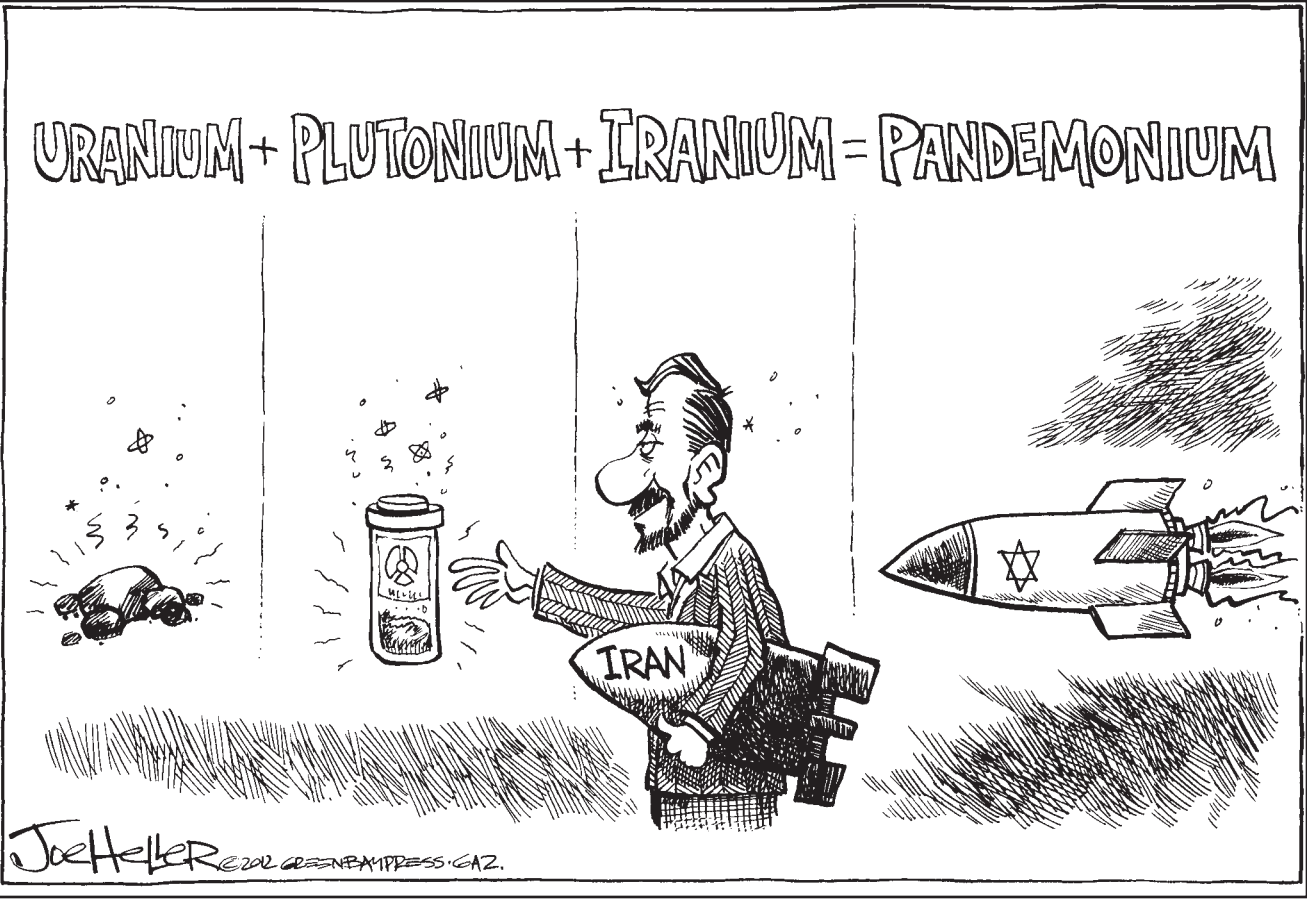
Among his best-selling books are *Crashing the Party: How to Tell the Truth and Still Run for President*; *Winning the Insurance Game*; *Why Women Pay More*; and *Getting the Best from Your Doctor*. Other titles include *Children First: A Parent’s Guide to Fighting Corporate Predators*; *No Contest: Corporate Lawyers and the Perversion of Justice in America*; and *The Ralph Nader Reader*. He also writes a weekly column, *In the Public Interest*, which runs in newspapers around the US.

Both citizens and corporate audiences listen intently to what Nader has to say. Years after they graduate, college students tell him how his lecture changed their lives. His message is simple and compelling: “To go through life as a non-citizen would be to feel that there’s nothing you can do, that nobody’s listening, that you don’t matter. But to be a citizen is to enjoy the deep satisfaction of seeing the prevention of pain, misery and injustice.”

PSC’s Distinguished Speaker Series was established in 2010 as part of the college’s commitment to student engagement and success. The intent is to bring diverse, nationally and internationally recognized speakers to southeast Nebraska to enrich the educational experience of our students while also providing our surrounding communities opportunities to engage in interesting and relevant topics.

## CAPITOL VIEW

LINCOLN – Voting is at least as important a function in our society as driving a car.

Most people know voting is a constitutional right. Some people think driving a car is a constitutional right—one of a legion of sad commentaries on our misunderstanding and ignorance of how government works.

When the Legislature wants to change the law involving the qualifications for driving, you know it is virtually impossible to do it on the sly. No proposal involving who should be allowed to drive, at what age, until what age, what time or anything else gets by without in-depth explanations.

Proponents of change need to be able to show and not merely speculate: WHY is the change needed?

What do the numbers show? What are the established facts?

They certainly couldn’t advance one inch with nothing more than the argument that it might help to solve a problem that hasn’t been shown to exist. Nebraska’s political roof would fall on them.

So, how about the constitutionally guaranteed right to vote?

What about proposed changes in state laws that would make it more difficult for some to vote? And the argument that fighting voter fraud, even when none has been alleged, justifies the same?

By way of arguing that voter fraud is a menace, some policymakers have come up with schemes that would burden voters with all manner of requirements – special identifications or presentation of drivers’ licenses or birth certificates among them. A driver’s license version was before the Legislature at this writing.

What do the numbers show? What are the established facts?

In Nebraska, there haven’t been enough rumors of voter fraud, let alone allegations of it, to warrant even the kind of cheap political baloney that emanates from the gutters of some political campaigns.

The view from here: When there is any serious proposal to change voter qualifications, Nebraskans would do well to demand the facts that show the purported need.

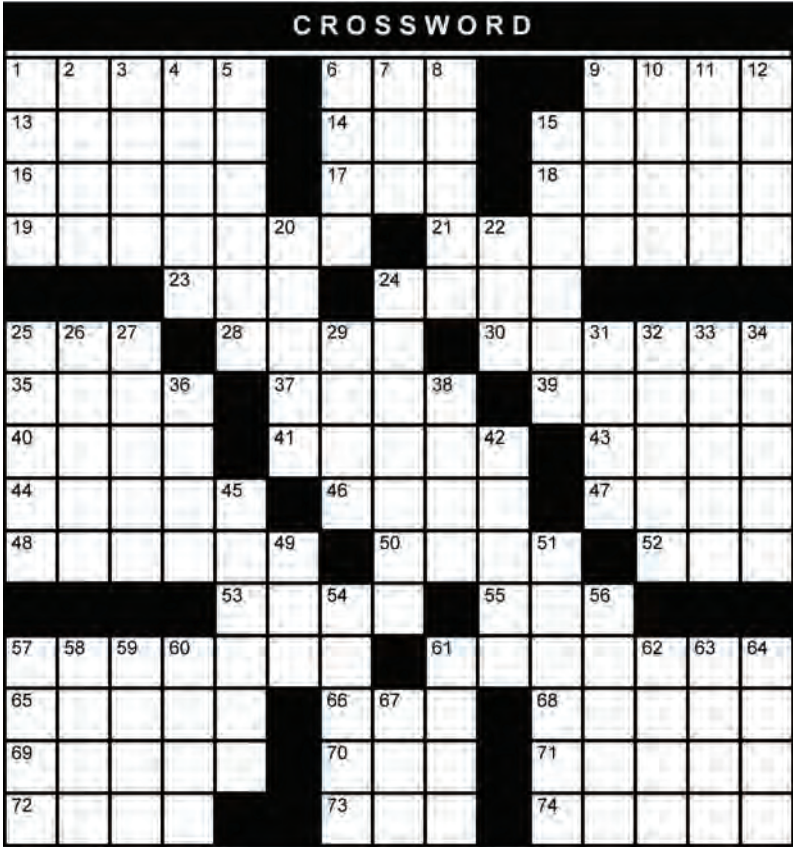

At the Citizens Party caucus, Ralph Steinbrink was nominated to run for his third term as mayor. At Humboldt, incumbent Wilber J. Boss and Wes Stansberry were running for mayor. Mrs. Guy Cooper was nominated for police magistrate.

Larry Godwin, World History teacher at Falls City High, was elected president of the Falls City Education Association and Leon Joy, FCHS math instructor, was the new vice president.

Navy Petty Officer 2<sup>nd</sup> Class Anthony Schawang, Falls City, was serving on the aircraft carrier USS Enterprise.

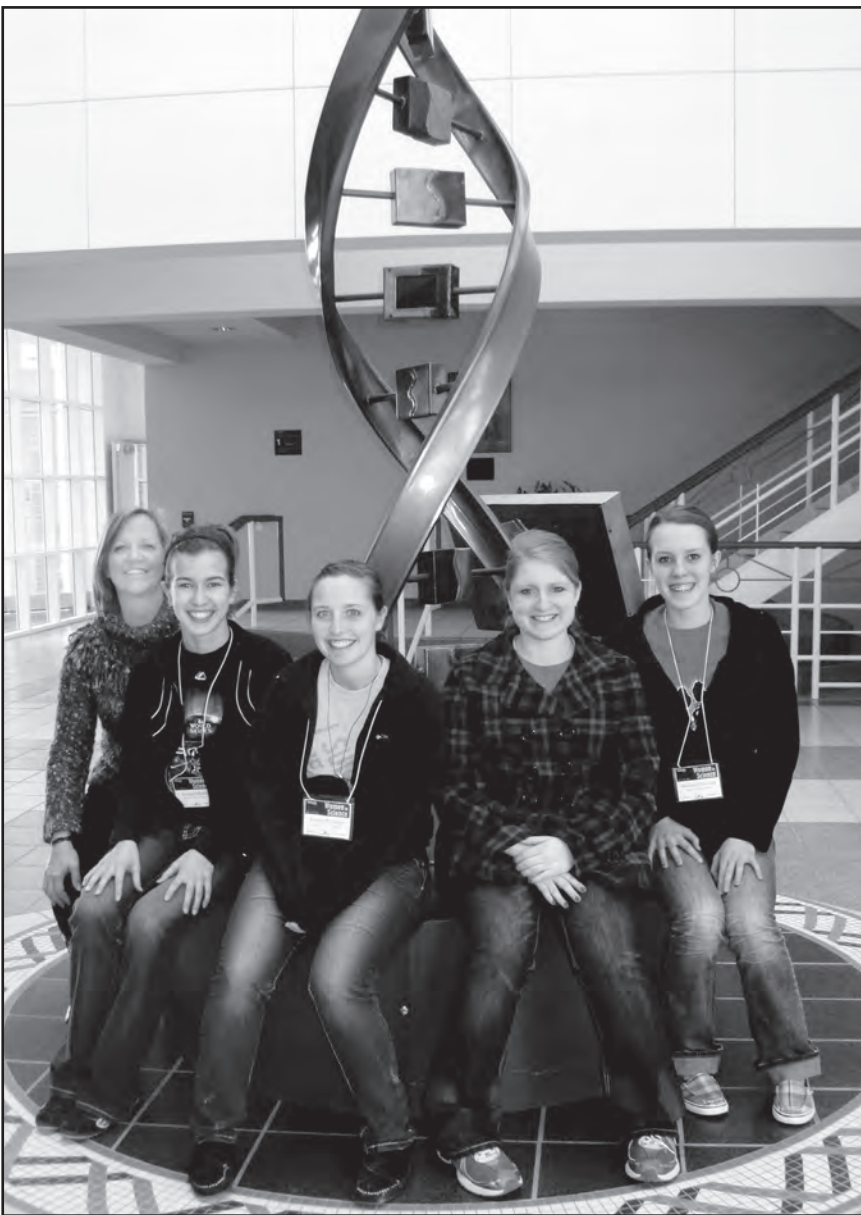

President Washington to choose a permanent site for the capital city in response to the Pennsylvania Mutiny in 1783.

Unpaid soldiers besieged the Congress while it was meeting and the Pennsylvania government refused requests to forcibly disperse the protesters. It emphasized the need for the national government to not rely on any state for its own security. Though President Washington chose the location, it took the Compromise of 1790 to get the North and South states to put the several items in place that shaped the location. The main issue was the huge amount of debt that had been accumulated fighting the Revolutionary War.

The South’s delegates voted in support for the federal assumption of the debt in return for locating the new capital on the Potomac River. This implied that the North would not raise objections to slavery because the capital would be located in territory donated by two slave states, Maryland and Virginia. Washington chose the southernmost location within these limits, including all of present-day Old Town Alexandria. Acting on instructions from Secretary of State Thomas Jefferson, Major Andrew Ellicott began surveying the 10-mile square on Feb-

ruary 1791.

Ellicott hired Benjamin Banneker, an astronomer and mathematician from Maryland, to make the astronomical observations and calculations necessary to establish the south corner of the square at Jones Point in Alexandria. According to legend, “Banneker fixed the position of the first stone by lying on his back to find the exact starting point for the survey ... and plotting six stars as they crossed his spot at a particular time of night.” From there, Ellicott’s team embarked on a 40-mile journey, surveying ten-mile lines. They placed a stone every mile resulting in 40 stones total. On each stone, the side facing the District of Columbia displayed the inscription “Jurisdiction of the United States” and a mile number. The opposite side said either “Virginia” or “Maryland.” The third and fourth sides displayed the year in which the stone was placed. The boundary stones are the oldest federal monuments.

FCC Issues Rural Call Completion Ruling

Carriers that deliberately fail to complete calls to rural areas could face cease and desist orders, forfeiture, license revocations and fines of up to \$1.5 million, the FCC said in a declaratory ruling adopted and released yesterday. The ruling is an important victory for rural telcos, who have seen a sharp increase in complaints from customers saying callers have not been able to reach them.

"These problems can have dire consequences," the FCC wrote in the ruling. "Small businesses can lose customers who get frustrated when their calls don’t go through. Urgent long distance calls from friends of family can be missed. Schools may be unable to reach parents with critical alerts, including school closings due to extreme weather. And those in need of help may be unable to reach public safety officials."

It is widely believed that certain carriers are deliberately failing to complete calls as a means of avoiding the payment of per-minute inter-carrier compensation to the terminating carrier. Those charges are highest in rural areas, where reports of call completion problems have been increasing dramatically.

The FCC’s nine-page ruling references a variety of ways that failure to complete calls to another carrier violates existing statutes. The commission also said originating carriers could be liable for actions taken by least cost routers – other carriers who terminate calls for them.

"If carriers continue to hand off calls to agents, intermediate providers or others that a carrier knows are not completing a reasonable percentage of calls, or are otherwise restricting traffic, that is an unjust or unreasonable practice prohibited by section 201 of the [Telecommunications] Act," the FCC said.

The commission also noted that enforcement action would not be restricted only to carriers that fail to complete calls but also would include practices such as informing a caller that a number is not reachable or is out of service when the number is, in fact, reachable and in service. Such practices, the FCC said, are deceptive or misleading and therefore are unjust and unreasonable practices under Section 201(b) of the Act.

Eventually the motivation for carriers to fail to complete calls to rural areas may fade away as the FCC implements planned ICC reforms, but that process will take years—and rural telco groups, as well as state utility commissions have urged the FCC not to wait to take action to address the issue. Such stakeholders have been particularly concerned since the FCC took no action after holding a rural call completion workshop back in October.

Last month a group of senators wrote a letter to FCC Chairman Julius Genachowski asking the commission to provide an update about the rural call completion issue – and that may have prompted the FCC to issue the declaratory ruling at this time.

# CRP Sign-Up Meeting March 5

The U.S. Dept. of Ag recently announced a Conservation Reserve Program general sign-up. Pheasants Forever will be hosting a Landowner Informational meeting at 1 p.m. Monday, March 5 at Bredeaux Pizzeria in Falls City to help answer questions about how to improve enrollment chances and wildlife values. There is no charge for attendance.


The general CRP signup begins March 12 and runs through April 6. Pheasants Forever Farm Bill Biologists, FSA, NRCS, and Nebraska Game and Parks Commission staff will be on hand to provide a brief presentation and then answer questions.

“The process for enrollment is pretty complex and the competition to get in is going to be steep,” according to Bruce Sprague, Farm Bill Wildlife Biologist. “We are providing this service to help out those who are interested. Obviously though, more and better CRP means more pheasants and other wildlife too, which is why we work so hard for this program and for producers.”

As in past CRP General Sign-ups, USDA will score offers using the Environmental Benefits Index. This formula driven system evaluates each tract of land according to its environmental values and challenges and how the landowner chooses to offer it into the program. According to Sprague, there are only a few things that a landowner can offer to do that will increase the EBI score.

Other meeting topics will include options for expiring CRP contracts, additional conservation programs to increase farm and ranch income, as well as CRP mid contract management options.

# Faith? Grace? Works? How are we saved?

Where does baptism fit in God's plan of salvation? Satan does not want anyone to be baptized for the purpose of being saved. Satan tells people that after you think you are saved and your sins are forgiven then you can be baptized; but, this is a lie of Satan which will cause many people to be lost. Jesus promised salvation only to those who believe and are baptized. We cannot afford to be wrong on this vital point. Our destiny depends on our being right with God.

In the Garden of Eden, Adam and Eve were not to eat of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. God said, "For in the day that you eat of it you shall surely die" (Genesis 2:17). But later Satan told Eve, "You will not surely die" (Genesis 3:4). Satan just added the one word: "not" and perverted what God had said. This is what men are doing today. Jesus said, "He who believes and is baptized will be saved" (Mark 16:16). Men today erroneously teach "He that believes and is not

Believing and being baptized to be saved, as Mark 16:16 says, does not nullify the grace of God; it activates it. Baptism is a very serious matter. According to the Bible, baptism is an essential part of our salvation.

Well, how then are we saved? We are saved by the unmerited favor (grace) of God through our obedient faith; "faith" obeys God's word. Jesus gives "eternal salvation to all who obey Him" (Hebrews 5:9). Heaven is God's gift, a reward, for all those to obey Him. In Hebrews chapter 11, we see many examples showing that "faith" moves us to obey God's word. Hebrews 11:6 states, "Without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of those who diligently seek Him."

Our Lord says (Luke 17:10), "So likewise you, when you have done all those things which you are commanded, say, 'We are

unprofitable servants. We have done what was our duty to do.'" There is not one of us that deserves to be saved. It is only by the grace of God that anyone will be saved. We cannot earn our salvation. We are saved by grace of God through our obedient faith. Heaven is God's reward for all those to obey Him. We read in Ecclesiastes 12:12-14, "Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter: fear God and keep His commandments, for this is man's all. For God will bring every work into judgment, including every secret thing, whether good or evil."

Let Jesus add you to the only church He established (Matthew 16:18). Speaking of Christ's church, Luke writes in Acts 2:47, "And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved." Read verses 36-46 to see what the Apostle Peter commanded the people to do in order to be saved and added to the church of Christ. What Peter (and the other apostles, v. 11, 14) taught was exactly what Jesus commanded in Matthew 28:18-20. The Bible says it, so believe it, obey it, and be saved by it!

Christ established and founded one church, not many different denominations teaching varying and conflicting doctrines. All of those who are Christians according to the Bible plan (Mark 16:16; Acts 22:16; Acts 2:38; Romans 10:9-10), are members of the one and only church (Acts 2:47) and then become members

of local congregations (Romans 16:16; Acts 9:26-28). If you are weary with the disunity and confusion of modern religion, we believe that you will welcome the plea made by churches of Christ - that all may lay aside all human creeds and systems and live according to the Bible. 

## 19-5 Lady Irish draw defending D2 Champs in Thursday opener

Freshmen twin sisters Abby and Elizabeth Magdanz, still wet behind the ears as far as postseason basketball goes, played like seasoned vets Friday night in Sacred Heart's 56-44 victory over Hampton in the Class D2-1 District Championship.

Abby's three-pointer at the end of the first quarter gave her team a 23-7 lead and capped off a memorable introduction to a familiar setting for Lady Irish basketball-district championship games. Abby scored 11 first-quarter points, including 3-3 from beyond the arc, in her first district championship game. She finished with 14 in the game. Elizabeth, not to be outdone, scored a game-high 15 points.

Irish Head Coach Luke Santo, now in his sixth season, said the twins have played beyond their years all season and adapted quickly to the varsity level.

"They don't play like freshmen," said Santo. "They've been playing a lot of games through our elementary system and their club teams, so they have more experience than most freshman do. All season long we've been telling them to stay aggressive and look to score when the opportunities there."

Senior Sara Landis, as she's done all year, dominated the glass recording 23 rebounds to go along with her 14 points.

The win punches a ticket to this week's NSAA State Basketball Tournament in Lincoln. It will be Sacred Heart's 15th appearance in the last 17 years, which includes three state championships ('98, '99, '00) and three runner-up finishes ('03, '07, '08).

"We're really proud of how the girls have grown and progressed over the course of the season," Santo said. "It never gets old getting to the state tournament."

Santo has led the Lady Irish to five state tournaments.

He said he's pleased with how his team has played since losing a head-scratcher to 7-17 Pawnee City in the Pioneer Conference tournament back on Jan. 31. The Lady Irish haven't lost since and appear to be peaking at the right time.

"As a coach, you have to be pleased that you're peaking at the right time of the season and you've given yourselves a shot at winning a championship."

Sacred Heart (19-5) is the No. 3 seed and will face the No. 6 seed Wynot (23-3) Thursday night at 8:45 at Lincoln Southwest High School.

Wynot is the defending Class D2 champion and is a scary six seed. All five starters return from last year's title team and their pressure defense has led to some gaudy scores being put up all season long. They are averaging more than 65 points per game – the most of any team in D2 – and have scored more than 90 points once and more than 80 points three times.

6-foot sophomore Maggie



Schulte, who averages 12.6 points per game and 5.3 rebounds per game, leads Wynot but Santo said their real strength is their

depth.

"Individually, their players are all similar. They play about 10 girls and will sub three, four,

or five girls at a time."

Santo said they will be working on handling pressure this week in practice and will stress the importance of taking care of the ball.

"We'll spend most of our time this week working on our press breaks and attacking pressure," said Santo. "Most of their points come off of turnovers. We feel if we can run our offenses and sets Thursdays, not turn the ball over and make them run their half-court offense, then we have a great shot."

Don't be surprised, though, to see the Lady Irish fight fire with fire and try to beat Wynot at their own game. Sacred Heart, which has a roster of just 10 players, isn't deep enough to run full-court pressure an entire game, but they've used the tactic with success at different times this season.

Lindsay Holy Family (21-1) is the No. 1 seed in the D2 bracket and is led by all-stater Kaylee Jensen. The 6-foot-3 sophomore averages 22.1 ppg and 11.1 rpg and is probably the best player in bracket.

2.0 Informational Items/Reports

2.1 Staff/Student/Organization Report: Principal Ernie Valentine, North School teachers and North School students in Kindergarten, Ashleigh Kirkendall, Emily Vitosh, and Kemper Foster, and students in second grade, Carson Bredemeier, Grace Hollis, and Carson Simon were present at the meeting and demonstrated to the administration and Board members their skills on the laptops in the IXL Math program.

2.2 Principal Reports:

2.2a Ernie Valentine reported on the following for North School: Enrollment was 212 as of Jan. 18; Kin-

dergarten students will travel to Peru for an afternoon of reading activities celebrating the birthday of Dr. Seuss on the afternoon of Feb. 24; Kindergarten surveys were sent out and the early indication is that there will be 45 students in Kindergarten for the 2012-13 school year, the low number due in part to the change in the Kindergarten age for admission date; teachers Kim Oliver and Melissa Hawley have been selected as members of the 2012-14 Elementary Primary Math Cohort based on their experience, application and support of the FC District; Winter MAPS Assessment is complete; NeSA writing has been completed; Check 4 Learning program is up and running.

2.2b J.P. Holys reported on the following for South School: Enrollment was 178 as of Feb. 3; 4th grade has completed the NeSA writing; 5th graders will compete in the Richardson County Spelling Bee on Feb. 14 at Sacred Heart’s O’Connor Hall; 4th grade will attend the Omaha Symphony with Mrs. Ankrom on Feb. 23; the new mobile lab is being used for various instructional activities as well as testing.

2.2c Rick Johnson reported on the following for Middle School: Second Quarter results for the number of students with perfect attendance, honor roll, ABBIT and more than 1 F were provided; Students of the Month are: Rylee Scholl, Cheyenne Dovel, and Haley Liberty; the County Spelling Bee is Feb. 14; the end of three weeks is Feb.15; no school on Feb. 17 for Winter Break; report cards go home on Feb. 20; the end of the quarter is March 7; scheduled Parent/Teacher Conferences will be held on March 13 and 15; May 16 will be the Middle School Promotion at Prichard Auditorium; the results of the NWEA – Map are being tracked for group and individual results and teachers will use this to prepare for the NESA next month; NESA writing test was given Feb. 1 and 2; wrestling has begun with 10 students from 7th and 8th grades participating; there will be no cheerleading tryouts this year as students will join the squad and placed on teams according to their dedication, attendance, team spirit and skills; school enrollment as of Feb. 7 was 180; March calendar of activities was provided in the Board packet.

2.2d Gale Dunkhas reported on the following for High School: Enrollment is 265 students; the I-pads are being utilized in Mr. Vitosh’s and Mrs. Thompson’s classrooms and students are engaged more in learning as well as learning at their own pace; the I-pads and laptops are making a difference in what our students are learning and how they learn it; a grant application is in the planning stages for “America’s Farmers Grow Rural Education” which is funded and sponsored by Monsanto; Mr. Dunkhas has been working with administration from Sacred Heart, HTRS, and Auburn to acknowledge students for achievement on their ACT scores, the Southeast Nebraska Academic Excellence Award; Ms. Barker and Principal Dunkhas are exploring the opportunity in starting an Energy Career Academy for the Fall of 2012; beginning this month Principal Dunkhas will be conducting four random locker searches per month at the High School which is required by the Nebraska State Patrol in order to utilize their police service dogs; Principal Dunkhas recognized the Falls City Police Department for their commitment to keeping our school safe and helping to organize the drug dog program in cooperation with the Nebraska State Patrol; the NeSA writing test was administered last week by Mrs. Vicky Zoeller to all 11th grade students; FC High School has been selected to participate in the 2012 Nebraska Civic Leadership Program and this is the second time Mr. Kurpgeweit has been selected to participate in the program; three students and Mr. Kurpgeweit will have the opportunity to visit the Nebraska Unicameral this spring as well as take a multi-day trip to Washington D.C. this summer; the NSAA released the 2012-2013 football schedules and there are two conflicting home dates with Sacred Heart with arrangements being made so that both teams will utilize Jug Brown Stadium on the week of their games; Students of the Month for January are Brent Maze, Ashleigh Jordening, Tyler DiGiacomo, and Elizabeth Oliver; recognition was given to the High School Band and Mr. Crouch for their performance during the mid-winter and to Mrs. Sutton’s pops concert held recently; congratulations to Cole Ackerman, and Tate Hayes who qualified for State Wrestling; the girls basketball team is playing at sub-districts and the boys basketball will begin their sub-districts this coming Tuesday; February and March calendar of activities was provided in the Board packet.

2.3 Board President Huppert’s Report: President Huppert stated that he, Board Member Kathy Bartek and Superintendent Heckenlively attended the Labor Conference in Kearney and they all concurred that the conference was very good and the sessions were informative.

2.4 Superintendent’s Report:

2.4a Legislative and Organizations Report: Superintendent Heckenlively reported that the Legislative Bills to watch include LB 870 Accountability (Adams), which provides for an accountability system to measure school performance. The system would go into effect Aug. 1, 2012 and must combine multiple measures to gauge the performance of districts and schools.

STATE AID: Nebraska Department of Education has released a state aid model under the current provisions of TEEOSA. The model calls for about \$852 million in funding for K-12 schools, approximately \$837 million from General Fund appropriations and

about \$15 million from insurance premium funds. The state originally budgeted \$864 million in General Funds for 2012-13 (plus about \$15 million in insurance premium tax) to equal about \$880 million in total funds for K-12 education. Locally, as a comparison to prior year calculated state aid, 12/13 State Aid for FCPS as in statute on 2/8/12 would be \$1,618,187.36. The 2011/2012 current year State Aid is \$1,745,724.32, which is a difference of (\$127,536.96, which figures out to a 1.44% State Aid Change as a result of formula need. Additionally, a 13.11% increase in adjusted property valuation is a significant factor when enrollment does not grow and remains steady.

LB 809 Evaluation (Lautenbaugh) proposed changes to teacher evaluation provisions was indefinitely postponed (killed). The measure was opposed by NCSA, NASB, NRCSA, and NSEA.

LB913 School Finance (Adams) Appears to provide a gradual phase-back to the normal base spending limitation of 2.5% over the period of several years. Under current provisions of TEEOSA, the base spending limit for schools in 2012-13 is set at one-half percent. LB 913 proposes to increase the spending limit to one percent for 2012-13. The base spending limit for 2013-14 would have been 2.5% under the current provisions of TEEOSA. Under LB913, the base limit would be set at 2%, which means, if no further legislative action intervenes, the base limit for 2014-15 would be 2.5%. The bill also changes provisions related to the local effort rate for school districts, and the impact of this change will vary by individual school district. Finally, LB 913 sets the date for state aid certification, budget authority certification, and certification of applicable allowable reserve percentages to May 1, 2012.

LB968 (Flood) This bill represents the mainline mid-biennium budget bill. This type of legislation is introduced during 60-day sessions to adjust the state’s two-year budget as necessary. The bill demonstrates the concern expressed by those in the education community that the existing state aid formula projects a decrease in necessary appropriations for FY2012-13. As passed in 2011, the state budget projected a need for \$880 million, \$864.6 million of which would derive from General Fund appropriations. LB 968 lowers the General Fund appropriation to \$814 million for FY2012-13, which represents a \$50 million decrease in funds.

LB970 Sales – Income Tax (Cornett) As outlined in the Governor’s State of the State, LB 970 proposed individual income tax relief by lowering rates and expanding brackets, helping small businesses grow by lowering the top corporate tax rate to the same rate as the top individual rate, and repealing the inheritance tax. Currently, Nebraska is one of only eight states with an inheritance tax. The Governor’s proposed tax relief plan will provide \$326.6 million in tax relief over three years, beginning January 1, 2013, with \$273.7 million going to individual income tax and \$52.9 million for Nebraska businesses.

Tax relief for married, filing jointly would be as follows:

- Bracket 1 - Expand from \$0-4,800 to \$0-6,000 -- lower rate from 2.56% to 2.42%
- Bracket 2 - Expand from \$4,800-35,000 to \$6,000-36,500 -- lower rate from 3.57% to 3.40%
- Bracket 3 - Expand from \$35,000-54,000 to \$36,500-60,000 -- lower rate from 5.12% to 4.90%
- Bracket 4 - Expand from over \$54,000 to over \$60,000 -- lower rate from 6.84% to 6.70%.

Corporate income tax relief, under LB970, would lower the tax rate for income over \$100,000 from 7.81% to 6.70%.

Nebraska School Districts were recently notified that a second-round of the Education Jobs Bill funds have been allocated to Nebraska. FCPS’ allocation for 2012 is \$3,740, which is considerably less than the nearly \$82,000 received in 2011. This second allocation is believed to be the result of another state turning down the 2011 Jobs Bill funds.

Key dates to consider for making arrangements include the NRCSA Legislative Forum to be held on Feb. 21, at the Cornhusker in Lincoln. The NRCSA Spring Conference is scheduled for March 22 and 23 at the Holiday Inn Convention Center in Kearney.

The NASB annual membership dues are included in the February claims. It’s important to recognize the support our district receives from NASB as a member district. NASB is the one organization, which represents all Nebraska public school boards and provides a strong voice in advocating public education in our state and providing valuable professional learning opportunities for school board members and administrators.

2.4b Building and Grounds Update: The project committee has continued to meet over the past several months and recommends the 2011-2012 project list proposals to the board of education for approval. The high school strength and conditioning room project, the middle school gym floor wood overlay, roofing maintenance, school security, and general building maintenance requirements will all be considered priority items on the project list as we move into the spring of 2012.

2.4c School Improvement Process: District data results from the Winter NWEA-MAPS Assessment are being analyzed by building administrators in preparation for the March 2 Teacher Inservice Day. Information and recommendations from the March 2 Inservice and the March 3 Board/Administration Workshop will provide the direction as

we address the district’s strategic plan and establish district goals to be addressed through the School Improvement Process.

2.4d Annual Planning Workshop: The agenda from the 2011 Planning Workshop, which is scheduled for March 3, was provided to the Board for their review and discussion. Burma Kroeger from NASB will again be available to facilitate the workshop. The Board will need to determine to what extent Ms. Kroeger will facilitate the strategic planning process and the agenda will reflect the Board’s direction.

2.4e Kindergarten Admission: Supt. Heckenlively reminded the Board that based on the new kindergarten admissions law going into effect for the 2012-2013 school year, a child who has reached the age of five years or will reach the age of five years by July 31 of the current year is eligible to enter kindergarten at the opening of the school term. A pupil who is six years of age or will be six years of age by July 31 of the current year and has not attended kindergarten shall be enrolled in the proper grade as determined by school officials.

Beginning with the 2012-2013 school year, a child who is four years of age and whose birthday is later than July 31, may not enroll in kindergarten except under special circumstances and met requirements as established by the Board of Education.

Parents or guardians of a child shall present a certified birth certificate to the school officials when seeking admission to kindergarten or to any grade if this is a first time enrollment in this district.

All students entering kindergarten and seventh grade, as well as all out-of-state students, must present a completed physical form and an updated immunization record unless parents have filed the statutory exemption with the district.

2.4f Faculty and Staff Appreciation: Supt. Heckenlively stated that Faculty and Staff Appreciation will be held on March 2 at noon for lunch in the High School Commons area. Board members are invited to attend this event.

2.4g Falls City Education Foundation Meeting: Supt. Heckenlively reported that the FC Education Foundation meeting was held Feb. 8, 2012. The agenda included a review and approval of the financial reports as presented by Merle Veigel for year ending 12/31/11. Scholarships amounts for 2012 were reviewed and set by the board. The Scholarship Committee for 2012 will be Mike Dunn, Teresa Olberding, and Glenda Nelson. Additionally, it was determined the FC Education Foundation will be the fiscal agent for donations towards the proposed strength & conditioning room at FCHS. Contributions towards the project will be tax deductible.

3.2 2012 Project List: It was moved by Ed Harris and seconded by Kathy Bartek to adopt the 2012 project list as recommended by the Project Committee.
