Farm and City Supply, a family-owned business and member of Falls City's retail community since 1978, was recently honored as the 2012 Falls City Economic Development & Growth Enterprise (EDGE) Investor of the Year, at the EDGE Banquet dinner.

F&M Bank President and EDGE Executive Committee Chairman Kevin Malone, who presented the award to the local business, gave a brief history of the business and complimented them on their constant involvement in civic-minded causes.

"I am not sure there is a better example of a family-owned, community-minded business in Falls City," Malone said. "They are involved in civic, school and church organizations and fundraisers and are always one of the first to give their time and/or money to a worthwhile cause."

Role reversal - Tigers cheer their biggest fan

The Falls City High basketball teams held an ALS Awareness Night at Friday's home games against Auburn to promote awareness for the disease that has affected one of Falls City's own. Kathy Bartek, a 24-year veteran of the Falls City Public School Board, was recently diagnosed with ALS, often referred to as "Lou Gehrig's Disease."

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Prior to Sunday night’s Super Bowl, I hadn’t read a word about the upcoming game. I’m not a fan of either Baltimore or San Francisco, don’t especially care for any of their players (except former Husker and current Baltimore punter, Sam Koch), am not fond of either head coach (the brothers Harbaugh) and could not buy into the hype surrounding the pending retirement of the Ravens’ Ray Lewis, an egomaniac who applies war paint before each game and then celebrates himself during the player introductions. I wonder how Lewis will handle being out of the limelight, now that his playing days are over. Maybe he’ll get a commentator gig and sit in various NFL stadium booths, talking about himself.

But I did tune into the game, after — not during — all the pre-kick-off blather, hoping for a competitive contest, which it turned out to be. That’s the part I missed.

As most of you know, the Ravens were beating the Rice-A-Roni out of the 49ers when at least half of the lights in New Orleans Superdome blinked early in the third quarter. Sometime during the blackout, I flickered out, too, coming back to life in the game’s final seconds. So I basically missed the 49ers’ comeback that fell just a little short. I’d bet I wasn’t the only one to succumb to sleep during the 34-minute lights-out delay. And, I’d guess NFL and CBS officials were frantic. The crowning event of the season interrupted by a mysterious blackout. Pondering the cause of the electrical malfunction on Monday morning, I’m wondering if maybe the fuzz off deer antlers didn’t have something to do with it. At Super Bowl parties throughout the nation, spinach dip crusted and chicken wings cooled. Up to that point, the game had been all Ravens. They led 28-6 after scoring on a record 108-yard kickoff return by Jacoby Jones, a player the Texans felt wasn’t worth keeping on their roster after last season.

From what I read Monday morning, the halftime show, featuring a barely-dressed Beyonce, taxed the electrical system to the point that a sensor designed to monitor load, detected the unusual demand and, as intended, opened a breaker. When the breaker opened, the lights went down and the stadium, which had received a multi-million dollar upgrade in advance of the game, went dark. The broadcast booth was also a victim of the outage, silencing Jim Nantz and his sidekick, Phil Sims.

The blackout apparently sapped the Ravens of their momentum and the Niners almost rallied to win. Because of the comeback, this Super Bowl is being described as a “thriller.” At least one of us was so thrilled, he snored through almost all of the second half excitement.

For CBS, the big issue was commercials. The game was an advertising sell-out, with 30-second spots going for the tidy sum of \$3.8 million. Everything that was scheduled was aired, but the lengthy delay and lopsided game (at the time the juice went out) probably didn’t help the home audience numbers, thus the effectiveness of the elaborately produced ads, some of which are fun and/or funny, while others are outright duds or border on offensive. They must pay off for companies that run them, but I can’t ever remember a Super Bowl commercial prompting a personal purchase.

Football season is now officially over, which is good news to many suffering recliners and couches — and wives and girlfriends — across this nation. In Nebraska, many fans will concentrate on this week’s football recruiting signings and then look forward to an early spring game. And some of us will approach these events well rested.

On a totally different subject: Nebraska is in the national news because of another bone-headed politician. Former Lt. Gov. Rick Sheehy resigned in humiliation during the weekend because the Omaha World-Herald exposed his penchant for phone conversations (on his state-issued cell phone) with four women, one who confirmed that they had been romantically involved. Sheehy, who is in the midst of a divorce action, was favored to win the Governor’s seat in 2015, when Dave Heineman leaves office. Sheehy had been in Falls City numerous times and was scheduled to speak at last Wednesday’s Chamber/Main Street banquet, but cancelled, presumably because of inclement weather. The weather might not have been the only reason Sheehy decided to sit the banquet out.



Legislative proposals: Same old ideas in new packages

Developing a long-term relationship with the Nebraska Legislature leads one to understand that when it comes to lawmaking, very little is new under the sun.

Take for instance, Senator Ken Haar’s suggestion (LB323) that a committee be formed to monitor how state aid is distributed to schools. The lawmaker from Malcolm calls it the School Finance Review Committee that would consist of four members of the general public appointed by the governor; four school administrators or officials appointed by the State Board of Education; four school board members appointed by the chairman of the Legislature’s Education Committee; three members of the Legislature appointed by the Executive Board of the Legislative Council; a representative of the governor appointed by the governor; and the state property tax administrator, who would be a nonvoting member.

That’s 17 people who would be charged with not only understanding the convoluted way in which school aid is determined and administered, but also be willing to be the keepers of that knowledge over time in the face of term limits. Haar, who was just elected to his second and final term in the nation’s only one-house legislature, said the committee is needed because term limits keep turning out lawmakers after they master an understanding of how the school funding formula works.

Admittedly it’s a great idea, but not a new one. Back in 1988, lawmakers passed a bill (LB940) to create the School Financing Review Commission to do an in-depth study on school finance and produce recommendations for change. The underlying motive was to give both the executive and legislative branches of government a voice and an understanding.

The result was the long-studied and hard-fought Nebraska Tax Equity and Educational Opportunities Support Act. It was a fitting name for an unwieldy problem. It was also the topic of a doctoral dissertation by the legislative liaison for the Nebraska Council of School Administrators, a fresh-faced young man from Gering named Mike Dulaney. In 1990, when he did the research and wrote the dissertation, he discovered that at least 73 measures dealing with school finance were on the table between 1975 and 1990. Dulaney is now the executive director of the school administrator’s organization, and school finance is still a hot topic.

The history of school finance in Nebraska dates to 1855 when the Common Schools Act was passed and a property tax levy of not less than three mills to the dollar was established. By 1864, a State Auditor’s report indicated that there was “corruption in school funding.” In 1867, the Territorial Governor reported the “school finance law was disorganized and in disarray.” Nebraska’s first Governor, David Butler, was impeached because he had “not deposited \$17,000 in school funds into the state treasury.” State Treasurer “Honest John Gillespie” was also impeached.

In 1854, the Kansas-Nebraska Act established the Nebraska Territory and stipulated that land sections 16 and 36 were to be reserved for the purpose of being applied to schools. There were nearly 3 million acres

set aside for that purpose. Thirty years later, a committee was formed to investigate school land practices because the Board of Public Lands allegedly let speculators gain control of much of the land. Among the more than 600 bills up for consideration in the 2013 Legislature is one dealing with the folks who oversee school lands and funds.

In 1907, lawmakers passed the first bill listed as state aid to schools. The State Aid to Weak School Districts measure allocated \$50,000 from the treasury. Under the law, K-8 schools had to meet a seven-month attendance requirement and set the maximum levy allowed by law to receive state aid. The money, a whopping \$125 per district, was to be used for the teacher’s wage.

Decades of allegations and bills and formulas set the stage for the introduction of LB940 and that first

commission. Under the watchful eye of then Education Committee Chairman (and later Speaker of the Legislature) Senator Ron Withem, the commission persevered and finally called for the automatic repeal of the existing formula on June 30, 1991, and called for a new school finance system to be in place by January 1, 1992.

Over an 18-month period, from 1988 to 1989, the commission held 21 meetings, five public hearings and listened to dozens of presentations by staff and outside experts in order to arrive at its conclusions. On January 1, 1990, the commission formally issued its final report entitled, “Funding Nebraska’s Schools: Toward a More Rational and Equitable School Finance System for the 1990s.”

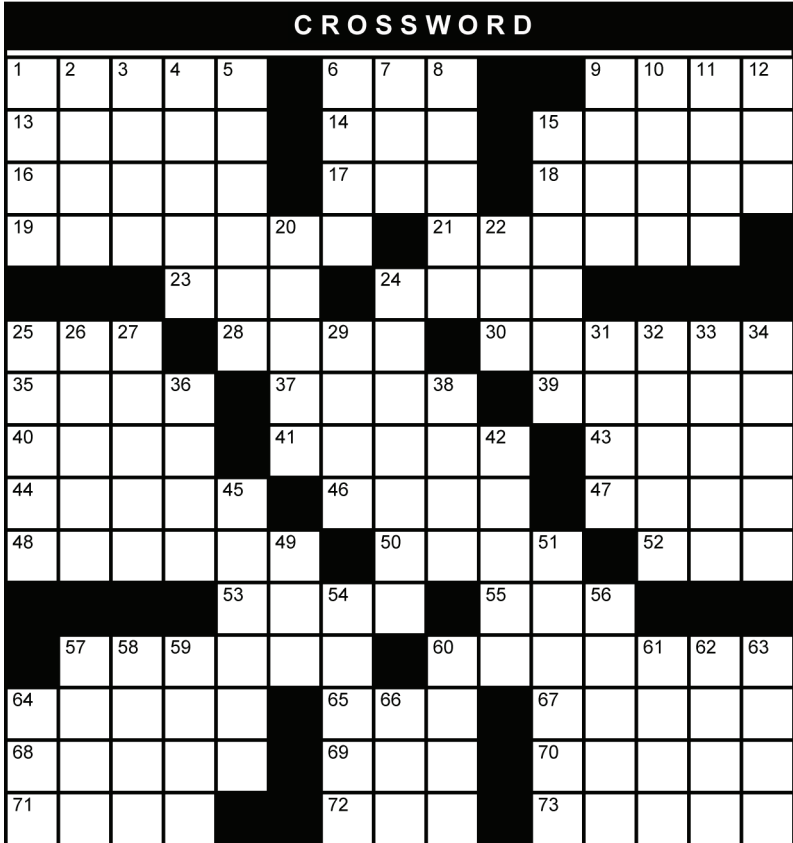

John L. Penney



John L. Penney, 98, Ralston, a former Richardson County school administrator and coach, passed away Jan. 24, 2013. John was a World War II veteran and had an outstanding 40-year career in education in Nebraska and Kansas as a teacher, administrator, counselor and coach. He coached at Sacred Heart and was school superintendent and coach at Verdon. John was a graduate of Doane College, Crete, where he was a standout football player. For a time he managed the Falls City office of the Nebraska Employment Service.

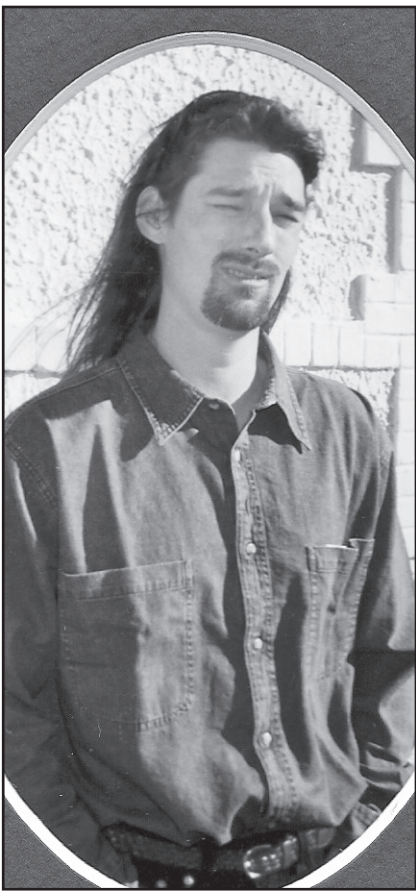

50-year prison sentence for sexual assault of child

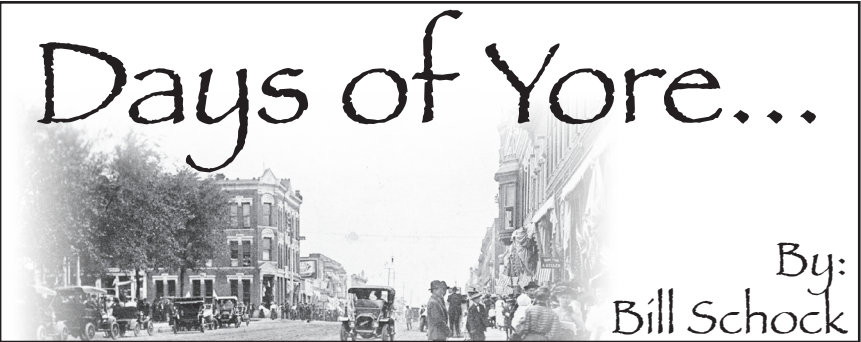
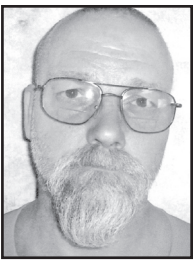
A Falls City man last week was given the maximum sentence possible — no less than 50 years in the Nebraska State Penitentiary — on charges of sexual assault of a child.

District Judge Daniel Bryan Tuesday sentenced 48-year-old Michael Patnode to 50 years in prison on each of two 1-C Felony counts of sexual assault of a child in the 3rd degree. Patnode had pleaded no contest to the charges in December. He was originally charged with one count of having sexual contact with a child less than 14 years of age and two counts of subjecting a child between the ages of 12 and 16 to sexual penetration.

A mistrial was declared in November after a motion filed by Patnode's attorney and a trial had been scheduled for Jan. 8 before Patnode entered the no contest plea.

The sentences will run concurrently, and Patnode was given credit for 490 days served in prison. He will be eligible for parole in some 26 years (March 2039). If and when Patnode is released from prison, he will have to register as a sexual offender for the remainder of his life, and he is also subject to lifetime community supervision.

Patnode was previously convicted of sexual assault charges in January of 2001 and spent two years in the Nebraska Dept. of Corrections.

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2013 Farm Program sign-up

Lincoln — “The sign-up period for the 2013 Direct and Counter-cyclical Program and Average Crop Revenue Election Program will begin Tuesday, Feb. 19, 2013,” announced Farm Service Agency State Director Dan Steinkruger. “These programs were extended for 2013 by the American Taxpayer Relief Act of 2012 signed earlier this month by President Obama.”

Under these programs eligible farmers and landowners will receive direct payments and other safety net protection afforded under the programs. The ACRE sign-up ends June 3, 2013. The DCP sign-up ends Aug. 2, 2013.

The 2013 DCP and ACRE program provisions are unchanged from 2012, except that all eligible participants in 2013 may choose to enroll in either DCP or ACRE for the 2013 crop year. This means that eligible producers who were enrolled in ACRE in 2012 may elect to enroll in DCP in 2013 or may re-enroll in ACRE in 2013 (and vice versa).

FSA is also making plans to implement the extended Milk Income Loss Contract Program and Conservation Reserve Program that were extended one year under the Act. Additional information on these programs will be announced in the future.

Steinkruger noted, “Our FSA Offices are making preparations to complete this sign-up during this short time period. Farmers and landowners will now be able to complete their 2013 farm program planning by considering their 2013 farm program options.”

Johnson, Pawnee Counties to merge Emergency Mgmt.

The Pawnee Republican reported in last week’s paper that the Emergency Management offices of Johnson County and Pawnee County would soon be one.

The County Commissioners of both counties have approved the merger and have voted to go forward with an interlocal agreement.

Johnson County Emergency Manager Clint Strayhorn, whose office is in Tecumseh, will be the interim manager for both counties. It is possible, the Republican article noted, that a part-timer would be hired to help with clerical duties.

Sacred Heart sweeps conference basketball championships

A four-year hiatus from the winner's circle of the Pioneer Conference Tournament came to an end Saturday in Humboldt for the Falls City Sacred Heart boys' basketball team. The Class D2 top-ranked Irish, now 18-3 on the season, earned a decisive 60-45 victory over D2 No. 10 Sterling in the championship game and claimed their first conference title since 2008. Sacred Heart leads the Pioneer with eight conference titles.

"Our effort and focus was great," FCSH head coach Doug Goltz said of his team's three-game run. "We put three good games together and played well on both ends."

FCSH defeated Lewiston 62-49 in Thursday's semifinals and crushed Diller-Odell, 65-25, in the first round last Tuesday in Lewiston.

The Irish and Jets opened the game at a fast pace and FCSH led by just three, 20-17, after the first eight minutes. Chaz Dunn, who finished with a game-high 20 points, set the tone early for the Irish with half of his points coming in the opening frame. Sterling's Ceaton Malone and Trey Trauernicht kept the Jets close though with 3-pointers of their own.

It was a different sto-

steal on the Jets' next trip, Dunn converted a floater from the left baseline to make it 55-43. Sterling never got it back within 10 points.

"We just talked about getting back better on defense and getting matched up sooner," Goltz said about the discussion during the timeout. "On offense we just wanted to do a better job of running our plays and taking good shots in the offense. The guys hit some key baskets after Sterling had got back in the game."

Matt Goltz finished with a game-high six blocks and 11 rebounds, as well as sharing a game-high in assists (6) with senior Clay Finck.

The Irish knocked down 14-of-15 free throws against the Jets and finished the week 53-for-74 (71.6 percent) at the stripe.

Goltz led the Irish with a double-double in the win over Lewiston, as he finished with 22 points and 10 boards. Barnhill scored 14 against the Tigers, while Finck also reached double-figures with 10 points. Junior Colin Niemeyer had his best game of the week with seven points in the win over Lewiston.

The Irish held Diller-Odell to quarters of five, 12, five and three as they extended their lead. The Griffins connected on only six field goals in the game and 16 was both their

field goal percentage and turnover total.

Dunn led the Irish assault against D-O with 22 points on

ry though in the second quarter, as the Irish stepped up defensively and held the Jets to 1-of-10 shooting despite several good looks inside the paint from the Jets big front court of Malone (6-5), Kody Benson (6-5) and Michael Lucas (6-6). The trio combined for only two points in that critical second quarter. The Irish got eight second-quarter points from senior Lane Barnhill and outscored Sterling 14-2 in the second to lead 34-19 at the half.

"We did a better job during that run of defending and we

were doing a good job attacking the basket," Goltz said about that pivotal second quarter. "Sterling's strength is their inside game and other than a few too many offensive rebounds, I thought we did a good job of making their posts work for every basket they got. We brought a lot of help with our guards off the perimeter, which gave them some threes, but we defended well inside."

The Irish opened the second half with a 10-4 run and held their biggest lead of the night at 44-23 at the 4:40 mark of the third, but the Jets countered with an 11-2 charge of their own to end the quarter and trailed 46-34 entering the final frame.

With just under 4:30 to play, Trauernicht recorded a steal that led to a 3-pointer from Jets' senior Ryan Zuhlke, which cut the lead to just eight, 51-43. It was the closest the Jets had been since the beginning of the second quarter and triggered a timeout by the Irish.

The timeout proved to be a difference maker, as FCSH scored on its next two possessions to push the lead back to

6-of-9 shooting, including 5-of-7 threes and 5-of-7 free throws. Goltz was a rebound shy of a double-double with 13 points and nine boards, while adding five assists. Barnhill finished with 11 points, seven boards and four assists.

the top two in the conference tournament only twice (2004, 2012).

“Last week was a special week,” Lady Irish head coach Luke Santo said. “We were just proud of the effort the girls gave and that they were rewarded with a championship. As a coach, you’re just hoping to keep the momentum going and you’re always glad when your kids see their hard work pay off.”

Friday’s win was the third in four days and it came less than 24 hours after a grueling 45-35 victory against Class D1 No. 5 Friend.

Friend, who was the last team to beat FCSH – 62-54 back on Dec. 28 – entered Thursday’s matchup on the heels of their own seven-game winning streak and the Lady Bulldogs jumped out to an early 24-16 lead midway through the second quarter via transition baskets and an early edge on the offensive glass. FCSH junior Ashli Jordan kept her team in it by scoring 11 of her 13 points in the first half. Jordan knocked down three 3-pointers in the game’s first 16 minutes, which included a momentum-capturing trey with only six seconds left in the second quarter that brought her team within two, 26-24, and capped off an 8-2 run by FCSH to end the half.

Santo said the adjustment from the man-to-man defense they started the game in to a combination of 2-3 zone, box-and-1 and triangle-and-2 was an easy call and helped slow down the Lady Bulldogs, who were averaging nearly 60 points per game during their seven-game win streak.

“I thought we were a little tight early on against Friend and they capitalized on us not get-

ting back in transition, so we switched and that slowed them down a little bit before the half,” Santo said. “In the second half, we just stayed in our 2-3 zone and mixed in some triangle-and-2, and we did a better job of rebounding.”

The Lady Irish held Friend to two points in the third quarter and nine in the second half, as they slowly grinded out the win.

Junior Emma Schock and freshman Maggie Goltz had clutch second-half performances against a much bigger Friend frontcourt. Facing two six-footers and three others standing 5-10, 5-11 and 5-11, Schock and Goltz combined for 12 second-half points and totaled 22 rebounds for the game. Schock grabbed eight boards (five offensive), while Goltz grabbed 12 defensive boards (14 total) to go along with her 13 points.

“Emma played great post defense again against Friend’s taller bigs, and she had some huge baskets that kept our momentum going in the second half,” Santo said. “Emma deserves a lot of credit for what she has done in the post this year. Nobody will play harder than her. We know she’s undersized in the post, but we still ask her to do a lot. She is very smart and understands her role and what we need from her night in and night out.”

Santo said Goltz isn’t your typical freshman and has had a pretty smooth transition from playing junior high basketball a year ago to the current grind of a varsity schedule.

“Maggie’s played a lot of basketball and is very smart, so her transition into high school was much smoother than most freshmen,” Santo said. “She’s a little hesitant at times, so we

have to remind her to be aggressive and create for herself and others, but she just keep getting better and better.”

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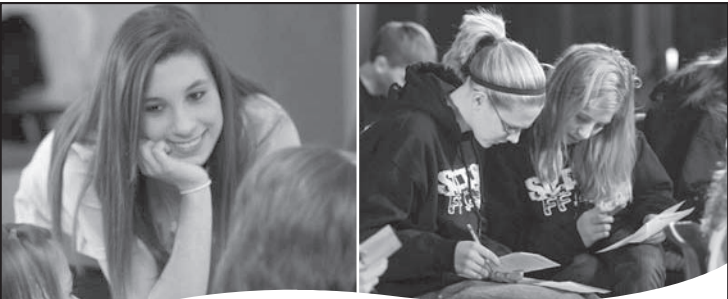
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Tigers take out anger on Auburn

Falls City High had some pent-up frustration after last Tuesday’s loss to visiting Platteview and who better to play the role of “whipping boy” than rival Auburn?

The Tigers improved to 18-3 with another victory against Auburn Friday night in their final home game of the season. Falls City jumped out to an early 10-0 lead against the Bulldogs and never looked back, as they made it 19 in a row against Auburn in a 64-42 victory. deficit into 48-44 lead early in the fourth quarter.

Wattage detectors at library

The Falls City Library & Arts Center has received two wattage detectors from Omaha Public Power District.

The watt detector is a device that measures the amount of electricity used by household appliances. You simply plug your appliance into the detector and wait for readings. Instructions are included.

The device calculates how much money or energy is being spent on an hourly, daily, monthly or yearly basis.

The detectors may be checked out for two-week periods.

As an example, measurements show that one library computer costs 6 cents per 10-hour day, 42 cents a week, \$1.83 a month and \$22.28 a year.
