Ames plant to close

Ames True Temper, a subsidiary of Griffon Corporation, has announced that it will be closing its Falls City facility over the next several months and will be consolidating those operations into its facility in Camp Hill,

The Pennsylvania-based company is reducing its manufacturing footprint to improve operational efficiencies and cost structures.

The process of closing the plant will begin shortly and the facility will be completely closed by December 2013.

Affected employees will be offered severance assistance based on years of service.

The company employs approximately 35 workers at the Falls City location.

Ames True Temper is the leading, as well as the oldest, manufacturer of non-powered lawn and garden tools in the U.S. The company manufactures and markets a wide variety of longhandled tools, wheelbarrows, cutting tools, garden hoses and hose accessories, striking tools, snow tools, decorative garden accessories and planters.

Plaintiff awarded fees, costs

Judge: 'City and EDGE acted in unison in denying public records'

A motion by plaintiff David Leon Frederick of Falls City to grant attorney's fees and court costs in a suit against the City of Falls City and Falls City EDGE has been granted by District Court Judge Daniel Bryan.

"This court has reviewed the evidence submitted and finds that a reasonable attorney's fee of \$16,345 and litigation cost of \$764.59 totaling \$17,109.59, should be awarded" to Frederick, Judge Bryan wrote in a decision dated March 6.

While Judge Bryan issued a "Stay" of the order, he ordered the City and EDGE to place a "supercedes bond" of \$10,000 cash with the Clerk of the District Court office, pending ap-

Frederick filed suit in relation to the Consolidated Grain and Barge economic development project. Construction of the large grain-handling facility is well underway in south Falls

At issue in this suit are documents and whether Falls City Economic Development and Growth Enterprise, Inc., is a public or private entity. Previously, the court found that EDGE is a non-profit corporation formed under Nebraska laws. Judge Bryan also found that EDGE is "a private entity," but the equivalent of a "public agency for the purpose of disclosing records held by it as public records." He wrote that "The structure of EDGE revealed that it walked like a public agency, talked like a public agency and for all purposes was a quasi public agency of the City of Falls City Nebraska." As such, Judge Bryan in December ordered that EDGE provide documents deemed public to Frederick. That decision is under appeal.

EDGE receives funding from the City, Richardson County and a number of local investors.

Judge Bryan has previously found that Frederick should pay costs associated with copying of the documents. But a renewed request for those costs was denied at this time because, the Judge found, not all of the EDGE documents have been produced. "Upon compliance

with this court's Write of Mandamus, EDGE may make application for actual costs incurred to this court," Judge Bryan determined.

"This court's findings . . . implicitly found that the City and EDGE acted in unison in denying public records" to Frederick, the judge ruled.

The case has created interest in economic development and civic entities across the state, especially with economic development arms that function with a blend of public and private funding.

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




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Will tax on soft drinks help curb obesity?

In a state where farmers feed corn to cattle to fatten them for market, a senator wants to tax drinks - many of which feature corn syrup sweetener -- as a way to curb obesity.

State Senator Bill Avery of Lincoln says his bill (LB447) being heard by the Revenue Committee is aimed at soft drinks, which have no nutritional value. He said the current exemption for soda pop is indefensible because the drinks don't belong in the same tax-exempt category as food. A similar bill filed last year never made it out of committee. On one side, many nutritionists say soda consumption contributes to obesity. Others say that even so-called diet soft drinks are unhealthy because artificial sweeteners metabolize as deadly chemicals that injure the body.

At least one brand of soft drink has a vegetable oil that is banned in Europe.

Avery says that ending the sales tax exemption would bring the state an estimated \$11 million in new sales tax revenue. Of that money, 70 percent would be used for school wellness programs and data collection on student obesity and exercise and 30 percent would go to local health departments for health-related programs.

Opponents say the measure is just an unfair way to raise revenue for a new state program by singling out the beverage industry. One Revenue Committee member wonders if this would open the door to selecting even more previously exempted food items and further diminishing that tax-exempt status. Many say that drinking pop is just one piece of the problem. Lack of exercise, poor diet, family history and overeating should also share the blame.

It has been argued for years that taxing food would place an unfair burden on those who can least afford it - the poor. Governor Dave Heineman is unlikely to support what he sees as a new tax. He frequently cautions against creating programs that would increase taxes, even though Avery and other proponents say that spending the proceeds on wellness programs and data collection would benefit higher education and local health departments.

Dr. Bob Rauner, a leader in a coalition of Nebraska physicians, nurses, teachers and health organizations that is supporting Avery's effort, acknowledges that obesity has many causes. But he thinks that reducing consumption of soft drinks and other sugary beverages – perhaps by raising the price through taxes -- could cut into the obesity problem and help reduce the gluttony of spending on diseases caused by the drinks.

A spokesman for the American Beverage Association says it boils down to a matter of choice. Government can't legislate healthy lifestyles, and people are against letting government tell them what

Association's Chris Gindlesperger. He said beverages constitute only 7 percent of all calories consumed.

He said the beverage industry has pushed voluntary guidelines for the nation's schools — including replacing full-calorie sodas with water, milk and other drinks. That has resulted in a 90 percent decrease in calories consumed in schools in the past four to five years. He thinks that is a good

Proponents say that cutting obesity rates will ultimately save Americans billions of dollars in fighting related diseases such as Type 2 diabetes, coronary heart disease and stroke. Rauner said

they can eat and drink, says the revenue from the measure would replace disappearing federal dollars that support many health initiatives such as healthier school lunches and exercise programs for students. North Platte Senator Tom Hansen, a member of the Revenue Committee, admitted that the new revenue might help the state close a \$393 million budget gap, but worried that other foods might be targeted next. There are a lot of things that aren't good for you, he said. But it goes back to parental rights. "Just say no," if your kids want it and it's not good for them,

Avery remains undaunted. He said it takes time for some issues to win public approval and that's no reason to back off.



'Thinking about health'

Decision-making at the end of life

My friend and colleague Charlie Ornstein, a fine reporter who investigates the health system for ProPublica, faced a family crisis after Christmas when his 70-year-old mother entered a Detroit hospital for a cough and ended up dead. As a nurse tried to insert a nasogastric tube, Ornstein's mother's heart stopped.

After nine minutes of CPR, a ventilator was breathing for her, and intravenous medication was keeping her blood pressure steady. Despite the family's efforts to revive her---they talked to her, squeezed her hand, played her favorite music---she remained unresponsive for days. Doctors said the prognosis was grim and suggested removing the breathing machine setting up that most difficult decision families make every day when a loved one is dying.

Ornstein, being the dogged reporter he is, consulted the medical literature and the family rabbi and reached back into his memory to find guidance in stories he had written about end-of-life issues.

He was also being a good medical consumer engaged in his mom's care. He knew that about one-quarter of Medicare payments are spent during a person's last year of life and that studies have shown that much of the care Medicare has paid for was futile. It doesn't always reflect what patients want or prolong their lives. Ornstein's mom had Parkinson's disease and was not in the best of health before that fateful hospital visit. She had told her family she did not want heroic measures to prolong her years.

Still, the family was conflicted, and all those wonk studies don't mean much when the person in question is your mom. Ornstein became skeptical of doctors' predictions having seen his father rebound after 10 minutes of CPR had restarted his heart. He knew all too well doctors make mistakes. He began to question his own assumptions about the health care system.

When a neurologist recommended two more tests, his father wanted them done. The results brought more bad news, and the family decided to honor their mother's wishes and remove her from the ventilator. It was an emotional time, and the cost to Medicare was way down on the list of considerations.

Writing about his ordeal for *ProPublica* and the *Washington* Post, Ornstein said the lesson he learned was that "behind the debate about costs and end-of-life care, there are real families struggling with real decisions."

Most families are probably never going to worry about the cost to the health system in those final weeks, days, or hours of a loved ones life—at least not in America where we've had practically a blank check to spend as much as we like even when there's little or no hope someone will return to a normal life. Ornstein wrote: "I never realized how little the costs to the broader health care system matter to the family of a patient."

The publication of Ornstein's blog post coincided with the publication of "Bitter Pill," a 36-page report in Time magazine by journalist and entrepreneur Steven Brill. He details why America pays so much more than the rest of the world for health care. It's a real eye-opener.

He examines the waste at the some of country's large, nonprofit hospitals showing how they bend their price schedule depending which insurance company has the most clout to drive the best bargain. He traces the influence of drug and medical device makers and their practices that result in the U.S. paying \$94 billion more than other countries pay for the same product. And Brill shows how political influence handcuffs Medicare when it comes to controlling costs. For example, Congress prohibits Medicare from engaging in competitive bidding when it buys things like wheelchairs and canes for beneficiaries even though competition could save a bundle.

It seems we spend way too much for crucial medical services. Thinking about that in the context of the Ornstein family's dilemma, I wondered if lower prices for care would cause families to make different, or perhaps easier, decisions. Or would they matter at all? Would human emotion still trump cost?



My family and friends were always around and I have always been content with that. In my opinion, being an only child is not better or worse than having siblings, it's just different."

Do you feel any different than children who have siblings?

Brandon: "Perhaps, as an only child you learn to be very self dependent in everything you do. Not always having someone there to do things with, or help with chores was challenging at times."





Beginning farmer and rancher workshops

With funding from the USDA Beginning Farmer and Rancher Grant Program, the Center for Rural Affairs, the UNL Extension and the Nebraska Sustainable Ag Society are sponsoring four beginning farmer and rancher workshops in southeast Nebraska. These workshops are focused on the beginning farmer and rancher. One workshop will focus on the concepts of mob grazing and/or marketing grass-fed beef. In the morning successful farmers and ranchers that utilize one or both of these concepts will speak about their operations and answer questions. Right before lunch, there will be a presentation on pastureland leases from an attorney with LegalAid of Nebraska, which is especially important under these difficult drought circumstances we are currently dealing with. Following lunch there will be a session on beginning business planning. During these session participants will learn about basic business principles, i.e. net worth, cash flow, income profit and loss statements and how these can be important business tools in a mob grazing and grassfed beef operation.

There will also be three workshops that focus on the beginning farmer and vegetable/ fruit production. At these workshops successful produce growers will discuss their operations and the various production and marketing strategies they use on their farms. Similar to the previously mentioned workshops, beginning business planning principles will be discussed and explained how they can be used in a vegetable/fruit farm.

On April 4 at the UNL Agriculture Research and Development Center near Mead, Ralph Tate will discuss how mob grazing is incorporated into his farm near Fairbury and Paul Rohrbaugh, from Pawnee Pride Meats in Pawnee County will explain production and marketing strategies with his grass-fed beef operation. Angie Miller will discuss leasing pastures to conclude the morning program. After lunch Dave Welsch will lead the session on beginning business planning on the farm.

On April 8 in Lincoln, Alex

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McKiernan from Robinette Farms will describe their vegetable production farm and how they market through a CSA, off their farm and at farmers markets. After lunch Dave Welsch will conduct a program on beginning business planning for a produce farm.

On April 12, at the UNL Agriculture Research and Development Center near Mead, Kevin and Charuth Loth will discuss their organic vegetable/flower operation at Shadowbrook Farm and how they produce both in high tunnels and in the field. They will describe their different marketing strategies of selling off the farm, through a CSA, at several farmers markets, and wholesale to different outlets. After lunch, Dave Welsch will conduct his program on beginning business planning for a produce farm.

On April 16 in Omaha, Ryan Pekarek from Pekarek Produce will explain his family's vegetable operation and the marketing options they practice. Ryan and his wife Katie produce a variety of vegetables on their farm. They also utilize a high tunnel and grow much of their produce in the field. They market their produce off the farm, at farmers markets, wholesale to grocery stores and to UNL through the Buy-Fresh-Local Program. Following lunch Dave Welsch will lead a session in beginning business planning for the produce farmer.

All of these workshops are free and include: refreshments, lunch, some resources as part of the workshops and an opportunity to purchase resources at a reduced rate. Pre-registration at least three days before each workshop is required so we can plan accordingly for lunch and handouts. Date, time and location of the workshops are listed below. CRP sign-up May 20-June 14

Falls City — Richardson County Farm Service Agency County Executive Director Shawna Mitchell announced today that the Richardson County FSA will conduct a four-week Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) general sign-up beginning May 20 and ending on June 14.

"It continues to be our goal to ensure that we use CRP to address our most critical resource issues," said Mitchell. "In 2012, Nebraska experienced the worst drought in 60 years. CRP protected environmentally sensitive lands from washing or blowing away. It gave ranchers extra grazing land when they needed it. I expect there will be strong competition to enroll or re-enroll acres into CRP, so I urge producers to maximize their environmental benefits and make sure their offers are cost-effective."

In addition to erosion control, CRP provides significant water quality benefits including reduced nutrients and sediment loadings and adverse consequences associated with floods as well as expanded and enhanced wildlife habitat.

Currently, about 27 million acres are enrolled in CRP nationwide, 20,687 acres in Richardson County. CRP is a voluntary program available to agricultural producers to help them safeguard environmentally sensitive land. Producers enrolled in CRP plant long-term, resource-conserving covers to improve the quality of water, control soil erosion and enhance wildlife habitat. Contracts on an estimated 3.3 million acres of CRP are set to expire on Sept.

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Spring precipitation critical

Latest forecasts through March, have put Nebraska in an area of below-normal temperatures, the Nebraska state climatologist says.

Projections for below-normal temperatures for the Pacific Northwest have expanded farther west to include the Great Plains. This area starts north of a line that extends from San Diego to Las Vegas, eastward to Dodge City, Kan., and northeast through Des Moines, said Al Dutcher, state climatologist in the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

"This is a sharp reversal in the forecast which removed all above normal temperature projections, and a significant change from last year when average temperatures were 12-15 degrees above normal," Dutcher

The western U.S. is still in a "mean atmospheric trough pattern," Dutcher said, which started in December and shows no signs of breaking down. He said the radical change in the 30-day forecast has not been reflected in the 90-day forecast, which was issued in mid-February.

"I have no faith in the 90-day forecast," he said. "Now that they have a new 30-day forecast, which is considerably less warm, my suspicion is that April and May will see more normal temperatures as well."

Dutcher said the aggressive storm pattern the state has seen in the last few months will most likely continue through spring, but should shift to the north and impact the northern plains of North Dakota, South Dakota, Wyoming and Montana, making for favorable storm conditions this spring.

Snow pack in northern Canada along with below-normal temperatures for March should favor additional snow in the northern plains. If snow pack across southern Canada remains in place through March, it would further support cooler than normal conditions through April.

"It would also be supportive of spring thunderstorm activity across the Central Plains," he said.

Precipitation this spring will be critical as the state is in worse shape at this time this year than it was at this time last year.

We don't have any deep subsoil moisture," Dutcher said. "Areas east of a line from Hebron northeastward to West Point, we have received 4 inches of moisture since Oct. 1. The heaviest precipitation has fallen from Blair southward to Nebraska City and westward to Syracuse, where there has been 6 inches of moisture."

With an infiltration rate of 70 percent, that would suggest 2.5 to 4 inches of moisture, Dutcher said.

Dutcher does see several more aggressive storms moving across the region with a very good opportunity for a significant moisture outbreak.

"With virtually no precipitation this fall, we need this spring months to be above normal so we can get caught up," he said.

However, even if moisture this spring does materialize, it won't reduce the hydrological effect from this drought any time soon.

"We can have good timed rainfall, but still have hydrological effects," Dutcher said. "Barring an exceptionally wet summer, hydrological impacts will be with us into next winter."

Dutcher said he recommends all producers and ranchers have a drought plan in place.

In addition, he suggests junior right water holders have some type
