

Armory bids opened

The Richardson County Commissioners opened sealed bids on Tuesday, Feb. 26, from firms interested in a possible project to convert the county-owned Army into a jail/law enforcement facility.

Proposals were received from Prochaska & Associates, Omaha, Carlson West Povondra, Treanor Architects, Lawrence, KS, and Johnson Construction, Inc., Sioux Falls, SD. Archi+etc, LCC, Lincoln, declined to submit a proposal at this time.

All of the proposals were accepted for further review by board members Dave Sickel, Jim Davidson and Jim Standerford and Sheriff Randy Houser. Two of the firms were represented at the meeting.

A public hearing was held to hear support or opposition to the Richardson County 1 & 6 Year Road Plan as presented by Highway Supt. Scott Huppert. Judy Burgett attended the hearing and inquired about the status of the Humboldt NW bridge that collapsed last spring. Huppert said engineering is being done and that the project should let out for bid this summer.

After the hearing was closed, the board moved to approve the plan.

The committee appointed to review the procedures for the county's payroll presented their recommendation to comply with the recommendation of the Nebraska State Auditor's Office. The recommendation was to change the payroll period to be calculated every two weeks and to provide the opportunity for employees to take advantage of direct deposits. The recommendation was to be considered at today's meeting.

Extension Educator Lindsay Chichester reported that she will be leaving Richardson County as she has accepted a position with Saunders County Extension. Jami Rutt, 4-H aide, requested to do some updating (painting) in the Extension Office. The board approved the request.

This is some turning back the clock stuff.

A couple of years back when Del and Shirley Bowers were living here, just for kicks Del and I decided to make a list of all of the eating places in the Falls City of yesteryear we could remember. I ran across the list the other day and again, just for kicks, I’m going to lay it on you. If you’ve got some years on you, see if you remember any of them. So here we go:

Brown’s Café, later Huber Café, Dairy Dip, Old Swiss, Frosty Queen, Pete Frederick’s, Hested’s lunch counter, Ken’s lunch counter, Barney Barnes’ One Stop, Pete Yaza’s Cafe, Dyna-mite Café, Carter’s Café, Ramsey’s Café, Tackett’s, Porgy Jones’ Breezy Hill, (later Beanie Prater’s, later Bob and Burdeen’s), Mason’s Hi-Way Café, Stephenson Hotel and Coffee Shop, Silver Grill, Chat ‘n Nibble, Pony Creek Tavern, Northview Café, Cross Town Café, Flanagan’s Grill, Bertie’s Grill, Moore’s Café, Mutt & Jeff Drive-In, Whitehouse Café, Ace’s Lunch, Fireside Inn, Southside Inn, Wittrock’s Drive-In, Fat Boy Drive-In, Redwood Drive-Inn, Lil Duffer, Vets Club, Elks Club, Ote Prater’s Café, Burchard’s (across from the High School and mostly for student snacks). I can’t remember the name, but Henry and Helen Hey had a rather upscale restaurant where the China Buffet now is located but it was destroyed by fire a year or so after it opened.

My memory just faded out on cafes and if it happens to fade back in maybe I’ll list the umpteen gas stations and the grocery stores we used to have.

The Holton, (KS) Recorder ran an interesting story about a barber who had been “cutting hair on the Square” for 50 years. One of the remarkable facts was that there had been 18 barbers in his family.

And that just reminded me of Rule’s Barber Shop (where Falls City Travel now does business) lots of years ago—in fact so many years ago that I was just a kid. I became personally acquainted with Rule’s after my dad tried to save money (Great Depression) by buying a clipper and trying to cut my hair. It was a disaster. After the clipper pulled out some of my hair Rule’s came into play. There were three chairs in the popular shop manned by Bob Rule in the first chair, Jim Birdsley and Carl Frederick. Saturday was the big day for kids and farmers and when you walked in the door you took a number and sat quietly against the south wall. While I was watching haircuts and numbers were being called for the next up, I tried to figure out who was going to cut my hair. Mr. Rule and Mr. Frederick were nice guys but they were getting old as the hills and square cuts sometimes resulted. I thought Mr. Birdsley did the best job and I was hoping when my number came up I was going to his chair. Once in a while I lucked out. I can’t remember whom I was trying to impress with my hair--probably me in front of the mirror. By the way, in those days you didn’t tell the barber how you wanted your hair cut. He did it his way--for 25 cents.

So much for Rule’s Barber Shop and the barber in Holton.

As long as I’m into old, unimportant stuff I might as well go on. I’ve never really bragged much about it, but when I was a sophomore at UNL I donned Cornhusker football gear. That would have been in October of 1937. Here’s how.

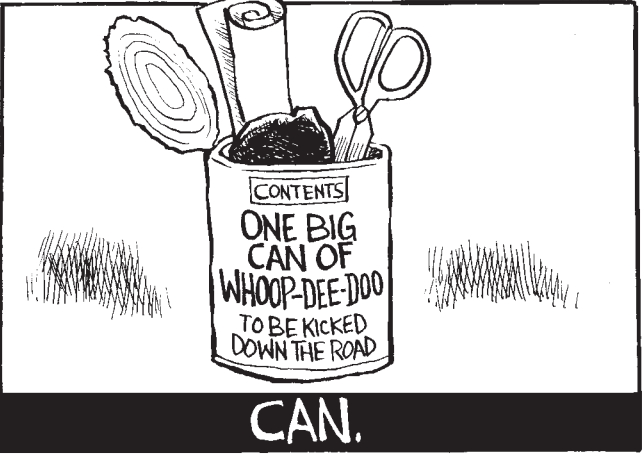
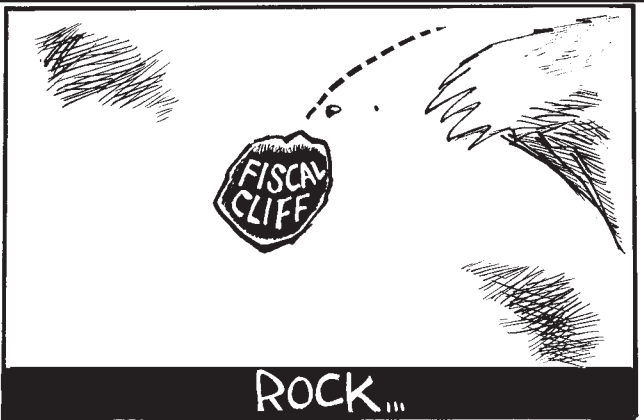
A UNL athletic department call went out to fraternity houses. (There were no men’s dorms.) A Cornhusker B team was going to be formed to play state college teams and anyone who had played high school football was encouraged to report to Memorial Stadium on Monday to make up a team. Chet Fliesbach of Scottsbluff and I knew better but decided to give it a go anyway. With about 25 or 30 guys we checked out gear on Monday afternoon and began a makeshift practice for Friday night’s game against Wayne State--yep, five days away. By Thursday afternoon our coach (I’m racking my brain trying to remember his name but can’t come up with it but he never rivaled Tom Osborne) had formed two teams and we had run through and run through about a half-dozen or so plays, striving for perfection.

Early Friday afternoon we boarded a bus, coach handed out a couple of sheets with several more plays on them and we headed north for Wayne. It began raining cats and dogs and a while after we left Lincoln we were traveling on a graveled highway. You know before I tell you that our bus driver steered too far right, we hit some mud and got stuck. We all de-bused and began pushing and it worked. Some miles down the road we did it again. So much for remaining psyched up, if anyone was.

We finally made it to Wayne, suited up, warmed up and the contest began.

We Cornhusker B’s had two quarterbacks and as the lesser of the two, I saw a little bit of action as the sub for Bud Cather. I won’t enhance it now that I have a chance to 76 years later—so I repeat it, a smattering of action. It never did quit raining and I recall we lost by a bunch to Wayne State. We arrived back in Lincoln about 4 a.m.

Chet and I decided rather quickly we had funner things to do on Friday nights than to push a bus out of the mud and then sit on benches, soaked to the gills, so the Cornhusker B’s went on to play several more games without our talents. You didn’t ask, but that was my collegiate football career in a nutshell and I wanted to share it with anyone who read this old-stuff column this far.



Ernie’s back - so is debate on death penalty

The return of Omaha Senator Ernie Chambers from his four-year term-limit-driven exile has also meant a return of discussions about the death penalty.

A couple of Chambers’ bills deal with the way Nebraska courts decide whether to execute someone (LB542) as well as an outright repeal of the death penalty (LB543) and replacement with mandatory life in prison without parole.

In 134 years, 37 people have been legally executed for the crime of murder in Nebraska. The first was Samuel Richards who was hanged on Jan. 15, 1879. Allison Cole and Allen Grammer were the first to die in the electric chair on December 20, 1920, the only time the state had back-to-back executions on the same day. Mass murderer Charles Starkweather, convicted in 1958 for killing 11 people, was the last to die in the electric chair (June 15, 1959) before the United States Supreme Court banned executions in 1972.

Three men have died since that ban was lifted in 1976. Harold Lamont “Walkin’ Wili” Otey died on Sept. 2, 1994, for the death of Jane McManus in Omaha. John Joubert was executed July 17, 1996, for the deaths of Bellevue area newspaper carriers Danny Eberle and Christopher Walden. Robert E. Williams was the last one electrocuted on December 2, 1997, for the deaths of Catherine Brooks, Patricia McGarry and Virginia Rowe in Lincoln in 1977. In 2008, the state Supreme Court ruled that electrocution was cruel and unusual punishment. A year later, the Nebraska Legislature adopted lethal injection as the method of execution. The state’s highest court set the first execution under the new method for June 14, 2011, but stayed that execution based on a defense attorney’s objection that the sodium thiopental the state purchased from a company in Mumbai fails to comply with U.S. pharmaceutical standards.

Nebraska law requires that someone convicted of murder be subjected to a second trial by jurors to determine if the aggravating factors surrounding the crime outweigh any mitigating factors. If they do, a three-judge panel then decides whether the death penalty is warranted. They look at nine aggravating circumstances, such as whether the murder was done for hire or to cover up evidence of another crime. Chambers’ LB542 would eliminate one that says: “The murder was especially heinous, atrocious, cruel, or manifested exceptional depravity by ordinary standards of morality and intelligence.” He told the Legislature’s Judiciary Committee that aggravator “is the most

litigated, judicially ‘interpreted, tweaked and defined,’ confusing, unworkable, disagreed upon aggravator in the litter.”

Chambers’ LB543 would abolish the death penalty and replace it with mandatory life without parole. Opponents of the death penalty emphasize that such a move prevents the execution of an innocent man. On March 25, 1887, William Jackson Marion was hanged for the murder of John Cameron. However, Cameron turned up alive in 1891. Marion received a posthumous pardon by the State of Nebraska on the 100th anniversary of his execution.

Proponents of the death penalty say it will work as a de-

terrent only if administered in a timely fashion. Starkweather was executed almost exactly a year after his sentencing; the shortest time on death row was the four months served by Gottlieb Neigenfind. He was executed March 13, 1903. By 1994, that number had jumped to 17 years for Otey, the first person executed after Starkweather. The most recent prisoner to be scheduled for execution has been on death row for more than 30 years. Carrey Dean Moore was convicted in 1979 of the murder of two Omaha cab drivers. He has received six stays of execution since then, including the one dealing with the lethal injection drug.

‘Thinking about health’

Should seniors pay more for Medicare?

Can you---or your parents---afford to pay more for Medicare benefits? The answer for most people is probably no, considering that half of all people on Medicare, including those with disabilities, have incomes of \$22,000 or less, and less than \$53,000 in personal savings. The question of paying more may seem so preposterous, why am I even asking?

The answer is that some politicians in Washington are giving the idea serious consideration as Congress looks for ways to reduce the deficit. Medicare accounts for some \$500 billion of the federal budget so it’s a juicy target for deficit hawks. The problem, say advocates for seniors, is that cutting the federal government’s costs simply transfers the risk of rising health care costs to individuals themselves.

A number of proposals are floating around Congress, and all of them focus on increasing out-of-pocket costs for seniors. The principle behind the proposals is to make seniors--and anyone else who needs medical treatment--have “more skin in the game” by paying more for their care. And the theory behind this is that when people pay with their own money, they’ll use fewer services, causing the country’s medical bill to come down.

While there is some evidence that patients use fewer services when they pay more of the cost, studies have shown that people can’t easily distinguish between what care is really necessary and what is not. The danger is that they will not seek necessary care, and an illness could get worse and become even more expensive to treat.

There are different ways proposals for transferring costs will affect seniors. One that has the most traction is to charge people more for their Part B benefits, which cover doctor visits and outpatient hospital care, and for Part D benefits, their drug coverage. Until a few years ago everyone paid the same premiums for Part B services. But now individuals with incomes of \$85,000 or more and couples whose incomes exceed \$170,000—about five percent of beneficiaries—pay higher premiums.

Supporters of plans to decrease Medicare costs would like to see income thresholds changed so that more beneficiaries would pay higher premiums. The Kaiser Family Foundation estimates that eventually one-quarter of all those on Medicare would be paying more. That could mean those with incomes around \$47,000 would be affected. The idea is that “wealthier” people should pay more.

But does someone with a \$47,000 income qualify as wealthy? Another proposal calls for prohibiting Medigap policies from paying what’s called “first dollar coverage.” It’s no secret seniors are afraid of large expenses resulting from costly illnesses and buy supplemental policies to protect themselves from large unforeseen medical expenses that Medicare doesn’t cover. But under some proposals, the policies won’t be able to pay as much up front. One idea is to make people pay the first \$550 of their medical expenses in the form of a deductible, \$2,500 of their expenses as coinsurance (a percentage of the bill they are responsible for paying), plus the premium. All this adds up quickly. Some analyses show that a couple could spend as much as \$15,000 out-of-pocket before Medigap policies kick in.

Joe Baker, who heads another advocacy group, the Medicare Rights Center based in New York City, points out that on average families on Medicare already spend about 15 percent of their income on health care. That’s three times more than younger families spend. These stats zoom in on the heart of the issue: who should bear the burden of deficit reduction. They have yet to become part of the national conversation.

erfeldt also requested office updates, including some minor repairs, painting and carpeting. Board members approved the request, which Duerfeldt will coordinate.

Sheriff Houser met with the board and requested authorization to advertise for sealed bids for patrol units, or to purchase units on the state bid contracts. He said he has received a quote from Hullman’s Ford in Falls City for a unit that was bid through the state contract. Houser reported that 20 hours of training is now required for all Nebraska law enforcement officials and that this will create some added expenses to sheriffs’ budgets. He said that two dispatchers recently attended training and that it was excellent. Radio communications were also discussed.

The board moved to amend the terms of the lease agreement entered into on Dec. 21, 2011, with Telecom Construction for the use of the Armory building (effective March 1).

EMA Director Jim Gerweck and Deputy EMA Director Roger Goos reviewed the report of the Homeland Security Grant Monitoring Visit of Dec. 6, 2012, and Highway Supt. Huppert reported that a demonstration will be given in April on the application of magnesium chloride for dust control on certain county roads. Representatives from Nemaha and Pawnee counties will also be invited to this demonstration.

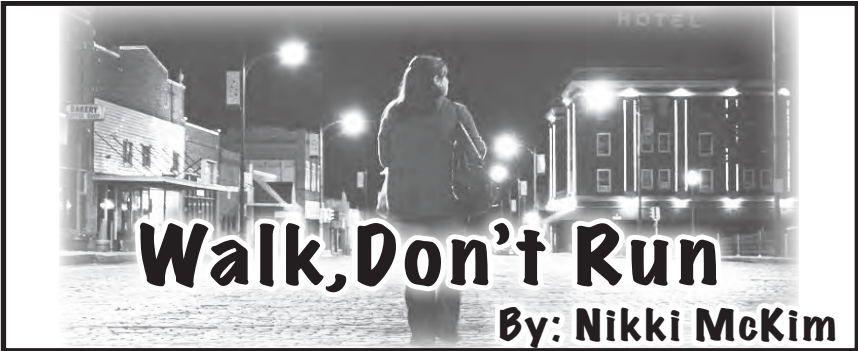

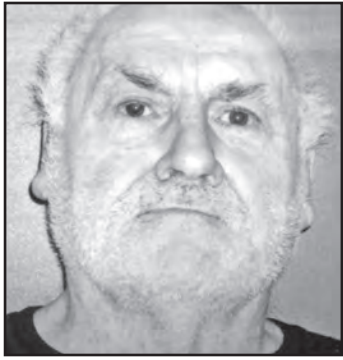

Falls City man, 70, returned to face trio of felony charges

A 70-year-old Falls City man who refused extradition and spent the last three months in a Saline County, Kan., jail was taken into custody and returned to Nebraska Feb. 20 by Richardson County Sheriff Randy Houser.

Eugene A. Waters was charged with using a firearm to commit a felony, 2nd degree domestic assault and terroristic threats for his alleged involvement in a Sept. 21, 2012, domestic disturbance at his former residence, located at 1614 Schoenheit St. All three are felony counts.

Waters is being held on \$300,000 bond and is scheduled to appear in County Court tomorrow (March 6).

According to the affidavit, Charles DiGiacomo of the FCPD responded to a call at the Community Medical Center in reference to a domestic assault. The victim, Margaret Waters, informed DiGiacomo that her husband, Eugene, had pointed a pistol at her face, threatened to kill her and then used the pistol to strike her in the head. Mr. Waters then allegedly ordered her to

give him money and a cell phone and then left the residence.

Mrs. Waters was treated for wounds to her head and required stitches. It is believed Mr. Waters fled to Kansas, where he lived homeless for nearly two months before he was detained in Salina Nov. 9. According to a daily booking report dated Nov. 10, 2012 and published on the *Salina Journal’s* website, Waters was booked into jail at 9:25 a.m. on Nov. 9 and the outstanding warrant from Richardson County was discovered shortly thereafter.

Due to his refusal to waive extradition back to Nebraska, a Governor’s warrant was issued from the state of Nebraska to Kansas, which caused Waters to remain in Kansas’s custody for nearly three months.

Count three – use of a firearm to commit a felony – is a Class 1C felony and carries a maximum sentence of 50 years in prison with a mandatory minimum of five years. Counts one and two are each punishable by up to five years imprisonment.

From frigid to furious: Lady Irish rebound from semifinal loss

What a difference a day makes. Technically for Falls City Sacred Heart it was only 22 hours, but the one-eighty the Lady Irish pulled from Friday to Saturday this past weekend in Lincoln at the state basketball tournament helped end the season on a positive note.

The Lady Irish bounced back from a frustrating 51-28 loss to eventual Class D2 runner-up Osmond in Friday's semifinal at Pershing Auditorium by knocking off Lindsay Holy Family, 50-35, in Saturday's third-place consolation game at Lincoln Northeast High School. With the win Saturday, the Lady Irish finished 25-5 and tied a school record for most wins in a season set in 2002.

Sacred Heart head coach Luke Santo said his team deserves a lot of credit for their performance Saturday after a quick turnaround from Friday's loss and know how beneficial it will be moving forward.

"To come back and play as hard as they did was impressive because it is tough to bounce back emotionally," Santo said. "The win was huge when you look at the fact that the girls got the sense of what it's like playing three games in Lincoln at the different gyms, at Pershing. They get that taste for that and with all of them coming back with all that experience, it's huge and could be a springboard for a really nice season."

Santo described the mood of the team in the locker room after Friday's loss as "deflated," but made sure they refocused for the game against Holy Family, who like FCSH, is without a senior on their roster. Santo presented this to his team as almost a preview of what could lie ahead for the Lady Irish.

"The way I looked at it was we are all going to be back next year and Lindsay was kind of in the same boat. They thought they'd be playing at Devaney for a championship, but they are going to be back next year too," Santo said. "This might be a game we could see a year from now at Devaney or Pershing, so let's go out and make the most of it and see what happens."

The Lady Irish, led by sophomore Elizabeth Magdanz and freshman Maggie Goltz, barraged Holy Family with a dozen threes and made Friday's poor shooting performance seem like ancient history.

Elizabeth set the tone Saturday

with the game's first shot attempt, a 3-pointer that hit nothing but net and put FCSH up 3-0 less than a minute into play. She added two more threes in the second quarter and two in the third en route to 19 game-high points. Elizabeth finished with seven threes over the weekend and tied a D2 state tournament record set in 2006 by Kaily Kennel of Shickley.

Goltz, who made a huge splash in Lincoln by scoring 30 points in her state tourney debut in Thursday's 57-42 opening round win over Sandhills/Thedford, helped the Lady Irish pull away from Holy Family with four 3-pointers in the second half. Goltz finished 6-for-9 from downtown Saturday and in doing so tied a D2 single-game state tournament record set by FCSH graduate Katie Simon in 1997. As luck would have it, the 30 points scored by Goltz Thursday tied a school record for points in a game at the state tournament set by, you guessed it - Katie Simon in 1997. She was the lone freshman to

earn All-Tourney honors from the Omaha World Herald and her 58 points led D2 and was the fifth best total in all classes.

Lost a bit in the 12-for-21 three-point performance against Holy Family was the masterful job the Lady Irish did against LHF's 6-foot-4 junior Kaylee Jensen, who entered the state tournament averaging nearly 25 points and more than 10 rebounds per game. Jensen was held to only two points in the second half and finished with just 12 for the game.

FCSH packed into a 2-3 zone with junior Emma Schock, who gave up almost eight inches to Jensen, in the middle and a combination of Goltz (6-0), Elizabeth Magdanz (5-9) and junior Ashli Jordan (5-6) on the blocks. Jensen was able to get a few buckets in the first half and held a 9-0 edge on the offensive glass in the game, but Santo was more than pleased with his team's defensive effort.

"Jensen is a beast and to hold a girl who averages 25 points and 10 boards a game to 12 is pretty impressive," Santo said. "We dared their guards to hit shots and hoped to limit Jensen's touches and it worked."

The Lady Bulldogs connected on only 15-of-48 field goals and attempted only five free throws.

Osmond used a 1-2-2 zone defense Friday and the normally keen shooting Lady Irish could not get the shots to fall. Osmond held FCSH to two points in the second quarter and built a 26-12 halftime lead.

FCSH finished 2-of-14 from behind the arc and 10-for-43 from the floor, while Osmond benefited

from three first-half 3-pointers and shot over 50 percent from the floor the first 16 minutes.

"I felt like we were getting

good looks, but they just weren't falling," Santo said about the first half against Osmond. "If we could have just got a couple of those to fall early on and kept it under 10 at the half, things might have tightened up for them in the second half.

"Saturday is more like the team we were most of the year, not to the extent of making 12 threes, but we have great, great shooters and that potential has been there all year, but they just didn't fall Friday."

Irish-Jets rematch Thursday night

Another year older and more importantly, wiser, the Falls City Sacred Heart boys take to the hardwood again Thursday night at the state basketball tournament.

It will be the 17th appearance for the Irish boys' basketball program and the 13th under head coach Doug Goltz, who will look to capture his ninth state championship in his 26th season at FCSH.

Fourth-ranked and third-seeded FCSH (22-4) will face familiar foe Sterling (19-7, ranked third) for the fourth time this season Thursday night at 8:45 in the first round of the Class D2 bracket, nearly two weeks removed from a 42-41 defeat the Jets handed the Irish in the sub-district final.

Sterling held the Irish to 12 points in the first half and held a 21-12 edge on the glass. Irish junior Chaz Dunn nailed five second-half threes and had an 11-0 run by himself to get his team back in the game, but the Jets' Ceaton Malone scored with less than three seconds left in the game to seal up the victory.

Goltz said the Irish were outplayed by Sterling in the sub-final, but the loss also helped his team come together for a potential run in Lincoln.

"Sterling played better than we did, they shot well and defended well," Goltz said. "We will need to do a better job this time. Losing that game didn't shake us to the core, but I do think it helped re-focus us."

That loss caused a ripple effect in the seeding and set up "Round 4" between FCSH and Sterling. The Irish were bumped from the top seed (assuming they would have defeated Dorchester in the district final), which Leyton (23-1) claimed, and a matchup with 13-10 Wauneta-Palisade.

Goltz and the Irish qualified a season ago, but were handed an early exit by Wynot in the opening round. It was only the second first-round loss ever for Goltz, who holds a 25-4 record in the state tournament.

"It's always good to have the experience of

being in that environment the year before," Goltz said of last year's tournament. "We return all but one player from that team, so playing in Lincoln last year is a plus."

Wynot, currently 22-3 and ranked fifth, also return to Lincoln and are the No. 2 seed, setting up a potential semifinal with the Irish on Friday. Wynot will face two-time defending D2 state champs Giltner (21-4) at 7 p.m. Thursday at Lincoln High.

Wausa (22-3) and Spalding Academy (23-2) round out the top half of the D2 bracket as the number four and five seeds, respectively. But recent history will have the attention on the bottom half, as all four teams were at state a season ago. Giltner and Sterling will be playing in their fifth-straight state tournaments and Wynot makes its third-straight appearance.

"I think there are quite a few teams capable of putting together three good games and winning the D2 title," Goltz said. "I think our side might be a little tougher because of that state tournament experience factor. Teams like Giltner, Wynot and Sterling have had a lot of success the past few years."

Goltz said despite the quick departure from last year's tournament, his players stayed in Lincoln to watch some games and spent most of the day Saturday at the Devaney Center for the championship games. The hope being that with only one player gone from a season ago, teams like Wynot and Giltner will be watching the Irish at Devaney this Saturday.

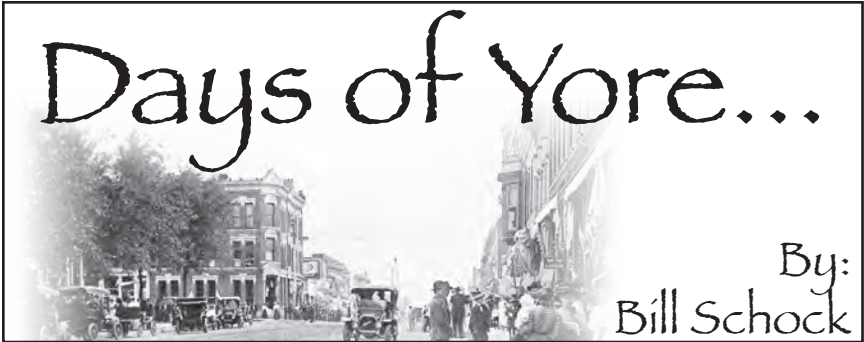

World War I -

from FC doughboy's point of view

post-war working days in New York City and is buried in Steele Cemetery, was Bill Nussbaum's great uncle and the letter was handed down to him. You can guess that after 94 years it was pretty fragile. He gave it to Rex Jones for perusal of its military side and Rex made copies for preservation. The letter will wind up in the Richardson County Historical Society's possession.

Dear "Shell-proof Mo":

Apologizin' to anyone is a brand of merchandise that I do not carry in stock, but realizing that you are an old "partner in crime," I am willing to set aside an ironclad rule for this one time as I believe an apology is very much in order. As a matter of fact, since the Armistice was signed I have been utilizing all of my spare moments studying "Anatomy" in order to find out how many bones there are in the human body so that I can count mine over to see whether or not they are all still there.

You may have heard people say that "Barnum & Bailey's Nostadonic Collection of freaks gathered from all point of the compass" was the most wonderful spectacle they had ever witnessed, but if they could have seen hell broken loose in a "three-ringed circus" and lived to tell about it as I have done, they would have to acknowledge that the "Eighth Wonder of the World" had been definitely established at last. All that I can say, now that the big show is over, I wouldn't take \$10,000 for my cancelled admission ticket, still all the gold in the world and that includes all the yellow stuff yet to be mined, would not constitute a bribe of sufficient size to make me purchase another.

The man who is responsible for the universally proverb, "All the World's a Stage," may be right in his assertion, but if I am to be one of the actors in the "Revue of 1919" I would prefer that the stage be set along the banks of the old Missouri instead of "No Man's Land" in the wilds of France. You surely missed out on something special when you did not take that little excursion across the "briney" with us from Hoboken to the Havrz, and I am willing to bet dollars to doughnuts that after you have finished reading this letter your eyes will bulge out of your head in such incredulous surprise that your associates at the Fairmont will think that you had your head in a hangman's noose.

First of all we came over in boat which wouldn't ever constitute a good-sized row boat in the "Irish Navy." I was always of the opinion that I had a fairly good head for figures, but when I decided that our "Queen of the Seas" had an official capacity of 250 passengers, I made a greivous error for Uncle Sam decided there was ample room for 800 of us, allowing of course, for every square inch of floor space including the anchor. After a wild voyage fraught with submarine scares, during which time our "Floating Palace" whose former voyages were used entirely to transporting cattle from one part of the globe to the other. During all this time she did everything but stand on her head and we were so busy engaging trying to maintain our equilibrium that we were all finished acrobats by the time we docked on the other side. After arriving in France we took "Pullman Palace Box Cars" to the flourishing hamlet of Chailrais-sen, population 62, we were fed on raw meat for thirty days preparatory to tangling with the Huns and by the time we left for the front we were as wild ferocious as blood-drinking Bengal tigers.

General Pershing surely displayed wonderful judgment when he decided to start the big St. Wishial drive on my birthday. During these operations the 89th Division captured more prisoners and suffered less casualties than any other division engaged. From that time on we never let up for a single instant and the evening before the Armistice was signed, found us busy on the west bank of the Wause laying over machine gun barrages at intervals of every fifteen minutes upon a French town on the other side of the river. Think of it, 300 machine guns playing upon the Dutch, firing at the rate of 600 shots per minute (some barrage).

It is useless to try and describe how we drove the Boche out of the Argonne Forest advancing foot by foot in the face of withering machine gun fire—you would let your imagination run riot and still not be able to comprehend the blood that was spilt and hardships we suffered during the drive. It was horrible beyond description. Our whole third platoon composed of 36 men was practically wiped out when a shell dropped immediately among them. Our squad of eight men entered this big drive on Nov. 1st and by the time we emerged on the other side of the woods on the morning of the 2nd we had but two men left, I being one of the two. Considering that I was the gunner of the squad and emerged I surely must have had a pocket of rabbit's feet.

My corporal was wounded by a sniper, our medic was bored squarely between the eyes while attending him, falling directly upon the helpless corporal, his brains oozing out on the helpless man's chest. Our gun was directly exposed to the sniper's fire and in taking down the gun my No. 2 man was shot thru the arm while penetrating into his side and covering me with his blood. A bullet evidently intended for me hit the water jacket of the gun, glanced off and whizzed harmless by my ear. (More horse-shoes). But when we got them out in the open is when we accomplished what seemed like the impossible and made the enemy think the Americans were superhumans. Can you imagine machine gunners with heavy type guns used for defensive purposed only preceding the infantry which constituted the first wave in going over the top? Well that's exactly what we did, neutralizing the fire of every machine gun nest while the infantry surrounded them and blew them to hell.

For 17 hours I carried a 50-pound tripod on my shoulders with my best friend, an entrenching shovel in the other hand, thru a heavy but futile barrage put up by the enemy, always advancing tho we were faint with hunger and ready to drop because of exhaustion. We were keyed up to such a pitch that flying shrapnel and singing bullets were absolutely disregarded. When any of our boys fell, they entreated us between their last gasps "to go get'em" and we did. I can't understand to this day how we stood up under the strain, and I may be boasting when I say it but I honestly believe the American soldier is the best of any in the world. He jumped in the breach at Chateau Thierry and turned the tide of war in favor of the Allies, they straightened out the salient of St. Michael, they cleared out the Argonne Forest which threatened the annihilation of the entire German army, and at the time the Armistice was signed elaborate preparations had been made for taking the Matz Fortress, the impregnable.

After we got the Dutch on the run there was nothing more to it. We camped right on their coat-tails, stopping only upon the crest of each 12th hill to sit down on a dead mule to catch our breath, scratch a cootie or two and take a refreshing drink of green water extracted from a nearby shell hole. Our total losses were 88 men out of the original 132 men that left Camp Funston. This included killed, wounded and gassed.

The present day finds us at Bleialf, Germany, a village near the Belgium border. The people seem to be reconciled to our being here, are treating us courteously and the only time we have had to exercise our military authority in any way is when it became necessary to spank a few of the village cut-ups for offenses of (unreadable). As usual the Fight'n 89th is patrolling more German territory than any other division. Also here is only one division in Europe that took more territory than the 89th during the war and that was a regular army division that arrived here long before we did.

The prospects for us returning home soon does not look very rosy at present. I hardly expect to be home before next June, still, army movements are very uncertain and the order to "pack up" might come tomorrow.

Kindly give all of my friends my very best regards, let them know I am well and happy (just got over an attack of flu a day or two ago). Enclosing herewith a little trinket which I captured in a German depart store. I remain as ever the same old "Coca Cola Hound."
