



ical Center in Falls City. He was born in Pickrell, NE, to Gaylord and Dorothy (Harvey) Marsh

Gale spent much of his childhood on the family farm near Pickrell, in Gage County. In his early teens, he went to work for several farm families in the surrounding area, while he attended and then graduated from Barnston High School in 1947.

He began farming in Richardson County in 1949, when his father inherited 160 acres southeast of Salem on the Nemaha bottoms. He also farmed with his uncle, Ralph Marsh, in Whiting, IA.


Gale joined the U.S. Navy in 1952. After being honorably discharged from the service in 1954, he returned to farming in Richardson County, where he met and married Jeanne Scheer of White Cloud, KS, in 1961. Together they had two daughters, Sarah and Carla. During the early 1960's, he attended University of Nebraska at Lincoln and continued farming on the weekends. After graduation he devoted himself to his passion of farming. Gale was a pioneer in Richardson County in the practice of gatedpipe irrigation beginning in 1956. He also served as the Richardson County Weed Control Commissioner.


Another that I can read over and over is not really a book-its a comic book. Alex bought me The Best of Archie Comics Deluxe Edition, for Christmas. It has 75 years worth of the best of Archie Comics. When I was a kid I collected Archie Comics. Over the years I lost a few here and there, but I still get a thrill when I find one in the check out line at the store. My mom used to buy them and put them on top of the refrigerator as a bribe to do better in school or at home. It always worked and I built quite a collection. Now I have a bookshelf full of new and old 'Archies' that Alex reads from time to time. Nothing is better than seeing your child fall in love with something you loved at that age.

A couple of my favorite biographies are those of classic actors, naturally. My favorite is about my favorite actress, Norma Shearer. Norma: The Story of Norma Shearer is one of the very few biographies about Shearer. She retired fairly young and is forgotten by most. To me nobody is as beautiful as Norma. When I first saw her face in the 1939 film, The Women, I was hooked. I wanted to know everything about her and her story doesn't disappoint. Shearer stared in a few silent films with Lon Chaney Sr., and Joan Crawford; pre-code films with Lionel Barrymore, Leslie Howard and Clark Gable; and other films with Frederic March and Joan Fontaine. She was married to MGM 'boy wonder' Irving Thalberg, who died at the early age of 37, leaving behind his young wife and two small children. Norma soon retired from films and married a ski instructor ten years her junior. She went on to discover actress Janet Leigh when she spotted her photo on the desk of Janet's father at a ski lodge.

Another wonderful biography is Screwball: The Life of Carole Lombard. Lombard was known in the 30's for her energetic, off beat roles in screwball comedies. I find her to be a fascinating woman. In a world of women who sat up straight and were prim and proper, she was more my speed. She was 'one of the boys,' and I loved that about her.

When the U.S. entered World War II at the end of 1941, Lombard traveled to her home state of Indiana for a war bond rally with her mother, and her husband Clark Gable's press agent. Lombard was able to raise over \$2 million (\$34,993,987.92 in 2016) in defense bonds in a single evening. Her party had initially been scheduled to return to Los Angeles by train, but Lombard was anxious to reach home more quickly and wanted to fly by a scheduled airline. Her mother and Winkler were both afraid of flying and insisted they follow their original travel plans. Lombard suggested they flip a coin; they agreed and Lombard won the toss.

In the early morning hours of January 16, 1942, Lombard, her mother, and Winkler boarded an aircraft to return to California. After refueling in Las Vegas, the plane crashed into "Double Up Peak" of Potosi Mountain, southwest of Las Vegas. All 22 aboard, Lombard and her mother included, plus 15 army servicemen, were killed instantly.



Legislature has two weeks to get budget to the floor

Remember, the only obligation the Legislature has is to pass a balanced budget. So, what is all of this other stuff that has occupied senator's time since the start of the year? Is any of it important? Could we live without some of it?

The budget has to be on the floor the 70th Day (April 24) and be passed through all three rounds of debate by the 80th day. It appears that WILL happen, as usual. There were a number of half days (committee hearings are held in the afternoon) early in the session devoted to seemingly endless debate over rules. The Gang of 29 wanted to change the number of votes necessary to cease debate. The other 20 senators pushed back.

Resolution of the issue came in an agreement to abide by temporary rules until the 50th day. That day came and lawmakers agreed to complete the session with the temporary rules in place. But that didn't necessarily open the floodgates to getting bills processed through three rounds of debate and signed by the governor.

By Day 58, the Legislature had passed and the governor signed 33 bills into law. A number of those were routine measures making necessary changes and statute updates in the licensing of health professionals, banking regulations and urban development practices and procedures. The banking updates were the first since 1963. Nothing sexy, just necessary. Gov. Pete Ricketts had signed LB45, a measure to include military reserve organizations in the category of specialty license plates for members of the military. That's a total of 11 different plates for soldiers and they join Husker plates, and mountain lion preservation plates and sesquicentennial plates and the original message plates that have been around a few years. Still awaiting final approval is LB46, another license plate bill that was subjected to lengthy debate. It carries the message "Choose Life." Seventy-five percent of the proceeds from the sale of those plates go to provide temporary assistance for needy families. Ricketts is expected to sign it when it gets to his desk. The governor's plan to streamline and run government like a business took another step forward with LB339 to merge the state Dept. of Aeronautics with the state Dept. of Roads, effective July 1. The combined agencies would be renamed the Nebraska Dept. of Transportation. Nebraska is the only state without one. The newly formed department would be administered by the current Dept. of Roads director-state engineer. A second-round amendment to the bill would require legislative confirmation of any person hired to serve as the director of the aeronautics division within the department. A measure (LB340) to merge the Dept. of Health and Human Services Veteran's Services with the state Dept. of Veteran's Affairs is at the second round of floor debate. Awaiting second-round debate is a measure (LB75) that would restore voting rights upon completion

of a felony sentence or probation. Current law requires a two-year waiting period. Omaha Sen. Justin Wayne has said the waiting period is unnecessary and unjust. He said research shows that ex-felons who have their voting rights restored are three times less likely to reoffend.

Stuck in committee are several pieces of prison reform, including a measure (LB560) that prohibits the use of solitary confinement for vulnerable inmates (those 18 or younger, pregnant or mentally ill).

The bill would allow for two hours out of the cell for other inmates in solitary. The current practice is one hour. The bill's sponsor, Sen. Paul Schumacher of Columbus, says the state

may be sued if changes aren't made.

There's a lot left to do, but the Legislature has

done some real work amid the inordinate amount of blustering and posturing this session.


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Though her life was short it was full of fun and energy and that makes any book about Carole Lombard a must read.

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'Repeal and Replace' fails; now Obamacare needs fixing

"Thinking About Health," is part of the Nebraska Press Association's partnership with Rural Health News Service, which will provide Nebraskans with unbiased health-related information, designed to help better understand the health issues facing our communities, state and nation.

The failure of the Republican-led effort to repeal and replace Obamacare represents a big victory for all kinds of citizens and interest groups that analyzed the proposed legislation and said no dice.

The day before House Speaker Paul Ryan decided not to take a vote on the American Health Care Act, a Quinnipiac Poll found that only 17 percent of American voters approved of the

GOP's legislation while 56 percent did not. You can hardly call that a vote of support for what

the bill was trying to do. Too many people would be hurt, and the public along with editorial writers in newspapers across the country, got that message: The GOP plan would cause real pain. Members of Congress heard it loud and clear, and many responded to what they heard.

Older Americans would have had to pay more, sometimes thousands of dollars more to get health insurance. In 32 states, millions of Americans with incomes slightly above the poverty line who had gained coverage under their state's Medicaid expansion program would have lost their coverage.

Others already on Medicaid or joining in the future would also have been affected. The proposal called for cutting back the federal government's commitment to fund healthcare for the poor by changing the way it would pay for its share of program. That would have left the states, which jointly fund Medicaid, strapped for funds to cover everyone needing medical treatment as well as middle class families who required help paying for long-term care. Medicaid pays for about half of all nursing home stays.

The Affordable Care Act (ACA), or Obamacare, had mandated that every insurance policy sold in the individual market where people without employer or government coverage must shop had to include 10 essential benefits. Under the Republicans' plan, that mandate - that all plans include things like prescription drug coverage, emergency room services, maternity care and mental health treatment – would have disappeared.

Dropping any of the essential benefits would have helped some insurance companies whose individual policies provided only bare bones coverage until 2010 when the ACA required essential benefits to be included. Insurers would have been able to sell skimpy and cheaper coverage to those willing to gamble.

Now, even though the "repeal and replace," effort failed, we are left with a health law that needs repairs of its own.

"Many of the criticisms of the ACA are, in fact, valid," says RoseAnn DeMoro, executive director of the National Nurses United, the largest union and professional organization of registered nurses. "For all the improvements under the ACA - primarily the expansion of Medicaid and crackdown on some insurance abuses - the ACA still left 28 million without health coverage - and millions more struggling with un-payable bills and escalating out-of-pocket costs."

DeMoro's assessment hits home to many readers of this column who have complained about higher and higher premiums, sky-high deductibles and coinsurance, and lack of choice. Many have limited choice of doctors, hospitals and other providers in insurers' restrictive networks. Even worse, in some parts of the country there's only one insurer to buy from.

Those problems stem from the underlying premise of Obamacare itself. The ACA was built on top of the existing private insurance system, which means that it will work only if insurers find it to be good business. As the years went on and sick people with pre-existing conditions flocked to buy coverage, which the law guaranteed they could do, insurers found that Obamacare was not good business. They left the market or made consumers pay more out of pocket or through higher premiums.

The ACA did not provide for any serious cost containment, and the GOP plan didn't call for any either. Medical inflation continues as doctors, hospitals and drug companies raise their prices, and new expensive medi-

The state of Nebraska's first State Capitol

Nebraska's first state capitol building was completed in Lincoln by December 1, 1868. In a reminiscence published by the Nebraska State Historical Society in 1902, Thomas Malloy, one of the surviving stonecutters, gave his memories of that event:

"In the month of November, 1867, I was hired in Chicago by contractor Joseph Ward, who had the contract of building the first state capitol. There were also twelve other stone-cutters who came west to Lincoln, Neb., along with me. We were to receive \$4.50 per day as soon as we began work. . . .

Malloy expected to start work immediately after he and the other stonecutters arrived in Lincoln but later recalled: "There was no material in the way of stone for us to go to work at. So we were badly discouraged.

What could we do, out in the wilderness of Nebraska, and our families in Chicago? At this time the contractor was on his way from Chicago to Lincoln, three days behind us. We patiently waited for him to come, and when he did come we met him determined to do something desperate. In fact we were going to hang him.

"When he saw the material was not on hand for us to go to work at, he there and then told us not to be uneasy; that he would see that we would get our wages, work or play, according to agreement, as the State was good for it. So that pacified us. We were idle two weeks before the rock came in. He paid us full time."

The first capitol building cost \$75,000 but was replaced after only a dozen years of service because of poor construction.

cal technology comes on the market before there is good evidence that it works. One consulting actuary put it this way, "Medical inflation will continue until doctors decide they have enough money and don't raise their fees."

It's not clear that the country's divisive politics will allow for any fix of the ACA's problems, let alone put any teeth into cost control measures. There could be renewed interest in a public option that could allow people to choose government-sponsored insurance rather than a policy from a commercial carrier. Or maybe there would be a move to let people in their 50s or early 60s buy into Medicare, which could spark the beginning of a movement toward Medicare for All.

I'm not betting on any of this right now, but as the failure of the GOP's

Despite continuing efforts at public education on the awareness of organ, eye and tissue donation and transplantation, and advances in medicine and technology, the gap between supply and demand continues.

The number of people on the national waiting list continues to grow. According to UNOS, as of March 31, there are 129,139 total on the national waiting list who need a lifesaving transplant. Of that number, 499 are in Nebraska and 233 are waiting for either a kidney or a kidney/pancreas.

Here are some sobering statistics:

Every 10 minutes, someone is added to the national transplant list.

One tissue donor can improve the lives of more than 60 people.

One organ donor can save up to eight lives.

On average, 22 die every day while waiting for a transplant.

Most organs and tissue are donated by individuals at the time of death; however, another way of obtaining organs for transplant is from a living donor. The most common of these living donations are kidneys but donations of bone marrow, or even small transplanted portions of liver, pancreas and lungs are possible. 

Survey: two-thirds of seniors have been scammed online

Southeast Nebraska area senior care experts offer senior cybersecurity, online fraud prevention tips

Financial and online fraud against aging adults are now considered the "crimes of the century" by the National Council on Aging. Scammers often target seniors because of perceived accumulated wealth, and feel that seniors are less likely to report crimes due to fear of embarrassment.

In fact, a new survey by Home Instead, Inc., franchisor of the Home Instead Senior Care® network of franchised businesses that provide in-home care services to seniors, found that two-thirds (67 percent) of U.S. seniors have been the victim or target of at least one common online scam or hack. In addition, more than a third (38 percent) report that someone has tried to scam them online, and 28 percent of surveyed seniors have mistakenly downloaded a computer virus.

Michael Kaiser, executive director of the National Cyber Security Alliance, explains that encouraging seniors to protect themselves online can go a long way in protecting sensitive identity and financial information. "Cybersecurity is about risk reduction. It's difficult to achieve perfect security. But you can help older adults work to make themselves a more difficult target," Kaiser said.

To help seniors understand their risks online and take steps to protect themselves, the Home Instead Senior Care network collaborated with the National Cyber Security Alliance to launch a new public education program, Protect Seniors Online, available at www. ProtectSeniorsOnline.com. The new program offers free resources and tips to help seniors understand how scammers operate, familiarize themselves with the most common senior scams and provides proactive steps seniors and caregivers can take to protect sensitive information. The resources include the online "Can You Spot an Online Scam?" quiz to test seniors' cyber security knowledge.

"For seniors, this is a time in their lives when they should be able to rest assured, trusting that their life's earnings are protected," said Rich Clabaugh of the Home Instead Senior Care office serving Southeast Nebraska. "Unfortunately, we know there are people who violate this trust. That is why we are committed to helping seniors empower themselves by understanding the ways they are at risk online and practicing good cybersecurity habits to protect their information and reduce their chances of being scammed." Research shows that more and more seniors are going online and putting themselves at risk. According to Home Instead's survey, 97 percent of aging adults use the internet at least once a week. They most commonly use the internet for email, with 94 percent of seniors doing so weekly. Seniors also use the internet to manage finances, with 41 percent banking online and over a quarter (26 percent) paying bills online. Seniors are also active on social media, with 51 percent using Facebook or Twitter at least once a week. All that time online coupled with what scammers view

as perceived financial security and a trusting nature – can make seniors a primary target for scammers.

Seniors are encouraged to take the following precautions, compiled from the National Cyber Security Alliance, Stop Think and Connect and the Home Instead Senior Care network, to protect themselves online:

Create passwords and make them strong. Lock all internet-enabled devices, including computers, tablets and smartphones, with secure passwords – at least 12 characters long and a mix of letters, numbers and symbols.

Secure access to accounts, with two-step verification. Many online services, including apps and websites, offer free options to help protect personal information. Learn more at LockDownYourLogin. com.

Think before you act. Emails or messages that create a sense of urgency – like a problem with a bank account or taxes – are likely a scam. Reach out to companies by phone to determine if emails are legitimate.

When in doubt, throw it out. If an email looks unusual, delete it. Clicking on links in email is often how scammers access personal information. Turn on spam filters to filter suspicious messages.

Share with care. Be aware of what you share publicly on social media and adjust privacy settings to limit who can see your information.

Use security software, including updated anti-virus and anti-spyware software.

Adjust browser safety settings for optimum security.

Use your computer's default firewall security protection on your computer.

Log out. Log out of apps and websites when you're finished using them. Leaving them open on your computer or smartphone could make you vulnerable to security and privacy risks.

Consider support. Seniors who live alone or spend a lot of time by themselves may want to consider a trusted source, such as adult family members, computer-savvy grandchildren, or professional caregivers, to serve as a second set of eyes and ears when conducting activities online. "Our hope is that by highlighting the ways scammers can gather sensitive information or hack technology, and providing seniors with cybersecurity solutions aging adults can implement themselves, we can help ensure their personal information, financial security and independence stay protected," explains Clabaugh. 
Coulton McCann receives scholarship for third time






Irish guys take the title at JCC



By Governor Pete Ricketts

One of my top priorities as Governor is to reduce the tax burden on all Nebraskans to grow our state. The Tax Foundation ranks Nebraska 14th highest for income tax collections per capita and USA Today rates us 5th highest for property taxes. We can, and must, do better.

As I travel Nebraska, people share with me their personal stories about how taxes are hurting their families and businesses. Roxie and her husband run a small restaurant and family farm near Fremont. Last year they took out a second mortgage on their house to pay their property and income tax bill. For Roxie, tax reform is the difference between keeping the business and farm, or shuttering their operation. This is not an isolated situation. I hear these stories from Nebraskans in every corner of our state. Each story deepens my resolve to deliver better tax policy to Nebraskans.

I have been working closely with Revenue Committee Chair Jim Smith and Agriculture Committee Chair Lydia Brasch to put together a tax reform package that will provide meaningful tax relief to families and small business owners now.

Nebraskans in every county want to see a change in how property taxes are assessed, and families want to keep more of the money they earn. This is why this tax reform package reforms both ag land valuations and reduces income taxes.

Property tax reform must be delivered for our farm and ranch families. Income taxes must be reduced to help our hardworking families, grow small business opportunities, and create new and good-paying jobs. To get either one of these goals accomplished, we are going to have to work together and do both.


Last week, the Revenue Committee advanced a comprehensive tax reform package in LB461 that includes both the property and income tax reforms I announced at the beginning of this session. The package will go to the full Legislature very soon. Here are the top five things you should know about the tax plan:

Property Tax Reform First: The plan changes the way ag land is valued for taxation purposes beginning in 2018, moving from a comparable market sales approach to valuing land based on its income potential. Functionally, this plan would have reduced ag land property valuations by \$12 billion if it had been in place in 2017. This would have been an average reduction of 12 percent statewide. With flat levies, this would have reduced property tax on ag land by about \$147 million in 2017. This plan also protects our K-12 schools with a projected

Use caution when spraying Be aware of winds, sensitive crops

Each spring there is potential for challenges in getting herbicides applied in a timely matter for good weed control. With good precipitation and more seasonal temperatures, weeds will be exploding. It is really important to be aware of the wind speed and wind direction when applying herbicides. It is important to know where the sensitive crops are located in your neighborhood. We have several sensitive crops being grown in the region. Grapevines, fruit trees, vegetables and ornamentals can all be quite sensitive to many herbicides.

When spraying, use of a larger droplet size, lower pressure and lower boom height can reduce the potential for drift. It is important to get the best uniform coverage as possible, but if you can reduce the potential for drift, it may save you a lot of problems in the long run. There is also a specific website called DriftWatch or FieldWatch that growers of pesticide sensitive crops and bee owners can register their location. The link to this site is: https://driftwatch.org/ You can go to this site to determine potential sensitive areas if you are planning a pesticide application.

Last year with extremely windy conditions and periods of extended wet weather, there were really challenges in getting herbicides applied and we had several drift issue in Nebraska. At our Private Pesticide Applicator Trainings in 2017, we addressed the issue of Temperature Inversions and also discussed the new XtendiMaxTM With VaporGrip® Technology for the use of Roundup along with the new formulation of Dicamba on dicamba-resistant soybeans. Last year in Missouri there were problems with



farmers applying the old formulation of dicamba on dicamba resistant soybeans. While it did not hurt these soybeans, the old dicamba formulation has major concerns with volatilization, especially at high temperatures and soybeans, grapes, peaches and other valueadded crops are very susceptible to injury from dicamba. This caused thousands of acres of crops to be damaged and even one person was killed in a dispute in the Missouri/ Arkansas farming community.

With the new formulation of dicamba approved along with strict regulations, it is important to follow the Label instructions. The Label is a legal documents and must be followed. It is a violation of Federal and state law to use any pesticide product in a manner inconsistent with its labeling. If you are planning on using this product be aware of the protocol required for its use. Be sure to check with your local ag chemical supplier if you have questions.
