A fabulous baseball and softball complex was dedicated on a warm and sunny Sunday, April 28, afternoon. As if on cue, spring finally arrived in southeast Nebraska and what better way to welcome a new season than the unveiling of the "Fiedler Family Ball Complex," which will provide immaculate, state-of-the-art fields for generations of young ballplayers as they hone their hitting, pitching, fielding and team-bonding skills. And have a blast doing so.

"In the 40 years I have been in Falls City, this community has

given me the opportunity to be a part of many wonderful community projects," said emcee Rod Vandeberg. "And, while I have enjoyed them all, ladies and gentlemen, this is one of the best!"

Vandeberg led a group of speakers that included Lt. Gov. Lavon Heidemann, State Sen. Dan Watermeier, Falls City Mayor Tim Hersh and Ballpark Committee Chairman Brian Poppe. Monsignor Robert Roh of Sts. Peter and Paul Catholic Church gave the opening prayer.

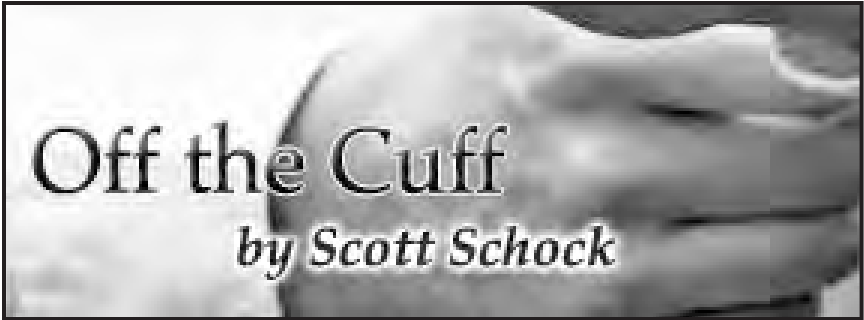

My granddaughters’ birthdays all come about the same time, early in the year. During one of those 2013 celebrations, I asked them — all softball players — if they were excited to play on the new fields at “Fiedler Family Ball Complex.” The answers were unanimous. “Yes!”, couldn’t wait. Same here. I can’t wait to watch them.

All of the leagues and programs that will utilize the new fields will benefit. So will moms, who won’t have to soak and scrub uniforms, dusted by afternoons and evenings of play, basically on the baked diamonds that have been replaced. Now, grass stains may become an issue. Everyone who contributed in any way to make Falls City a destination for baseball and softball should take a bow. Area businesses will also be impacted, as young people and their families visit for games and tournaments. Suddenly, Falls City is competitive with other southeast Nebraska cities whose facilities once far-outpaced ours.

When you start mentioning names, it is usually a problem. Someone is left out. But in this case, three people stand out: Brian Poppe, Kevin Malone and Rod Vandenberg. They, and the members of the committee, as well as those who stepped up to the donation plate, deserve so much credit. We’ve seen it before in recent years in this town, with a new library, Community Medical Center, Thomas Field at Jug Brown Stadium, Aquatic Center and so much more, including a new bridge at Rulo, the Grand Weaver Hotel, Vision Inn.

The message is that this part of southeast Nebraska is on the move. No longer passive, it is aggressive and proactive. That is a good thing.

When I think of the ball fields my granddaughters will play on, I have to reminisce about where we played, years and years ago, way back in the 1950’s and 60’s. In those days, the only field was the main one, Legion Field. There was no softball in the summer. In fact, nothing organized for girls, except for looking good in their swimsuits.

I don’t remember at what age, but most of my friends and I played Pee Wee baseball. It was the only league available, far before Falls City Recreation. Our games were in the mornings and no one came to watch, thankfully. My coach was Tom Castle, older brother of Mike and Pat. He had a job on his hands. All of us had come up through the sandlots, playing games that were hatched in the mornings and sometimes took all day to play. We didn’t necessarily make up new rules, but there were no umpires and negotiations on a call were not unusual. So organized ball was new to us.

As I recall, we all were issued T-shirts from local businesses. Nothing else. We were a jeans and tennis shoes league. I’d suppose some business furnished the baseballs. Our gloves were our own. Mine was a Ken Boyer Trap-Eze, the absolute best should I have had the skills to use it.

I remember stepping into the batter’s box and the catcher — I think it was Butch Gibson — screaming at his pitcher, “Come babe, come boy, rock and fire!” Was I intimidated? You bet. In fact, I was a reluctant batter, at best. No one ever accused me of taking one on the nose for the team. We did have a guy, Johnny Horton, who was known as the “bunt king.” Johnny would bunt at will, and would take one on the chest for the rest of us. Always admired Johnny.

The only game I really remember in organized baseball — many memories from sandlot games — was when I faced my very good friend, Jim Harkendorff. Jim was a big guy, strong, and could pitch with great velocity. I mean, he could fire it. He did not play favorites, even though I was one of his and I knew it. Still, he rocked back and fired pitches over the plate. No way I could catch up to them. The count, I don’t know. But the final throw from “Harky” was on its way and I just closed my eyes and took a swing. Miraculously, contact was made, probably using my Hank Aaron bat (we furnished the bats in those days, too).

Thanks mostly to the speed of Harky’s pitch, and not my bat speed, the ball soared into right field. Not unsurprisingly, the fielder misplayed it. So I took off, not exactly in a blazing manner, and rounded first. Touched second and headed for third. Eyes on home plate and a one-and-only home run in my organized-baseball life.

That was a poor judgment call. The ball was thrown to the catcher — or maybe to Harky, I just don’t remember — and I was tagged out at home. Out! Credit for a triple, but no glory!

Kind of the story of my life.

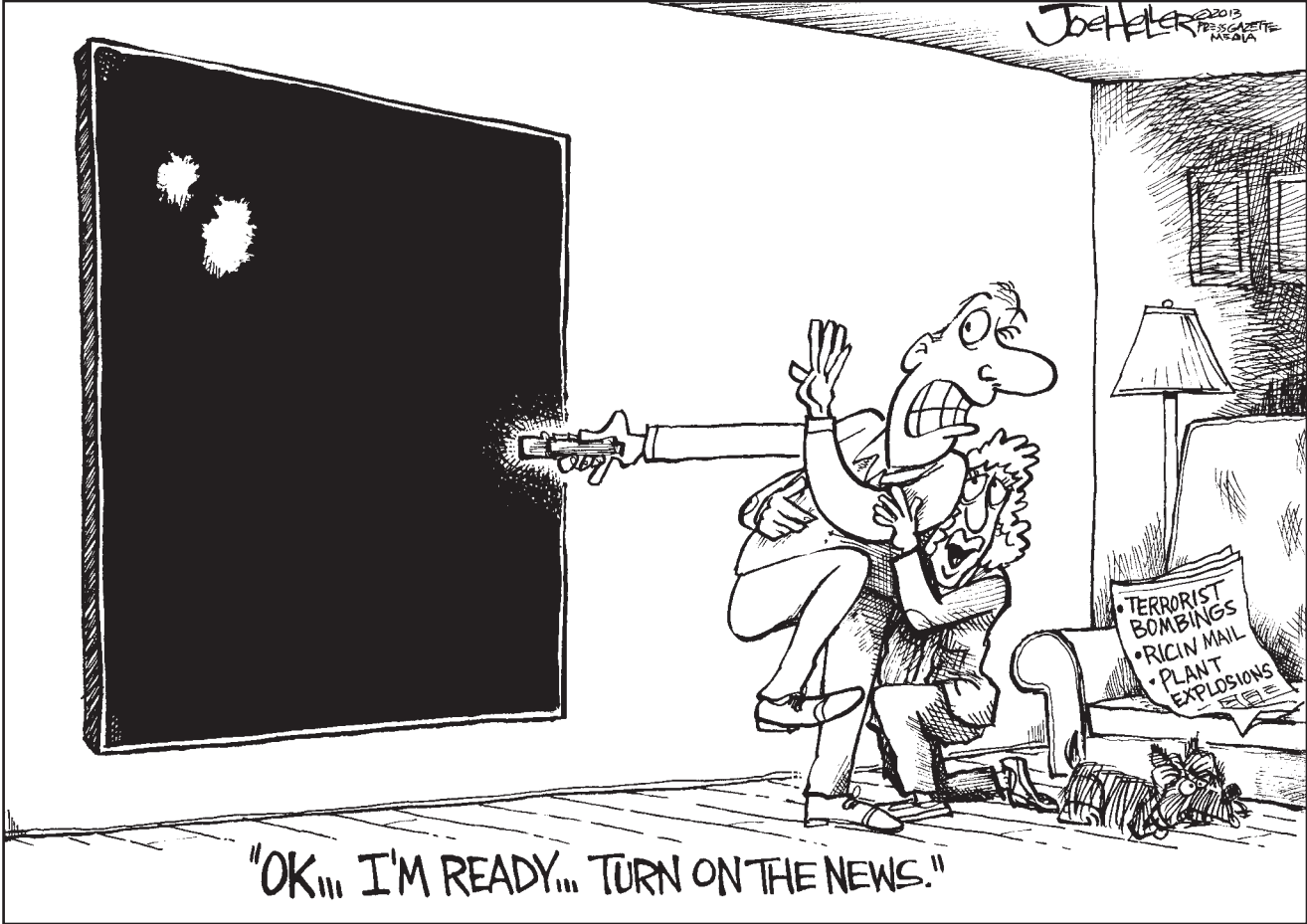

Budget debate looms as lawmakers stay on schedule

As the clock ticks on the 103rd Legislature-First Session, lawmakers face a deadline for dealing with the Biennial Budget. Statute says that the nine-member Appropriations Committee has to have the document ready for consideration by the full Legislature no later than the 70th day of the 90-day session (May 1) and it has to be passed by lawmakers by the 80th day.

The committee, chaired for the first time in decades by a Democratic senator in the officially non-partisan Unicameral, is nearing completion of their budget document, which is based on a lengthy series of public hearings and reviews of state agency requests. Also on the table before the committee, which includes three new members this year, are the proposals from Republican Governor Dave Heineman.

Nebraska’s Economic Forecasting Advisory Board will have two meetings under its belt as it finalizes revenue projections for general fund receipts used by the Legislature to craft the state’s budget. When the group met in February it revised its October 2012 projections upward by \$53 million, raising revenue projections by 5.5 percent to \$3.87 billion for fiscal year 2012-13. Projections for FY2013-14 also were raised 3.1 percent to \$3.96 billion and projections for FY2014-15 were raised 4.5 percent to \$4.1 billion.

The committee’s preliminary budget calls for \$3,806,587,879 spending in fiscal year 2013-2014 and \$3,989,765,536 in fiscal year 2014-2015. Both are under the projected income of \$3.87 billion for FY13-14 and \$4.1 billion for FY14-15. The committee’s budget is also \$19.9 million leaner than Heineman’s proposed budget. Good for them, especially if they can stave off any gubernatorial pressure to cave on some of his pet projects or promises.

Major differences between the committee proposal and the governor’s proposal include: the University of Nebraska; health care reform; developmental disability; construction of a chemical dependency unit; state colleges; community colleges; retirement programs for schools, judges and the State Patrol; early childhood education and salary increases for state employees.

Agency operations account for the biggest share (34 percent) of money spent in the budget. Aid to local governments accounts for 33.4 percent, aid to individuals 32.1 percent and construction 0.6 percent.

Agency operations include the costs of actually operating state agencies (including costs such as employee salaries and benefits), data processing, utilities, vehicle and equipment purchases, fuel and oil, and the like. Although there are 47 state agencies that receive General Fund appropriations from the Legislature through the budget process, higher education (University of Nebraska and State Colleges) and the six largest agencies (Health and Human Services, Corrections, Courts, State Patrol, Revenue, and Retirement Board) account for 89% of state operations. Most of the General Funds for the Retirement Board are actually state contributions for the K-12 School employee retirement plan.

Aid to local governments includes school aid (the Tax Equity and Educational Opportunity Support Act), special education, community college aid and homestead exemptions.

Aid to individuals reflects the largest overall growth in the proposed

budget with a net increase of \$85.5 million for FY2013-14 which includes a \$28.6 million increase for Medicaid eligibility and utilization, \$18.3 million to offset a lower federal Medicaid match rate, \$14.6 million for a 2.25% Department of Health and Human Services provider rate increase, and \$12.5 million for projected higher participation in Medicaid and Children’s Health Insurance (SCHIP) under the Affordable Care Act health care reform and \$4.2 million for childcare rates. Increased funding is also provided for the developmental disability program including funds for new clients transitioning from high school and funds to help reduce the waiting list.

Then there is the matter of the statutory Cash Reserve fund, the unobligated balance the state has kept on

the books – thanks to the wisdom and urging of the late Sen. Jerome Warner of Waverly, the longest serving Appropriations Committee Chairman. It is that very fund that has kept Nebraska out of the financial crises faced in recent years by a number of states that have been forced into deficit spending for a variety of reasons.

At the end of fiscal year 2012/2013, Nebraska should have \$384.1 million in its piggy bank. Those funds can be transferred in small amounts to meet emergencies as long as the plan to transfer the money is accompanied by a plan to reimburse the fund as soon as possible.

Thanks Senator Warner. It’s nice to recognize our generally conservative fiscal roots in Nebraska every couple years while the rest of the country scrambles.

Field and F&M Bank Field. The revamped John and Amalia Morehead Field at Grandview Park opened several months ago.

Vandenberg described Sunday’s ceremony as a “special celebration” and “dedication of another wonderful new project in our great town.” He explained that recent, welcome rains have caused some delays as the project nears completion, but that “hopefully, we can be ready to play ball when the season starts.”

Vandenberg explained how a “very generous ‘lead off’ gift of \$400,000 from The Richardson Foundation” started the ball rolling on the ballpark effort. Those funds, he said, came from the estate of Francis Fiedler. The emcee said that gift “really jump started” the fund-raising campaign.

The speaker, former Mayor and leader of many recent community efforts, shared parts of the project that he believes “exemplify the extraordinary fiber and character of this great community” — which “make me very proud to live in Falls City, Nebraska!” He pointed to the way the complex turned out and how it will “provide many wonderful benefits for our young people for decades to come,” which is “vitally important because our young people are and will always be the backbone of this great community.” Vandenberg also acknowledged the “overwhelming and wide-spread support” for the project from within and without Falls City. It appears, he said, that donations (including in-kind) will completely fund a nearly \$2 million project. Much of the “in kind” work was done by City Utility and Park Department employees, thanks to the endorsement of Mayor Hersh and the City Council.

Special thanks were given to Poppe and Ballpark Committee Treasurer Kevin Malone. “I, for one, will think about you guys every time I drive by this great complex,” Vandenberg said.

Vandenberg saluted Lt. Gov. Heidemann and Sen. Watermeier for their support of Falls City and made special introduction of senior landscape architect and Turf Solutions partner Bill Phillips, who also addressed the large crowd. “I do not know how we could have chosen any better,” said Vandenberg.

Taking part in the ribbon cutting were members of the Fiedler family, Mayor Hersh, Council president Jerry Oliver, Falls City Rec president Don Hogue, Poppe, Malone, Dan Hill and Dr. Terry Malcolm, representing The Richardson Foundation, Lt. Gov. Heidemann, Sen. Watermeier, Turf Solutions representatives and Vandenberg.

“Ladies and gentlemen, the ceremonial ribbon has been cut and I am pleased to announce that this beautifully remodeled complex is now an official part of this community!” Vandenberg explained.

After “first pitches” were made at each field, refreshments were served.

Dear Fellow Nebraskans:

This week, I am writing to share with you the story of the 2013 Nebraska Leopold Conservation Award - the Beel family of Johnstown. The award is given to private landowners who practice responsible land stewardship and management.

Earth Day is the perfect time to acknowledge the conservation efforts of the Beels and all Nebraska landowners. More than ninety percent of Nebraska’s land is used for farming and ranching. It is being well cared for by those who take on the responsibility of leaving things better for future generations. Conservation on private land is something Nebraskans do very well. We all benefit from the work of private landowners who are preserving the natural beauty of our state.

The Leopold Conservation Award is named in honor of world-renowned conservationist Aldo Leopold. Sand County Foundation, Nebraska Cattlemen and Cargill present the award annually to agricultural families in Nebraska.

For the Beels, conservation is part of their family heritage. In 1937, Henry O. Beel purchased land in the Sandhills. His son, Henry C. Beel, joined him 23 years later. In 1990, the third generation of Beels assumed stewardship of the nearly 22,000 acre ranching operation.

The Beel brothers, Frank, Henry and Adam, along with their wives, Jennifer, Mary and Jenny, own and operate the Beel Ranch today. They make it a priority to teach their young children the importance of maintaining and caring for our natural environment. This is the same lesson their father and grandfather instilled in them years ago.

Ranch records indicate that in 1945, Henry O. Beel entered into the first of many conservation plans for the ranch. Today, conservation and range management continues to play a crucial role in the management of the Beel Ranch. Participating in cost sharing programs through the Environmental Quality Incentive Program, the family spent numerous hours planning, designing and coordinating the installation of 32 miles of pipeline. With the existing 67 windmills and tanks, there is adequate supply of water in every pasture on the ranch, allowing them to successfully match their integrated rotational grazing plan to the environment and climate.

This effort proved advantageous during last year’s drought, the second driest season on record. They were able to maintain their cattle number and good range under stressful conditions.

Previous recipients of the Leopold Conservation Award in Nebraska include: the Buell family located in Bassett in 2012; the Mathewson family located in Cheyenne County in 2011; the Kalkowski Family Ranches located near Lynch in 2010; Bluestem Valley Farms near Martell, owned and managed by the family of Lyle and Alice Sittler and Todd and Kristen Eggerling in 2009; A.B. Cox of Mullen in 2008; Rod and Amy Christen of Steinauer in 2007, and the Wilson Ranch in Lakeside in 2006.

In 2012, Sand County Foundation will present Leopold Conservation Awards in California, Colorado, Kentucky, Nebraska, South Dakota, Texas, Utah, Wisconsin and Wyoming. The awards are presented to accomplish four objectives. They recognize extraordinary achievement in voluntary conservation on the land of exemplary private landowners. They inspire countless other landowners in their own communities. They provide a visible forum where leaders from the agricultural community are recognized as conservation leaders to groups outside of agriculture, and they bring representatives from agriculture, environmental organizations, government, industry and academia together to advance private land stewardship.



Board approves vehicle purchases

the bid for the purchase of a 2013 Ram 1500 Crew Cab 4-wheel drive patrol pickup to Armbruster Motor Co., Falls City, for a total price of \$24,495.

Sheriff Houser also requested that discussion and plans be made to formalize the move of the Public Service Answering Point, 911 dispatch, to the County Sheriff’s Office. This item was to be placed on today’s agenda.

Highway Supt. Scott Hupert held his weekly meeting with the board. Weather permitting, he said, construction of the Preston North-South Road is scheduled to begin June 1.

Representatives of Prochaska & Associates presented an agreement for the completion of a needs assessment for the renovation of the Armory into a jail/law enforcement facility and to review a time line for completion of the project. The agreement was to be reviewed by the County Attorney’s office.

Deputy County Attorney Doug Merz presented 23 tax foreclosures. The board authorized the County Attorney’s office to proceed with the 23 tax foreclosures.

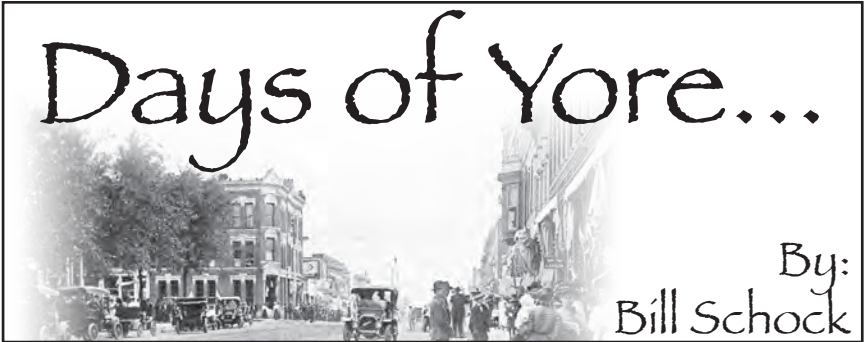

Irish boys capture another Pioneer championship

In dominant fashion, the Falls City Sacred Heart boys' track team captured the team championship – their fifth this season – at Saturday's Pioneer Conference Meet in Auburn. With six gold medals and more than one top-6 finisher in eight events, the Irish boys tallied a season high 152 points. Sterling was second with 114.33 and Pawnee City was a distant third with 81 points.

Chaz Dunn, a junior, led the way with 26 points for FCSH with first-place finishes in both the 400 (53.2 seconds) and 800-meter (2:04.8) runs, as well as a third-place finish in the long jump. Senior Clay Finck took home a trio of gold medals as the top performer in the 100 (11.5) and 200-meter (23.8) dashes and was also a member of the Irish's first-place 1600-meter relay team. Finck was joined by sophomores Sawyer Kean and Austin Malone and senior Lane Barnhill on the 4x400 team. Junior Sean Strasheim captured the other gold medal for FCSH in the pole vault with his vault of 12-feet even. The Irish placed three in the top five in the pole vault with Kean finishing fourth and senior Matt Mullins finishing fifth. Kean also took home a fourth-place finish in the long jump.

Irish junior Yianni Haralabidis was second in both the 100 and 200, as well as earning fourth in the triple jump. Henry Arnold, who is just a freshman,

Collectively, the Lady Irish also competed well and took home second place with 102 points. Friend was first with 114 points, followed by Wymore Southern (63) and Pawnee City (56).

Freshman Maggie Goltz and sophomore Kelsi Fouraker, as they have been all spring, were the top point-scorers for the Lady Irish. Goltz was first in the triple jump with a distance of 33 feet, 2.75 inches, third in the 400 (1:06.5), fourth in the long

jump (14-10) and fifth in the 200 (28.8).

Fouraker earned four silver medals on the day, individually in the 400 and 800-meter runs and as a member of the 4x100 and 4x400 relay teams. Junior Rachel Parrish and senior Kathryn Bieker joined Fouraker on both those relays, while senior Toni Kean was the fourth member of the 4x100 and sophomore Elizabeth Magdanz was the fourth member of the 4x400.

Joining Elizabeth on the 3200-meter relay team, which took fourth place, were Bieker, Nicole Fiegenger and Natalie Kreifels.

Parrish was fifth in both the 100 and 300-meter hurdle events; Elizabeth Magdanz finished third in the pole vault and fourth in the 800, while her sister, Abby, was fourth in the pole vault; Fiegenger was fifth in the 1600, as was Bieker in the 3200.

The Irish track teams finish up the regular season this Friday at the Tecumseh Invitational, then travel to Auburn next Wednesday for the district meet.

The Nemaha Natural Resources District issued an Order at the April 11, 2013, Board Meeting approving the dissolution of the District-wide temporary 180-day stay on water wells and the proposed revisions to the District's Groundwater Management Plan Rules and Regulations as brought before the District Board of Directors. The proposed revision to the rules and regulations will apply geographically to include all lands and water bodies within the boundaries of the Nemaha NRD. Also the proposed revisions will apply stratigraphically to all groundwater located within the Nemaha NRD and is not limited to just groundwater found in the Missouri River Alluvial aquifers, Paleovalley Alluvial aquifers, shallow aquifers, or other such bedrock aquifers within the District. The proposed revisions to the rules and regulations include the following:

- Requiring the installation and use of flowmeters on all new and replacement high capacity wells,
- Allowing no more than two high capacity wells to serve a single purpose, and
- A high capacity water well permit ranking system methodology.

The Board finds that notice of the public hearing to receive testimony concerning dissolving the District-wide temporary 180-day stay imposed on the construction of high capacity water wells and on the changes and additions to the District's Groundwater Management Plan Rules and Regulations was published in *The Falls City Journal*, *Pawnee Republican*, *Tecumseh Chieftain*, *Nemaha County Herald*, *Syracuse Journal-Democrat*, *Humboldt Standard*, *Voice News* and the *Nebraska City News Press*.
