County, Union finalize contract

Richardson County and the Road Department Union finalized a two-year contract Tuesday, April 24, during the commissioners' regular weekly meeting.

Only one item remained in the negotiation process. The union's proposal called for a change in the amount of the medical reimbursement from \$500 to \$650 for the calendar year 2013.

Commissioners Dave Sickel, Bill Ely and Jim Davidson accepted the proposal as presented.

Sheriff Randy Houser was unable to meet with the board because of prisoner transport scheduling. He had presented a request for an increase of reimbursement rates of travel expenses for county employees. The board acted not to make any changes to the travel reimbursement rates.

Ken Dustin of Blue Cross/Blue Shield presented renewal informal for the NACO Group Plan. Dustin said there would be no increase to the group premium rates for the upcoming year.

In other developments, the commissioners:

- —Made a presentation to former Richardson County Assessor Regina Cummings, who retired after serving in the Assessor's office for more than 29 years.
- -Met with EDGE Executive Director Beckie Cromer, who presented the quarterly report.
- —Reviewed resumes for the position of Assessor. An interview was scheduled for today's meeting.
- —Adopted a resolution to establish a formal policy regarding the statement of inventory of county property.

Main suspect in disappearance of Peru State student could be eligible for parole in seven years

LINCOLN - Attorney General Jon Bruning today announced Joshua Keadle, 30, was sentenced to 15 to 20 years in prison on one count of firstdegree sexual assault of a minor. Last month, he was convicted by jury in Dodge County District Court.

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Keadle was spared the maxium penalty of 50 years in prison. He could be eligible for parole in less than seven years.

"Mr. Keadle raped a young girl while she slept," said Bruning. "The seriousness of the crime merited a serious penalty. Today's sentencing ensures Mr. Keadle is behind bars where he belongs."

Keadle is the main suspect in the 2010 disappearance of Peru State College student Tyler Thomas. He is the last person to have seen Thomas on Dec. 3, 2010, and later told investigators that he picked Thomas up and dropped her off at a secluded boat ramp on the Missouri River. He was arrested, but has never been charged in the

Thomas case. Keadle was accused of sexually assaulting a 15-year-old girl at the dormitory of what was then Midland Lutheran College in December 2008. The victim, now 18, testified that she had been asleep in the dormitory and woke up to find Keadle having sex with her. Keadle was 27-years-old at the time of the assault.

Assistant Attorney General Sandra Allen handled the case.

Sometimes when you go digging through a box of mementoes you come up with something significant.

Eleanor Last, who moved from the Shubert area to Falls City in February, buying the house of the late Janet Sailors at 1515 Abbott, sure did.

Ellie was upstairs in the house going through a box of "stuff" left behind when she came up with a high school diploma and a Navy discharge. The name on both was Dale Kobler. Right then and there she became determined to get both documents where they belonged.

A few inquiries got Ellie nowhere and she finally went to the Falls City Library and Arts Center where she was told that Richard Zentner, local historian and genealogist, probably was her best bet to find Kobler or his family. Bob Ferguson, Missouri Pacific historian, supplied the information that Kobler had been a MoPac tower operator in Falls City for several years. Ellie was getting closer.

Sure enough, Zentner and his research came up with the info. Kobler's surviving wife lived in Kansas City, KS.

Ellie gave her a call and said Mrs. Kobler "was thrilled to death" to get the news. The high school diploma and the Navy discharge were soon on their way.

That will be a nice addition to the Courtesy Committee's good deeds report of the Shubert American Legion Auxiliary in which Ellie has been a long-time and very active member.

A copy of a veteran's discharge certificate, as that found by Mrs. Last, is a very important paper. Since World War II, veterans have been filing a copy of their discharge in the County Clerk's office at no charge. They are not public record, so requests for copies of them come through the County Veterans Service Office, where Mona Godemann says a copy of a discharge is essential for many of the services available through that office. A copy of a discharge often is used for information included in a veteran's obituary. Veterans always have been encouraged to make sure their discharges are in safe keeping. And they are in the County Clerk's office.

My main focus in reading is biographies and autobiographies and I got a bonus recently when Janice Phillips of rural Humboldt brought me the biography written by her late uncle, J. R. Shurtleff. J.R. had an unbelievable memory of events from his childhood, through his lengthy and combat service in France and Germany in World War II, and post-war life as a farmer/hog producer in the Humboldt area. He had a unique and humorous way of expressing himself and as a farmer he was an improvisator of the first order. I truly enjoyed reading his memoir and often smiling to myself. Here's one of his experiences those of us stationed at Camp Robertson, AR, at the time well remember:

As a member of the 35th Infantry Division, as was Falls City's Company B, 134th Infantry, stationed at Camp Robinson some months before the start of WWII, J.R. was involved in an incident which made the front pages of newspapers all over the country. On a hot Sunday afternoon, his 110th Quartermaster Battalion was returning from maneuvers in Tennessee (July 1941) and at the outskirts of Memphis, en route to Camp Robinson, the convoy passed a golf course where gals in shorts were playing. A man who also was playing golf paused to watch the Army unit pass by.

When the GIs in one of the trucks couldn't resist yelling "You Hoo!" at the pretties it was a big no-no in convoy regulations. Unfortunately, the golfer was Army Lt. General Ben Lear (three stars on his shoulder) and the yelling, in his eyes, was a serious breach of Army regulations. He would react. When the convoy arrived back at Camp Robinson, General Lear was in gear. He ordered a gassing-up of the trucks, troops still aboard, a return to Memphis (almost 100 miles) and an overnight bivouac at the airport there before re-departing for Robinson. For the "You Hoo" battalion of the previous day the general ordered a 15-mile walk, in five-mile segments, for all of the GIs in the convoy. There was more. When they arrived back at camp exhausted by the walk/heat, General Lear sternly observed as he had them ordered to stand at attention for one full hour. A number of GIs were overcome by heat and tension. No matter, punishment fulfilled--but not so silently.

J.R. wrote: "The news media had a field day at the General's expense. Irate mothers called their Congressmen to complain about the General's treatment of their 'poor boys.' To judge the event calmly, we the culprits got much the better of the deal. General Lear, in effect, was frozen in rank. We became known as the You Hoo Quartermaster and (our unit) was respected in every camp we were in." In post-war years, when the guys who fell under the general's irate spell got together to re-fight their experiences, it was known as the You Hoo Reunion.

Can you just imagine what today's media would have done with that incident and with General Lear's reaction?

Besides his very interesting biography, J. R. published a book of his poems, *Blue Sky and a Black Furrow*, also a winner. He sure knew how to express himself.


It was reported in last week's Journal that 4,300 invitations to the FC High School Reunion had been put in the mail. That's lot of bucks for stamps. 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Senate acts on US Postal Service

Last week, Nebraska Senator Ben Nelson voted for "The 21st Century Postal Service Act," saying that Nebraskans support it because it will maintain vital postal services in rural America, protect rural post offices, and help put the U.S. Postal Service on more stable financial footing.

"This important bill strikes a balance between maintaining post offices and postal services Nebraska communities rely on, and reforming the Postal Service for long-term stability by addressing the financial challenges they face," said Senator Nelson. "Many Nebraskans have voiced strong support for this reform bill because they know local post offices link us to neighbors, our towns and the world.

"Congress must work quickly now to get a final bill to the President's desk, or nothing will stop the Postmaster General from going ahead with draconian plans to close many mail processing centers and 3,700 mainly rural post offices across the country, including 90 in Nebraska," Nelson added.

The Senate passed its bipartisan postal reform bill on a vote of 62 to 37

At the request of Nelson and 11 of his colleagues last December, the U.S. Postal Service agreed to a five-month moratorium on the closings in order to give Congress a chance to enact postal reform legislation. The moratorium expires on May 15.

Nelson has heard from many Nebraskans supporting the bill and raising concerns about the planned closures. For instance, a business owner wrote saying that if the Lisco office is closed, as is proposed, he'll have to drive to Oshkosh to get his mail. That's about 15 miles one way or a round trip of 30 miles, which would amount to 150 miles for a five-day work week. That's a lot of inconvenience and added expense especially considering to-day's high gas prices.

Keith Reid, Legislative Chairman, Nebraska Chapter, National Association of Postmasters of the United States, said: "This legislation adds greater transparency and accountability to the post office closing process. Moreover, it better protects rural postal-dependent communities from arbitrary post office closings and clearly defines requirements and steps that must be taken to close a post office.

"The hard work and dedication that Senator Nelson has placed on this legislation is a testament to the voice of our customers," Reid said.

Alicia J. Toczek, mayor of Loup City, said that her community in central Nebraska uses the Postal Service to send items, documents and water quality samples to state officials in Lincoln.

"Almost half of our community is senior citizens who depend on the mail for their medication delivery. Many do not drive and the Postal Service is their main source of sending and receiving for their need and communication with their families," Toczek said. "This bill will allow the State and local municipal government time to adjust, change requirements, so we do not have the unnecessary expenses for trying to meet State statues with a 24-hour window to get water qual-

ity samples in to the lab."

The Senate bill creates safeguards to ensure that any post office closures are the result of a transparent process and one that takes into account the unique needs of communities, particularly small towns and rural areas. The legislation also puts safeguards in place before closing mail processing facilities and where closures or consolidations may be needed, the Postal Service must do careful study and consider downsizing rather than closing the facility.

Further, the bill prohibits the Postal Service from eliminating Saturday delivery for at least two years and continues appropriate delivery standards.

Finally, to help modernize the Postal Service, the bill creates a new Chief Innovation Officer within the Postal Service to lead development and implementation of new and innovative products and services. It also establishes a new Strategic Advisory Commission of experts to provide advice on turning around its troubled finances and develop a blueprint for long-term viability. The Postal Service would also be given expanded authority to offer non-postal products and services in order to boost revenues as part of the legislation.

LINCOLN – When the feds turned down the original route for a "tar sands" pipeline to run through Nebraska's Sand Hills, the folks at TransCanada might have given you the impression that the decision itself represented some sort of national disaster.



The Canadian company said it would take its unarguably dirty tar sand glop and get it to the West Coast, instead of sending it to refineries on the south coast of Texas. So, there!

They failed to mention the political and other problems they would face in

other states.

The original plan had the pipeline running over porous areas of the Sand Hills and the precious Ogallala Aquifer. In some affected areas, the water table is within a few feet of the surface.

Low n' behold, however, it didn't take TransCanada more than a corporate minute or two – once the initial fight was lost – to come up with an alternative route.

This development was so predictable it wouldn't have gotten even one shouted "Surprise!" from Gomer Pyle.

The new route would run east of the Sand Hills area – or most of it. Critics contend the pipeline would still pose a threat of aguifer pollution in some areas.

The Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality, under a newly enacted law, will review TransCanada's new proposal.

The fight over the pipeline, and the product it would transport, was/is national in scope.

Opponents include a host of scientists and environmental groups who say the bitumen taken from the tar sands is the dirtiest on earth, and that mining and using it would be a disaster.

Meanwhile, proponents in Nebraska and elsewhere maintain it would make America less dependent on other foreign sources of energy. And it would create jobs. Both assertions are subject to scru-

The Christian Science Monitor reported that testimony offered by experts working for TransCanada itself shows that the company actually expects the pipeline to feed the export market and actually increase the price of gasoline in the Midwest, as the current oversupply in the region is reduced.

And while TransCanada has estimated the job creation number at 20,000, independent estimates by the State Department and Cornell University predict a range of 2,500 to 6,000 temporary construction jobs with no significant impact on long-term job creation.

Gov. Dave Heineman has always supported the general idea of a pipeline, but acknowledged public opinion in Nebraska in opposing the route first sought by TransCanada.

If the Department of Environmental Quality signs off on the new plan, it will likely build support for the pipeline in the Legisla-

The pipeline would run some 1,700 miles from Canada to the Texas coast and cost an estimated \$7.6 billion.

Many diseases affect pines, spruces

There are many diseases that affect pines and spruces. Not all of these diseases mean that your tree is going to die, and some don't even require much control effort. Either way, they all look bad when they get into your tree.

Pine wilt is a disease that affects primarily Scotch pines, but it will also affect Austrian pines and less often ponderosa pines. The disease is one that is caused by a nematode, a microscopic worm-like creature, which burrows through the tissues in the wood and decreases the amount of water flow throughout the tree. The nematode is then moved from tree to tree with the help of a pine sawyer beetle. This beetle carries the nematodes on its back to new trees and when it bites into the next pine tree, it makes a wound in the tree where the nematode can go into it and start feeding, causing a large amount of damage. The needles on an infected tree will turn grayish green and will eventually turn all brown. The death usually occurs over a short amount of time. The dead needles will remain on the tree well after the death oc-

There is no control method for pine wilt infected trees. If you have a tree that has or gets pine wilt it needs to be removed as soon as possible to prevent the spread of the disease. If your tree gets pine wilt after the first of October of the year, it should be cut down and burned or chipped by the end of April. If the tree dies between the beginning of May and the beginning of October it should be cut down and burned or chipped as soon as possible. This is done to reduce the spread of the disease and possibly save some of

our beautiful Scotch pine trees. There are two other diseases that affect the same pine trees in similar methods that are commonly mistaken for pine wilt. Diplodia blight is one that mainly affects ponderosa and Austrian pines. The difference between diplodia blight and pine wilt is that in diplodia the pine cones will usually have tiny black spots on the cones which are the fruiting bodies of the fungus. This disease usually occurs as stunted and brown new growth or as entire branches that have brown

The other disease of pine trees is dothistroma needle blight. Dothistroma affects mainly ponderosa and Austrian pines. The difference between dothistroma and pine wilt is that in dothistroma the needles will get dark brown bands across

the needles that have turned brown. This disease is also different from pine wilt because it affects the bottom of the tree first and will eventually move up throughout the tree.

There are different fungicides that are available for use on both dothistroma and diplodia, but they must be applied two times each year. Pruning the diseased branches out of the tree can help to increase the air flow therefore reducing the incidence of the disease. However, if you have dothistroma and/or diplodia your tree is stressed and therefore more susceptible to pine

A disease that is commonly found on spruce trees is needle cast disease. This disease can affect most spruce trees. This is a fungal disease that is caused mainly by the fungus Rhizosphaera. With this disease, the needles on spruce trees will turn reddish brown and under magnification you will see rows of black dots, which are the fungal spores. This usually will show up on the shaded areas of the tree, the interior and lower needles will be mostly affected. For control of this, any type of fungicide will work, especially one containing chlorothalonil. This fungicide should be applied in the early spring with rains.

Sirococcus is another disease that affects most spruces. This is another fungus that affects the new growth on spruce trees in a rainy spring season. A tree infected by Sirococcus will lose the needles on the new growth and sometimes those bare branch areas will droop Trees suffering from this disease can be sprayed with a fungicide containing chlorothalonil if the rains continue. If the rains subside, just trim the infected areas off of the tree.

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USDA grant to fund new ag policy research at UNL

All consumers are not the icy studies are lagging. same. Neither are all agricultural producers. Yet ag policy analysis typically has assumed they are, which can result in ineffective or inefficient policies. The University of Nebraska-Lincoln is leading a new research effort to change that approach.

UNL received a two-year \$766,166 grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture to establish a new policy research group within its Center for Agricultural and Food Industrial Organization.

Traditionally, policy studies have imagined a "representative consumer" or "representative producer" in analyzing agricultural policy, said Konstantinos Giannakas, UNL agricultural economics professor who will lead this research.

However, there's really no such thing. Consumers respond to food policies in very different ways, driven by preferences, income and other factors. Producers' responses to ag policies vary, too, depending on factors including education, experience, location, management skills and available technology.

"We're not all the same. We make different decisions based on where we're coming from," said Peter Calow, research professor with UNL's Office of Research and Economic Development and part of the research team. "It's hard to take these differences into account. It's much easier to make the presumption that everybody is the same."

Calow said policy-makers long have understood that those differences exist, "but they presumed the variability wouldn't make a lot of difference in the end" in making policies about consumers' and producers' decisions.

USDA and others now believe those distinctions potentially make a huge difference, and UNL's research is aimed at developing a new policy-analysis framework that will take them into account.

Many market studies already account for these differences, Giannakas said, but pol-

As an example, Giannakas pointed out, one can look at consumers' reaction to initial introductions of genetically modified foods. European consumers were up in arms initially, while most American consumers were

"We'll be trying to get a handle on these variabilities through observing what people say and do in experimental situations, which is an area called behavioral economics. This is really cutting edge stuff," Calow

Giannakas agreed. "This is novel. This has not been done in ag policy analysis."

"Economics is about behavior and incentives. Policy is about the kind of incentives you're creating for people," Giannakas said. "The so-what question - why USDA is excited about this, why policy makers are excited about this - is this will enable us to take any policy and see how it will affect different consumer groups and different producer groups."

The research will build on work Giannakas and colleagues have been doing for a decade, which has focused on the market for organic products; the economics of innovation and intellectual property rights; the economic effects of the introduction of genetically modified products under different regulatory and labeling regimes; the role of cooperatives in the agri-food system; conservation compliance on highly erodible lands; the market and welfare impacts of country-of-origin-labeling; and consumer demand for qualitydifferentiated products.

Once developed, this new framework will be used to analyze important policy issues such as the market potential and best regulatory response to food nanotechnology; producer behavior and design of policies related to downstream water pollution issues; least-cost policies to facilitate commercialization of biomass crops for energy; the impact of agricultural policies on entrepreneurship and the economic development of rural communities; and producer response to various risk management policies.

Policy analysis will be able to determine the effects of different policies on different groups of producers and consumers - for example, comparing consumers of nanofoods vs. consumers of conventional, genetically modified or organic products; low income vs. high income producers; more efficient producers vs. less efficient

"We believe this will lead to improved policy design, enhanced efficiency, increased effectiveness and fewer policy failures," Giannakas said.


Jordan Schaardt one stroke from medalist honors

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
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Head Start Track & Field Day May 2

Tuition hike at state colleges

Rates up 3.5% for residents, 5% online

Lincoln — At its April 20 meeting, the Nebraska State College System (NSCS) Board of Trustees (Board) approved an increase in tuition of \$4.75 per credit hour for undergraduate resident students at Chadron, Peru and Wayne State Colleges. This 3.5% increase translates to an additional per semester cost of \$71.25 for an undergraduate resident full-time student taking 15 credit hours. Graduate resident students will pay an additional \$6 per credit hour for on-campus graduate courses.

The Board also approved an increase in tuition of \$10 per credit hour for undergraduate online courses and an increase of \$12.50 per credit hour for graduate online courses. This translates into a 5% increase in tuition for online courses.

For the first time, a system-wide rate was approved for dual enrollment courses offered by the State Colleges. Dual enrollment courses, sometimes referred to as early entry courses, are offered to eligible high school juniors and seniors who wish to get a head start on their college careers or take an advanced course not available at their high school. High school students taking advantage of dual enrollment courses offered by the State Colleges will now pay \$50 per credit hour.

Chancellor Stan Carpenter said, "The NSCS will continue to focus on affordable, high quality education for our students. Faculty and staff at Chadron, Peru and Wayne State Colleges can be proud of their efforts to provide opportunities that make a difference in the lives of their students. Education is a game changer and the State Colleges are committed to our students, the state of Nebraska and the surrounding regions we serve."

Monitor drought conditions

LINCOLN – Nebraska farmers, ranchers and water system managers are being encouraged to monitor weather conditions as spring progresses and temperatures rise.

The Nebraska Climate Assessment Response Committee met last week to discuss current weather conditions and the outlook for the remainder of 2012. Committee members reviewed information provided by the state climatologist, as well as representatives of the National Drought Mitigation Center and the National Weather Service.

"The Panhandle and part of eastern Nebraska currently are in either early drought or abnormally dry on the U.S. Drought Monitor map," said Bobbie Kriz-Wickham, CARC chair and assistant director of the Nebraska Department of Agriculture. "The Committee is encouraging farmers, ranchers and water system managers to take note of these circumstances as they gear up for the production season."

State Climatologist Al Dutcher said precipitation across the state in April has not been enough to erase moisture deficits caused by a relatively dry winter and above normal temperatures.

"In some parts of the state, the rain we have been receiving has been lost rather quickly, either as runoff from a hard precipitation event, from high winds, or due to the above normal temperatures," Dutcher said. "While the summer forecast is somewhat uncertain, conditions at present will dictate the need for timely rains, especially in the Panhandle and northeast Nebraska."

According to the U.S. Drought Monitor, 12 percent of Nebraska is in a Class 1 drought. Mark Svoboda with the NDMC said the U.S. Seasonal Drought Outlook map, valid through July 31, predicts the dry Panhandle conditions will persist. Streamflow is low in the Republican and Platte river basins, although reservoirs are in fairly good shape due to good precipitation the past couple years, Svoboda said.

"Water supply conditions are fairly stable for now, but regular precipitation events will be critical as we move forward into the summer," Svoboda

"What we were told this week is that conditions could deteriorate quickly. We just want folks to be paying attention and planning ahead as much as possible," Kriz-Wickham said.

That's the message being carried by a coalition of communities and organizations in the states of Missouri, Iowa, Nebraska and Kansas. The members are in counties two deep on either side of the river and they call themselves "MINK."

MINK intends to take that "open for business" message to local, metro, regional, national and international media again. The coalition members will hold a major news conference on May 17 at Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge near Mound City, MO. Squaw Creek is the premier national recreational site in the MINK corridor and is working hard to restore the wetlands damage done to much of the more than 7,000 acre refuge. Squaw Creek has been featured in international coverage by the BBC for the last three years and by Japanese me-

MINK began meeting in 2010, in Nebraska City, Bigelow, MO, and Hamburg, IA, to concentrate on marketing the corridor and highlighting its assets in local foods, historical culture and attractions, and small town businesses. Then the floods began in June 2011, extending through the summer. Bridges across the river were closed from Plattsmouth to St. Joseph, MO. The MINK meetings were suspended until this spring, with a four-state meeting at Hiawatha, KS, last month.

The attendees shared their stories of the effect of the floods in their states, but also concentrated on the positive responses from businesses, manufacturers, farms and tourism destination points. All four states were not affected equally, with some communities actually seeing an increase in sales tax revenue when highway traffic was re-routed on the west side of the river because of the closing of Interstate 29 in Iowa and Missouri.

Some communities were affected by misinformation about highway closings. Brownville merchants, for example, reached out to the news media to let them know that there was access to their community from the west, even though the Missouri River bridge into Missouri was closed.

Representatives of businesses and tourism sites from the four states will be present at the news conference to tell their experiences in both flooding and recovery. They will be available for media interviews. After the news conference, MINK members will join the media in a luncheon featuring foods from the area, including locally produced root beer. It will be catered by Sportsman's Lodge at Bigelow.

Owner Bill Hutting, a Missouri business person, will share his flood recovery story. Registration for the MINK events on May 17, including the lunch, can be made by calling the Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge at 660-442-3187.

Blue Valley welcomes new practitioner to staff

Blue Valley Mental Health recently welcomed Tammy L. Killin, a Professionally Licensed Mental Health Practitioner, to the staff.

Mrs. Killin comes to Falls City with 15 years experience in the field. Fourteen of those years were spent at Boys Town in Omaha where she held a number of positions that focused on children and families.

"I just moved back to the area in May of 2011 to be closer to family and spent a little less than a year working with developmental disabilities, such as Autism, Aspergers and lower functioning disabilities," said Killin.

Mrs. Killin is also working with the Youth Assistance Program (YAP) for the Falls City Public Schools. YAP is a free, confidential, family-centered case management and referral service for youth, ages 3 to 17, and their families. Referrals are accepted from schools, police, neighbors and parents with concerns about children.

"YAP has really taken off in the last year or two," said Killin. "I work with kids that have been identified within the schools who may benefit from assessment or therapy services. So I'll work with them in the school for a short time frame and if needed I'll refer them for additional therapy or make recommendations to the school."

Mrs. Killin has immediately noticed the support of the community, especially in the Falls City Public School system.

"We have a great school system in Falls City that I am very impressed with. Everyone is very much on the same page," said Killin.

Killin will also be collaborating with the Community Medical Center for when clients, patients and families may need therapy in crisis situations or upon receiving information.

Killin's hours at the BVMH office are Monday through Thursday 8 a.m. – 5 p.m. and Wednesday's from 10 a.m. – 6 p.m.

and in just three days had the 1800-square feet building completed.

Josh said the old Prop In was a total loss and between \$150,000 and \$200,000 worth of damage/ loss was turned into the insurance companies. As frustrating as that may be Josh said the future is looking bright for their "new" business and Big Lake State Park. Construction crews can be seen just about anywhere you look on Highway 111, which runs along the east shore of the lake.

"A lot of people are coming back," Triggs said. "A lot of people tore down and are rebuilding. Most of the full-time residents, that I know of, are back or are planning on it." Josh is one of those people. He, too, had water damage to his home and has lived in St. Joseph, MO, since the park closed last June. He is currently rebuilding his home – this time 10 feet above ground – and is hoping to be living there by July.

The next and probably most important step to reestablishing a normal feel at Big Lake is for the park to re-open. It currently remains closed, including the campgrounds, hotel, cabins and pool, but talks are in the works to give the buildings and park a much-needed face-lift and start allowing people to utilize its features.


Josh and his family's business are just one of the many stories of perseverance in the tiny tourist town, but their story resonates with so many people with fond memories of the lake and all it has to offer.
