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

To burn or not to burn - that is the question

Burning trash within city limits, an issue that has come before the council time and again, will be resolved by voting citizens during the November general election.

Members of the city council voted Monday evening, May 21, to place the issue on the ballot for local voters. City Clerk/ Treasurer Gary Jorn reported that a survey of utility customers on this question was about 50-50, although only a small percentage of responses were returned.

Councilman Ryan Rieschick said the burning question should

be placed on the ballot by citizens who mount a petition, not by the council. "I disagree Mr. Rieschick," said Councilman Hal Sutter. "It is up to us to solve this once and for all."

Councilman Kirby Robidoux said he believes voters should "make the decision. Why not settle it now?"

Councilman Mike Moore said he believes many citizens are reluctant to make their attitudes known in a "public place," such as a council meeting. "People I've talked to," he said, "want this on the ballot."

After Jorn read the resolu-

tion as prepared by City Attorney Doug Merz, questions were raised about the scope of the ban. Rieschick wondered if the potential ordinance would,

in essence, ban all burning, including fire pits and barbecues. That, Sutter said, is not the in-

I never fancied myself much of a cook, although recent waistlines might suggest otherwise; and, my kids didn't starve while under my care. A not-so-long-ago kitchen-related error, however, points to definite limitations. Oh, I'm okay with cube steaks or frozen fish, and zapping a Healthy Choice dinner is not a problem. I can open a can of peas and bake a potato, or even bake a frozen cinnamon roll. But when invading new territory, the waters can be rough.

Ever thrifty, I purchased an econ-o-pack of hamburger at Sun Mart, thinking I'd freeze most of it for future burgers on the grill. Then the robins showed up and my outdoor plans hit a snag. So during my next trip to the grocery store, I purchased a couple of boxes of Hamburger Helper, figuring at least three meals from each box. Then I looked at the directions on the box and realized I needed milk in the preparation.

When you live alone, perishable products like milk are hard to keep. I quit drinking dairy products years ago and get most of the nutrition in them from an occasional slice of cheese or a vitamin supplement. Determined, however, I returned to Sun Mart, thinking evaporated milk would best suit my needs. It could be used in cooking and not spoil in the fridge.

Unfortunately, my knowledge of evaporated milk is lacking, actually non-existent. Instead of what I'd intended, I picked up a couple of cans of condensed, sweetened milk. I'm guessing this product is more suited to baking stuff from scratch, which is not one of my talents. I did not realize the gravity of my shopping mistake until preparation was underway.

I'd thawed a pound or so of hamburger and placed it in a Dutch oven for browning, a task that was well on its way when it was time to retrieve the remaining ingredients, most of which are included in the box. Sans the milk.

It was then that I opened a cupboard and grabbed a can of the dairy product, taking a little closer look at the label. Condensed, it said. Does that mean it should be diluted? And if so, how much water? Not a clue could I find. Then I noticed the word "sweetened."


Not wanting to return to the store in mid-cook, I forged ahead, adding the ingredients as indicated on the box (I'm pretty darned good at following directions). All of this happened after draining excess grease from the steaming hamburger. I don't recall the sequence, but we're talking about seasoning mix, water, pasta and milk.


I'd put in a grueling day of journalism here at the Journal, typing away at a hectic pace, so the stomach was calling. The mixture, including condensed, sweetened milk, came to a boil for the recommended time, I shut down the burner and prepared to dig in, as usual, in front of the TV monitor.

Let me assure you that "sweet" and "Hamburger Helper" don't mix. It took just one anguished mouthful to realize the error of my ways. What I'd created was more like Hamburger Helper liquid cake. Or custard. Absolutely awful. Not wanting to return to the kitchen for another cooking adventure, I ate some of the stuff. That was my second mistake.

At about 2 a.m., I awoke for a trip to the restroom, where most of the concoction made an exit via the hole located lower face. That had not happened in at least 20 years, my best recollection. That remaining in the Dutch oven found the garbage disposal.

I have one can of condensed, sweetened milk in the cupboard, as well as another box of Helper. I may not be a fast learner, but am not totally stupid, either. I'll keep the box and buy some sort of milk, either evaporated or the real stuff. The can of sweetened dairy is available to anyone who knows what he or she is doing. I don't want to see it again.

LINCOLN – It was just a tad surprising when Republican Deb Fischer turned down the chance to debate Democratic rival Bob Kerrey at the Cornhusker Boys and Girls State gathering

in Lincoln.

Getting on stage with Kerrey this early in their race for the U.S. Senate would have

given Fischer a chance to size up her far more experienced rival. And even if the outcome hadn't been particularly good for her ... so what? It's a long way from June to November.

Kerrey, who served one term as governor and two in the Senate, has offered one particularly worthwhile suggestion for the coming contest.

He has challenged Fischer to three Lincoln-Douglas style debates – one in each congressional district. Kerrey wants a two-hour format in which the candidates would speak and ask each other questions.

The view from here: This debate format should be standard in every House, Senate and gubernatorial election. It takes the talking heads out of the equation and makes it more difficult for politicians to duck the issues by blabbering until their time runs out. And if it was good enough for Abe Lincoln ...

Kerrey has called for seven debates, the same number the Republicans held during their primary season.

At this stage, it seems Fischer's camp might content itself with letting endless advertising dollars do most of the talking, and Kerrey bashing.

This contest is going to be influenced by tens of millions of dollars in television and radio ads

Again our local cable service was out for a lengthy time. A cable service person at 1-800-248-8823 said the company would refund one day of service for non-service. This may not seem like a lot for just one or two customers. However, if when this happens if more would call and ask for the day's credit on their bill, it will add up to a huge amount.

I would hope the company has up-to-date equipment to support Nebraska winters and Nebraska hot summers and have a back-up generator if needed to avoid such lengthy and too often blackouts.

Service personnel from Lincoln have to first travel the two-hour drive to the Falls City area before anything is observed to be fixed. This seems to be poor service for a whole community such as Falls City. Elaine Griebel from both sides and obviously only a small fraction of that money will come from Nebraskans. It is virtually certain to be the most expensive-ever Nebraska political race. That's not surprising, since it is also one of the contests that will determine which party controls the U.S. Senate next year.

With Karl Rove and a bunch of super PACs pitching for Fischer, the tone of much of the advertising is a well established given. At this writing, they'd already spent some \$260,000 for one anti-Kerrey ad that criticized him for saying some good things about the bank bailout that was supported by Republican President George Bush.

And even before Kerrey announced he would run (after he

announced he wouldn't run) the GOP was on him like body odor because he had lived so many years in New York, serving as president of the New School university.

Kerrey wants debates that will let him get into topics like entitlement reforms, healthcare and foreign policy, contrasting his knowledge and experience with that of a state senator/rancher from the Sandhills.

If this were a prize fight, Kerrey would be cast in the role of the underdog slugger. He needs to score a lot of points. And Fischer's job would be obvious – don't fight his fight. Just keep jabbing and jabbing ... and stay away from him. He's scored a lot of knockouts.



purchases and improvements for county roads.

Action to advertise the bids was authorized during the board's Tuesday, May 22, meeting at the Courthouse with Highway Supt. Scott Huppert.

Bids will be accepted on a new rock truck (until 11 a.m.), a crane (11:15), the overlay of 6 miles of hard-surfaced road (11:30), including 2 miles on the "Dustless Highway" and 4 miles on the "Humboldt-Bern Road" and for armor coating (11:45) on 6.2 miles of hard-surfaced road south of Rulo, 6 miles of hard-surfaced road on the "Dustless Highway" and 1 mile within the Village of Preston.

Also while meeting with Huppert, the board authorized a change order on the project on 704 Road, 3 miles south of Salem. The project is completed. The change order calls for additional excavation and rock totaling \$2,178.72.

County Assessor Pam Vice and Appraiser Wayne Cole met with Commissioners Dave Sickel and Bill Ely (Jim Davidson was unable to attend the meeting) to request improvements to computer hardware for the Assessor's office. The current equipment is becoming outdated/obsolete and is in need of updating to comply with the needs and software requirements for the assessment requirements of the county. A quote for the replacement of the combination copier and printer with a copier-printer-scanner combination was also presented.

The board requested that formal purchase orders be presented for this expense to be budgeted for and incurred within next year's budget. Discussion was also held on the current software system and future reappraisal projects in the county.

After a public hearing, the board approved a request for additional funds in the amount of \$25,000 to the Sheriff's budget for fiscal year 2011-12. Sheriff Randy Houser was present and offered a letter explaining the budget shortfall and the request. Also present during the public hearing and inquiring about the need were Jimmy Coonce, Joseph M. Cromer and Mark Jones.

Russ Newton of Nebraska Machinery met with the board and presented information about a Caterpillar tracking system available for road department equipment.

The board approved claims, including six that had been held for further review. They had been submitted by Emergency Management Agency head Jim Gerweck.



New Commits

Nebraska entered May with five oral commitments for their 2013 recruiting class, and will exit the month with eight after adding a defensive end, tight end and offensive lineman.

Christian Lacouture, a 6-foot-5 and 255 pound defensive end out of College Station, Texas chose NU over Alabama, Auburn, LSU, Michigan, Texas and numerous other choices.

He told HuskerOnline.com what gave Nebraska the edge over his LSU and Michigan, his other two finalists.

'I just felt it was right for me with everything going on up here," Lacouture shared. "I feel that I wanted to come help win championships and that it was just the right place for me. The people here are awesome and I am really looking forward to it. I love the coaches and the tradition is amazing."

Both Rivals.com and 247Sports.com rate Lacouture as a three-star prospect and among the top 25 defensive ends nationally.

Next to pledge was tight end Greg Hart (6-5/225) of Dayton, Ohio. Another three-star prospect, Hart chose NU over offers from Boston College, Indiana, Purdue and Northwestern among others.

Expect the Huskers to use Hart in a hybrid tight end/H-back role, much like senior-to-be Kyler Reed. Hart will also provide a bigger red zone target at 6-foot-5 and with good leaping ability.

The third new commit is offensive lineman Dan Samuelson (6-5/275) of Plymouth, Minn. Samuelson had committed to Pittsburgh in late April, but when NU offensive line coach John Garrison called to inquire about the solidity of that pledge the family decided to take a trip to Lincoln to check it out. What they saw there changed Dan's mind, and he made the switch shortly afterwards.

Known primarily for his run blocking, Samuelson could play any of the three spots on the offensive line.

According to Rivals.com national analyst Josh Helmholdt, NU's getting a

"He's an above average athlete for the position. He really moves his feet well. He plays with great leverage. I think that something that really stands out in his film is that he's always up underneath the pads of the defensive lineman. He just does a lot of things well.'

Big Red Weekend

Nebraska's junior day in February and the Red-White spring game have been successful opportunities for the Big Red to show their wares to multiple prospects. Currently committed players Josh Banderas, Marcus McWilson, A.J. Natter and Courtney Love all visited during one of those events.

NU recruiting coordinator Rich Fisher has developed another event during the summer. The Big Red Weekend will be an invitation-only event June 16, and the list of prospects expected to attend is ever-growing.

Four-star linebacker Marcus Newby (6-1/207) of North Potomac, Md. headlines a group that also includes running back Terrell Newby (5-10/180) of West Hills, Calif., tight end Jon Wisnieski (6-5/215) of West Des Moines, Iowa, athlete Delton Williams (6-2/205) of Erie, Penn., linebacker Darian Claiborne (6-1/225) of Port Arthur, La., defensive tackle Kenneth Clark (6-2/275) of Rialto, Calif. athlete Nathan Gerry (6-2/206) of Sioux Falls, SD, athlete Jerel Morrow (5-11/180) of Emporia, Kan. and offensive lineman Zach Hannon (6-5/295) of Kansas City,

Marcus Newby, 247Sports' No. 9-ranked outside linebacker, has offers from Oklahoma and Penn State, but recently named a top five of Virginia Tech, Maryland, Nebraska, West Virginia and Rutgers. It will be difficult to pull him away from childhood favorite Virginia Tech, but if he indeed makes the trip to Nebraska it will greatly improve their chances.

Terrell Newby has drawn tenders from seven Pac Twelve schools, including Oregon. He lists NU, Oregon, Cal and USC as his top four with the Trojans yet to offer a scholarship.

Wisnieski, who plans to decide after a trio of summer visits to Nebraska, Oklahoma and Oregon, recently listed NU among his top three with Iowa and Iowa State. Wisnieski would give NU another athletic tight end to combine with

Williams also lists Michigan State, Penn State and West Virginia among his 20 offers. The Spartans might hold a bit of an advantage with the safety prospect, as his classmate and quarterback Damion Terry is committed to them.

Claiborne has been pursued heavily by Texas A&M, and he recently listed the Aggies, TCU and Mississippi State as his top group. NU defensive coaches Ross Els and Terry Joseph have done a great job on him, however, and it would not be a surprise if NU jumped up his list quickly after the visit.



Arkansas and Missouri are NU's main competition for Hannon's pledge. This will be Hannon's third trip to Lincoln, and his relationship with teammate and 2012 Husker signee Michael Rose certainly plays in the Huskers' favor. However, Missouri will also be tough to beat.



tent. "Open burning is trash (burning)," Sutter said.

Sutter moved to amend the resolution to apply only to open trash burning. That is what Falls City voters will decide in November.

During the meeting, Fourth Ward Councilman Brad Campbell's resignation was accepted. He and his family have moved from the ward. Mayor Tim Hersh said he appreciated Campbell's eight years of service and that he had stood up for what he believes in. Campbell expressed his thanks to the mayor(s) and council(s) during his time of service.

Council members voted to continue funding the Main Street Falls City program at \$30,000 per year for the next three years. Councilman Oliver abstained from voting as he is a member of the Main Street committee.

Tony Brunette, Main Street vice president, presented the funding proposal. In a letter to the mayor and council, Brunette expressed thanks for "the very generous support you have provided and continue to provide our organization." He explained that many "new and exciting things" are happening "due to the support you have given." Main Street, Brunette said, is "looking forward to completing the first phase of downtown revitalization this summer."

Brunette said AHRS Construction has entered into an agreement to complete the initial stage of Main Street work (1700 block). The contract is awaiting signature from the Main Street committee. Council members approved amending an ordinance so that some Main Street sidewalks can be narrowed. They will still be

Diana Orton, also representing Main Street, introduced an idea for a fund-raising event to be held July 7 on 18th Street between Harlan and Stone. She said the event is designed to "bring Main Street Falls City to the forefront of people's minds." Live music, a beer garden and food will be highlights. The council agreed to the proposal (inclement weather, Prichard Auditorium).

In other developments, the council (Steve Scholl was unable to attend):

—Met in executive session and then voted against an appeal of a health insurance grievance involving premiums for married couples who work for the city. This is in line with an arbitrator's finding.

—Approved an application for a block party on Weaver between 11th and 12th on June 30.

—Learned from EDGE Executive Director Beckie Cromer that Marvin Planning is recommended to help develop a new comprehensive plan for Falls City. The council approved the recommendation. EDGE will pay 70 percent of the costs and the city 30 percent.

—Received an update on the Ballpark Renovation project from Kevin Malone, who said the city's pledge of up to \$198,000 in funding and in-kind work may be more than will be needed. "We really appreciate the role the city is playing in all of this," Malone said.

Work is progressing at Grandview Park, with earth moving and the installation of a sprinkler system. Jorn said the city planned to do most of the electrical work, but timing will depend on the workload on employees. The committee hopes to find grants that will help provide for parking lot lighting.

—Heard from former mayor Rod Vandeberg, who raised concerns about the direction of the Falls City Area Chamber of Commerce, concerns shared by Councilman Mike Moore. Vandeberg wondered if the Chamber has "lost the support of the merchants." Moore, a former Chamber president, suggested the Chamber should "get out of the entertainment field" and concentrate more on the needs of retail merchants. Brunette said leadership is needed.

—Approved a grand opening event as presented by Randy

Raney of D&R Liquor, LLC. This will mark a year since the purchase of Bottle Shop. The outdoor event is scheduled for June 9.

—Learned from Jorn that some complications have arisen regarding an efficiency remodel of City Hall. Anticipated to cost in the \$10,000 range, the project appears to be in the \$50,000 range. Back to Joplin

When over one hundred and fifty thousand volunteers, including many wonderful people from our community made the journey to Joplin, Missouri, did they know what they were doing would make a world of difference? It did.

One year ago a massive F-5 tornado tore a path of destruction 13 miles long through Joplin, Missouri. The weekend leading up to the anniversary was a celebration of how far the city and its residents have come, and a remembrance of the 161 people who died.

As we pulled into town a week and a half ago the city was buzzing. There was bumper-to-bumper traffic on the heavily hit Range line road. We found that we were not the only volunteers who found their way back to this southern Missouri town. Thousands and thousands of the volunteers who gave their time were drawn back to Joplin to see the progress and celebrate with this wonderful community. From the moment we stepped foot in Joplin nearly a year ago, we were treated as part of the community. The residents were appreciative, kind and extremely generous. And here nearly a year later, they were just as kind, some how more appreciative and more generous. As we drove down Range line road we noticed that many of the buildings hardest hit had been cleared away and new business were thriving. The power lines that were still absent in October were now back up along the road, and the landscape wasn't as bare as it had been months earlier. We decided this time to bring our 8-year-old niece and 6-year-old son hoping to share the spirit and strength of the community with them.

The first stop we wanted to make was at Cunningham Park. We had participated in some of the reconstruction of this park back in October. But, we were not able to see the finished product during our last trip. As we pulled up the shell of the St. Johns Regional Medical Center greeted us. They are in the process of slowly tearing it down, and as the kids played on the amazing new playground equipment the sounds of construction equipment echoed all around us. Brian and I walked around reading all the tributes to the volunteers.


At the far west of the park closest to the hospital is a "Fountain of Rebirth" next to it, a plaque listing the names of the 161 people who passed away. Up the hill on the east side of the park sits a "mosaic of remnants"

The plaque on this reads;

"A Tribute To Volunteers"

At 5:41 P.M. on May 22nd 2011, An EF-5 Tornado ripped through Cunningham Park and the greater Joplin area leaving a path of death and destruction one mile wide by six miles long in its wake. Over 160 people perished in the storm. What immediately followed in staggering numbers and through personal accounts is the "Miracle of the human spirit" The Miracle of the human spirit symbolizes the incredible outpouring of volunteers who have lifted Joplin out of the rubble. Countless volunteers from all walks of life have offered themselves to the Joplin effort with out request, serving as a reminder of the overwhelming power of human generosity and the steadfast tenacity to rebuild the once broken city. The tribute embodies the volunteer's determination through four rippling garden walls, representing Joplin's ongoing rescue, recovery, demolition, and rebirth. Several elements within the tribute, bronzed artifacts, a mosaic of remnants, a volunteer statue, and the emblematic wristband-represent the volunteer's unprecedented response. Joplin and its residents are eternally grateful to those he-

This plaque overlooks a garden containing four concentric ringed sidewalks. These rings symbolize rescue, recovery, demolition and rebirth. A multi-figural statue representing the thousands of volunteers will later be placed in the center of the rings. The mosaic included pieces of homes, dishes, cars, glass, and other bits that volunteers collected. The idea was to create a mosaic of items recovered to be viewed and touched. The most eye-catching tribute is the large brass sculpture that overlooks the hospital. The emblematic wristband sits to the side of the garden. This sculpture depicts the wristbands that many of the volunteers wore after the Tornado. Engraved on one side is "The

miracle of the human spirit" and on the other "Joplin, Mo. 2011" It was truly a sight to see. You could feel the progress and life in Cunningham Park. We spent over two hours walking around and reading all of the tributes. We were so touched by the appreciation for every volunteer who has come through Joplin. Before we left the park, we had one more stop. The volunteer walls and benches.

These were simple sun blocks and benches made out of the two by fours Volunteers signed with messages of hope and love during the Extreme Home Makeover build in October. Our niece Emma Littrel was amazed by all of the messages and told us the best one would have to be "Don't Stop Believin."


As we drove through town we hit the railroad tracks and saw a tree that had been ravaged by the tornado. It sat almost 40 feet in the air and has become the new spirit of the community. It has been named "The Spirit Tree" A group of local artists had painted it hoping to make a lasting statement. It portrays the strength of Joplin. The colors on the tree represent different things, White is spirit, red is life, yellow is knowledge, black is clarity, blue is prayer, purple is healing and orange is kinship with other living creatures.

The next stop was the heavily hit Joplin High School. The last time we were in Joplin the school had been reduced to a large pile of rubble with a few walls still standing among it. The area was fenced off where no body could

get near it, and three hand carved wood eagles sat 90% finished in front of the sign reading Hope High School. After the tornado hit the school, all that was left of the Joplin High School sign was the OP, with careful precision and some Duct tape someone added the H and E creating a symbol for the entire community.

This time, the rubble still sat but the walls were now torn down and some of the debris had been cleared. The fence was now gone, and the Eagles (The School Mascot) were sitting proudly behind the same Hope High School sign. Tiny little gasps arose from our back seat.

My son and niece were now in the middle of "ground zero." This area had not been rebuilt as much, and the trees were still mangled and wrapped with debris. They could not believe what everything looked like. I tried to explain that Brian and I were very impressed with the improvement, but this was their first trip to Joplin and all they saw was the damage that still sits.

The last stop on our Friday afternoon was the house we volunteered at that first trip down. I'm always worried when we go back that the smell of rot and earth will still be lurking heavily in the air. My stomach started to turn a bit, but as we pulled up to the driveway we have become all too familiar with, there was nothing. There was no heavy dirt smell, No more homes, they had been completely tore down. No more trees, they had died and been taken out. No more life. Nobody had started to rebuild. And as we stood in the empty lot we could see blocks up to the newly built Wal-Mart and Home Depot. Nobody had really tried to build anything yet and you could see for blocks in each direction. In the middle of this city of rebirth and rebuilding were still entire neighborhoods with no movement, and no life. Just another reminder of how far Joplin has yet to come.

The next day we attended the First Annual Joplin Memorial Run.

We were four of over 3,000 people who had entered the race.

That morning as the sun rose, men and women we had never met greeted us and thanked us for being there, one man yelled, "I am happy you are here!" A woman who had lost her son in the tornado spoke before the race as volunteers released 161 balloons into the morning sky. We then observed a 161-second moment of silence. Many people wore shirts with photos of loved ones lost in the tornado. A young woman named Jody Kirk held a sign reading "Running for The Heavens, I'm memory of my Daddy Stan Kirk. It needed no explanation, and when she finished the race; she was still proudly holding her message over her head. Another group of almost 100 called Edie's Angels, ran to show support for Edie Howard who lost two of her children, Harli, 5, and Hayze, 19 months, and her husband Russell on May 22. We ran in support of the city, a week before we had bright red shirts made by Leland Harmon that said "Huskers for Joplin" and as we sat waiting for the race to begin people walked by smiling while taking photos of our shirts. The race went great, and we had a wonderful time just listening to the stories of strength, loss and

As we packed our bags and made our way out of town we promised the kids we would try to do this again every year so we can witness this town recover and show the world, they are stronger than an F-5 Tornado.

Today, Nearly 80% of the businesses have been rebuilt and are fully operating, but the FEMA trailer area north of town still clearly shows the families will need more time before they can get back into their neighborhoods and find their new normal.

Tornado shelters are all over town now, and Joplin will come back stronger than ever. The last night we were there as we drove to our hotel, we watched some fireworks off in the distance near the hospital. This town still clearly had the scars of devastation very vis-

ible still a year later, yet at night...if you look beyond the parts of town that are still pitch black, there was beauty all around. You just need to keep an eye out for it. I know we will always find our way back to this southern Missouri town that has captured our hearts and taught what William James said was so very true, "Act as if what you do makes a difference. It does."

And we have found out in the last year, it really really does.

helping on that day; graduation practice was held on May 12 and the graduation ceremony on May 13 at Prichard Auditorium; semester tests will be held May 15, 16 with the last day for the remaining students on May 17; Students of the Month of April are Josh Stoller, Ashley Crawford, Montana Jones, and Taylor O'Brien; congratulations to the Instrumental Music and Vocal Music students for the fine performances during the school year and at districts; State qualifiers from the District Track Meet in Plattsmouth are Cord Huettner and Zach Jordening; the golf team District game was held in Beatrice this week with no State qualifiers; May and June activity calendar was made available to the Board.

Principal Dunkhas reported that the changes in the High School Handbook consists of random locker searches; discontinued use of the pay phones and cell phones can be used while in the office or the office phone can be used for legitimate reasons; no Middle School students or dates over 21 are allowed to attend High School dances; change from five days to three days that the students have to make class changes, solicitations be made outside of school and off school property, and changing the lunch period from 3 to 2 periods and then there will be no split classes.

2.3 Board President's Report: Board President Huppert stated that it was a good graduation ceremony held on Sunday. It was reported that the air conditioning at the auditorium was not working and Superintendent Heckenlively received an apology from Gary Jorn for that inconvenience.

2.4 Superintendent's Report:

2.4a Legislative and Organizations Report: Superintendent Heckenlively reported that the 102nd Nebraska Legislative session is now complete and in the books. Any board member wishing to view the Final Legislative Report compiled by Mike Dulaney, NCSA, is welcome to request a copy.

The NASB School Law Seminar is June 8 in Kearney, featuring a full-day presentation of the Nebraska Council of School Attorneys covering changes in the laws and regulations governing schools. There will be updates on the final provisions of the 2012 legislative session and other current topics from the legal front. The seminar will begin at 8 a.m. with registration and adjourn at 4 p.m. on the 8th.

The NE Dept. of Education certified the 2012-2013 state aid to school districts on April 11. The bottom line impact on FCPS is a \$64,973 reduction in state funding as compared to the 2011-2012 certification. Total state aid is as follows. 2011-2012 Certified State Aid to FCPS: \$1,757,677.82; 2012-2013 Certified State Aid to FCPS: \$1,692,704.72. Increasing property valuations is a lead cause to the loss of state equalization aid, what's become a trend for FCPS and other rural school districts in this part of the state. The state legislature will eventually need to address the school funding formula as more small school districts lose state aid. NE Dept. of Ed counts 104 Nebraska public school districts will not receive any state equalization aid for the 2012-2013 school year, representing 42% of schools across the state. There are 249 Nebraska school districts for 2011-12.

The State Board of Ed has taken up discussion on a proposed change to Rule 10 (accreditation) that would require schools to provide an opportunity to recite the Pledge of Allegiance each school day. The original proposal was offered by Board member Mark Quandahl and applied to kindergarten through grade eight. However, Mr. Quandahl has now offered a revised version of his proposal to expand the mandate to K-12. The State Board voted unanimously (8-0) to direct the Commissioner to establish a hearing date on the rule change and that hearing date is June 6 at 10:00 a.m. In the interest of providing information at the hearing, NRCSA has surveyed its member schools on the current practice of reciting the Pledge at each grade level and any foreseeable issues or concerns that may arise from this rule change.

2.4b Building and Grounds Update: Superintendent Heckenlively reported that the new strength & conditioning facility is nearly complete, with the HVAC, flooring, and equipment yet to be installed. Our hope is to have the facility in operation for students by the end of May. An open house will be scheduled at a later date to showcase the facility to the community.

The Middle School gym wood overlay is scheduled to begin immediately after school has been dismissed for the summer on May 17. The Board was provided with a list of additional summer maintenance projects planned for completion.

2.4c School Improvement Process: Superintendent Heckenlively reported that the School Improvement Steering Committee met on May 2. Agenda items addressed at the meeting included (1) a discussion of the larger Continuous Improvement Committee membership structure and recommendation for members, (2) Data Committee chair persons and committee from each school building, and planning for the June 18 Data Retreat.

2.4d Staffing Planning: Supt. Heckenlively reported that certificated candidates for an elementary classroom teacher have been reviewed and interviews are currently being scheduled and conducted. Two special education paraeducators will be hired to replace the existing vacancies at North School and SPED transportation. Coaching vacancies are still being considered, as well as the school psychologist position and Spanish/Social Studies Com-


# David Martin one of first honorees to NELAC Hall

Falls City native and former Omaha Central High School English teacher David Martin earlier this month was one of 10 first honorees of the Nebraska English Language Arts Council's and National Council Teachers of English Nebraska English Language Arts Educator's Hall of Fame.

Martin and the others were honored at a ceremony May 4 in the Warner Chambers of the State Capitol Building in Lincoln. He was presented with a framed certificate announcing the honor. An engraved plaque will also hang in the Nebraska Department of Education-Language Arts Department.

The purpose of this Hall of Fame recognition is to honor, thank and recognize Nebraska's Legendary Outstanding English Language Arts Teachers during the centennial year of the National Council of Teachers of English (NETE) in the 2011-2012 school year and in future years. It will be the basis of a future continuing recognition of Nebraska's former English/Language Arts teachers by NELAC and NCTE.



A painter's painter and realist to the core, he is sometimes refined, sometimes loose, and sometimes seemingly out of control with his media, yet he paints the world that directly surrounds him and is connected to him in all its facets. Thriving on observation and of painting what he observes – of family and of community, the artist offers us, through his work, narratives of isolation, fear, joy, and beauty."
