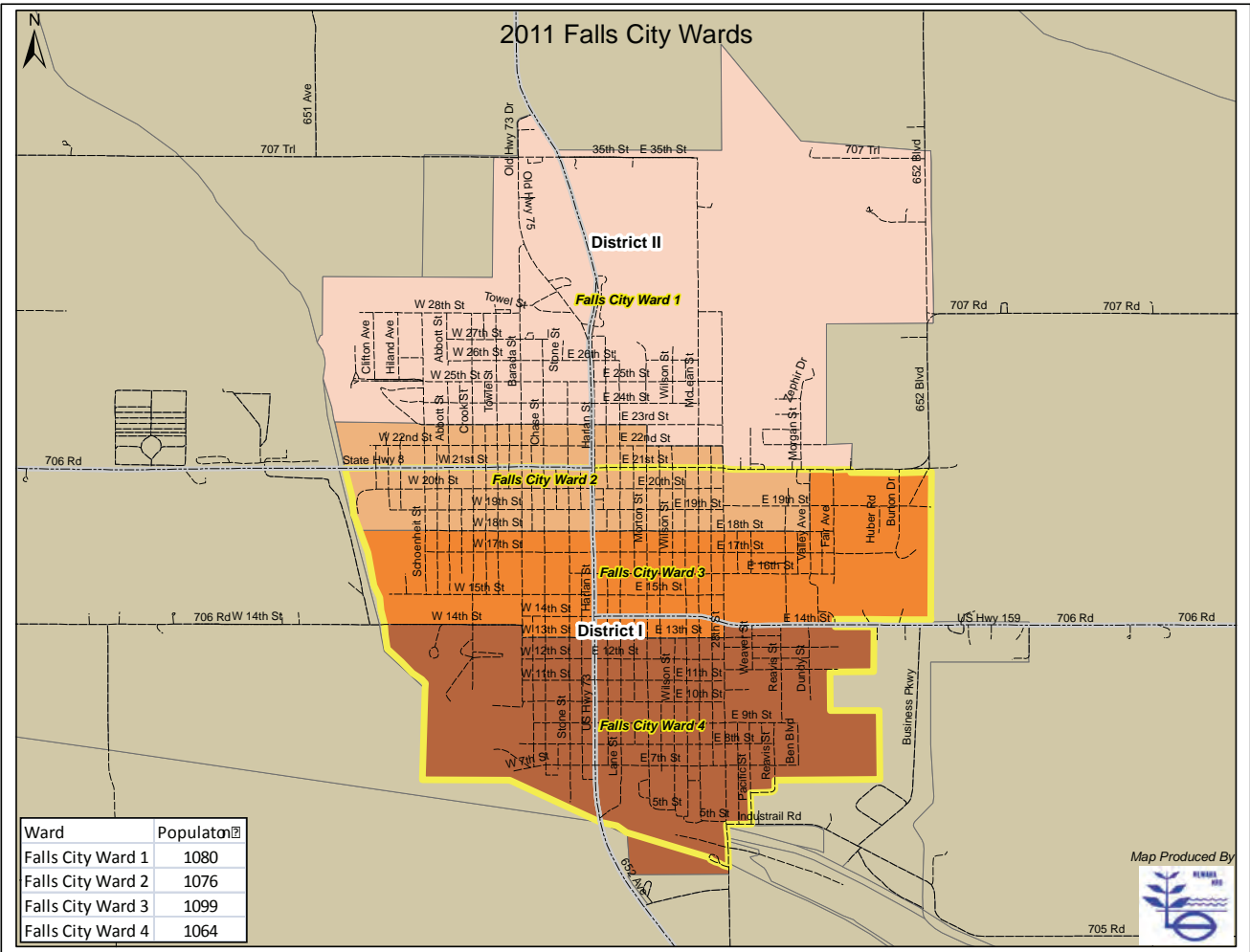
Boundary lines change for Wards 1, 2 and 3

Primary election next Tuesday

Registered voters in Richardson County, Nebraska will be eligible to vote in the Statewide Primary Election to be held on Tuesday, May 15, 2012 at the designated polling places within the County.

Those polling places are: **Arago/Barada**, United Methodist Church, Barada; **FC Rural/Ohio**, Prichard Auditorium, 312 W 17th Street, Falls City; **FC Ward 1**, St. Paul's Lutheran Church, 20th & Towle, Falls City; **FC Ward 2**, Prichard Auditorium, 312 W 17th Street, Falls City; **FC Ward 3**, Prichard Auditorium, 312 W 17th Street, Falls City; **FC Ward 4**, Assembly of God Church, 6th & Reavis, Falls City; **Franklin/Humboldt Rural/Speiser**, Humboldt Ag Building, 1034 4th Street, Humboldt; **Grant/Nemaha**, St. Mary's Hall, Dawson; **Humboldt Ward I**, Humboldt Ag Building, 1034 4th Street, Humboldt; **Humboldt Ward II**, Legion Club, 307 W Square, Humboldt; **Jefferson/Rulo**, Rulo Library, Rulo; **Liberty**, Verdon Community Building, Verdon; **East Muddy**, Shubert Community Building, Shubert; **West Muddy/Porter**, Stella Community Building, Stella and for **Salem**, Salem Community Hall, Salem.

Two polling places have changed since the last election in 2010. Barada will now vote at the United Methodist Church in Barada instead of the Community Building and Falls City Ward 2 will now vote at the Prichard Auditorium instead of the City Building.



Voters in Falls City Wards 1, 2 and 3 should be made aware of a change in the boundary lines from the previous election in 2010. Due to the 2010 census the drawing below depicts the boundary lines of the voting wards located in the boundaries of the City of Falls City as adopted by the City Council of Falls City late in 2011. Voters who would like to determine their voting precinct may call the County Clerk's Office at 402-245-2911 to verify their voting ward or you may access your record at the Nebraska Secretary of State website www.votercheck.necvr.ne.gov

It was also noted with the information provided with the sample ballot in the last week's edition of the Falls City Journal and Humboldt Standard that Humboldt Ward II would vote at the Humboldt Ag Building. Humboldt Ward II will vote at the Legion Club in Humboldt at 307 W Square.

Those voters who will not be able to vote at their regular polling place on election day can cast their votes early at the Office of the Richardson County Clerk located in Room 203

Flood claims 729 trees at Big Lake

The Mound City News last week reported that in Big Lake State Park alone 729 trees died in last year's four-month-long flood.

Of those dead, 396 are walnut trees and 236 are cedars. The walnut trees were planted in 1965.

That does not account for the many trees that are dead on the other 60 acres of timber and shoreline area that is part of the park grounds, the newspaper reported.

Jerry Joy, who is a candidate for the District 1 seat in the Nebraska Legislature, has earned the Journal’s endorsement in the Tuesday, May 15, Primary Election.

Joy, chairman of the Stella Village Board, was in Falls City Friday on a campaign stop. He visited the Journal office and spoke about his perceptions and concerns for the District. In the Journal’s opinion, Joy was spot on, especially in his overall impressions of what it takes to be an effective legislator and best serve his District.

“I will be a full-time Senator, working all of the time” for the citizens of District 1, he said. He also pledged to take “a non-partisan approach” as a member of the Unicameral.

The Journal believes this is a key ingredient to effective government. In a time when Washington is paralyzed by partisan politics, Nebraska cannot afford to do the same. Clearly our lawmakers are most efficient and successful when they are willing to work across the aisle. This is the case even in Nebraska, where the Legislature is supposed to be non-partisan.

Joy referred to a Bob Kerrey TV ad that is running statewide. In the ad, Kerrey, a former governor of Nebraska who is seeking a return to the U.S. Senate, notes that Republicans have plenty of good ideas, as do Democrats. He argues that the people are best served when one side is willing to acknowledge and act upon the solid ideas that originate on the other side.

“Why can’t we work together, resolve our differences and get things done?” Joy asked. He said he is willing and anxious to do just that.

In his travels through District 1, Joy said many potential constituents mention property taxes and education. They want improved economic development, he said, and established the vital link between development and quality education. Joy had high praise for the work Executive Director Beckie Cromer and EDGE, as well as Main Street Falls City, have done for Falls City and Richardson County. He said he would work hard to protect the largest employers in this region, including Peru State College and Cooper Nuclear Station.

“I’m really concerned about population,” Joy said, pointing to the declining numbers in Southeast Nebraska — numbers that have forced a geographical expansion of the District. Increased population (not only in SE Nebraska but all of the state) can relieve the property tax burden on everyone, he said. When the population is growing, more people are shopping locally, which leads to greater employment. Joy said he favors generating “some different kinds of agriculture operations” that would help attract people to this area.

Jerry Joy, a long-time Peru State administrator, teacher and football coach, graduated from Shubert High School and PSC. The Journal believes he should emerge from the Primary as one of the top two candidates who will vie for the District 1 seat in the November General Election.

LINCOLN — There is an ages’ old axiom about how countless arguments could be avoided by giving a wide berth to discussions of religion and politics.

Dating back to the 1960s, at least, that axiom should have been expanded to include another subject: Statistics on crime/punishment and race. Any such discussion is going to quickly evolve – or descend – into questions of racism.

A new study by the University of Nebraska-Omaha affirmed what you would suspect: Kids who are black, Hispanic or Native American get arrested more than their white contemporaries and wind up in court and in jail more often, too.

Every study of this type – including this one – brings forth assertions from the appropriate parties that the criminal justice system needs to be diligent in its efforts to see that race, per se, doesn’t put anyone at a virtually automatic disadvantage when accused of a crime.

The current head of the Urban League of Nebraska, Thomas Warren, is a former Omaha police chief. He was quoted: “It’s obvious there’s gross dis-

parities and over-representation of minorities in the juvenile justice system, as demonstrated by this report.”

Warren’s comment is the sort that can spark heated, sincere and endless argument.

Do cops and prosecutors swing a bigger stick, and swing it harder, when minority kids get jammed up? Or, do the statistics simply reflect that, for whatever reasons, minorities commit more crimes, and more serious crimes per capita than white youths, and that many of them are repeat offenders?

Broken homes, poverty and gang affiliations are partners in crime. Who are those factors most likely to involve, most of-

ten?

The view from here: When a youngster seriously runs afoul of our law enforcement and judicial institutions, it is likely that the most basic and important of institutions – the family – has not played the role it should.

This conclusion is based in part on 38 years of covering the Legislature, and listening to the testimony and debate of lawmakers, educators, law enforcement officials, judicial and juvenile authorities – among many others.

A young offender’s problems don’t begin at the courthouse. More likely, they have their roots in a house that was not a proper home.

Pam Vice new County Assessor

Pam Vice was sworn in as the Richardson County Assessor during the afternoon session of the weekly commissioners meeting on Tuesday, May 1.

Mrs. Vice, who has worked in the Assessor's office for 13 years, replaces Regina Cummings, who resigned her position because of health issues. Mrs. Vice has been a certified assessor since May 5, 2011.

Commissioners Dave Sickel, Bill Ely and Jim Davidson were unanimous in appointing Mrs. Vice after an interview earlier in the day. Mrs. Vice was the only person to submit a resume.

She will serve the remainder of the term, which expires on Jan. 5, 2015.

In other May 1 developments, the commissioners:

—Heard an update on the Preston Road project from Highway Supt. Scott Huppert. A meeting with Commercial Construction indicated the project was to begin May 1 and take about three weeks to complete.

—Met with the Roads Department Union to finalize and execute the new contract.

—Held a public hearing regarding the inclusion of the incorporated area of the Village of Verdon in the Verdon Rural Fire Protection District. Andy Dunn, Jed Fritz and Dave Ebel spoke

in favor of annexation. Mike Dunn represented the rural fire district. After the public hearing was closed, the board voted to adopt a resolution to approve the annexation, stating that the change would be beneficial to the public interest. A meeting will be held May 17 for the election of a Board of Directors of the newly reformed district (Thursday, May 17, 7 p.m., Verdon Fire Hall).

—Moved to hold a public hearing at 11 a.m. Tuesday, May 22, to receive comments about the addition of \$25,000 to the

Postal carriers annual food drive to be held May 12

Letter carriers will hold their annual food drive on Saturday, May 12.

Falls City and surrounding area residents are encouraged to participate by placing non-perishable food items in bags, and leaving them by their mailbox before mail delivery on May 12. All the food collected will go to local community food banks and pantries.

This is the 20th year for the Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive, which has collected more than one billion pounds of food since its inception. Last year generous Americans donated more than 70 million pounds of food.

Examples of non-perishable items include: canned soup, canned meats, canned vegetables, fruits and juices, boxed goods (such as cereals), pasta and rice. Do not donate items that have expired or are in glass containers.

The Falls City Post Office also will have a food drive bin set up in its lobby on Saturday, May 12, and every day of this week so customers can drop off their canned and non-perishable food items.

According to the most recent USDA Food Security Report, nearly 49 million Americans live in food-insecure households—including more than 16 million children.

“This is a great opportunity to help those in our community who are struggling to put food on the table,” said postmaster Joyce Scholl.

County receives
scrap tire funding

Richardson County has been awarded funding for scrap tire collection by the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality.

The county will receive \$15,752 and is one of 131 tire recycling and clean-up projects to be funded. The total funding in Nebraska is \$1.86 million.

“Nebraskans pay a \$1 fee for every new tire they purchase,” said Mike Linder, Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality director. “These grants put that money into use locally to help manage scrap tires. We like to see the highest possible beneficial use of these old tires, and these projects help us reach that goal.”

Nebraskans generate more than one and a half million scrap tires each year, about one tire for every person in the state. The grants will reimburse individuals and organizations for crumb rubber and equipment purchases, and will help prevent public health and environmental problems by eliminating tire piles, Linder said.

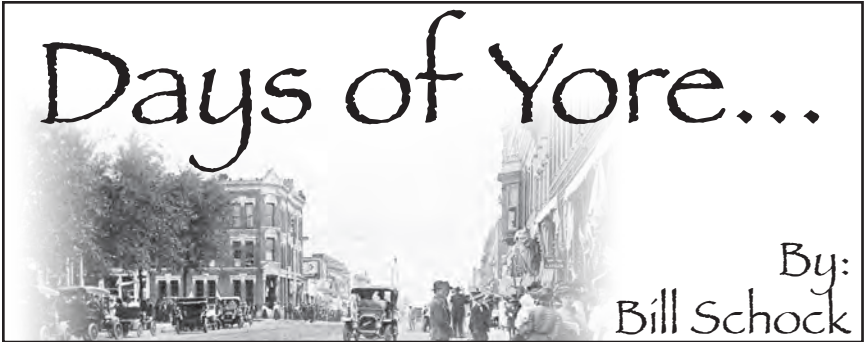

FCSH celebrates past with eye toward future

Falls City Sacred Heart with one eye celebrated another year of extracurricular success and with another focused on a promising future Saturday night at its annual activities banquet held at Parish Hall.

No Irish athletic team turned in a losing record and the football and both basketball teams qualified for state tournaments - largely with rosters full of underclassmen. “It looks exciting for next year,” Athletic Director and Coach Doug Goltz said.

The Irish football team posted an 8-2 record and qualified for the state playoffs for an ongoing state-record 25th consecutive year, despite losing its biggest weapon, junior Lane Barnhill, to injury in just the second game of the season. Barnhill was so dominate in a 31-26 win over two-time state champion Mound City, he earned post-season honors with just one full game played.

Sacred Heart bolted to a 7-0 record and saw senior back Garrett Harring rush for more than 1,000 yards. The team finished with a playoff loss at Clarkson, but will enter 2012 as perhaps the team to beat in Class D2. FCSH last won a state title in football back in 1994 and has yet to even play in a final at Memorial Stadium. Many around the state expect that to change next fall, as a host of all-state and all-conference-caliber playmakers return, including seniors-to-be Barnhill, quarterback Lane Scheitel, linemen Brody Chandler and Brady

Cromer and receiver Clay Finck, as well as juniors-to-be Chaz Dunn, Jarod Fiegenger, Colin Niemeyer, Yianni Haralabidis and Brandon Schawang.

The same is true for the boys’ basketball team, which will return all-state sophomore Matt Goltz and regulars Cromer, Finck, Barnhill, Dunn, Scheitel and Fiegenger from a 16-9 team that won seven of its final nine games, won its district and qualified for the state tournament. “If you watched us in December, you probably didn’t think we’d have a winning record,” Goltz said. “It took a while to gel, but this team did gel.”

The Lady Irish, too, return a lot, but they face a future without graduating senior Sara Landis, who carried the bulk of the weight for the 16-13 volleyball team and the 19-6 district champion basketball squad. Landis grabbed 311 rebounds last winter, which is the fifth-best single-season total in Nebraska history. The 6-3 middle hitter and center will play Division I volleyball for Lamar University in Texas.

The FCSH volleyball team was under the direction of longtime FC High Coach Susan Witt for the first year and also will need to replace Molly Chapple and Kelly Schawang. The JV team, though, went 17-5 and letterwinners Rachel Aitken, Janey Malcolm, Kathryn Bieker, Ashli Jordan, Rachel Parrish, Emma Schock, Kelsi Fouraker, Emily Rohrer and the Magdanz Twins – Elizabeth and Abby – return to provide a strong nucleus in 2012.

The girls’ basketball team had just 10 on the roster – two seniors (Landis and Schawang) and eight sophomores and freshmen – and had a memorable season that culminated with a district title, state tournament berth and No. 6 and 7 final ranking. Jordan and the Magdanz Twins will return to the starting lineup for Coach Luke Santo.

Santo thanked his players, assistants and the parents, as well as school secretaries Cathy

O’Grady and Deb Lemerond, “for sorting the mail.”

In other news from the 2012 banquet:

— Lane Scheitel and Jarod Fiegenger were named by Goltz as the Lifters of the Year.

— Knights of Columbus President Bill Rowan presented a \$3,500 check derived from the annual fish fry proceeds to Superintendent Msgr. Robert Roh, who said the money would go toward the new activity center fund.

— Junior Will Burenheide was named the 2012 Cecil Murphy Scholar-Athletic and earns a \$700 tuition scholarship for his senior year.

— Shannon Stemple presented the following music awards: Outstanding Choir member, Gabby Speers and Josh Mayo; Outstanding Band, Ben Mullins and Kathryn Bieker; and Outstanding Musician, Austin Martin.

— Speech Coach and publications sponsor Diana Eickhoff remarked on another successful speech season that saw FCSH win a district title and place fifth at state. Senior Tami Rethman placed first in Class D Serious Prose and was one of nine presenters to earn “Best of the Best” by NET, which televised her speech. 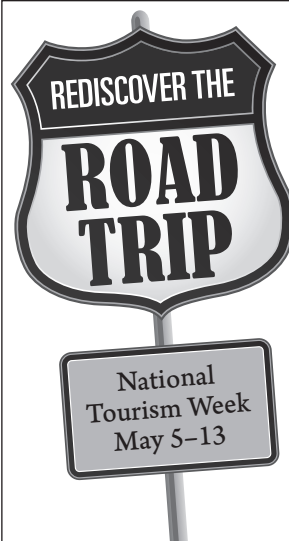

Probation for possession of child pornography

Noah Hall, 21, of Falls City was sentenced last Tuesday in Richardson County District Court to five years Intensive Supervised Probation and 180 days in jail on five Class III felony counts of Possession of Visual Depiction of Sexually Explicit Conduct.

According to court documents, Hall must register as a sex offender with the Nebraska State Patrol and Richardson County Sheriff's Department; will not be allowed to possess firearms, ammunition or dangerous weapons; is banned from using the internet or cell phones with picture-taking capabilities or texting without advanced permission from his probation officer; obtain a sex offender specific evaluation; attend and successfully complete a sex offender specific program; pay court costs of \$147, plus \$180 for chemical testing and \$2,100 in probation fees.

Hall was arrested on July 1 of last year following an investiga-

tion by the Attorney General's Office Rural Cybercrimes Unit and reached a plea agreement in January of this year.

Kerry Crosby, a law enforcement officer serving as Special Deputy State Sheriff, and Investigator Ed Sexton, conducted the initial investigation between

March 14 and April 25, 2011, that led them to Hall.

During the investigation it was discovered that a computer using a particular IP address had been sharing 34 unique files, 11 of which were suspected to be in violation of the law.

Hall's computer was seized and examined by Investigator Sexton, who is trained in the forensic analysis of computers used in criminal activity. The computer was found to have been using the same IP address as well as a unique GUID number that is produced when some Peer-to-Peer (P2P) software applications are installed, or updated on a computer.

A 28-year-old Falls City man is free on bond after being arrested last week by Falls City Police officers.

Lucas J. Vice is facing numerous charges, including two felonies following an incident early the morning of April 29. According to police reports, Officer Patrick Stamper was dropping off Sgt. James Baker when they heard what they believed to

be a crash and then saw a vehicle speed through an intersection. Officer Stamper then proceeded to follow.

Eventually the officers found Vice involved in a disagreement with two other men. It's alleged that Vice was driving a car that rear-ended another vehicle driven by Dennis Lockard II, at 14th and Reavis Streets. Lockard pursued Vice who allegedly hit a mailbox in the 1900 block of Nemaha Street.

Vice was taken into custody and transported to Community Medical Center in Falls City for alcohol testing. While there, Vice allegedly escaped from the officers and was able to get outside before the officers caught him.

Vice is facing a felony count of driving under the influence. The charge is a felony because Vice has previously been convicted of three counts of DUI. He also faces a felony count of escape and misdemeanor charges of hit and run, willful wreckless driving and driving while under suspension.

Notice is hereby given this 30th day of April, 2012, pursuant to the Noxious Weed Control Act, section 2-955, subsection 1(a), to every person who owns or controls land in Richardson County, Nebraska, that noxious weeds being grown, or growing on, such land shall be controlled at such frequency as to prevent establishment, provide eradication, or reduce further propagation or dissemination of such weeds.
Upon Failure To Observe This Notice, the County Weed Superintendent Is Required To:
1. Proceed pursuant to the law and issue legal notice to the landowner of property infested with noxious weeds and giving such landowner 15 days to control the noxious weed infestation. Conviction for noncompliance may result in a \$100 per day fine to the landowner, with a maximum fine of \$1,500; or
2. Should more immediate control be required, proceed pursuant to the law and have the weeds controlled by such method as he/she finds necessary, the expense of which shall constitute a lien and be entered as a tax against the land, and be collected as other real estate taxes are collected, or by other means, as provided by law.
Also, the public is notified that noxious weed seed and propagative parts may be disseminated through the movement of machinery and equipment, trucks, grain and seed, hay, straw, nursery stock, fencing materials, sod, manure, and soil as well as articles of similar nature. Methods of treatment have been prescribed by the Director of Agriculture and may be obtained from the county weed control authority.

Climatologist: ‘Take comfort in science-based action’

LINCOLN — When you hear there’s a tornado watch, do you console yourself or your family with the idea that it can’t happen here? That we’re in a bowl that’s sheltered from tornadoes, or that we’re protected by an ancient Indian blessing?

Those myths may make us feel better, but actually learning how to tune in to official warnings and learning what to do and what not to do in severe weather are better ways to protect ourselves and our families, says Ken Dewey, climatologist and severe weather expert at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln’s School of Natural Resources.

In a nutshell, Dewey recommends that you pay attention to forecasts, that you own and use a weather radio and that you know where you will take shelter when a tornado watch turns to a tornado warning. He added know what a warning siren means in your community and take it seriously.

Southeast Nebraska had six tornadoes on April 14 and there

were 130-plus tornadoes that day in the area where they had been forecast, mostly in Kansas. Dewey noted that an afternoon downpour that caused flash-flooding in southeast Nebraska stabilized

the atmosphere with cooler air and prevented more tornadoes from forming.

Dewey urged people not to become complacent because it didn’t get as bad as it could have on April 14, and to prepare for the rest of the storm season, which normally peaks in June.

He recommends people have a battery- or crank-powered weather radio that receives broadcasts from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration’s National Weather Service.

“Own and use a weather radio,” Dewey said. “Don’t depend on friends, TV or radio. You need a NOAA weather radio.”

But do stay tuned to TV and radio when possible, and do pay attention when someone tells you to take shelter. Check the weather more frequently when severe storms or tornadoes are forecast.

Know where you will and won’t go if the weather looks bad, if there is a tornado watch, or when a tornado has been sighted and a warning has been issued.

“If the weather is threatening and you’re under a tornado watch, have a plan,” Dewey said. “Are you in an area with a tornado siren? Do you have an escape route? Don’t head into a congested area. Many deaths occur when people are backed up in traffic jams.”

ings you enter if there is a tornado watch.

“Big box stores with big roofs are at risk of collapse,” Dewey said. “Think about all that stuff piled up on shelves, flying through at speeds in excess of 100 miles per hour. Some grocery stores are OK because they put people in a reinforced room like a cooler.”

Make contingency plans at home. “If you’re on an upper floor of an apartment, go down and meet the people on the first floor,” Dewey said. “If you’re in a mobile home, go someplace else that’s safe.”

Dewey recommends having your valuables in a box that you can take with you if you need to take shelter, or can carry out of the house if it’s on fire, and he doesn’t mean jewelry. “You’re going to need to reestablish your life,” he said. “What do you need? ID, your insurance card, passports, birth certificates, medications.”

And finally, Dewey said, wear shoes, or make sure there’s

a pair where you’ll be taking shelter, so that you’re not climbing barefoot out of rubble.
