A good-sized crowd turned out on a sunny, warm and calm Monday morning at Steele Cemetery to pay tribute to the men and women who have made the supreme sacrifice for the United States.

As he has for more than a quarter century, Larry Whalen, Korean War veteran and commander of the Falls City Ceremonial Color Guard, arranged and presided over the service in Falls City, as he had earlier Monday morning at the Jim Prater Memorial Service at Rulo.

Mid Bauer sang two heart-felt numbers and color guards participating included the VFW Auxiliary Color Guard, Falls City Ceremonial Honor Guard and the Kansas-Nebraska Iowa Tribal Color Guard of White Cloud. At the replica bier at the Steele Cemetery service were Boy Scouts of Troop 396. The Scouts previously had placed American flags at the marked graves of all veter-

Dorr & Clark Funeral Home Director Brian Daake, a member of the American Legion who has worked closely with the various color guards the past 25 years or so, spoke at Steele Cemetery. He noted that after two other scheduled addresses in previous years were rained out, Monday's perfect weather proved that the third time is indeed the charm.

His presentation was titled, "Was it worth it?"

"This is a question, sometimes politically-loaded, that is often asked of family members and war buddies of our fallen heroes," Daake said.

FCHS one of 18 Save The Music grant recipients

The VH1 Save The Music Foundation, in partnership with Grammy nominated singer Charlie Puth and Casio America, announced that Falls City High School is one of 18 winning schools in the 2016 Keys + Kids grant program, created in 2014 in response to the lack of functional pianos in public schools.

Consequently, FCHS and the

other 17 winning schools will receive \$10,000 worth of instruments, including a Casio Grand Hybrid piano



and three keyboards, to support their music and drama programs. The pianos will be delivered by VH1 Save The Music celebrity ambassador Charlie Puth this fall.

"We received a record number of applications for our Keys + Kids program this year, serving as a great reminder of how important instruments are in music education programs," said Henry Donahue, Executive Director of VH1 Save The Music. "The selection process is never easy, but we are thrilled to announce the 18 winners, the most we've been able to grant thanks to our incredibly generous partners."

Falls City High was the only school in the entire region to win. The others are in Arizona, Connecticut, Georgia, Illinois, Louisiana, New York, Minnesota, Tennessee, Rhode Island, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts and Texas. Three Chicago schools were selected. The application submission period was open for a month this spring for all K-12 public schools in the country. Submissions were evaluated by a committee of





Friday, April 29-Day two of my five day Film Festival trip.

Batman: The Movie, what can you say about this film? If you haven't seen it, I have a copy and would be thrilled to loan it to you or you can buy a copy at a very reasonable price online. I've been a fan of Batman with Adam West for as long as I can remember. My love of the cheesy campiness of it all has led to my love of the *Naked Gun* films and *Airplane*. I know my sister and I had hours of laughs from the sheer corniness of it all. And when I say corny, I mean it's so incredibly, fantastically and wonderfully corny that you wonder how it got made in the first place. The film was shown pool side at the Hollywood Roosevelt Hotel. The atmosphere was so amazing. I truly don't know if I have ever been in an environment anywhere else in my life for a film that made me as happy as this one did. The weather was a bit chilly but nobody cared or bothered to complain about it.

We all waited with baited breath for Adam West to appear in front of us. Ben Mankiewicz first brought out the incredibly lovely Lee Meriwether who played Catwoman in the film. She was sweet and remembered her time while shooting as a great experience. While she was fun to see, time stood still as Adam West made his way on to the stage. Ben Mankiewicz, Meriwether and West all laughed about how campy the film was. Adam West said he insisted in keeping the sounds of the rubber shark in the movie because it was so ridiculous that it worked. If you've seen the film you may remember how a very obvious rubber shark latches onto Batman's leg. The shark leaks water and looks so fake that they ended up just going with it. The only way the shark can be removed is with 'Shark repellent Bat spray.' I think it's a classic scene in movie history. When West was asked why or how he can play himself as a complete idiot on 'Family Guy' he answered honestly when he said he did it for the bags of money they offered him. Everyone was both charmed and captivated by how personable and funny his interview was. Of the entire festival, Adam West ended up being my favorite interview. Once the celebrities had left the stage it was time for the film. We sat shivering by the pool laughing until we cried. Batman: The Movie is truly a must see for all ages and I'll watch it 200 more times in my life but none will make me as giddy as that one night I watched it under the palm trees in Hollywood.

After the movie was over we rushed over to the TCL Chinese Theatres across the street to catch The Manchurian Candidate. I had never seen the film and was incredibly excited to see it for the first time in such a historic theater. Angela Lansbury was going to do an interview with Alec Baldwin before the film and it was the hottest ticket in town that day. We walked to get in line and walked and walked and ended up going completely around the entire theater before we secured our place in line only steps from where we had started. I was given the number 504, by far the highest number I was given the entire festival. I waited with a couple of my roommates and a new friend I had made who was currently living in Japan. He was originally from Chicago so we talked about midwest living and I was fascinated to hear stories about Japanese baseball. It made the hour wait fly by and the next thing I knew we were entering the theater. We found four seats in the very front row. It was great for the interview but once the film started I had to leave. We were too close and my head started to pound. A couple of us excused ourselves and decided to go hang out in the lobby of the multiplex and wait for the midnight movie to start. I snacked on some ice cream and popcorn as I charged my phone and talked to other people waiting for the film.

The film in question was one that I went to because my roommates were going. I didn't really care to see it but I'm thrilled I did end up joining the fun. The 1981 film *Roar* film is historic because it was plagued with production problems (it spent 11 years in production) and it used live, untrained animals, some of which actually lived with stars Tippi Hedren, Melanie Griffith, Noel Marshall, John Marshall, and Jerry Marshall. Many of the cast and crew were injured by the animals over of the course of production. Nothing could have truly prepared me for the sheer insanity of what the movie is actually like.

The plot was incredibly thin. Noel Marshall goes to Africa to study lions and lets them all live with him in his dilapidated house. Tippi Hedren plays his estranged wife who brings their kids (Melanie Griffith, John Marshall, and Jerry Marshall) out to see him. But is he home when they arrive? Nope! So the family arrives to a house full of big, wild cats who begin terrorizing them and they all have to avoid the cats by doing things like hiding in cabinets and iceboxes. This goes on for quite a while, like a really long while, then they all fall asleep and wake up with a whole new perspective on the situation. Enter laughs and playful moments between the actors and the lions, tigers and elephants. The movie ends with a big montage showing the entire family living in peace with the cats and a thoughtful song plays in the background. I'm not kidding, that's how it ended.

I laughed a lot through this film. The sheer insanity of it all was hilarious. I asked those seated around me several times if they knew how this film got made? Tippi Hedren who is fabulous in *The Birds* was a caricature of herself, her acting was awful and cringe worthy but again the hilarity of it all made it one of my favorites during the festival. You think 'It's just a movie,' but then you remember no, those are real cats and they did cause several injuries to everyone on set. People could have died and should have died. It left me shaking my head one moment and laughing hysterically the next, but you're not entirely sure you should be laughing at this movie. While watching actors get attacked by wild animals in and of itself isn't funny, the fact that this movie has an awful plot, a ridiculous musical score, and really terrible dialogue that's made even funnier by Noel Marshall's hilariously bad line delivery makes it comedy gold. I bought it the moment I got home.

I had spent the last six hours laughing, cringing and questioning everything I had known about Tippi Hedren. It was a total blast that made the entire festival completely worth every penny. Getting to see people like Alec Baldwin, Norman Lloyd and others is amazing but spending hours with your friends laughing and enjoying great films is somehow even better.

Term limits, Partisan Governor changing the face of Nebraska Legislature

There was a time when the prospects of at least 12 new faces in the Nebraska Legislature wasn't a bad thing. There were still enough seasoned veterans in the body to explain the art and nuance of lawmaking to the greenest of freshmen.

That has changed because of term limits and a partisan governor who is calling out the names of Republican (his party) senators in the officially non-partisan legislature for failing to support his legislative agenda. Governor Pete Ricketts is even supporting a challenger in one of the races against 11 incumbents who have four years of experience. That incumbent, Les Seiler of Hastings, is chairman of the Judiciary Committee.

At least five of those incumbents finished behind their challengers in the recent primary. While it's too early to sound the alarm, if those five are replaced by newbies, that's 17 of 49 senators – one-third of the body -- who face a straight-up learning curve. It takes a while to find the bathrooms in the marvelously historic state Capitol. It's an even bigger task to learn to read and resist the lobby, dodge the scrutinizing eye of the governor and his minions and pay attention to the constituents – the folks who brought you to the dance.

By the numbers: Ernie Chambers, clearly the senior statesman of the whole bunch, has 41 years of experience. He's likely to return for his second four-year term after sitting out the mandatory one term required by the term limits law, which was designed to get rid of him.

The next closest is Omaha Senator Bob Krist, Chairman of the Legislature's Executive Committee, who comes in second in seniority with a whopping 7 years of experience. Next up are five senators with 6 years under their belts. They include Business and Labor Chair Burke Harr of Omaha;

General Affairs Chair Tyson Larson of O'Neill; Transportation Chair Jim Smith of Papillion; Lydia Brasch of Bancroft and Paul Schumacher of Columbus.

That leaves the next seniority level at 11 senators who have 4 years of experience. Senator Tommy Garrett of Bellevue has 3 years. Eighteen senators have 2 years of experience and, at least 12 will have no experience. That depends on which of the 11 incumbents stumble.

Veteran lawmaker Jeremy Nordquist of Omaha, a Democrat in the officially non-partisan legislature who represents a heavily Democrat and Hispanic area of the city, left the Unicameral last year to go to work for U.S. Representative Brad Ashford of Omaha. Ricketts appointed Nicole Fox, a Republican, to replace him. She came in third in the primary and

won't be coming back.

Left in that race in Omaha's District 7 are John Synowiecki and Tony Vargas. Synowiecki served 6 years in the Legislature a few years ago and is a Democrat. Vargas is Hispanic and a member of the Omaha Public School Board. This single legislative race is enough to give one hope that representative government still exists.

Troubled incumbents who finished second to newcomers include: Seiler who finished 1,926 votes behind his challenger; Al Davis of Hyannis who finished 808 votes back; Jerry Johnson of Wahoo, Agriculture Committee Chairman who finished 595 votes behind his challenger and Rick Kolowski of Omaha who garnered 481 fewer votes than his challenger. The fifth, Fox, finished in third place behind her two challengers and is out of the

New faces coming for sure. Whether it means fresh ideas or fresh meat for the governor and the lobby, that's a matter of perspective. Let's just hope that the Nebraska Legislature doesn't become embroiled in the same partisan divisiveness that has hamstrung Washington.



Bridge work to begin on N-105 in Humboldt

Weather permitting, work is scheduled to begin the week of June 13 on the Big Nemaha River bridge on N-105 located on the south edge of Humboldt, according to the Nebraska Department of Roads.

A.M. Cohron & Son, Inc., of Atlantic, Iowa, has the \$999,277 contract. Work includes removing the existing deck and approach slabs and pouring a new concrete deck, bridge rail and approach slabs.

Beginning on June 13, N-105 will be closed and traffic will follow a marked detour utilizing N-4 north and east of Humboldt, N-8 south and east of Humboldt, US-75 from the Jct. with N-8 to the Jct. with N-4, and N-105 north and south of the Big Nemaha River bridge. The project is anticipated to be complet-

ed in the fall.

The Nebraska Department of Roads manager for this project is Bill Jasa of Tecumseh. Motorists are reminded to drive cautiously through construction zones and watch for signs and detour routes.


'Is Trans-Gender an option?'

Inspiring others to 'pay it forward,' for Tami

This past February, family members of Tami Feek, rallied together in search of donations to do something special for cancer patients. It had become a goal of Amanda (Weaver) Crowley's to organize the event in hopes that we could help others going through the same struggles that her beloved aunt Tami did.

In mid-February 2014, Tami was diagnosed with inflammatory breast cancer, a rare form. She underwent two rounds of chemotherapy, surgery and radiation. In December, it was discovered that the cancer had spread to her vertebrae. She went through another round of radiation, with no success, so she started chemo again. She was traveling frequently to Bellevue for her treatments, as well as seeking care at M.D. Anderson Cancer Center in Houston, TX. After a long hardfought battle, Tami passed away on Oct. 29, 2015.

Soon a Facebook event was created to help spread the word of Amanda's mission. Her goal was to donate at least 10 bags in memory of her aunt Tami. A donation of \$26 was asked for in order to purchase the bags from her "Thirty-One Gifts" business. Crowley would then fill the bags using her commission. There were several family members, friends and friends-offriends who donated to the cause breaking Crowley's goal of 10 bags. Pam Scott even applied for \$250 from Thrivent for Lutherans Action Team. After all of the donations had come in, Amanda was able purchase 60 bags, filled with items such as hand sanitizer, lotion, Biotene mouthwash, hard candy,

socks, crossword puzzles, pens/pencils, Kleenex, Chapstick, blankets and a notebook with an inspirational quote handwritten on the inside. There were also bag tags, with Tami's picture on them, greeting the patient, describing why they were receiving this special bag and who it was sponsored by. The family of Tami Feek was able to deliver 25 Chemo Care Bags to Village Pointe Cancer Center in Omaha, 25 bags to Bellevue Hospital Cancer Center and 10 bags to the Falls City Community Medical Center.

Crowley said that a number of thank you cards have started coming in, reminding them all of why it is so important to "pay it forward."

Kathy H. of Papillion wrote, "After one of chemo sessions, I was sitting in my car, ready to go home when I saw this troop of women walking through the parking lot

of the hospital. They were all lugging bags. I thought to myself, 'I wonder who the fortunate people are who are receiving the bags?' I found out at my next appointment that I was one of them-I keep the card with Tami's picture on it in the bag and show it to everyone when I am telling the story of the bags."

Amanda said the response was outstanding and that she expects next year's numbers to be even bigger.

"From multiple communities and states, we came together as one, and got the job done! I can only imagine what next year's numbers will look like," she said.

City to begin flushing hydrants this weekend

Falls City Utilities will be flushing fire hydrants throughout the city over the next few weeks to flow test and remove any sediment built up in the water mains. This is scheduled to start on June 6.

Customers may experience a temporary brownish-red discoloration of their

water during this flushing process. However, the Utility Dept. notes that this water discoloration does not pose any health threat and is safe to use.

Persons who notice flushing in progress in their area are advised not to use water for a short period of time until the flushing is complete, so as to not pull dis-

Persons who notice flushing in progress in their area are advised not to use water for a short period of time until the flushing is complete, so as to not pull discolored water into their service piping. For those who do experience discoloration of water, the Water Department reminds then not to wash white clothes during this time since the brownish-red minerals will stain white cloth.

The Water Dept. apologizes for any inconvenience that this flushing process might cause for consumers. The process of flushing the system at the fire hydrants removes as much of the build-up as possible. If we no not flush the system, excessive iron and manganese build up over time and could lead to long-term problems such as clogging of lines and water fixtures. Your patience is appreciated.







a reporter with National Public Radio. He said, 'I think what I tell families now is the only person really that has a right to answer that question – was it worth it? – is the young man or woman that lost their life. And I believe what they would say is that they were doing what they wanted to do. They were where they wanted to be. So that's the answer, I think, to that question. It's not for us that survived to answer it. I think it's for those young people to answer. And I think they do answer it with their actions and obviously their lives.'

"Who can deny the heartfelt wisdom and logic of General Kelly's words?," Daake asked. "But just as we should not presume to speak for the fallen, we can make the country for which they have died a better place – one that honors their sacrifice and epitomizes the ideals enshrined in our Constitution.

"The American Legion will always be proud of the more than one million men and women who made the supreme sacrifice for the United States since our nation's founding.



'Was it worth it?' is the wrong question for us to answer. Instead, we should commit ourselves to Make it Worth It."

Daake said the people should insist "that America remain the land of the free. A land where patriotism trumps politics, where the American Flag is displayed proudly and frequently and where military veterans are society's true celebrities."

"While there is nothing unpatriotic about an auto race, a trip to the beach or a barbecue, we are here today to reflect on the true meaning of Memorial Day. Let us remember that terrorist plots were foiled and killers brought to justice because Americans were willing to pay a high price. 



The VH1 Save The Music Foundation was founded in 1997 in an effort to restore instrumental music education programs and raise awareness about the importance of music as part of each child's complete education. It was the first organization of its kind and to date more than \$52 million worth of new musical instruments has been donated to 1,964 public schools in 233 school districts around the country -impacting the lives of more than 2.6 million public school students.

Some Cups runneth over

The final standings for The NSAA Cup, the all-activities award started in 2007 to recognize the state's most successful high school athletic and fine arts programs, was announced Monday.

Winners are determined by a point system based on participation in NSAA activities and performance in state championship events within each division and class. Music, which does not have a statelevel event, earns points based on participation at the district music contest. The boys and girls competition in each class features schools earning participation and performance points from their respective activities. In the all-school division, schools receive participation points for each of its NSAA registered programs, and earn additional points for placing in NSAA championship events. Points are awarded for all activities championship events as follows: 1st place, 50 pts.; 2nd, 45; 3rd, 40; 4th, 35; 5th, 30; 6th, 25; 7th, 20; 8th, 15.

None of the three Richardson County schools finished in the Top 10 for the 2015-16 school year — in the Girls, Boys or Combined

Columbus Scotus ran away with Class C, as their boys totaled a tremendous 397.5 points, 205 more than any other school. The Scotus boys scored heavily in football (50), cross country (35), journalism (40), wrestling (30), dual wrestling (35), basketball (40), track (37.5), golf (40) and soccer (50). Kearney Catholic (325) and Grand Island Catholic (320) finished second and third, while Bishop Neumann (282.5), Hastings SC (257.5) and David City Aquinas (232.5) also finished in the Top 10. HTRS, which earned 45 points in speech, totaled 105, while Falls City High scored 75.

In Class D, Bruning-Davenport took the title with 250 total points. FCSH finished with 132.5 points, placing 25th overall. The boys, which had 22.5 in football and 20 in track, scored slightly better than the Lady Irish, which totaled 40 in girls' basketball. Bruning-Davenport swept all the divisions in Class D in 2016.

Did you know?

Students in high-quality school music education programs score higher on standardized tests compared to students in schools with deficient music education programs, regardless of the socioeconomic level of community. And

students in lower-quality programs score higher than students with no music at all. Playing a musical instrument significantly enhances the brainstem's sensitivity to speech sounds, effectively fine-tuning" the brains auditory system.

Young children who take music lessons show different brain development and improved memory over the course of a year, compared to children who do not. They perform better in tests of literacy, verbal memory, mathematics and IQ.

The musician is constantly adjusting decisions on tempo, tone, style, rhythm, phrasing, and feeling - training the brain to become good at organizing and conducting numerous activities at once. It pays off for lifelong attention skills, intelligence and an ability for self-knowledge and expression.

BIG BRAIN. Learning and performing music actually strengthens the synapses between brain cells. Brain scans taken during musical performances show that virtually the entire cerebral cortex is active while musicians

are playing. It increases the brain's capacity by increasing the strengths of connections among neurons. German researchers found that music lessons in childhood actually enlarge the brain. An area used to analyze the pitch of a musical note is enlarged 25 percent in musicians. And the earlier they start, the bigger that portion of the brain gets.

Music enhances the process of learning. The systems it nourishes, which include our integrated sensory, attention, cognitive, emotional and motor capacities, are shown to be the driving forces behind all other learning.

Taking piano lessons and solving math puzzles on a com-

puter significantly improves specific math skills of elementary school children. Children given four months of piano keyboard training scored 27 percent higher on proportional math and fractions tests than other children.

learning piano and voice all contribute to spatial reasoning...conclusions of about 3,000 studies found mathematical skills and language facility benefit directly from spatial reasoning.

-Nearly 100% of past winners in the prestigious Siemens Westinghouse Competition in Math, Science, and Technology (for high School students) play one or more musical instruments.

— Students at risk of dropping out of high school cite their

participation in the arts as reasons for staying in school. Arts provide a supportive environment that promotes constructive acceptance of criticism and one where it is safe to take risks.

Dr. James Catterall of UCLA has analyzed the school records

of 25,000 students as they moved from grade 8 to grade 10. He found that students who studied music and the arts had higher grades, scored better on standardized tests, had better attendance records and were more active in commu-

nity affairs than other students. He also found that students from poorer families who studied the arts improved

overall school performance more rapidly than all other students. Second graders from a low income school in Los Angeles were given eight months of piano keyboard training, as well as

time playing with newly designed music software. The result? These students, taking the Stanford 9 Math Test, went from scoring in the 30th to the 65th percentile. These second graders were performing sixth grade math. The critical point here is the students were not taught math using music...they were taught music. It was the process of learning music that helped improve their math skills. Students of lower socioeconomic status who took music lessons in grades 8-12 increased their math scores significantly as compared to non-music students. But just as important, reading, history, geography and even social

-Students involved in courses beyond the required 'basics' were less likely to be involved with drugs.

-A 2005 study showed that students who took four years of arts coursework outperformed their peers who had one half-year or less by 58 points on the verbal portion and 38 points on the math portion of the SAT.

All that said, yet...

—Fewer than half the nation's 8th graders are being taught the arts...Even at schools where courses are offered, not everyone takes part. Only one in four 8th graders reported being asked to sing or play a musical instrument at least once a week.







The historic Fort **Robinson Cemetery**

Post cemeteries were common adjuncts to the often isolated U.S. military posts scattered across the West during the nineteenth century. These cemeteries were not exclusively reserved for the burial of soldiers. Others interred there included military wives and children, civilians who worked at the post and their dependents, and scouts and interpreters associated with the army. At long-lived posts such as Fort Robinson, active from 1874 to 1948, the cemetery might hold the graves of hundreds of individuals. The first burial in the Fort Robinson Cemetery was that of Pvt. James Brogan in July 1875, barely a year after the troops arrived. The last was Fred Lester, a retired army sergeant, who died in nearby Crawford in the summer of 1945.

Contrary to expectations, few of the deaths at western military posts resulted from combat. Most were from disease or accidents. The latter included careless handling of firearms, runaway animals, building fires, and being run over by trains. Alcoholism, suicide, and getting struck by lightning were other causes. Murders accounted for several of the burials at the Fort Robinson Cemetery, including Sgt. William Bell of the Tenth U.S. Cavalry, who was shot by his wife during a 1904 dance at the fort.

The only men to die during military conflict involving Fort Robinson were 11 soldiers killed during what is known as the "Cheyenne Breakout" in January 1879. This was the desperate escape by starving Northern Cheyenne from a Fort Robinson barracks where they had been imprisoned by the army to force their return to a hated Oklahoma reservation, where many had previously died.

Among the notables buried in Fort Robinson's cemetery were Moses "California Joe" Milner, a famous civilian scout for the army who was murdered in 1876, Medal of Honor recipient and "Buffalo Soldier" Sgt. Emmanuel Stance of the Ninth Cavalry, found dead of gunshot wounds along the road to Crawford, and Lt. James A. Swift, who committed suicide while being investigated for a shortage of some \$4,000 during his management of the Post Exchange. Another famous scout, Baptiste "Little Bat" Garnier, ended up in the cemetery after being shot to death by a Crawford bartender in 1900. Several of "Little Bat's" children who succumbed to disease were buried nearby. A tragic loss was that of Gertrude, age four, and Mattie, age two, daughters of Sgt. and Mrs. Henry Wallace of the African American Ninth Cavalry, who burned to death when the barracks where the family lived caught fire in March 1898.

When Fort Robinson was about to be abandoned after World War II, the U.S. Army made arrangements to move the remains from the post cemetery to Fort McPherson National Cemetery near Maxwell, Nebraska. In July 1947 more than 250 remains were exhumed for transfer to the national cemetery, although none were found beneath several stones. Some of the graves held more than one set of remains, such as in the case of children of the same family who were interred

The Nebraska State Historical Society has preserved and marked the post cemetery site, which now lies within Fort Robinson State Park and is accessible to park visitors. Several of the original grave markers that were declared surplus and defaced in 1947 have been recovered and re-installed to enhance interpretation of the post cemetery







Community safety, what to know in these changing times

ROAD & BRIDGE DEPARTMENT Scott Huppert, Highway Superintendent updated the Board on the routine maintenance being done on county roads and bridges this week. Equipment maintenance was discussed.

Mr. Huppert reported that the bridge crew are inspecting bridges for erosion after the heavy rainfall recently and checking on signage. He also gave an update on the completion of the FEMA sites from the disaster declaration of 2015. Mr. Huppert also informed the Board that the Department has also switched to their summer hours starting at 6:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. He also requested the Board

consider the approval of adding a tint to the windows on the motorgraders to help with the sun glare and to help with cooling of the cab. The Verdon NW bridge project is progressing and the guardrail should be installed by the end of the week. If progress continues the bridge could be completed and opened before the end

of the month. Motion was made by Sickel to approve a permit for A.H. Cohron to operate an oversize/overweight vehicle on county road 644 Avenue north of Hwy 73 or 712 Road for 1 mile then east on 713 Road to a bridge site. Motion seconded by Davidson. SHERIFF POUNDS Sheriff Pounds reviewed further with the Board the proposed contract with Catering By Marlin's, Inc., dbs CBM Managed Services, a professional food service company to provide meals to inmates at the Jail and other services for the Law Enforcement Center. This contract will be considered at next week's meeting.

The current status of the delivery of meals to the jail inmates was reviewed. Sheriff Pounds also informed the Board that the current version of the "Slueth" program needed by the Sheriff's

Department and Jail be considered and that contact has been made with the City of Falls City to share the Version 10 of the program. The Board and Sheriff Pounds contacted the City Administrator, Gary Jorn during the meeting to inquire as to the status of a response to the Sheriff's request.

Mr. Jorn relayed that it was to be discussed with staff at a meeting later today.

A brief review of the current agreement with the City of Falls City for the 911 dispatch services, PSAP, was held. Sheriff Pounds informed the Board that he was researching options for 911 dispatching.

Sheriff Pounds requested that the Board consider the approval of grant funds for a COPS Grant to hire a "School Resource Officer" for the County. The grant funding would provide 75% of the costs for the position for three years with the fourth year being funded totally by Richardson County. The Board instructed the Sheriff to proceed with the grant application and if the grant would be awarded then the Board will consider to accept the grant funding at that time depending on the resources that would be available to fund the 25% match and the full funding for the fourth year and on.

Grant funding has also been received for the purchase of preliminary breath testing equipment and applications have been made for additional grant funding to purchase radar and in-car video equipment and bullet proof vests.

The Board also discussed with Sheriff Pounds the need for a maintenance person at the Jail/Law Enforcement Center when it becomes occupied. Ideas of hiring a person or contract-


