Marlin O. Armbruster, 89, a former Falls City Mayor and founder, owner and operator of Armbruster Motor Co., died Monday, June 11, 2012, at Falls City.

Mr. Armbruster purchased what is now Armbruster Motor Co. in 1951, and in 1973 earned the Time Quality Deal-

er Award for Nebraska. In 1988 he was president of the Nebraska New Car Dealers Association.


He served as Mayor of Falls City from 1968 to 1974 and at one time served as president of many local organizations, including the FC Country Club, the Community Hospital Board, the Chamber of Commerce, the Jaycees and the Industrial Development Corp.

Armbruster was on the Board of Downtown Development Corp., was a member of First United Presbyterian Church and the Elks Lodge #963, all of Falls City.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. Thursday, June 14, 2012, at Dorr and Clark Funeral Home, with Rev. Paul Weinert officiating. Interment in Steele Cemetery. The family will receive friends from 7-8 p.m. Wednesday at Dorr and Clark Funeral Home.

Marlin was born April 27, 1923 at Shubert to Otmar and Hattie Belle (Johnson) Armbruster. He was raised in the Shubert area, graduating from Shubert High School in 1940. He graduated from General Motors Institute of Technology in 1946 and taught auto mechanics in Fremont from 1944 until 1947. He sold cars in Wisner from 1947 until 1951,

Miller-Monroe Co. no longer brokers City's health insurance

Premiums about \$730,000 annually

Acting on the recommendation of the City's Health Insurance Committee, the City Council voted Monday evening, June 4, to change the agent of record to Benefit Management, Lincoln. This is a change in health insurance brokerage from Miller-Monroe of Falls City, the firm that has provided this service for about 10 years.

At this point in time, said City Clerk/Treasurer Gary Jorn, the City spends about \$730,000 each year on health insurance premiums for employees. The vote to change was 4-2, with Council members Steve Scholl and Ryan Rieschick casting the nay votes.

Council members spent a considerable amount of time on

"What can they (Benefit Management) offer than Miller-Monroe can't?," asked Councilman Rieschick. "What is the gain? Why go out of town?"

Jorn explained that employee members of the committee are not insurance experts. That is why, he said, a broker firm is contracted to find the best options involving employee coverage and cost savings for the City. This may include options in a non-traditional plan.

No one at the meeting expressed displeasure with Miller-Monroe and its president, Steve Kottich. "Maybe it's time for a change," several said.


Rieschick stressed the local angle, noting what Falls City businesses, including Miller-Monroe, do for the community and how they "put money back in the community." Jorn, while agreeing that the Council should try to do business locally, said health insurance involves a "pretty good chunk of change" now and in the future and that the City depends on brokers to "tell us what's out there."

Julie Hutfles, who heads the insurance committee, said the committee's recommendation was well considered and final.

"We appoint these committee members to do a job," Councilman Jerry Oliver said. "If we don't take their recommendations, why have the committees?"

Miller-Monroe President Kottich, a former Falls City mayor, cited several "misrepresentations" and asserted that his company could pursue all op-

It started with a baby.

The pencil drawing Jordan created as a gift and as an art assignment was awarded first place in the 2012 First Congressional District Art Competition and will be displayed in the Cannon Tunnel of the United States' Capitol for one year.

Ashli and her mother, Kathy, next Monday will fly to Washington, D.C., for Wednesday's 31st annual Congressional Art Awards Ceremony at the Capitol Visitor Center.

According to information received from the United States House of Representatives, each spring the Congressional Institute sponsors a nationwide high school visual art competition to recognize and encourage artistic talent in the nation. The competition provides an opportunity for members of Congress to encourage and recognize the artistic talents of their young constituents. Panels of local artists in each district select the winning entries.

Jordan's pencil drawing, *In His Hands*, was inspired by a family photograph and was initially intended as a gift for her aunt and uncle, Julie





City and the community.



Falls City has one. He is Dylan Frederick, 22-year-old son of Harvey and Annie Frederick who has just graduated from Nebraska Wesleyan University with a degree in Political Science and already is on the staff of Congressman Jeff Fortenberry.

A few months back, Don Walton of the Lincoln Journal Star wrote about Dylan's work with College Republicans. The Falls City High grad of 2008 is state chairman of about 600 College Republicans at Chadron and Peru State Colleges and Midland University. Walton quoted Dylan:

"Our goal is to have a presence on every campus in Nebraska. We want students emerging as young leaders with the courage to stand up for their principles early on."

College Republicans help supply energetic campaign workers ready to stuff envelopes, make fundraising calls and walk the precincts, and can be a youthful sounding board for established political leaders.

"Boots on the ground," Dylan told Walton.

The Falls Cityan spent one Wesleyan semester as an intern in Fortenberry's Washington office and after his graduation he joined the Congressman's staff. Dylan is completing training in the Washington office and will return to Lincoln to become involved in Fortenberry's bid for re-election.

Besides his political bent, Dylan has been a busy young man. He began working at Falls City Care Center when he was 14 and continued through high school. While in college he worked in a shoe store, was a waiter at Olive Garden and his senior year worked in a law office and also for Fortenberry.

The notice of the death of Belford E. "Pete" Smith, 84, in Lenexa, KS, on May 30 stirred memories for me back when I was writing about high school jocks and would-be jocks. Pete was an outstanding fullback on the 1946 FCHS football team that went undefeated. That edition of Tigers nudged powerful Lincoln Northeast 12-7, whacked Neb. City 24-12 and whitewashed Fairbury 33-0 and Auburn 27-0.

It was the first year of a great 10-year tenure for coaches Jack McInteer and Bob Henderson. A couple of weeks after the season ended, Mac, the head coach, and Hendy came to the Journal office with long faces and spilled the sad news. The powers that be had discovered that FCHS had played an ineligible student and that all games had been forfeited. So instead of an 8-0 season it had become an 0-8 season. Mac and Hendy were not at fault. They did not know that the player had briefly enrolled at another school and that his eligibility had run out.

Three players on that team went on to stand out in college sports. Pete Smith played football for (I believe) Emporia State, Jack Oslin played football for an Oklahoma school and Bob Burton ran track and played basketball at Texas Christian. All three, plus vicious tackle John Meyer, were all-conference choices. Rex Jones, a junior then, was an all-conference tackle the next year.

By the way, the 1947 FCHS yearbook lists the '46 football team's record, and doesn't mention the season forfeit. And that's the way the fans felt it should be—the ineligibility ruling had been made on a technicality.

Some very good Tiger teams have played in Jug Brown Stadium—in my book, the 1946 squad was one of the best.

It 's time to heap some praise on Larry Whalen, who serves more or less silently.

For the past 25 years, Larry has been the organizer and presenter of the Memorial Day ceremonies at the Rulo and Steele Cemeteries. That's some doing!

The Rulo service was initiated by the late Jim Prater, a World War II Marine Corps vet. When Jim passed away, Larry, a Korean War vet, inherited the job, plus the Memorial Day service at Steele. Both now are sponsored by the FC Ceremonial Honor Guard.

Here's what Larry does: Talks someone into speaking at Rulo and another to speak at Steele; runs down a clergyman to offer prayers at both services; arranges for a solist to sing at both (usually Mid Bauer, this year Annie Crofford); contacts a Scoutmaster for Scouts to stand at the replica bier at the two cemeteries; calls each person to place crosses for the nation's wars, a different group of 10 at each cemetery; makes sure the various ceremonial honor guards, including the Iowa Tribal Ceremonial Honor Guard, are at the services; arranges, with help from guys like Ken Coonce, Steve Schawang and others, for chairs and the public address system and its setting up; arranges for the playing of "Taps" at both cemeteries; gives the "Tribute to Veterans" and emcees both services.


I asked him how long it takes him to get ready for Memorial Day. "About three months," Larry replied with a smile.

He also is commander of the Ceremonial Honor Guard which, among other patriotic activities, conducts veterans' graveside services. Persons who have not been involved can have no idea what this dignified service means to families of deceased veterans. The Honor Guard, comprised entirely of veterans, often is asked to conduct the service at a veteran's burial outside of the immediate community and the time involved is considerable. Incidentally, Larry has to call each of them every time the Honor Guard is asked to conduct a graveside service to see if they can participate. It's all volunteer service by guys who have served.

Too many times community service like Larry Whalen gives us is just taken for granted. I've tried to change that with the above paragraphs.



Being a great Dad

With Father's Day just around the corner, it's a good time to reflect on ways fathers can make a difference in the lives of their children. Here are some ideas taken from research.

Nurture your marriage first. If you are a married father, an important key to a good father-child connection is to have a strong relationship with your wife. If things aren't going well, it's easy for bad blood between you and your wife to spill over into the parent-child relationship.

Someone once said that the best gift a father could give his children was to love their mother. Spend time together, just you and your spouse, no kids or other adults. Daily rituals such as reading the mail together, calling each other on the phone, or snuggling close during a favorite TV program are great ways to stay connected.

If your marriage went sour and you are now a divorced father, focus on maintaining a civil relationship with your exwife. Never bad-mouth her in front of the children when they spend time with you. Maintain a cooperative parenting partner-

Prioritize fatherhood.

Some dads worry that by emphasizing family so much they will lose their edge at the workplace. Research doesn't support that fear. Plan your work around your family. With calendar in hand, schedule first the activities of your children, the school concerts, the athletic events, the one-on-one times, then write in your work obliga-

Get involved with your child from the beginning. Remember, there is nothing you can't do for a baby, except breast-feeding. Even if your wife is breast-feeding, you


can still establish a role for yourself: bathing, burping, and comforting the baby.

Have regular one-on-one time with each child. Sometimes it's fun to talk while you're doing errands or making home repairs, but be sure that there are times that you turn off the TV, put down the newspaper, and give your kids your undivided attention. Schedule a dad-daughter or dad-son date occasionally. Go out to eat at a favorite restaurant or to do an activity the child enjoys. At the end of the day, talk about how

their day went. Show affection often.

Even if older kids seem squeamish, kids enjoy a hug and encouraging words from their dad. With older kids you may want to do this in private, though, rather than in range of their friends.

Connect with your child at all levels. Make sure you have some contact with every aspect of your child's life. Visit school, meet the teachers, know their coaches, and their friends. This will give you more to talk about. Parent involvement during children's schooling is critical to their school success.




Sissy and Angel a sure bet

And down the stretch they come! In more ways than one.

In the three Triple Crown races, it was I'll Have Another that made the most of his stretch runs (unfortunately, I'll Have Another was scratched from the Belmont; Union Rags won by a neck). Three Falls City-area women were there to see the first of the big horse races, attending the Kentucky Oaks and Derby early last month. In fact, Angel and Sissy Georges and Lori Gottula are on a home stretch of their own, literally.

For the past year (actually lots longer than that) Lori has been

writing a book with the working title Sissy and Angel that tells the story of Sissy, the Barada girl who achieved fame as a barrel racer despite being legally blind, and her mom, Angel, who was by her side every step of the way. Last summer, I read Lori's first draft and was so very impressed but not surprised, because I was familiar with the story and with Lori's literary skills. Since then, an agent has become involved and Lori has been editing and re-writing at a 24/7, 12 to 14 hour-a-day clip. This book will be published and, frankly, I'd be shocked if it were not a huge success.

Most Journal readers are similarly familiar with the story. If not, I'd suggest you buy the book or check it out from the

library when it hits those shelves. So I won't go into detail here. Let's just say that horses play a prominent role, sometimes a tragic one. And that while sharing their story, Sissy and Angel and Lori have become great friends. Once in a while, they take their friendship on the road and attend neat events. Certainly, the Kentucky Derby would fall into that category.

"Everything fell into place for us all week," Lori wrote in an email. "Even the rain on the day of the Oaks race was fun," as the trio avoided the crush of 112,000 others, got "drenched," but "laughed until our stomachs hurt." Lori said Churchill Downs is "plopped right in the middle of a residential area" and that residents make a little cash by selling parking spaces. One such entrepreneur is "Eva Mae," who lives just across the street from the famous venue. "Eva Mae was a rough-looking old gal, probably 75, and she even had business cards that said, 'Eva Mae's Parking Lot.' It was her back yard and she had been parking cars there for 29 years. We just made friends all over," Lori wrote.

After four days of attending the races, folks in the stands had learned about Sissy and Angel's story. "Our section became a little community," said Lori, "and the people in the front rows invited us into their seats for Oaks and Derby days." Fans from Australia, Canada, Ohio, Louisville and "all over the place" befriended the local women and were especially protective of Sissy, as they formed a semi-circle around her on Derby day so that she could "watch" all of the races from the rail and not be crowded or pushed by any of the 165,000 who attended on Saturday.

During their four days in Louisville, Sissy, Angel and Lori met some "racing celebrities, including Secretariat owner Penny Chenery and the jockey who rode Secretariat for the Derby win in 1972, Ron Turcotte," Lori said. She was able to obtain tickets to a private brunch given by Ms. Chenery to benefit the Kentucky

Derby Museum and Lori, Sissy and Angel were seated at one of the front tables. The tale of Sissy and Angel had spread by then, and when Lori introduced Sissy to Ms. Chenery, she asked "Where's Angel?" Those two met, as well.

The women visited a ranch for retired thoroughbreds and Sissy had her photo taken with Tinners Way, Secretariat's son, and Popcorn Deelites, the horse that played Seabiscuit in the movie. Lori said both are "big celebrities" in Sis' mind.

Sissy is a certified equine sports massage therapist, with clients throughout the area, including Omaha. A massage, Lori writes, takes about two hours and Sis will do up to four a day.

A massage starts at the horse's head and continues with stretches on all four legs. "She knows that massages, stretching and chiropractic work make a horse feel and perform better, just like they make us feel and perform better," Lori wrote. "I've seen the results myself!"

Among Sissy's clients are some high rollers in the world of jumping horses (Omaha area). At one estate, the gals confused the guest house with the mansion. The guest house, barn and Olympic-sized swimming pool encompass an immense area and the host, who drives from the mansion to the gate, spends the day with her Falls City and Barada-area visitors.

"You should see some of the horses while Sissy is doing her massages," Lori wrote. "I've literally seen them fall asleep, and I've seen others lie down afterwards, like they're saying 'Aaaaah.'" Lori explains that Sis knows the intricacies of a horse's muscles, how they work together, where the sore spots are . . . "because she can feel them. When she's in Omaha doing these massages, she is an expert."

Sis, Angel and Lori did not see a Triple Crown winner at the Derby. But they came close. Too bad Sis wasn't at Belmont to work her magic on I'll Have Another. There are no sure bets in horse racing. Not in literature, either. The story Lori is refining, with the help of her subjects, Angel and Sis, is about as close to a sure bet as you'll find.
