Puff, puff, toot, toot off we go!

The arrival of Union Pacific Steam Locomotive No. 844 in Falls City Saturday morning was a family affair. It's just unfortunate that many families and railroad enthusiasts were unable to see the last steam locomotive built for UP.

Flooding concerns forced several scheduling alterations and the last word many received was that No. 844 would stop here at the UP yard at about noon on Monday. To be safe, that schedule was moved up. The old steam locomotive arrived shortly after 9 a.m. and departed at about 10. It is now in Council Bluffs being prepared for the short haul to Omaha where it will be part of UP's Home Plate attraction at the College World

Still, a crowd was on hand, learning of the Saturday morning arrival by word of mouth. And many of those folks brought their children to see what is known as UP's "Living Legend." No. 844 may not pass this way again.

The Falls City maintenance stop was one of the last legs of

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No. 844's Little Rock Express tour that attracted thousands along the route that was determined through UP's Great Adventure — You Route the Steam contest held earlier this year. The Little Rock Express route won in voting conducted via a special contest website. Help offered in cleaning up dilapidated residential properties

The City of Falls City Housing Advisory Board is looking at continuing to build on the momentum of clearing vacant dilapidated residential properties by offering up to \$3,000 of assistance per property to help cover the cost of demolition and site clearance. Applications are being sought from owners of vacant residential properties that are beyond economic rehabilitation. This action is an effort to continue neighborhood revitalization that the City of Falls City undertook last year in which 14 properties were demolished and sites cleared.

The City of Falls City is eager to receive more demolition applications from interested property owners so that the Housing Advisory Board and City staff can evaluate whether there is an opportunity to utilize Program Income Funds to address a handful of additional properties. The Housing Advisory committee has set July 13 as the initial deadline to receive applications for this round of potential demolition and site clearance. The City appears to have funds available to support up to five demolition and clearance projects via a cost share approach of up to \$3,000 per property.

As theses projects would be financed with HUD program income there will be specific steps to follow that include asbestos

Electrical switch cause of blaze

Last Thursday afternoon, June 9, the FC Fire Department responded to a garage fire at 822 Pacific St.

The garage, owned by Jeff and Tina Ferris, was engulfed in a matter of minutes from a cause the State Fire Marshall ruled as "accidental." A trio of electrical switches appeared to be to blame for the fire.

"The entire switchboard was gone," said FCFD Chief Kenny Simpson. "They were just disintegrated."


A value on the contents of the garage had not yet been determined, but inside were at least five motorcycles, countless tools, an air compressor, a generator, and propane/gas tanks, among other items of value. Also a Dodge pickup and

a camper that were parked just outside the garage were damaged.

Ted Godemann, who is the Ferris' insurance agent, provided the Journal with an initial estimated loss in excess of \$50,000, with the garage alone estimated between \$15,000 and \$20,000.

Godemann wanted to remind everyone that it is always advisable to make a video or take pictures of all of your belongings and to keep it in a safety deposit box and not in your home just as a precaution. In the event of a fire, tornado, flood or other tragic event having your items documented can help when working with the insurance company.

Seventeen firemen responded to the call and were on the scene for some three hours.



As a veteran TV watcher, I think my opinion counts. And I'm voting for what cable networks offer, way, way over NBC, ABC and CBS. Just this week, I read that ABC cancelled its best new show, "Detroit 1-8-7." Michael Imperioli was great in the lead role and the rest of the cast was excellent. Really good stories, too.

We'll find out on Sunday, when the current series concludes.

For me, the gripping part of the show has involved the dead girl's parents. Their utter grief and despair has been dramatically portrayed through two great performances. Yet, the dad has a questionable past, including a history with organized crime. The mom's sister is a bit shady and we're finding out more about the dead girl, who may not have been the outstanding citizen we all thought she was.

In virtually every scene, it's raining in Seattle, which certainly helps set the mood of this dark, somber whodunit. Friends who also watch tell me the show will be back next year.

Next on my must-watch or record list is "Men of a Certain Age," which can be found on TNT at 9 p.m. Wednesdays. This show features Ray Romano, Scott Bakula and Andre Braugher, long-time friends who have reached mid-life and must deal with varied situations. Romano plays a guy going through a divorce who is the father of two teenage kids. He has a gambling addiction he's working to overcome, owns and operates a party favor store and is trying to hone his golf game so that he can make a try at the Champions (Senior) Tour. Romano is a funny guy. But his is not always a comedic role.

Bakula is a playboy/actor who has had few attached strings but is beginning to realize life is short and, with the exception of his two friendships, has not much to show for his life to date. He's taken a job as a salesman in the Chevy dealership owned by Braugher's dad and now operated (sort of) by Braugher.

Andre Braugher, for my money, is the best actor of the threesome. Overweight and suffering from sleep apnea, he has a great marriage and family, but a meddling dad who was once an NBA star, and who can't keep his hands off. His dad, an overbearing type, has supposedly given dealership control to his son. There are strings attached.

The show includes plenty of humor, but viewers soon realize that laughs aren't the point. Each of the three guys is dealing with unique life problems that will be familiar to many of you who have reached 50 or soon will. As for me, I'm beyond a "Certain Age," but living a life not without some drama.

Next and last on my list (I haven't purchased the premium channels) is "Breaking Bad," an award-winning story that will begin its fourth AMC season on Sunday, July 17, at 9 p.m. Walter White, played by Bryan Cranston, is a high school chemistry teacher who develops cancer and can't pay for the treatments. His solution: use his chemistry skills to cook methamphetamine. Not just any meth, mind you. Some of the baddest around. His sidekick is former student Jessie Pinkman, played by Aaron Paul.

In order to market the meth, Walter and Jessie must deal with some unsavory characters, which leads to problems. Walter also finds that once in, it's virtually impossible to get out. Did I mention his brother-in-law is a DEA agent?

Cranston and Paul are clearly the stars of this show. Especially Cranston, who has been justly awarded for his portrayal. Lots of twists and turns in this one, as White tries to deal with cancer, his wife, his son (who is disabled), his brother-in-law, drug cartels and a partner who is a bit on the volatile side.

These shows aren't in the "Dancing With the Stars" category. I hope you'll try them though. They are the best I've seen. By the way, reruns of "Law & Order," "Men of a Certain Age" and "The Closer" on TNT on Saturday mornings aren't bad, either.

DEAR READER: I apologize if I haven't responded to your letters in the past, but I can assure you that I have endorsed this remarkable product for such things as easing the pain of an earache, controlling hot flashes and keeping mosquitoes from biting, to name a few.

Garlic has been used for countless years and for reasons we wouldn't consider appropriate. For example, in ancient times, garlic was thought to repel evil and protected warriors from witches and vampires. During the early 18th century, gravediggers drank crushed garlic in wine to protect themselves from the plague that hit Europe. During the two world wars, soldiers were given garlic because it was believed to prevent gangrene. It has been used against arthritis and intestinal infections, and is added to pet food to repel ticks and fleas. It repels deer, rabbits and other garden animals, and now we use it to prevent heart disease, keep cholesterol levels and blood-pressure readings lower, and improve our immune systems. It appears to both prevent and treat the common cold. It may even help fight cancer, although there is no conclusive testing in this regard. Studies, however, have found that people who eat more raw and cooked

chief executive officer. "With college baseball and Union Pacific having strong historical ties to Omaha, it is fitting that we help celebrate the opening of the new stadium and the beginning of a new era of championship games by displaying one of our legendary steam locomotives along with one of our newest."

UP's Home Plate is located where workers broke ground to begin the westward expansion of the nation's first transcontinental railroad after President Abraham Lincoln signed the Pacific Railroad Act in 1862.

No. 844, a high-speed passenger engine, was delivered to UP in 1944 and pulled such widely known trains as the Overland Limited, Los Angeles Limited, Portland Rose and Challenger. When diesels took over all passenger train duties, No. 844 was placed in freight service in Nebraska from 1957 to 1959. It was saved from being scrapped in 1960 and held for special service. The engine became UP's ambassador of goodwill, traveling across the country to be a part of major events. In 2000, a major overhaul began and No. 844 returned to service in 2005.

The steam engine and tender weigh in at 907,980 pounds (454) tons). It is fueled by No. 5 oil and can still crank up the power, propelling it along at up to 60 mph. A crew of about 15 is required to maintain the locomotive on its longer excursions. No. 844 pulls a boiler car, maintenance tool car, boxcar, water tender, baggage car and concession car.

After the maintenance work was completed at the Falls City yard, crewmembers boarded the legendary steam engine, powered her up and blasted the horn. Steam poured into the air, kids' eyes opened wide, cameras clicked and she was off.

At least one person in the crowd was reminded of a song sung long ago in a kindergarten classroom:



line play in Nebraska's 2012 elections? The proposed pipeline, which would move sand tar coal across a portion of the Sand Hills and the Ogallala Aquifer, is catching almost enough hellfire and brimstone to qualify as a Bible

story.

U.S. Sens. Ben Nelson and Mike Johanns have raised a variety of concerns about the thing, which many landowners and environmental interests have labeled as a project

whose environmental risks outweigh whatever financial benefits might spring from it.

The specter of oil polluting the aquifer is understandably cause for worry, both environmental and economic.

How do you clean up contamination of underground water?

Interestingly, the U.S. Department of State has yielded at least twice to demands for additional public meetings, so the citizenry can air their grievances and worries.

The federal Environmental Protection Agency recently told the State Department that the latter's analysis of the potential environmental impact of the pipeline was woefully inadequate. The State Department keeps saying its final recommendation the pipeline will come before the end of the year. A reading of political tea leaves would at least suggest that such might not be the case.

Countering the criticism of the pipeline are labor and business interests.

Costruction of so huge a thing means jobs by the score. Organized labor has downplayed potential risks, while ballyhooing the

What ground will Republican Senate hopefuls Don Stenberg and Jon Bruning stake out? Amid Democrats pointing fingers and clamoring over it, Bruning returned a \$2,500 political contribution to the pipeline company. (Republican Gov. Dave Heineman did the

Stenberg appears to have straddled the issue, saying a pipeline is needed, but that he opposes it in close proximity to the aquifer.

Democrat Nelson and Republican Johanns have effectively been on the warpath – though not walking companions – demanding more answers and information on the project.

In Nebraska politics, one would ordinarily expect candidates to stumble over each other yelling Huzzahs for any large-scale project connected to the magic words – economic development.

Nelson doesn't want to be accused of depriving Nebraskans of jobs, nor do any of the Republicans. But neither do any of them want their name connected with a project that has an honest potential for environmental havoc. It is hardly possible to overstate the importance of the Ogallala Aquifer to the Cornhusker state. Another Candidate for GOP Senate Nomination?

State Sen. Deb Fischer of Valentine might have declared her candidacy for the Republican nomination to the U.S. Senate by the time you find this column in your local newspaper.

Fischer made a name for herself during eight years in the Legislature. Her most noticeable achieving from enacting a law that will – for the first time – guarantee roads projects a share of the state's sales tax dollars.

She believes she can be a competitive fundraiser in the primary.

The Republican who ultimately challenges Nelson in the November election probably won't have to worry about money. The national GOP and several conservative groups have targeted Nelson as ripe for defeat if he seeks a third term.

To use the Retirement Estimator, you must have enough Social Security credits to qualify for benefits and you cannot be receiving benefits currently.



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"In Christ" (part 2)

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places in Christ..." (Ephesians 1:3). The Scriptures plainly show that every spiritual blessing available to us from God our Father is found "in Christ." We are so in need of all these spiritual blessings (blessings such as forgiveness, intercession, mercy, fellowship, salvation, hope, peace, victory). But what does it truly mean to be in Christ?

Before time began, God created a plan of salvation for all men (Ephesians 1:3-4). He knew that free will would lead us all to sin (Romans 3:23), and that we would require a Savior to die for our sins (Hebrews 9:11-22).

Jesus became the sacrificial Lamb for the sins of the world (Revelation 7:9-17; 1 Corinthians 5:7). Therefore, He went to the cross to shed his blood for the remission of our sins (Romans 5:6-11). To be "in Christ" is to be in His church. Je-

sus lovingly constructed the church, which is His body (Ephesians 1:22-23) and His family (Ephesians 2:19). We are there by His grace (Ephesians 2:8-10). We owe Him everything and gratitude should propel us to share the Gospel with the world (Matthew 28:18-20).

Since all spiritual blessings exist in Christ, we join with our new family, leaning on one another (Galatians 6:2) and uniting in Christ. We need to put an emphasis on this point. "Paul, an apostle of Jesus Christ by the will of God, to the saints who are in Ephesus, and faithful in Christ Jesus" (Ephesians 1:1). Paul became an apostle BY the will of God. We are saints, set apart BY Christ, as well.

If we read Ephesians 1:3-6, we see that the Lord added us to His body and we receive bountiful blessings, as a result. "In Him we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins, according to the riches of His grace" (Ephesians 1:7).

The Jews and Gentiles were historically at odds with one another. Yet Christ brought them together in the Cross (Ephe-

sians 2:11-17). He created "in Himself one new man from the two" (Ephesians 2:15). Christ did the work and we obey him to receive the available blessings.

Because of the work of Christ, "we are fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God" (Ephesians 2:19). Accordingly, we are "joined together" in Him (Ephesians 2:21). Collectively, and individually, we are to spend our time glorifying Christ by walking "worthy of the calling" of holiness (Ephesians 3:20-4:1).

By this point in the Ephesian letter, Paul has painstakingly stressed that Christ has built everything we need in His body to be saved, united and joyous. We read further in the next verses and we see the culmination. We must be "endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" (Ephesians 4:3). This is deeply profound.

Being "in Christ" means that we don't get together and decide to agree to disagree on doctrine and create our own unity. No! When we all get INTO Christ and we live by the faith, we become united. When we are all looking at one another, pointing fingers, we have taken our eyes off Christ.

Unity means "speaking the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment" (1 Corinthians 1:10). It is not OUR unity but the Lord's unity. Being "in Christ" they were united in peace and purpose.



Pam was thrown onto the roadside, suffering numerous injuries, including a broken neck that left her completely paralyzed from the chest down. Surgeons said she would never feel or move most of her body again.

The couple immediately began a prayer chain from their PhilandPamMorgan.com website that soon circled the globe. Much to the doctors' amazement, feeling and movement began to gradually return to Pam's lifeless limbs. Over the period of a year, she progressed from being wheelchair bound to walking unassisted. The specialists have no explanation for Pam's recovery, but the Morgans attribute her healing to the power of God.

Exactly one year after the accident, Phil and Pam walked into a Nashville studio to record a project entitled "Living Proof."

"When tragedy struck our family, God was the only One who got us through," Pam said. "My prayer is that through our story others will be motivated to walk with God everyday, no matter what life brings."

The Morgans message of hope and encouragement has touched lives around the world through recent media attention. Their story has been told on Oprah, Montel, TBN, Discovery Health's "Only A Miracle" and The 700 Club, as well as in many national newspapers and magazines.


DiGiacomo was 3-3 at the plate with two runs scored and


