Former Husker All-American to play CMC Tourney Friday

Community Medical Center's fourth annual "Golf Fore Good Health" event is set for Friday, June 27, at the Falls City Golf Club.

Hullman's Ford-Lincoln-Mercury, of Falls City, is the host sponsor this year. Through the charitable tournament, funds will be raised for the CMC Foundation, which ultimately will provide for future expansion of medical services, equipment and community health and wellness programs.

Husker legend, Heisman Trophy winner and College Football Hall of Famer Johnny Rodgers is the Celebrity Banquet Host and former Huskers Steve Taylor, an All-America quarterback in the late 1980s, and Clester Johnson, a receiver on two Nebraska National Championship teams in the 1990s, will appear and play golf, as will Peru State College Head Men's Basketball Coach Eric Behrens.

Husker quarterback in the mid- to late-1980s, earning All-Big Eight honors twice. As a senior, he earned All-America honors and was a Heisman candidate. He graduated as one of the NCAA's most prominent and prolific dual-threat quarterbacks, shattering numerous rushing and passing records.

As one of the most highly recruited high school athletes, Steve had the task of choosing a university that would facilitate both his academic and athletic endeavors. Out of nearly 100 offers, Steve

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'We all feel betrayed'

Former Deputy confesses to staging events, shooting himself

Six handcuffed and shackled orange-clad prisoners were escorted from the elevator at the second floor of the Richardson County Courthouse Monday morning and one by one shuffled directly passed Sheriff Randy Houser en route to appearances before Judge Curtis Maschman.

There should've been seven. "Josh, too," a somber Houser said to the deputy in charge of the transfer.

"Josh," being one of the Sheriff's own, whose job duties once included such jailhouse transfers, was in reference to Josh Nincehelser, a 25-year-old Humboldt man deputized by Houser himself three years ago this month. Houser was calling for Josh, but not his assistance, as the former deputy last Friday traded his badge for handcuffs and his uniform for prisoner orange. The officer is now an inmate.

Nincehelser was arrested without incident at about 1:30 p.m. Friday at his home in Dawson and, according to Houser, confessed to staging the well-publicized events of June 9, when the then-deputy suffered a bullet wound in a supposed shoot-out with an unidentified Hispanic gunman on a dark, deserted county road near Humboldt.

There was no Hispanic gun-Steve Taylor was a standout man - Nincehelser shot himself, fired several shots into his patrol vehicle, and called dispatch to report the false tale, which included an unsuccessful attempt to apprehend the fleeing suspect. Nincehelser was later taken to a Lincoln hospital; meanwhile various law enforcement agencies, including the U.S. Dept. of Homeland Security, searched for an imaginary gun-

> How long they actually searched is unclear, but Houser hinted that authorities had problems with Nincehelser's story from the very beginning.

"There were several items that didn't add up," Houser said. "But

until there was a confession, I was going to stand by my guy."

Nebraska State Patrol investigators one day after the incident plotted the trajectories of the bullets that struck Nincehelser's vehicle and determined that the bullets were fired from a higher point than could've been possible if fired by a person seated in a car. Later, report.

shell casings found at the scene were determined to have been fired by two different guns, though both weapons proved to be property of the Richardson County Sheriff's Office. Forensic technicians determined that the .40 caliber shell casing claimed by Nincehelser to be fired by the unknown assailant had actually been fired by his department-issued pistol. It was retrieved, from Nincehelser, on June 12.

When confronted about the shell casings and questionable trajectories of the bullets, Nincehelser, according to the arrest affidavit, confessed that the entire thing had been staged and he had falsely radioed his emergency to dispatch.

Houser said that Nincehelser's admission included a motive, but would not divulge that information with this reporter.

Houser, who recognized Nincehelser, a 2007 Humboldt-TR-S High School graduate, with a certificate of commendation just one year ago, was noticeably disheartened when reached by phone shortly after the arrest Friday, and similarly doleful Monday. The ordeal comes on the heels of a primary election loss and marrs the last few months of his term.

"We all feel betrayed," he said. "This is someone we were close to and believed in.

Shortly after signaling to his deputy for Nincehelser's Monday court appearance, Houser himself retrieved his former deputy and escorted him to County Court for a bond reduction hearing. Maschman denied the request and Nincehelser as of Monday evening remained in Richardson County jail on \$50,000 bond (10 percent allowable). He faces felony charges of criminal mischief and use of a firearm to commit a felony, as well as misdemeanor charges of false reporting, obstructing government operations and abuse of public records. He is set to be arraigned in County Court at 10 a.m. Monday, July 14.

"He has lost so much, his pension and job," Houser said. "He had so much promise and opportunity. He is tremendously disappointed and embarrassed."

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Somehow, driver escapes major injury when car split in two

A seatbelt couldn't prevent a 57-year-old Falls City woman from being ejected from her vehicle as it got split in two halves by a grain truck, yet she walked away from the most violent of car crashes with little more than a cut on her head.

Somehow, Katherine Elwonger, of 924 Lane St., is able to give a first-hand account of a car collision as extreme as they come. At about 4:30 p.m. last Tuesday (June 16), Elwonger was eastbound on Hwy. 8, apparently didn't stop at the intersection with Hwy. 75, and was hit flush by a northbound grain truck with such force that the Taurus was actually split in half, one piece eventually coming to rest 75 feet from the other piece.

"It tore in half like it went through a buzzsaw," Richardson County Sheriff Randy Houser said.

Elwonger was ejected, despite wearing her seatbelt.

The crash forced her driver's seat to collapse all the way back, in the lie down position, making

The Historic Grand Weaver Hotel Courthouse Square Falls City, NE • 402•245•2448







The John P. Falter Museum, which is in the works, will be a great addition to the preservation of Falls City and Richardson County history. John, who was labeled the greatest illustrator of his time by fellow famous artist Norman Rockwell, put us on the map with his memorable Christmas 1946 Saturday Evening Post cover of our Main Drag, and with the public television production of "View from the Water Tower" which went nationwide. He and I were friends and occasionally exchanged letters. John wanted to keep up with anything extraordinary happening in Falls City and occasionally I supplied him with details. He was as common as you and I and had a great sense of humor, which you most certainly could detect in his oodles of Saturday Evening Post covers.

We got a super preview of what's to come in the great reception of the opening of the John P. Falter Art Review Saturday at the Stalder Art Gallery with excellent presentations by Dobey Falter Haws and Barbara Frost Hemphill.

We should step up our promotion of what we have historically.

The Richardson County Historical Museum with its ag annex at 14th and Chase Street has to rank up there with the best of them. It is a two-story facility filled with interesting artifacts and is extremely well maintained and staffed by members of the Richardson County Historical Society.

The community's rich military history is well documented. Thanks to the late Marshall Maddox, there is a museum of World War II and National Guard artifacts including uniforms of the era. On the southeast corner of the Courthouse Square there are memorial plaques of Richardson County men killed in World War II, the Korean War, Vietnam War and the Iraq War. All told, 74 names are inscribed. In the 700 block on Harlan Street we have a War Memorial Park with vehicles of World War II and Korean War vintage which is well maintained by several members of the Ceremonial Honor Guard. The east wall and the wall of steps leading into the park are faced with hundreds of bricks engraved with the names of veterans, their years of service and their branch of service. The bricks were paid for by families and friends of the veterans.

The historic Stanton Lake Park is something to be proud of. The Crystal Beach swimming pool, the ice house and the big dance hall are gone but the unique home of the late Charles and Sally Stanton has been renovated and is rented out for receptions, family gatherings, meetings, etc. Fishermen still cast lines and reel in prizes which can be enhanced. The Fiedler all-weather path surrounds the lake and is a favorite of many walkers. During the summer the trailer park section sees lots of RVs and more often than not their inhabitants leave with a good taste in their mouths.

A Stanton Lake incident not too many will remember. It was 1934 or 1935, a period of extreme drought. The Nemaha River, source of our water supply, went dry and so did our water taps. Stanton Lake had a great water well and residents without their own well lined up at the well with every kind of water jug to draw water. I don't recall how our water supply was restored but it was after a couple of days.

It's not historic, but the Itha Krumme Arboretum, located on the south side entrance to Stanton Lake Park, with its native plants and shrubs and a concrete path, draws visitors and much favorable com-

The Mini Park in the 1500 block on Stone Street is not exactly historic in years but it sure is in content with its excellent colored mural panels depicting Falls City history. Each of the panels represents a period of history in Falls City. It was Mary Whitehouse's brain storm 30 years ago. It's unique.

Hotel Weaver, which dates back to the 1920's, now has been beautifully refurbished into the Grand Weaver Hotel by its owner Mitch Glasier and the accommodations are superb. A few of us can remember what a madhouse the hotel lobby was during the oil boom in the early 1940s (it was owned by Tony and Catherine Schroedl) when "oil men" from Kansas, Texas and Oklahoma, were trying to outdeal each other on oil and gas leases.

This incident is only historic in my own mind but it concerns Hotel Weaver. The Journal then fitted into a cubbyhole at 108 East 16th Street and we (I was a minor employee) had an eager young advertising salesman who got together with the Chamber of Commerce for a Thanksgiving promotion to bring people to town. And it sure did. John Thompson and a couple of helpers took a dozen turkeys to the roof of the hotel and tossed them one by one, flying, down into the crowd. The lucky catchers had the makings of a nice turkey dinner. There was no Humane Society around in those days but our town was full of turkey lovers and the negative outcry grew so intense the turkey toss was never repeated. And young Mr. Thompson had a new nickname,"Turkey John." As I said, historic only in my mind.

This bit of recall and tourism promotion wouldn't be complete without my recollection of an historic trickling body of water, with an unprintable alias, which originated around 16th Street between Morton and Wilson and ran south out of town. Mercifully, it was buried out of existence by a government-sponsored beautification project.

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Historic horse racing: Reviving an industry or beating a dead horse?

Proponents say it's an attempt to revive a tradition that started 80 years ago when Nebraskans first approved pari-mutuel gambling on horse races. Opponents see it as simply another way to expand gambling. Folks from both sides

agree that it's a good thing to let the voters decide the matter in the November election, although opponent Pat

Loontjer of Gambling With the Good Life says that out-of-state money for advertising will swamp any efforts to defeat the measure. She also predicts that Nebraska Indian tribes will seize the opportunity and open their own outlets for instant racing. But Mike Kelley, a lobbyist for Nebraska horse trainers and owners, predicted the opposite. He said out-of-state casino gambling interests would invest heavily to defeat the new competition that betting on historical horse races would provide.

Much of Nebraska's colorful Thoroughbred racing centered on Omaha's Ak-Sar-Ben for more than 70 years. The Coliseum was a popular spot for ice hockey and big name entertainment. It also housed a cinema-sized screen and betting windows to handle fan overflow. In its heyday, Ak-Sar-Ben was tenth in the nation in attendance with \$2 million per day bet on weekends by an estimated 25,000

Dog racing began across the river in Iowa in 1986 and other forms of gambling soon followed, marking the eventual end of Ak-Sar-Ben and a decline for the state's other tracks in Columbus, Lincoln and Grand Island. Following the closure of the racetrack, a simulcast facility, Horsemen's Park, was opened in Omaha in 1998. The horse racing industry in Nebraska is now confined to live racing dates rotating from Fonner Park in Grand Island, to the Lincoln Race Course in Lincoln, and finishing at Agricultural Park in Columbus, plus a four-day meet at Horseman's Park to allow that facility to keep its simul-

casting license. As he has before, Omaha Senator Scott Lautenbaugh carried the water on the latest proposal. Governor Dave Heineman vetoed his 2012 proposal that would have allowed the State Racing Commission to license and regulate historic horse racing. He said the measure raised constitutional issues. Lawmakers failed to override the veto. This year's version, passed 30-17 by lawmakers in May, proposed a constitutional amendment to allow voters to decide. That didn't need the governor's approval.

Lautenbaugh knows it's a gamble to put it before voters. In 2004, voters rejected two proposals to allow casino gambling in Nebraska and in 2006 they defeated a plan to allow video keno in the state. Casino gambling available in border states seems to be satisfying the whims of those who want a faster-paced gaming experience.

He said the measure would resolve any constitutional concerns by amending the Nebraska Constitution to allow betting on "live or replayed" races at state racetracks. If approved by voters, the Legislature would have to revisit the issue next year and create implementation laws. He says allowing the new video wagering terminals would increase revenue for horse racing, which would boost purses for Thoroughbred owners and increase live races and jobs in the industry.

He said the Instant Racing terminals allow bettors to place wagers on previously run races after being provided the racing history of the horses and jockeys involved in the rebroadcast races. The identities of the horses and riders are changed to guard against bettors recalling the outcomes of old races. The terminals can be programmed to show only the final seconds of a race, thus allowing

more bets per hour. Despite legal challenges, Instant Racing betting has been lucrative in Kentucky, generating an additional \$41 million in

revenue and \$5.7 million for purses since the terwere minals

installed at two racetracks in 2011. In Nebraska, proponents are hoping to raise enough money to build a new racetrack in Lincoln to replace the track that closed after the Nebraska State Fair moved to Grand Island.

The world is a different place than it was in 1934. Entertainment opportunities and interests have changed markedly since 1986. The amount of options available on computers and smart phones have killed video stores and taken a bite out of revenues at movie theaters and record stores. Much of what we would call "old school" has just become "old."

Voters must decide if betting on historical horse races will amount to reviving an industry or just beating a dead horse.

chose the University of Nebraska-Lincoln because of its strong tradition of graduating its players as well as its steep tradition of football excellence.

He loved it enough to stay - after playing professional football in Canada for eight years, Taylor returned to Lincoln and has built a reputation in real estate that rivals that of his football glory. That said, the Californian-turned-Nebraskan will be making his first trip to Falls City.

""I have not been to Falls City, or at least not that I can recall," Taylor said Monday, when reached by phone. "I talked with Linda and know of Coach (William) Reed from his time at Omaha; I look forward to coming down and am excited to have a good time for a worthy cause. The people seem great also. They are very courteous and excited."

While at San Diego's Lincoln High School, Steve broke many of Marcus Allen's passing and rushing records while leading his team to a city championship.

Following his collegiate campaign, Steve signed a multi-year contract with the Edmonton Eskimo Dynasty of the Canadian Football League and was still drafted by the Indianapolis Colts in the NFL a month later.

During Steve's 8-year CFL career, he appeared in three Grey Cup games and his team was crowned champion in 1992.

Now a champion real estate professional in Lincoln, Steve continues to break records...living proof that diligence and positive thought pays off.

Rodgers, the 1972 Heisman Trophy winner, came to the University of Nebraska from Omaha Tech and became one of the most exciting players to ever play for the Huskers.

Earning All Big-Eight honors as a sophomore slotback and wide receiver in 1970, Rodgers blossomed as a national star in 1971 to help lead Nebraska to its second consecutive national championship.

It was Rodgers' sensational 72-yard punt return for the first touchdown that ignited the Huskers' thrilling 35-31 victory over Oklahoma in the "Game of the Century" in 1971. His 77-yard punt return touchdown against Alabama helped trigger the 38-6 Orange Bowl victory that sewed up Nebraska's second national title.

Capping a tremendous career with a fantastic final performance, Rodgers devastated Notre Dame in the 1973 Orange Bowl. In the most sensational finale ever for a Heisman winner, Rodgers moved into the I-back spot and blitzed the Irish with four touchdowns, runs of eight, four and five yards, and a 50-yard pass from quarterback Dave Humm. Rodgers passed for another, a 52-yard strike to Frosty Anderson. Rodgers' point total set an Orange Bowl record.

The top pass receiver and kick return man in Big Eight history, Rodgers owns 41 school records, seven conference records and four NCAA records. Rodgers was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame on Dec. 14, 2000, in New York. More recently, Rodgers was one of six Huskers named to Sports Illustrated's 85-player All-Century Team, joining Mike Rozier, Rich Glover, Dean Steinkuhler, Tommie Frazier and Aaron Taylor.

Rodgers, who still holds NCAA records for punt return touchdowns in a career (seven) and most career kick return touchdowns (nine), ranks as Nebraska's all-time leading pass receiver with 143 catches for 2,479 yards, and ranks fifth in points with 264 on 44 touchdowns in his career. In all, he currently holds or shares 41 school records, including most career all-purpose yards (5,586), most touchdown receptions in a season (11) and career (25) and most receiving yards in a career (2,479).

Rodgers lives in Omaha, and is active with the Johnny Rodgers Youth Foundation, the National College Johnny "The Jet" Rodgers Return Specialist Award and his company, Jetwear.

Clester Johnson, the 1991 Athlete of the Year in highschool at Bellevue West, was recruited as a quarterback to the University of Nebraska. After sitting out as a redshirt in 1991, Johnson was suddenly no longer a quarterback. Tommie Frazier, Brook Berringer and Matt Turman had that position nailed down for the Huskers.

Johnson went to the 1992 Orange Bowl and practiced as a defensive back and worked as a DB that next spring, surrounded by Eric Stokes, Mike Minter, Octavious McFarland, Tony Veland, Michael Booker and a lot of other talented guys.

Though his heart was still on offense Johnson made the transition to wingback in the fall of 1992 and that's where he finished four seasons later. There was a ton of talent at receiver, too, Reggie Baul, Mark Gilman, Jon Vedral, Brendan Holbein and Kenny Cheatham were just a few of the receivers at Nebraska at the time.

Johnson was the leading receiver for the 1995 national championship team. He grabbed 22 passes for 367 yards and two touchdowns. He caught two passes for 43 yards in the Fiesta Bowl blasting of Florida

Johnson considered pro football, but after Berringer, a close friend, died in the spring of 1996 and some other issues popped up, Johnson chose the field of business and investments. He resides in Omaha and spends time watching his sons Cade and Clester, Jr. grow with athletics just like he did. He was inducted into the Nebraska High School Sports Hall of Fame in 2012.

Eric Behrens has spent the last 13 years as head boys' basketball coach at Omaha Central High School where his teams have captured seven state titles. The Central High Eagles defeated Bellevue West in overtime games in 2006 and 2007 to earn Class A crownsthe first since 1975. They defeated Bellevue East in 2008 to make it three in a row.

The Eagles started a four-year run of state championships in 2010 with a victory over Norfolk. Behrens' teams defeated Omaha Bryan in 2011, Omaha South in 2012 and Papillion La-Vista in 2013 to claim three more titles.

During those seven championships seasons, the Eagles' combined record was 173-25. Behrens' overall record as head coach is 283-58.

Behrens was named 2007 Boys High School Coach of the Year by the Omaha World-Herald and 2008 Boys High School Coach of the Year by the Lincoln Journal Star. He was also named Metro Basketball Coaches Assocation's Class A Boy's Coach of the Year in 2006, 2007, 2011, and 2013.

The public is welcome and invited to watch the celebrities and teams of local golfers as they make

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

Free home safety checks available for area seniors

"An annual safety check can help seniors avoid dangers that could threaten their independence," said Houdek. 

'Thinking About Health'

Pushing back against high-priced meds

Many Americans have begun to realize they're paying too much for prescription drugs. And maybe---just maybe---a national conversation on the topic has begun, sparked by the introduction last year of Sovaldi, touted as the most effective way to treat patients with hepatitis C.

The problem is Sovaldi's hefty price tag---\$84,000 for a three-month regimen---and the fact that insurers have begun factoring the price they are paying for the drug into the premiums all of us will pay for health insurance in the next few years. UnitedHealth Group announced it had already paid \$100 million to cover Sovaldi for its policyholders in the first three months of this year.

To get an idea how Sovaldi could crowd out spending for other healthcare needs, let's look at Oregon. One of the state's Medicaid managed care organizations noted that if 30 percent, or 814 members out of a total of 2,466 with hepatitis C, got the drug, the cost would be about \$68 million. Compare this to the \$72 million the health plan spent for all its pharmaceuticals last year, and you get the point.

I have written about Sovaldi before in a "Thinking About Health" column. Since then a Washington-based group called the National Coalition on Health Care, which counts insurers, employers, unions, providers, and faith-based organizations among its members, has launched the Campaign for Sustainable Rx Pricing. CEO John Rother says it's an effort to discuss possible solutions for rapidly escalating drug prices. Rother, who is the former chief lobbyist for AARP, and helped pass the Medicare prescription drug law a decade ago,

knows a thing or two about drugs.

He told me that since the drug law passed, price increases have been held in check largely because of the greater use of generic substitutes. Not so any more with the debut of Sovaldi and with some 200 specialty drugs in the pipeline, which may be priced as high as Sovaldi. The country, he says, is headed down an unsustainable path when it comes to paying for medicines.

As a country we've rarely asked whether paying for these super highpriced drugs means we may have to forego other healthcare services. Insurers, employers, Medicare and Medicaid have rarely blinked. They've just paid the bills. Nor have payers always carefully scrutinized the evidence that a new expensive medicine actually did what the drug maker claimed it would do. They paid even when there was little evidence a drug was effective. This time it's different.

The California Technology Assessment Forum, a private group funded by insurers, has recommended that Sovaldi be used only for the sickest patients. In Oregon the Center for Evidence-Based Policy established by the governor a decade ago and based at the Oregon Health & Science University has said there have been no long-term trials, and many of those trials that have taken place were laced with conflicts of interest. It recommends more comparative studies and restricting use for now.

The U.S. has no official oversight agency like the National Institute for Health and Care Excellence (NICE) in the U.K., which evaluates new drugs and technologies and makes recommendations to the National Health Service. NICE will complete its review in the fall. Meanwhile the British health service is paying the equivalent of \$32 million to treat 500 of the sickest patients.

There's zero chance the U.S. will adopt a NICE-like organization any time soon. The Affordable Care Act prohibits the Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Institute, created by the ACA, from considering costs when it evaluates the effectiveness of various treatments. And Medicare is not allowed to consider cost in deciding whether to cover a drug or a device. The government's hands are tied.

Rother's group will have to figure out a way to evaluate cost and effectiveness within the health system's political boundaries. That won't be easy, and the drug industry is pushing back. Drug makers want the government to make insurers absorb the extra cost rather than passing them along to patients in the form of higher copays and coinsurance for those who need the drug.

That's not really a solution, Rother says. "High-cost drugs raise premiums and threaten funding for important health services. Ultimately the individual pays the costs one way or another. The fundamental problem is the unnecessary high prices of some drugs, not which pocket the consumer uses to pay for them."

With fireworks sales often come wildfires

The nation's birthday is a time of celebration – picnics, ball games and fireworks. As fireworks sales begin across the state, fire-safety officials say it's a good time to review wildland fire safety measures.

Fireworks routinely cause wildfires. Just one careless, stray spark can burn thousands of acres and cause needless injuries. Last year, fireworks caused 57 fires in Nebraska, which resulted in \$285,365 in losses, according to statistics provided by the Nebraska State Fire Marshal's office.

"We want Nebraskans to keep their Independence Day celebrations both memorable and safe by following basic fire safety precautions," said Mike Morgan, wildland fire prevention associate with the Nebraska Forest Service. "The largest number of outdoor fires associated with fireworks involve grass and brush fires. Combine that with the dry conditions in Nebraska

during the summer and you create suitable conditions for wildland fires."

Even though recent rains helped some areas of Nebraska return to a normal wildfire season, others continue to experience increased fire danger. Since wildfire season began in mid-April, Nebraska has declared extreme fire danger alerts during 43 percent of that period.

utilized to locate issues in the sewer lines. The pool's water level was lowered slightly and a portion of the cement deck was removed to access the broken elbow. The connection was fixed Thursday and the pool was closed Friday to allow the sealant to cure.

Pool Manager Roger Lampe said the way the pool was built, with tons of rock and tile forming the foundation, prevented the water leak from creating any sinkholes or washouts of rock around the leak. All the water leaked from the pool went into the sewer system.

The heavy-duty design of the plumbing - namely, the elbow connection - indicates only a major strain from a source such as heavy machinery (used to "move tons of rock and tile") could cause the thick commercial-grade pipe to fail. The pool was built and opened for business in 2007.

The FCAP will be open from 1-8 p.m. the remainder of the summer.







Tornado warning sirens confuse some Richardson County residents

At least one tornado was reported with a storm that swept through much of Southeast Nebraska on the evening of June 3. The tornadic storm impacted Richardson County prompting sirens to sound in our area. Many Falls City, Salem and Rulo residents were left asking why sirens sounded on a storm that was traveling along the western part of the county, moving into

As the sirens sounded some Richardson County residents took to Facebook to find out what was going. The Richardson County Emergency Management Facebook page sent out the following message: "Tornado Warning for Falls City, Salem and Rulo," soon after the previous tornado warning for western Richardson County was allowed to expire. Residents were left confused as to why no local news outlets were reporting the warning and why their NOAA weather radio also didn't sound. Richardson County Emergency Management Deputy Director, John Moon III explained last week that the tornado warning for western Richardson County was set to expire at 10:45 p.m.. This warning had been placed at 10:12 p.m. for Southern Pawnee County and Southwestern Richardson County. The areas around DuBois and Camp Cornhusker were told to seek shelter immedi-

ately. After the warning expired, the storm still showed signs of possible rotation. The motion of the storm veered to the northeast instead of the southeast. Due to the new radar information and this change of direction, Emergency Management Director, Brian Dixon decided to sound the sirens in the communities of Salem, Falls City and Rulo.

The storm then weakened to the west of Falls City, changed direction again and went to the southeast were it regained strength causing significant damage in Brown County, KS. "This is a prime example of the unpredictability of tornadic storms, even with modern day technology," said Deputy Directory John Moon III. He went on to remind the community that the primary purpose of the outdoor warning sires are to warn those that are outside. Outdoor warning sirens are often not heard very well indoors. These sirens are used to alert as many people as possible of the potentially hazardous events such as: tornadoes, radiological releases, or hazardous material events.

When the sirens sound it is your cue to go indoors and monitor local media for additional information and instructions. A NOAA Weather Radio is the preferred information source.

Richardson County residents were also left wondering when it was safe to emerge from their

shelters. Local and surrounding media outlets were not reporting on the warning and didn't give clear information on whether it was safe to come out of our basements.

Moon explained, "Unfortunately there is no all clear siren. The sirens back in civil defense days did have an all clear siren sound, but due to confusion modern sirens no longer have this feature. When a siren sounds in Richardson County it will last for 3 minutes. It is possible that a siren will sound more than once. It is best to take shelter until the threat has passed. It is recommended that you wait at least 15 minutes until the last siren has stopped sounding before emerging from your shelter."

The next outdoor siren test is scheduled for 10 a.m. Saturday, July 5, depending on the weather at that time.



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

it possible for her body to shoot from under the restraint and fly head-first, face-up in the direction of where the rest of her car used to be. And what was once a backseat had become open air, but eventually pavement.

"As far as I know, she only suffered a laceration on the back of her head," Houser said.

Several attempts to contact Elwonger throughout the day Monday were unsuccessful.

The driver of the semi-truck, Lavon Knippelmeyer, 60, of Johnson, was uninjured.

In addition to the Richardson County Sheriff's Office, the FC Volunteer Ambulance Squad, Dawson Fire Dept. and Richardson County Emergency Management responded to the scene.

Houser complemented EMD Brian Dixon for accessing the Nebraska Dept. of Roads camera at the intersection, which gave responders essential information about the accident and potential injuries before they even arrived on the scene.

"As really bad as accidents are, this one was really a blessing," Houser said.
