

Shubert residents concerned about water supply

a city council meeting regarding pivot irrigation lowering the town's water supply. The people of Shubert have been concerned about their water supply for

quite some time, even bringing up their concerns to the Nemaha Natural Resources District last year.

According to the NRD meeting minutes, the issue goes back to the spring of 2015 when two permits were approved for a Richardson County farmer who irrigates near Shubert.

On September 10, 2015, during the regular NRD monthly meeting; Chuck Wingert, NRD Water Resources Manager, reviewed issues regarding Shubert's problems with pumping air in August of 2015. He pointed out the locations of nearby irrigation and domestic wells in relation to the public water supply well. However, he added that there was not conclusive evidence that this was the cause of Shubert's problems.

In October 2015, Wingert updated the NRD Board on the Shubert Public Water Well Supply Well Concern. Pumps tests were done in that area on October 7, 2015; the transducers would be removed on October 9. The information would be sent to LBG to determine whether these irrigation wells are impacting the public wells.

During the November 2015 meeting, it was reported that the committee met with several concerned citizens from Shubert and Stella. Residents were asked to report any issues to the NRD so they were aware. Wingert stated that the report was somewhat inconclusive and things needed to be checked into, and further investigation needed

Last Thursday, June 23, the Village of Shubert held to be done to determine if there were any problems with well screens. The committee discussed installing some transducers in Shubert wells to provide more continuous water level data. The report also

> told the irrigators that there might not be as much water available as they had hoped. Winger said they would continue to work with area residents and measure any wells they would like measured.

> The board agreed to work with the public water supplier to come up with an emergency plan in the event of a water shortage situation. They also discussed the option to monitor wells, questioning whether a plugged screen was the problem. Director, Lisa Beethe asked if the NRD is going to do any of the other controlled tests mentioned in the report. She questioned if it was the responsibility of the NRD. Bob Hilske, NRD Manager, explained that they hoped to find out; what impact the irrigation wells had on the Village wells; provide information to the irrigator so he knew what risk he may get into; and help Shubert manage their water system to reduce the risk of low water levels in their wells.

> In February 2016, another local farmer applied for two permits for irrigation. Director, Jim Gerweck commented on concerns expressed by neighbors about the wells. He

suggested waiting until March to allow some of the domestic wells in that area to be registered so they could get a focus on the problem that is perceived by the public and many board members. There was concern from guests who asked if the NRD could limit the

City Council says yay to Smokin' on the Bricks, nay to fireworks

The Falls City, City Council met on Monday, June 20 for a brief but jam packed meeting.

Mayor Jerry Oliver began the night with some good news. During the Mayor's report he announced that the District Court has ruled in favor of the City, Consolidated Grain and Barge and the Community Redevelopment Authority. The ruling is in favor of 11 of the 12 causes of action stemming from a 2012 injunction suit filed by Salem Grain, David Leon Frederick and William Lester. The lawsuit was filed to try to halt the expansion of CGB into Falls City. A trial on the remaining cause of action is set to begin on June 28 and is expected to last three days.

Eric Froeschl asked the Council for a Special Designated Liquor License for the free Smokin' on Stone event to be held on July 8 and July 9, 2016. The event will be held between 18th and 20th and Stone Streets, in a gated off area. The license was approved, seven yes, one no.

Marc Merz requested to put a sign up at Stanton Lake for the new Disc Golf Course at no cost to the city. Merz also informed the Council that the Falls City Library would have disc golf equipment for people to check out and use. Motion was unanimously approved.

Rick Lemerond requested funds for the fireworks show he oversees each year. The display is the only display held in Falls City each year. Lemerond said an estimated 700 to 1,100 people attend the firework show on the north end of town. "This is bringing people to town, not a donation," said Lemerond.

He added that a few merchants donate extra funds each year just to keep the event going but he can't rely on that generosity forever. The Council said the budget committee may consider a donation for next year but they wouldn't be able to do anything this year.



Prison escape, employee stress shaping correction's reform Capitol

The way I see it, details from the recent escape at the Lincoln Correctional Center played out like the script of one of those grainy black-and-white B movies of years ago. Two inmates hid in laundry carts, which were loaded on a truck and hauled out of the prison on an otherwise unassuming Friday morning.

Several miles later, they climbed out of the truck at a traffic light and stole a nearby pickup, which they later crashed into an SUV and fled on foot. That started a massive manhunt, which led to the capture of one inmate in Lincoln the next day and the other several days later in Omaha.

Sorry guys, not an original plot. Mexico's most notorious drug lord did the same thing 15 years ago. In 2001, Joaquin "El Chapo" Guzman escaped from a high-security prison in a laundry cart. It took authorities 13 years to catch him. Seventeen months later he crawled through a hole in the shower of a maximum-security prison and vanished through a mile-long tunnel, which had apparently been built for him.

He's back behind bars again as Mexican officials investigate who helped him escape. In the Nebraska case, Correction's Director Scott Frakes said the two convicts were able to escape because Corrections staff failed to follow procedure. The two apparently talked the guard at the turnkey into letting them in to the laundry "to work" even though their names were not on the list of approved workers. That was one of several failures to follow procedure he said.

The escapes came at a time when prison critics and spokesmen for the prison worker's union are complaining that staffing levels are inadequate at the prisons and employees are being forced to work overtime. A spokesman for the governor said the prison was fully staffed at the time of the escape, and neither of the two employees that officials said failed to follow procedure

was working overtime. At a hearing of the special legislative committee investigating prison reform, a few days after the escape, state Ombudsman Marshall Lux gave senators an email his office received from a prison employee who said the prisons have been critically understaffed for at least six years. Very little has been done to solve the problem, said the employee -- who Lux did not name -adding that lack of staff allows inmates to pay attention to gaps in security and then take advantage of them.

The committee met with Frakes to discuss how much money is needed to fix the system. Frakes hasn't pegged a number yet while he continues doing analysis and studies. He's working on changing the culture of the prison system. Senators Paul Schumacher of Columbus and Ernie Chambers of Omaha are among those pushing for answers. At one point, Chambers left the meeting in frustration with Frakes' inability -- or unwillingness -- to address the money issue.

The committee drafted a letter claiming that the state employees union blamed the June 10 escape on understaffing. The letter also said that high levels of turnover have led to large amounts of overtime and have overextended prison staff, putting them and the community at risk.

Schumacher said he wants to make sure that the administration earmarks money in the next budget for emergency funding to hire and train additional corrections officers for Nebraska's prisons. The Columbus lawmaker said he fears some will try to keep that money for property tax relief.

The letter to the governor noted numerous recent incidents of violence -- more than a handful of attacks on guards by inmates -- as well as the

Mother's Day 2015 riot at the Tecumseh prison that left two dead, several injured and hundreds of thousands of dollars in damages to the state's maximum security prison.

Narrowing in on the Lincoln escape, the letter called for immediate action "to assure Nebraskans that these lapses of security will not be tolerated -- not one more day."

The Legislature has given Corrections \$1.5 million to use to retain employees. The union wanted it used to retain people through merit increases and bonuses. Frakes said the most successful and enduring organizations devote time, energy and money to retaining employees. Thus, he has chosen to use the money for training and professional development opportunities for all levels of staff. He said the resources will help employees cope with challenges and stress unique to prison work as well as wellness amenities and a commuting bonus for people who work at the Tecumseh prison.

The warden and two employees at the Lincoln Correctional Center have been moved to desk jobs in central administration while a team of prison officials from Virginia -- where former Nebraska Correction's Director Harold Clarke now runs the show -- are investigating what went wrong here.

More money for retention and training of employees and maybe hiring additional employees sounds good. But you know what even sounds better? Getting all the employees to follow established rules and regulations. Testing and drilling them on it frequently. Keeping them aware of the clientele.

Most importantly, not being conned by the convicts.

amount they pumped.

Chuck Wingert, Water Resources Manager, said the NRD cannot limit the flow rate, but there could be an allocation. However, there would have to be a significant drop in the water table to prove that before determination. Other neighbors were concerned that their domestic wells should be allowed to be concerned as an amendment to the rules. The board explained that they could not change the rules for this situation since any changes would require a public hearing first.

It was concluded during the March 2016, meeting that the two well permits carried over from February would be approved. There was a report given on the installation of the transducer in the newer well and issues with installing one in the older well. The Village of Shubert requested the NRD help by paying to make changes to the older well to allow the transducer to be installed and also to provide a laptop or tablet for their use in recording readings. The quote for the work needed on the well was \$4,100, and a laptop was estimated

In April of this year, A bid from Rieschick Drilling Co. of \$2,050.00 to provide assistance to Shubert to install transducers was approved by the NRD. The action did not include the requested amount to cover a laptop for the Village. The Village wouldn't agree to provide or match funds for the project. The committee started looking into everything that needed to be addressed and talked about educating the well managers to help them operate better. It was stressed by the board that they're not trying to make a rule to address every potential situation. They are pushing to add some extra meetings to continue moving forward and address the changes in a quicker manner.

Shubert currently has two working wells and is running on the smaller of the two. A 35-gallon per minute well located in Shubert. The well, once designed to pump 150 gallons per minutes, ran at 90 until it was turned down to 35. The second and larger 100 gallon per minute well is located south of Shubert. The larger of the two wells is currently losing water.

The Village of Shubert is using about 20,000 gallons per day

- leaving the 35 gallons per minute well fully capable of handling Shubert's current needs. During the meeting the Board asked about whether a voluntary water restriction was needed but it was decided that those type of measures don't need to be taken at this time. No answers were found as to why the larger well was losing water. The pivot irrigation system operated by the local farmer suspected of lowering Shubert's water supply has been shut off for the time being. It was decided to keep an eye on the issue throughout the summer and readdress the matter at the end of summer to determine what steps need to be taken.

The farmer at the center of the issue said he would continue to work closely with the village water operator and NRD about their irrigation times of usage, to assist them in their monitoring of the water levels at the village wells.

According to information drawn from the 2007 Census of Agriculture and the USDA 2008 Farm and Ranch Irrigation Survey; About 80 percent of the state's public drinking water and nearly all of its private water supply are from ground water sources. Nebraska had at that time more than 100,000 registered irrigation wells and an additional 16,000 registered water wells. As of 2007, Nebraska had 8.56 million irrigated wells with Richardson County being one of the lowest counties in the state with only 2,180. Between 2002 and 2007 agricultural census years, Nebraska's irrigated base expanded by 934,000 acres, moving it ahead of Califor-

Of approximately 55 million acres under irrigation nationally, about 15 percent are located in Nebraska. It appears that the NRD approved approximately 25 wells in our area from May 2015 to April 2016.

Accelerating Roads Construction

Whether you're taking your children to school, driving to work, or moving equipment for your farm or ranch, infrastructure helps to connect Nebraskans to their communities and one another. Our quality of life and top industries depend on a 21st-century infrastructure.

Over the course of the first year and a half of my administration, I have

prioritized roads because they are one of the key ways we support the efforts of farmers, entrepreneurs, small business owners, and all Nebraskans who are working to grow our state. Last summer, the Nebraska Department of Roads (NDOR) and I announced the state would return additional roads funding to local governments through the state's federal funds swap program. This session, we successfully worked with the Legislature to pass the Transportation Innovation Act, which aims to accelerate construction of the state's expressway system, help facilitate bridge repair, and support infrastructure projects tied to economic development goals.



In the last couple weeks, the Nebraska Department of Roads and I highlighted major updates to the state's roads standards recently approved by my office and the Nebraska Board of Public Roads Classifications and

Standards (NBCS). This revision modernizes Nebraska's requirements

for new construction and preservation of state highways, county roads, and municipal streets in Nebraska.

The revisions do three things: First, they give counties and municipalities access to the Resurfacing, Restoration, and Rehabilitation Standards, also known as the "3R Standards." Second, it completes comprehensive updates to the minimum design standards (MDS) for all public roadways in Nebraska. Third, the changes eliminate outdated MDS and makes other technical and stylistic changes. These updates, for example, will allow counties to replace existing bridge pilings with pilings of the same design, rather than investing in a new bridge built under new construction design standards. Previously, our standards would have forced local governments to make significant improvements in addition to making simple repairs to infrastructure.

The common sense changes made in this update not only modernize our state's roads and bridge standards, but will also help your hard-earned taxpayer dollars go further as state and local government partner together to build the 21st-century infrastructure Nebraska needs to continue to grow.

While these changes may seem technical in nature, they are significant for the taxpayer because they help cut red tape and roadblocks for local governments seeking to maximize their roads improvement budgets. These standards will encourage local governments to address infrastructure needs in a more timely manner by allowing them to fix targeted issues, and they will help your elected officials stretch your tax dollars further.

In the coming years, my administration will continue to look for new ways to help local governments efficiently and effectively create the 21stcentury infrastructure Nebraskans need to live their lives, grow their business, and build their communities. This initiative, like many others, took a lot of collaboration from many stakeholders over the course of three years, and it would not have been possible without the leadership and commitment of the Nebraska Board of Public Roads Classifications and Standards. As we continue to work to identify new ways to cut red tape, I hope that you will offer your own suggestions. 

Firework safety tips to remember

In accordance with State Law the selling period for consumer fireworks begins on June 25th 12:01 a.m. and ends at midnight on July 4th. This selling timeframe can be shortened by city ordinances so citizens need to familiarize themselves with their local requirements. All retail stands need to be licensed and citizens should purchase their consumer fireworks at Nebraska stands. State law in Nebraska has changed to allow a broader selection of consumer fireworks, but there are still some restrictions. Some of the prohibited items include rockets with a stick attached, nighttime parachutes, and wire sparklers.

In 2015 Nebraska Fire Departments reported 49 fires directly attributed to fireworks. Those fires resulted in \$60,417.00 of total loss.

A total of 176 fireworks related injuries were reported by 44 Nebraska hospitals during the survey period of June 25 through July 5, 2015. 27 hospitals reported no fire-

works related injuries treated during this same time frame.

Here are some fireworks safety tips from the National Council on Fireworks Safety, American Pyrotechnics and the Insurance Information Institute that can make your celebration safer.

Safety first. Never throw or point fireworks at others.

Obey the law. Don't use fireworks that are illegal in this state.

Keep fireworks away from children. Sparklers burn at up to 2,000 degrees, making them extremely dangerous for children.

ALWAYS read and follow the directions for fireworks carefully.

Don't use malfunctioning items. Never attempt to relight a "dud."

Have a fire extinguisher, hose, or bucket of water handy for emergencies. Drop used fireworks into a bucket of water. (Every year trash related fireworks fires occur because used fireworks are not fully extinguished.)





Is your water safe to drink?

The Board is considering the purchase of a motor coach for students in replacement of the 1998 transit activity bus utilized on activities and trips. The motor coach bus would be utilized nearly daily for all students K-12 when considering field trips, athletics, choir, band, etc. The purpose of this bus review is to gauge the level of community support for such a bus. I have attached a comparison sheet to this report, which reviews the main differences and price between a motor coach and a transit bus, both financially and non-financially.
