Barbara Hemphill, a 1964 graduate of Falls City High School, will

view Saturday, June 21, at the Stalder Art Gallery in the FC Library & Arts Center.

Barb is the daughter of the late Everett and Doris Frost. She will also be in Falls City the weekend of June 21 to celebrate the FCHS Alumni Weekend with the 50-year Class of 1964.

The library opens at 9 a.m., Barbara speaks at 10 and then follows with a tour of the Falter artwork. Cookies and lemonade will be served.

"My intention for the presentation would be as a 'Thank you' for the people who have already contributed to the John Philip Falter Museum thus far, and to encourage others to do the same," Hemphill said.

The John Philip Falter Museum, to be located in the lobby of the former Richardson County Bank building at 17th and Stone Streets, is still in its fundraising stage, Chairperson Dobey Haws said, but with \$80,000 donated as of June 1, is edging closer to its construction goal of \$100,000.

"\$100,000 is needed to renovate the space to museum standards and we hope to have \$125,000 to cover operating costs for each of our first five years (\$25,000/per)," Haws said. "Our opening date is the Christmas window opening downtown (Friday, Nov. 28)."

The project is certainly fortunate to have Barbara Hemphill's enthusiastic support. Frequently

Firefighters stay busy late last week

Three fire calls kept the Falls City Fire Dept. busy last week. Fire Chief Ken Simpson reported on two of the fires. On Thursday morning at 5:02 a.m., the fire department received a call at 923 Fulton St. and was on the scene at 5:05 a.m. The Fire Marshall is calling the cause undetermined at this time.

At least \$25,000 in interior damage was done to the home. In fact, the blaze caused a bedroom floor to fall through to the basement. Thirteen city firemen and seven rural firemen were on the scene to extinguish the flames.

At approximately 4:20 p.m. the fire reignited. Simpson stated that a spark could have caused the reignition. Thirteen city firemen returned


Schemmer was the architect that designed the Aquatic Center.

It's officially summer! The kids are out and everyone is ready to go on that summer vacation. Our family is a family of travelers. Our next stop was the Old Capitol Building a few blocks away. They had tents set up outside and men and women were dressed up in Civil War era outfits. They are there many weekends for the tourists. Is there a lesson to be learned from botched execution?

Count me among those people who have changed their mind about the death penalty.

Sure, the recent bungled execu-

tion of Clayton Lockett in Oklahoma had something to do with it. Sure, listening - repeatedly - to the arguments against the death penalty by Senator Ernie Chambers of Omaha had something to do

with it. Sitting through two days of Pardon's Board testimony about Willy Otey in the summer of 1994 had something to do with it. He was executed. Spending time at the Governor's Mansion with Ben Nelson and a couple reporters in July 1996 awaiting word that John Joubert had been executed played a

Narrowly missing an assignment to witness the execution of Robert E. Williams in December 1997 and report my observations to the world had a giant impact. But having my first-born son incarcerated for three years, and the in-depth look at the criminal justice system that gave, me probably turned the corner for me.

Researching the death penalty in Nebraska about a year ago gave me the final push when I ran across the story about the hanging death of William Jackson Marion back in 1887. He was convicted and executed for the murder of John Cameron. However, Cameron turned up alive in 1891. Marion received a posthumous pardon by Nebraska Governor Bob Kerrey on the 100th anniversary of his execution.

You don't have to be a reporter to pause and wonder if Marion was the first and only mistake in Nebraska among the 37 executions in Nebraska's history and how many others there might be in a year in the United States. But when you get to know the system, you understand that we are all humans, and humans make mistakes.

I reported on the crimes and the trials and the convictions and the executions of the last three in the 90s. I know that the bodies of the victims were found. We can assume, based on extensive reporting, that the same holds true for the 11 men currently on death row.

In 2008, the Supreme Court ruled that death by electrocution in Nebraska was cruel and unusual punishment. The Legislature approved death by lethal injection in 2009. Capital punishment remains on the books in Nebraska, but the supply of the execution drug sodium thiopental ran out in December. The drug is nearly impossible to buy because like most drugs used in executions, it's produced by European-based companies that are prohibited from exporting drugs used for capital punishment.

There are those, some of them death penalty proponents, who believe that there will never be another execution in Nebraska. While they believe the punishment is appropriate for the most heinous crimes, they understand that the constant legal challenges to the method and the appeals process for the convictions are just too costly.

Couple that with the fact that government has yet to prove that it's up to the task of administering the death penalty fairly and constitutionally, and one can make a

strong case for locking

threatened to overshadow the woman who was murdered.

Chambers has fought for decades to abolish the death penalty. Lawmakers passed his repeal in 1979, but then-Governor Charles Thone vetoed it. A similar proposal didn't get past first-round debate this year.

Life in prison without parole would limit the length and expense of the appeals and remove the false hope of victim's families. It would also take the pressure off a system that struggles, at best, to do some things right. In the end, life in prison without parole is probably the most humane for all concerned.

Blue Storm Seniors go 8-3 in May

Falls City Blue Storm Seniors built an early edge in Saturday's "Fight for the Falls" Tournament at SNC Field, but the EMN Nationals roared back to steal a 4-3 victory.

Falls City, now 8-3, hosts Plattsmouth tonight, faces EMN again Wednesday in Nehawka, and travels to Lincoln Sunday for a night game with Wilmar Electric at Sherman Field. The team next plays at home June 11.

"Offensively we are playing really well," Coach Kory Huppert said late last week, prior to Saturday's tournament. "Through nine games we have stolen 69 bases, which is well above the pace to break the record of 171 set last year; a goal the team has set for themselves. We are also hitting the ball extremely well and hitting gaps, which is another goal we have

set and practiced hard to do.

"Defensively our pitching is solid with three starters returning (Logan Scheitel, Derek Bippes, and Reese Hogue). We also have Derek McCann and Weston Witt who are throwing really well right now. The seniors have some things to clean up defensively and fine-tune before the district tournament because we are playing well but not well enough to beat most likely the best in the Class B if not all of the state (Norris). The positive is the players are all excited and in a baseball frame of mind. They have all worked hard up to this point and continue to work hard on our game," Huppert said.

The Blue Storm opened the year with four victories, beating Hiawatha (9-8, 12-1), Sabetha (2-0) and Syracuse (7-4). The team lost twice to Nebraska City (5-1, 8-5) in three days, swept a

doubleheader at Sabetha (9-2, 12-4) and took a 12-4 victory at Tecumseh last Thursday.

Saturday, in the championship game, FC took a 3-0 lead in the top of the first and, thanks in large to the pitching of Hogue, held that lead into the fourth. The EMN Nationals put one on the board in the fourth and, in the bottom of the sixth, capitalized on a two-run error and scored three to take a 4-3 lead. FC failed to send the game into the bottom of the seventh, as Chaz Dunn led off and reached on an error, advancing to second on a sac bunt off the bat of Tyler DiGiacomo. Dunn represented the tying run, but was stranded at second after back-to-back strikeouts.

The EMN Nationals managed just two hits off of Hogue, who allowed no earned runs, walked six and struck out six during his 3 2/3 innings of work. Logan Scheitel took the loss, allowing three runs in one and a third.

FC's offense got off to a good start that could've been great. Lead-off man Witt reached on an error, Dunn walked on four pitches and DiGiacomo loaded the bases with a single to center. All three eventually came across as Chase Thompson drilled a 1-2 pitch to left field and Derek McCann also added an RBI

single during the frame. The Storm managed to load the bases again, with just one out, but left them stranded after a popup and ground out.

FC put their lead-off hitters on base but failed to score in both the second and third innings, went down in order in the fourth and fifth, and again threatened in the sixth after singles by Scheitel (2-for-3) and Zach Jordening, but left them stranded.

Patrick Carlton got the win for the EMN Nationals. He allowed three runs over 5 2/3 innings. He struck out six, walked two and surrendered six hits.

The Blue Storm advanced to the title game with a 3-2 comeback win over Fairbury. Dunn collected three hits and two RBI, singling in the first and sixth and providing a game-winning walk-off RBI double in the bottom of the seventh. Witt was the starter and surrendered just one earned run in 5 2/3 innings, giving up no walks and six hits while striking out four. Scheitel pitched one shutout inning and got the victory.

In the seventh, Jordening singled and eventually advanced to third before Dunn, with two out, drilled the first pitch he saw to left field, ending the game.



Superintendent's Year-End Report

By School District #56 Supt. Tim Heckenlively

The School Board meeting was preceded by a budget hearing since the board took action during the regular part of the meeting to adopt the amended budget. The hearing and emending of the district budget is required by state statute anytime expenditures in any part of the budget exceed the original budget projections. In a nutshell, back in January of this fiscal year, the district had the opportunity to refinance \$1.6 million in outstanding school construction bonds from the high school remodel project back in the year 2000.

The old interest rate we have been paying was 3.355% and the new interest rate is 1.09%, for a total savings to the district/property tax payers of \$82,751 in the bond fund. Whenever a transaction like this takes place, a municipal bonds company, D.A. Davidson in this case, must pay off the old bonds to the original investors, and then market the new bonds to investors. As these bonds

only have 5 years remaining until maturity, they were appealing bonds to investors, thus helping us achieve the favorable interest rate. Because of the refunding transaction, the budget has to be amended. It's also important to note that there is absolutely no impact to the current bond fund tax levy because of the transaction and budget amendment. The refunding and purchasing of new bonds is a wash, but the interest payment in the next five years will be reduced.

Kim Goff spoke of the requirements and her family's experiences in hosting six foreign exchange students over the past six years, and Alex discussed his experiences in our community and school, and made comparisons to life/school/ cultures in Norway. This was an excellent and informative presentation and we express our gratitude to Lonnie and Kim Goff for their contribution of a global experience for our school.

Construction crew cuts fiber, phones disrupted

Saturday morning - between 7 and 9 a.m. - a highway construction crew outside of Brownville cut a main fiber optic phone line located directly under the highway, disrupting phone service throughout southeast Nebraska. The fiber optic line is a direct link for Windstream and Southeast Nebraska Communications.

Phone calls get routed from the area to Lincoln in a matter of nanoseconds; with this line cut, calls were unable to make that connection. SNC Vice President and General Manager Ray Joy said that within an hour SNC was able to reroute landline 911 services directly to the Falls City police station.

All Windstream and cellular services were unable to reach 911 throughout the day Saturday, until a new line was placed at 9:38 p.m.

Brian Dixon of the Richardson Emergency Management Agency said, "All fire stations were manned and extra sheriff's patrol personnel came in to man roads and use public safety radio's to connect to one another." Residents were told if there was an emergency and they were unable to contact 911, to visit their local fire station via Facebook.

Weather radio service at Shubert was also cut and the NOAA Weather Radio service was down as well.

Had there been the possibility of a major weather event, Dixon said as many citizens as possible would've been notified in person by local police and fire departments, but otherwise communication, for some 12 hours, was largely reduced to the "word of mouth" medium of yesteryear.

Big Lake residents urged to boil water

A precautionary boil advisory was issued for portions of Big Lake, MO last Thursday.

Residents are asked to boil water for at least three minutes before using it to cook for cooking or drinking. Continue boiling water until the cause of the contamination has been corrected. Water for bathing does not need to be boiled.

The advisory is in effect for residents on the northwest side of the Village including all of Mobile lane, Alpine, Richards Lane, Beach Drive, Fairlane Drive, and Stanton Drive. The advisory was issued following a loss of water pressure.

Big Lake officials will contact residents when the order is lifted. For now the boil advisory will remain in effect until further notice.
