

Lesson learned (?) from Vietnam 10th anniversary of US withdrawal

Memorial Day is a time reserved to honor service and sacrifice of all American warriors – living and dead – who fought to preserve their peoples right to life and liberty. Rights we enjoy today, and all too often take for granted. And while we're still prone to a collective attitude of indifference, as a society we thankfully now do better at supporting the troops. Americans have a better sense of its obligation to veterans and do better than they did 40 years ago, when Vietnam vets returned home, because Americans, frankly, couldn't have done worse.

This year marks the 50th anniversary of the beginning of a Vietnam War that tore the country apart and the 40th anniversary of the end of the war and one of our society's darkest hours, when veterans were ignored — or worse — upon returning home. That truth is hard to stomach, and hopefully always will be.

Memorial Day 2013 events in Rulo and Falls City were rained out last week, and so too were opportunities to commemorate the anniversary of Vietnam. Retired Army Col. Dr. Charles "Chick" James, a Vietnam War veteran, was scheduled to give the keynote address at Rulo. Instead, he sat down with the Journal to share his presentation and discuss his experience.

"When I got off the plane at Travis AF Base in California, there were probably three soldiers who had family members there," James said. "I thought there would be a celebration.

"Because of that (disrespect), I think, society changed. By the time the Desert Storm troops returned, they were welcomed home. So, yes, it seems we've learned to separate the war from the warrior. Still, it seems we've slipped into a period of indifference. One-half of one percent of the country serves. If more would, there'd be more pride of country – a more patriotic feeling," he said.

Upon graduating from Falls City High School in 1963, Chick was accepted into the U.S. Military Academy at West Point, NY. He was commissioned in 1968 and then moved to Ft. Benning, GA, for the grueling nine-week Ranger School, as well as Airborne Training. He landed in Vietnam in July 1970.

"By the time we were sophomores (at West Point), we knew that as soon as we graduated, we were headed for Vietnam. That was it – war was on. We were trained for it and we were doing our job," he said.

"You could tell just by looking at somebody if they were new in Vietnam," James said. "In a very short amount of time, you could see it in their eyes. War changes you. I came back

Former editor Del Sutherland once told me about Randy's longdistance high school running accomplishments. And that his dad used to encourage the son to "Go, Randy, go!" We'd second that and urge Randy to go in whatever direction he wants. Just not to stray too far from the community he has served for nearly three decades.

Greg Weinert (son of Paul) was in our office a couple of weeks ago with news of the Rulo Bridge project. When the new bridge is complete and traffic has opened, what's to become of the old bridge? Greg said plans call for a major portion of that old structure to be removed by explosives (without damaging the nearby railroad bridge).

Anything that would fall into the river would be removed. In all likelihood, the deck will be cut into pieces and carried off. Then the trusses and piers will be blown up, but not to smithereens. Rather, the explosions will be controlled and blast matting will be used to harness any flying debris. Don't look for this to happen until after Dec. 1, possibly sometime in January 2014.

Eventually, a permanent barricade will be installed so that drivers, accustomed to the old route and terribly narrow bridge, aren't the victims of habit.

Recent wet conditions and minor flooding may have slowed new bridge progress somewhat, but look for an opening event sometime this summer.

That new bridge will be a boon for local traffic and business. And I'm sure everyone, myself included, is anxious to take that first drive over it. So that's far and away the paramount part of this huge project. But I've always wanted to witness one of those implosions that precisely bring down a worn out and out-dated piece of infrastructure. Here's that chance. Doubt many tears will be shed for that old, dangerous bridge.

A friend of mine and I recently lamented this time of year in the sports world. If you're not that into baseball, golf, tennis or the NBA playoffs, there's just not that much to follow. During college football season, I can spend (literally) hours reading the daily sports page and Jim Langan's Journal Sports. In late spring/early summer, it's about a five-minute journey.

One thing I have been watching is the box scores for the Kansas City Royals, in particular Alex Gordon's performances. The former Husker star has been hitting over .300 since early in the season and shows few signs of slowing down. He's KC's best hitter (and a very good left fielder). Too bad the rest of the squad doesn't contribute much. In a matter of weeks, the Royals have plummeted from first place in their division, to last, a position they know very well.

Why did it take this organization so long to install George Brett as hitting coach (interim or not)? Why wouldn't a team, floundering for years, take earlier advantage of the skills and knowledge of one of the best ever to play the game? Might explain why they are floundering, at least in part.



Governor Dave Heineman's decision not to seek the surething Republican nomination to be Nebraska's next U.S. Senator leaves the race wide open. Read that boring.

Queue up the regulars. You know their names. Jon Bruning, Shane Osborne, Don Stenberg, Pete Ricketts. Read that boring as well.

Maybe Congressman Jeff Fortenberry. Or Midland's University President Ben Sasse in Fremont. Perhaps a little more interesting.

Quick, let's look at the Democrats. You know them, they're the ones still pinching themselves in disbelief that not one, but two (remember the gubernatorial race has but one lone announced Republican candidate) major political seats are wide open. Read that, well, moderately exciting.

But don't overlook the list of the regulars as well: Omaha Senator Steve Lathrop; former University of Nebraska Regent Chuck Hassebrook; Lincoln Mayor Chris Beutler. Hey, former Omaha Mayor Jim Suttle's available now.

What this state, and these particular races, needs are some new faces. They're bound to be out there. Some fresh new perspectives, new ideas, new energy. And that goes for both parties. Heck, where's Rick Sheehy now that we need him? The entrance of the guy who admitted to unsportsmanlike conduct with a state-issued cell phone would at least offer some interesting press.

But why, you ask, would Heineman turn down a done deal? In a letter to supporters, he wrote that a race for the United States

Senate would distract from the State's priorities of tax relief, job creation and education.

Dave Heineman loves being governor. U.S. Senator Mike Johanns and others confirm that. In fact, when Johanns left the Governor's office to become a senator, he opened the door for Lt. Gov. Heineman to serve out two years as governor before being elected twice. That gives Heineman the record as the state's longest serving governor. Ten years. Governors are term-limited at two four-year terms.

The late Frank Morrison holds the record as being elected Governor the most times. He

won the spot three times when terms were only two years. Both Heineman and Morrison will be recognized as asterisks in the Nebraska Blue Book. (The Blue Book is Nebraska's official reference manual, with information about the state's government, geography, economy, history and culture.)

Both men wanted more. Perhaps Morrison will be remembered for The Great Platte River Road Archway near Kearney. Heineman is still jockeying for that memorable monument, but it could be tax reform, job creation or education. He has a year to make that mark.



Several weeks ago the Journal ran a photo/story about a dilapidated crate which Louie Fritz of Verdon had found when he was dismantling an old shed. It had been sent by J. L. Lord, USS Henderson, Fleet Post Office, San Francisco, CA. to Vera Lord, Box 343, Falls City, Nebraska. Louie wondered how it wound up in the old shed.

Ruth Rannebeck did some checking and it revealed the crate and its contents had been sent by Josh Lord, who did his growing up in Falls City, when he was in the Navy and aboard the USS Henderson in 1950-51. The ship was damaged in a typhoon in the China Sea and had to put in to Japanese shipyard for repairs. Could be, some of the crate's contents were obtained there. Now 86, he lives in Lakeport, CA. Josh said he had sent a lot of souvenirs to his mother, Vera, and sister, DeLoris. He said his mother had friends by the name of Helmick living in the Verdon area, so maybe that's how the crate wound up in Louie Fritz's old shed.

Mystery solved—pretty much so, anyway.

I was privileged to attend a great Patriotic Service Sunday, May 19, at the Martin Luther Lutheran Church, rural Johnson, with Naola Fritz and her son, Ethan, who attends Texas A&M at College Station. Mrs. Fritz and her late husband, Lyle, a Marine Corps veteran, had attended the pre-Memorial Day event several times.

Patriotic songs were sung by the Martin Luther Choir and the speakers were Bill and Yvonne Williams of Omaha. The Williamses have been the instigators of the free Honor Flights from Omaha to Washington, D.C., for World War II veterans to visit the fantastic World War II Memorial. Elmer Chapp of Falls City and the late Leon Harbour of Stella were among those making the memorable Honor Flights. National Guard Major General (Ret.) Charles Jim Barr conducted an impressive flag-folding ceremony and spoke briefly.

Following the service everyone (and the church was packed) was invited to a delicious buffet meal prepared by the church women.

Church member Ron Meyer planned and emceed the program which has been held annually since 2005. I repeat: it was outstanding.

On the printed program at the Patriotic Service was one version of the origin of "Taps," which is played by a bugler at military funerals. I have read other versions but the following version seems to dominate:

"Reportedly, it all began in 1862 during the Civil War when Union Army Capt. Robert Ellicombe was with his men near Harrison's Landing in Virginia. The Confederate Army was on the other of the narrow strip of land. During the night Capt. Ellicombe heard moans of a soldier who lay severely wounded on the field. Not knowing if it was a Union or Confederate soldier, the Captain decided to risk his life and bring the stricken man back for medical attention.

"Crawling on his stomach through the gunfire, the Captain reached the stricken soldier and began pulling him towards his encampment. When the Captain finally reached his own lines, he discovered it was actually a Confederate soldier, but the soldier was dead. The captain lit a lantern and suddenly caught his breath, and went numb with shock. In the dim light he saw the face of the soldier. It was his own son.

"Without telling his father, the boy enlisted in the Confederate Army. The following morning, heartbroken, the father asked permission of his superiors to give his son a full military burial despite his enemy status. His request was only partially granted. The Captain had asked if he could have a group of Army band members play a funeral dirge for his son at the funeral. Their request was turned down since the soldier was a Confederate. But out of respect for the father, they did say they could give him only one musician. The Captain chose a bugler. He asked the bugler to play series of musical notes he had found on a piece of paper in the pocket of the dead youth's uniform. His wish was granted.

"The haunting melody we now know as "Taps" used at military funerals was born."

I want to believe this emotional version but still one has to wonder if it really happened that way. Strange things do occur in wars--and this may be one of them. Any way you look at it, it's one heck of a story.

church for six years, will celebrate the mass, along with Msgr. Robert Roh and Bishop James Conley.

According to Mary Grace Thiltges, choir director at the church, special music numbers will be provided by past and present choir members.

Following the mass, the church members will host a potluck dinner. Fr. Oldham said that all visitors are welcome but those who aren't members of the church are asked to RSVP. The dinner will take place in a tent outside, so there will be plenty of room and food for everyone, but the servers would like to know how many visitors to expect. Fr. Oldham is hoping for a large turnout, not only because the celebration is an historical occasion, but also because the church is well-known for its food.

The ladies are so famous for their special dishes at funeral dinners that they are compiling a recipe book of all of their secret recipes. However, longtime member Ed Murphy recently joked that the church isn't famous for the *ladies*' cooking, it's famous for the men's. The Men's Club hosts a pork barbecue in late winter, and a fish fry in late summer. Both are very popular. (The church also holds an ice cream social in late summer.)

According to Ed, events like the barbecue and fish fry hold the church family together. And he should know. At 84, he has been a member longer than anyone currently attending Immaculate Conception.

"I was baptized, raised and married in that church," he said, "and I've been attending ever since. It's the feeling of family that keeps people coming back."

Lifelong member Betty Majerus agreed.

"I don't think I could pick one *event* that sticks out in my memory because it's the people who make the church special," she said. I have thoroughly enjoyed every one of our priests because each made his time here fun. The first time I saw Msgr. (James) Reinert, he was wearing a Hawaiian shirt, and had an inner-tube in the back of his vehicle. He was just so down-to-earth and approachable. Everybody loved him. People like him have made Immaculate Conception special."

Helen Goltz, who has been a member of the parish for 61 years, said the same

"I thought as much of one priest as I did the next," she said. "The priests weren't just spiritual guides for the parishioners, they became friends as well"

Msgr. Reinert, who now leads a parish in York, returned the compliments.

"Immaculate Conception was my first parish, so it will always be special to me," he said, "but it's more than that. In Rulo, I could knock on a door to talk to someone, and I would be invited in for supper. On a weekend, I'd be invited to go squirrel hunting with parishioners, or boating at Big Lake. If I walked into Ye Ole Tyme, I could sit at any table and be welcome. That's just how the people of Rulo and Immaculate Conception are."

Fr. Thomas Dunavan, who now serves a church in Tecumseh, as well as the state prison there, agreed.

"Rulo was my first parish," he said, "and the people of Rulo know how to break in new priests. I had only been there one day when Ed Murphy and Bob McQueen invited me out to Ed's farm to pick cherries. Then, they took me to Ye Ole Tyme for lunch. I hadn't even been in the Falls City area for 24 hours and they already had the new priest in a saloon."

"The people of Rulo are just special," he said. "When I was there and something needed to be done at the church, people gave of their time and talents without hesitation. I called one person to help mow the lawn, and six showed up."

Lifelong church member Ken Thiltges said the people of the church have been that way ever since he can re-

member.

"A tremendous streak of volunteerism and work ethic has always been present with the parishioners of the church," Ken said. "From mowing the church cemetery and grounds, to helping with building repairs, the list goes on and on. The members have always worked together for the good of the parish."

That unity has been present from the very beginning. In 1863, Fr. Almire Fourmont became the church's first pastor. Between his appointment and the church's 50-year anniversary, the congregation built three different churches. The third was consumed by fire in 1913, but that setback didn't even faze the congregants. They laid the cornerstone for a new building that same year. The church was then built brick-by-brick, and was trimmed with Bedford limestone. (The congregation will celebrate the *building's* 100th at the birthday party, too.)

In 1956, under the pastorate of Fr. Raphael Chonta, the men of the parish excavated a church basement with tractors, shovels and picks. Ed Murphy was there.


"There were 20 men out there digging with shovels," he said. "Some of us worked on our days off, but others

worked the entire time — I'd say three weeks to a month. That's the kind of spirit that keeps people coming to Immaculate Conception."

The 1913 building with its 1956 basement still stands today, and the list of stalwart families who have attended is evidenced in the names that are emblazoned on the beautiful stained-glass windows. Thiltges. Kanaly. Goltz. And many more. The church is home to generations whose family trees have deep roots in this area.

"Our services draw a lot of people who grew up here," Fr. Oldham said. "But many have moved to other locations in Richardson County, or even to Missouri. Yet they still bring their families to church here. People like to maintain their roots because it gives them a sense of stability, but most importantly, of family."

The congregation is proud of that camaraderie, and invites others to see it for themselves any time. But June 23, they hope to have a crowd. The members of Immaculate Conception want others to feel what they and their ancestors have experienced throughout the past 150 years — the warm and welcoming embrace of a trusted old friend

Storm Chaser down

Last Friday Oklahoma was inundated with another round of tornadoes. Through the weekend we learned of a mother and her child being sucked out of their car and killed as well as veteran storm researchers Tim Samaras, his son Paul and Carl Young. Every life lost is as valuable as the last but Tim Samaras was a face a lot of us came to know and respect.

The deaths of these storm researchers as well as the close call experienced by The Weather Channel's Mike Bettes and his team have already caused a debate about Storm Chasing. CNN was already asking if we should have people out chasing these storms. If anyone followed the TWISTEX team or the career of Tim Samaras they would know he was an extremely cautious scientist. He was one of the safest Storm Chasers in the field. I have been a fan of his for years now and watched him and Carl Young as they both starred on The Discovery Channel's Storm Chasers with another well-known chaser Reed Timmer. I believe everyone in Falls City will remember when Reed and his team came through a few years ago in the "Dominator."

Tim Samaras was unlike the wild and unpredictable Reed Timmer. Samaras holds the world record for "measuring the lowest barometric pressure drop (100 millibars) inside of a tornado that destroyed the town of Manchester S.D., on June 24, 2003. His team didn't drive into tornadoes. They placed cameras and probes designed and built by Samaras in the path of these deadly and destructive storms to measure wind speeds and get a better knowledge of how and why storms do what they do. He was in it purely to get a better understanding of why some thunderstorms produce tornadoes while others don't. His death affirms that we still don't know why or how tornadoes work and that they can be very unpredictable. I hope the backlash of his death slows down as people come to know the man who was always extremely cautious of his team and his own safety. We may never know how tornadoes work but now more than ever we need a team out there in the field researching and getting those warning times up. Men like Timmer and Samaras do a job I certainly wouldn't want. They keep an eye on these storms, follow them and call in the warnings we so desperately need. Thank them, don't condemn them. They gave their lives for scientific research. If they want to put themselves in harms way to keep us safer, that is certainly their decision. The discussion right now should be on why tornadoes like the one in El Reno followed the path it did. The track this tornado took many who had spent years studying tornadoes by surprise. We should value the time and information these men provided us. Because of people like Samaras and Young we get warnings days ahead of time for the potential of bad weather.

In our household we have a great appreciation and interest in the weather. We have developed a fondness for all of these storm spotters. Unlike television "characters" they were real, they taught us something. Besides being a fan of Samaras, I respected him. I was drawn to him. He was incredibly smart. He was my storm-chasing hero. My respect for Tim Samaras led me to start learning more about the weather and not just rely on what people on TV told me. I have taken classes to learn how to read a radar and read the clouds. I went from a kid who sat in the basement closet alone crying, to someone who is certified to call in a storm and more importantly know when to really be scared. My little boy was also huge fan of these guys. Every spring as the weather turns a bit rough, Alex plays Storm Chasers. He declares I am Tim Samaras (the level headed one), he is Reed Timmer (The wild and fun one) and sometimes Brian is Joel Taylor or Carl Young (The sidekick). Those are the type of real life heroes I like him to have. I'll take him wanting to be like any of these guys over someone who lives in a pineapple under the sea, not that there's anything wrong with that.



Boomerang Kids: When your empty nest fills up again!

How to deal with recent graduates and young adults moving back home

With a slowly growing economy and a still sluggish job market, there has been a continued increase in children moving back home after having lived independently on their own. These so called "boomerang kids" are popping up more frequently and when this situation

However, this "boomerang" can be viewed as an opportunity. It can allow youth to begin saving money for the future, continue a job search or to get out of debt, but only when expectations are clear and roles are known. it was once thought to be and this can actually be a very productive time for both children and parents if it's handled well. In May, sociologists Karen L. Fingerman and Frank F. Furstenburg reported that "in 1988 less than half of parents gave advice to a grown child in the past month, and fewer than one in three had provided any hands-on help. Recent data show that nearly 90 percent of parents give advice and 70 percent provide some type of practical assistance every month."

This type of increased financial co-dependence between parent and child can lead to strain when living together again after a separation. If you are a parent with a young adult at home, it is important communicate about expectations and responsibilities and to help your child build a solid financial foundation for their future.

Stoller says reviewing these few tips can smooth the transition and can guide both the child and parent through a tough time:

1. Set Expectations

Discuss with your child how much he/she should contribute to household expenses and tasks. A key to making the transition easy on everyone is having clear expectations for everyone involved both financially and otherwise.

2. Review your insurance and taxes (and theirs)

Save time and money by seeing if your boomerang child is covered by your health and/or car insurance. Also see if you are able to claim your child as a dependent.

3. Consider having them "Pay Rent"

Consider having your child pay rent or at least a token amount for living expenses. This gets the child into the habit of paying a monthly amount. Or have a set amount of money go into a saving account monthly that the child could later use such as for a down payment on a house or car.

Help them keep busy

While waiting to hearing back from companies your child could continue to expand their resume. For example, remind them to consider volunteering, joining a professional organization, connecting with a networking group, or participating in an internship, even if it's unpaid.

5. Focus on your own finances first

You may be tempted to use retirement dollars toward financial assistance for your child, but don't derail your own financial plans. Make sure your savings and retirement plans remain intact. Not sacrificing your own livelihood and continuing to invest in important options like life insurance, disability income insurance and long-term care insurance is critical to maintaining your overall financial health.

Though you may not have planned on it, helping support your child after they've left home can be a springboard towards a healthy financial future for them. Following these few tips can help ensure that the boomerang experience remains positive and the relationship remains strong.



"Last month I was talking with another fellow vet from Texas and reminiscing about how our veterans are being treated. We've moved from the patriotic strains of 'When Johnny comes marching home' after WWII to the indifferent reception of those who returned after the Korean War to the hostile receptions many of us received after the Vietnam War," James said. "When my good buddy, retired LTC Terry Flynn returned from Iraq, he was greeted in the states with a heart-warming welcome thanks to the many folks who wanted our soldiers to be recognized for their efforts. Now, as the war in Iraq and Afghanistan continues, he agrees we seem to be slipping into an air of indifference again. He said he used to have folks shake his hand and thank him for serving. Now he

June 7 deadline for SURE

Farm Service Agency County Director Shawna Mitchell wants to remind Richardson County producers that the final date to submit an application for payment under the 2011 Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payment Program is June 7, 2013.

The SURE program provides financial assistance for crop production and or quality losses due to a natural disaster.

"To receive 2011 SURE payments, an eligible producer must have had a qualifying loss during the 2011 crop year, which means at least 10 percent production loss affecting one crop of economic significance in a county that was declared a disaster or contiguous to a disaster county," said Mitchell. "Producers outside a declared disaster county or contiguous county, but with production losses in 2011 of 50 percent or more of the normal production, also qualify," she said.

Mitchell said, "Richardson County was declared a disaster in 2011 or is contiguous to a declared county, therefore producers in Richardson County qualify based on the 10 percent loss requirement. To date, Richardson County has paid out approximately \$280,000 to more than 26 producers."

Mitchell urges producers who think they may qualify for a payment to contact the Richardson County FSA Office prior to the June 7 deadline to discuss details of the program and complete the application process. More information can also be found at www.fsa.usda.gov/sure.
