## City Council rejects board appointment

The City Council, meeting in regular session Monday evening at City Hall, voted 3-2 to deny the appointment of James Hersh to the Board of Public Works. Mayor Tim Hersh had recommended the appointment of his father.

Council President Hal Sutter made the motion to deny the appointment. Voting in favor of the denial were Sutter, Brad Campbell and Steve Scholl. Ryan Rieschick and Kirby Robidoux voted against the motion. Council members Phyllis Krause, Jerry Oliver and Mike Moore were unable to attend the meeting.

In making his motion, Sutter cited "nepotism" as a reason not to make the appointment. Mayor Hersh said the appointment of family members to City committees and positions was not unprecedented, pointing specifically to an example several decades ago in which a mayor appointed his son-in-law as city clerk. Mayor Hersh said legal council had been consulted and determined no "conflict of interest."

Mayor Hersh and City Clerk Gary Jorn both appealed to volunteers to help fill sandbags to be used in an effort to protect the City's water wells at Rulo. The sandbag-filling operation takes place at the City shop on south Crook Street. Jorn said approxi-

## Big Lake in large part abandoned; Rulo Bridge remains open (for now)

The inevitable flood of the Missouri River has caused citizens on both sides of the river to prepare for the worst – again. Similarities are found everywhere you look. Homes are being evacuated. Windows have been removed. Boats and jet skis have been pulled from the water.

However, differences are also of note. Take a drive through Big Lake, Mo., where just over 100 people reside year-round. Not necessarily a bustling community, save for the summer months when hundreds more move in



and call the lake home for a few months a year and enjoy all that the park has to offer. Regular visitors pull their campers in to the park and spend weeks at a time.

The lake, state park and the

surrounding communities usually thrive economically between the months of May and September.

Not this year. A(nother) historical flood has turned the small community into a ghost town of sorts.

Big Lake State Park officially closed Sunday night and local businesses are also prepared to close their doors.

"It's just tragic," said Jo Wittwer who has called Big Lake home since 2001. This is her flood in ten years. "It's getting old," she said. "It's happening year after year."

Josh Triggs, another Big Lake resident who is part owner of the Prop-In, blames the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

"It's definitely mismanagement on their end," he said. "We go 20 years between floods and now it's happening every year. It's not right."

The frequency of this area flooding also has him crossing his fingers that by some miracle the Big Lake area will spared, if just this once.

"We've definitely had our fair share of this," he noted. "I would never wish anything bad on anyone, but if they get up north what we've gotten the last four or five years, we're all about sharing the wealth," he

joked.

A little humor in such a dire time was all that was keeping Triggs going as he packed up the bar/restaurant Monday afternoon. The doors closed officially at the Prop-In Monday night with no timetable on when they would re-open.

Down the road a little ways sits Lakeshore Grill, the other restaurant located in Big Lake. It is owned and operated by Scott McCann, formerly of Falls City. His daughter Hayley, a 2011 Falls City High graduate, is a waitress there and was not sure what would happen to their family business.

"We don't really know," she said when asked if they would have to close their doors for good.

"We had locals coming in for three meals a day and they're all gone now," she said. "They are telling people to make long-term arrangements."

Lewis and Clark estates, located near Rulo on the Nebraska side of the Missouri River, residents there are planning on staying for as long as they can.

Marcia Brennan, a long time resident of Lewis and Clark confirmed this

Wednesday morning.

"Everyone down here that is a permanent resident is staying," she said.

A FEMA representative, who called one of the residents there on behalf of Omaha Public Power District, asked them to confirm collectively if they were

They raised the bar and caregivers throughout the Careage organization delivered," said Grupp. The Myers will remain with the incoming Ensign operators for an indefinite period to ensure a smooth transition.

"We are anxious to build on Careage's outstanding reputation for resident care and patient outcomes," said Mike Dalton, President of Bandera Healthcare, Inc., the Ensign subsidiary overseeing the transition. ## Cinnamon bark may lower cholesterol

DEAR DR. GOTT: Back in 2006, you ran a column in which a gentleman said he had good results taking two 1,200-milligram capsules of cinnamon bark every morning. You said you were going to experiment on yourself and report back to your readers. Well, I never saw the follow-up article and was wondering how your experiment went. Can you share your results with me? I’m currently on 80 milligrams of Lipitor every day and would like to try to eliminate that, if possible. Thanks.

DEAR READER: I’m sorry to say it didn’t work for me, but I must commend you on remembering a column from five years ago.

Lipitor is in a class of drugs known as HMG CoA reductase inhibitors, or statins. It is designed to lower bad (LDL) cholesterol while increasing good (HDL) cholesterol. I don’t have access to your lab testing, nor do I know your medical history, so I don’t know what you are dealing with. Many people are adequately controlled by taking 10 or 20 milligrams daily along with following a low-fat diet and getting moderate exercise. That leads me to believe that you may have a cardiac condition that necessitates lower-than-normal levels or a genetic predisposition to higher-than-acceptable levels.

Speak with your prescribing physician to express your concerns. He or she may shun the

concept of cinnamon bark even on a trial basis or might endorse a trial period.

You also neglected to indicate whether you have modified your diet and incorporated a program of exercise into your daily activity. If you do have a family history, you may have a battle ahead of you; however, if you know your diet is less than optimal, simple changes might be the answer to eliminate having to take the drug.

DEAR DR. GOTT: For years, I have had itching in my ear canal. At times, I wake myself up scratching my ears with my nails. This causes abrasions, pain and a buildup of residue. At times, there is a buildup of what appears to be dry skin. I have tried antibiotic and cortisone creams, olive oil and aloe vera, to no avail. Any suggestions? My doctor doesn’t have any.

DEAR READER: Many things can cause itchy ears. You could have a skin condition such as eczema or psoriasis, an infection,

allergy, inadequate amounts of wax production, a fungal infection and more.

Testing must be performed to hopefully find the exact cause. Perhaps you should speak with your primary-care physician to determine if a biopsy of the residue buildup or a course of oral antibiotics or antifungal would be appropriate. The testing might then determine whether you need to be seen by a dermatologist for your symptoms of dry, itchy skin or an otolaryngologist for the pain and buildup of residue. I wish I could be more specific, but based on your brief note, you are exhibiting a lot of confusing signs that have me puzzled.

# From the Governor's Desk

Dear Fellow Nebraskans:

One of the most important accomplishments of the recently concluded 2011 legislative session was the passage of several bills focused on creating new momentum for developing and attracting businesses rooted in technology and innovation.

The Legislature gave unanimous support to four proposals that I proposed as part of our Talent & Innovation Initiative. This package – including the Nebraska Internship program, the Business Innovation Act, the Site & Building Development Fund, and the Angel Investment Tax Credit – was developed based on recommendations made in a comprehensive review of Nebraska’s economic climate. The 2010 Battelle study focused on developing more highly-specialized career and business opportunities in our state through investments in technology and innovation.

The Nebraska Internship program creates new internship opportunities for 500 to 750 college and university students to gain job experience working with companies across the state. Funded with \$1.5 million a year in job training funds, awards will be made to companies creating new internships on a first-come, first-serve basis. The program went into effect on June 1.

Nebraska is the only state in the nation with a program like this. By partnering with Nebraska businesses, we want to connect students with opportunities to gain work experience, particularly in high-skill sectors, to help retain more students after graduation.

The Business Innovation Act provides funding to help businesses develop new technologies that lead to quality job opportunities across our state. Competitive grants will provide funding and technical assistance for research at Nebraska institutions, new product development and testing, and

help expand small business and entrepreneur outreach efforts.

A new Site & Building Development fund will help increase industrial and commercial sites available and ready for business development. Most businesses are looking for sites that can be customized to fit their needs, rather than properties where they are starting from scratch. Communities will match state funding, with a focus on securing land and helping with infrastructure costs. Forty percent of the funding is set aside for projects in non-metro areas.

Finally, creating an Angel Investment Tax Credit encourages investment in high-tech and other startup Nebraska enterprises by helping attract private funding starting with the current tax year. Eligible small businesses must have fewer than 25 employees. Many states offer similar tax credits and what sets Nebraska’s apart is that it is refundable and available to a wide range of industries. That combination makes Nebraska’s Angel Investment Tax Credit one of the most competitive in the nation.

The Nebraska Department of Economic Development is preparing to implement these programs. Applications for companies creating internship opportunities are available now. Grants and funding opportunities to stimulate business innovation and development of commercial and industrial sites will be rolled out over the next several months.

The Talent & Innovation Initiative is about making investments today that will develop new career opportunities in innovative and technologically-advanced sectors. It puts a laser-like focus on growing Nebraska’s innovation economy. With this initiative, Nebraska has a strong and coordinated strategy in place to advance business recruitment and development.

LINCOLN – Understanding politics and policymaking often requires reading between the lines.

Take Gov. Dave Heineman’s farewell to the 2011 Legislature.

His Excellency generally congratulated lawmakers for successfully dealing with a revenue shortfall that once was estimated

at up to \$1 billion. Credit Heineman with guiding much of his budget and economic agenda through the session of 90 working days.

Between the lines ...

Heineman gave no mention to Sen. Deb Fischer of Valentine, a fellow Republican and possible candidate for the GOP nomination to the U.S. Senate. That omission fairly screamed between the lines.

Fischer was the prime mover behind a bill that committed state sales tax dollars to roads projects. We’re talking better than \$65 million annually for 20 years. Heineman said, several times, that this was not the year for such a move. Fischer moved ahead. And she won.

Next came Sen. Steve Lathrop of Omaha. Rather, he was next to be omitted. He was a prime mover in the negotiations that led to revisions in the way the Commission on Industrial Relations handles disputes between unionized public employees, local government and state government.

Lathrop is a Democrat, which is automatically strike one. Heineman was frustrated and annoyed with the way Lathrop initially handled the negotiations.

Heineman commented on the CIR revisions, but he gave Lathrop not so much as a mention.

### Tax Breaks For Big Oil

U.S. Senators Ben Nelson and Mike Johanns voted against a proposal that would have eliminated tens of billions of dollars in federal tax subsidies for the oil industry.

Democrat Nelson and Republican Johanns have long understood the energy industry’s point of view when it comes to taxes.

Despite history-making profits, both Nebraskans believe the nation’s best interest is served by encouraging the industry, via tax incentives, to produce more oil and gasoline and to create more jobs.

A majority of their Senate colleagues agreed with them. Nelson was among only three Democrats who voted to maintain the subsidies. The other two were from oil producing states.

### Different Worlds

New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie drew criticism recently when he had a state helicopter to chauffeur him to his son’s baseball game. There was a car waiting on the ground to take him the next 100 yards to the field.

Christie watched some five innings, was chauffeured back to the helicopter, which then chauffeured him to what he and everyone acknowledged was a purely partisan political gathering.

Can you imagine a Nebraska governor doing that, or anything like that?

Nor can I.

And if anyone on a governor’s staff suggested such a thing, they would immediately be recognized as an agent provocateur for the other side and sent packing.

Flood stage at Rulo is 17 feet.

Council members voted unanimously to accept committee findings and hire Travis Mitchell of Omaha as a Falls City Police Officer. Chief of Police John Caverzagie said he believes Mitchell “will make a fine police officer.” Mitchell is not certified and thus will attend the Law Enforcement Training Center in Grand Island, where he will complete the 12-week course.

In other developments, the council:

—Held a public hearing regarding a liquor license application from La Carreta, 1516 Stone. No one spoke in opposition to the application and the council voted in favor of recommending it be granted.

—Approved a hobbyist permit for Tom Marquis, 703 Wilson.

—Approved a “block party” request from Pat McGinnis. The party is planned for from 3 p.m. to 1 a.m. July 2-3 on West 16th between Schoenheit and

Abbott Streets. For safety reasons, barricades will be set up. Signatures of numerous neighbors who approved of the party were submitted.

## Sez I

The Center for American Progress notes that, as men suffer more layoffs than women, families today depend even more on the income of women, whose average salaries tend to be lower, for many reasons. And whereas the national average of families in poverty has fallen slightly, Nebraska’s average has risen, according to 2008 data from the U.S. Census Bureau.

One thing is clear: many Nebraska families are missing out on the Good Life. And in turn, their economic instability affects their communities. A smaller tax base, increased welfare costs, and a diminished quality of life overall are but some of the problems.

Certainly none of us can, ourselves, do everything to solve these difficulties. But we can do something: We can join with generous Nebraskans who are thinking big and getting involved. We can give our time, our talent, and our treasure to support community programs and statewide organizations addressing these serious issues on a local level.

For example, the WealthSpring Fund, an affiliated fund of the Nebraska Community Foundation, made a grant to Lincoln’s Center for People in Need to help support a program teaching women warehousing skills and forklift safety. These women became qualified for nontraditional jobs paying higher wages than many jobs typically held by women.

proximately 30,000 sandbags would be needed and that City workers would do the majority of the work, while also transporting and installing the sandbags.

But volunteers certainly would help, he said, inviting citizens to come to the shop at 7 a.m. Tuesday, Wednesday and possibly Thursday. The purpose of the sandbagging operation is to “protect infrastructure,” Jorn said.

With unprecedented water releases from Missouri River dams, the possibility of record-setting flooding is real. Actual flood levels are difficult to predict and it is possible the wells will not be threatened. Sandbags will be used to protect three of the wells. Jorn said the plan is to develop a wall that would be effective for as high as 30 feet.

# BIG RED

As schools go on summer break around the country in the coming weeks, it signals the end of the “spring evaluation period” and the beginning of camp season.

The NCAA defines the spring evaluation period, which ends May 31, as “the time a college coach may watch a prospective student-athlete play or visit the high school but cannot have any in-person conversations with the possible recruit or the parents off the college’s campus. The prospective student-athlete and the parents can visit a college campus during this period and a coach may call or write during this period.”

Nebraska’s coaching staff was very busy during the evaluation period, traveling to states like Florida, Texas, Ohio, Arizona and California to name just a few.

Despite having very few scholarships available in the 2012 recruiting cycle, Nebraska looks to be in good position to sign a top 20 class. In fact, NU is among the top schools for a number of Rivals.com’s top 250 players nationally.

With only 12 graduating seniors NU has little room for error. Even with players like Kody Spano possibly going on medical hardship and Bubba Starling likely to choose professional baseball, NU still has little to work with. What exactly are the needs for the 2012 class? Here’s how I see it:

- 1 quarterback

2 wide receivers

1-2 tight ends

3 offensive linemen

1 defensive ends
- 1-2 defensive tackles

3 linebackers

2-3 cornerbacks

1-2 safeties

That totals anywhere from 15 to 19. Somewhere around 15-17 is probably what can be expected

With Jamal Turner moving to wide receiver this spring and Starling likely to command a \$6-7 million dollar signing bonus in the MLB draft, NU needs one more QB on the roster. Four-star prospect Devin Fuller (6-0/185) of Old Tappan, N.J. is listed as the No. 37 overall player nationally. Rivals lists him as an athlete, however NU is recruiting him at quarterback and that should get them an unofficial visit this summer. Alabama, Florida State, Michigan and Penn State are among Fuller’s 20-plus scholarship offers. Fuller says he talks “probably 3 times a week on Facebook” with NU offensive coordinator Tim Beck.

Among the strongest possibilities is Cibolo, Texas’ Tommy Armstrong (6-2/210) who ran for over 500 yards while throwing for over 1,300 with 19 touchdowns and only 2 interceptions for a state champion in Texas’ largest classification. In fact, NU told Armstrong “if (Starling) doesn’t come, they want me bad”. The Huskers will battle Missouri, Georgia Tech and Mississippi State among others.

NU has a lot of young talent at receiver, but a team can never have too many “playmakers”. Scottsdale, Ariz. athlete D.J. Foster (5-10/180) is such a player. Foster, who hails from former Husker all-American Mike Brown’s high school, has choices such as USC, Oregon, and Notre Dame but plans to visit Lincoln before making a decision.

Another possibility is Orlando, Fla. speed-demon Alton Howard (5-9/170) who also lists Miami, Ohio State, Notre Dame and USC among his offers. A four-star prospect according to Rivals, Howard is open to playing either offense or defense in college.

At tight end NU has two top juniors in Kyler Reed and Ben Cotton, but after them the scholarship cupboard is pretty bare with only sophomore J.T. Kerr and incoming freshman Max Pirman behind them. Three-star junior college player Terrell Mitchell (6-6/245) is expected to choose between Nebraska and Oklahoma very soon. Whichever school he chooses will have him on campus this fall; however Mitchell will have knee surgery and miss the 2011 season. He will have 4 years of eligibility remaining, so after the surgery he’ll be a sophomore.

Orlando David (6-3/230) of Hollywood, Fla. also holds a Nebraska offer along with Illinois, Louisville and South Florida. He says the Huskers will definitely “make the cut” with him.

NU took 5 offensive linemen in 2011. Don’t expect them to take as many this year, but three is definitely likely. Their top target is Andrus Peat (6-7/280) of Tempe, Ariz., the younger brother of 2011 NU signee Todd Peat, Jr. The younger Peat is the nation’s No. 15-ranked player and a five-star prospect according to Rivals. Florida State and USC will be tough to beat, but with his brother on the team there will certainly be some family trips to Lincoln this fall when Andrus can be shown the red-carpet treatment.

Other top targets include the nation’s No. 103-ranked Max Tuerk (6-6/294) of Santa Margarita, Calif., No. 130 Evan Boehm (6-2/290) of Lee’s Summit, Mo., No. 137 Paul Thurston (6-5/274) of Arvada, Colo., and No. 149 Ronnie Stanley (6-7/285) of Las Vegas, Nev.

Defensively linebacker and cornerback are the top needs. NU already has Michael Rose (6-0/230) of Kansas City, Mo. in the fold, but will look for two more from among players like Quanzell Lambert (6-2/230) of Sicklerville, N.J. Lambert wants to visit Lincoln this summer unofficially, but with competition from Alabama, Florida, and Penn State it’s tough sledding here.

Three-star prospect Joe Robinson (6-0/225) of Temecula, Calif. holds offers from Arizona State, Colorado and Washington as well as NU. Robinson is friends with NU quarterback Taylor Martinez, who has helped sell him on the Huskers. Oregon and USC are also in the mix, but have yet to offer. Robinson said in April that NU was his leader.

Cornerback Brian Poole (5-11/187) of Bradenton, Fla. is a dynamic playmaker who checks in at No. 75 in Rivals’ top 100. With offers from Florida, Florida State, Miami, Auburn and Alabama it’s likely that Poole stays in the Southeast. Don’t count out NU, though, as he’s friendly with NU quarterback Brion Carnes and former NU cornerback Fabian Washington.

Two players from Cape Coral, Fla. – Tyreece Jiles (5-11/165) of Cape Coral High and Jordan Diggs (6-0/191) of Island Coast High – are also in possibilities. Diggs also has Ohio State, Stanford and Tennessee to choose from. He could play safety as well as corner at the next level.

One more “under the radar” recruit is Fred Tiller (6-1/178) of Rochelle, Ga. Mississippi State and South Carolina are the top competition for Tiller.

There are other prospects, and will certainly be more, but NU has a great jump on a 2012 recruiting class that is sure to be small but should pack a big punch.

## Flood ‘11

planned on staying, and the answer was a resounding “yes.”

As of Wednesday morning, the National Weather Service is predicting a record flood of the Missouri River in most areas of Nebraska and northwest Missouri. The river was at 23.2 feet yesterday morning, or a little more than six feet above flood stage. Levels are predicted to reach 25.4 feet in Rulo, 41 ft. in Brownville and 25 ft. in Nebraska City by Sunday morning. River levels could swell to 29 or 30 feet by the time it crests, which would easily trump last year’s record level of 26.6 feet.

The combination of water releases from Gavins Point Dam at Yankton, S.D., record

rainfall for the areas on the upper Missouri River basin and snow pack that is 140 percent of normal caused the conditions and forecasts to be so bleak.

Nebraska Gov. Dave Heineman declared state disaster areas along the Missouri River last week and a disaster declaration in Richardson County was declared Monday morning and confirmed by the county commissioners in their Tuesday morning meeting. This will allow for more state, county and city emergency funds to be allocated in the area.

Emergency Management Coordinator Jim Gerweck noted that Nebraska is one of just a handful of states to have an emergency disaster fund, which was signed by the Governor last spring to work in coordination with the Nebraska Emergency

Management Agency.

Gerweck also stated he had been in contact with Senator Mike Johann’s staff and Congressman Jeff Fortenberry, who both offered their full support.

The county received 50,000 sandbags Sunday evening from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in the Kansas City, Kansas region, and have requested 50,000 more from the Omaha branch of the Corps.

Volunteers worked all week filling the sandbags at a location behind the FC Utilities Department shop and the city urges others to donate their time. The sandbags will be used to sure-up the water wells south of the Rulo water plant. For questions regarding volunteer help contact City Hall at 245-2851 or 245-2077.

# Take precautions during flooding, clean-up

LINCOLN, Neb. -- Some areas of Nebraska are experiencing water entry into homes from flooding, and residents should take special precautions.

Flood waters may contain fecal matter from sewage systems, agricultural and industrial waste, and septic tanks. Wear rubber gloves, protective clothing and a tight-fitting facemask, such as an N-95 or N-100 air filter mask, when working around mold and contaminated flooded areas. Persons with medical problems such as suppressed immune system or breathing problems, young children and the elderly should not be involved in the cleaning, said Shirley Niemeyer, University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension housing and environment specialist.

If you have open cuts or sores exposed to the floodwater, keep them as clean as possible by washing them with soap and disinfectant and boiled water. Apply antibiotic ointment to reduce the risk of infection. Do not allow children to play in floodwater and the area contaminated or with toys that are contaminated by floodwater.

Basic hygiene is very important during flooding. Always wash your hands with soap and clean water before eating, and after toilet use, cleanup activities, or handling items contaminated by floodwater or sewage.

Removing some flood contaminated materials and household goods and thoroughly cleaning or drying out others are essential steps to combat mold, Niemeyer said.

Floodwaters compromise household fixtures in different ways. Porous materials are nearly impossible to clean. Flood soaked carpets, carpet pads, linoleum, fabric covered furniture, mattresses, drywall or wall board, wet insulation and ceiling tiles should be discarded. For heirloom rugs and furniture, contact a professional cleaner.

Mold problems often continue to appear five to six weeks after a flood has occurred, but steps can be taken to combat mold growth and its potential to cause serious health problems as well as structural damage to homes. Warm humid weather speeds up mold growth.

Appliances such as refrigerators, freezers, stoves, dishwashers, hot water heaters, washing machines and dryers contain insulation that may harbor mold spores without visible evidence and should be discarded or inspected by a qualified professional appliance repair person, Niemeyer said.








Heating and air conditioning filters should be changed and if contaminated, the ductwork cleaned by a professional. Have a heating and cooling professional inspect air conditioners and heating systems to determine the damage.

Damaged wallboard should be discarded. Water can rise in the material higher than the visible water line. The best practice is to remove the wallboard at least two feet or more above the water line. Leave the wall cavity open for several weeks to months to allow the components to dry. A moisture meter, available in some plumbing, heating and air conditioning businesses or through the Internet, can be used to determine when the materials are dry. Even though the wood or other materials may feel dry, the moisture level may still be too high to close up the cavity. To prevent mold growing within the wall or floor cavity, wait until the wood and area is completely dry.

It may be necessary to open up the floor cavities to prevent buckling of the floor, to clean, and to allow drying. Remove some of the floor covering and decking to determine the extent of the damage. When possible, inspect from the underside of the floor.

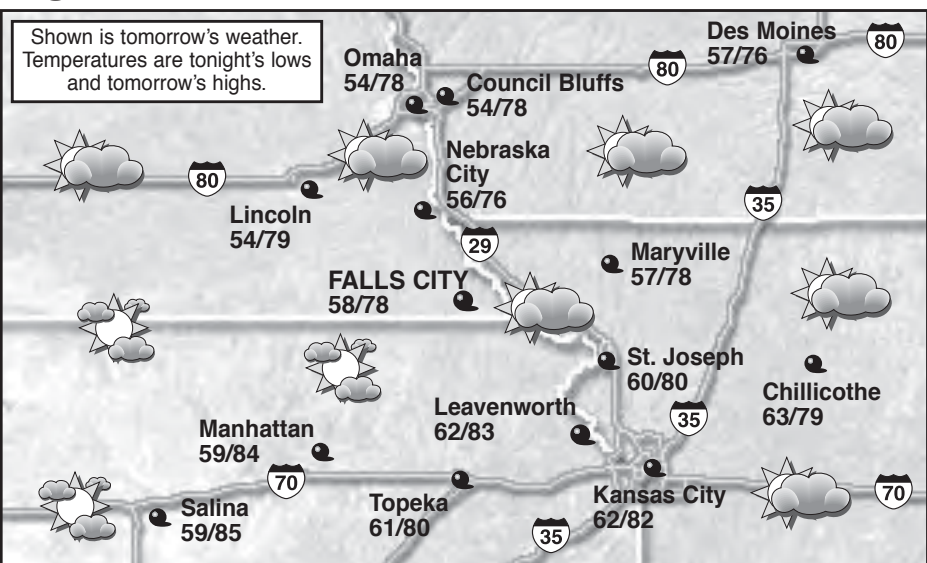

## Romans 10:9 – “a plumber & baptism”

Many preachers conclude that baptism is unnecessary for salvation after quoting, “if you confess with your mouth, ‘Jesus is Lord,’ and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved” (Romans 10:9). The problem of a leaky faucet quickly illustrates just how fallacious this reasoning is.

Imagine a woman hiring a plumber to determine why her faucet drips. Upon inspecting the wet offender, the plumber concludes, “your faucet has a bad stem.” With a smile he adds, “Change the stem, you will have no more drip.” The plumber’s statement might make the woman later argue with her husband, “No, we don’t have to shut off the water and unscrew the faucet. The plumber just said, ‘Change the stem, you will have no more drip!’”

In the event a wife would dare to make such a poor argument, hopefully a loving husband would respond, “Honey, the

plumber identified what was wrong and needed to be fixed. He did not intend to give us a step by step instruction guide on how to change a faucet’s stem. Yes, we need a new stem. However we also need to turn the water off and remove the faucet fixture.”

In the same way, consider the context of Romans 10:9. Beginning in Romans 9:30, Paul diagnosed the barrier preventing Israel from being justified by faith. She refused to believe in Jesus and confess him. In spite of all of her other activity there would be no justification by faith because how someone responds to Jesus with their lips and their heart is essential to faith.

However, just like the plumber, who had promised a favorable result, so too Paul unveiled how resistant Israel could enter salvation. If Israel would fix her problem by confessing Jesus and believing in him, she too would be saved since salvation is extended to all who will call upon the name of the Lord. “For the Scripture says, ‘Whoever believes on Him will not be put to shame.’ For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek, for the same Lord over all is rich to all who call upon Him. For

“whoever calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved” (Romans 10:11-13).

Neither the plumber nor Paul intended to provide an exhaustive step by step list of how to achieve the desired goal. Both identified the problem and pronounced resolution if that problem would be addressed. Furthermore, even from within Romans evidence surfaces revealing that Paul would sharply disagree with many contemporary preachers regarding baptism.

Arguing that Christians should abandon sinful lifestyles, Paul reminded the disciples about the transformative ramifications of their baptism. “What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin that grace may abound? Certainly not! How shall we who died to sin live any longer in it? Or do you not know that as many of us as were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into His death? Therefore we were buried with Him through baptism into death, that just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life” (Romans 6:1-4).

Then Paul described this pivotal act as constituting a wholehearted obedience

resulting in setting them free from sin. “But God be thanked that though you were slaves of sin, yet you obeyed from the heart that form of doctrine to which you were delivered. And having been set free from sin, you became slaves of righteousness” (Romans 6:17-18).

To make an argument against the necessity of baptism for salvation from Romans 10:9 requires ignoring both the immediate and greater literary contexts to pursue a proof-text for a preconceived theology. This is an example of theology driving interpretation, rather than using contextually based interpretation to determine our theology.

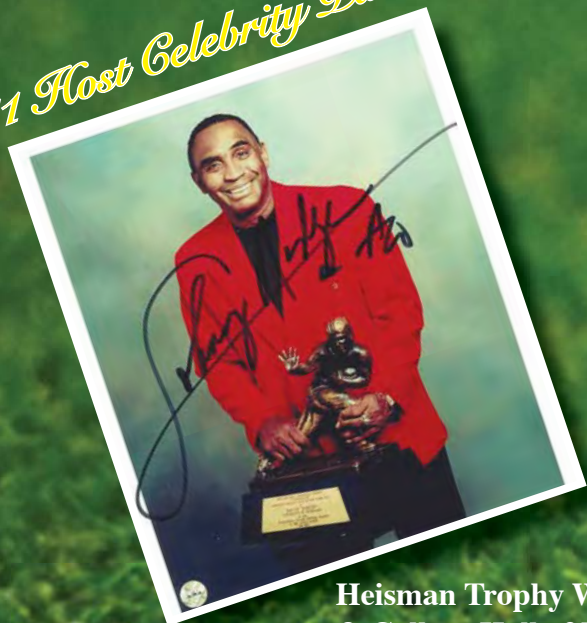

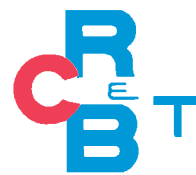

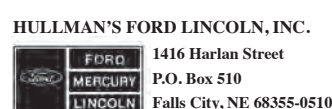

An event took place this weekend at the Falls City Golf Club and many folks either did not know about it, or maybe, unfortunately, just did not care. Brian Walker the course superintendent and former long driving competitor organized and hosted the 2nd Annual Long Drive Open Championship Sunday morning. A crowd of maybe fifteen people (besides the competitors and their friends/family) gathered to watch these behemoths pound 340-plus yard drives.

The question arises: If a tree falls in the forest does it make a

sound? Well in this case, I would say yes. The event was a fundraiser for 4-H Shooting Sports and for those who caught any part of the weekend, whether it was the skins game on Friday, the Pro-Am Saturday morning, or the Long Drive championship Sunday morning, they were definitely entertained.

The winner, Mick Yelovich, who stands 6-9, 260, and played basketball at Indiana State, crushed one to the tune of 348 yards down a 40-yard wide grid to take home the championship and a nice paycheck of \$2,250. A total of 13 competitors competed in the event, which was

disappointing to Walker who had hoped between 20-25 competitors would make the trek to Falls City.

The lack of a crowd Sunday morning and the fact that between 6-10 competitors bailed at the last minute would normally leave a sour taste in one's mouth, but not for Walker or myself.

I guess it was hearing all of the competitors, who came from Dallas, Canada and eh-hem, Barbados, among other places, personally thank Walker for hosting such a great event and telling him they'd be back next year that has him excited to do it again.

"I'm happy with the way the entire event came out," said Walker. "I would like more community involvement. This event isn't about me, it isn't about the country club, it isn't about the long drive guys, it's a group effort to do this. I want this to be a huge event in the Midwest that just happens to be in Falls City."

Walker is right. These guys for the most part are just your average joes, who can hit the crap out of a golf ball. Most of them travel around by car to local tournaments just the like the one that was here in Falls City. However, most stops are in cities like St. Louis, Phoenix and Las Vegas. The ReMax Long Drive Championships, which occur in late October, take place in Mesquite, Nevada are televised on ESPN.

My point is Falls City needs to embrace this annual event. Last year the funds raised went to the summer rec program. This year a 4-H group that is growing in popularity among Falls City's youth benefited. The potential of this event to grow regionally is tremendous. Nowhere within a 100-mile radius hosts something like this. If it takes off here in Falls City, the folks from Lincoln, Omaha and Kansas City might come calling to either compete or just be a spectator. In either fashion, the people will spend their dollars in this town.

This means more revenue for the community. Restaurants, hotels, gas stations all benefit. Plus, it has been well documented in this publication the need for funds to help renovate the ball fields. Walker said he'd like to work with anyone who has a charity or organization that needs help financially. Also, he is looking to form a committee to brainstorm and bounce ideas off each other to make the event all that it can be.

"I need help from the community to make this dynamic event in rural Nebraska the best around."

So it's back to the drawing board for Walker and I hope we as a community can be there to help this event grow.
