Falls City High School Class of '64 honored

The 50-year class of 1964 was honored when approximately 220 alumni and spouses met Sunday, June 22, at the annual dinner of the Falls City High School Alumni Association at Prichard Auditorium.

Mike Castle of the Class of 1965 was the emcee. The invocation was prayed by Paul Weinert.

In his welcome presentation, Castle briefly recalled high school years, as did Bill Beasing, who gave the response for the 50-year class. Both men spoke seriously and humorously in brief, excellent talks.

Teachers in the school system who were present were recognized. They included Glenda Nelson, Paul Weinert, Leon Joy, Kathy Martin and Jannie McNeely.

Also introduced were officers and board members of the Alumni Association who make the reunions possible.

Physicist Edward Lovick Jr., Northridge, CA, Class of 1937, was inducted in absentia in the Wall of Fame by Bob Ferguson and Rex Jones. Paul Weinert, former history teacher at the high school and a member of the Class of 1948, which sponsors the Wall of Fame, accepted the honor for Lovick. The citation for the new Wall of Famer appears elsewhere in today's Journal.

Introduced as representing the oldest class attending the reunion were Albert Rieschick and Bill Schock, 1936 graduates. Members of the honored 50-year class were introduced by Denny Heinzelman, a member of the class.

Reporting for the Falls City Educational Foundation, Mel Harmon said that donations received from alumni the past year totaled over \$12,756 and 19 scholarships totaling \$31,450 were awarded this spring. The Foundation now has 23 scholarships that are funded each year from the endowment funds that total over \$597,000. Schol-

arships and the names of donors were listed in the June 17 edition of the Falls City Journal and more donors' names appear in today's edition. He praised

Physicist Edward Lovick Jr., Northridge, CA, a principal developer of the stealth safety factor in military aircraft, was inducted, in absentia, in the Falls City School Systems Wall of Fame Sunday afternoon at the Falls City High School Alumni Association dinner at Prichard Auditorium

A Falls City High School graduate in the Class of 1937, Lovick was an avionics engineer for Lockheed Aircraft Co. and was recognized as one of the principal designers for stealthy aircraft such as the SR-71 celebrated spy plane and the F-117. He spent more than three decades at Lockheed's super secret Skunk Works in Nevada.

During World War II he served in the Navy at the Naval Ordnance Station at Inyokern, CA.

'Golf Fore Good Health'

For this California kid, there is no place like Nebraska

By all appearances, Nebraska's recent quarterback from California named Taylor was at the very least uneasy under the glare of a blinding red-

hot light cast upon him 24 hours a day from an obsessive fanbase.

There was a time - about 30 years ago - when nothing could've been further from the truth. That Taylor from

California, first name Steve, not only embraced the spotlight, but actually followed it to Nebraska, then basked in it during a four-year career that saw him graduate as one of the NCAA's most

prolific dual-threat quarterbacks. The Huskers' starting QB from 1986-88, Taylor twice earned All-Big Eight honors and was a Heisman candidate and All-American a senior, leading NU to the Big 8 title over Oklahoma.

The California kid relished his Nebraska experience so much he never really left. Steve Taylor married a girl from Seward and, after a successful eight-year professional football career in Canada, returned to Lincoln where he's become one of the most successful realtors in the region.

"I was hooked on Nebraska," Taylor said Friday, in Falls City for the fourth annual Community Medical Center "Golf Fore Good Health" tournament at the FC Golf Club.

"I just love it here," he said. "And it's the people - just like coming down here to Falls City, the people are great."

Taylor played the four-person scramble event with local celebs Ed Hartman, Marty Froeschl and Ben Hullman as part of "Team Hullman," as Hullman's Ford-Lincoln-Mercury was the host sponsor of this year's CMC tournament.

As one of the most highly recruited high school athletes in the country, Steve, who had broken many of Marcus Allen's Lincoln High School records, had the task of choosing a university that would facilitate both his academic and athletic endeavors. Out of nearly 100 offers, Steve chose the University of Nebraska-Lincoln because of its strong tradition of graduating its players as well as its steep tradition of football excellence.

"Nebraska was the premier program at that time," he said. "And really, what did it for me, was when Coach Osborne went for two. That was it - I

Every so often in our small community a story comes along that demands attention. The last few weeks that story has been about former Sheriff’s Deputy Josh Ninceheler. When you live and grow up in a small community such as Dawson or Falls City you know nearly everyone. Some of the time knowing everyone is a good thing. When you help report the news, knowing everyone is a double-edged sword. Chances are you will be typing up something about someone who is - or was - a friend of yours.

When you have a story with such magnitude it gets your blood pumping. You want all the details, you want the photos and you want to speak to everyone involved. As an employee of a newspaper you want the best story on your front page. During the last few weeks some of us here in *The Journal* office put in 12 to 14 hour days. We followed every lead we could and carried our cameras around with us as if they were an extension of our bodies. *Journal* staffers stood around the office discussing the events and what it would be like to cover the trial of the person who had committed such a heinous crime. It had been years since something this big had happened and it certainly had the town buzzing.

The Friday afternoon I received the phone call about the turn of events was one that will stick with me forever. It was like someone had knocked the wind out of me. I imagine so many others felt the exact same way.

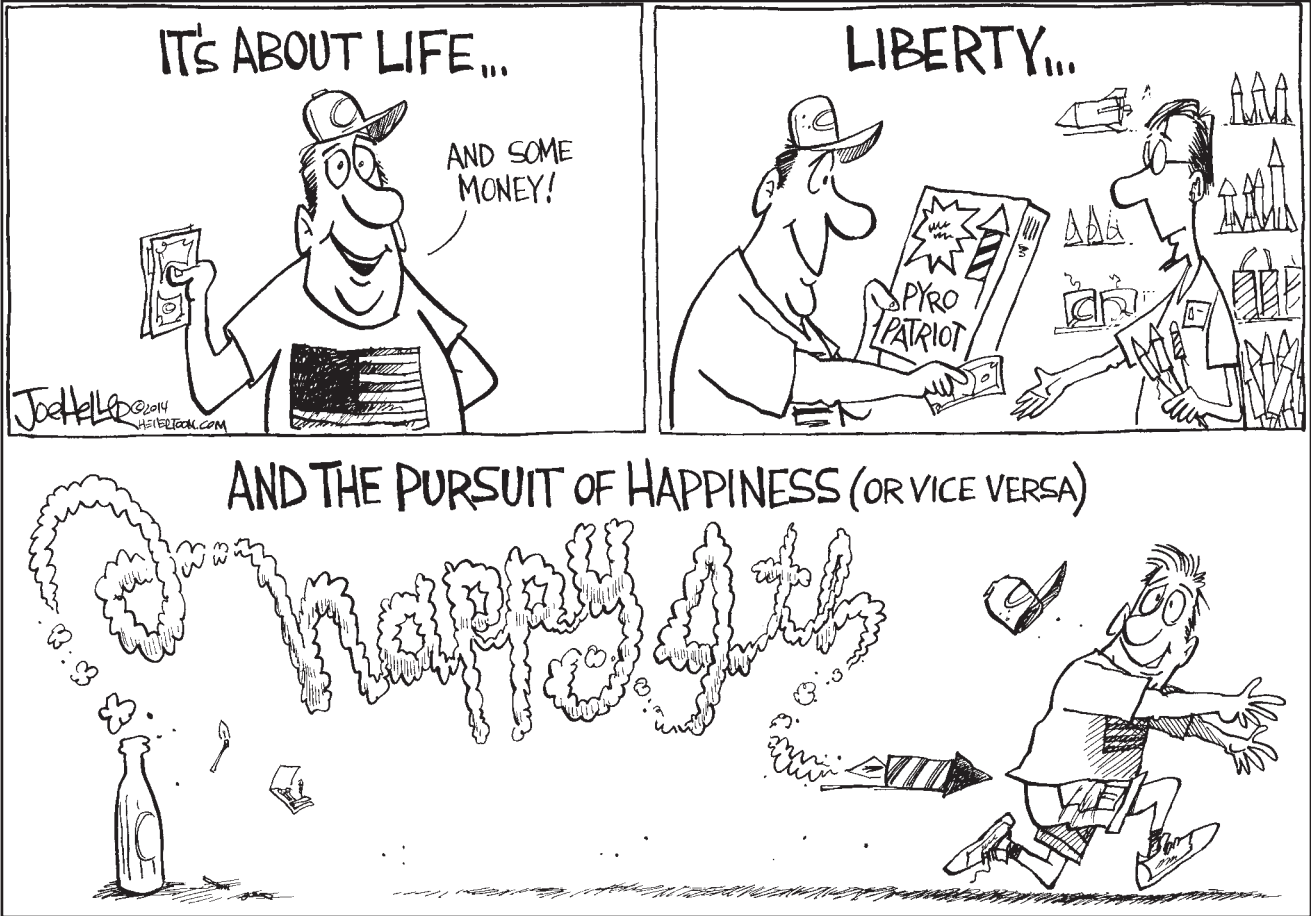
Driving to *The Journal* office that afternoon my head was spinning. I was sure this couldn’t be true. Josh was and is a good kid. I didn’t believe it until I found the press release waiting in the office. As much as I would have liked to rip it up and pretend it was a mistake, I always want to do the best job possible for *The Journal* and our readers. Jason and I sat trying to piece together the facts in a haze of disbelief. We published the facts and waited for what would be collective outrage throughout the community. Reactions were quick and harsh. I read comments that made me sick to my stomach. Citizens were calling for swift and painful justice against Josh. I kept picturing the little kid I knew who was now clearly lost. I know this statement will be controversial and many, many readers won’t agree with me but I am sad for Josh. He is a daddy, brother, son, nephew, grandson and uncle. He is a person, albeit a flawed person, but a person nonetheless. He harmed himself and (allegedly) made a massive mistake. His life will never be the same and everything he worked for is gone. One lapse in judgment has altered an entire group of lives forever. That is sad.

I have known Josh Ninceheler and his family for nearly 17 years. During my teen years his sister and I were inseparable. If she wasn’t at my house, I was at hers. I came to love her family very much during that time and I was able to watch Josh grow up.

Last Monday I was at the Richardson County Courthouse with a camera. It was the first glimpse I had gotten of Josh in quite sometime. I stood for what felt like an eternity as I battled my personal feelings. I had been sent there to do a job and that job was take a photo for the paper. In that moment I stood with sweaty hands imagining how angry his friends and family would be at me. “How could you do that to him Nikki?” I would get asked days later by our mutual friend. As Sheriff Houser and Josh passed in front of me I clicked. I felt like slime as I pulled the camera away from my face. I whispered, “I’m sorry” to Josh and just stood there. My feet felt like they were stuck to the floor. I realized much like others have in the last few weeks that I cant let my personal feelings alter my job performance. Had it been anyone else in that courthouse I would have been giddy with getting the photo for the front page. When you sign up to work for a newspaper in a small community they don’t tell you in the hiring process that you will cover someone who is your friend or family. You will have to decide between your head or your heart and it’s a tough decision when you take pride in your work.

That same day in the courthouse I was able to speak with Sheriff Randy Houser. I had a hard time being able to tell if he was incredibly hurt or disappointed, or both. When he spoke of Josh’s previous job performance he beamed with pride. Sheriff Houser clearly cares deeply about his deputies and their job performance. This is the first instance I have been able to work with Sheriff Houser and I came out with a lot of respect for him and his position. The roller coaster of emotions must have been awful for his entire staff.

We don’t know the motive and its possible we never will. People keep contacting me asking if I know why. “Why did he do it?” I honestly don’t know. I know what everyone else knows. Human error can be a horrible thing. We were all affected by these events. We were angry with this phantom person who would shoot at our friend. We were sad and many of us prayed for Josh and prayed for justice. This is why there is so much anger. We feel used. Its not a good feeling either. I believe Josh knows what he did was wrong. I know he is a good person who made a mistake. Life happens and we lose our way. I also understand the anger and backlash this shooting has caused but I will never understand condemning someone to death for a lapse in judgment.



Gubernatorial race: Rural Versus urban

It is just flat out hard to deny that the coming Nebraska Governor’s race is all about the city mouse and the country mouse.

The gist of that story is about how each of the mice viewed things differently when forced to cope with circumstances that were outside their familiar environment. It’s a lesson that Democrats will likely pursue in their effort to promote candidate Chuck Hassebrook in his race against Republican Pete Ricketts. And it’s not a bad approach to take in a state where Republicans dramatically outnumber Democrats.

It takes less than a handful of fingers to count the number of Democrat governors in the last 50 years and the most successful Democrats, Jim Exon and Ben Nelson, were Centrists. The two, along with fellow Democrat Bob Kerrey, also discovered the secret to winning big in populous Lincoln and Omaha as a way to victory. The game is playing your power base well and then picking up as many of the population centers that dot the Platte River system from Scottsbluff to Columbus.

But the race this year is pitting small town born and reared Hassebrook, 59, against city born and reared Ricketts, 49.

Hassebrook was born in Platte Center, graduated from Central Community College and the University of Nebraska Lincoln and has lived in Lyons where he worked at the Center for Rural Affairs for 36 years, 18 of those as executive director. He was also an 18-year member of the University of Nebraska Board of Regents. He was chair of that board for two terms. Ricketts grew up in Omaha and graduated from the University of Chicago with an MBA in marketing and finance and worked at Union Pacific Railroad in Omaha and then worked his way up the ladder at Ameritrade Inc. He is also chairman of the Platte Institute for Economic Research.

Ricketts’s campaign refused an offer from Hassebrook to join in a pact to stop hidden donors from financing attack ads. The six-man Republican primary – won by Ricketts with just 26.5 percent of the vote – was easily one of the worst mud-slinging festivals in Nebraska history. Many of the attacks were against the number two finisher, Attorney General Jon Bruning, whose campaign blamed Ricketts for the ads. Ricketts vehemently denied the accusation.

In turning down Hassebrook’s offer, the Ricketts campaign said the Democrats have already gone negative in tweets after the primary calling their candidate “Wall Street Pete.” The campaign also said Hassebrook has distorted Rickett’s record with regard to the family-owned Chicago Cubs. Ricketts is a director for that major league baseball team.

For his part, Hassebrook said that Nebraskans have told him of their dislike of what was termed one of the ugliest campaigns in recent history. He outlined his intentions to run a clean campaign, but admitted that no candidate can unilaterally disarm and survive.

An independent blogger wrote

that Hassebrook’s dad took his son to a baseball game one time while Rickett’s dad bought his sons a baseball team.

Ricketts chose incumbent Lieutenant Governor Lavon Heidemann as his running mate and announced the choice early. Heidemann is a dairy farmer from Elk Creek and a former state senator who also chaired the Legislature’s Appropriations Committee.

Hassebrook, who said he would announce his running mate later this summer, said Ricketts picked Heidemann because he needed somebody with an agricultural background and government experience.

Having grown up on a farm that has been in the family for more than 100 years, Hassebrook said he has the experience and knowledge that Ricketts had to recruit in Heidemann.

Recent polling – interesting if not slightly premature – shows that Hassebrook is within 4 percent of Ricketts in terms of people who say how they would cast their vote. Given that statewide campaigns rarely heat up until Labor Day, this year could be an exception.

Hold on to your executive leather chairs and your milking stools folks, this one could be a real doozy!

Lovick worked for the Northrop Aircraft Inc, corporation in Hawthorne, CA, on Project 25, a star tracker device for use in navigating military aircraft and for the Douglas Aircraft Co. in Santa Monica, CA, designing control circuitry and serving as final checkout supervisor for the Nike missile project. He supervised several test firings at the White Sands Proving Ground in New Mexico.

At Lockheed he became an avionics engineer in an experimental design group who designed, built and used special electronic equipment for testing aircraft. In 1981, he received Lockheed's prestigious Robert E. Gross "Engineer/Scientists of Year" Award for "for his extensive contribution to the new technology incorporated in advanced avionic and microwave systems."

His slide rule is preserved in the Smithsonian Museum.

Kelly Johnson, head of Lockheed's Advanced Development Projects at the Skunk Works, credited Ed with saving the A-12 program, the prototype for the SR-71, in his personal notes. The CIA declassified the 50-year-old documents about the A-12 in 2008. Only Lovick is mentioned by name.

The new Wall of Fame member holds degrees in Electrical Engineering from the University of Illinois and a Master of Physics from the University of California at Los Angeles. His book, "Radar Man: A Personal History of Stealth," tells the story of his experiences from the prospective of an enthusiastic scientist in an innovative secret world, "enjoying the process of creating "Science Is Fun" in my book contains my story. I want to encouraging others to pursue science and engineering so that they also can experience the fun and adventures like I did."

Ed is a licensed aircraft pilot and an amateur musician. In retirement he and his wife reside in Northridge, CA.

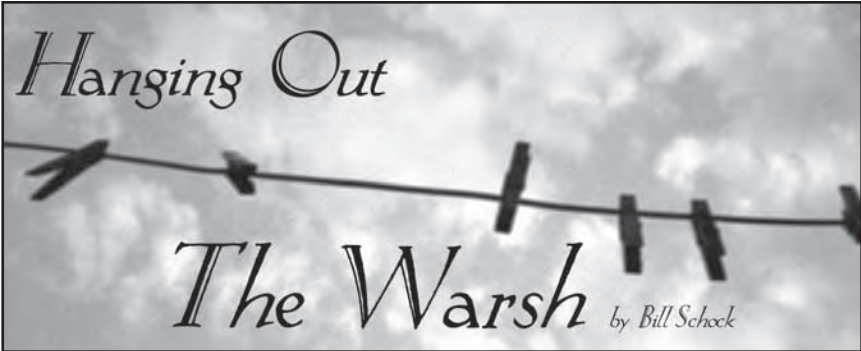

I hope you have read the citation, which went along with the induction of Edward Lovick Jr., Northridge, CA, in the FCHS Wall of Fame. He is one famous guy in the military aircraft industry.

One cannot over-emphasize the importance of the stealth safety factor to military aircraft. It is the way for our military aircraft to hide from enemy radar. In my opinion Ed Lovick is a genius.

Ed's late brother, Bob, was no slouch when it came to ingenuity and grey matter. He graduated from FCHS in 1939 and played on the 1939 Class A state basketball championship team. Bob was a mighty important factor in his 40-year career with Eastman Kodak. He held over 20 patents, which are registered in the U.S. and other countries. In the several years before his retirement in 1983 Bob was involved with preliminary studies of high definition TV. Their dad, Edward Lovick Sr., was a machinist for the Missouri Pacific Railroad.

The photos, plaques and brief biographies of the 20 FCHS grads in the Wall of Fame are on the wall opposite the entrance to the high school.

Nincehelsner getting mental eval

Former Richardson County Sheriff's Deputy Josh Nincehelsner has been transferred to the Nebraska Dept. of Corrections Lincoln Regional Center for mental evaluation, the Sheriff's Office reported Monday.

The 25-year-old Humboldt man June 20 was arrested at his home for allegedly staging the well-publicized events of June 9, when the then-deputy suffered a bullet wound in a supposed shoot-out with an unidentified gunman on a county road off Highway 75, four miles north of Dawson. Evidence seized during a subsequent investigation by the Nebraska State Patrol didn't corroborate Nincehelsner's story and he later confessed to fabricating the story and shooting himself in the arm with a RCSSO-issued weapon.

He faces felony charges of criminal mischief and use of a firearm to commit a felony, as well as misdemeanor charges of false reporting, obstructing government operations and abuse of public records. He is set to be arraigned in County Court at 10 a.m. Monday, July 14.

Nincehelsner was deputized in the summer of 2011 and in 2013 earned commendation from Sheriff Randy Houser.

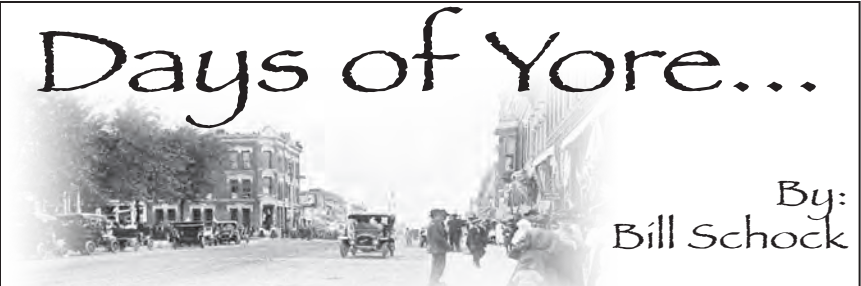

was hooked.”

Taylor, of course, was referring to the 1984 Orange Bowl loss to Miami in the National Championship. Like most everyone else, he was watching it on TV.

Though Taylor never quarterbacked Nebraska to a national title, he did enough to earn a place in the Nebraska Football of Fame.

“We were in the hunt every year,” he said, “and only some of the best teams in college football history beat us. I wanted the challenge of keeping

Nebraska’s tradition going. I feel very good about what we accomplished during my playing days.”

Following his collegiate campaign, Steve signed a multi-year contract with the Edmonton Eskimo Dynasty of the Canadian Football League and was still drafted by the Indianapolis Colts in the NFL a month later. During Steve’s 8-year CFL career, he appeared in three Grey Cup games and his team was crowned champion in 1992.

“While playing for Coach Osborne, I learned the importance of honesty

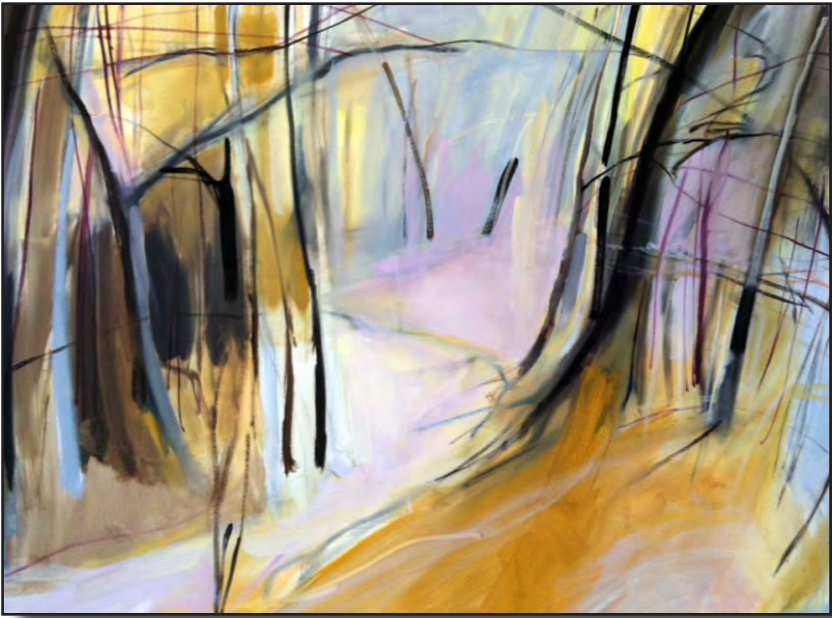
and hard work,” Taylor said.

Husker legend, Heisman Trophy winner and College Football Hall of Famer Johnny Rodgers was also in attendance, as was Clester Johnson, a receiver on two Nebraska National Championship teams in the 1990s, and Peru State College Head Men’s Basketball Coach Eric Behrens.
