FCPS teachers base salary now \$31,075

The Falls City District 56 School Board of Education Monday night voted to add \$725 to the teachers' base salary, which is now \$31,075 per year, and approved a 3.06 percent wage increase for 2011-12.

BOE members Kathy Bartek, Ed Harris, Scott Huppert, Scott Hollens and Teresa Olberding voted 5-0 to approve that wage hike, as well as 3.5 percent for classified staff and 2.21 percent for the four principals (FCHS Principal Gale Dunkhas, \$87,802; FCMS Principal Rick Johnson, \$89,548; South School Principal and Special Education Director J.P. Holys, \$74,500; North School Elementary Principal and Assessment Director Ernie Valentine, \$74,000).

Board President John Martin was absent from the meeting, held at the Central Office in FC Middle School. Included in the motion concerning compensation, the Board voted to continue insurance at the \$600 deductible for teachers, but will discontinue paying a \$250 deductible reimbursement.

Superintendant Tim Heckenlively noted that the district is currently compiling the preliminary budget with all eyes on Aug. 20, which is when property tax valuations must be certified.

The budget will be the first in two years to not include federal stimulus funds and that money will not be replaced by the state. State legislators this year bridged a projected \$900 million budget shortfall, but didn't have to decrease its aid to K-12 education in order to do so.

More optimistic news came out of Lincoln Monday, when Gov. Dave Heineman commented on June state General Fund receipts that came in \$19 million over projections. The state ended FY 2010-2011 above projections by approximately 4.3 percent.

"The continued gains in state receipts are a clear indication that Nebraska's economy continues to improve. Additionally, we are rebuilding our Cash Reserve Fund to \$362 million. This is good news for Nebraska and demonstrates that Nebraska's fiscal practices are keeping us in

Harriet Falter, 92, former art dealer, Journal columnist

Harriet Rudolph Falter, of Falls City, widow of John Charles Falter, passed away on Saturday, July 9, 2011 at the Falls City Care Center.

In the 1960s, 70s and 80s, she wrote a social column for The Falls City Journal called "Hattie's Hints."

She was born June 13, 1919, to Rodney F. and Martha Jacobs Rudolph in Atchison, Kan. She graduated from Atchison High School in 1937 and then attended Baker University. On March 9, 1943, she married John Charles Falter of Falls City. They made their home in Atchison until January of 1950 when they moved to Falls City.

Harriet enjoyed interacting with people and was a strong advocate of her community. In order to make newcomers feel welcome to town, she started a luncheon group called "Area Acquaintance." She gave piano lessons and had a preschool summer music program. She was the choir director and a member of the altar guild at church.

From 1977-2007 her business, Falter Art, became the only outlet in the country which sold

I suppose some newcomers to the community do not know who Harriet Falter was. But those who were born here and stayed, or came to Falls City and Richardson County in the past several decades, do. In fact, she may have been among the first to welcome you.

Harriet's obituary can be found on today's front page. She died last Saturday at Falls City Care Center, where she and her family members were among the most popular in the house. That's not surprising. Harriet was accomplished and easily made friends. Her interests were varied and numerous. She and husband John raised four children, each of whom have reflected their mom's intelligence, inquisitiveness and good nature. Three of those children survive.

Some might wonder why the Journal chose to place Harriet's obituary on the front page. The reasons are many. For years, she wrote a column for this newspaper, "Hattie's Hints." She formed "Area Acquaintance," a group of women who met regularly for lunch, inviting all newcomers to join them as a welcoming gesture. Harriet operated Falter Art, an enterprise that boosted the fabulous works of John Philip Falter and Maggie Furlong, as well as many other artists with local roots. Countless households in this town are proud to have a John Philip Falter print hanging on the wall, or a Maggie Furlong angel on the table, thanks to Harriet.

Among my earliest memories are ones that involve John and Harriet, Jeff, Dobey and Julie. Cathy came along a little later. My grandmother lived just across the alley and a bit north of the Falter home. We spent many childhood days riding trikes and bikes and playing games while my sister and I were visiting the neighborhood. As Dobey and I are of the same vintage, we remained good friends throughout the school years. Our families were social friends, too.

A remembrance of Hattie would not be complete without mention of her great love of Husker sports, especially football, and the academic achievements at the University. She and John attended I-don't-know-how-many-home-games during many years — guests in the Lincoln home of Dobey and her husband, Butch Haws. These were sort of like family gatherings in many respects, and friends were invited to take part. I was lucky to be one of those many friends. It was always fun on a Sunday morning after a Husker win to have a cup of coffee and a good conversation with Harriet, who could find a reference to someone in Richardson County in just about every state newspaper she read.

Earlier, I mentioned "Hattie's Hints." When I moved back to Falls City and joined the Journal staff in 1976, one of my duties was to type what Harriet had written. I looked forward to that assignment because of what I learned. Harriet knew everyone and spiced her column with tidbits of flattering and enlightening information about them. Jason Schock suggested a look at a "Hints" column so I randomly selected a file from Wednesday, May 3, 1978. "Greetings," Harriet wrote before exclaiming a "BULLETIN" that noted a crushed aluminum can collection to be conducted by 4-H kids. She invited all newcomers to that Friday's Area Acquaintance, where they might enjoy "the Elks tuna salad plate" and, for dessert, "Dutch strawberry-rhubarb pie (the homemade kind!)." You see, "Hattie's Hints" was not only informational. It also included advertising, which Harriet solicited. In that 1978 column were ads from the Elks, Sheets Pharmacy, Falls City Federal Savings & Loan and a bunch of other businesses. Harriet cleverly introduced those business names and their specials with news she had gathered. She was very good at it. Always included were upcoming birthdays and anniversaries and several "DIDJAKNOW" items. One item that caught my eye in the column: "Friends, please do not bring any more used greeting cards to Mabel Herling until further notice, okay?"

Harriet loved this community and the community loved her back — for who she was and for making this little spot in Southeast Nebraska a better place.

Natural remedies for arthritic hands

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 67-year-



husband old recently become affected by arthritis pain in his hands. They swell and his knuckles seem "stick." What are some ways of deal-

ing with this problem? He is currently taking aspirin for the pain, but we'd like to know if a supplement or anything else would be helpful.

DEAR READER: There are more than 100 types of arthritis, the most common of which is osteoarthritis. This form typically occurs as we age and is the result of joint cartilage breakdown. While typically seen in seniors, anyone can develop osteoarthritis; it generally affects weight-bearing joints such as the hips, knees and spine, but may be present in just about any joint in the body.

To determine if this is the cause of your husband's hand pain, I suggest he make an appointment with his physician for an examination, blood work and X-rays. Other types of arthritis can cause similar symptoms but may require different treatment. I will answer your question as though he has osteoarthritis since it is the most likely cause.

Over-the-counter anti-inflammatory drugs such as ibuprofen, naproxen and aspirin can relieve pain and swelling, but do not use more than the recommended

dose because they may upset the stomach.

Glucosamine chondroitin may prevent further damage and rebuild lost cartilage.

Topical castor oil, or castor oilbased lotions with capsaicin or menthol (such as Castiva), applied to the affected areas twice a day can reduce pain.

A purple grape juice and liquid pectin combination has been found to reduce pain and swelling while increasing mobility. Simply mix 8 ounces of the juice with 1 to 2 tablespoons of the liquid pectin; drink up to three times a day. When pain levels have been lowered, reduce the pectin to 1 to 2 teaspoons and drink the mixture once or twice a day as a maintenance dose. Other readers have had success using 4 ounces of grape juice and 8 ounces of apple juice, and a few brave souls have even taken the pectin without any juice at all. Apple pectin capsules have also been found beneficial by some, but they may be difficult to find.

Beyond that, prescription antiinflammatory and pain medications may be recommended. Exercise and physical therapy will keep the joints moving. Heat or ice applied to the affected areas several times a day may also relieve pain.

There are many options, so I urge your husband to see a physician to get to the bottom of the situation. Together, they can then come up with a treatment plan that will successfully ease pain, improve hand mobility and prevent further damage.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I am a 13-year-old girl. I have excessive arm hair, mostly between my elbows and wrist. Is there some reason for it?

DEAR READER: Unless you have other health concerns, the most likely reason is genetic. If your mother, grandmother and/ or other close female relatives also have excess forearm hair, you can blame them. Some ethnic backgrounds may be more prone to developing heavier amounts of arm, body or facial hair.

I suggest you speak with your physician regarding your concerns. Perhaps an examination and blood work may be in order if you are experiencing other symptoms you did not mention in your brief note.





One VIP (very important person) presentation to another VIP. That's what took place recently at the Falls City High School

Alumni reunion at Prichard Auditorium when Marlan W. Downey of Dallas, TX, presented the Wall of Fame certificate to Merle S. Bachman of Bellevue, one of this year's inductees. Both FCHS graduates have made it to the top of their chosen fields.

Two weeks ago you read in the Journal that Merle has four decades of experience in the architecture/engineering industry and is a registered architect in 38 states and Canada. During his tenure as president, HRD Architecture, with 1,600 employees worldwide and \$38,743,000 gross revenue was ranked as the second largest architecture firm in North America and the No. 1 leader in government buildings, health care and justice buildings.

Marlan worked for Shell Oil for 30 years, retiring in 1987 as president of Pecten International. He joined ARCO in 1987 and served successively as senior vice president of exploration, president and special adviser to the board of ARCO International. He is chairman of the board of Roxanna Oil Company. He has published dozens of articles on subjects in his field. After retiring he became Bartell Professor of Geoscience at the University of Oklahoma and chief scientist for the university's Sarkeys Energy Center. What do you have to do to get the same photo in the newspaper twice?

Be a target of the computer gremlins, I guess.

From the comments I have been getting I know our subscribers are reading the Journal. The FCHS reunion picture carried on two different pages was of Margaret Koester, the oldest grad (class of 1934) at the reunion and of Thelma Swisegood, Albert Rieschick and me, and we were celebrating our 75th year (1936).

The faux pas reminded me of a similar incident some years back. Cal Weddle was involved in a fender bumper in the Elks Club parking lot and I told about it in the Journal. The next day he took a terrific beating from the retirees in the club—his terrible driving, etc. Editor Jim Todd covered the Police Station that day and apparently had not read about Cal. So he ran the accident item thing in the paper for the second time. And again, Cal was at the mercy of his hecklers in the Elks—only worse.

Mr. Weddle didn't take it lying down. He called the Journal.

"Say," he said rather loudly, "if you run my (beep...beep) accident in the Elks parking lot again, would you like to run my picture with it?" Slam!! End of conversation!

Jim and I dodged Cal for the next few days.

Guys who ride Harley's love 'em. Take Steve Sperry, a retired Army lieutenant colonel out of West Point with two tours in Vietnam. He lives in Virginia, outside of Washington, and a few years back rode his Harley to the FCHS reunion. This year he did even better on his 50th year FCHS reunion. He and Rose rode their bikes from Virginia to visit some friends in Texas and then came on to Falls City. That's a lot of sitting and steering. Steve said he can do it from Virginia to Falls City in two days but with Rose it's a three-day voyage, gentleman that he is.

To attend the reunion several years ago, Leo Koester, who lives in Tucson, AZ, pedaled his bicycle from Tucson to Falls City and back home again. Leo was here this year, but not by bike. He is a son of the oldest grad, Margaret Koester.

I believe I know that the Bud Runyan-Wayne Pfister families, like lots of others, have had their fill of Missouri River flooding.

While rummaging through some of my mementoes, I came across the June 18, 1984, issue of the Journal and the coverage of that flood with the river cresting at 24.6 feet. Floodwater was up to the rooftops of homes at Big Lake. In one of the stories, Bud Runyan, east of Barada, said the floodwater was 10 to 12 feet deep on some of Runyan–Pfister land. Gary Bierman echoed Bud's words.

I remember pilot Jim Winsterman, who was flying me over the flooded area so I could take photos, remarking, "Bill, you'd better hope the engine doesn't quit."

In this column, I recounted how some of the other floods had made life miserable for those living and farming along the Big Muddy. In the epic flood 1952, the Runyan and Pfister families were forced out of their homes on the flooded bottomland and lived in the Cottier School for six weeks. In January of 1974, an ice gorge on the Missouri created an unexpected flood that trapped and drowned 500 head of Runyan-Pfister cattle. The cattle had retreated to a wooded area less than one-fourth mile from high ground but that wasn't good enough.

There will be similar miserable stories from the historic flood of 2011.

> LINCOLN - The purported budget cutters in Washington have a lot better deal than the Nebraska lawmakers.

> In Washington, some of the so-called fiscal conservatives want to keep alive some tax breaks that ordinary Nebras-

kans would like to share in, on a much, much, much smaller scale. Being fond of almost anything that will float, keep me dry and allow

me to cast a line, it's the fantabulous deal allowed for yacht owners that arouses the itch of envy.

If you have a yacht – not just a big boat, but a yacht – you can claim it as

It would be great to have a boat so big that it could serve as a real second home, but it would also seem to me that the thing would be an honest

The view from here: Fair would be fair enough. How about if those who own boats and buy bait (live or artificial), sunscreen, soda pop, life jackets and fishing poles and out-of-town lunches and breakfasts would be allowed to write them off their income taxes as "economic development credits."

Think about the money that goes through anglers and into local economies. It's a bunch.

And it's even more if you add in the occasional speeding ticket and, for some possibly over devoted to drowning bait, the once-in-awhile divorce. And subsequent alimony!

And the State of Nebraska wouldn't even have to participate.

Since it's the House and Senate who are so fond of water-oriented generosity in the tax code, the tax mercy could apply only to income taxable

Next on the listen of "How about some for the little guy" is the matter of allowing the multimillionaires and billionaires who run hedge funds to declare what is really their income as "capital gains."

Do you know what that means? It means that a guy with hundreds of millions of dollars in annual income only has to pay income tax at a rate of 15 percent!

We're not talking entrepreneurs. We're talking glorified management

with battalions of employees who do the real arithmetic. But, let's say those hedge fund managers are worth what they take – if

not what they earn. Or, let's say they can keep it, and their tax break. How about if ordinary Nebraskans only have to pay income taxes at the same rate as the guy who runs the company, but only if that rate is less than the employee currently pays.

Let's say you have an income that puts you above the 30 percent level. If the company's biggest big shot earns more than, say, triple your salary – but actually pays at a rate that is actually less than 30 percent – then you pay the same tax rate as them.

If the policymakers won't consider that scheme, then how about if the honchos have to pay at a rate at least equal to yours?

Some people might call such notions "class warfare." They are entitled to that opinion. But from here it seems more like something less than schoolyard scuffle, with the little guy looking for survival, rather than the defeat of the other fellow.

Our guess is that such schemes will appeal to the majority of Nebraskans

who don't earn better than a million bucks a year - and to virtually all of them who made less than \$10 million last year, and were taxed at 15 percent or less.







is good news for Nebraska and demonstrates that Nebraska's fiscal practices are keeping us in better shape than most of America," Heineman said.

Heckenlively noted the FCPS district would be able to fund its budget for the coming year.

It was also established that the district would continue to fund the position of the UNL Extension Educator who has been working in collaboration with both the Falls City and Humboldt schools, UNL Extension, FC EDGE and Humboldt SHARES.

The program focuses on teaching entrepreneurship and sciences at the high school.

Board member Scott Hollens said it was his understanding that FC was not going to continue to fund the program. Board members Kathy Bartek and Teresa Olberding said, though, that if teachers in the district thought there was value in the program then they should continue to fund the program.

It was noted that there are teachers, especially at the high school level (which is where the full focus of the Extension Educator's resources will now be spent) who see great value in the program.

The Extension Educator's salary and benefits will increase to a total of nearly \$39,200, but the district will scale back its contribution from \$10,000 to approximately \$4,700.

In other news Monday:

- Supt. Heckenlively gave first readings on policy recommendations, five of which were revisions to current policies and the other four are new policies. Final readings will be given at the next meeting.

- The board will have public hearings on Monday, Sept. 12, at 6:30 p.m. prior to the regular board meeting for the 2011-12 Budget of Disbursements, Receipts and Transfers, and Proports Tay Page 2011-15.

erty Tax Requests. - Supt. Heckenlively updated the board on the progress of the summer maintenance projects. Various concrete jobs around the district have been completed and include the sidewalk/entrance on the lot south of South School, patchwork in the high school parking lot, and improvements to the sixth grade entrance at the middle school. The drainage improvement project between the high school and Jug Brown Stadium will begin within the week. Additionally, the asphalt portion of the high school parking lot is presently being sealed and will be re-lined for parking.

- Determination will be finalized in August on the purchase of the new International route bus. The new 58-passenger will cost approximately \$79,000 with 50-percent of the cost coming from the 2010-11 budget and the remaining 50-percent to be paid in the fall as part of the 2011-12 fiscal budget.





Further investigation into this IP address determined it to be owned by SE Nebraska Communications in FC. On May 16, SENCO was served a subpoena that requested the subscriber information, which in turn led the investigators to Hall's residence at 212 W 10th

On June 7 Crosby served a search warrant at the address provided in the subpoena from SENCO. Hall was contacted at the residence and interviewed.

According to Crosby, Hall indicated he did have a filesharing program on his computer and that he had downloaded files that contained persons under the age of 18 engaged in sexually explicit conduct. Hall's computer was seized and examined by Investigator Sexton who is trained in the forensic analysis of computers used in criminal activity. The computer was found to have been using the same IP address as well as a unique GUID number that is produced when some Peer-to-Peer (P2P) software applications are installed, or updated on a computer.

Sexton also discovered 20 video files on the computer thought to be in violation of Nebraska law. The files were submitted to the National Center for Missing or Exploited Children (NCMEC) to determine if any of the children in the videos had been previously identified in other investigations. NCMEC indicated that in seven of the videos, at least one child had been previously identified by law enforcement. After Crosby reviewed all of 20 files a total of six were in violation of the law.

An arrest warrant was issued June 29 and Richardson County Sheriff Randy Houser took Hall into custody two days later.

Hall is scheduled to appear in county court July 20 for a preliminary hearing. He is free on bond.

What's wrong with my corn?

Last week I had a couple of calls from clients concerned about issues they had with their corn. When they first contacted me I wasn't aware of the problem being common this year, but I quickly learned that this phenomenon was wide spread across the region. The terminology I use for this condition is buggy whipping or twisted whorls. Many times we associate buggy whipping with injury from herbicide application. This usually occurs much earlier in the growing season. What we are seeing now is sometimes called accelerated growth syndrome. A few of the tops of the corn canopy stand out because of their bright yellow color in the normal sea of green plants. These trapped sunstarved leaves are now emerging and showing up in the fields. The concern was that the tassel would not emerge normally and thus pol-

lination may be compromised.

In Iowa, this condition was showing up a couple of weeks ago from the V5 to the V8 stage. The difference is most of the corn we are seeing this in is in the V10 to V12 stage. According to Roger Elmore, Extension Agronomist with Iowa State University, this similar phenomenon occurred in 2008 in Iowa. It also occurred in North Dakota in 2008 and is showing up in Illinois this year. In general there doesn't appear to be any yield impact from this condition unless it causes a delay in either growth or development. In traveling around Nemaha County and other counties in southeast Nebraska earlier in the week, I saw a number of fields that exhibited a small percentage of corn plants with yellow leaves at the top of the canopy scattered throughout the corn field. Towards the end of week most fields looked normal, so I would not expect to see any impact on corn yields in these fields. Corn plants produce a large amount of pollen, so pollination should not be an issue even if these few plants produce pollen off schedule.


So what caused this to happen in 2011? Due to widespread occurrence of this condition, it would appear it was due to an environmental stress. Corn in the region grew unbelievably fast the past 10 days. Some corn probably grew 3' or more in a week. Extreme fluctuations in temperatures also may have caused stress on plants. Finally, some of the exotic germplasm incorporated into adapted hybrids for the area have shown to exhibit twisted whorls this late in the growing season.


Another issue that also is showing up is green snap in some cornfields. Most of this is showing up in white corn varieties in southeast Nebraska. With the extremely rapid corn growth, maybe not ideal stalk strength and storms with strong winds, corn hybrids were vulnerable to green snap.


With the extremely humid conditions we have been experiencing, it is important to scout for corn diseases such as gray leaf spot. Gray leaf spot flourishes in wet, humid conditions with temperatures ranging from 70 – 900 F. It is important to keep the ear leaf and all the leaves above it healthy, as they contribute about 70% to corn yield. If gray leaf spot or other diseases are increasing in your corn, treatment with a fungicide may be warranted. If you have questions about these or other issues contact me at: (402) 274-4755.

Funding available for community tree planting

Communities wanting to plant shade trees can apply for Trees for Nebraska Towns grant funds until Oct. 1. The program, which focuses on plant diversity and sustainable landscapes, provides grant funding and technical assistance to public-oriented projects that emphasize the planting of large-maturing trees in Nebraska communities.

Grant coordinator Kendall Weyers said, "Over the last few decades, Nebraska communities have lost 30-50 percent of their tree canopy to disease, insects, extreme weather, old age, development and human neglect." TNT funds seek to replace these lost trees and the many benefits they provide. According to Weyers, "the positive impacts of trees go far beyond shade to a wide range of economic, environmental, aesthetic and social benefits."

TNT funding, provided by the Nebraska Environmental

Trust, a beneficiary of the Nebraska Lottery, is coordinated by the Nebraska Forest Service and is part of ReTree Nebraska's 10-year effort to plant one million trees by 2017.

Eligible sites include, but are not limited to, parks, schools, college campuses, libraries, courthouses, fairgrounds, recreation areas, research and extension centers, cemeteries and public golf courses. Private properties may be eligible if they provide clear public benefit. Projects must be located within or near the incorporated limits of a Nebraska community.

Eliminating breeding grounds for mosquitos

With the flooding that has occurred this summer and recent rains, there are areas of standing water, which are breeding areas for mosquitoes. Recent reports indicate that West Nile Virus is present in Nebraska. Whatever we can do to eliminate breeding sites for mosquitoes will reduce the potential for West Nile Virus.

Anything that can trap and hold water is a potential breeding site for mosquitoes, i.e. bird baths, wading pools, and pails. In the country, potential breeding sites include ponds, sewage lagoons, ditches, old tires, and tin cans. There are certain biological agents that are specific to mosquito larvae and other aquatic flies, Bti (Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis). While lethal to the larvae, it is safe for birds.

fish, mammals and other organisms. These microbial insecticides (AquabacTM, TeknarTM, BactimosTM, VectobacTM) are available as briquettes and granules. These products can be found at garden centers, hardware stores and farm supply stores. Once these products are wetted they will be slowly released and may be effective for up to 30 days.

There is also a growth regular, methoprene that just kills mosquito larvae and is available in briquette or granular form. In water that has a high level of organic matter, such as stagnant sewage lagoons, the product Bacillus sphaericus (Vectolex CGTM) can be used. Whenever you use any of these chemicals, be sure to follow label directions.

For control of adult mosquitoes in your yard or on your farmstead there are a number of insecticides that can be used. This is especially important if you are having outdoor activities. Appropriate insecticides for adult control include: bifenthrin, permenthrin, lambda-cyhalothrin and cyfluthrin. While these insecticides only last a few days, it is helpful to apply them a few hours before an outdoor gathering. For temporary relief of flying adult mosquitoes outdoors, the use of an aerosol fogger and fogging device containing pyrethrins or permethrin are helpful for immediate knock down. The use of citronella candles or lanterns containing citronella oil will also help repel adult mosquitoes.

It is also important to wear mosquito repellent if you or your children are doing outdoor activity, especially during the evening hours. The use of a repellent containing DEET is recommended and there are a number of repellents available that contain this product. Be sure to follow label directions and it will be safe.

ON RELIGION

Evangelical vs. 'Secular' America

When evangelical leaders look at the United States of America, they do not see a country defined by the familiar Gallup Poll statistic stating that 92 percent of its citizens profess some kind of belief in God.

Nor do they see a land that is only 1.6 percent atheist and 2.4 percent agnostic, according to the U.S. Religious Landscape Survey by the Pew Forum on Religion and Public Life. They do not see a land in which another 12.1 percent of the people do not embrace any one religion "in particular," but insist that "spirituality" plays some role in their lives.

In other words, they do not see a remarkably, if somewhat vaguely, religious nation -- especially in comparison with other modern industrialized lands.

No, when elite evangelicals see America today the word that comes to mind is "secular."

In fact, 92 percent of evangelical leaders from the United States who took part in a new Pew Forum survey said they are convinced that secularism is a "major threat" to the health of evangelical Christianity in their land, a threat even greater than materialism, consumerism and the rising tide of sex and violence in popular culture.

In a related question, a majority of U.S. evangelical leaders -- 82 percent -- said they are convinced that their churches are currently losing clout in American life.

In this study, researchers surveyed nearly 2,200 evangelical leaders from around the world who were invited to participate in last year's Lausanne Congress on World Evangelization in Cape Town, South Africa.

"This rising fear of secularism" among top American evangelicals "really surprised us, especially when you compared their feelings to the more optimistic attitudes among evangelicals in other parts the world," noted John C. Green of the University of Akron, a senior Pew Forum research advisor.

So what is happening? For generations, he explained, evangelicals have "primarily been defined in terms of their conflicts with other religious groups, with other faiths. ... But now, it seems that they are increasingly starting to see themselves in terms of conflicts with those who are either indifferent to religion or who are openly hostile to traditional forms of religion."

Thus, it seemed that when these evangelical leaders used the term "secularism" they were not always referring to people and groups with no religious convictions at all. Instead, they were expressing their concerns about the rising numbers of people in America and around the world who simply do not practice any one form of faith, as traditionally defined.

"They don't seem to know what to call the unorthodox expressions of faith that you see among the so-called 'spiritual, but not religious' people," said Green. Thus, the frustrated evangelical leaders may be "lumping them all together under the term 'secularism."

In contrast to this surge of pessimism in North America, evangelicals from other parts of the world were more optimistic about the future.

This was especially true among those from Africa, Asia, Latin America and the rest of the so-called "Global South." Other survey results included:

-- While only 41 percent of northern leaders believed the state of evangelicalism would improve in the next five years, 71 percent of those in the Global South were convinced things would be "better than now" for their churches. In the Global North, 33 percent of those surveyed thought things would soon get worse.

-- While in overwhelming agreement (96 percent) that "Christianity is the one, true faith," these evangelical leaders were somewhat divided on a key authority issue, with 50 percent saying the "Bible should be read literally, word for word" and 48 percent saying "not everything in the Bible should be taken literally."

-- Not surprisingly, 90 percent of evangelicals from Muslim-majority nations said Islam poses a major threat to their future work, compared with 41 percent from those living elsewhere. However, survey participants from Muslim lands held more favorable views of Muslims and their faith than did evangelical leaders from other countries.

-- The Lausanne Congress participants were convinced that evangelicals in the Global South currently have "too little influence" in the leadership of world Christianity. Researchers found it particularly interesting that leaders in the United States and other parts of the Global North were even more likely to hold this point of view -- 78 percent compared to 62 percent -- than their counterparts in the Global South.


