

State officials to discuss plan for Harlan/73

Meeting tonight, 4-6 p.m.

The Nebraska Dept. of Roads will host an Open House from 4-6 p.m. tonight (Tuesday, July 14) at the Falls City Senior Center and discuss a construction project that includes a nearly three-mile stretch of Highway 73, including Harlan Street through Falls City. The plan will reduce much of Harlan Street from four lanes to three.

The public is encouraged to attend and ask questions regarding the project known as "In Falls City and North."

The proposed project will run from 7<sup>th</sup> Street north to a mile outside of the northern corporate limits of Falls City. The price tag is estimated to be around \$1.6 million. The plan is to take the current four-lane portions of Hwy. 73 from 7<sup>th</sup> to 19<sup>th</sup> Streets make it a three-lane road with one northbound lane, one southbound lane and a milled left-hand turn lane.

State employees will be available to hear concerns and answer questions.

cost of nearly \$3 million.

Preliminary work for the Wilderness Falls II project is currently

derness Falls II project is currently underway. This year-long construction project, which includes seven duplexes, will consist of four (4) two-bedroom units, eight (8) three-bedroom units and two (2) four-bedroom units that will rent for \$475, \$515 and \$560 per month, respectively.

The Wilderness Falls II housing development will be all one level and include a zero entry design, patio and attached garage. Exterior features will include partial brick, shutters, landscaping, and lawn sprinklers with amenities such as a washer and dryer, dishwasher, refrigerator and microwave in each unit. Tenants will also enjoy a maintenance-free living environment and a shared community garden which will be developed as part of the project.

"Every community needs choices when it comes to senior and family living facilities," EDGE Executive Director Beckie Cromer said.

"Excel Development Group continues to build a waiting list of individuals looking to live in their units and I'm sure this is welcome news for the many who have been waiting years for the opportunity to live at Wilderness Falls. Excel Development Group has a proven reputation and we thank them for their investment in Falls City."

This project addresses a direct need as outlined in the 2010 Falls City Housing study.



# Death and taxes, a certain thing in the interim

Ben Franklin is credited with saying "In this world nothing can be said to be certain, except death and taxes." The same holds true for the interim of the 104th Legislature, that awkward time between adjournment of the

first session and the start of the University of Nebraska football season.

The matter of taxes still rests on the plate of the Legislature, with

at least four interim studies scheduled by the Revenue Committee to narrow the focus of the on-going discussion of tax relief. Gov. Pete Ricketts has promoted property tax relief as the panacea. Lawmakers say they want to look at all tax categories and many want to focus on funding formulas for Nebraska schools.

Overshadowing the entire debate is the catastrophe in Kansas where vigorous tax relief efforts the past few years have created a \$279 million shortfall and forced state government to make some tough decisions. Independent analysts say that the state faces a \$384 million tax increase in 2016 while revenue will still lag behind spending by a tenuous amount. Many state programs have constricted budgets and state employees have gone several years without even a cost of

living raise. So much for taxes. The death issue comes in the form of the Legislature's override of Ricketts' veto of a bill that would ban executions. That decisive action was followed with the formation of Nebraskans for the Death Penalty, a group that is using paid petition circulators to obtain 115,000 valid signatures of registered voters to put the matter to a vote of the people in the 2016 general election. Organizers will need at least 150,000 signatures

to have enough valid ones. By the end of August, getting 5 percent of the state's registered voters to sign up will put the issue on the ballot, but to suspend the death penalty ban from becoming law, those in favor of it will need 10 percent of Nebraska voters to sign their petition.

Ricketts and Attorney General Doug Peterson are hoping for the latter. Ricketts has announced that the state has already purchased the necessary chemicals to carry out executions of the 10 men on Death Row. Opponents of the death penalty say the state faces protracted appeals from those 10 if the state wants to carry through with its effort before letting voters decide the matter. The two men have repeatedly said the death penalty remains an important tool for Nebraska's prosecutors when seeking punishment for the most heinous crimes.

So serious is the effort that Ricketts and his father, Joe Ricketts, have each contributed \$100,000 to fund the organization. That's \$200,000 of the \$240,000-plus raised so far.

Adding to the drama is the formation of a group opposing the death penalty and the referendum. The new coalition, called Nebraskans for Public Safety, has secured \$400,000 through a grant made possible by the ACLU of Nebraska. The group includes members of Nebraskans for Alternatives to the Death Penalty, the Nebraska Innocence Project, the ACLU of Nebraska, faith leaders,

conservative leaders, and the Nebraska Criminal Defense Attorneys Association. The group says it will focus on public education efforts showing that the death penalty is broken beyond repair and noting the state has been unable to carry out an execution since 1997.

It is interesting to note that the dissenters in a recent Supreme Court of the United States opinion on a lethal injection execution appeal from Oklahoma also called the death penalty, nationwide, a broken system. The

> dissent called for someone to present the constitutionality of the death penalty as a

whole for consideration by the high court. That would be a welcome dis-

Nebraska's property taxes ranked 13th highest in the nation, according to a ranking by the Tax Foundation, based on 2012 figures. Agriculture's portion of the total state property tax bill has grown from 19 percent in 2004 to 29 percent in 2014. Farmers have to pay the property tax whether they have a good year or a bad year.

The governor, as did his predecessor, has pushed for more property tax relief. But, to avoid the debacle of Kansas, that loss in property tax revenue will have to be offset by increases in other taxes and fees or more budget cutting. Not an easy solution any way you slice it. Let's hope that clear heads prevail in this situation.

# Ricketts: Jobs plan 'represents paradigm shift for unemployment'

Growing Nebraska will not happen by accident - it takes careful planning. Connecting Nebraskans to good jobs is one way we can ensure that our state continues to grow, and it is something that I have directed members of my team to work on in their agencies across all of state government. For job creators, this is particularly important in light of our state's lowest-in-the-nation unemployment rate of 2.6 percent. At the Department of Labor, growing job opportunities means looking for new ways to help unemployed Nebraskans expeditiously reenter the workforce by finding good jobs that fit their skills and experience.

This week, my administration announced the launch of Nebraska's new reemployment system aimed at helping unemployment claimants reenter the workforce and making it easier to find a good job. Our state's program developed by the Nebraska Department of Labor is the first of its kind

of any state in the nation, and has won approval from the U.S. Department of Labor. The goal of the program is to utilize personal one-on-one assistance to connect the approximately 10,000 Nebraskans looking for work and applying for unemployment benefits with some of the over 50,000 jobs in the state's job opening database.

Our state's reemployment program is unique to other states for a couple reasons. First, nearly all jobseekers who receive unemployment benefits will be required to enroll in an individualized reemployment plan to remain eligible for benefits. Department of Labor staff will meet with each worker to develop their individualized reemployment plan shortly after an application is submitted for unemployment benefits.



Second, the reemployment program leverages cutting edge software that requires jobseekers to create a resume searchable by potential employers who can make queries for skill inventory, find resumes with the right experience, and proactively reach out to potential applicants. Previously, the department successfully utilized a limited version of this program for jobseekers with a high probability of exhausting their benefits.

Nebraska's new reemployment program has several components that will ensure that jobseekers in our state have the best resources on hand as they look for their next job. For example, not only will jobseekers work with agency staff to develop individual employment plans, but they will also help them to identify goals and objectives and determine the appropriate combination of services for the participant to meet their employment goals. These plans are designed to help engage the individuals and provide them with a clear understanding of where they are going.

Additionally, all participants will be required to create an account on the state's employment website, NEworks. This account will allow individuals access to employment tools and resources, such as a resume builder, a messaging center to communicate with employers and workforce staff, free online learning resources, job search options including a virtual recruiter to identify personalized employment opportunities, and access to their individual employment plan.

Finally, this reemployment program will use assessments to provide data-driven opportunities to jobseekers. The assessments will cover career interests, skills confidence, and work values. The results will be reviewed with the jobseeker to ensure they represent an accurate picture of the individual and to identify areas of knowledge, skill, and ability that they can leverage as productive members of the workforce. The assessments will then be used in conjunction with labor market information and previous work experience to determine options and opportunities that exist in the current job market.

The formal launch of this program in October represents a paradigm shift for our unemployment system. By focusing on reemployment, we can help Nebraskans reenter the workforce more quickly and ensure that they are meeting their career goals, while connecting our state's job creators with talent across our state. ### FC Public named a finalist for America's Farmers Grow Rural Education grant

Falls City Public Schools has been announced as a finalist in this year's America's Farmers Grow Rural Education program, sponsored by the Monsanto Fund. Falls City Public Schools is among the top districts in Nebraska in the running for grants of \$10,000 and \$25,000.

Earlier this year, farmers nominated their local public school districts to apply for Grow Rural Education grants. Once nominated, school districts were eligible to complete applications requesting funding for a specific math or science project that will enhance curriculum in their district. This year's applications were again very competitive. A panel of math and science educators evaluated all of the applications and selected the strongest submissions as finalists.

"Making it to this stage of the process is a great accomplishment that requires a lot time and effort," said Michelle Insco, Monsanto Fund program officer. "There is still more to do before we announce our winning school districts, but this year's finalists submitted impressive applications. The Monsanto Fund is grateful for their focus on improving math and science opportunities for their students."

Next, finalist applications will be reviewed by the Grow Rural Education Farmer Advisory Council. The Advisory Council, made up of farmers from across the U.S., will select this year's winners, who will be announced in early August.

Last year, Grow Rural Education awarded over \$170,000 in public school districts across Nebraska to improve math and science curriculums. Since 2012, Nebraska school districts have received \$420,000 through the program.

Projects funded over the last four years have helped school districts across the U.S. upgrade technology and scientific lab equipment, build greenhouses and outdoor classroom learning environments, update teacher and curriculum development and other math and science related initiatives.



# Falter picture brings big bucks

A John Philip Falter painting, which portrayed a Sunday family picnic in Troy, KS, was recently reportedly sold during an auction on eBay for a whopping \$190,000, according The Kansas Chief, which featured the story and painting on the front page of it's June 11, 2015 edition.

The illustration had appeared on the cover of the former Saturday Evening Post magazine on Oct. 20, 1945.

The information was provided to The Chief by subscriber Mary Winder, of Troy, who told reporter Paul Stewart her husband found the painting, titled "Sunday Picnic, Troy, KS" and decided to sell it on

"Even though the painting has 'Troy, KS' in its title, the house is apparently located between Troy and Atchison, north of Atchison, on Highway 7, on the west side of the highway. The house looks like its in need of some TLC currently," Winder is quoted by Stewart as saying.

According to Janet "Dobey" (Falter) Haws, a cousin of the famous artist and curator of the newly created John Philip Falter Museum in Falls City, several Falter family members are depicted in the paint-

"George and John W. Falter are conversing in the foreground; Jeff is the baby near the porch in Mattie Rudolph's arms with John C. (in the Navy uniform) and Harriet Falter looking on," Dobey said.

"Kate Falter is setting the picnic table, with some of her famous potato salad, no doubt! Butch and I have driven by the house on Hwy.

7 north of Atchison several times. "It's nice to see that John's works are selling well."

Both Norman Rockwell and John Falter painted 'covers' for the Post. They both also painted (sometimes) humorous depictions of American life.

"It's not every day that a painting of an area home sells for \$190,000. And, I expect people would be interested to learn that the painting was on the cover of The Post," Winder said.

Other area towns painted by Falter during his career include: "A Windy Day in Atchison"; "Falls City, NE at Christmas" and the "Country Club Plaza in Kansas". Other memorable illustrations on Post covers include: Yankee Stadium, on April 19, 1947; Michigan Avenue in Chicago, on Oct. 15, 1960, and Park Street in Boston, on Jan. 1, 1961.

"I recorded most of it, but Vince plays some leads on the record and he plays the ukulele and also does back up vocals," Thompson said.

A web site is currently in the works - once it's up, the other four songs on the record will be avail-

"We are going to release teasers and eventually release the whole thing for everyone to hear," Thompson said.

Thompson has played acoustic solo shows under his name, but decided it wasn't the path he wanted to take. He wanted to have a full band and that's when Everything Breathes was officially born. In addition to Dean, Maze also joins

the ensemble, as does another of Thompson's college friends.

'We are still looking for a bassist but eventually we'll find one. I'll sing and everyone will sing a little bit, but it will mostly be me," Thompson said.

Maze and Thompson have been playing music together for many years. Dean joined in four years ago and the boys have been making music ever since.

Thompson writes all of the songs and sends them to the other members to listen and see if they like

"Everything Breathes plays alternative rock — or just really 'personal' rock," Thompson said.

Eventually the band plans to send its music to other labels and hopefully get picked up. For now, they will just keep playing music with Kerekes and record a full-length record when they get enough songs and enough support.

"It (the music) gives people a look at things that you normally wouldn't share, but it's the only way to come to terms with some things," Thompson said.

"After my shows in Lincoln, people would come up to me and say that they really related to one of my songs. That's the coolest thing ever when you kind of help someone for a moment."

# \$3.5 million granted to UNMC researchers to study failure of stents in treating PAD

Researchers at the University of Nebraska Medical Center have received a five-year, \$3.5 million grant funded by the National Institutes of Health to find out why stents don't work well for treating peripheral artery disease.

In the last decade, there's been an explosion in treating PAD using angioplasty and stenting - a minimally invasive procedure in which the patient is awake and usually leaves the hospital the next day.

Stents, small tubular metal devices that doctors put in diseased arteries to keep them open, work well in the heart, but often fail miserably in the leg arteries. Though peripheral artery disease stents may generally work for many patients, there is significant room for improvement as many patients require repeat procedures in as little as one or two years, said Jason MacTaggart, M.D. A national study estimated the cost at \$21 billion a year.

Dr. MacTaggart, a vascular surgeon, and Alexey Kamenskiy, Ph.D., a biomedical engineer, both assistant professors in the UNMC Dept. of Surgery, are co-principal investigators of the research study.

"There are several ways to treat PAD, but none of them are really very good," Dr. MacTaggart said.

"It's frustrating for doctors and patients. Everybody is trying to build a better mouse trap, but nobody really has. With the support of the UNMC department of surgery and our team of collaborators, we are taking a rational approach to figure out why stents don't work very well in the legs."

Researchers will study donor cadavers and arteries of various ages and stages of disease to gain accurate information to design computer models that would be used to determine which stent is best to use in individual patients. The computer predictions will be verified in PAD patients receiving stents at NE Medicine, UNMC's hospital partner, and the VA Medical Center.

"Our goal is to help make better stents and to personalize PAD interventions," Dr. Kamenskiy said. "Right now there's a lot of art to using stents in PAD. We are trying to do less art and more science."

PAD reduces or completely cuts off blood flow in the leg arteries. This results in pain, numbness of the feet, inability to walk, wounds that won't heal, and, in worse case scenarios, amputation of the toes, feet or legs. The risk factors include diabetes, smoking, high blood pressure, high cholesterol and obesity.

# FSA reminds of reporting deadline

Richardson County USDA Farm Service Agency Executive Director Shawna Mitchell reminds producers of the July 15 acreage reporting deadline for spring seeded crops

"In order to comply with FSA program eligibility requirements and avoid late file fees, all producers are encouraged to visit the Richardson County FSA office to file an accurate, timely crop certification report," said Mitchell.

The following acreage reporting dates apply for producers in Richardson County:

July 15, 2015: Spring seeded crops, CRP, and all other crops for the 2015 crop year.

Nov. 16, 2015: Fall seeded crops and perennial forage for the 2016

The following exceptions apply to the above acreage reporting

• If the crop has not been planted by the acreage reporting date, then the acreage must be reported no later than 15 calendar days after planting is completed.

• If a producer acquires additional acreage after the acreage reporting date, then the acreage must be reported no later than 30 calendars days after purchase or acquiring the lease. Appropriate documentation must be provided to the county

• If a perennial forage crop is reported with the intended use of "cover only," "green manure," "left standing," or "seed" then the acreage must be reported by July 15.

According to Mitchell, filing timely acreage certifications with FSA establishes eligibility for programs including: Marketing Assistance Loans, Loan Deficiency Payments, Conservation Reserve Program, Agriculture Risk Coverage and Price Loss Coverage, Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) and others.

If a weather related event has caused the inability to plant an intended crop or has caused a planted crop to fail, it is important to report these claims to both FSA and your crop insurance provider timely.

For NAP policy holders, the acreage reporting date for NAP covered crops is the earlier of the dates listed above or 15 calendar days before grazing or harvesting of the crop begins.







# Bond between grandparents and grandkids benefits both

What used to be the "golden years" of life for seniors is now turning into any opportunity to spend even more time with their youngest family members. Nowadays, a growing number of grandparents are called on to provide child care for their grandkids, many of whom are growing up in two-income households. And an April 2012 study for the MetLife Mature Market Institute and the nonprofit Generations United, an intergenerational policy group, found that 74 percent of respondents provided weekly child care or babysitting service for grandkids.

Grandparents often cite helping their own children financially as well as staying in touch with grandchildren as motivating factors behind providing care. According to Generations United, staying in touch with grandkids can give seniors a feeling of self-worth and improve their overall health.

When spending so much time together, grandparents may develop special relationships with their grandchildren, who may benefit from the knowledge and wisdom offered by their elders. The following are some lessons grandparents can share with youngsters.

\* Empathy: By sharing stories of how things were when they were younger, when opportunities may have been more scarce, grandparents can help teach grandchildren empathy. Grandchildren may learn to be grateful for the things they have and the people around them, rather than taking what they have for granted.


\* Family history: Grandparents can tell grandchildren about family members, including youngsters' own parents, and shed light on the generations that came before them. Looking through photos or watching old movies can provide the avenue by which to start conversations about family history and give children opportunities to ask questions.

\* Interests: Children may be excited about learning new skills or hobbies taught to them by their grandparents. Anything from gardening to woodworking can be shared.

\* Respect: Children who grow up respecting their grandparents may have an increased tendency to respect authority figures outside their homes, which may help kids grow up to be more courteous and kind.

Grandchildren also offer benefits to their grandparents. Companionship, new experiences and conversation can help keep grandparents' minds sharp and bodies active well into their golden years.

second in the Professional competition in the brisket category, upsetting the nationally ranked "Iowa's Smokey D's." Cromer, who had considered not competing this year, said he changed his mind last minute.

"I enjoy barbecue and coming out and seeing everyone and I'd be happy to get in the top ten, I just hope for the best," said Cromer.

Starting at 11 a.m. Friday with his nephew, Ryan Bauman, Cromer recognized this year's more experienced competition, "It's going to be tough," he said.

Tough it was for "Crome's Smoke" — the team placed 30th overall, 11th in chicken, 20th in pork ribs, 31st in pork and 30th in brisket.

Parked next to "Crome's Smoke" was five-year veteran Gary Jones and his team "Buck Snort BBQ."





Jones, who came from North Platte for the competition, has been doing this for a while.

"Normally I do four or five of these events a year but this year, this is only my second," he said.

"Buck Snort BBQ" also had success in last year's first annual Sauce and Cycles event, placing second in ribs. When asked what "Buck Snort's" specialty was, without hesitation, "ribs" said Jones.

He said the long drive from North Platte is worth it.

"It's fun seeing people and down here we have a lot of family here," Jones said, referring (at least) to his brother Jim.

Jones had nothing but praise for Falls City Chamber Director David Branch, the founder, director and heat shield for FC's Sauce and Cycles.

"This is a good one, and I'd say it's right up there. I mean I've been to some that aren't very organized but this one is well organized and ran well and the money is good," Jones said.

Branch, too, was happy for the most part with the 2015 version of

Like Cromer, Jones also realized that competition would be stiff this year. "Buck Snort BBQ" placed 17th over all, 12th in chicken, 24th in ribs, 18<sup>th</sup> in pork and 11<sup>th</sup> in brisket.

In the Backyard Grillers competition, last year's overall winner, husband and wife team "Limp Brisket" (Mitch and Julie Sailors) did well again, placing 3rd overall, 2nd in backyard pork, and 4th in backyard ribs. The big winner in the Backyard Grillers was the "Farmhouse Firestarters" team, who placed first in all events.

The KC Barbecue Society was on hand again - 45 strong - to judge the professional cookers, followed by the Backyard Grillers. After the BBQ awards were presented, the motorcycles were judged on seven different categories. Barbecue was available for purchase from the cookers with the purchase of a \$10 wristband. Along with the Sauce & Cycles event the Chamber hosted an outdoor showing of Wild Hogs on Friday night and the High Heel Band performed Saturday night.

"All in all, there were a few missteps, but mostly behind the scenes, and we'll make some changes and try and make it bigger and better next year," Branch said.

#### NRD Board votes to increase fund allowance

The Nemaha NRD Board of Directors last Thursday, July 9, examined a proposed budget for the new fiscal year, and unanimously voted to increase the restricted fund allowance by an additional one percent. This action will not result in more property taxes collected but does ensure the opportunity for future use of the funds. A 75 percent positive vote was required, and the board approved the increase unanimously.

# Freeman, now Huskers' top golfer, leads Aitken,

Miller-Monroe to title at 5th annual CMC event

The team of Bob Aitken/Miller-Monroe, comprised of Aitken, Bill Simon, Ron Kelley and University of Nebraska No. 1 golfer Calvin Freeman, a Humboldt-TR-S graduate, shot 11-under 59 to win the Championship Flight of the fifth annual Community Medical Center Charity Golf Outing held at the Falls City Golf Club.

Other notable "celebrity" players included former Husker and NFL linemen Brenden Stai and Aaron Graham, NU All-American and Kansas City Chief Hall of Famer Neil Smith, and former Husker All-America quarterbacks Tommie Frazier and Steve Taylor.

Freeman, the son of Barb and Randy Freeman, of Table Rock, is a history major at UNL and last spring used up his final year of eligibility. He now has set his sights on joining the professional ranks.

Freeman, a four-time state medalist, graduated from HTRS in 2011, finishing runner-up in Class C State (after losing a playoff) for the second year in a row. In the spring of 2010, as a high school junior, Freeman earned statewide acclaim with a remarkable 7-under-par 64 (33-31) at the Tecumseh Country Club.

After high school, he first went to SCC in Beatrice for two years - earning first team NJCAA All-America honors both seasons. Freeman tied for second at nationals as a sophomore after a sixth-place finish as a freshman. He also won the Region IX and SCC Spring Invite individual titles during his time in junior college.

After transferring to UNL, Freeman quickly made his way to the front of the line for the Huskers, starting 11 tournaments and playing to a 74.9 stroke average in 31 rounds as a junior. At the Desert Shootout in the spring of 2014, Freeman opened with 68 before rounds of 72 and 71 en route to a 5-under-par 211 total, his best 54hole score of the season. In his very next event, Freeman again fired 68, this time in the final round of the Hawkeye Invitational. The score marked the best by an individual among the 65-player field during the rainy final day. At the Oak Hill Intercollegiate, he was one of four Huskers to finish in the top 10, notching a tie for ninth at 12-overpar 222.

This past spring, Freeman was Nebraska's top player, leading the team with a 74.94 stroke average and firing a team-best seven subpar rounds of golf. At the Mark Simpson Invite, the college senior opened with another 68, and also earned his best career finish with a tie for 3<sup>rd</sup> place at 5-under-par. His lowest 54-hole score of the season came at the Denver Desert Shootout, where he fired a one-under-par 215 and finished tied for 32<sup>nd</sup>.

In May, Freeman nearly advanced to the second of two qualifying rounds for the U.S. Open, shooting 73 at the Omaha Country Club and finishing in a four-way tie for the fifth and final spot. Pro Ryan Vermeer, of Omaha, birdied the first playoff hole to move on.

A couple weeks prior to making his appearance in Falls City, Freeman competed in the Nebraska Match Play Championship at Valentine. After qualifying with the No. 4 seed, Freeman was upset by Timothy Davis of Cozad in the opening round after 21 holes. Earlier this summer, he finished runnerup at the Fremont Invitational, shooting 70-68, four strokes back from champion Carson Schaake, and tied for fifth (with rounds of 73-73) at the Homesteader held at the Beatrice Country Club. He finished just two strokes from a three-man

playoff between Lance Lawson, Greg Stanek and Ross Dickson.

Through three events, he is currently 10th in the Nebraska Golf Association point standings. The NGA ranked Freeman as the 15thbest player in Nebraska last winter (the rankings are updated annually on the first day of January).

The team of Dr. David Borg and his wife, Joyce, Matt Simpson and Jim Hoy shot 10-under to finish second, followed by Miller-Monroe (63), Dickey's BBQ (63), F&M Bank (64) and Dr. Charles James, Jr. (64).

Hullman's Ford, with Taylor, Ben Hullman, Marty Froeschl and Ron Jordening, finished first in the "A" Flight with a round of 65, winning by handicap over a four-way tie with the Southeast Communications team of Dorothy Towle, Chuck Whitney, Mark Hodge and Bob Ivey, which

# Farmers urged to get vocal

# EPA proposal would slash amount of biofuels in fuel supply

The Nebraska Corn Board and Nebraska Corn Growers Association are issuing an urgent call to action to Nebraska farmers to once again get vocal about recent action by the Environmental Protection Agency that would reduce the nation's commitment to renewable fuels.

Nebraska Corn strongly encourages Nebraska farmers to submit comments to the EPA expressing their displeasure with the proposed renewable fuels reduction. The comment period will close on Monday, July 27.

A portal has been established on the Nebraska Corn Board website at NebraskaCorn.org and the Nebraska Corn Growers Association website at NeCGA.org, under the icon "Don't Mess with the RFS."

This icon links directly to a comment submission form and suggested verbiage on the National Corn Growers Association's website.

In a statement, Nebraska Corn leaders expressed great disappointment and concern regarding the recent proposal from the EPA to slash the required amount of conventional biofuels in the nation's fuel supply for 2015 and 2016. EPA proposes to adjust the conventional biofuel requirement that is mandated in the Renewable Fuel Standard passed by Congress, downward by nearly 2.6 billion gallons.

"Agriculture was once again placed in an unstable position by EPA when they released their long overdue RFS proposal," said Tim Scheer, farmer from St. Paul, Nebraska and Chairman of the Nebraska Corn Board. "It is absolutely imperative that farmers get engaged in the comment period if we have any prayer of getting EPA to increase the proposed figures to the original congressional statue of 15 billion gallons for 2015 and 2016. All the work and investment that Nebraska corn farmers have put into building the ethanol industry is at risk. We've already seen corn prices drift downward to the cost of production."

"This proposal plays right into the hands of the oil industry, which has been pulling out all the stops to prevent loss of market share to renewable fuels such as ethanol. American farmers and consumers were promised the opportunity to utilize an American-made, cleaner, renewable alternative to oil. This proposal not only ignores that agreement, but diminishes the costsaving options that ethanol provides in the marketplace for consumers," NE Corn Growers Assoc. President Larry Mussack, of Decatur, said.



# Civil War veterans gather in Kearney for 1889 reunion

Although Nebraska Territory furnished only a few men to the Union army during the Civil War, thousands of former soldiers who served from states all across the North moved here afterwards. They came, in part, to claim land under the Homestead Act. Accordingly, during the last decades of the nineteenth century Nebraska had many "posts" of the Union veterans' organization known as the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR). Each year the Nebraska Department of the GAR held an annual "reunion" where the old soldiers could renew acquaintances and reminisce about their time in camp and field. The reunion of 1889 was held at Kearney, which promised to furnish a camp site of more than 200 acres, 75 tons of hay, 50 tons of straw, 100 cords of firewood, 40 tons of ice, and enough water and tents for up to 50,000 people at no expense to the GAR. The city fathers agreed that no gambling or liquor sales would be allowed on the grounds, which were located on the bluffs northwest of the town.

The encampment caught the attention of the Army and Navy Journal, a national periodical that covered the nation's military establishment. The August 31, 1889, issue of the ANJ reported on the gathering: "The past five days at Kearney have been one continued round of military excitement and enthusiasm. . . . Besides the encampment of the Grand Army of

the Republic and general reunion of our war volunteers, representing almost every state in the Union, there were present on the occasion six companies of the 2d U.S. Infantry that had been ordered here from Fort Omaha, Gen. Frank Wheaton commanding. The camp was named Camp Brooke in honor of the present commander of the Department of the Platte [John R. Brooke] and Gen. Frank Wheaton was placed in command of the whole encampment."

One of the highlights was a reenactment on Lake Kearney [a reservoir fed by the Kearney canal] of the 1862 naval battle between the Monitor and the Merrimac. "Two steamboats on the lake were fitted up in the shape of an ironclad gunboat and a turreted monitor and one evening was devoted to a fight between these two ships of war. Another evening was devoted to a combined attack of military and naval forces on a fortification in the midst of the lake which was, of course, captured after some heavy cannonading and charging by the boats on the lake and the troops on

the land. "The last afternoon was devoted to a sham battle by the land forces entirely, in which all of the 2d Regiment of U.S. Infantry and volunteer troops, together with Captain Murdock's battery of rifled cannon took part. The attacking forces were all under the command of Major Butler, of the 2d U.S. Infantry, and right well he silenced the enemy's guns and carried the position so long and gallantly held by its defenders."

Nebraska Governor John M. Thayer was also present and reviewed the troops, both regular and veteran. It was no surprise to see the governor there; he had commanded the First Nebraska Volunteer Infantry Regiment when it went off to the Civil War in 1861 and had later been promoted brigadier general of volunteers. What's more, Thayer had been commander of the Nebraska Department of the GAR in 1886.


