WWII years serving his country for the second time.

Gelwick, a University of Nebraska graduate, lived in Huettner’s neighborhood and could be a bit intimidating, Huettner recalled. But Ralph remembered him as a very nice man.

The 1940 *Orange and Black* yearbook (Dorothy Lunsford Schock’s senior year) paid tribute to the superintendent:

“Thirteen years of service in Falls City Public Schools have proved neither unfortunate for our superintendent, A.B. Gelwick, nor for us. His able leadership has been helpful to everyone, and the unstinted praise which all who know him can give, speaks well of our leader, who is also ‘one of us.’

“The high standing of our school is assured continuance under his untiring guidance.”

Study fails to recognize reform measures in LB553

The recent Platte Institute policy study on Nebraska’s Public Pension System raises a number of issues regarding the sustainability of defined benefit programs for Nebraska’s public employees. What the study failed to properly highlight was the recent substantial pension reform measures contained in LB 553, passed by the Legislature this past session for the School Employees Retirement Plan. In the 68 year history of the State’s pension plan for school employees, this is the first time the benefit has been reduced.

LB 553 modified the monthly retirement benefit for new school employees hired on or after July 1, 2013, by averaging their salary over five years rather than three, and also capping for new employees future COLA increases at 1 percent. These reductions in plan benefits were necessary in order to reduce total plan liabilities over the long-term and to make the school pension plan financially sound for years to come. Though the State is statutorily required to pay for any unfunded pension liabilities, school employees have agreed to assume a significant portion of the long-term funding obligation for these liabilities by maintaining the current employee contribution rate of 9.78%.

By modifying the monthly retirement benefit for new employees and eliminating a scheduled employee contribution rate decrease to 7.28% in 2017, the changes in LB553 covered more

than 81.6 percent of the projected actuarial required contribution amount owed by the State during the next two years.

The Platte Institute suggests that the method for solving future liabilities in the School defined benefit plan is to close the defined benefit plan to new employees and instead offer defined contribution accounts – which are similar to 401(k) accounts. If a conversion is made from a defined benefit plan to a defined contribution plan, the funding liability still remains for the current employees enrolled in the defined benefit plan; shifting to a defined contribution does not eliminate this liability. Instead it exacerbates the financial situation of the plan and in fact, increases the funding costs for taxpayers. This is because a conversion splits the resources of the plan into two pools of money instead of one, and with a smaller group of employees to cover the financial obligations of the pension plan, the school district or the State would be left to cover the cost. In the case of the School Employees Retirement Plan, the amount to convert to a defined contribution plan has been estimated at between \$400 - \$500 million.

Defined contribution plans create other problems as well for school employees and school districts. A 2000 Nebraska Benefit Adequacy Study and similar studies in other states nationwide have revealed that with individual defined contribution accounts where the employee is responsible for making invest-

ment choices, the earnings are less than accounts invested by professional managers. In addition, since the employee assumes all the risk for investment losses, these plans may be significantly inadequate if there is a significant market loss just prior to an employee’s retirement, because there is insufficient time to recover from such losses that occur just before retirement. Instead the employee may be faced with putting off retirement until age 70 or longer. A teacher, who may desire to retire at age 65 due to personal issues or declining health, would be left in a dire situation with an inadequate retirement income.

In contrast, the School defined benefit plan helps to reduce this negative outcome by pooling financial contributions paid by its employees and employers in order to provide a monthly benefit payment after retirement. It is very similar to life insurance except that payment begins at retirement to cover living expenses rather than upon death.

Converting from a defined benefit plan to a defined contribution plan is not the answer. Instead the right choice was implemented by the Legislature this past session with LB 553.

The bill is good public policy because the overall funding for the school employee retirement plan is primarily borne by school employees and school districts. LB 553 proves that the Legislature has the ability to make changes to the defined benefit plans in order to reduce the plan’s overall cost rather than completely scrapping the current pension system and then

having to pay almost a half billion dollars in order to make that change.

LB 553 saves the taxpayers money and made common sense changes to the School Employees Retirement Plan in order to keep the plan financially sound. As mentioned in the Platte Institute’s study, the Nebraska School Retirement Plan is rated among the top 100 pension plans in the nation, and fares better than the national ratio with funding at just under 80 percent. By passing LB 553, the Legislature intends to keep it in the top 100.

My last comments come from my personal and professional experience as one who spent over 41 years in our public schools as a professional educator. The task of each of our school districts to recruit, maintain and retain the services of quality, long term teachers

is crucial to the success of our public schools.

The starting salary for a first year teacher in Nebraska usually ranges between \$30,000 to \$40,000 depending upon the district and duties assigned. In contrast, the 2013 UNO Alumni magazine reports the starting salary for a Computer Science graduate at \$58,000; a Chemical Engineer at \$67,000 and a Petroleum Engineer at \$98,000.

Having a defined benefit plan for our School Employees is a positive incentive to draw some of our best and brightest students into a career in education. I believe our Legislature has made the right decisions to ensure quality teachers in our classrooms for the future.

UNL alumni advise students to be interns

Alumni of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln’s Dept. of Ag Economics recommended today’s students “aggressively pursue internships,” according to a survey.

The department surveyed 2,899 alumni and received 789 responses.

The alumni answered the question “What advice would you give our students that wanted to follow your career choice?”

The most common answer was “work internships.”

“The advice from many of the respondents was for students to aggressively pursue internships, to serve as many as possible, in as many fields with as many different types of companies as they can,” said Larry Van Tassell, head of the Department of Agricultural Economics. “In fact, many expressed internships were beneficial enough that students should work for free, if necessary.”

Many responders said that internships helped with networking.

“Relationships developed during internships were not only valuable in landing the first job for many alumni, but formed associations that remained just as strong and important many years later,” Van Tassell said.

Other advice included encouraging students to intern outside of Nebraska and to get work experience before returning to family farms.

Of the respondents that graduated after 2000, 44 percent did not serve an internship, 26 percent served one internship and 29 percent served at least two internships.

“Internships are becoming increasingly popular; a significantly greater number of internships are utilized by students graduating after 2000, as any time period before,” Van Tassell said.

Alumni also advised students to participate in extracurricular activities and to take leadership roles in these activities.

Of those graduating since 2000, 75 percent of alumni participated in at least one club or organization, with 14 percent participating in more than three. Fewer than 50 percent of alumni served in a leadership capacity. Nearly all of the respondents that participated in more than three clubs or organizations held leadership positions in three or more of those organizations.

“A number of respondents lamented they did not take advantage of campus activities and clubs, but instead chose to spend their time working on their family operations they intended to return to,” Van Tassell said. “They felt they forfeited opportunities to network and develop relationships that they could have drawn on throughout their careers.”

“I knew looking at the girls Saturday night in KC that most of them didn’t want to play the league tournament Sunday,” Messner, the program founder and director, said. “I could see it in their faces, but they toughed it

out and came through big. I knew if we would of forfeited out of the league tournament they would regret it later, so I didn’t ask them if they wanted to - I told them we played in Humboldt Sunday morning and they showed up to play.”

And the journey is far from over. Another 270 miles or so of asphalt awaits as the winningest Travelersteam in the program’s 17-year history will cap a successful and busy summer this weekend at the ASA Class C State Tourney in Lexington. The Travelers 10-and-Under team, coached by Heather Feek and Alicia Schock, takes an 18-6 record to the Class C State Tournament in Grand Island at the same time and one or the other is almost certain to capture the program’s 1,000th victory.

“This has been a great year for our entire program with every age group really playing their tails off,” Messner said. “We have two state tournaments left.”

Big Red Weekend Fallout

Previously, I wrote that Nebraska would have a quarterback committed before July 1. **Zack Darlington** (6-1/205) of Apopka, Fla. chose NU June 14, cancelling a trip to Ohio State and also spurning Virginia Tech and West Virginia among others.

“I knew this is where God wanted me to be and my parents are 100 percent behind my decision and could not be happier,” he told HuskerOnline.com. Darlington was NU’s fifth pledge, his decision coming during a five-day period around Big Red Weekend where six prospects committed.

Darlington was preceded by O-lineman **Tanner Farmer** (6-4/300) of Highland, Ill. and followed by D-back **Trai Mosley** (5-10/171) of Pflugerville, Texas, in-state prospects D-lineman **Mick Stoltenberg** (6-5/250) of Gretna — who happens to be the son of Falls City native Sandra (Reesman) Stoltenberg (FCHS ‘79) — **D.J. Foster** (6-3/312) of Lincoln SE and athlete **Demornay Pierson-El** (5-9/174) of Alexandria, Va.

Farmer dominated at the Rivals Camp Series in St. Louis, earning offensive line MVP honors. Then at Nike’s The Opening in Beaverton, Ore. Farmer acquitted himself well. His testing numbers were among the strongest, and he really shined in the 1-on-1’s by stonewalling **Josh Frazier** (6-4/335), one the nation’s top defensive tackle prospects who is lists Alabama, Texas A&M and USC in his top five. Farmer will likely play guard as a Husker.

Nebraska was Mosley’s first Division 1 offer, but SMU and Baylor followed quickly. During NU’s camp Mosley ran a 4.43-second electronic 40-yard dash. He also has recorded a 38-inch vertical leap.

Mosley is more than an athlete. His high school coach, Chip Kilian, told HUSkerOnline.com that his star can cover as well, “The thing about Trai it is that we can put him out there wherever their best receiver is and say ‘OK, you’ve got him’ and we won’t have to worry after that. We can then roll our coverages away from Trai and be confident that he is going to take care of business on the other side of the field.”

Stoltenberg is another top-notch athlete, who could project as a defensive end, defensive tackle, offensive lineman or even tight end, depending on his development. He’s coming in with an open mind, telling HuskerOnline.com, “Wherever they need me and wherever I can make an impact as quickly as possible I’ll definitely do it.”

Foster, who along with Farmer fulfills NU’s needs along the interior offensive line, chose NU over Florida, Georgia and UCLA among others. He will join his older brother, Trey, who is a redshirt freshman tight end on the Husker squad.

He told HuskerOnline.com that their relationship helped solidify his choice, “...I said ‘what doesn’t Nebraska have to offer?’ ‘I couldn’t figure out one thing and they had one thing other people didn’t have, which was my brother. It just felt right, so that’s why I committed.”

Pierson-El is an explosive playmaker who also held offers from Boston College and North Carolina. He gives Nebraska their first high school commitment from Virginia in more than a decade. In a very strong year in the Commonwealth, Pierson-El is Rivals’ No. 22-ranked player and comes in at No. 26 in the 247Sports composite rankings.

The Next Round

After Big Red Weekend there was a lull until July 4 when the Huskers received three more commitments.

First, TE **Freedom Akinmoladun** (6-4/240) of Grandview, Mo. joined the fold. Illinois, Iowa, Kansas and K-State had also offered Akinmoladun, who runs a 4.7-second 40-yard dash and has what his high school coach Andy Leech calls, “...an unbelievable first step.”

A multi-sport athlete at Grandview, Akinmoladun also sports a 3.5 GPA and plans to major in physics. Akinmoladun could project to D-end if NU were to sign another TE prospect in February.

Later on July 4, WR **Monte Harrison** (6-3/190) of Lee’s Summit, Mo. followed with his pledge. Harrison is also a highly accomplished baseball player and is projected as a first-round pick in the 2014 MLB draft. Should he choose to pass up pro baseball and go to Lincoln, Harrison will play both football and baseball for the Huskers.

He turned down Arkansas, K-State and Michigan State among others to pick NU. Harrison boasts 4.5-second speed and a 41-inch vertical, which he showed off at the Rivals Camp Series in St. Louis this summer on the way to being named the camp’s offensive MVP.

The day after Akinmoladun and Harrison’s pledges, Klein, Texas running back **Lorenzo Stewart** (5-6/165) committed to NU over Baylor and Houston. Stewart ran for over 1,300 yards as a junior, averaging 8.6 yards per carry in Texas’ largest classification. He has tremendous speed, finishing fifth in the state 100-meter dash in a personal-best 10.45 seconds that was run on a gimpy ankle. Stewart hurt the ankle celebrating his team’s 4x100 meter relay victory just 15 minutes earlier. Stewart projects as a slot receiver and kick returner for NU, although he could be worked in at running back in certain packages. His speed is unquestioned, but on video Stewart also “finishes” his runs and always seems to fall forward.

Who’s next?

Millard West prospect **Harrison Phillips** (6-3/250) Monday chose Stanford over Nebraska and 30-plus other offers. NU offered late in the process after freshman defensive end Earnest Suttles was kicked off the team.

Hiawatha, Kan. defensive tackle **Peyton Newell** (6-2/282) is another player who plans to make a decision before his senior year. NU and South Carolina seem to be his leaders with Kansas and Kansas State also in his final top four.

Newell eliminated schools such as Georgia, Oklahoma, Penn State and USC among his other 40-plus offers. Most experts predict Newell will choose Nebraska. We should know before Sept. 1.

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Walk-off win keeps Juniors' season alive

Survive and advance. Falls City's Blue Storm Juniors did just that last night as they defeated Nebraska City 2-1 in an elimination game of the Class B Area 1 District tournament at Syracuse.

Tied 1-1 in the bottom of the seventh inning, FC's Trenton Pentecost drew a walk and moved all the way around to third on a pair of sacrifice flies, the first from Tyler DiGiacomo and the second from Logan Scheitel.

Austin Malone stepped in and sent the first pitch he saw into left field for the walk-off single to keep the Blue Storm Juniors' season alive.

FC, now 19-10, will face either top-seeded Hickman or No. 2 Beatrice tonight at 7 in the loser's bracket. A win moves them into Wednesday's district championship where they would have to defeat Hickman or Beatrice twice to advance to the State Tournament in Elkhorn July 20-24.

Monday night's walk-off victory marked the second one-run victory over Nebraska City in four days.

In Friday's opening round game, FC defeated Nebraska City 6-5 in extra innings. Beatrice shutout FC 10-0 Saturday, but the Blue Storm responded with 11 runs over the final three innings and won 14-7 Sunday afternoon to eliminate Auburn.

Sawyer Kean went 4-5 and drove in four for FC in the win over Auburn. Trenton Pentecost was a perfect 3-3 and drove in a pair, while DiGiacomo and Zack Jordening drove in three and two runs, respectively.

Kean, DiGiacomo and Malone each stole three bases, as FC racked up 14 steals against Auburn.

Weston Witt (4-3) struck out eight and earned the complete game victory for FC.

Jeremy Robinson's two-out single in the top of the seventh Friday night scored Preston Deckinger and put FC ahead 5-3, but Nebraska City's Chris Monaghan launched a two-run home run off DiGiacomo with one out in the bottom of the seventh to tie it. A pair of singles by Scheitel and DiGiacomo to start the eighth were followed by Jordening's ground ball sacrifice to first that plated Scheitel for the eventual game-winner.

DiGiacomo pitched solid prior to giving up the home run. He had allowed only five hits and three earned runs, while recording four strikeouts to one walk before Monaghan's game-tying blast.

DiGiacomo and Logan Scheitel, who picked up the victory in relief, also led FC at the plate. The duo batted 4-5 in the lineup and were responsible for four of FC's seven hits. DiGiacomo drove in two runs, while Weston Witt and Jordening each had one RBI.

“If you build it, *they* will come.” Those famous words, modified a bit (“he” instead of “they”), were ominously whispered to Kevin Costner’s character, Ray Kinsella, at the beginning of the classic movie, “Field of Dreams,” in which Kinsella plows under his corn to build a baseball field.

That legendary movie quote seems appropriate as Falls City readies to host their first-ever American Legion baseball district tournament this weekend. Southeast Nebraska Communications Field, part of the brand new Fiedler Sports Complex, will be the site of the Class B Area 1 baseball tournament July 19-23, as Falls City host’s teams and fans from Beatrice, Nebraska City, Hickman, Auburn and Fairbury.

Falls City’s “Field(s) of Dreams” came to fruition in late May, though not through the actions of a voice-hearing Iowa farmer, but rather the hard work and support of an entire community. Tournament Director Kevin Scheitel and Falls City Legion head coach Kory Huppert applied to host the tournament in January and said the new \$2 million Fiedler Sports Complex was vital in bringing the tournament to

town.

“That’s the main reason we received it this year,” Scheitel said. “The response to the new field has been very positive. It’s been great for the town and everybody involved.”

Huppert, who had not applied for the district tournament prior to this year because of the old field’s poor condition, is excited to showcase Falls City and plans on applying to host next year’s Class B State Tournament, as well as keeping Falls City a regular district site.

He added that coaches from around the tri-state area have mentioned doing something like this in their communities in the near future.

“The new field was huge in getting districts for us this year and we’ve had great feedback from all the other coaches,” Huppert said. “Nebraska City and some other teams have mentioned that they are going to look into upgrading their fields. This weekend will be a great opportunity for us.”

The district tournament kicks off Friday at 2:30 p.m. and runs through next Tuesday night’s championship game. The winner punches a ticket to the Class B State Tournament in Gering July 27-31.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR

The Falls City Blue Storm enters the tournament as the No. 3 seed with a record of 16-10 and is 3-4 against district teams with a pair of wins over Auburn and one over Fairbury. FC fell twice to Auburn, once to Nebraska City and once to Beatrice.

FC is led offensively by short-stop Chaz Dunn (.362/.441/.450, 7 2B, 18 RBI, 25 R 26 SB), outfielder Tyler DiGiacomo (.369/.420/.449, HR,10 RBI, 25 R, 28 SB) and pitcher/utility Lane Scheitel (.312/.430/.438, 8 2B, 18 RBI, 18 R). Taking one for the team, quite literally, is first baseman Wade Witt, who has been plunked eight times and holds an on-base percentage of .417 despite hitting just .246. Chase Thompson has driven in 17, while Jordy Stoller and Derek Bippes also hold double-digit RBI totals with 10 apiece.

Aggressive on the base paths, FC has stolen 149 bases this summer and been caught just 24 times, which makes for an 86 percent success rate.

The pitching is led by right-handers Lane Scheitel and Derek Bippes and southpaw Reese Hogue, who have tossed 45, 36, and 36 innings, respectively. Scheitel leads the team in ERA (2.80) and strikeouts (49). Bippes and Hogue share the team-lead in wins with four each. Wade Witt, Thompson, Stoller and Logan Scheitel have all pitched in relief and could see time this weekend.

FC will face fourth-seeded Fairbury in the last game of the day Friday at 7:30 p.m. Fairbury, who FC defeated 10-2 in June, enters with a 10-7 record and will bring a young squad to town. Nine of the 12 players on the team played both Juniors and Seniors this summer. They are led by their two aces, Dalton Griffin and Zack Edson.

Top-seeded Hickman enters with a record of 21-11 and split their only two games against district opponents. They defeated Beatrice 10-0, but fell 5-3 last Wednesday at home against Nebraska City. Hickman, made up of many of the same players that posted a 26-2 record and claimed the Class B State Championship for Norris High this past spring, are led by Trey Hair (.417 avg.), Payton Kinney (.396), Jake Peterson (.324) and Jakson Reetz is hitting .462 in limited action. As a junior, Reetz was a Super-State First Team selection at catcher by the *Lincoln Journal Star* after hitting .444 with 49 RBIs and five home runs in just 28 games. Byron Hood (1.697 ERA) joined Reetz as a First Team Super-State selection.

Perennial power Beatrice enters as the sixth seed with a record of only 13-12, but is 3-1 in the district. Hickman and Beatrice play the tournament’s first game Friday at 2:30 p.m., in what should be a dandy. Hickman defeated Beatrice 10-0 earlier this summer, but Beatrice always fields a quality team

and deep runs in July are the norm. Offensive leaders are Colton Adams (.400, 14 SB), Drew Hausman (.433, 31 R, 12 RBI, 24 BB), Chance Baumann (.362, 18 runs, 22 RBI) and Spencer Weishahn (.354, 14 runs, 22 RBI).

Adams (5-2, 36.1 innings, 50 K’s, eight earned runs) and Rylee Zimmerman (4-1, 30.1 innings, 25 K’s) are the teams top pitchers.

Auburn is seeded second and held a 15-9 record at the time of seeding. They are 2-2 against district teams and will face No. 3 Nebraska City at 5 p.m. Friday.

Auburn is led by pitcher and HTRS grad TJ Standerford, pitcher Nick Behrends, infielders Tyler Collin and Joe Nelson, as well as centerfielder Robert Georges.

Nebraska City was 12-11 at the time of seeding and hold a 5-3 record against district foes. They are led by first baseman Chris Monaghan (.340), Trever Kreifel (3 HR) and center fielder and top pitcher Tanner Faris. Faris has hit two home runs this summer and pitched six quality starts. Kreifel and Faris were both Honorable Mention All-State in Class B this spring.

Games four, five and six will be played Saturday at 2:30, 5 and 7:30. Sunday’s games are scheduled for 4 and 6:30, but could include additional games if five teams remain after game six Saturday.

County Treasurer Austin Duerfeldt presented the semi-annual report for the period ending June 30, 2013, when he met with the Richardson County Commissioners during their regular meeting Tuesday, July 9.

Duerfeldt also presented a listing of the uncollected taxes for tax years 2009, 2010, 2011 and 2012, as well as the listing of tax certificates that were not sold at the annual tax sale in April 2013. The board moved to direct the treasurer to issue the remaining tax sale certificates to the county on any real property upon which there are any delinquent taxes.

The treasurer also presented pledge security receipts that have been issued to the county.

Highway Supt. Scott Huppert met with board members Dave Sickel, Jim Davidson and Jim Standerford and said the truck purchased through bidding in April was to be delivered during the week by Lincoln Truck Center. Huppert said the listing for rural addressing signs that need to be replaced is being completed so that signs can be ordered and put in place.

During this portion of the

meeting, the board moved to enter into an agreement with the City of Humboldt regarding the maintenance and cost share of a bridge. And, the board moved to approve an emergency request to place a utility pole on county road right-of-way, approximately six miles north of Falls City, with the provision that the formal written agreement are completed for the record.

While meeting as a Board of Equalization, 133 property valuation protests were heard. Adjournment was at 9:05 p.m.
