Man who hung himself during chase was suspect in gun theft; case still open

A 19-year-old Pawnee City man who last week allegedly took his own life by jumping out of a moving vehicle during a high-speed pursuit was the focus of an investigation involving the theft of several firearms.

Justin T. Kanniard died after jumping from his blue Dodge pickup with one end of a rope tied around his neck and the other attached to the vehicle's steering column. The incident occurred just after 11:30 p.m. Monday, July 16, approximately one-half mile north of Highway 4 on 636 Avenue near Humboldt.

Authorities reportedly deployed "stop sticks" to puncture the truck's tires, and the vehicle left the road and drove into a soybean field before coming to a stop. Officers didn't see Kanniard leap from the vehicle and initially suspected he had fled on foot, but soon came across the torso of Kanniard's decapitated corpse. Members of the Nebraska State Patrol, Pawnee County Sheriff's Office and Richardson County Sheriff's Office were involved in the 17-mile long pursuit, hence state law requires a grand jury investigation into Kanniard's death.

According to Pawnee County Attorney Victor Faesser, law enforcement officers served a search warrant on the house Kanniard rented with at least one other adult male,

searching for several stolen firearms belonging to Rick Dettmann. The guns were allegedly taken in a recent burglary of Dettmann's rural Humboldt home.

Authorities would not say if any or all the stolen guns have been recovered. It was confirmed, however, that Kanniard was not the lone suspect in the burglary case and the investigation remains open.

There is potential evidence that suggests Kanniard planned to commit suicide. Earlier on the day he died, the following message was posted on his Facebook profile: "I love you all im sorry for everything."

Kanniard, who was originally from Scottsbluff, moved to southeast Nebraska with his grandparents in 2010. He earned his General Educational Development (GED) from SE Community College and at the time of his death was employed as a mechanic at Smith Auto in Pawnee City.

According to owner Bob Smith, Kanniard was a quiet guy and a good worker.

"I was very surprised," Smith, said of the news of Kanniard's death.

According to Court records from Scotts Bluff County, Kanniard had repeated scrapes with the law dating back at least four years. Most of the cases, including a 2010 felony charge of theft by receiving stolen property, were transferred to Juvenile Court.

City seeks health cost savings

Dustin Will of Benefit Management, the City of Falls City's health insurance brokerage firm, said his company is working to find "creative ways to improve the cost structure" of a very expensive benefit for city employees.

Health insurance costs through Blue Cross/Blue Shield for the City of Falls City were projected to soar by about 28 percent under the present plan. Will said while his firm was able to negotiate that increase to about 25 percent, the costs would be "very significant" this year. So, other options were ex-

plored after meetings with the city's Health Insurance Committee and city employees, who returned also returned questionnaires.

Will said several options have been included that should result in a reduced premium, with savings as much as \$67,000, from an expected \$808,120 to about \$741,000. He recommended plans with deductibles of \$2,500 and \$3,500 and said the city could lessen the financial impact on employees by paying a part of the deductible.

Were the city to try to reduce costs only by increasing the de-

ductible, Will said that increase would be from the current \$750 to \$5,000.

He described the plans and options as "good for the city and employees" and helpful in long-term planning.

The council voted to renew the health insurance benefit with Blue Cross/Blue Shield with the additional options.

Council president Jerry Oliver presided at the July 17 meeting in the absence of Mayor Tim Hersh.

Oliver cast the deciding vote

Sheriff Houser provided comparisons of sheriff's department personnel from comparable counties in Nebraska. Notification was also received from the International Union of Operating Engineers Local 571 informing the county they will

Falls City Travelers Softball '12

Bailey Armbruster and all the FC Travelers softball players showed - and sometimes even tasted - plenty of grit on the searing, arid dirt diamonds in Hastings, Grand Island and Sioux City this past weekend at Class C State Tournaments. The five Travelers' teams (10-and-Under, 12-U, 14-U, 16-U and 18-U) produced a program-record 97 victories in 2012, nine of which came over the weekend. The 12-and-Under team posted a 32-5 record, becoming the first Travelers team in its 16-year history to eclipse 30 victories. They went 3-2 at state in Hastings, finishing fourth. The 16-U team was fifth at Class C in Grand Island, and finished 18-6 on the season. The 10-U team was seventh with a 4-2 record - half of those games were decided by a single run. The 10-U team ends the season at 21-9 overall.

"Our goal this year was to win 100 games for the Travelers program - we came up short with 97, which is one more than any other year," Travelers founder, director and coach Carl Messner said. "We are already looking ahead to next year with the excitement of playing on new fields and knowing already we will be hosting the 14-U and 16-U league tournaments in Falls City. In the past, when we were the host team, we played them in Auburn so we didn't have to be so concerned about rain."

"I'm also looking into hosting an invitational sometime next summer if I can work out the dates, and would like to try to bring a State Tournament to Falls City in the next three years so everyone can see our new fields."

The family vacation. In the 1950s, when my sister and I were kids, we’d climb aboard the family Oldsmobile, with Bill Schock behind the wheel, Tootsie riding shotgun and Laurie and me in the backseat. The 1957 Olds I best remember had a huge motor with three carbs and we were rarely passed, but it was without an air conditioner. So the trips, usually westward to the mountains for a week, were on the hot and breezy side. I’m told that on one trip I discovered the delicacy known as a hot beef sandwich, and sampled that fare in every diner we encountered from Falls City to Colorado Springs and back. Not sure if it was on the same trip that I stood on my head with my legs under the back window most of the way. My parents should have realized something was dreadfully wrong.

At the time, I figured just about everyone took off for somewhere during the summer. Most people had jobs and cars and economic times were pretty good. Of course, I was looking at life from a white perspective. We weren’t denied service at a restaurant or a motel room for the night. What I failed to realize was that we didn’t see many — if any — black travelers along the way. Were they simply eating at different places and staying at different motels?

Yes, they were.

Melissa Harris-Perry is the host of a new show that airs Saturday and Sunday mornings on MSNBC. A professor at Tulane University, Dr. Harris-Perry invites interesting guests who have different points of view. She’s a great, great interviewer and discussion moderator. Occasionally, she introduces a topic from a perspective that I missed. Such was the case on a recent broadcast, when Dr. Harris-Perry talked about “The Negro Motorist Green Book.”

The travel guide was introduced in 1936, went national a year later and continued to be published until the Civil Rights Act of 1964. Victor Green of New York City published 15,000 copies each year.

Why was such a guide necessary? Because African Americans couldn’t travel the USA like white ones did during the Jim Crow years. Green’s idea was to provide information to keep black families and business travelers from “running into difficulties and embarrassments,” to make the trips “more enjoyable” and to “ease the anxieties of the average Negro traveler.”

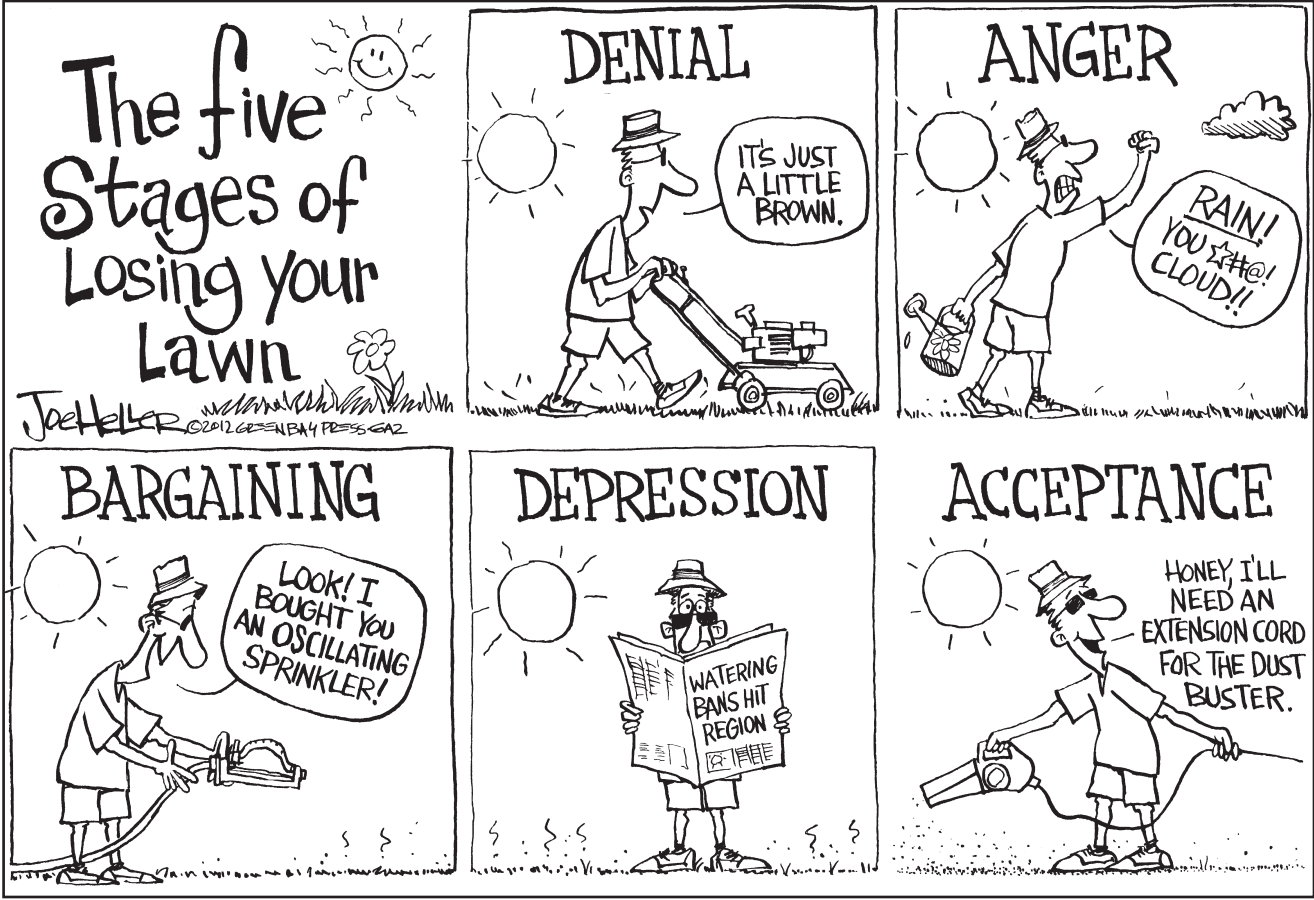
“There will be a day sometime in the near future when this guide will not have to be published,” Green wrote in the 1949 edition. “That is when we as a race will have equal opportunities and privileges in the United States. It will be a great day for us to suspend this publication, for then we can go wherever we please, and without embarrassment. But until that time comes we shall continue to publish this information for your convenience each year.”

The Green Book provided information on hotels, boarding rooms, restaurants, beauty and barbershops, gas stations, “tourist rooms” and other services that were available to African Americans. A “tourist home” was in a private residence that would be rented to a black person or family.

In Denver, for example, one hotel was listed in 1949 and 10 restaurants. In Daytona Beach, a tourist home, a restaurant and a service station. Boise, ID, offered a hotel and a restaurant. One hotel was available in Portland, MA. There were a handful of service stations and a funeral home listed for Mississippi. Kansas City’s Cadillac Hotel featured “hot and cold water in every room.” In Omaha, African Americans could choose from four hotels, dine at two restaurants and purchase gasoline at four service stations. Lincoln’s listing included a tourist home, a drug store and a tailor. If a black traveler was headed for Aberdeen, SD, he could stay at one hotel, eat at one restaurant and gas-up at one service station. Aberdeen was the only South Dakota town listed. The closest town to Falls City that made the list was St. Joseph, where a room in one tourist home was available.

Imagine having the resources to take a vacation by car and having to plot in the Green Book where you could go, where you could stay, where you could eat and where you could fill up the gas tank. Or where you could get a haircut.

All the while, I was loading up on hot beef sandwiches and climbing back into the family Olds.

no longer represent employees of the Richardson County Sheriff’s Department as of June 30, 2012, when the collective bargaining agreement expired.

Sheriff Houser proposed the following regarding compensation: a 2.75% increase for deputies and sergeants; a rate of \$13.75/hour for jailers/dispatchers and eliminating the shift differential; a rate of \$15/hour for the administrative assistant; longevity pay of 50 cents per hour for every five years of continuous employment with the county.

Board members Dave Sickel, Bill Ely and Jim Davidson took no action on the proposal at the meeting.

While meeting with Highway Supt. Scott Huppert, the board moved to award the bid for the Falls City NW culvert project to M.E. Collins Contracting, with a reduction of the bid price of \$35,634.40 for expenses that the county will assume to remove and dispose of the bridge and abutments, trees, stumps and brush necessary for the construction of the box culvert. The total adjusted bid price is thus \$154,682.40. The county will assume the task to complete all the necessary roadway items for completion of the project. Commissioner Ely abstained from the voting.

The board moved to purchase a 1991 Link-Belt HSP-8028 S crane with 10,563 hours from the bid received at the June 19 meeting from Ferrell Construction/Construction Crane Solutions, Prairie Village, KS, for a price of \$52,250.

The condition of two bridges on the “State Line Road” (702 Road between 632 and 633 Avenue) was discussed. Nemaha County, KS, shares the costs of maintenance.

EDGE Executive Director Beckie Cromer presented a quarterly report and Barb Vice and Gary Jorn, representing the Falls City Chamber of Commerce, requested the use of Courthouse facilities during the Cobblestone Festival on Saturday, Aug. 25. Members of the Falls City Area Retired Senior Citizens have volunteered to serve as attendants for the building during this time. The board requested that the Falls City Library and Arts Center also be open during this time.

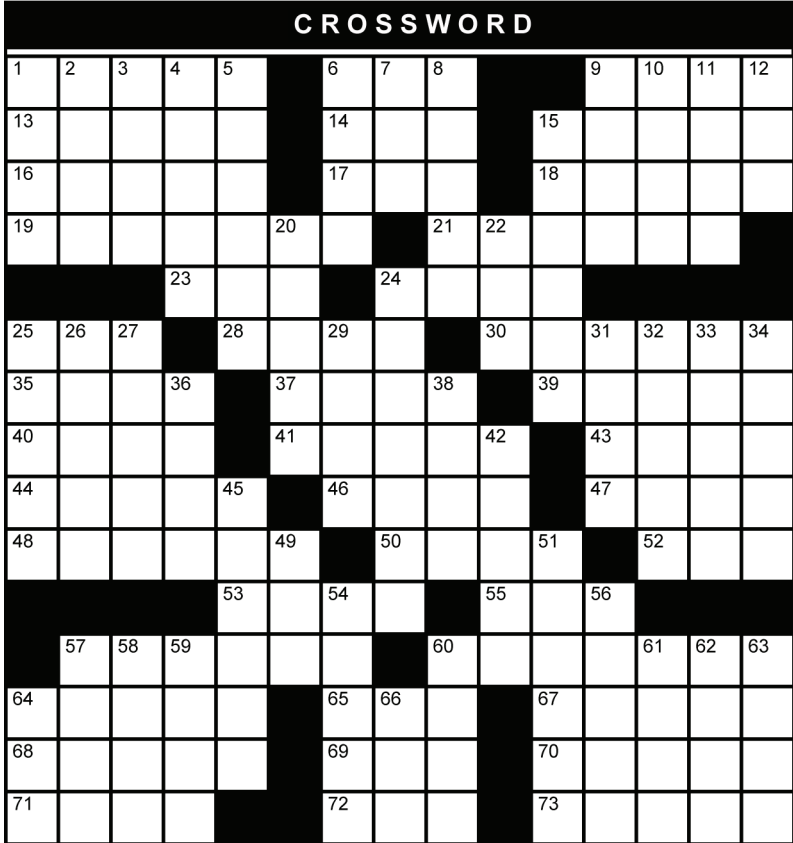

Drought hard, with a vengeance

Drought is no stranger to Nebraskans.

But this time, exacerbated by extreme heat, wind and wild-fires, Drought 2012 has already become the subject of one of the largest disaster announcements ever from the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture. It is also the subject of bloggers, jokes and prayer chains.

U.S. Ag Secretary Tom Vilsack said more than 1,000 counties nationwide – 16 in Nebraska – have been declared a natural disaster area. The announcement came on the heels of a national crop report that indicated corn and soybean production would be diminished this year. Even though more acres than before are planted, the secretary said, “We are still looking at significant reductions.”

In Nebraska, the High Plains Regional Climate Center based at the University of Nebraska – Lincoln, says moderate drought or worse conditions are plaguing 99.81 percent of the state. Temperatures in the 90-degree to 100-degree range and little rainfall since June add to the problem.

At a time when the earth is parched, the Nebraska Department of Natural Resources has issued more than 1,100 shut-off notices to farmers and ranchers who use surface water on their crops and grassland. The orders touch nearly every river basin in the state, speaking to the breadth of the problem.

Lake McConaughy near Ogallala, the poster child for the impact that a bad year of snow-pack in the mountains of Colorado and Wyoming can have, was brim full last year. This summer it is already at 69 percent of capacity, according to the Central Nebraska Public Power and Irriga-

tion District, which owns and operates the popular recreation and irrigation site. Central officials caution there is a long-range impact affecting future years.

In western Scotts Bluff County, blogger Karen Ott writes a mostly-weekly post called “The Face of Drought.” She writes: “Pastures have turned to dirt and fields to dust; meteorologists say the heat is bred in the furnace of the desert southwest and carried to our area by the jet stream ... but all we know is that it has shriveled our hopes for a good crop to a hard kernel of fear ... fear

of not having enough irrigation water to finish the season.”

The e-mail prayer chain currently circulating is based on Isaiah 41:10 (fear not for I am with you) and encourages readers to pray for rain and pass the request on to others.

The e-mail joke list claims that it is so hot in (fill in the state) that “the cows are giving evaporated milk ... farmers are feeding their chickens crushed ice to keep them from laying boiled eggs ... the potatoes cook underground, so all you have to do is pull one out and add butter.”

As is typical in times of disaster, some think they aren’t as bad off as their neighbors. Ott shares comments from a farm wife in neighboring Wyoming who says, “things are tragically dry.” She said absolutely nothing is growing, not even weeds, and “bees have starved to death.”

Ott said she never met Terry, the ranch woman who penned this tale of drought, but she understands her sorrow.

“I thought I knew drought, but I never imagined anything like this,” Ott wrote.



Sez I

Several weeks ago they held a parade in Omaha to honor the veterans of the Cold War, which extended from the end of World War II to the early nineties.

It brought back memories of when I was drafted in the mid-fifties. The Korean War had ended and Vietnam loomed in the future. During that time we had numerous alerts in preparation in case things got hot.

After I received my “Greetings” and was sent to Fort Chaffee, Arkansas, for basic training, which lasted eight weeks, I thought I would be assigned to a combat unit but instead I went back to school. Then after completing a course in automotive mechanics, they had me and several of my buddies put on a plane for Aberdeen, Maryland. There we attended another school. It was known as “F & E” (fuel and electric).

Aberdeen, Maryland, Proving Ground was quite an experience. We worked on AV1790 tank engines, which were air-cooled, super charged and fuel injected. There was also an atomic cannon on base, which they occasionally used in parades. I remember it was pretty noisy when they fired it off, usually at night.

After graduating from “F & E” I was sure my school days were over — but no. Next up was IT school, which stood for Instructor Training. After which I was a part-time instructor and supervisor.

I had always had in mind overseas duty so applied for it and after several tries was given the chance to go to Europe. My destination was Nelligen, Germany. I was then assigned to the 903rd Ordinance Company HAM, which stood for heavy automotive maintenance.

We worked on everything from jeeps to ten-ton trucks. I was put in engine rebuild, where we worked on/tested engines before they were replaced in trucks out on the line. When we went on alerts we would go by convoy to Stuttgart, Augsburg and Munich. So went the Cold War. There was no KP as the German civilians did that. But we still had guard duty, which wasn’t all that bad.

The time I spent in the Army I divided in two parts. Basic training and the schools I attended I considered a challenge and the rest of my time in service was to me an adventure. I will never look back on my time in the service as an obligation, but as a privilege to serve the greatest country in the world. I will always feel fortunate I had the opportunity to do my part for my country.

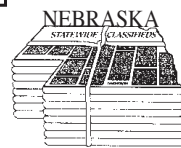

Sprint, Kids Triathlons this Saturday at Aquatic Center

A reminder the triathlon is on Saturday, July 28 starting at 8 a.m. for the Sprint and 10 a.m. for the Kids Triathlon at the FC Aquatic Center.

The sprint triathlon is open to all individuals 15 years of age and older, the kids triathlon has been changed for 14 years of age and under. It was originally set for 9-14, but we have received some interest for children under nine. Both triathlons can be raced as individuals or as a relay team of three.

The route for the Sprint Triathlon - the athletes will swim 300 meters serpentine swim in the FCAC pool. Bike - the athletes will leave transition area to end of FCAC driveway and turn north on Old Hwy. 73, follow until they arrive at Highway 73 (behind Merz Farm Equipment), they will head north for about four miles, will turn around and head south on highway 73, they will follow until Harlan and Old Hwy. 73, turning right in front of Northvue Cafe. They will head north until they reach FCAC heading into transition area. Run- athletes will leave transition area following the signs to run out on the FCAC sidewalk to Barada Street. They will head south on Barada to 23rd St. heading west to Schoenheit St. They will head north on Schoenheit to 25th St. heading west toward Staton Lake, they will follow the sidewalk to the back of Staton Lake and will come out on 28th St. They will head east toward Barada, north on Barada to Old Hwy. 73 to the Community Medical Center, they will enter the main entrance of the hospital, run around the hospital to exit back on to Old Hwy. 73 heading south to the FCAC finish.


The Sprint Triathlon will start at 8 a.m. - 300 meter swim, 15K bike and 5K run.

The route for the kids triathlon - the younger athletes will swim 150 meters serpentine swim in the FCAC pool. Bike - the younger athletes will leave the transition area to the FCAC sidewalk and head west to Barada Street and head south to 23rd St., they will head west on Schoenhiet heading north to 25th St., they will head west on 25th Street to Clifton, head north to 28th. They will head east toward Barada, Barada to Old Hwy. 73 turning south to FCAC transition area. Run - the young athletes will run out of the FCAC to Old Hwy. 73 and head north to the main entrance of the CMC, they will run around the hospital to exit back on to Old Hwy. 73 going south to the FCAC finish.

The Kids Triathlon will start at 10 a.m. (time will vary depending on the Sprint Triathlon athletes, all will have to finish before the Kids Triathlon starts). 150 swim, two-mile bike and one-mile run.

We ask that the citizens be aware of the athletes and give them the right away, especially the youths since they will be biking on the streets of Falls City. Participants are still able to register (sprint \$45 for individual, \$105 for relay team of 3; kids \$35 for individual, \$90 for relay team of three). Volunteers are always welcomed and needed. Spectators are encouraged to cheer the athletes on.

on a recommendation from the Board of Public Works to retain Charles Sargent Irrigation (dba Sargent Drilling) to drill test wells at the city’s water plant at Rulo. Project engineer Kirkham Michael had made the same recommendation.

The Sargent bid, \$23,650, was not the lowest received. The low bid was from Rieschick Drilling submitted the lowest proposal at \$17,524. Project engineer Scott Schmoker, in a letter to City Utilities Supt. Alan Romine, said he questioned Rieschick’s experience in drilling municipal wells or municipal test wells in Nebraska.

Councilman Ryan Rieschick (speaking as a bidder and not a council member) disputed that assessment, saying Rieschick Drilling has much experience in drilling municipal and test wells

and submitted the low bid. His company, Rieschick said, submitted a competitive bid and “it doesn’t matter.”

The vote to award the bid to Sargent was 3-3, with Rieschick not voting. Oliver broke the tie to follow the BPW and engineer’s recommendation.

In other developments, the council:

—Voted 5-2 (Rieschick and Steve Scholl voted no) to hire Mike Dunn of Halbert, Dunn & Halbert to prepare necessary documents for the annexation of properties on the south edge of Falls City.

—Heard the quarterly report from Beckie Cromer, EDGE Executive Director, who said Falls City’s industries are doing well in tough economic times.

—Learned from Oliver that Grimm’s Gardens may have a solution to the “bird problem” south of the library.

—Approved a recommendation from the Housing Committee to award three housing rehab (grant) contracts (\$61,519).

—Approved the use of city streets for the annual Cobblestone Fun Run on Aug. 25.

—Accepted the resignation of Second Ward Councilman Rieschick, who said he and his family would be relocating to Auburn on Aug. 10. Oliver thanked Rieschick for his council service.

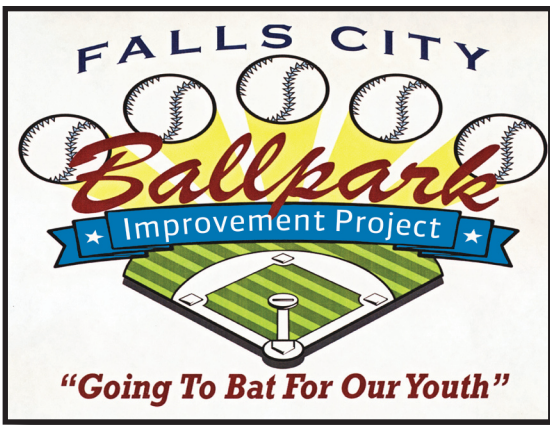

The Ball Field Improvement Committee continues to work hard keeping the citizens informed about the progress of the newest improvement to our community. I have received numerous inquiries and comments about the progress at Grandview Park and felt it was time to send out a progress letter. Grandview Park has turned out to be a beautiful improvement for our youngest ball players, but this park is not finished at this time. Turf Solutions Group is making final preparations to crown the infield so the water drains to the edges where the newly installed drainage trenches can remove the water. I know that after the last big rain citizens were concerned about the amount of water that was standing on the infield. Fortunately the rain came before the infield was completely finished and the water wasn’t able to drain in the proper manner. I also want to emphasize that after a rain of this intensity there is no drainage system able to handle this amount of water, so be patient. TSG has been delaying finishing the infield because it is more important to keep watering the sod that was installed almost a month ago. The sod is too wet for equipment to travel on it but due to the efforts of Randy Miller and Mike Huppert, the sod is rooting down, even in this July heat. If you see Randy and Mike tell them Thank You for their constant attention making sure the water is applied properly.

Other improvements to be completed are the installation of the roofs on the dugouts, replacing the scoreboard with a larger model, installation of gates on the outside fences, installing bleachers, and field signage. Our committee has been meeting weekly with TSG to discuss the progress at Dallas Jones Park and the final touches at Grandview. TSG is committed to completing Grandview in time for the fall High School season, which includes being ready for fall practice. The committee is already talking about a ribbon cutting for the first home game, so mark your calendar.

A quick note about Dallas Jones Park, the future site of Fiedler Family Ball Complex. TSG has been moving a ton of dirt from the East to the West side of the complex. Contrary to popular remarks, we are not building another swimming pool. Field D, which is along Barada Street, will actually be lower than street level. When this field is completed, there will be numerous viewing sites similar to Grandview. It will be a beautiful venue to watch a game. We are remodeling the existing concessions and bathrooms to match the new concessions/bathrooms that will be built in the NE corner of the complex. The new Legion Field is coming along nicely and the baseball players will appreciate a level outfield.

As you can tell, I am excited about the progress of our project and the beautiful complex that will arise for our youth to use in the future. I appreciate the comments from the citizens of Falls City. It reinforces the fact that you care about progress and you demand a quality project for your community. I believe we are accomplishing this task but there are many challenges ahead of us. Don’t be afraid to approach a committee member with your comments or questions. Just remember this is a community project.

Travelers capture best-ever 97 wins

The Falls City Travelers Softball Program wrapped up another banner year last weekend at Class C state tournaments in Grand Island, Hastings and South Sioux City.

The five Travelers teams (10-and-Under, 12-U, 14-U, 16-U and 18-U) produced a program-record 97 victories and the 12-U won both its league regular season and tournament titles and both the 14-U and 16-U teams won regular season

league championships. After 16 seasons, the Travelers are 886 and 380 overall.

“Our goal this year was to win 100 games for the Travelers program - we came up short with 97, which is one more than any other year,” Travelers founder, director and coach Carl Messner said. “We are already looking ahead to next year with the excitement of playing on new fields and knowing already we will be hosting the 14-U and

16-U league tournaments in Falls City. In the past, when we were the host team, we played them in Auburn so we didn’t have to be so concerned about rain.

“I’m also looking into hosting a invitational sometime next summer if I can work out the dates, and would like to try to bring a State Tournament to Falls City in the next three years so everyone can see our new fields. Doing something like that takes a lot of volunteers and the support of the whole city, which I think we will have,” Messner said.

The 2012 12-and-Under team, coached by Joe Dunn and Ryan Rieschick, posted a 32-5 record, becoming the first Travelers team to eclipse 30 victories. They went 3-2 at the state tournament in Hastings, finishing fourth. Scores: FC 3, Bennington 0; FC 10, Central Xplosion 0; FC 0, Yutan 2; FC 10, Waverly 2; FC 9, Gretna 10.

The 14-U team, coached by Chuck Dawkins and Billy Lotter, were in Sioux City and went 0-3, losing to Emerson (9-5), Cozad (3-2) and DC West (2-1), finishing the year with a 17-10 record.

The 16-U team, coached by Gina Scheitel and Messner, was fifth at Class C in Grand Island, bolting out to a pair of Friday victories (Fremont, 13-1; Pierce, 12-2). Saturday, though, the team lost a pair of heart-breakers (Bruning-Davenport-Shickley, 4-3; David City, 7-6), and failed to make Sunday play. They posted an 18-6 record in 2012.

The 10-U team, coached by Alicia Schock and Heather Feek, was 4-2 at Class C in Hastings, finishing seventh. Falls City beat Calvary (6-2) and lost to David City (5-4) Friday. Saturday, they opened with a 7-6 win over Gothenburg before battling back from a 10-2 deficit in a 13-12 extra-innings victory over Lightning Silver. A 9-1 win over Synergy made it three in a row on the day and pushed the team just a game away from qualifying for Sunday play. Late Saturday, though, FC lost 9-4 to Waverly Heat to end the season at 21-9 overall.

The Travelers 18-U, also coached by Scheitel and Messner, didn’t go to state, but they posted a 9-6 record and captured the Alexis Calfee Memorial Tournament in Palmyra.
