Dr. Moras L. Shubert, Denver, Colorado, a renowned botanist, educator, conservationist and competitive figure skater who celebrated his 100th birthday, is the 2016 member of the Wall of Fame. The late Dr. Shubert was inducted into the Wall of Fame Sunday afternoon, June 26, at the annual reunion of the Falls City High School Alumni Association at Prichard Auditorium.

He was born at Shubert and graduated from Falls City High School in 1930, from Peru State Teachers College with a double major in botany and chemistry, and then earned his master's degree and doctorate at Iowa State University.

Kirkman's Cove, Iron Horse on health alert status

Water tests collected on June 27 have confirmed that toxic algae levels at both Kirkman's Cove Recreation Area near Humboldt and Iron Horse Trail Lake northwest of DuBois have exceeded limits set for safe contact with the water. Therefore, both lakes have been placed on "Health Alert Status", which means the swimming beaches are closed effective immediately; and all body contact activities including swimming, wading, and water skiing are restricted.

Nemaha NRD officials report that the recreation areas remain open, and all other usual activities such as boating, picnicking, camping, and hiking are permitted. Fishing is still allowed, though anglers are encouraged to practice "catch and release" as the toxins could be present in the liver, intestines, and pancreas of fish.

Visitors to the parks are cautioned not to ingest or make contact with the water and to particularly make sure children and pets do not come into contact with the water. Most of the risk associated with this form of algae is limited to skin irritations; however, gastrointestinal illness and liver disease could result from ingestion of the water.

Signs have been posted at the lakes informing visitors of the

water restrictions, which will remain in effect until further notice. Because of the high readings, the beaches must remain closed until results drop below safety limits for two consecutive weeks. NRD staff collect water samples each Monday, but test results are not available until the end of the week.

NRD personnel monitors the waters at all of its public recreation areas weekly and, if necessary, will issue alerts via local news media and the Nemaha NRD's website, www.nemahanrd.org and on our Facebook page. In addition, the District maintains a message on its voicemail system for those checking on the lakes' status after business hours. Lake visitors should note, however, that the levels of toxic algae can change dramatically in a short period of time. Therefore, if you observe toxic algae, which resembles bright green paint on the lake surface, avoid contact with the water.

A “breakthrough” Drug may not be as great as it sounds

“Thinking About Health,” is part of the Nebraska Press Association’s partnership with Rural Health News Service, which will provide Nebraskans with unbiased health-related information, designed to help better understand the health issues facing our communities, state and nation.

A story in The Guardian, a British news outlet that now has a publishing arm in the U.S., grabbed my attention. The headline read, “Treatments for cancers and Alzheimer’s on the verge of a breakthrough.”

Really? Now, I’ve written about this stuff long enough to know the word “breakthrough” is a red flag. Anyone who hears the word or sees it in print should be skeptical.

There are very few genuine breakthroughs, but there’s lots of enthusiasm for the term on the part of the media, physicians, academic medical centers and others who use it to attract attention to a product or a service. It’s a dandy marketing tool. Who wouldn’t want a “breakthrough” cure for cancer or Alzheimer’s disease?

Sure enough, the first paragraph of the Guardian’s story noted that new emerging treatments “may, in the next 10 to 20 years, transform the way people are treated.” Ten or 20 years doesn’t exactly sound like a breakthrough is imminent. But the word sure gets people to read the story and pay attention when they see advertising for the product.

What exactly does the term “breakthrough” mean? It sounds as if it signifies a sudden, important and dramatic discovery or development. The Food and Drug Administration has a specific meaning for the term. A few years ago Congress gave the FDA, which regulates drugs, the authority to designate certain drugs as “breakthroughs” and allow drug companies to market them based on preliminary evidence that they might result in important outcomes for patients. That’s according to Larry Sasich, PhD, founder of Patient Drug News, who once worked for the Washington consumer advocacy group Public Citizen.

Drugs with this “breakthrough” designation can come to market in a shorter time, but approvals can be withdrawn if further trials don’t show meaningful benefit to patients, Sasich told me. All it means is that these drugs “are allowed to be sold using a lower standard of evidence that requires confirmation of a true benefit for full approval.”

The idea of an FDA designation for “breakthrough” drugs has now spread to breakthrough medical devices. A bill, the 21st Century Cures Act, that loosens regulatory standards for clinical trials for devices passed the House of Representatives last year, and a Senate version is moving toward passage. It contains controversial provisions for labeling some devices as breakthroughs.

Dr. Sanket Dhruva, a Yale cardiologist, who studies medical evidence, told me, “This is more a marketing sales pitch than something that’s truly a breakthrough that’s going to benefit patients.” The FDA grants one-third of requests it receives for the breakthrough designation for drugs. “It’s a low bar,” he says.

“If a drug is truly meaningful, we’ll know that through the evidence and won’t need to call it a breakthrough.”

Furthermore, it’s becoming clear that neither doctors nor patients really understand what breakthrough really means. A study published in the journal JAMA reported that board-certified internists and specialists significantly overestimated what the FDA requires to be a breakthrough drug. They believed those drugs were backed by stronger evidence than what the FDA actually required.

Sasich added that the JAMA study also showed that doctors don’t have a good understanding of the drug’s FDA-approved professional product label. This, he says, can result in physicians overestimating the benefit and, thus, prescribing inappropriately.

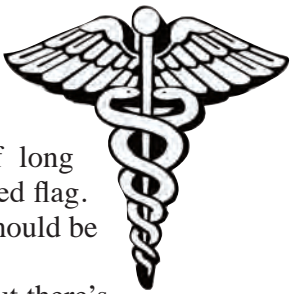
Another study, published in JAMA Internal Medicine, asked a sample of Americans which of two drugs they would take for a potentially deadly condition. One was described as a “breakthrough.” The other was described as meeting the FDA criteria for being a breakthrough drug. Ninety-two percent chose the one that was labeled “breakthrough.” Marketing works, leading patients to be overly optimistic about what a drug can and cannot do.

If doctors don’t know whether a drug (and maybe also a medical device if the Cures Act passes) is really a breakthrough supported by scientific evidence, it’s up to patients to find out on their own.

One place to start is the DailyMed website, <https://dailymed.nlm.nih.gov/dailymed/> offered as a free service of the National Library of Medicine, part of the National Institutes of Health. The website contains drug labeling information for more than 87,000 drugs. You can find drug guidance, regulatory information, and warnings about medicines you may be prescribed - for example, that the FDA’s strongest warning, a black box warning, means there is reasonable evidence that a serious hazard is associated with the drug.

Remember, before you ask your doctor about some “breakthrough” drug you’ve seen advertised, it’s best to do your homework.

Nebraska Democrats -yes Democrats - making some noise

Legend has it that there actually was once a Democrat who lived in the sprawling Third Congressional District of Nebraska. But he died. Of loneliness.

In this red state where fence posts are said to outnumber people in many areas, Republicans certainly outnumber Democrats. Official 2014 figures show: 559,494 Republicans; 357,899 Democrats; 235,984 nonpartisan (independent) voters and 5,708 Libertarians.

More importantly, the people who count these political noses, say that the number of Republicans has grown less than 2 percent since 2008 and Democrats have actually lost voters since 2008, when then-U.S. Sen. Barack Obama won the presidency and claimed victory in Omaha’s 2nd Congressional District. There were 392,943 Democrats on the rolls then.

Nebraska is seeing a continuing surge in “other” voters as the number of Libertarians has grown dramatically from the 453 registered in 2008. The number of nonpartisans was 195,507 back in 2008. The 2014 nonpartisan numbers represent an increase of more than 11 percent, according to the Nebraska Secretary of State’s office. In a nutshell, about 48 percent of the registered voters in Nebraska are Republicans, 31 percent Democrats and the rest independents or Libertarians.

Those numbers don’t mean much when it comes to actual voting. Nebraska has had its share of Democratic governors in recent times -- Morrison, Exon, Kerrey and Nelson – and also elected Exon, Kerrey and Nelson to the U.S. Senate as Democrats. That means each one of those candidates had to attract a large number of Republicans to their camp. That also means the candidates had to offer something to attract those voters.

In those cases, Nelson and Exon had a knack for acting more like Republicans – at least with more centrist views – on many occasions. I don’t recall anyone from either party complaining much about that because the wheels of government were still turning and the state was moving forward without the divisiveness that has been highlighted on the national stage in the last few years. The only time people referred to Nebraska as a “red state” was on those afternoons when more than 70,000 people donned red apparel and crowded into Lincoln’s Memorial Stadium for a football game.

With that background you can see why it’s such a big deal when the Nebraska Democrats make headlines, albeit from divisiveness in the ranks caused by two candidates for U.S. President, Sanders and Clinton. The Sandersonians say they won the all-important Democratic caucuses while the Clintonians point out that they won the more traditional primary election. Political scientists tell us that caucuses tend to be low-voter turnout events with most participation by people who feel strongly about a candidate.

So, it was along those lines that

Nebraska Democrats found themselves divided in a race for party leadership during their recent state convention in Kearney. With the state party chair vacillating about serving another term, a plan was hatched for a so-called “unity slate” that would see him serving as chair while grooming a vice-chair who could take the reins in the future. Jane Kleeb, an activist who led the charge against the controversial Keystone XL Pipeline, was poised to take the vice-chairmanship.

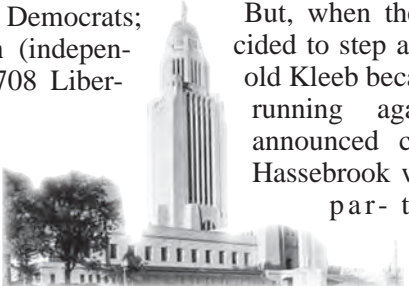
But, when the party chair decided to step aside, the 43-year-old Kleeb became the candidate running against previously announced challenger Chuck Hassebrook who had been the party’s candidate for governor in 2014 and a longtime

University of Nebraska Regent. Kleeb rode the wave of Sandersonians and defeated Hassebrook and his fellow Clintonians by 42 votes.

She says she wants to see a dynamic Democratic Party, one that can challenge the Republican stronghold in Nebraska. Well, good luck with that. What sounds good on the floor of the state convention doesn’t necessarily translate to the voter registration rolls and the general election ballot box. That’s where it counts.

And what about that growing number of independents, the folks who are wearied by party politics, party fighting on the national stage and in-fighting in the state party.

During World War II Dr. Shubert served as a line officer on the aircraft carrier Lake Champlain in the Pacific Theater. At the wars end his ship made five trips across the Atlantic Ocean bringing troops home from Europe.

Dr. Shubert accepted a position as a botany professor at Denver University and taught botany classes for 31 years. A classroom was named for him.

He became infatuated with ice skating and competed in Denver-era ice shows for many years. He said he built his botany class schedule around his ice skating schedule. For one ice show his dancing partner was Condoleezza Rice, former Secretary of State, who was a Denver University student at the time.

Dr. Shubert was the principal founder of the internationally recognized Denver Botanic Gardens and was a lifetime member of the Gardens board of trustees, also serving as its secretary for decades. The Gardens is a sanctuary of native plants, trees and agriculture. He actively promoted the Gardens research and conservation work and a Genetics Lab there was named in

his honor.

He and his wife of 73 years, Erne, led world tours, organized mountain hikes and were instrumental in creating a residence for university staff and students.

His 100th birthday in May 2012

was celebrated in the Botanic Gardens and at that time it was announced that a variety of geranium had been named in his honor. Dr. Shubert said that would be his memorial. He died several months later.

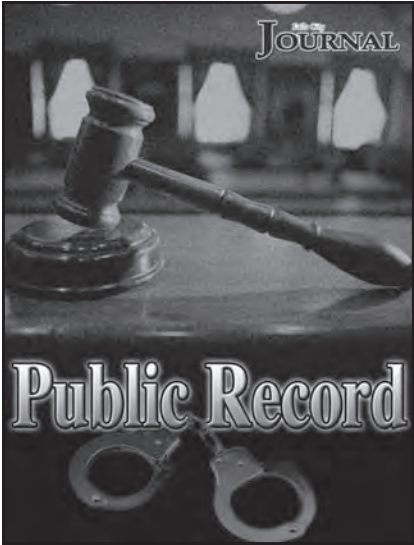

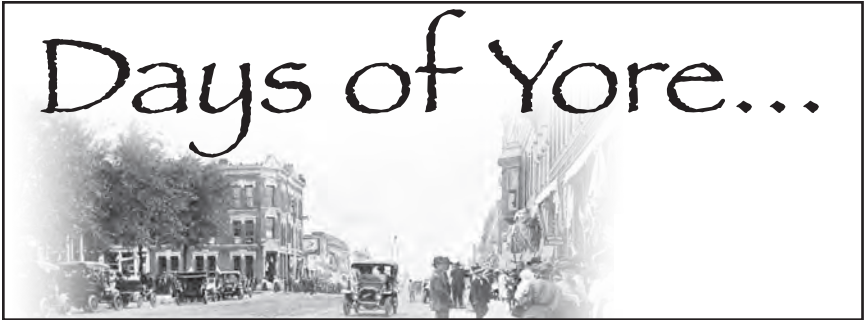

50 Years Ago
(July 5, - July 11, 1966)

Tober’s Vogue advertised an “after the 4th Sale.” Among the many bargains, gals could get two pair of seamless nylons for a buck.

Gaelord Bek was the only county competitor to win a class at the Salem Kart races.

Marine Pvts. Charles W. Helmick, Humboldt, and Melvin E. Kuhlman, Falls City, had completed individual combat training at Camp Pendleton, CA.

A tornado struck the Lawrence Bierman farm, northeast of Falls City, destroying an implement shed (but not the tractors inside), uprooted trees and damaged a hen house. The twister created a huge mess. It also blew down an old barn at the W. B. Maze farm in the same area. No injuries were reported.

The FC Council took the initial steps to create the Housing Authority.

President Johnson said “we are on the way” to winning the War in Vietnam, words he would later severely regret.

Stock car races were set for July 8 at the Richardson County Speedway, south of Dawson.

The FC Safeway advertised 1-lb. rolls of ground beef for 49 cents. You could get a TV dinner at Fleskoskis’ Food Basket for that same price. At Hinky Dinky, sirloin steaks were 89 cents a pound.

Bill Simon fired a no-hitter as his Richardson County Bank and Trust Pee Wee team bested Jim Hill’s.

The local Elks Lodge, for the fourth year in a row, earned best in the nation for their Youth Week program.

A guy in Missouri wanted to obtain a functioning “spare” electric chair from Arkansas for a museum he had in mind. Arkansas turned him down as the only one they had was still in use.

Upcoming at the Rivoli Theatre in FC: “The Flying Nun,” starring Debbie Reynolds. It followed “The Ghost and Mr. Chicken,” starring Don Knotts.

Jack Nicklaus won his first British Open by a shot over Doug Sanders and Welshman Dave Thomas.

25 Years Ago

Falls City Sacred Heart celebrated its Centennial Mass on the field east of the school. Hundreds attended. More than 1,000 enjoyed a barbecue dinner that followed.

At Hardee’s in FC, celebrating their 3rd anniversary, folks could get burgers at 3 for a dollar and cheeseburgers at 3 for \$1.45, as well as register for trips to Worlds of Fun in Kansas City.

§1-403 OFFICIALS; CHANGE IN OFFICE. The Governing Body shall meet at six o'clock (6:00) P.M. on the first (1st) regular meeting in December in each election year following the day of the Municipal election and the outgoing officers and the outgoing members of the City Council shall present their reports. The outgoing members of the Council shall surrender their offices to

the incoming members. Each outgoing officer shall thereupon surrender to his successor in office all property, records, papers, and moneys belonging to the same. After such surrender, the outgoing Council shall adjourn sine die. The newly elected Council shall then convene and proceed to organize itself for the ensuing year. The Mayor shall call the meeting to order. The new Council shall then proceed to examine the credentials of their members and other elective officers of the Municipality to see that each has been duly and properly elected and to see that such oaths and bonds have been given as are required. The Council shall then elect one of its own body to be the President of the Council. The Mayor shall then proceed with the regular order of business. It shall be the duty of all members of the Council and other elected officials to qualify prior to the first (1st) regular meeting in December following their election. All appointive officers shall qualify within two (2) weeks following their appointment. (Ref. 17-107.02(9) RS Neb.)

Section 2. That Chapter 1, Article 5, Section 1-513 of the Falls City Municipal Code be amended to read as follows:

§1-513 MEETINGS; TIME. Regular meetings of the City Council shall be held at the City Council Chamber in the City Hall commencing at six o'clock (6:00) P.M. on the first (1st) Monday of each month and at six o'clock (6:00) P.M. on the third Monday of each month. Special meetings may be held at said chambers whenever called by the Mayor or any three (3) Council members.
