Sheriff Houser would like the 911 answering point at the Sheriff's Department/Jail so that two persons would be staffed in the jail area and so that the dispatcher could be utilized as the person who would call for assistance for the jailer if assistance would be needed.

Chief of Police John Caverzagie requested that the board visit with county constituents to assist in the decision about moving the 911 answering point. Falls City Mayor Tim Hersh also commented during this portion of the meeting.

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You can, indeed, go home again

Thomas Wolfe once wrote, "You can't go home again." I say he was wrong. I've done it. Twice!

The first time was in 1977 when our sons were nine and 11, and we took a detour during our return from a vacation in Colorado. It was a spontaneous decision, incited by my curiosity about the place where I had been born. I'd left Falls City at the age of four with little memory of it, but my parents had always spoken well of the community.


That first visit impressive. When we arrived, bands were playing. Crowds were about. A celebration. I joked that it was all for me, but the family didn't buy it. They recognized it for what it was—a summer festival. My sons noticed the wide brick streets, but they weren't as impressed as I. The memory I

did have focused on the house where we lived, and seeing that house became my immediate goal. Unfortunately, I didn't have the address, so I had nothing to go on. We ended up taking a few pictures, buying some souvenirs, and heading for home.

Not seeing that house gnawed on me. The craving to see it again wouldn't let go, and 36 years later I decided to try again. This time I had a photo of the house, taken in 1945, an address from my birth certificate, and a current image I'd found on the Internet—the remodeled version, I assumed, since the 1945 photo showed a house with a unique roofline that apparently

I planned on smiled politely, figuring she was finding out where the Midstates Oil Refinery that employed my father had been, seeing the hospital where I was born, and finally, getting my picture taken next to the baptismal font where I had been baptized. According to the Internet, the 1907 church was still there. Thankfully, my long-suffering wife agreed to accompany me after another vacation in Colorado. We had visited Aspen, a beautiful town with perhaps more money that it deserves, but welcoming all the same. Then on to Falls City.

"Our last room," the lady pulling my leg as people do who push motel rooms where we come from—Illinois. But a "No Vacancy" sign quickly went up in the window.

Her recommendation for where to eat was perfect. We got such a delicious meal at such a reasonable price that I left a 100 percent tip. Usually my tips top out at 20. The family restaurant was homey, and the people were friendly, eager to welcome strangers to their community. We struck up a conversation with the table next to us and explained our mission. As we left, a gentleapproached who'd overheard. He thought the Midstates Refinery might be in Salem, not in Falls City, because that's where he remembered one.

I couldn't imagine my father commuting any distance in those times, so I faced another question. But that was for the next day. Tonight we would visit the address, give the current occupants a copy of that 1945 photo, and then drive down the

block to see the church where I had been baptized.

But when we arrived at the house shown on the Internet, its address didn't match the one on my birth certificate. address was a couple of houses down the block and was a large, two-story house. I knew my parents had had an apartment before moving to the

house in the 1945 photo, and that must have been the address I was using. Thus I didn't have the house address, just a photo.

Blast!

More disappointment was imminent. When we drove to the church, we discovered the Internet had been wrong again. A church built in 1975 stood at the location, which meant that the old baptismal font was gone. From the conversation at dinner, I had already learned that the hospital where I was born had been replaced with a new facil-

Poll: Most rural Nebraskans skeptical of new health law

surance and a majority think the nation will be worse off under the new health care law, though many also acknowledge they don't sufficiently understand the law, according to the 2013 Nebraska Rural Poll.

The 18th annual University of Nebraska-Lincoln poll was sent to 6,320 households in Nebraska's 84 nonmetropolitan counties in March and April. Results are based on 2,317

The poll asked participants a series of questions about their own health-insurance situation and about their opinions of the Affordable Care Act, also known as the health care reform law, passed by Congress in 2010.

Fifty-five percent of respondents reported having health insurance through their Congress, "and we're polling a very conser-

Most rural Nebraskans have health in- job benefits or their spouse's. Twenty-four percent said they have insurance through a government program such as Medicaid or Medicare. Nine percent said they have no health insurance.

Most likely to be uninsured are those who live in North Central Nebraska, people with lower household incomes, people who never married, people with lower education levels and people with food service or personal care occupations.

The poll also found rural Nebraskans to be highly skeptical about the Affordable Care Act. Cheryl Burkhart Kreisel, UNL Extension specialist in entrepreneurship/ business development, said that skepticism is not surprising considering the law came from a democratic president and members of vative red state."

Fifty-four percent of poll respondents said they think the country will be worse off under the new law, and just 9 percent think it will be better off. Also, 52 percent think self-employed individuals will be worse off, and 8 percent think they will be better off.

Thirty-five percent said they believed people currently without health insurance will be better off under the new law, while 27 percent think they'd be worse off.

Other findings:

 Thirty-six percent think the new law will be somewhat successful at increasing access to health insurance coverage, while 27 percent think it won't.

- 58 percent think the law will not succeed in decreasing overall health care costs, while only 13 percent think it will. Also, 44

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Falls City received some great publicity — and rightfully so – in the lead editorial published in the Tuesday, July 2, edition of the Omaha World-Herald. "Falls City shows secrets of success" chronicled the community-building efforts that have been happening here, from Mitch Glaeser's renovation of the Grand Weaver Hotel to the Main Street project that continues to evolve. And everything in between. The editorial is copyrighted so we should not quote it directly here. Let's just say it is highly complimentary, especially of community leaders who have given tirelessly to help this town move from one that was stagnant, if not going backward, to one that is on the map and progressing. Just wait until that new bridge at Rulo opens. Glaeser, with help from many others, got the ball rolling on that one, too.

Once in awhile in this job, you meet a politician who appears sincere and honest, and whose thoughts correspond with many of yours. That was the case a year or two ago when Mike Flood, a Republican and former Speaker of the Legislature, stopped by. We had a great conversation and, as I recall, that translated into a favorable story that was published in *The Journal*. Unfortunately, Flood's wife was diagnosed with breast cancer and he dropped any governor-related ambitions, at least for the time being.

A couple of weeks ago, State Sen. Steve Lathrop, a Democrat, visited our office as part of a "listening tour." Lathrop, who earned his Juris Doctorate from the Creighton University School of Law in 1981, is considering a run for governor as Gov. Dave Heineman completes his final term in office.

I was impressed with Lathrop, who will be "term-limited" in a year. "For the most part," Sen. Lathrop said, legislators in Nebraska leave partisanship aside." That is a good thing, as anyone who pays attention to the name-calling and inactivity in Washington will ascribe. He said that most Nebraska senators tend to "take on the state's problems and come up with solutions."

Lathrop, from the Omaha area, said he's been listening to elected officials, merchants and others to gain an understanding of what they think of state government. He described the conversations as "very instructive." Lathrop said he believes state government can even better partner with city governments and businesses to solve problems those entities face.

One priority, said Lathrop, is to keep young people at home through good jobs. "That has to be a priority," the senator said. This would include entrepreneurs who decide to start a business, maybe one that is Internet-based. Of course, with Southeast Nebraska Communication's fiber optic system, Falls City is a prime area for that sort of development.

"Wind energy is huge," Sen. Lathrop said, and one of his legislative priorities. He said removing the sales tax from wind energy projects would equal business incentive and "allow Nebraska to compete with Kansas, Oklahoma" and other states for energy exports. "I believe we are just tapping our potential," Lathrop said, relating to energy-related jobs, incomes, the benefits for landowners and counties. He said business tax incentives benefit rural Nebras-

Lathrop said those on the extremes of the political spectrum rarely are part of needed solutions. Rather, leaders who can bring people to the middle and consensus and earn trust are the real problem solvers. "I've been able to do this," he said. Whether in the Unicameral or not, "I'll continue to do that." Lathrop said he's enjoyed his seven years in the Legislature, which he described as "the best example of democracy."

On Saturday, July 6, World-Herald reporter Robynn Tysver wrote a story that examined the upcoming governor's race and a potential candidate many of us in this area know. Charles Herbster, a successful businessman and prize-winning cattleman, was reportedly seen at some Fourth of July parades in the state, accompanied by "Herbster for Governor" signs. A Republican, Herbster declined to say he had decided to run in what would be his first campaign, but promised an upcoming announcement. He was highly involved in the most recent presidential election as a supporter of Mitt Rom-



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Pending auction of car dealership: The rest of the story

The Internet is alive with the story of the pending two-day auction of the former Lambrecht Chevrolet Company in Pierce, Nebraska. The dealership closed 17 years ago. The Minnesota-based auction company is touting a number of vehicles with fewer than ten miles on the odometer, plastic on the seats, original factory stickers still in the windows and hub caps and floor mats still in the trunk.

It's the stuff that car guys yearn for. A 1958 Chevrolet Cameo pickup truck with one mile on the odometer. A 1964 Chevy Impala with four miles on the odometer. A Silver Anniversary issued 1978 Corvette with four miles on the odometer. Plus a large number of "project" cars, trade-ins that were not re-sold, but stored on the Lambrecht farm. In addition, there are car parts still in the bins, parts books still on the counters, advertising displays, etc. in the showroom.

But the story of Ray P. and Mildred Lambrecht, as told to the auction company by their daughter Jeannie Lambrecht Stillwell, is the story of small business in the Midwest, of the true spirit of Mom and Pop and their love of, and involvement in, the life of the community.

She writes that her Dad and Mom owned and operated Lambrecht Chevrolet Company from 1946 until 1996, selling new Chevrolets to multiple generations of families all over the Midwest and beyond. They had one mechanic and Ray developed a reputation for making his first offer to the customer his best offer. No dealing or dickering. He would offer a price and encourage his customers to go elsewhere and try to beat it. They usually came back.

Born in 1918 during a depression in rural Pierce County, Nebraska, a small farming community, Lambrecht drove his first car at age nine. It was a 1927 tan Chevrolet two-door coupe and he drove his mother seven miles into town to buy groceries. He was drafted into the Army in 1942 and served in the Aleutian Islands in Alaska where there was fierce fighting with the Japanese. Honorably discharged in 1946, he returned to Nebraska, married Mildred and went into the car business with his uncle. He designed and built the building that housed the dealership, driving from town-to-town in post-war Nebraska to find the materials. After two

years, he bought out the uncle. Ray and Mildred operated the dealership for 50 years until they retired in 1996 at ages 78 and 75. They worked six days a week for 50 years, never taking one single day of vacation or one sick day. They worked hard and operated their business with honesty, integrity, and kindness, frequently lending a helping hand to others who were in need. Now, 17 years later, they have decided to sell everything, including the cars that are making collectors quiver with excitement. The late September auction is even the subject of a YouTube video.

Jeannie says her dad believed in the Golden Rule, and he treated his customers accordingly. He was especially kind to the children who accompanied their fathers to the dealership to look at cars and trucks. He would let the kids sit inside new cars or look under the hoods while he explained to them how things worked. The kids were delighted and often became life-long customers when they became adults.

Ray also believed in selling safe cars to families and often took the trade-ins to the farm where his collection started to grow. It now includes

500 survivor vehicles. Ray, now 95, can look at any of those vehicles today and tell you the story behind it. He remembers each used car and the former owner, like the 1928 Durant owned by his wife's uncle Louie. That car is still part of the collection.

But more important than the cars was the fact that Lambrecht Chevrolet participated in all of the important local celebrations and events throughout the years. For its grand opening in 1946, there were real live elephants in front of the dealership wearing Chevrolet banners on their backs, Jeannie said. During the Nebraska Centennial in 1954, Ray had the honor of driving the Governor of Nebraska in a 1953 Corvette down Main Street in the parade. Pioneer Days in June of 1959 was the 100th anniversary of Pierce County, Nebraska. Ray again drove dignitaries in a new 1959 Chevy in

the parade. There were countless other functions and parades.

Lambrecht Chevrolet Company remained a small business in a small Nebraska community of about 1,200 people. In the 1980's, the Lambrechts made the transition from typewriter to computer for communications with General Motors. But Mildred still used an adding machine for maintaining handwritten financial ledgers and paper files. The original cash register from 1946 still sat on the front counter and was used daily.

The inventory of Lambrecht Chevrolet is a virtual time capsule. The dedication of Ray and Mildred and their involvement in the community is a story repeated every day across Nebraska by countless small businessmen and women dedicated to serving friends and neighbors.



ity, so that too was gone.

Thomas Wolfe was turning out to be right, after all. You can't go home again.

Double blast!

Totally discouraged, I drove back to the motel. "We'll go to Monday morning's Mass anyway," I told my wife. "Maybe someone there will recognize the photo. If not we'll try the records at the courthouse."

I slept poorly and was up in plenty of time to make the 6:45 Mass. It was a beautiful weekday ceremony, attended by 20 or so worshippers. Afterwards the celebrants disappeared behind the altar, and when I turned around I saw that the church had emptied. I looked for the baptismal font. Maybe it was in the vestibule. We headed in that direction, but with everyone gone, what good would it be to see a baptismal font that had nothing to do with

When we opened the door, a smiling parishioner greeted us. She had lingered to welcome us and was as friendly as the people in the restaurant. I showed her the photo. She didn't recognize the house, but perhaps someone else would. She would ask a couple of the others to wait for us. My spirits lifted. "Where is the baptismal font?" I asked. She directed us back toward the altar, where the Easter candle clearly announced it. Obviously, I'd been too dense to notice.

As we approached, the monsignor came from behind the altar to say hello. "Visitors stand out on weekdays," he said with a smile. I told him that I'd been baptized at the church 70 years ago, and I had hoped to see the baptismal font. After all, the website showed the old church building. "We have a website?" he asked, clearly astonished.

I told him about my mission to find the house where I'd spent my years as a toddler. He suggested the name of a realtor to contact as we hurried to catch the others who had waited outside.

No recognition there either, although one lady charmingly invited us to retire to Falls City. It was a serious and warm invitation, and I couldn't help but be moved. The other lady did recognize the last name of the landlord my parents had had in the 1940s. The family was still in Falls City. We got an address, and the dear parishioner who had greeted us in the vestibule promised to call the woman and let her know we were coming.

All this from strangers. All this from truly caring people. They had lifted my spirits immeasurably, although I doubted that I'd ever see the house. Probably torn down.

Since we thought it was too early to barge in on a stranger, we followed our original plan, stopping at the courthouse, Miller-Monroe and The Falls City Journal. Surprisingly, everyone seemed interested; everyone wanted to help. The realtors even copied the photo and took our email address, promising to send us a picture if they found the house. But no one recognized the old house with the unique roof line. And no one knew anything about Midstates Refinery. We headed for our last hope, the lady with the same last name as my parents' landlord: Margie Fleskoski, 421 E. 25th St.

She was expecting us. When I showed her the picture, she thought a bit and said she might know where it was. Unsure of the exact location, she told us to get in her car. "I can drive," I said. I'm not young, but I thought I might be younger than she, and I felt a little guilty. But she insisted on driving, leading us to her garage. We were off.

She drove a few blocks south, telling us about my parents' landlords who were her father

percent think it will not help increase the quality of health care, while 24 percent think it will.

 Persons living in or near smaller communities are more likely than those in or near large communities to say they and their family will be worse off under the new law – 56 percent compared to 43 percent.

Underlying respondents' opinions of the new law, though, is an acknowledgment by many that they don't understand it well. Only 5 percent say they understand the law "very well." More than 40 percent say they don't understand it at all and almost one-third say

"There's a lot of learning and education that needs to take place," Burkhart-Kreisel said.

"There's a lack of trust in the entire system," added Randy Cantrell, rural sociologist with the Rural Futures Institute.

"It's a fascinating look at what you get with a major national policy change," he said.

The Rural Poll is the largest annual poll of rural Nebraskans' perceptions on quality of life and policy issues. This year's response rate was about 37 percent. The margin of error is plus or minus 2 percent. Complete results are available online at http://ruralpoll.unl.edu.

With its 18-year history, the poll has a collection of data about rural trends and perceptions that is unmatched in the country, said Becky Vogt, project manager who's been working on the Rural Poll since its second

The university's Center for Applied Rural Innovation conducts the poll in cooperation with the Nebraska Rural Futures Institute with funding from UNL Extension and the Agricultural Research Division in the *Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources.*

Midstates had been in Falls City, not Salem. I made a copy, recognizing names that my father had often mentioned. In gratitude, I gave the director copies of two of my books, hoping someone in the community might read them. She gave us a little tour of the art exhibit by Allan Turbach, whose paintings were much more suited to our taste than the New York artist on display in Aspen. I found it noteworthy that I could compare the two displays on such equal

My wife had written down our mileage when we arrived and when we left. We'd driven 15 miles on Falls City streets and each mile was replete with friendliness and help. Each mile was precious.

We returned to our Oswego, Il address about eight and a half hours later, but I wondered. Had

we arrived home, or had I just left home? My heart was divided.

No, I'd found the home of my origin, Mr. Thomas Wolfe. I went there. I talked with the residents there. I did go home. It is a beautiful, charming spot filled with warm, caring people, the place where I was born and where I spent my first four years. I'd found it again. It's Falls City, Nebraska.

Medicare now delivers diabetic testing supplies directly to homes

For years, Medicare and its beneficiaries have been paying too much for durable medical equipment, prosthetics, orthotics, and supplies.

To reduce costs and the fraud resulting from excessive prices, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services introduced a competitive bidding program in 2011. This program is now being expanded to include diabetic testing supplies which are provided by mail-order suppliers. This will have no effect on beneficiaries who are currently picking-up their diabetic testing supplies at a local pharmacy. This will only affect beneficiaries who have testing supplies delivered to their home.

The National Mail-Order Program for diabetic testing supplies began July 1. Beneficiaries who have supplies delivered to their home will need to use a Medicare national mail-order contract supplier. Medicare will list the contract suppliers on www.Medicare.gov/supplier

You can also call 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227) for help finding a contract supplier. Local counselors from the state of Nebraska's SHIIP can also assist in locating contract suppliers by calling 1-800-234-7119. If a beneficiary doesn't want diabetic testing supplies delivered to their home, they can go to any local store that is enrolled with Medicare and buy them there.







Property tax increases dominate Council discussion

Falls City Sacred Heart educator Jim Hoy, who acknowledged that the City Council has nothing to do with real estate assessments, broached what he sees as an unfairness and liability when the council met in regular session Monday, July 1.

Hoy said he, his wife, Ann, and the neighbors in the area of 2618 Schoenheit they have talked to are "concerned," as real estate values have increased from 40 to 100 percent. The increases, he said, will have a severe impact on incomes.

"Can you imagine real estate taxes doubling?" Hoy said. "It's sad." He continued that the drastic increases "will drive people away," including some who decide commuting is cheaper. "We got hammered" on Schoenheit Street, said Hoy.

He said that neighbors in the very same block, yet on Abbott Street, did not see near the same increases. The County Assessor's office, Hoy said, attributed the large increases to undeveloped land sales, yet homes in the area are selling for less than their valuations.

"I love this town," Hoy said, but basing real estate valuations on undeveloped land sales does not seem right. He said there are "a bunch of discontented people" in his neighborhood.

Councilman Don Ferguson said valuation increases are statewide and state-mandated, and do not affect only Falls City.

Hoy urged residents to contact their county commissioner. He also urged the City to contact the County Commissioners through a letter. At the urging of Councilman Kirby Robidoux, the council will send a letter to the commissioners relating what Hoy said during the meeting.

In other developments, the council:

-Heard a report from Clerk/Treasurer Gary Jorn, who said late spring and early summer weather has impacted attendance at the Aquatic Park, use of Candlelight Cabin and Stanton Lake camping. Turf Solutions, he said, has completed its work at the new ballpark complex. The number of burials at Steele Cemetery is down, said Jorn, yet the number of burial plots purchased has increased. Work continues on storm sewers and replacing curbs. Jorn urged motorists to "be cautious." Fact-finding for new wells to supply water for Falls City continues. Jorn said crews are working to provide electricity and gas service for the CGB complex in south Falls City. The Wastewater Treatment plant will soon be in need of an extensive cleaning. The plant, Jorn said, has served Falls City well.

-Voiced favorable comment for a special designated liquor license for Eric Froeschl for the Cobblestone Street Dance on Aug. 23. Councilperson Judy Murphy voted "no."

-Approved a request from Jenny Strecker for a block party.

—Approved the replacement of the aging server (a lease) in City offices. The cost will be between \$9,000 and \$10,000.

—Acted to approve a recommendation from the Housing Advisory Board to approve changes to the Housing Rehab Program Guidelines. The changes were recommended by the state and should help with grant funding requests.

-Accepted the bid from MidCon Underground Construction, Denton, to replace gas infrastructure that, according to Utility Supt. Allan Romine, serves about half the town. The project is budgeted and should take about 60 days. The old lines are rusting. This was recommended by the Board of Public Works.

-Approved the lease of a skid steer loader from NMC Cat through the government lease program. The cost: \$3,500.

—Approved a request from Rhett Blakley for the first annual "Tanner Shelby Merz Memorial Cruise" in conjunction with the Elks Lodge. The cruise is set to be held on Saturday, July 13, with registration at 9 a.m.

Stone Street from 14th to 15th will be closed from 9-11:30 a.m. and 5-11 p.m. for what is anticipated to be a very large event.
