FC loses pair of business leaders over last weekend

Two prominent retired Falls City businessman passed away after fighting lengthy illnesses over the weekend.

Founder, owner and retired operator of Milam's Greenhouse in Falls City, Bill L. Milam, of Falls City, passed away Saturday, Aug. 9. He was 83. On Friday, James F. 'Jim' Heineman, a financial advisor with Edward Jones Investments for nearly three decades, died at the age of 73. Both men had at one time served on the Community Hospital Board and both were active in many other local organizations.

James F. "Jim" Heineman, 73, of Falls City, died Friday, Aug. 8, 2014 in Falls City. He was born on Jan. 11, 1941 at Falls City to the late Keith and Josephine (Merritt) Heineman.

Jim graduated from Verdon High School in 1959 and from the Lincoln School of Commerce in 1960 with a degree of Associate of Applied Science in Accounting. He became employed in September of 1962 at Metropolitan Life Insurance Company as a Registered Sales Associate until 1980. In 1981 he

Bill L. Milam, 83, of Falls City, passed away Saturday, Aug. 9, 2014. He was born April 3, 1931 at Auburn to the late Lewis and Mamie (Avey) Milam.

Merz Farm Equipment marches forward

A Falls City Journal article, printed in 1957, raved in its depiction of Merz Farm Equipment, the area's upand-coming farm machinery dealer, founded by Nelson Merz: "A comparatively new business has flourished by leaps and bounds in its four years of existence," it read.

Fifty-seven years and three generations of Merz sons later, what was once new is now iconic — the quintessence of a family business, sewn securely into the very fabric of this Nebraska farming community. Fifty-seven years later, *The Journal* is still gushing.

Merz Farm Equipment unveiled its latest, perhaps greatest, upgrade Saturday during a Grand Opening Celebration at its dealership on 35th Street and Hwy. 75. Call it an early birthday gift - 2015 will be the company's $30^{\mbox{\tiny th}}$ year at the current location. And a valuable gift, to be sure. A vision of Nelson's grandson and the company's general manager, Mitch Merz — who had the blessing from his father and Dealer Principal Bruce Merz – customers were welcomed to celebrate Merz Farm Equipment's \$500,000 upgrade that was more than a year in the making. Harmon's Tire seeks change to zoning law

A plan for Harmon's OK Tire to utilize two locations in the 1800 block of Stone Street to warehouse tires has met at least a temporary roadblock, as it was brought to the attention of the City Council that current zoning ordinance forbids warehousing in the business district of Falls City.

Melvin Harmon, an owner and operator of the family tire business, appeared before the City Council at its regular meeting Monday, Aug. 4, at City Hall to request changes in the zoning ordinance which would allow the business to store tires at 1823 Stone St. (formerly Blue Collar Auto Sales & Repair), property Harmon's purchased for \$15,000 in April for that very purpose and without prior knowledge of the warehousing restriction. The company, in 2009, purchased for \$25,000 a two-story building further south on the same block, at 1805 and 1811 Stone, for the same purpose. In the five years since, Harmon's has stored tires at that location – in apparent violation of the zoning ordinance, though the company wasn't notified that doing so was incompliant with the law until following the purchase of 1823 Stone and subsequent capital investment in tire racks. Harmon's has spent considerably more money on the 1805/1811 location in renovations, including a new roof.

service office. The former building, too, has been remodeled to maintain the new look throughout the facility.

"We built this facility with the customer in mind," Mitch said. "We put together plans that allowed us to make the customers proud to call this dealership their own. We have made the commitment to have the largest amount of Massey Ferguson merchandise anywhere. We have ordered all the

toys that have been offered, all the merchandise from ShopAGCO, plus added more products from outside vendors and even have our own Merz Farm Equipment merchandise. We added a customer lounge, with Pepsi and candy vending machines and a TV for their comfort and convenience. We want people to live the lifestyle, we want customers to feel part of the family. We have updated our brand

image, we have showed our customers we are willing to invest in their future and partner with them for the long-term."

Mitch, who graduated from Falls City High School in 2002, in 2006 earned a degree from UNL in Ag Business, but also earned the equivalent of a "minor" in marketing. There's nothing "minor" about it - Mitch is responsible for the company's increasingly recognized logo and commonly seen/heard advertisements existent throughout the region via various mediums.

More so, perhaps, than the Merz men who came before him, Mitch has seen first-hand how other dealers throughout the entire country do business. Following college, for four years Mitch worked on the road for Tractor House, an ag equipment dealer in Lincoln, living, as he says, "on airplanes and Holiday Inns," working mainly on the west coast.

"I saw a lot of different ideas other dealerships had," he said.

His grandfather, who served as a State Senator after passing the torch to three sons (out of nine children) in the 70s, thought big and so does Mitch.

"I want to have the largest inventory of Massey merchandise in the country," he said. Sure enough, you can go out to Merz Farm Equipment today and buy anything from T-shirts and hats to piggy banks and Ipod covers.

Modernizing the facility, Mitch said, makes for a better experience for the customer, which has always been



Debate on debates: How many is enough?

When you're the underdog – read that Democrat in a Republican state - you want to take advantage of public exposure. When you're underfunded, you want all the media coverage possible. One way to get both is by debating your opponent as many times in as many places as possible.

It comes as no surprise that Democratic gubernatorial candidate Chuck

Hassebrook wants more than the two agreed upon debates with Republican Pete Ricketts in the first contested race for the governor's office in nearly two decades. Hassebrook is the former director of the Center for Rural Affairs and a former University of Nebraska Regent. Ricketts is an official at TD Ameritrade headquartered in

Hassebrook, who grew up on a family farm, wants an opportunity to let voters statewide know of his rural roots and his experience on the governing board of the statewide university system. Unopposed in the gubernatorial primary, ne does have political name recognition as the Democrat candidate for U.S. Senate who lost out to popular former U.S. Senator and one-term Governor Bob Kerrey who jumped into the fray late in the game and lost the election to Republican Deb

Ricketts, well funded and ahead in the polls, doesn't have to worry about his public exposure. His political name recognition came as the person who finished second to incumbent U.S. Senator Ben Nelson in one of the most expensive races in Nebraska history as both candidates spent millions in advertising. Ricketts also emerged from an expensive six-way Republican primary race in May for the seat he

is now seeking. That primary, labeled by many as the bloodiest in Nebraska history, will long be known for the overabundance of attack ads. Attorney General Jon Bruning, who finished second to Ricketts, blamed the Ricketts campaign for the negative

ads. Ricketts vehemently denied it. It's understandable that the Hassebrook campaign is probably steeling itself for more of that as the Nov. 4 election inches closer. Hassebrook has been walking parade routes, seeking donations – his biggest score being \$100,000 from billionaire Warren Buffett - and trying to get Ricketts to agree to more than two debates, one of which he has characterized as more of a joint appearance than a debate.

The Ricketts camp says their candidate has a full campaign calendar including what they call the third debate, an appearance at the Lincoln Chamber of Commerce and Nebraska Chamber of Commerce Senate forum at the Strategic Air and Space Museum near Ashland. Each candidate will be given five minutes to speak and then allowed to take questions from the audience for about 25 minutes.

Hassebrook spokeswoman Meg Mandy says that's NOT a debate. Ricketts spokeswoman Jessica

for four other historic buildings in Falls City, appeared before the Council on behalf of Mitch Glaeser, an investor from Florida who several years ago purchased the former Stephenson Hotel and the four historical buildings managed by Orton. Glaeser played an instrumental role in getting the new Rulo Bridge built as well as downtown Falls City's revitalized streetscapes. Glaeser came to Falls City with a vision – and that vision, frankly, doesn't include warehouses of tires on Stone Street.

Glaeser, in a letter read by Orton, urged the Council members to "enforce the rules of the City, which is not always an easy task.

"As an investor bringing economic development into a city, zoning is a key factor and there is an expectation by the investor that the City will help protect that investment through the enforcement of City codes," he said.

"I am blessed to work with Mitch, and as you know he loves this town," Orton said. "As you also know, he has always been vocal about his vision for Falls City. His commitment and vitality helped capture the hearts of our community and spurred it into action. He understands it is through the works of many that these things happen; I understand that without a person of vision and determination to lead the charge things seldom change," she said. "He continues to work hard to continue the forward momentum of Falls City."

In a telephone conversation last week, Glaeser said he appreciates Harmon's long-time commitment to Falls City and wants to find a resolution agreeable to all parties involved.

"We should celebrate the fact that Harmon's is expanding," Glaeser said, "but we need to find an appropriate location for them. I love the Harmon's — they're a wellrespected family and business and I respect them equally."

Glaeser said meeting fire code regulations at the hotel has been challenging and expensive.

"You can understand confusion — a half block away is a multi-level building full of tires that would not only cause a dangerous fire, but an environmental disaster. Their storage of tires makes the area less appealing for all the businesses on North Stone and certainly offers a higher and unnecessary risk. I have invested significant funds to improve those buildings while at the same time improve Falls City. And I have done so by following the rules. That's all I ask, just comply with the zoning rules and regulations," Glaeser said.

Melvin Harmon said he visited with Glaeser "many times on various things and that was way after the fact that he knew we had those buildings with inventory in them. He never brought it up once.

"I'm quite surprised Mitch would say that." Harmon said the tire company has

stored inventory in Falls City since 1939 and never had a problem.

"I thought Falls City was trying to bring in business, not run it off,"

Harmon said. "Four years we've had other companies and cities around – Hiawatha and Mound City – that encouraged us to move there and we sure could have. I'm 71 years old and I don't have to fight this anymore. I could retire.

"If you guys persist, we'll have to shut down or there's no way we're going to be able to run the business in Falls City. We'll just have to shut down. And you can ask – I can bring other people from businesses around and they'll tell you, it's going to be a real problem for Falls City. Because we generate millions of dollars of business around here," Harmon said

The issue will be taken up with the Planning and Zoning Committee when they meet in early September. Following its recommendation, the City Council will either vote to change the zoning ordinance, or enforce it as its written.

Also on Aug. 4, the Council voted to approve, in part, a request by Mark Meyer, of Falls City, to limit parking to one side of the street around FC Sacred Heart School. However, the parking restriction will only affect the streets directly peripheral to the school's campus.

Meyer's original request, made at the July 21 meeting, was to restrict parking to one side of the street, not only around the school, but also including 17th, 18th and 19th Streets from McLean to Valley Avenue (including the 1700 block of Dewey Avenue); Fulton and McLean streets from 17th to 20th streets (including one block of E. 20th between Fulton and McLean); Nemaha Avenue north of 19th to the dead end; and Valley Avenue from 17th to E. 21st Street. Parking on Fulton Street in this area is already limited to the west side of the street.

Sacred Heart Principal Doug Goltz said Sacred Heart was not opposed to this plan and offered another recommendation, as well.

"We would recommend that parking be allowed on Sacred Heart's side of the street for safety reasons," Goltz said. He noted that Sacred Heart families won't have to cross traffic when entering their vehicles after an event and if someone were to accidentally park on a curb or on the grass, it would be on Sacred Heart's lawn and not a neighbor's.

Meyer expressed some displeasure in the revised plan.

"I feel, as several other of my neighbors feel, that if it's just parking on one side of the street and if it butts up to Sacred Heart's property, that it will push the problem across the street, across the intersection, to the neighbor's."

Other residents in the area spoke in agreement with Meyer, including Steve Thompson, of 2007 Nemaha, and Kris Simon, of E. 19th Street, who suggested council members take more time to research the issue.

"I just have to say that I'm a little disappointed that you're going to go ahead and vote and not table it, because at the meeting last week (July 21) you said you were going to discuss and research it," Simon said. "When I asked any of you if you had discussed or research it, this is the most discussion I think that's been put out there. It's a little disheartening that you're going to go ahead with, what seems like a prenotion. I am glad that Mr. Robidoux did say that

it's open for future discussion," Simon said.

Assistant Police Chief Jamie Baker said the parking issue around Sacred Heart has been nominal for

"The only issues we've had in the past is, every once in awhile, someone will park in front of a driveway. The property owner calls us and we issue a citation and try to contact the owner of the vehicle. Usually, we don't have any problems (with parking)," Baker said. "Usually, if it's a congested area, an ambulance will go around if it's too tight."

He added that policemen are usually the first on the scene and if the area is too congested, they will dispatch the ambulance to go around the area.

After the discussion, councilwoman Judy Murphy thanked Meyer for bringing the issue to the Council.

"I think that Mark and the people that live over in that area are trying to be proactive and get ahead of what could be a problem, rather than wait until there's a problem and be reactive, which is what usually happens," Murphy said.

The council approved to make parking one-sided on the streets directly around Sacred Heart, with parking on the Sacred Heart side only (except on Fulton).

In other news:



Ken retired from the business several years ago, and sold Ken's Pharmacy. However, he came out of retirement to open Falls City Pharmacy, and later, the Radio Shack store.

Jon also noted the commitment that Ken has made as a volunteer in the community, including his unwavering support for Cobblestone.

"One of my earliest memories," Jon said, "is of my father performing in the talent show. He lived for the talent show. Members of the community will probably recall him being up on stage at Prichard Auditorium, in a white suit jacket, leading his kazoo band. He was also delighted when he worked for months to pack 2,500 toilet paper cores into prescription bags for the infamous 'derder' concert."



A Falls City man reached a plea agreement and pled guilty in Richardson County District Court last Tuesday to three felony counts. He will be sentenced at 9 a.m. Tuesday, Oct. 7.

FC man, 32, pleads NPPD responds to questions over National Weather Service messages

Brownville—Owning a nuclear power plant involves safely maintaining and operating an industrial facility for the purpose of generating electricity. But it also means protecting the public by preparing for emergencies that could, but are unlikely to, happen at the plant.

To do that, personnel from the Nebraska Public Power District and its nuclear power plant, Cooper Nuclear Station, work with a multitude of agencies - from Atchison County in Missouri and Nemaha County in Nebraska, to the Nebraska Emergency Management Agency and State of Missouri Emergency Management Agency, to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission – all in an effort to provide a collective and unified response of information.

Mid-afternoon on Sunday, Aug.3, the public's preparedness was tested by a message inadvertently issued by the National Weather Service. NWS issued the false message at 3:48 p.m., then sent a correction at 4:01 p.m. and placed a message explaining the error on its website. The counties of Atchison and Nemaha also issued corrective communications to the public via Facebook and a press re-

As part of its emergency response efforts between NPPD, the counties and the states, NWS will broadcast alert messages to the media, various agencies and the public. In Sunday's instance, NWS personnel were updating the wording programmed in the computer system, and the message was mistakenly issued.

Unfortunately, it was the second inadvertent message about emergencies for Cooper sent out in two weeks. On July 24, NPPD personnel were troubleshooting the computer system associated with a siren in Nemaha County when a false alarm was broadcast.

"Computer systems are sup-

posed to make us more efficient, accurate, and proactive in protecting the public. Unfortunately, they recently have caused confusion," said NPPD President and CEO Pat Pope. "NPPD asks the public around the plant for its patience and understanding. Work on these computer systems is being done to help - not hinder - our emergency planning and response activities."

NPPD practices its emergency response efforts by conducting drills or exercises at each of its generation facilities, including Cooper. The drills and exercises conducted at Cooper are more extensive, involve multi-state, county and local agencies and also involve practice on disseminating public informa-

Neal William Scheitel, of Aubrey, TX, died Monday, Aug. 4, 2014 at

Denton, TX. He was born Jan. 17, 1929, at Falls City, the son of Homer and Esther (Bissegger) Scheitel, of Falls

City. He spent his

childhood on the family farm with his favorite dog "Shep," attended grade school at the Sunny Hill ("Pig Hill") School, and graduated from the Falls City High School in 1946. He was active in the 4-H Club, the Evangelical Church youth group and bought his first car, a 1937 Chevy Coupe.

After graduation the family moved

to Lincoln, where he attended the Lincoln School of Commerce. He graduated from a course in Advanced Accounting, and went to work in the Accounting Department at the American Bus Lines in Lincoln. 

Bobcats picked to finish fourth again

Three-time defending Heart of America Athletic Conference champion Missouri Valley received six of 10 first place votes to claim one point more than Baker and sit atop the 2014 HAAC Preseason Coaches' Poll, released last week at the annual Media Day festivities at the NAIA national office.

The Vikings took 77 of the possible 81 voting points as the coaches' choice to win a fourth-straight championship. Baker, which claimed the remaining four first place votes, tallied 76 points after winning a share of its first conference title since 1993. The two teams, who each advanced to the 2013 NAIA Football Championship Series quarterfinal round, will meet on the final day of the regular season, Nov. 15, at Liston Stadium in Baldwin City, KS.

The final team to claim a share of last season's title was Benedictine, which was picked to finish third after garnering 65 voting points. Peru State was picked to repeat its best-ever finish in the conference after finishing in fourth place last season, while MidAmerica Nazarene was picked to finish fifth after sharing fourth with the Bobcats in 2013.

The second half of the poll was nearly identical to the finish from last season's standings. Evangel tallied 44 points to take sixth position; Central Methodist was picked to finish seventh with 29 points, while Avila (21 points), Culver-Stockton (19) and Graceland (15) finished out the poll.

Representing Peru State along with Bobcat head coach Steve Schneider at the HAAC Football Media Day were seniors Tyler Ford (Lincoln) and Shane Lloyd (Ridgecrest, CA).

After wishing all of the teams good luck for the entire season, Coach Schneider introduced Ford, an offensive lineman, and Lloyd, a linebacker – both of whom earned all-conference recognition last season. Schneider then addressed the crowd by sharing his expectations of the upcoming season on the various aspects with the football team. These four areas included: 1) expectations, 2) leadership, 3) discipline, and 4) being a physical football team.

Continuing, Schneider noted the team this fall

will have more depth on both sides of the ball. He improving his leadership ability. Being a fifth-year remarked the defense is working on not giving up as many big plays. Offensively, Schneider discussed the aspect of losing three wide receivers. He mentioned that the offense the team needs to do a better job of throwing the ball.

At that point, questions were asked from the crowd. Schneider was asked about Tyler Audsley (Prescott Valley, AZ) moving back to the defense and he responded that Audsley would be playing both ways. He also noted it was great to have Bo Shepard (Gretna) back, but Audsley will still play a role in the offense while also being a starting defensive back.

Another question asked of Schneider was about the excitement level due to the renovation of the Oak Bowl. Schneider stated that the facilities are important and shared his appreciation to the state of Nebraska as well as Dr. Hanson, president of Peru State, and Todd Simpson, Peru State Foundation Executive Director, for their support. "It should be exciting going forward, but we also have some work to do to finish the entire project" commented Schneider.

When asked about the rise in the conference over the time in the HAAC, from eighth to sixth to now fourth in the preseason polls, Schneider discussed the overall success of the Bobcat football program over the years, including a national championship in 1990. Schneider added that if the team does the things they are taught and know how to do in the right way, success will come.

Ford fielded the first question from the media which was not being able to play in the Oak Bowl last season and playing all of their home games on different fields. His response was that it was a challenge and a struggle and they got by it.

"It was a struggle to begin with, but that Coach (Schneider) kept reminding us that it didn't matter where we were playing, it was still a field and we just had to do what we knew how to do." Lloyd added that the renovations will help and that it will be a motivation playing in the Oak Bowl this fall.

Lloyd said that individually, he was working on

senior, Lloyd plans on leading by example. And yes, the guys lost were huge losses, but Lloyd anticipates that the defense will step up again this year.

Asked about the mood of the team after a successful 2013 campaign, Ford stated that the mood was somewhat bittersweet as the team had made tremendous strides, but it was disappointing to some extent as they knew they had missed opportunities to win a few more games. Also, Ford added, it did provide them with more motivation to get better in the offseason and to work hard this fall.

Schneider said the team had dropped several games down the stretch after going 7-1 as they had run out of gas. "With eight ACL surgeries, with most to back-ups who had played a lot, the rest of the team was a little beat up and we lacked additional depth. In the spring, we re-grouped and Coach Derr (strength and conditioning coach) worked with the team to help prepare the team in the off-season."

In conclusion, Schneider talked about how the team was resilient last year about playing every game technically on the road last season and they look forward to playing in the Oak Bowl this year.

All 10 HAAC teams will host games on Saturday, Sept. 13, in the 2nd Annual HAAC-KCAC Football Series with each team taking on the KCAC team that finished in the same position in the 2013 standings at the KCAC site. Head-to-head conference play begins the following Saturday, Sept. 20.

PHYSICAL EXAMINATION/IMMUNIZATIONS

PHYSICAL EXAMINATION/IMMUNIZATIONS Nebraska Law requires evidence of physical examination by a qualified physician, physician's assistant or a nurse practitioner for children entering Kindergarten, the seventh grade and for students who have resided in another state during the past year. Students are required to be immunized against measles, mumps, rubella, poliomyelitis, diphtheria, pertussis, varicella and tetanus prior to enrollment and any student not in compliance shall not be permitted to continue in school. Two (2) doses of MMR (measles, mumps, rubella) are required for all K-12 students. Hepatitis B is also required for students entering school for the first time and all transfer students from outside the State of Nebraska. All 7th grade students are required to have had one dose of Tdap (must contain pertussis booster) after 10 or 11 years of age. Exemptions shall be granted for: 1) medical exceptions for health reasons substantiated by a signed statement from a physician, physician's assistant or nurse practitioner; or 2) religious conflict substantiated by a signed affidavit from the student or the student's legal guardian, if the student is a minor. Students may be provisionally enrolled in a Nebraska school if they have begun the required immunizations and continue to receive the necessary immunizations as rapidly as is medically feasible. The law will apply to all students enrolled in Nebraska schools. All students participating in athletics must have a current physical on file.

ASBESTOS NOTIFICATION

Asbestos is an issue we have been dealing with for many years. The Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act of 1986 was enacted by Congress to determine the extent of and develop solutions for any problems schools may have with asbestos.

To give you some background, asbestos has been used as a building material for many years. It is a naturally occurring mineral that is mined primarily in Canada, South Africa, and the USSR. Asbestos properties made it an ideal building material for insulation, sound absorption, decorative plasters, fireproofing and a variety of miscellaneous uses. There have been over 36,000 different products made using asbestos materials. EPA began action to limit uses of asbestos products in 1973 and most uses of asbestos products as building materials were banned in 1978.

We have had our facilities inspected by a certified asbestos inspector, as required by AHERA. The inspector located, sampled and rated the condition and hazard potential of all material in our facilities suspected of containing asbestos. The inspection and lab analysis records were turned over to a professional certified firm to develop asbestos management plans.

over to a professional certified firm to develop asbestos management plans.

An asbestos management plan was developed for our facilities which includes: this notification letter, education and training of our employees, a set of plans and procedures designed to minimize the disturbance of the asbestos containing materials and plans for regular surveillance

of the ACM.

FCPS, complying to this plan, removed all of the friable asbestos from its buildings. Some

floor tile containing abestos still remain.

A copy of the asbestos management plan is available for your inspection in our administrative offices during regular office hours. Mike Kafer is our asbestos program coordinator and all inquiries regarding the plan should be directed to him.

We have implemented the asbestos management plan. We are intent on not only complying with, but exceeding federal, state, and local regulations in this area. We plan on taking whatever steps are necessary to insure your children and our employees have a healthy, safe environment in which to learn and work.

MISSING CHILDREN IDENTIFICATION ACT

The law requires all new enrolling students to provide; 1) a certified birth certificate, or 2) other reliable proof of the student's identity and age accompained by an affidavit explaining the inability to produce a birth certificate.

Nell Wanderwell in Omaha

When Nell Wanderwell and her party rolled into Omaha in the "Honeymoon Express" in August 1926, the Wanderwell name was already widely known. Nell's former husband, the colorful "Captain" Walter Wanderwell (actually a Polish national named Valerian Johannes Piecynski), had organized an around-the-world expedition in 1919 to promote world peace and the League of Nations.

He and Nell led competing teams to see which team could log the most miles. By 1926 the two had divorced and Walter Wanderwell had remarried, but the race continued.

The Sunday World-Herald on August 8, 1926, reported that Nell was "head of a party on the last lap of a round-the world tour, which has been in progress for the last seven years." She told the World-Herald that she did not contract the wandering spirit "until after her marriage to Captain Wanderwell, with whom she started on the world tour in 1919. Since, she has obtained a divorce, but the spirit remained the same, and each continued on the trip as an endurance

"In 1921 they separated in Detroit. Mrs. Wanderwell has yet to make India and Africa on her world tour, while he has already visited those countries. She says mileage, however, proves she has distanced her former husband by 150 thousand miles.

"Only once have their paths crossed when they visited in Paris during Christmas of 1922 for a brief time, and then again they resumed their travels, each making his way by lectures, travelogues, and the sale of pictures and stories of their travels to news bureaus and syndicates."

Nell Wanderwell told the World-Herald that she was enroute to Mexico and expected to complete her tour in another two years. "In the seven years of travel, Mrs. Wanderwell's car has covered a distance of 214,715 miles, or an average of 137 miles a day.

It is covered with emblems of every country through which they have toured," as well as autographs of such celebrities as Warren G. Harding, Douglas Fairbanks, Gen. John J. Pershing, and William Jennings Bryan. While in Omaha Nell

planned to add the autograph of Mayor Jim Dahlman.

"The car has been christened by the owner as 'Honeymoon Express.' It was in this car that she started her own, and while she has been touring three girls who have been her companions were married, and two men, dropping their nomadic life for life in the cities."

The Wanderwell name continued to drew international media attention well past the 1920s. In December 1932, Walter was shot and killed by an unknown assailant aboard his yacht in Long Beach, California. The murder remains unsolved.





the most important part of the equation.

"Farmers are buying a dealership more than they are a brand and this trend will become even more prominent as time goes on," Merz, said. "No matter what the dealership has for physical inventory, it's that customer's past relationship and brand image that matter most.

His goal with the store modernization is to be "functional and nice, but not be over the top," he said. "The building is simply bricks and mortar, but what the building represents is more important; commitment to the customer," he said.

Everything about Merz Farm Equipment's latest expansion is first-class and customer-driven - as it's historically been. The company has been boldly marching forward since day one.

In 1952, 12-year-old Dennis Merz watched out the window as his father, Nelson, firmly grasped the hand of local Ferguson tractor dealer Harold Strauss, thus

completing one business transaction to set in motion thousands of others. Mere months after that handshake, Nelson and Dennis were driving eight brand new Ferguson 30 tractors from boxcars on Falls City's south side, all the way north, to Merz Farm Equipment.

The business flourished almost immediately and through the decades staved off the customary family-business killer - the sinister status quo. Nelson expanded the original building - located along Old Hwy. 73 - three different times the first 20 years before moving into a 10,000 square foot building at the current location in 1975. By then, sons Dennis (1963) and Gale (1966) were on board and a third, Bruce, joined upon his high school graduation in 1976.

In the early-1980s, the farm sector experienced its worst financial crisis since the Great Depression — farmland value dropped by nearly 60 percent in some parts of the Midwest between 1981 and 1985 — yet Merz Farm Equipment endured, even adding a second location in Forest City, MO in October 1987 (the family closed it in the early 2000s, but currently lease the building).

The farm economy rebounded - and the company thrived in the 1990s. In 1993, Bruce Merz traveled to Germany on a select trip with 16 other dealers to tour the Claas facilities while they were working with Massey Ferguson on the combine market. Two years later, Merz Farm Equipment was the highest volume Massey Ferguson dealer in the North Plains Region.

Nelson died of cancer in early 1996, and Dennis retired just shy of the company's 50th anniversary. Gale retired in 2010 after managing the parts department for more than 45 years. That spurred Mitch's return home to help his dad Bruce continue what Nelson Merz started with a handshake in 1952. The family history is not lost on Mitch.

"Nelson was an innovator in his dealership," Mitch said. "One building at a time and one dream driving him forward he managed to bring together family, friends, and a loyal farming community with his vision. He worked with his customers, made his customers feel like a part of the family, made many, many friends all while setting up a business that continued to flourish for decades with the focus on customer service," he said.

"I have watched and learned — I learn from my dad every day," he said. "I want to do exactly what they have done before me. I am just the next generation of the Merz family. I appreciate everything my grandfather, father and uncles have worked their entire lives creating and feel privileged that I have the opportunity to continue in their footsteps," Mitch said.

"Dad was all about letting me do this project because I'm the one who's going to be here for 40 years," he said Monday, sitting in his new office, naturally and brightly lit by picture windows that comprise most of the entire east wall. The windows present a brilliant view of the company's future - the latest Massey Ferguson tractors, combines and balers.

With that, Mitch Merz offers a firm handshake and gets to work.


