Irish looking to get back on top

The Falls City Sacred Heart Irish football team finished the 2015 campaign with a 9-2 record; great by most standards but not quite good enough for Coach Doug Goltz and the Irish.

As Coach Goltz enters his 30th season at the helm, the Irish have compiled 276 wins against 48 losses including seven State Titles. The Irish have made making the playoffs a habit with 32 appearances which is third best all time in the state.

When asked about what has changed in his 30 years Coach Goltz replied with a smile, "I probably yell less than I did when you played."

Sacred Heart opens the season this Friday, August 26, at home against Nebraska City Lourdes Central Catholic. The Knights began last season, ripping off seven straight wins before losing their final two games of the season. The Irish will be without Bryant Jorn

who suffered an ankle injury and will be out of action for 3-4 weeks.


The Irish will return five starters on offense, and six starters on the defensive side of the ball. 6-5', 290 lb . Senior Bryant Jorn, along with 6-2', 240 lb. Junior, Theo Rhorer will help anchor both the offensive and defensive line for the Irish.

On offense, look for FB Austin Ahern, RB Christian Harring and RB Sean Arnold to get the majority of the touches.

The Irish, looking to get back to the State Championship game for the first time since 2013, will need to avoid the injury bug and hope for a little extra "luck of the Irish."

NE's Main Street Communities receive National Accreditation



Enter your destination in the vehicle's computer and then concern yourself with other priorities, like taking in the passing landscape, as if you were the passenger? Not this old man. Talk about a nervous wreck (excuse that term), but I'd certainly be one. I'll take my chances behind the wheel in control of my car. On the rare occasions when I've flown on an airline, I presume the pilot and co-pilot set the auto pilot. But I expect them to have their eyes on the skies and the instruments. That may not always be the case, but at least I don't have to watch what's going on in the cockpit.

By the time this technology is, maybe, perfected, I'll be either too old to drive or still driving a car that doesn't have it. Fine with me.

I don't have anything against our Olympic athletes. Well, maybe one or two. But I do have a problem with the International Olympic Committee. Prior to the opening of the Games in Rio, Bryant Gumble's Real Sports show on HBO was devoted to the upcoming Olympics in Rio. Several correspondents reported and the information they found was disgusting.

Most of you are aware of the raw sewage tinkling its way through Rio slums into the harbors where events were scheduled. And there was the Zika virus threat. That's not the half of it.

Brazil is not a wealthy country. The country, in the midst of political turmoil, was awarded the 2016 Summer Games because of their bid and promises that could not be kept. Still, this relatively poor nation was expected to build hugely expensive venues and housing complexes for the thousands of athletes. And who suffered? The people of Brazil. To the tune of billions of dollars, not to mention from displacement from their homes, better described as shanties.

The I.O.C. dictates, very explicitly, what is expected/required. My opinion is that this committee is made up of autocrats who could not care less about the hardships that befall host countries. In Russia, which hosted the previous Winter Games and had to manufacture tons and tons of snow, people were ousted from their homes and forced to withstand hardships. Who cared? In Russia, and other recent site hosts, the new construction required for the Games largely stands vacant. That will likely happen in Rio, too.

I was so infuriated by the reports that I didn't watch one second of Olympic coverage. I hope no American city bids on future Games. This craziness has to stop.

I'm guessing that a lot of voters will leave the Presidential ballot blank in November. We have two flawed candidates. Not sure I could vote for either one of them, but I probably will make a choice for the least objectionable.

I'm getting slower with advancing years. This fact has recently manifested itself in a battle with a house fly. This little insect has made my house his/her home and constantly buzzes me while I'm reading the morning paper. Attempts to swat it out of my misery have failed. The little critter is quick, certainly quicker than I am. I've begun to wonder what the lifespan of a fly might be. Unless I increase my swatting prowess, I'll have to outlast him.

Throwing stones at a stubborn man

State Senator Bill Kintner of Papillion is hard to like. He's certainly not the kind of person who walks into a room and brightens it up. He's a bit pushy and loud. He's not afraid to push his agenda.

He's also stubborn. An investigation a year ago revealed his involvement in a cybersex incident while he was out of the state on non-legislative business. He used a state computer. The governor asked him to resign. He refused. An investigation by

the State Accountability and Disclosure Commission resulted in a \$1,000 fine and another request from the governor that he resign. He didn't.

In fact, he's been defiant about it. He won't apologize for it. He said he will apologize only to his wife and to God for engaging in cybersex with a woman last summer. He said he is sorry he sinned against God and sorry that he sinned against his wife. He told the Lincoln Journal Star that he hasn't apologized to his constituents or fellow senators. One gets the idea that said apologies won't be coming anytime soon.

During legislative debate, Kintner likes to point out that he was raised to learn the "moral absolutes of Christianity." During this current struggle he questions why senators would be talking about impeaching or expelling him. He said a number of them have shown a lack of standards themselves. He asks what standard he has violated to embarrass the institution of the Legislature.

Take a deep breath senator. Unauthorized use of a government issued device is against state policy. Lieutenant Governor Rick Sheehy resigned after it was discovered that he used a state-issued cell phone to make hundreds of calls to women who were not his wife. Yes, Sheehy did the honorable thing and stepped down and gave up a promising political career.

At least one veteran observer has noted that if it was another senator involved in a cybersex scandal that Kintner would be leading a handful of his cronies in gathering firewood for the burning at the stake.

Kintner told the Lincoln paper that other senators have acted in ways that "apparently did not violate legislative standards: drinking and driving, adultery and affairs, fornication between senators and staff, habitual drunkenness and inflammatory rhetoric that could incite violence against police officers."

Excuse me senator. The charge against you has been proven and you have been fined. Where is the proof to back up your complaints about drinking and adultery and fornication? Isn't there something in those "moral absolutes" that prohibits you from making such judgment?

When the Scribes and Pharisees brought the sinful woman to him to be stoned, Jesus said to them (in John 8:7) "He that is without sin among you, let him cast a first stone at her."

So now the Legislature is throwing stones at a stubborn man. The gov-

ernor has washed his hands of the matter, saying it's the Legislature's business. Lawmakers are mulling a special session to deal with the matter while one of their colleagues, Senator Ernie Chambers, has indicated he'll seek impeachment or expulsion proceedings. Chambers once sued God, how hard could it be to do something about Kintner? Besides, Kintner now says that it's part of God's plan for him to be an effective advocate in the Legislature. Suppose it's also part of God's plan that Chambers be an effective advocate for his constituents?

Kintner says that Chambers does not occupy the moral high ground in the Legislature. "Not on this issue or any other moral issue." Oh put down your sack of stones

senator. In his more

than 40 years in the nation's only Unicameral, Chambers' most egregious errors seem to have something to do with a heavy foot on the gas pedal.

Oh, and those moral absolutes. Ernie knows and can quote and explain more passages of Scripture than anyone else in the place.

People who don't like Ernie managed to get this bad idea called term limits passed. Ernie was gone for four years and the people saw it and said it was good. But, he's back.

So what can the people do about the stubborn man who refuses to resign?

Safety committee issues surface at Board meeting

Some issues surfaced when the County Commissioners and department heads met as a Safety Committee Tuesday, Aug. 16, at the Courthouse.

Commissioners Dave Sickel and Jim Davidson were in attendance for the entire meeting. Commissioner Jim Standerford attended a portion of

Sheriff Don Pounds said he had learned that the north entrance to the Courthouse incorporates heated sidewalks and he recommended that the sensors be moved to be more accurate in helping with the thaw of ice and snow on the walkway during winter months.

EMA Director Brian Kirkendall said his office is having problems with the public loitering in his office area. After some discussion, it was suggested that a barrier be put in place to deter unauthorized personnel from entering the staff office.

Highway Supt. Scott Huppert said he is working on plans for Courthouse sidewalk repairs. He also presented a quote for repairing the north Courthouse sidewalk and stairs. More information was requested by the Commissioners. That was to be reviewed at today's meeting.

Also participating in the Safety Committee meeting were Tammie Beckner, Courthouse maintenance, and Steve Darveau Jr., from the Road Department.

Earlier, Kirkendall met with the board as president of the SE Nebraska Gun Club. He presented information regarding preliminary plans to construct a "trap range" at the FC Jaycees' Field, south of Falls City. No funding was sought, as the topic was informational.

Board members reviewed 2016-2017 budget requests from Kirkendall, County Attorney Doug Merz, County Clerk Mary Eickhoff, County Treasurer Austin Duerfeldt, and County Assessor Pam Vice. During Mrs. Vice's session the board approved a contract for professional appraisal services for mineral properties with Prichard & Abbott, Inc., of Forth Worth, TX, for the years 2017 and 2018 at a cost of \$1,800 per year.

Board members met with County Treasurer Austin Duerfeldt, who presented an issue regarding the distribution of motor vehicle tax to the Village of Preston. Board members directed Duerfeldt to to make the proper entries to correct the current fiscal year motor vehicle tax distributions, since July 1, 2016, and to distribute them to the Village of Preston. The board members requested that the Preston Village Board of Trustees meet with them to discuss further corrections to the distribution.

The board adopted a resolution to transfer funds from the Inheritance Tax Fund to the General Fund and approved all claims that were submitted.

In 1918, T.H. Korthanke moved with his wife to the 200 block of Miami Street in Hiawatha. On the corner of their new lot stood a towering maple, admired by all in the neighborhood. Inspired by the townsfolk's appreciation of this tree, which blazed with color each fall, Korthanke took it upon himself to plant seeds which grew into saplings, free for the taking to all who would plant and care for them. It was because of this that Hiawatha eventually earned the moniker "the City of Beautiful Maples.'

It seems fitting, then, that Nick Haedt (pronounced "hate"), and his wife Jordan, both products of small town middle America, chose to settle here in Hiawatha.

In May of this year, Haedt was offered and accepted the position of arborist for Grimm's Gardens, specializing in all things tree-related.

As the most recent addition to the Grimm's staff, Haedt tends to the retail garden center's trees from seed to sapling to maturity, as well as diagnosing pathogens, assessing potential risk of damage to homes and property, and completing whatever work is necessary to mitigate the risk of tree damage and disease for businesses and home owners across Northeast Kansas and southern Nebraska.

Haedt, originally from Wathena, met his wife Jordan while attending college in Iowa to earn his degree in biology. The two later moved to

Kansas City, where his wife completed her studies in dentistry. During that time, Haedt began work with Ryan Lawn and Tree, the company to which he attributes much of his knowledge and experience as

After completing his certification with the Midwest chapter of the International Society of Arboriculture (ISA), Haedt and his wife relocated to Hiawatha where Jordan began work as a dentist with Dr. Ronald Wright.

"We always knew we wanted to come back to this part of the state. We love the town," explained Hae-

While it can be dangerous work - Haedt explains he took a near 40 foot tumble to the ground but was narrowly saved when his leg caught in the crook of the tree he was in it is work he loves.

"I have always loved science, especially biology. It was the only thing that interested me. I love nature and being outdoors."

Now in his fifth year as an arborist, Haedt looks forward to expanding Grimm's arbor business throughout the region. In addition to diagnosing tree pathogens and assessing risk - both consultation services he provides at no cost -Haedt treats tree diseases, removes trees and limbs, completes pruning, and installs cables and bracing among other jobs.

Bletcher starts the Tiger softball season off with a grand slam

School just started last Wednesday, but the Falls City Tigers' softball team has already played four games. The first was Thursday against Nebraska City at Hartman Field in Falls City.

The Tigers lost to Nebraska City five to four, in a very tough but well-played game. Falls City led three to one after three innings, but gave up four runs in the top of the sixth on two Nebraska City singles, two doubles and a Falls City overthrow error. When the Tigers came up to bat then, Erin Brewer pounded a single to left center, and Megan Eickhoff walked, setting up the possibility for a score. Sophomore Regan Deckinger then hammered out a fly ball to deep left field, inking a double for herself and sending Brewer across the plate. A pop fly to second base ended the inning.

In the seventh inning, The Tigers sent the Pioneers back to the field one-two-three, but Nebraska City sat the Tigers down one-two-three as well, ending the game for a Falls City loss. Senior pitcher Tayten O'Brien, who made a miraculous come-back after suffering a torn ACL last April, pitched the game for Falls City. On Saturday, the Tigers played in a one-day tournament at Doris Bair Field in Lincoln. The team started the day with an exclamation point against Wahoo. The Tigers kept Wahoo scoreless in the first inning while scoring five for themselves. Senior Molly Brown knocked in a run on a left field double, then sophomore Erin Brewer pounded a homer with two on base, sending the score to five-zero.

The Tigers scored another four in the fourth inning on singles by Meredith Poppe, Molly Brown, Rylee Scholl, and Bailey Armbruster, and a double by Morgan Bletscher. Rylee Scholl hit a double in the fifth inning, allowing Meredith Poppe to score, and sealing Falls City's deal.

The defense gave up just three runs, in the top of the fifth inning. Senior Tayten O'Brien went the distance on the mound, striking out five in the first four innings, and leading the Tigers to a 10 to 3 win.

The second game of the day proved to be Falls City's most challenging of the weekend. Raymond Central came to play, and upset the Tigers 12 to 3 in four innings. In that game, senior Morgan Bletscher led the Tigers offensively with a double in the second inning, and a home run in the fourth. On defense, junior Meredith Poppe pitched the first two-and-a-half innings, and senior Bailey Armbruster pitched the final one-and-a-half. In the Tigers' final game of the tourney, Falls City led two to nothing from the top of the first inning through the bottom of the fourth. In the first inning, Meredith Poppe hit a single, then Molly Brown hammered out a triple to bring her in. Bailey Armbruster grounded out to second, but brought Molly home. Both teams remained scoreless then until the fifth inning when Meredith Poppe hit a double, and was knocked in on a sacrifice by Molly Brown, and a single by Rylee Scholl.

Crete scored single runs in the fifth, sixth, and seventh innings, tying the score and forcing extra innings. Playing Californian rules (by starting with a runner on second base), Falls City scored five runs in the top of the eighth inning when freshman Hannah Clary, Regan Deckinger, Meredith Poppe, and Bailey Armbruster hit singles, then Morgan Bletscher put the icing on the cake with a grand slam.

The players, coaches, and spectators figured the game was over, but Crete had other things in mind. In the bottom of the ninth inning, the team hit four runs in, and the score was suddenly eight to seven.

Fortunately, the next three batters hit fly balls to left field and second base, and all three flies were caught, ending the game at eight to seven, in Falls City's favor.

Tayten O'Brien took on pitching honors for the game, striking out six. At the end of the game, coach Joe Dunn said, "The girls battled all weekend long. We did some good things, but still have some areas to work on. Some girls came through in some clutch situations, too, though. It's good to get back to .500, and we'll keep going from here."

Falls City Tigers optimistic about this season

Coach Darin Fritz and the Falls City Tigers begin their season on Friday, Aug. 26, and look to improve upon their 7-3 record of 2015. The Tigers will begin the season on the road against the Southern Raiders, a team that finished last season with five wins against four losses.

The Tigers will be tested early this season as they play host to Ashland-Greenwood the second game of the season. Ashland-Greenwood, who beat the Tigers 41-14 last season, is rated fifth in the preseason poll by the *Omaha World Herald*. Fairbuy and Auburn could also prove to be tough opponents on the schedule

this season.


Ambitious tailgaters can now make their dips ahead of time, without worrying that the look and flavor of their creations will fade over time.





SENCA Head Start Program Annual Report to the Public

Head Start is an early childhood development program that provides comprehensive services to children age three to five and their families. Families served are primarily at the 100% poverty level or below. SENCA Head Start can serve up to 10% of children above the poverty guideline.

The Head Start program is federally funded and receives federal dollars via the Department of Health and Human Services, Administration for Children and Families, and Office of Head Start. The federal government requires Head Start programs to obtain a 25% non-federal match on every federal dollar expended within their program. The in-kind match is meant to have communities show support and have a stake in the Head Start program. Without the tremendous support of the volunteers, the program would not be possible.

Southeast Nebraska Community Action Partnership, (SENCA) is a grantee for the Head Start program that currently serves the southeast Nebraska counties of Nemaha, Otoe, Pawnee, and Richardson. SENCA has been the grantee agency for the Head Start program since 1967. SENCA Head Start is funded to serve 151 children with 31 slots in Nemaha County, 53 closts in Otoe County, 18 slots Pawnee County, and 49 slots in Richardson County. The SENCA Head Start Centers are located in Auburn, Nebraska City, Table Rock, and Falls City. Collaboration sites include the Parent Child Center at North School in Falls City, HTRS Early Education Center located at HTRS Schools in Humboldt, and Bulldog Beginnings at Auburn Schools in Auburn. With a fleet of seven buses, one being handicap accessible, every effort is made to provide transportation to all children who attend school at the SENCA Head Start sites. SEN-CA Head Start operates Monday through Friday with services being held Monday through Thursday in the part-day/part-year programs and Monday through Friday at the full-day/full-year location.

In the classroom SENCA Head Start utilizes the Creative Curriculum 5th edition for Preschool. SENCA also implements the Positive Behavior Instructional Support, a systematic approach to preventing or reducing challenging behaviors and, eventually, enhancing the quality of life for individuals and support providers.

All activities in the classroom are based on learning through play, allowing for the educational opportunity to be given to every child. The program starts by teaching children school readiness and self-sufficiency skills of: listening, following directions, letters, names, numbers, cutting, sharing, snapping, zipping, pouring, setting the tables, as well as cleaning up. Individualation is done with every child, making it a fun and safe atmosphere on a daily basis. The goal is to have every child ready for kindergarten when

the time arrives.

Good health and wellness are essential components of the SENCA Head Start program. They consist of physical health, dental health, social and emotional health and nutrition. The objective of the health component is to ensure all child health and development concerns are identified and children and families are linked to ongoing sources of continuous, accessible care to meet their basic health needs. A registered dietician reviews nutritional information for each child allowing the dietician to make suggestions for families on how to improve or maintain their child's nutritional needs for growth and development.

Angela K. Antholz, SENCA Head Start and Deputy Director, along with a team of Coordinators, Teachers and support staff, are currently preparing for the 2016-2017 school year.

Sumner and the Stamps Quartet at the age of 14. He also played for the Blackwood Brothers, Gordon Jensen and Sunrise, and Andrus/Blackwood & Company and toured with Voice, the opening act for the Elvis Presley show. He has traveled in solo ministry and has worked in youth and pastoral ministry. Billy has four daughters and one son. He and his wife, Cherry live in Hendersonville, TN

Wayne Little is one of the best tenors to ever sing a gospel song. Wayne formed the Crystal River Boys Quartet and later sang with former Blackwood Brothers bass singer. Ken Turner in the New Millennium Quartet. He was a featured singer at the Pentagon for a 9/11 Memorial service with Rev. Franklin Graham. His powerful, clear tenor voice thrills audiences from coast to coast. Wayne and his wife, Gina, live in Elizabethton, TN, and have two sons.

Mike Helwig sings lead in the quartet. He started singing Gospel music at the age of 19. A Canadian native, he sang for Canadian groups The Torchmen and Unashamed. He won a Dove Award for Favorite Tenor from the Canadian division of the Gospel Music Association in 1997. Since moving to the United States he has sung with the Wilburns, the Stamps Quartet, the Dixie Echoes and Promise before joining the Blackwood Brothers. 

IRS warns of back-to-school scams; encourages students, parents, schools and teachers to stay alert

The Internal Revenue Service today warned taxpayers against telephone scammers targeting students and parents during the back-toschool season and demanding payments for non-existent taxes, such as the "Federal Student Tax."

People should be on the lookout for IRS impersonators calling students and demanding that they wire money immediately to pay a fake "federal student tax." If the person does not comply, the scammer becomes aggressive and threatens to report the student to the police to be arrested. As schools around the nation prepare to re-open, it is important for taxpayers to be particularly aware of this scheme going after students and parents.

"Although variations of the IRS impersonation scam continue yearround, they tend to peak when scammers find prime opportunities to strike", said IRS Commissioner John Koskinen. "As students and parents enter the new school year, they should remain alert to bogus calls, including those demanding fake tax payments from students."

The IRS encourages college and school communities to share this information so that students, parents

Scammers are constantly identifying new tactics to carry out their crimes in new and unsuspecting ways. This year, the IRS has seen scammers use a variety of schemes to fool taxpayers into paying money or giving up personal information. Some of these include:

Altering the caller ID on incoming phone calls in a "spoofing" attempt to make it seem like the IRS, the local police or another agency is calling.

Imitating software providers to tax professionals--IR-2016-

Demanding fake tax payments using iTunes gift cards--IR-2016-99.

Soliciting W-2 information from payroll and human resources professionals--IR-2016-34

"Verifying" tax return information over the phone--IR-2016-40

Pretending to be from the tax preparation industry--IR-2016-28.

If you receive an unexpected call from someone claiming to be from the IRS, here are some of the telltale signs to help protect yourself.

The IRS Will Never: Call to demand immediate payment using a specific payment method such as a prepaid debit card, gift card or wire

Threaten to immediately bring in local police or other law-enforcement groups to have you arrested for not paying.

Demand that you pay taxes without giving you the opportunity to question or appeal the amount they say you owe.

Ask for credit or debit card numbers over the phone.

If you get a suspicious phone call from someone claiming to be from the IRS and asking for money, here's what you should do:

Do not give out any information. Hang up immediately.

Search the web for telephone numbers scammers leave in your voicemail asking you to call back. Some of the phone numbers may be published online and linked to criminal activity.

Contact TIGTA to report the call. Use their "IRS Impersonation Scam Reporting" web page or call 800-366-4484.

Report it to the Federal Trade Commission. Use the "FTC Complaint Assistant" on FTC.gov. Please add "IRS Telephone Scam" in the
