Two arrests made in alleged home invasion

A weekend of heavy precipitation adequately improved conditions to allow Simpson and the Fire Department to discontinue the ban.

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

It rained on Falls City's parade.

After a drought-ravaged summer, a couple of months' worth of rainfall fell during one weekend — the weekend reserved for the annual Cobblestone Festival, washing out Saturday morning's parade and generally curtailing many of the activities that had been planned. A weekend that usually attracts thousands of locals and visitors to Falls City, was waterlogged this year, and many opted to sit it out with a roof over their heads.

It's not that the rain wasn't welcome and needed. It's just that the timing was bad.

How much rain fell? Rain gauge measurements in Falls City varied. The Journal's rainfall recorder in the middle part of town emptied 6.20 inches from her gauge from Friday night, Saturday and Sunday. Other reports ranged from 4.50 to 8 inches or more. Rivers of water rushed down the streets, especially on Saturday, Cobblestone's normally big day.

Some events were spared, including the Thursday evening Firemen's Fishing Contest at Stanton Lake and the Hot Dog Eating Contest Friday night. The frogs didn't mind the downpour Saturday morning, but their handlers did. Sam's Amusements owner Jodi Montgomery Sunday told Journal editor Jason Schock that sales were cut in half.

Actually, a small dry window opened late Saturday morning and early afternoon. But not in time to avoid the parade's cancellation. Lori Gottula, who has served as parade chairperson and organizer for 16 years, said the possibility of delaying the start of the parade might have been considered, "if my crystal ball hadn't been floating in water" at 10 a.m. "Nobody wanted that parade to go off more than I did."

She explained that it takes at least an hour to line up entries for the 11 a.m. parade. That means a decision has to be made by 10 a.m. Lori had arrived at the line-up area by 8 Saturday morning and was soaked as "the heavens had opened and it was a downpour, and the radar showed no

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Council votes for CGB facility site annexation

Approximately 60 citizens, many of them opposed to the possibility of the location of a Consolidated Grain and Barge (CGB) facility in southwest Falls City, attended the Monday evening, Aug. 20, City Council meeting. This was the largest attendance at a council meeting in recent memory.

CGB is interested in building a multi-million dollar looped track grain shipment facility near the BNSF Railroad tracks. The announcement of CGB's intent has triggered some controversy, with economic ramifications at the forefront.

Mayor Tim Hersh, in his opening comments, asked that the CGB topic be debated in a respectful manner. Because of the large crowd, Hersh said each speaker would be limited in the time allotted.

Before the discussion began, Mayor Hersh delivered the oath of office to new 2nd Ward Council member Judy Murphy, who will serve the remaining term of Ryan Rieschick, who has moved away from Falls City. Mrs. Murphy previously served a term on the coun-


Opponents of the CGB project contend that it will result in lost jobs for employees of the existing elevators in Richardson County, as well as for truckers and other businesses. Proponents, including EDGE representatives, point to capital investment, infrastructure improvements, an increased tax base, job creation and better prices for area grain producers.

Stacey Bailey, representing the Straussville Elevator, described the CGB project as "a big, big elevator" that will be able to pay more for grain, thus the potential to "put Straussville and Salem Grain out of business, or close to it." She said numerous jobs will be put at risk, including the employees at the elevators and truckers who haul grain. Families, "our friends and neighbors," will be forced to relocate, she said. Bailey said that CGB could offer other services that would impact businesses other than elevators and trucking.

Bailey described the situation as "dire," describing CGB as a "Japanese company" that will add to foreign control over U.S. grain

There was a time when Kurt Mueller didn't even like to run. In high school up in Scribner, he recalls thinking his best friend was crazy for running both the one- and two-mile races at track meets. Kurt preferred the more laid-back pace of the track team manager.

He's a changed man. That was more than four decades ago and, in adulthood, Kurt Mueller left the sideline behind and ratcheted up the pace to a degree few can comprehend, let alone attempt to keep step with. It started with a New Year's resolution in 1982. The now 60-year-old former schoolteacher laced

Don't think for a minute that economic development hasn't benefited from Fiber To The Home, or that it won't continue to. Thanks to SNC, we are state of the art and companies looking for locations know it.

Approximately 60 citizens attended last Monday night's City Council meeting. Almost all of them had some sort of opinion about CGB, the international company that hopes to build a grain handling operation in south Falls City. A lot of the folks who attended oppose the project, believing that long-time area residents will lose their sources of employment and thus be forced to look elsewhere for jobs and homes.

It doesn't matter what I think. In fact, I'm not sure what I think. What I do know is that EDGE, Falls City and Richardson County's economic development entity, has done lots of good and difficult work in attracting new business and industry to Southeast Nebraska. EDGE is genuine in working toward the betterment of the community and the area.

One of the speakers at the Aug. 20 Council meeting said she had written and submitted a "Sez I" to the Journal and that we would not publish it. That's not accurate. She did submit the letter and I typed it. But we intended it to be published Aug. 21, along with a large ad we knew was coming. That was the day after the Council meeting. My thinking was that both sides of the question could be aired in that one paper (and then in today's newspaper).

Very possibly, my thinking was flawed. But to say at the meeting that we would not run the letter is in error. We did not run the "Sez I" when the Journal reader wanted us to. We never refused to publish the letter. It was ready to go on Aug. 21. She requested that it not run when it was not in the paper she wanted it to be in (Aug. 14). We did publish another letter in opposition to the CGB project on Aug. 21, and a paid advertisement in support of the project.

The Journal does not have a horse in this race. We have always supported legitimate economic development in hopes that all of us would be better off for it. No one wants to do harm to existing businesses and the people who work for them. We're talking about grain elevators, their employees and truckers.

In the past months, I have not attended Council meetings. Instead, I've received the recording of the meetings and transcribed notes from the convenience of my DVD player/TV at home. I can pause, go back and replay in an attempt to be as accurate as possible. I'm not as quick with the notes as I used to be, and my audio senses aren't nearly as sharp as they used to be (too much loud music through the earphones?). In watching and listening to the recording of the meeting, I noticed that not a lot of farmers expressed an opinion. Interesting in that those are the men and women who depend on growing corn and soybeans. It's their livelihood.

Last week, I asked for input on your favorite Husker names. So far, I've received a handful of responses, but not as many as I'd hoped. We'll go with what we've got next week, but I'd sure like to hear from more of you. By the way, two names are leading the balloting.

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Lincoln could jail people for watering

Lincoln's Public Safety Director says a brown lawn in the Capital City is a "badge of good citizenship."

pods, no crop.

One can walk across the mighty Platte River at places like Fremont and Columbus and Grand Island without hardly getting their feet wet.

A farmer north of Kearney has already cut his corn crop, leaving only two rows of wilted stalks, some without even a mini ear on them, in the middle of the field awaiting an adjuster's inspection.

These are the sights in the midst of one of the state's most gripping droughts since the "Dirty Thirties." The aftermath of a mild winter that left little snow in the Rockies to melt and fill the North and South Platte tributaries to the Platte River, the statewide lifeline that some years has been teeming at the

Mandatory water restrictions went into force in the Capital City Aug. 9, for the first time in a decade. The rules are simple. No lawn watering on Mondays. Odd-number addresses water Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. Evens get to water on Wednesday, Friday and Sunday. Police initially issued 470 warnings for violations.

On Aug. 19, Public Safety Director Tom Casady invited the media to his brown front lawn to announce that police would begin issuing tickets the next day. On Monday, an official "no water" day, one of the first tickets - complete with a fine of up to \$500 and/or as much as six months in jail – was issued to a popular Lincoln chain restaurant. Manager Jason Runge called the ticket "unfortunate and unexpected" because the Carlos O'Kelly's in north Lincoln had received no warning. He said the automatic sprinklers have since been reprogrammed.

What? Jail time? Imagine the conversation: "Yeh, I'm in here for waterin' my lawn." City Attorney Rod Confer says he's working with the county court on an option that would let people pay a set fine instead. Lincoln joined 19 other Nebraska communities under water restrictions, but is the only one to impose fines and/or jail time.

With a goal of reducing water consumption to no more than 60 million gallons a day, some are pointing fingers claiming more compliance is needed. Critics have said the University of Nebraska-Lincoln has stopped only 15 percent of its irrigation. A University spokeswoman says the University did empty its iconic Broyhill Fountain by the Student Union. Lincoln Public Schools says it is cutting back on watering athletic fields. The governor said lawns at the mansion and other state buildings would be watered only twice a week.

Lincoln's well fields near Ashland depend on the Platte River for replenishment, but with historic low levels, the river is not recharging the aquifer, said city water engineer Jerry Obrist. The aquifer level is half gone and "we've got the fall and winter ahead," he said.

UNMC study: Medicaid expansion would bring in \$2.9 billion from feds, reduce charity care by \$650 million

Expansion of Nebraska's Medicaid program under the Affordable Care Act would bring in at least \$2.9 billion in revenue from the federal government by 2020, potentially finance over 10,000 on-going jobs, and reduce charity care by \$650 million from 2014-2019, a report released last week by a center at the University of Nebraska Medical Center indicates.

The report is based on a study conducted by Jim Stimpson, Ph.D., director of the Center for Health Policy and associate professor in the UNMC College of Public Health.

"Medicaid expansion is an important decision for each state, and these results indicate that it would have a huge impact on Nebraska," Dr. Stimpson said.

On June 28, the U.S. Supreme Court upheld the ACA but ruled that the ACA provision expanding the Medicaid program for individuals from 100 percent of the federal poverty level to 133 percent of the FPL is optional for states.

For those states opting in for Medicaid expansion, the federal government would pay 100 percent of the cost of Medicaid expansion between 2014 and 2016, with that amount decreasing incrementally to 90 percent by 2020.

For Nebraska, if Medicaid were expanded, it would bring in between 90,021 and 108,025 new enrollees through 2020, Dr. Stimpson's report indicated. From 2014 to 2020, the total estimated cost of this expansion for the state of Nebraska would range from \$140 million to \$168 million. The report did not calculate potential savings to the state government from expansion.

The report indicated that these additional costs would be significantly outweighed by an influx in federal funding, which would range from \$2.9 billion to \$3.5 billion through 2020. That funding would:

- Generate at least \$700 million in economic activity every year;
 - Potentially finance more than 10,000 on-going jobs; and
- Save between \$163 million and \$325 million from costs associated with uncompensated care, which is typically provided now through the uninsured persons' visits to emergency rooms.

Without Medicaid expansion, Dr. Stimpson said more than \$1 billion in uncompensated care would be provided through 2019 which is often shifted to individuals and employers in the form of higher insurance premiums, sometimes referred to as the "silent tax." Dr. Stimpson said that the decision to expand Medicaid could have a significant impact on the cost of individual and employer health insurance premiums.

The ACA provides federal tax credits and subsidies for persons to purchase insurance in health insurance exchanges. However, these benefits would not be available for most people who would be eligible for the Medicaid expansion. States that decide not to expand Medicaid eligibility will face a coverage gap or "doughnut hole" of insurance coverage options for the poor and uninsured.

Dr. Stimpson noted that states joining the expansion program later than 2014 might risk losing the 100 percent federal match.







Stone culture, silversmithing on display at Historical Society

Aaron Wing, who was reelected president of the Society at a board of directors meeting following the program, presid-

Gary Nelson, secretary, read the minutes of the 2011 meeting and Jo Ann Auxier, treasurer and curator, gave that report. In her presentation, Mrs. Auxier noted that \$1,259 had been spent on the renovation of the Iron Monument, the first point of measurement of Nebraska, which is atop a bluff on the Kansas-Nebraska State line on Kansas Highway 7, east of the mouth of the Nemaha River. The surroundings were heavily damaged in the 2011 Missouri River flood and the renovation of site is being undertaken by Austin Chapple with help from fellow Boy Scouts as his Eagle Badge project.

In his report to the membership Wing also commented on the Iron Monument project and pointed to some of the clearing out work on the access trail by Society members. The president paid tribute to the late Mildred Fritz and her devotion to the Society. "We miss her badly," he said. Wittwer, who spiced his presentation with humor, said he became interested in rock or stone culture on the winters he and his wife Edna have spent in Arizona the past 17 years. With some amusement he told getting "thrown out of (carving) class" on the first day because he didn't "do it their way."

He has his own shop in Arizona and gets most of his rocks from the desert. For the carving he uses a diamond drill bit. For an excellent example of his work he displayed the carving of a buffalo which originally had been a square piece of rock. Roy said he started out by outlining a buffalo on the rock and going from there. The buffalo's ears are bear claws. Then there

was lots and lots of polishing. The finished product is outstanding. Also on display were numerous small rocks and other figures which had been carved and polished to attractiveness.

"It really takes time," he said, noting that he spent well over 100 hours getting the buffalo the way he wanted it.

Wittwer also enjoys doing silversmithing and passed around examples of pendants, necklaces and rings which he had made, and which are the favorites "of my 17 grandkids."

Asked if he sells any of his rock carving and silversmithing, he answered, "No, I give all of my stuff away. It's just a hobby for me. And all it takes is practice." (And talent.)

It might be added that Roy also is a storyteller and that also was enjoyed by his audience. At the end of his presentation a number of persons gathered around the exhibit table to get an up-close look at the examples of the speaker's work which had been laid out there.

Before retiring to Auburn, the Wittwers farmed southwest of Humboldt and he also was a custom bulldozer operator. One of the exhibits on the display table was a rock bulldozer.

Thieves strike rural area again



People in rural areas are encouraged to report any suspicious activity to the Sheriff's Office (402-245-2479).

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



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

"A body in motion tends to stay in motion," Kurt said, quoting famed scientist Sir Isaac Newton.

Mueller didn't teach physics – he was guidance counselor, athletic director and track coach at Dawson-Verdon from 1985-94 and later taught and coached at Prague - but he and other exercise enthusiasts (extremists?) use one of Newton's Three Laws of Motion to illustrate the importance of physical activity. They don't, however, very often mention friction and its ability to resist perpetual motion. That said, Mueller has sustained just one knee injury, a torn meniscus in 2010, and the surgeon was amazed at the condition of his joints, saying Mueller's knees looked like those of a 40-year-old. He ran the Montana Marathon months later.

Mueller never gets sick, and he continues to run at the same pace he set three decades ago. The numbers don't lie: He qualified for the Boston Marathon in the 1980s with a time of 3:27; he ran in Hawaii (his 50th state) in March of this year for Big Island International Marathon and finished with a time of 3:32 — the fastest of his age group. A month later, he traveled to South Dakota and ran his 70th career marathon.

"It DOES help to get older," his wife of 40 years, Judy, said. "I was so excited and proud of him! I have a picture of myself and my husband after he finished the Mile High Marathon (Denver) in 2003 and on the front it reads, 'What's my favorite sport?, and on the back, 'Watching hubby run marathons!'"


Kurt, who calls friend and Hall of Fame runner Louis Fritz, of Verdon, "a role model in a league by himself," said he needed to set an ambitious goal after qualifying for the Boston Marathon in the early days. "I had run in Nebraska, Massachusetts and Minnesota, but I was getting to a place where I was stale in my training. I needed a goal."

His fourth state was Missouri. "Then I got serious," he said. Mueller tried to run in five or six different marathons (in different states) per year, then pushed it up to eight or 10. He ran with a moose in Alaska; ran in the rain at Rhode Island; traced Crater Lake in Oregon; and crossed the line in St. George Utah holding hands with his daughter, Katie, and her husband, Travis Bourret, of Kearney.

The family trio is currently training for October's Twin Cities Marathon (Kurt previously run it in a personal-best 3:13) in Minnesota, where he hopes to pace Katie to qualify for the Boston Marathon in 2014. Kurt himself has already qualified. Aside from that, he now plans to run a marathon in each of the 13 Canadian provinces.

'My husband will run until his legs say 'no more,'" Judy said.

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up the running shoes and took off down the path at the age of 30

- "I started gaining weight and decided I wanted to be active and always be able to play with my kids and grandkids" - and never stopped.

Just take a look at his odometer: Seventy 26.2-mile marathons (at least one in each of the 50 states) in 30 years of competitive running. Kurt runs five or six miles every day, five or six times per week. By conservative calculation, the Dawson man has legged, literally, some 41,000 miles. To put that in perspective, that's nearly two trips around the globe (positioned at the equator, no less), or 17 jaunts from New York City to Los Angeles.

"I just kept going. I the reason I've stayed as healthy as I have." He is one of 2,898

Newest Husker Commits

In my last column I lamented that Nebraska was still searching for a quarterback for their 2013 recruiting class. Shortly after that column ran, the Huskers got their man as Rancho Santa Margarita, Calif. signal-caller Johnny Stanton (6-2/220) chose NU over Oregon, California and Wis-

Stanton is a player who was named to the prestigious "Elite 11" quarterback group earlier this summer. The Elite 11 is a competition where hundreds of quarterbacks from around the nation compete in six regional camps for one of 22 invitations to the final competition.

Stanton excelled during the finals, finishing the first two days as the clubhouse leader. Day three brought a conflict, as Stanton left camp to participate in a 7-on-7 tournament with his high school team. According to ESPN.com, Stanton"... tried to perform immediately following the tournament, but fatigue set in. Still, he maintained well enough on the final day to cement a spot in the Elite 11."

The notoriety that Stanton gained at Elite 11 is already paying dividends, as 247sports.com three-star running back Terrell Newby (5-10/180) of West Hills, Calif. specifically mentioned Stanton as one reason he's drawn to Nebraska. Both players will take their official visits Sept. 21 for the Idaho State game.

Following Stanton, Nebraska added Rivals.com three-star offensive guard lineman Zach Hannon (6-5/295) of Kansas City, Mo. Hannon had narrowed his choices to Arkansas, Missouri and Nebraska and surprised some when he didn't choose the Razorbacks. Not only is Hannon big and strong, but he also has excellent foot speed and plays lacrosse during the spring sports season.

The third new commitment was a complete surprise, as Spanish Fort, Ala. defensive back Jonathan Cook (6-0/185) gave the Big Red his pledge. Penn State, Mississippi State and Ole Miss were among the 247sports three-star prospect's 20-plus offers.

Alabama asked Cook to take a 'greyshirt' season, meaning he would pay his own tuition his first year of school before going on scholarship. Cook decided against that option, but don't be surprised when other SEC schools call if Cook changes his mind on Nebraska. Personally I believe it's a 50-percent chance at best that Cook signs with Nebraska in Febru-

Transfer from Auburn

Another addition to NU's roster for the 2013 season is cornerback Jonathan Rose (6-2/185), a transfer from Auburn where he saw significant action as a true freshman last year. Coming out of high school, Rose was Rivals' No. 112 overall prospect nationally at all positions and the No. 7-ranked cornerback.

Why exactly Rose is leaving Auburn is a bit of a mystery, but numerous sources with intimate knowledge of the young man say that the Big Red are getting not only a talented player but also a great kid. He will sit the 2012 season under transfer rules, but with the number of seniors on next year's roster at cornerback a player with Rose's ability is certainly welcome.

Lacouture makes a move

There was more good news in late July as Rivals three-star defensive end Christian Lacouture (6-5/270) transferred to Lincoln Southwest from his former school in College Station, Texas. Lacouture's mother took a job in Lincoln and she and his sister made the move with plans for the entire family to move following Christian's senior year. The prospect of spending his senior year apart from his mother and sister was too much, though, and Lacouture soon followed.

Southwest now sports two Husker commits, as Lacouture pairs with linebacker Josh Banderas to form one of Class A's stingiest defenses.

Departures of Moore and Klatchko

There has been a lot of hand-wringing in Husker Nation about the departures of three former four-star prospects. Fans blame coaches for "losing" top young players. Most, if not all, of the blame is unwarranted in my opinion.

Running back Aaron Green transferred to TCU over the summer, citing homesickness. Green is ultra-talented and should excel with the Horned Frogs; however he's also a guy who never should have left Texas for college. He never seemed comfortable in Lincoln despite having his older brother Andrew on the team, and if you followed Aaron's Twitter postings the writing was on the wall long ago.

Offensive guard Ryan Klatchko (6-4/295) decided to transfer over

"We have a culture around here," Pelini said, "and if somebody doesn't feel they fit into that culture — for whatever reason — he decided to take his talents someplace else. I wish him well."

That's coach speak for, "Just because you're a four-star prospect in high school, nothing's going to be given to you at Nebraska. You have to put in the work, and if you're not willing to do that then don't let the door hit you where the Good Lord split you."

The third transfer is complicated, as offensive tackle **Tyler Moore** (6-6/305), who started four games as a true freshman, abruptly left the team during pre-season camp.

Comments by his father, Brian, to the Lincoln Journal-Star fueled speculation that offensive line coach Barney Cotton was the cause of Tyler's unrest, "...he loves Bo (Pelini) and he loves Coach (Tim) Beck, and we're still in regular contact with Bo and Coach Beck trying to work through this whole thing."

Cotton was not named by Moore, but according to my sources another staff member is actually the issue. Although both sides have left the door open, I do not expect Moore back at NU without staff changes. I put the chance of those changes at less than five percent.

Fellow four-star 2011 signee **Todd Peat, Jr.,** a defensive tackle who redshirted in 2011, was also rumored to be transferring after he was left off the 105-man pre-season roster. However, as classes started Peat was practicing with the team. His absence was simply a case of Peat not earning his way onto the 105. Hopefully this will serve as a "wake-up call" for Peat. With proper work ethic, he is talented enough to be a major force in Pelini's defense.

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John H. and Amalia P. Morehead, with grandchildren Teresa and Will, children of Marc and Marcia Morehead, officially open the field named in their honor at a ceremony held last Thursday afternoon. The Moreheads donated \$100,000 to the

renovation to the ballfield at Grandview Park. Mr. Morehead recently retired from his position of president of Richardson County Bank & Trust.

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Baffling death of physician captivated Nebraskans

NEBRASKA TIMELINE Nebraska State **Historical Society**

The strange death of prominent Omaha physician and surgeon Frederick Rustin in September of 1908 ushered in a series of widely publicized events culminating in accusations of suicide, a trial for murder, and a lengthy legal struggle by his widow to collect her husband's insurance benefits.

Dr. Rustin, discovered by his wife with a mortal gunshot wound on the front porch of his Farnam Street home at about 3 a.m. on Sept. 2, died shortly afterward in an Omaha hospital. The sensational details were reported by newspapers across the state, especially after an inquest turned up evidence of a tangled suicide pact that resulted in the arrest of Charles E. Davis for murder.

A key witness at the Rustin inquest was Mrs. Abbie Rice, who

had been detained by Omaha police because she was one of the last persons to see the well-known physician alive. Rice claimed to have been an intimate friend of Rustin, who prior to his death was having financial problems. According to Rice, the doctor wanted to end his own life, but realized that his widow would be unable to collect his life insurance benefits if he did so, and accordingly tried to induce Rice to do the job for him.

The Morning World-Herald, which reported extensively on the

Weman Declares That Rustin Planned to Have Himself Shot Through Ab domen So That People Would Not Think It Suicide.

Omaha, Sept. 9.—Startling in detail almost beyond conception, sensational in every word, and told with a calmness that ulmost shocked the staid county attorney, although he himself had once read it, the statement of Mrs. Abbie C. Rice, who for four days has been detained by the police in connection with the shooting a week ago of Dr. Frederick C. Rustin, before he coroner's jury eclipses anything of the kind ever before dealt with by the police of perhaps the whole country in the way of suicide pacts.

Rice told the coroner's jury that she had initially agreed to the double suicide scheme but later backed out, and Rustin had been forced to find someone else willing to kill him. "The man she loved told her, she says, that he had secured

> repeating the story she had told at the inquest that implicated Davis in the killing. Davis maintained his innocence, admitting that he had a drug problem, but denied that he had ever entered into a suicide pact with Dr. Rustin. In a move to deflect suspicion from Davis, his defense team produced a surprise witness who testified that she saw—not Davis, but Rice-near Rustin's house about an hour after the shooting.

Rice testified at Davis's trial.

After 13 hours of deliberation, the jury returned a verdict of not guilty. The Kearney Daily Hub said on Dec. 11, 1908, that the decision freed Davis, but "left the death of Dr. Rustin involved in as deep a mystery as it was on the morning he was found dying on his front porch."

The unsolved Rustin case again surfaced in the Nebraska press in September of 1910 when the first guns were sounded in the fight to collect more than \$38,000 worth of insurance on the principal figure in the tragedy. Five separate suits were filed by Mrs. Rustin, but later consolidated, in the district court at Louisville, Kentucky. When the jury returned a verdict awarding her the money, the affected insurance companies appealed, only to have the verdict upheld by the Kentucky Court of Appeals.

Teacher/Leader Performance Framework - In February, the State Board of Education tasked NDE with creating model teacher and principal evaluation systems for voluntary adoption by local districts that find them useful. They asked that the models include evaluation of instructional and leadership practices, measures of student achievement, measures of student, staff, and parent feedback, and other components. NDE created the Leadership Steering Committee, which began meeting in April 2012. That group has, as its primary task, will be making specific recommendations to the State Board on what such a model evaluation system should look like. A series of Leadership Committee meetings are scheduled through September with the expectation that recommendations will be ready for the State Board in Novem-

The Leadership Committee has invited 23 schools, including Falls City Public Schools, to participate in the project as Pilot Districts. The key roles of the pilot districts are to take the recommendations once they are approved by the State Board and design the specific documents (rubrics, forms, etc.) that would make up model evaluation systems for teachers and principals. This amounts to translating some relatively broad recommendations into the kinds of detailed documents that you need to make the evaluation system a reality in our schools. In addition, the Pilot Districts will need to help design the technology that makes the model workable for our teachers and administrators and create the training that will allow our teachers and principals to put the system into effect. The plan is to have the pilot districts implement the new evaluation system in 2013-14 and, after adjustments, make the models available to all Nebraska schools that want to use it in 2014-15.

Right now, the Leadership Steer-Committee is asking each pilot district to identify two representatives (one teacher and one administrator) who would work on the committee at the state level. In addition, we will need to create a local evaluation committee that will have the task of making the model workable in our district and be involved in training, etc. At the state level, it's anticipated that the Design/Pilot District Committee work will begin in the mid-Fall of 2012 and continue through the winter-springsummer of 2012-13 in order to be ready to implement in 2013-14. They have not identified a specific number of meetings yet; but possibly one per month from December to April or May might be a fair estimate. Since they are creating both the teacher and principal models at the same time, it is likely they will divide the groups.

This opportunity directly aligns with our adopted district goal of "Developing and adopting teacher and principal evaluation models based on NDE's new Teacher/Leader Performance Standards." The opportunity for Falls City Public Schools to be a Pilot District would positively impact our ability to design an evaluation model that is unique to our district, yet aligned with the Nebraska Department of Education Teacher/Leader Performance Standards, and work in the direction of accomplishing our district goal on teacher and principal performance evaluation models. Therefore, the Board of Education will have the opportunity in September to formally authorize the district to participate as a Pilot District in the process, and authorize the superintendent to form a local evaluation committee.

Notice and Public Explanation of a **Proposed Activity in the 100-Year** Floodplain and Wetland

To: All Interested Agencies, Groups and Individuals

This is to give notice that the City of Falls City has conducted an evaluation as required by Executive Order 11988 in accordance with HUD regulations at 24 CFR 55.20 to determine the potential affect that its activity in the floodplain and wetland will have on the environment. The proposed project would consist of the construction of a 120-Car Unit Train Grain Facility to provide a new business to cater to the underserved grain market in the local area. The proposed project would be located on an approximately 160 acre undeveloped agricultural field immediately southwest of the intersection of U.S. Highways 73/159 (Harlan Street) and the Burlington Northern Santa Fe/ Union Pacific Railroad crossing (southern half of Section 15, Township 1 North, Range 16 East). Approximately 150 acres of the proposed project area is located within the Zone A floodplain, as mapped by the Federal Emergency Management Agency Flood Insurance Rate Maps. Wetlands are also located within the proposed project area. The proposed project area is bordered to the north by the Burlington Northern Santa Fe railroad line, to the south and west by an irrigation ditch, and to the east by U.S. Highways 73/159 (Harlan Street). At this time, the proposed project would consist of a 1.6 mile railway loop, an approximately 220 feet tall grain elevator, and access road for a total impact of approximately 23 acres. The total acreage of potentially jurisdictional wetlands impacted by the proposed project is approximately 0.295 acre, and the total linear feet of potential drainage ditch impacts from the proposed project is approximately 271.5 linear feet. The engineers and designers continue to reduce impacts to the extent practical and will obtain all the necessary federal, state, and local permits required for the project prior to construction.

The City of Falls City has determined that it has no practicable alternative other than locating the proposed Community Development Block Grant project in a floodplain and wetlands. This activity will have no significant impact on the environment for the following reasons:

Site selection criteria for the proposed project requires that the proposed project area be located adjacent to an existing railroad and have access to an existing roadway to allow truck hauling activities to access the proposed project area. The proposed project area also needs to be large enough to facilitate project design, specifically a large, circular rail to provide railcar access to the facility. Sites evaluated for the project area included the proposed project area and an alternative site located immediately north of the proposed project area. The proposed project area meets the needs of the project due to its location adjacent to an existing railroad and access to U.S. Highway 73/159, which is located immediately east of the proposed project area. The proposed project area is located within a Zone A special flood hazard area and several wetlands are located on the property. The proposed project area consists of cultivated cropland, and therefore has limited environmental concerns beyond the presence of wetlands and the floodplain. The alternative site is located adjacent to an existing railroad but is further removed from a major roadway, which would be needed for access. Although not located within a designated special flood hazard area, there are several other constraints to developing the alternative site. Numerous drainage ditches containing wetlands are present within the alternative site and there is a densely-wooded area in the southeast portion of the property. In addition, the alternative site contains potential cultural concerns related to the presence of a cemetery along the northern boundary of the alternative site. Additional road construction and improvements would be required to provide a suitable access point to the alternative site. Finally, the alternative site has a substantial change in grade across the parcel. As rail loops for car storage require very gradual grades, significant earthwork would be required to develop the alternative site. The extent of earthwork that would be required to create the necessary grades on the alternative site would be cost prohibitive and require a substantial amount of earth removal, including prime farmland and farmland of statewide importance. Additional alternative sites were cursorily evaluated during preliminary project siting. However, additional alternative sites were determined to be unsuitable based on further distances from existing roadways, economic and/or engineering constraints, more significant environmental concerns, lack of rail access, and cultural resource concerns. The project activity cannot be relocated because alternative sites have either increased environmental concerns or do not provide necessary access to ex-

A no action alternative is not feasible because the need for more efficient transportation of locally harvested grain would remain an issue for local farmers.

isting rail lines and roadways.

The proposed project would consist of project buildings (grain elevator, office building) and a rail loop that would be elevated a minimum of 1 foot above the base flood elevation (BFE). Buildings would be built in the northeastern corner of the proposed project area so as to minimize the floodplain disturbance (several buildings would be located outside the floodplain). Development of the proposed project area would minimize impervious surfaces to the greatest extent possible in order to retain ground water recharge and similar hydrologic processes within the floodplain and proposed project area. Hydrologic processes would also be retained by installing culverts along existing drainage ditches, thereby facilitating conveyance of water flow across the rail loop. Installing culverts at drainage ditches would also minimize impacts to wetland areas, maintain a hydrologic connection to downstream waters, and allow potential floodwaters to flow into and out of the proposed project area. Appropriate erosion control measures, as outlined in a Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan, would be implemented during construction activities to minimize impacts to the floodplain and wetlands resulting from runoff or other temporary construction disturbances. Necessary local, state, and federal permits will also be obtained prior to the construction of the proposed project.

ORDINANCE NO. 2012-104

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 3-805 OF THE FALLS CITY MUNICIPAL CODE; TO GIVE THE MUNICIPALITY THE DISCRETION TO INSTALL A FUSED SWITCH A BREAKER AHEAD OF THE UNDERGROUND SERVICE; TO REPEAL CONFLICTING ORDINANCES IN SAID SECTION; CONFLICTING TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FALLS CITY, NEBRASKA;

SECTION 1. That Chapter 3, Article 8, Section 3-805 of the Falls City Municipal Code be amended to read as follows:

§3-805 M U N I C I P A L ELECTRICAL SYSTEM; INSTALLATION EXPENSE. The expense of the overhead system, the meter and meter socket shall be paid by the Municipality. The expense of installation and wiring from the meter to points of distribution, meter loop and service to entrance shall be the responsibility of the consumer. In the event that the customer is a nonresident, the Municipality shall furnish the transformer pole and overhead service to yard pole, but not the cost of the pole or wiring to points of distribution which shall be at the customer's expense. The service entrance conductors shall be installed in rigid metallic conduit from the weather head to the service disconnect unless otherwise authorized by the Electric Inspector. Customers of the Municipal Electrical System, may at their discretion, have the wires installed underground and in that case, the consumer shall compensate the Municipality for any additional costs of installation that may accrue as a result of such option. At the discretion of the Municipality a A fused switch or a breaker is to be may be installed ahead of the underground service, not to be larger than the amp capacity of the smallest ungrounded wire. The location of the meter shall be at the discretion of the Municipality. If the instrument metering is to be installed and a meter cabinet is required, cost of the meter cabinet will be paid by the customer. Underground primary service at the Municipality's option may be made available whereby the Municipality's primary cable will extend into a Municipal transformer or transformers at a consumers location. Such underground primary service cable shall be installed, owned and maintained by the Municipality on consumer property; provided prior easement for the cable route has been granted the Municipality by the consumer. The consumer shall pay the Municipality its estimated excess cost

in lieu of standard overhead service. Maintenance and replacement expense shall be apportioned in the same manner. (Ref. 17-902, 19-1404 RS Neb.) (Amended ord. 94-126)

SECTION 2. That any other ordinance or section passed and approved prior to the passage, approval, and publication or posting of this ordinance and in conflict with its provisions, is hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage, approval, and publication or posting as required by



stores. "We need to step up," she said, and avoid the "short-sighted" attitude of "selling out our financial future."

Ruth Rannebeck said the "Japanese are grabbing up our farms and elevators" and questioned whether local or state funds should be used for the project. She wondered what entity would pay for access roads to the facility, describing "a hefty price to pay," especially for those who might lose their employment (and thus the community). Mrs. Rannebeck said area "farmers and agribusiness have teamed up and done a fabulous job." She questioned what CGB would do for Falls City and Richardson County.

ACGB representative, Eric Kresin, from Tulsa, OK, said the company "is excited about the opportunity to come to your town," and that CGB would be good for the community. CGB, he said, is "not a big scary monster," but a largely American company that buys and sells grain. "We think the market here will be good for us," as well as the community and the transportation business. Kresin said CGB has no intention of forcing others out of business.

Salem Grain manager Dave Irwin described the issue as "county-wide" with "huge ramifications. He objected to the use of any tax dollars for the project. While farmers would realize higher prices for their grain, Irwin said in the long run, jobs will be lost throughout the county.

Falls City businessman Ted Godemann urged that everyone, including the council, "take a breath" and delay any CGB-related action. Attorney Mike Dunn, who is representing the city in CGB dealings, said the matter at hand, a petition for the city to annex the 160 acres southwest of Falls City, by statute required action last Monday night. The petition to annex from landowners Towle Realty and Reesman Investment Corp., could not legally be tabled, he said.

EDGE Executive Director Beckie Cromer, who has been working with CGB, spoke of the economic impact including new, good-paying jobs with benefits, an increased tax base, more business for Falls City Utilities, increased rail activity, better prices for grain and opportunities for truckers. She said CGB would qualify Tax Increment Financing and possibly other incentives, but still would pay "big taxes."

Councilman Hal Sutter said the council's concern is "what is best for the city," not who is invested in Salem Grain and the Straussville Elevator. Councilman Jerry Oliver said that the gloomy predictions from some in the audience are not based on fact and that the bottom line is that no one can accurately say what CGB's impact would be. And Mrs. Murphy said the council "can't satisfy" everyone at the same time. She said she appreciated the large turnout and input of opinions.

After nearly an hour of discussion, the council unanimously voted to approve the annexation petition and the first reading of the ordinance to annex the 160 acres. The second and final readings were approved

In other developments, the council (either Monday or during the two special meetings):

—Set the Airport Authority tax levy at .029482 for fiscal year 2012-13, a slight increase. City Clerk/Treasurer Gary Jorn said this tax levy fluctuates very little.

—Approved the 1% allowable growth for the 2012-13 budget.

—Okayed a Memorandum of Understanding with Falls City Recreation regarding a loan of up to \$600,000 for the ballparks project. This is a four-year agreement and the interest rate is 2%. It will assist Recreation in paying construction bills during the time that pledges are fulfilled.

—Approved the first reading of Ordinance 2012-105, amending the hours allowed for "Off Sale" and "On Sale" liquor sales on Sundays.

—Suspended the first and second readings and approved the final reading of Ordinance 2012-107, regarding the National Flood Insurance program.

—Approved Olsson Associates to review CGB's construction plans and building permit.

—Gave their approval for two special designated liquor licenses at Prichard Auditorium (Oct. 6 Northwest Fight Club and Sept. 1 family reunion). Jorn said while the limit of 12 such licenses had been reached, the State Liquor Commission had granted a waiver. Council member Murphy voted "no."


