\$3.2 million awarded to Brenner Field

The City of Falls City and the Falls City Airport Authority have been awarded a \$3,218,000 grant from the Federal Aviation Administration for improvements and construction at Brenner Field.

The grant money is derived from the aviation fuel tax.

Bob Ferguson, chairman of the Airport Authority, said the work to be done includes the widening of the runway from 60 feet to 75 feet, refurbishing the apron concrete panels, joint sealing the existing runway where needed, installation of pavement markings, installation of new runway lights, a new regulator and electric vault work and new fencing installed.

Ferguson said a contractor has been secured and preliminary work will begin this fall with the dirt work and with the removal of building and tree obstructions.

Weather permitting, work will resume in early spring of 2014 with the closing of the airport while construction is underway. However, the contractor will work with airport traffic wherever possible.

Thirty-three aircraft are based at Brenner Field.

After the project has been completed, construction will commence on a "new" taxi lane to the north and east side of the runway.

Poll: Rural Nebraskans believe climate change real, feel less urgency to address it

LINCOLN — Most rural Nebraskans believe global climate change is real, that human activity is at least partially a cause and that changes must be made to contend with it, but they're not as passionate on any of those points as they were five years ago, the Nebraska Rural Poll shows.

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln team that conducts the poll speculates rural Nebraskans' ardor on the issue may have cooled as concerns about energy security have diminished, as they've measured real current costs versus uncertain future benefits, or perhaps out of suspicion that scientists seem to blame apparently contradictory weather conditions on climate change.

The 18th annual University of Nebraska-Lincoln poll was sent to 6,320 households in Nebraska's 84 nonmetropolitan counties in March and April. Results are based on 2,317 responses.

The key climate change findings, and how they've changed since the last time the issue was explored by the poll, in 2008:

- Seventy-three percent of respondents

believe to some degree that climate change is happening — 48 percent "somewhat" and 25 percent "definitely." Only 13 percent say it's definitely not happening, and 14 percent said they didn't know.

- Fifty-four percent agreed with the statement that "human activity, including industry and transportation, is a significant cause of climate change." That's down from 65 percent in 2008.
- Forty-one percent agreed that "global climate change is something people can control," down from 51 percent five years ago.
- Forty-seven percent believe current climate change is due to normal climate patterns, up from 37 percent in 2008, and 59 percent agree that increased carbon dioxide and other gasses will lead to global climate change, down from 67 percent.
- Sixty percent of respondents said they think something needs to be done in their lifetime to deal with climate change, with half believing something needs to be done immediately. However, fewer rural Nebraskans believe immediate action from the gov-

ernment is necessary — 38 percent, down from 53 percent in 2008.

Several factors may have contributed to the drop in urgency in rural Nebraskans' feelings about climate change.

For one, Congress considered but rejected new legislation regulating greenhouse gas emissions.

"The public recognized there are economic impacts of any policy that addresses climate change — future benefits versus current costs," said UNL public policy specialist Brad Lubben. "The public decided, in the midst of an economic downturn, that costs to the economy were too great a price to pay for the promised future benefits to the climate."

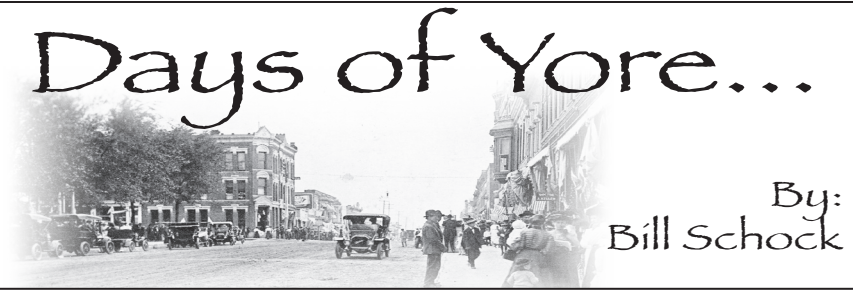
National energy security concerns have diminished some, too, as more sources of domestic oil and gas have been developed, lessening dependence on imports from hostile or unstable oil-rich countries.

Lubben said a general lack of scientific understanding and the underlying uncertainty about climate effects may be an issue, too.

For example, some scientists said the 2011 floods in Nebraska were caused by climate change, but so was the 2012 drought. How is that possible, the public may wonder, he said.

Randy Cantrell, rural sociologist with the UNL-based Rural Futures Institute, said there’s a certain impatience with the scientific process too.

“As good scientists, they ask a question. They answer it but it raises two more that need to be explored,” Cantrell said. “The public says, ‘you should have an answer by now, shouldn’t you?’”

“Maybe we’ve become just a little more jaded about the topic,” said Cheryl Burkhart-Kriesel, UNL Extension specialist based at the Panhandle Research and Extension Center in Scottsbluff.

The poll team was surprised to find that the poll indicated that more educated rural Nebraskans are less likely than others to support immediate action by the government to deal with climate change. Thirty-seven percent of those with at least a bachelor’s degree supported it, compared to 40 percent of those with a high school diploma or less.

Also, 47 percent of people with a college degree said they were worried about global climate change, compared to 54 percent of those with no more than a high school diploma.

It’s possible, Lubben said, that more educated respondents are more sensitive to the additional costs of dealing with global climate change, or maybe more confident in our ability to adapt or in scientists’ ability to find a solution.

However, more educated respondents were more likely to believe they have a “personal responsibility to help reduce the impacts of global climate change” – 63 percent, compared to 55 percent of those with a high school diploma or less.

The Rural Poll is the largest annual poll of rural Nebraskans’ perceptions on quality of life and policy issues. This year’s response rate was about 37 percent. The margin of error is plus or minus 2 percent. Complete results are available online at <http://ruralpoll.unl.edu>. The university’s Center for Applied Rural Innovation conducts the poll in cooperation with the Nebraska Rural Futures Institute with funding from UNL Extension and the Agricultural Research Division in the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

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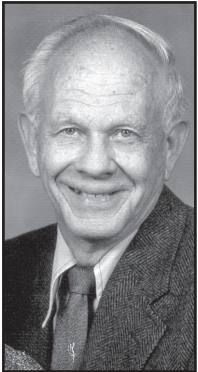
Edward Eckwert, Jr.

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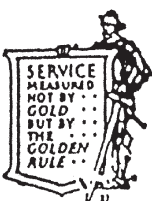

Senior Brooke Scheitel drove in junior Sydney Armbruster in the bottom of the seventh to tie Southern 1-1 and force extra innings. Southern's 2-3-4 hitters came up in the top of the eighth and the Raiders scored a pair of runs to hold off FC 3-1. FC mustered only four hits against the tough Southern pitcher Ellie Edmond.

FC's 3-2 walk-off victory over Syracuse in the first round was highlighted by senior Payshince Dawkins blooped over third base that scored senior Allyson Scholl from second. Scholl reached on a single, then stole second on a wild pitch to get into scoring position.

Scholl finished 3-for-3 against Syracuse. Scheitel was 2-3 with one RBI and freshman Bailey Armbruster was 1-3 with an RBI.

Perhaps deflated from the extra-innings loss, the Lady Tigers couldn't get anything going in the third place game with Class C contender Cass Count Central and were defeated 9-1 in five innings. Big Red Recruiting Report

As we move away from UCLA week and Nebraska's first true test of the fall (which they failed miserably), many questions remain unanswered. At 2-1 with winnable games against South Dakota, Illinois, Purdue, and Minnesota over the next six weeks, we should expect a 6-1 Husker squad hosting Northwestern on November 2.

However, as we saw on Saturday you really don't know what you're going to get from this team game-by-game (or even quarter-by-quarter). NU was up 21-3 and looking at regaining some national relevance. The next thing you knew they had given up 38 straight points and were blown out at home. This game was eerily reminiscent of recent games against Wisconsin, Ohio State and Michigan.

My opinion is that this team isn't mentally strong, and that includes the guys wearing helmets AND those wearing headsets on the sideline. When they face adversity, there are no leaders who step up and settle things down and keep them on task.

After Saturday's game, the UCLA players and coaches talked about how head coach Jim Mora was the calm in the middle of the storm when the Bruins were down 21-3.

"Coach Mora walked in there in the last two drives we had in the first half," said UCLA offensive coordinator Noel Mazzone. "He came in smiling, 'Hey guys, everybody just breathe.'... He kind of lightened things up for the kids... he got things going there."

Contrast that with Bo Pelini saying that he was looking at his guys on the sidelines and, "it looked like they had seen a ghost. When that happens, somebody's got to step up and make a play..."

Mora stepped up for his team. That's leadership, and I'm afraid that might be something that NU's program lacks right now. To be fair, it can't be all on coach Pelini. His assistant coaches are also culpable.

Where this team goes from here is completely up-in-the-air. We really won't find out anything until November, but that month could be make or break for Pelini's future in Lincoln. After Northwestern, Michigan, Michigan State, Penn State and Iowa in five straight weeks, NU could spend the holidays anywhere from the Rose Bowl to the Pinstripe Bowl.

On the recruiting front, Nebraska hosted four official visitors for the Southern Miss game and two for UCLA.

Quarterback Quinton Flowers (6-0/205) from Miami, Fla. was in attendance for the Southern Miss game. Flowers also lists offers from Alabama, Clemson, Tennessee and Texas, but only NU is recruiting him at quarterback which should weigh on his decision. Flowers told HuskerOnline.com that he was familiar the NU offense.

"Their offense fits my game," Flowers sated. "We run that at my school, Miami Jackson. We run the same type of offense, we just call it different."

After seeing Flowers up close during pregame warm-ups, I can tell you that he has a powerful upper body to go with tremendous explosion and the ability to make tacklers miss. He's a guy who could play multiple positions in Tim Beck's offense.

Running back Madre London (6-1/202) from Ft. Lauderdale, Fla. raved about Lincoln. He was on Twitter encouraging fellow running back Brandon Powell (5-9/167) of Deerfield Beach, Fla. to make the trip to Lincoln. Powell subsequently visited for the UCLA game.

London, who ran for nearly 1,000 yards in his freshman season at St. Thomas Aquinas High, will also visit Wisconsin, Michigan State, Mississippi State and Virginia. He has strong relationships with NU coach Ron Brown and Husker running back Ameer Abdullah which should keep the Huskers in it until the end.

Erik Brown (6-2/170), a wide receiver from Fontana, Calif. committed to Washington in early July but visited Lincoln during Southern Miss week also. He was hosted by freshman running back Terrell Newby, and Brown was familiar with Newby from reports in the Los Angeles area media the prior season. The fact that the true freshman was playing early and often wasn't lost on Brown, but it was the fan reaction that really stood out for him.

"It's the No. 1, most sold out stadium in America. And the fans were incredible," Brown told HuskersIllustrated.com. "A lot of the fans knew my name and I've never met these people a day in my life. They knew who Erik Brown was and they cheered for me to be a Cornhusker."

Brown will also visit Notre Dame, but most recruitniks expect him to remain committed to Washington

Defensive back Josh Kalu (6-1/170) of Houston, Texas is probably the most likely visitor to commit soon. An explosive athlete who also returns punts and kickoffs for his high school, Kalu arrived in Lincoln on Friday and was able to get a full academic tour along with seeing the athletic facilities.

Kalu was hosted by redshirt sophomore offensive lineman Givens Price, who hails from the same high school as Kalu. Despite also planning to visit Iowa State, Wake Forest, Washington State and Houston, Kalu sounded like someone ready to make a pledge after the trip.

"First I'm going to go home and talk to my parents about everything," he told HuskerOnline.com. "I'm going to most likely commit after the season, but if something happens I might commit before then."

A Rivals.com four-star prospect, Powell committed to Miami in August after previously pledging to Tennessee in June. Flipping him a second time will be tough, but the December grad enjoyed his trip to Lincoln.

Powell is explosive and shifty, and has shown good hands in the passing game. It's easy to see him excelling as a slot receiver or running back at NU. Swaying him away from the hometown Hurricanes will be difficult, though.

The other uncommitted official visitor for UCLA week was Rivals.com four-star defensive tackle Ricky Walker (6-2/275) of Hampton, Va. Virginia Tech is an overwhelming favorite to gain his pledge, but the opportunity for early playing time at NU certainly gave him something to think about. He was also impressed with the game day atmosphere and the family feeling on the team. It's still a long-shot, but NU should remain in it with Walker until the end.

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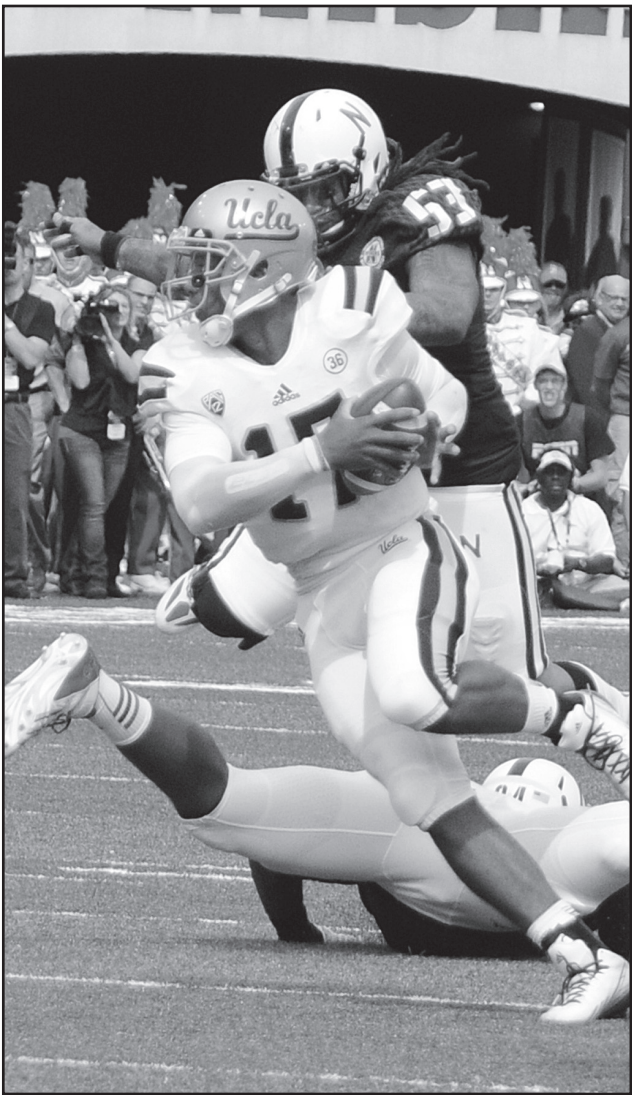
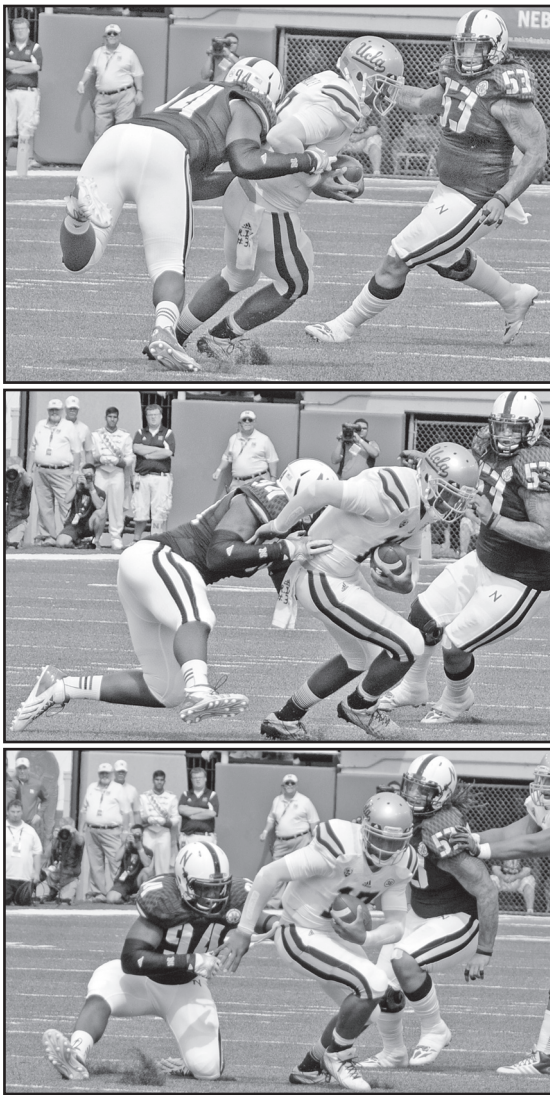

Senior Captain Taylor Martinez no leader

If Nebraska coaches or players have a question or need advice on what they need to do in order to win each and every football game they ever play, there are thousands upon thousands of unpaid advisers more than willing to provide their tutoring services. They never ask, so you have to assume the unsolicited advice is neither wanted nor heeded. Why? Well, because they wisely consider the sources. And that's a piece of advice everyone would be wise to note. Always consider the source because messenger makes the message - NOT the other way around.

For instance, if the guy at the end of the bar advises you to, say, wager every penny of your latest hard-earned paycheck on the outcome of Sunday's Oakland Raiders game, don't make the phone call before you check the source. What information led your potential new found wealth consultant to provide such a tip and where did he acquire his or her knowledge? Is he or she - let's stick with "he" - a current or former

NFL coach or player? Or was he just a pretty decent player for the JV back in the day? Does his research extend into the Oakland locker room or front office? Or is that end of the bar just close enough to the TV that he can hear the announcers? Or does he like the Raiders because silver is his favorite color? One should find answers to these and many, many other questions prior to phoning a friend and following your bar bud along - down? - his path to economic prosperity.

Bo Pelini is highly unlikely to take the advice from Husker fans who are experts at being Husker fans. Like you, I am an expert at being a Husker fan. Hence, I tend also to reside in the past because the other neighborhood isn't well-kept. I can make that observation after watching a team give up 38 unanswered points in a 20-point loss to a decent but hardly great UCLA team in front of the biggest crowd in school history. I'm not qualified to advise Bo Pelini on what he should've done differently to avoid that collapse. Or the similar one last year in LA. Or

the one at Ohio State. Or the one in Indianapolis. I'm just a Husker fan, so I care too deeply and follow it too closely. And I remember what I see.

I've paid close attention since the dawn of the 1980s and remember the legends - Gill, Frazier, Crouch, of course, to name just a very few - were legends not only because they were fast or could throw, but because they led. You didn't have to be in the huddle to know they were great leaders - it was visible to the naked, untrained eye when they played and also when they spoke. And it wasn't following their many triumphs when the leadership was most evident. It was when they lost. Leaders hurt when they fail. You can see it on their face.

I think of 1986 and all of Nebraska had is collective heart pulled from its chest yet again by Barry Switzer's Oklahoma Sooners. You know the record - if not, look it up.

Anyway, I vividly remember seeing linebacker Marc Munford on TV for the post-game interview. Couldn't tell you what was said, but the tears in his eyes told the story. He had 16 tackles in a performance forever regarded as one of the greatest ever by a Nebraska player. It was the pain he obviously felt, though, that stuck with me way back then. I shared it, too.

Fast-forward 27 years. If Saturday's loss caused the same pain to the captain of the 2013 Nebraska team, it was hardly evident. Taylor Martinez has been criticized for everything from his throwing motion, to his footwork, to his fumbles and untimely interceptions. Unfairly criticized, because when you check the sources, you find they don't know a single thing about playing quarterback at Nebraska. He's worked his butt off to improve footwork, release and all mechanical elements of his position. And he should be commended.

I'm critical of Taylor Martinez - and his coach for putting him in charge - because either he doesn't hate to lose or he's incredibly adept at hiding his pain. In either case, a team's fight can only reflect the perceived fight in the heart of its captain. After the UCLA debacle, Martinez casually told reporters he didn't know what happened and slipped out of the room and took in the Husker volleyball game.

Only a shockingly inept leader engineers an 18-point lead, allows it to turn into a 20-point loss and does so completely devoid of emotion. Martinez has flashed anger before, but only in the interview room, in defense of his personal play. And that's bound to happen again now. The Pelini and Martinez "us against the world"

routine is coming to a TV near you. And suddenly, it's the reporters and their stupid questions and Nebraska fans and their ridiculously high expectations that are the enemy. That's a disingenuous deflection of Pelini's own culpability in the four-year flop that is the Taylor Martinez era at Nebraska.

Nebraska fans have been guilty in the past of being overbearing - it was shameful what Scott Frost and Jamal Lord went through - but they rightfully expect better than this. Expecting your senior quarterback to sustain an 18-point lead and show just a hint of killer instinct isn't an unfair expectation. Neither is expecting him to hate losing.

For Pelini - nobody questions his passion - but he needs to be held accountable for stitching a "C" on Martinez' chest and selling him as a leader.

Sure, Husker fans are hardly qualified to give football advice. But we know it hurts to lose, or at least it should.

Twelve offensive plays in the first half was all the top-ranked Falls City Sacred Heart football team needed to build a 54-0 lead over visiting St. Joseph (MO) Christian last Thursday night en route to a 60-6 victory.

All told, the Irish ran only 23 offensive plays the entire game against the over-matched Lions, who managed only 73 yards on 46 plays. FCSH, now 2-0, finished with 334 yards offensively.

Senior Chaz Dunn threw four first-half touchdown passes to four different receivers and added a 43-yard touchdown run to lead the Irish who improved to 2-0. Dunn hit senior Colin Niemeyer for 31 yards, junior Austin Malone for 40 yards, senior Sean Strasheim from one yard out and finally, junior Sawyer Kean for a 34-yard score. Dunn finished the night 5-of-6 passing with 116 yards, while also carrying the ball twice for 51 yards.

Irish sophomore Henry Arnold made the most of his opportunities, as he carried the ball only two times but for scores of 65 and 47 yards. Arnold finished with 112 yards to lead FCSH.

Kean and Malone also scored twice for FCSH. Kean’s second

TD came on a 34-yard run with 5:38 left in the second quarter and put the Irish ahead 48-0, while Malone scored the second touchdown of the game on a 50-yard punt return with just under seven minutes left in the opening quarter.

The Irish defense, led by seniors Jarod Fiegenger and BrandonSchawang,againcaused fits for the opposition. Fiegenger finished with 12 tackles, three of which were solo, one sack and two tackles for loss, while Schawang had 10 stops (two solo), two sacks and two tackles for loss. Junior defensive end Logan Scheitel finished with a game-high three sacks, which resulted in 21 yards lost for SJC, and freshman Emerson Keithley recorded the only Irish takeaway when he picked off a pass in his own end zone late in the fourth quarter to thwart a SJC scoring opportunity.

FCSH travels to Axtell, KS Friday night for a game with the 2-0 Eagles. Axtell defeated Lewiston (NE) 42-16 on the road in their opener and won at home last week 44-28 over Clifton-Clyde (KS).

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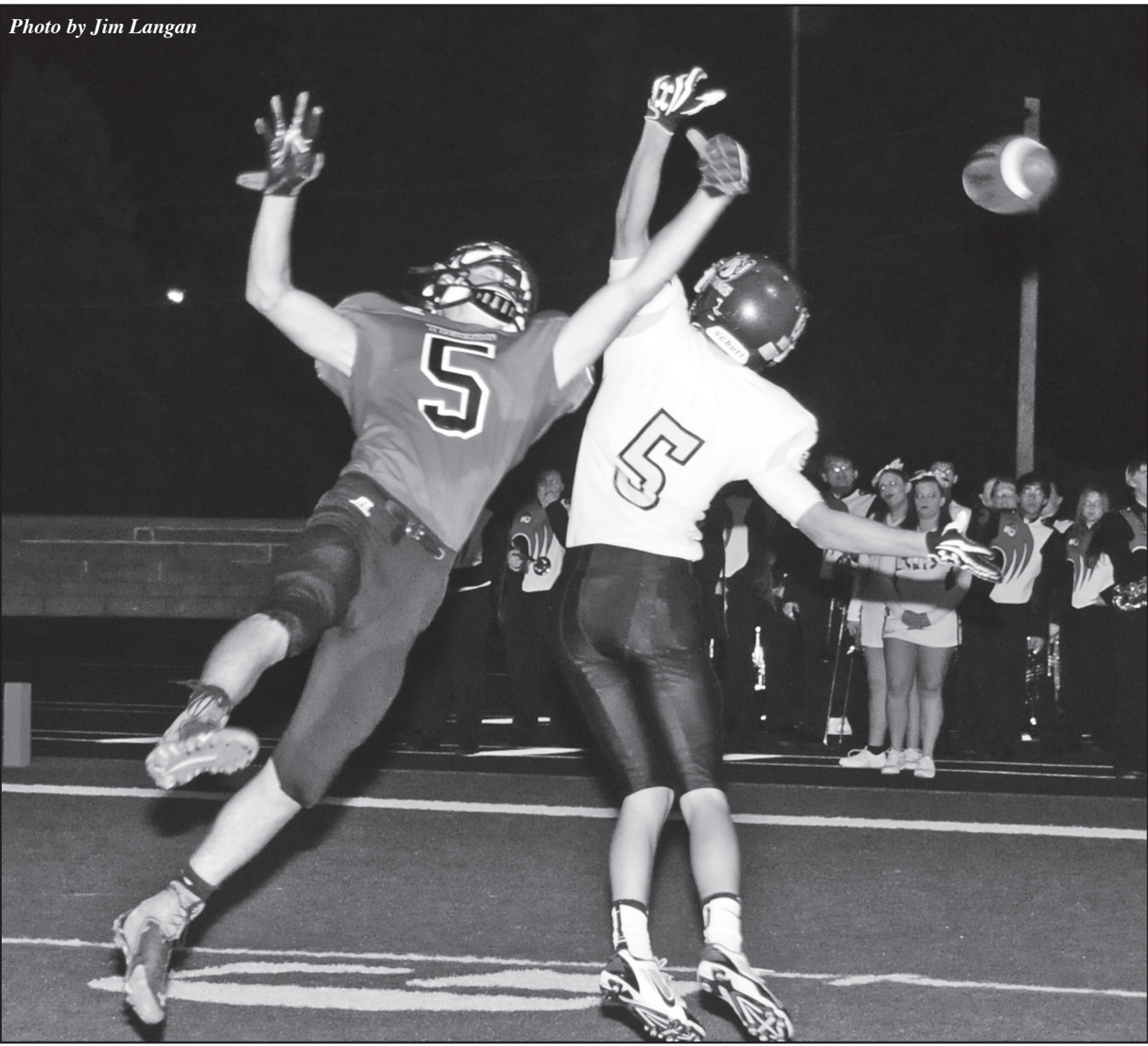

Coaches say it all the time. “Make more plays than the other team and you give yourself the best chance to win.”

Falls City High did just that Friday night against visiting Raymond Central, as the Tigers made more plays in the end to defeat the Trojans, 46-36.

Ironically, in a game low on defense – the teams combined for 997 yards on 112 plays – it was a defensive play made by the Tigers that flipped the momentum and set up the eventual game-winning touchdown.

Leading 36-30 with five minutes to play, Raymond’s

sophomore running back Jake Pelensky took the handoff near his own 40-yard line, rushed up the middle where he was met by FC junior Brenden Heckenlivley, who forced the ball out of Pelensky’s hands. FC senior safety Mitchell Harling recovered the fumble and the Tigers were back in business.

Two plays later, Harling connected with junior Jack Hartman on a 37-yard touchdown pass to tie the game and junior Jordy Stoller followed it up with his third successful 2-point conversion run of the game and FC led 38-36 with 2:37 left in the game.

Raymond returned the ensuing kickoff to the FC 45-yard line and with 2:37 left in the game, the Trojans, led by their senior quarterback Ben Lodema who finished the night with 232 yards passing and another 168 rushing, still had life.

Lodema’s first and second down passes fell incomplete though and on third down, FC senior C.J. Arnold sacked Lodema for a one-yard loss. Lodema’s throw on 4th and 11 also found the turf of Jug Brown Stadium and the Trojan threat ended.

FC tacked on an insurance touchdown after Stoller broke loose for a 53-yard run to the Trojan 4-yard line with less than a minute to play to setup Harling’s third rushing touchdown of the game.

FC built a 22-6 halftime lead on the heels of their big play threat, Stoller, who is averaging 16.2 yards per carry and 39 yards per reception. After Harling’s 21-yard touchdown run in the first quarter gave the Tigers an 8-0 lead, Stoller broke loose for a 52-yard TD run with 4:34 left in the second quarter to put FC ahead 14-0. Then, less than one minute after RC capped off a nine play, 62-yard scoring drive to cut the lead to eight, FC senior Ryan Mount found Stoller for a 54-yard touchdown pass.

The Trojans answered in the second half, though, with three-straight scoring drives and 22 unanswered points. RC’s Alex Kruse scored from one yard out with 8:34 left in the third to end an eight play, 66-yard drive. After a 3-and-out by the Tigers,

by Lodema capped off a four play, 88-yard drive with a 71-yard TD run that gave RC a 22-20 lead. The third unanswered score came at the beginning of the fourth quarter when Lodema punched it in from three yards out and put his team ahead 28-22.

All was for not, however, as the Tigers made the plays in the fourth quarter.

Offensively, Harling and Stoller led the attack. Harling finished with 19 carries for 107 yards and three touchdowns, while Stoller carried it 10 times for 182 yards and a TD. He added two receptions for 78 yards and a TD. Mount carried eight times for 41 yards and also connected on his only pass of the evening – the 54-yard TD to Stoller in the second quarter.

Junior linebacker Weston Witt led the FC defense with nine tackles, seven of which were solo, and one quarterback sack. Harling also finished with seven solo tackles. Heckenlivley and junior Lee Huettner each finished with four solo stops and Huettner added the third FC sack.

The Tigers, now 1-1, host 1-1 Omaha Concordia Friday night at 7 at Jug Brown.

Cuts result in empty chairs, empty bowls at Head Start

This year, Southeast Nebraska Community Action Partnership Head Start preschools resumed classes on Monday, Sept. 3 minus 10 students and three staff members. This decrease was due to budget cuts as a result of the government sequestration.

SENCA realized a decrease in Federal grant funding in the amount of \$62,301, directly affecting the Head Start program for the 2013/2014 school year. SENCA Head Start serves low income preschool children and families throughout five locations in southeast Nebraska. Collaboration sites also serve students at Auburn, Falls City Public and Humboldt-TR-S schools.

Prior to the budget cuts, SENCA provided 156 children, ages 3 to 5, and their families with services promoting school readiness that include but are not limited to: Education, Health and Nutrition, Parent Engagement and Social Services. While the quality of education has not been affected, the number of



children receiving school readiness skills has been decreased by more than six percent, which may affect outcomes of these students upon entering Kindergarten.

From the fall of 2012 to the spring of 2013, SENCA Head Start preschool students met or exceeded expectations for Social Emotional skills by 22 percent. Language skills increased 21 percent and mathematics increased by 23 percent. Head Start is making a difference in the lives of children and families!

With the reduction of students, three Head Start staff also lost their jobs. This impacts family incomes which in turn has a

negative impact on local communities and small businesses.

SENCA Head Start is required to have 20 percent “in-kind” in the form of monetary donations or through donations of goods or volunteer services. If you are interested in making a

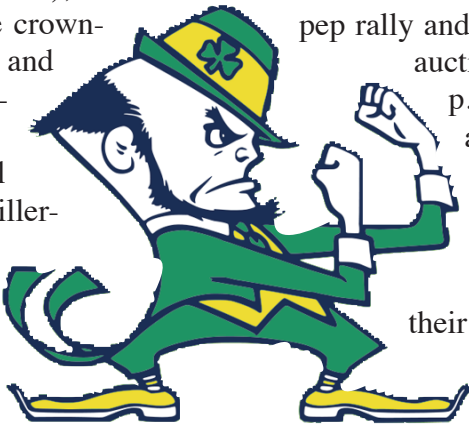
An All School Mass will be celebrated at 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, Sept. 25, in remembrance of deceased Sacred Heart Alumni.
