Charges dropped against Shubert man arrested by former deputy

Charges of driving under suspension and possession of drug paraphernalia against a 23-year-old Shubert man were dropped by the Richardson County Attorney's Office last week, as the arrest was made by former Sheriff's Deputy Josh Nincehelser.

In the early hours of May 27, Nincehelser stopped a vehicle driven by Jacob W. Bennett on 709 Trail near Straussville because "the ball hitch on the bumper was obstructing the view of the license plate," according to the arrest report written by Nincehelser. During the subsequent search of Bennett's vehicle, Nincehelser allegedly found a glass pipe under a seat in the vehicle.

Two weeks later, on June 9, Nincehelser reported to dispatchers that he'd been shot while on duty by an unknown person on a county road near Dawson. He later admitted to staging the story and shooting himself in the arm. On Aug. 19 in District Court he entered pleas of not guilty to felony criminal mischief and misdemeanor charges of false reporting, official misconduct and obstructing government operations. A jury trial has been scheduled for Oct. 22 and Nincehelser, 25, remains free on bond.

The charges against Bennett were dismissed "with prejudice," which means he cannot be retried. It is the equivalent to a finding of not guilty.

Construction underway at Falter Museum

The John Philip Falter Museum fundraisers held this summer — one hosted by Dr. Chick and Carole James, and another by artist Sandy Appleoff — successfully pushed the collection effort past the \$100,000 mark and renovation of the former Richardson County Bank building, 17th and Stone Streets, is officially underway.

The Falter Museum is on schedule to open Friday, Nov. 28, just in time for Santa Claus' annual visit and Falls City's downtown Christmas window opening, Museum Chair Janet "Dobey" (Falter) Haws reported. Some \$80,000 was pledged as of June 1. The monetary target is \$225,000, which would cover the entire remodel, as well as five years of site maintainance. Falls City native and architect Merle Bachman, general contractor Jim Murphy, Gary Jones of Jones Air Conditioning and Ben Howard of El Camino Electric have teamed up to construct the museum.

John Philip Falter became a world renowned illustrator and historic painter, but never lost his love for Falls City. Following his death in Philadelphia in 1982, his studio and some of his paintings were donated to the Nebraska State Historical Society in Lincoln. The NSHS is loaning the Falter Museum Committee his studio.

"Many thanks to the donors who have already given," Haws said.

Mrs. Haws, who's father, the late John C. Falter, was a first cousin to the famous Falls City artist, recently accepted a \$7,000 check from the Union Pacific Railroad Foundation. Falls City EDGE Executive Director Beckie Cromer made the presentation.

HISTORY OF THE IRON MONUMENT

The history and importance of the Iron Monument, located high on a bluff on the Nebraska-Kansas state line southeast of Rulo, was brought into sharp focus by Gene Thomsen, deputy state surveyor, Saturday afternoon, Aug. 22, at the annual meeting of the Richardson County Historical Society at the Historical Museum.

Thomsen has been a deputy state surveyor since 1987 and has written articles for the Professional Surveyor Association of Nebraska. He worked with the three Boy Scouts who did an excellent job the past three years of restoring the Monument area in

earning their Eagle Badges. See adjoining article for their accomplishments.

(The youths include Austin Schaible, Tapsee Ogden and Isaac Berry, all members of Troop 396, sponsored by the Lions Club.)

Thomsen told his audience the Iron Monument dated back to the futuristic thinking of President Thomas Jefferson who, in the development of the West, wanted a way for citizens to be able to own land. Thus, the Monument was the point of beginning of the public land surveys of sections, townships and ranges of public land in Ne-

braska, Kansas and parts of Colorado, Wyo-

ming and South Dakota. Its location was determined by extensive surveying. Thomsen said the first land in Nebraska made available to the public sold for \$1.25 per acre.

The speaker related the difficulty of moving the seven-foot, 800-pound cast iron monument from St. Joseph to its location southeast of Rulo in 1854. Accompanied by 24 workers, it was transported by wagon to the eastern bank of the Missouri River. There an Indian was talked into taking the 800-pound load across the river in his canoe. Those aboard the canoe said it came within inches of being swamped during the river crossing.

Then came the equally difficult task of moving the heavy monument to its location and getting it

The exhibition is on loan from the Museum of Nebraska Art in Kearney, whose main purpose is to collect and exhibit works of art created by Nebraska Artists.



Nebraska sports, democracy battle for attention

There are nine University of Nebraska football games between now and the November election. There are

four - and potentially six - candidates running for the U.S. Senate seat being

vacated by Mike Johanns and two teams of two each running for Governor - Lieutenant Governor, as well as others running for 17 open seats in the Nebraska Legislature.

If the crowded Republican primary that brought an inordinate amount of downright nasty commercials to the airwaves is any indicator, Nebraskans could be settling in for another spell of nasty before the votes are counted the night of Nov. 4.

In a year when the Democrats think they might have a better chance at winning a couple of the state's top offices than the Cornhuskers do of capturing a Big Ten Championship, there's likely to be a lot more than just sports on the other end of the onoff switch on Nebraskan's TVs and radios. I haven't even taken three state colleges and two other University of Nebraska football teams into account here.

If the debates have started, can the negative campaign ads be far behind? All the producers are waiting for is the opportunity to get a twisted facial gesture on the face of the opponent, or an opportunity to twist their words out of context and it's "game on!" Remember when appointed U.S. Senator David Karnes debated Bob Kerrey at the State Fair some years ago and talked about the size of farms and how fewer farmers are farming bigger areas and drew the logical conclusion that Nebraska "needs fewer farmers?" The Kerrey camp played and replayed those words at every chance and a race was decided in favor of the chal-

lenging Democrats. Gubernatorial Candidates Chuck Hassebrook, the underdog Democrat, and Pete Ricketts, the millionaire Republican, have done the traditional State Fair debate and have at least one other planned. The Democrats, sensing opportunity, would like more debates. Perhaps even Democrat Lieutenant Governor candidate Jane Raybould of Lincoln would like to take on Republican incumbent Lieutenant Governor LaVon Heidemann. That would certainly fill some non-sports hours on TV and radio, perhaps in the space between commercials.

Democratic US Senate Candidate Dave Domina, an Omaha attorney, has already had a State Fair Debate with Republican Candidate Ben Sasse, President

of Midland College in Fremont. The four independent candidates - two of them already certified for the ballot and two not – also participated.

In case you're keeping track, independents Dennis Macek and Dan Buhrdorf have not been officially certified for the Senate ballot. Jim Jenkins and Todd Watson have been. If

all six run, the margin of victory in the Senate

race will be somewhat similar to that by which Ricketts bested a field of six in the Republican gubernatorial primary. In a decid-

edly Republican state, Domina and the Democrats are hoping that margin is one they can achieve.

As one pundit said, all that Hassebrook and Domina really have to do is win all of the undecided voters in Lincoln and Omaha – assuming that November 4th is a nice day and all the negative advertising hasn't forced people to decide NOT to

FCSH: Striving for Success, Year after Year

The 2013-2014 school year was one of many successes for Sacred Heart School: State Championships in football and boys' track; trips to the state tournament in girls' basketball, girls' track, and in speech. There were many awards in band, choir and one-act as well.

I have said many times that the academic successes are some of the most important, but tough to quantify and therefore, tougher to publicize. Looking at ACT scores, while not a complete indicator of academic success, is one good tool to gauge student readiness for academic success in college.

You may have read the recent headlines about Nebraskans scoring higher on the ACT than the national average with an average score of a 21.7. You may also have read that the results are mixed. Only 43 percent of Nebraska's 2014 graduates reached what ACT calls their "benchmark scores." These scores are meant to predict success in college courses. Even though this is less than half of Nebraska's students taking the test, it is still better than the national average.

Once again, Sacred Heart students have excelled in their academic work and in taking the ACT. The average composite score for the Sacred Heart Class of 2014 was 23.2, well above the state average of 21.7 and the national average of 21.

This score alone is worth celebrating, but there is even more good news for Sacred Heart. Regarding the benchmark scores, 88 percent met the benchmark for college English Composition (state average is 72), 56 percent met the college Algebra score (state average is 45), 50 percent for college Social Sciences (state average 48%), 63 percent met the college biology benchmark (state average is 42). Finally, 38 percent of our students met all four benchmark scores, compared to the state average of 29 percent and the national average of 26 percent.

Last year I wrote an article about the trend of academic success at Sacred Heart. The scores from the class of 2014 clearly show that this trend continues. Perhaps the most striking number is that nearly 95% of the class of

Thinking About Health

How limited provider networks restrict choice

Should you be able to choose your own doctor? Most people would say yes, and for years letting patients choose their providers was an almost sacred requirement for any health reform proposal.

But political talking points in the heat of a legislative battle are one thing. Reality is another, and today's reality is you cannot always choose the person you want to treat you.

The change is part of what I like to call the Great Cost Shift accelerated by the Affordable Care Act which, thanks to compromises made as the bill was negotiated, includes few effective cost controls to slow down medical inflation. More fundamentally, the shift stems from our apparent unwillingness as a country to allow government to negotiate prices with healthcare providers as other nations do.

The Affordable Care Act, for example, prohibits Medicare from negotiating prices for drugs available to beneficiaries under the prescription drug benefit. Yet many experts say that would save money for Medicare as

Since controlling costs the way the rest of the world does is taboo, the remaining option is to put the burden on consumers when they buy health insurance and patients when they use healthcare services. Right now the tools for doing that are narrow networks of providers.

Insurers allow in their networks only providers who agree to accept the fees insurers are willing to pay. Typically, insurance carriers have tried to lower those payments claiming that helps bring down medical costs. It also has triggered fights across the country between hospitals and insurers such as the one that raged this summer between Catholic Health Initiatives, which runs 12 Nebraska hospitals and Blue Cross Blue Shield, the state's largest carrier.

As this fall's open enrollment approaches---the time when you can switch coverage provided by employers or purchased through state health exchanges---you'll bump against this dilemma: Do you choose a policy with a narrow network, possibly disrupting your care, and leaving a trusted physician in return for cheaper coverage that goes along with those restrictions? Or do you spend more for higher-priced coverage and the freedom to choose the providers you want, including some super specialist you might need?

If there are few insurers selling coverage in your area, the decision is especially tough.

"People have to recognize it's a trade-off, and I'm not sure they do yet," Matt Eyles, an insurance expert at Avalere Health consulting firm, told Politico, the online politics site. "Broader access comes at a cost, and what's the right balance between access and cost is an ageold question in healthcare."

It goes back at least two decades to the time insurance companies promised that managed care would save the system from escalating costs. Under managed care, the insurers restricted the doctors and hospitals they would cover, and patients howled all the way to their state legislatures. In many states lawmakers passed "any willing provider laws" making it easier for patients to pick their doctors. Sometimes women could pick a favorite gynecologist or someone with a chronic condition could select a specialist as a primary care doctor and navigate around the restrictions.

There's a new push these days for "any willing provider" laws. In November South Dakota voters will decide if any provider can join an insurer's network if the provider agrees to the carrier's terms and conditions and practices within its coverage area. The ballot measure, backed by the South Dakota Medical Association and specialty hospitals, would eliminate insurers' restrictions on who can be in their networks. Both sides are expected to spend big bucks to try to win the public to their side.

In earlier battles insurers maintained they chose for their networks only providers who delivered high quality care. Some still say that. I am highly skeptical of those claims. Quality measures especially for doctors, some devised by government, some by for-profit and not-for-profit groups, are not great. These fights are still about money, not high-quality care. The biggest casualty is still the consumer.





presentation on the Cast Iron Monument and its relationship to every piece of property in all or parts of five states. Thomas Jefferson transacted the Louisiana Purchase and his inception was that land be surveyed and that "yeoman farmers" own property. The 1854 Kansas-Nebraska Act created the Nebraska Territory, which was then surveyed using the monument site south of Rulo on the Kansas-Nebraska line as the starting point for the subsequent surveying of Kansas, Nebraska, most of Wyoming and Colorado, and a small part of South Dakota. That specific point was determined by topographical engineer Thomas Lee in 1854, and most of the land in Richardson County was surveyed in 1855 and 1856. Rectangles 48 miles wide and 24 mile high were divided into six mile by six mile townships, which in turn were divided into sections and individual pieces of property with legal descriptions. Models show above normal precipitation

A big question this fall: will there be harvest delays due to wet weather?

Tendencies for above-normal precipitation statewide with the highest probability south and west of a line from Scottsbluff to Grand Island are showing up for September according to the Climate Prediction Center, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln climatologist says.

October through December forecasts also show above normal moisture is projected for the southeast half of the state with equal chance of above or below normal moisture for the remainder of the state, said Al Dutcher, state climatologist in the university's Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources.

There are equal chances statewide of temperatures being above or below normal, Dutcher said.

However, during El Nino winters, Nebraska typically sees above-normal temperatures with below-normal temperatures across the southern United

"We are borderline now with the expectation of a weak El Nino event starting as early as this fall," Dutcher said. Dutcher said forecasts indicate that El Nino conditions will become established during the fall period. However, he expects it to be weak and short lived.

As for precipitation this growing season, Dutcher said, certain areas of the state did well as there was heavy precipitation this spring after a dry winter. June precipitation brought 12-17 inches of precipitation to northeastern Nebraska during June, which dropped off to the 5-9 inches across east central and southeast Nebraska.

During the July through mid-August period, dry conditions developed across a substantial portion of eastern Nebraska, with pockets of dryness reported across the Panhandle. There has been crop damage in spotty areas across dryland cropping areas of east central and southeast Nebraska, Dutcher said.

However, the "million dollar question" is how much of an impact did early season freeze events and multiple rounds of severe weather have on crop production this growing season. He said there is so much variability from field to field as several places across the state saw freezing, flooding, hail and having to replant once, twice, even three times.

"For the majority of people that did not get freeze, hail or flooding, crop development is fairly close to normal, especially with these last two weeks of warmer temperatures," he said.

However, those farmers that had to replant are the "big open-ended question," he said.

"Based on available climate data and fall freeze probabilities, as long as producers that replanted corn varieties that require at least 300 less Growing Degree Day to reach maturity, there is less than 50 percent likelihood at this point in the game that they will incur hard freeze damage, based on a normal freeze date."

Dutcher said soybeans may also be a "big story" this season due to the drier weather in July and August during

'We've been under stress in east and east central Nebraska where rains have not been as generous," he said. "To what extent crops may have been damaged is still up in the air."

If forecasts play out, Dutcher said the entire state could see generous moisture during the final 10 days of August. Forecasts indicate heavy rainfall with over two inches of rain possible across the state, with isolated pockets receiving more than five inches. This would provide excellent moisture to finish grain fill and begin building soil moisture for the 2015 growing season.

Dutcher said with winter wheat planting beginning in September, beneficial big rains also will be good for building soil moisture in top three feet of the soil profile prior to planting.

Overall the Platte River system is doing well. Irrigation demand came later in the season and reservoir declines didn't occur until late July.


Dutcher said if there is above normal snow in the central Rockies this winter, having enough room to store the spring runoff could be a problem.


"Right now we are sitting at 2.5 million acre-feet in the Platte reservoir system," Dutcher said. "We were just under two million acre-feet in storage entering into the spring run off season. Net storage declined 500,000 acre-feet this growing season, but typically we see a 600,000 to 800,000 acre-foot decline.

"So if we get a normal snow season and the fall precipitation forecast by the Climate Prediction Center verifies, we would be looking at essentially filling up all upstream reservoirs from Lake McConaughy upward."

The North Platte River Basin generally has a positive response during El Nino events. In addition, an El Nino also typically brings beneficial moisture to California.

"However, because this El Nino is so weak, it may not bring the rains they need," he said.

Lincoln Lutheran last Friday at Wesleyan University put all its defensive effort in stopping Falls City High School senior Jordy Stoller (above) on the ground, and were successful, holding the speedy four-year starter to just eight yards on five carries. The strategy of daring the Tigers to pass ultimately backfired on the Warriors, though, as senior Jack Hartman completed three passes - all for touchdowns - in a 42-0 FC victory. He first hit senior Lee Huettner for a 23-yard score early in the second period. Hartman then found Stoller for a 25-yarder before half, and the two connected yet again in the early moments of the second half on a 60-yarder, giving FC a 20-0 lead. Hartman (16 carries, 102 yards; 3-of-5 passing, 108 yards, three TDs) scored on a 13-yard run later in the period and senior Weston Witt added a five-yard TD run and a pair of two-point conversions in FC's big third. Tiger sophomore Zayne Heckenlively finished the scoring with an 11-yard TD run in the fourth quarter. Senior Brenden Heckenlively (below) led all rushers with 123 yards on 19 carries.

The Falls City Tigers opened the 2014 football season with a lopsided 42-0 victory over Lincoln Lutheran last Friday night at Nebraska Wesleyan's Abel Stadium.

Defensively, the Warriors stacked the line of scrimmage in an effort to thwart the Tiger running attack and in doing so left themselves vulnerable downfield. And senior Jack Hartman, in his first game as the "spin" back in Coach Darin Fritz' single-wing offense, made them pay. Hartman completed

three passes - all for touchdowns. He hit senior Lee Huettner on a 23-yarder to open the scoring, and then completed a pair to senior Jordy Stoller. One, at the end of the first half, went for 25 yards, as Stoller split and outjumped a pair of Warrior defensive backs at the goal line; the other, at the beginning of the second half, showcased Stoller's speed, as he outran the defense on a 60-yard catch-and-sprint. Hartman finished with 108 yards passing and 102 rushing, on 16 carries. Senior Brenden Heckenlively led all ballcarriers with 123 yards on 16 attempts.

"Putting 11 in the box helped us out," Fritz said. "Usually, they'll at least put a safety back there, but with 11 in the box they basically called our plays for us," he said.

While the Warriors were effective in limiting Stoller's damage in the running game, they had to punt it to him and, in the end, they might've been better off going for it on fourth down. Stoller fielded five punts and racked up 130 yards in returns. His longest went

for 41 yards, more than flipping the field for his team. Stoller returned Lutheran's lone kickoff 36 yards, as well. Remarkably, though it was the first

game of the year, not a single turnover was made. Falls City fumbled three shotgun snaps, but recovered them all

The Tigers led 14-0 at halftime, but blew the game open in the third period and led 36-0 entering the fourth. Following Hartman's 60-yard pass to Stoller, he carried one in from the 13, followed by a two-point conversion run by senior Weston Witt. Witt then scored on a five-yard run and added a second two-pointer. Sophomore Zayne Heckenlively finished the scoring with an 11-yard run in the fourth.

"We played pretty well," Fritz said. "They had us scouted, actually, pretty well and kept Stoller out of the running

"But we leaned on them a little bit. For a first game, I thought our execution was pretty good," he said.

The stats were as lopsided as the score would indicate. FC rushed for 301, while holding Lutheran to negative-two. Total yards: FC 409, LL 85.

"We played very well defensively," Fritz said. "Our players were in the right position most all the time and then we got guys to the ball. Our defensive line did a real good job and occupied the offensive line when they weren't making plays."

Up front, Tucker Merz (1 1/2 sacks, six team-high tackles), Derek McCann (two tackles for eight yards in losses, five total tackles) and Payton Adams (four tackles, two tackles for even yards in losses, 1/2 a sack) were dominant. Hartman added five stops and a pair of pass break-ups at his linebacker spot, and Luke Kirkendall had a sack

to go with three tackles.

Now the Tigers focus on a trip to Fairbury this Friday, where the Jeffs, also 1-0 and coming off a blowout (50-8 over Superior), await. In the opener, Fairbury freshman Jacob Johnson rushed for four touchdowns, as Superior lost its 30th straight game.

"Fairbury's running game is more physical than Lincoln Lutheran's," Fritz said. "They'll come straight at you."

The Tigers beat Fairbury 49-8 at Jug Brown Stadium in the sixth week of the season last year. Fairbury finished with just one win. The Tigers host preseason No. 2 and 2013 C1 runnerup Ashland-Greenwood for the home opener Sept. 12, but Fritz is confident his team won't look ahead.

"I think we understand that with the new playoff system, we can't look ahead," he said, referring to the 16-team playoff format, cut in half by the NSAA from a year ago.

"Fairbury presents a different challenge - every week is a challenge," he

The Falls City Sacred Heart Irish football team may yet defend it's 2013 Class D2 State Football Championship, but it won't replicate last year's perfect season, as the Irish fell 56-48 to North Andrew, MO, in a shootout for the ages last Friday night at Jug Brown Stadium.

In a battle of defending eightman state champs, there were fireworks early, starting with a 52-yard TD run by Irish senior Austin Malone and a pair of 68-yard kickoff

returns for touchdowns by classmate Sawyer Kean - all in the first quarter - and late, when the appropriately named Cardinal QB Gunner Hughes ran for two scores, tossed his fourth touchdown pass (to go with another four on the ground) and tacked on the two-point conversion to give his team the 56-48 lead with 5:25 to go. When the smoke finally cleared, Hughes had a hand in each and every one of his team's 56 points and 316 of its 402 total yards (99 rushing, 217 passing).

The Irish, which led by two possessions, 48-34, late in the third quarter, began to mount a potential game-tying drive. FCSH managed a couple first downs and drove inside the Cardinal 35 before two big sacks of Malone ended the threat. The Irish, which had been driven all the way back to its own 20-yardline, punted it back to Hughes, a junior, who moved the chains twice, enough to run out the clock.

The loss was Sacred Heart's first since the 2012 Class D2 state semifinals. Remarkably, it's also just one of two regular season games against defending state champions. The Irish face 2013 D1 State Champ Exeter-Milligan Oct. 10 on the road. FCSH hosts Meridian, a 30-6 winner over Osceola last week, this Friday at Jug Brown Stadium. Kickoff is set for 7 p.m.

Irish Coach Doug Goltz, now 258-44 overall in his 27th year, entered the season with four proven veterans — Malone, Kean, Logan Scheitel and Zavan Kirkendall off a 13-0 team that was never seriously threatened. But also minus six players who earned postseason honors in '13, including the D2 Offensive and Defensive Players of the Year (Chaz Dunn and Jarod Fiegener). Malone, who scored three times in last year's state title game, switched to quarterback, behind a line comprised of first-year starters, and performed admirably and beyond.

His 52-yard touchdown run (photographed, right) opened the scoring less than four minutes into the season opener. Malone, following a Kean interception, added a 25-yard TD strike to Scheitel (three catches, 59 yards) later in the quarter and broke TD runs of 44 and 15 yards in the third, finishing the game with 111 yards rushing on 13 attempts, while completing 6-of-11 passes for 100 yards. He threw an interception on the game's opening drive, but N. Andrew didn't capitalize. Malone added a trio of twopoint conversion runs in the game.

Malone's final shot — the 15-yard TD run — came with 2:37 to play in the third period and his accompanying two-point conversion run gave FCSH a 48-34 lead, it's second double-digit advantage of the night. In the end, though, Gunner had more bullets in the chamber: A pair of 13-yard TD runs and a two-point conversion pass to Derek Mercer tied the game at 48 with 7:49 to play. Then, on their first snap after stopping the Irish on downs, Hughes found junior Mitchell Officer (four catches, 122 yards) for their second TD bomb connection of the game, this time for 43 yards and, inevitably, the victory. Hughes, of course, made it an eight-point lead with the PAT

N. Andrew led the final 5:25 and for a total of 5:40 of the 48-minute game. FCSH, as it did late in the third, got up by double digits, 28-14, late in the first quarter when Malone hit Scheitel and added the two-point conversion run with 2:54 left on the clock. The game was tied at six, 14, 28, 34 and 48 points. The Cardinals' one other lead, 34-26, followed a six-play, 53-yard scoring drive to open the second half. It was capped by an eight-yard pass



from Hughes to Deryk Goff, and the lead held for all of 15 seconds. On the first snap of the ensuing drive, Malone broke loose on the 44-yarder to tie the game. Less than three minutes later, after Irish junior Henry Arnold intercepted Hughes in the end zone, Kean turned in a 36-yard scoring run to get the lead

Despite the contradicting evidence — there were 42 points scored and scoring plays of 52, 68, 64, 68 and 25 yards in the first quarter - defense was played in this one. Kean's 36-yard TD run the third made up more than half of his 70 total rushing yards. Otherwise, the Cardinals held the Irish runner, who gained 864 yards and 14 TDs in last year's playoffs, to about three yards per carry (11 for 34). Of course, there was the 51yard average on three kick returns.

All of the Irish's points came in the first and third quarters and the team lost three critical fumbles. Two, both recovered deep in Sacred Heart territory by N. Andrew senior Jarred Ellis, led directly to Cardinal scores. The third and final fumble set up the second of Hughes' 13-yard TD runs in the fourth quarter, tying the game at 48.

After taking a 28-14 lead, FCSH forced N. Andrew three-and-out as the quarter ended, but four Irish possessions in the second quarter resulted in two punts and two lost fumbles. Then, with a 48-34 lead and the ball in the fourth: Punt, fumble, stopped on downs, punt.

The Irish owned the kicking game and out-rushed N. Andrew 186-168, but got scorched by Hughes through the air, aside from the two timely picks by Kean and Arnold.

Kean led the team with 13 tackles (six solo), followed by Kirkendall (eight total, six solo), Arnold (eight total, four solo), Malone and Scheitel (seven total, four solo), and Reggie Johansen (six total, two solo). Sophomore defensive tackle Bryant Jorn recorded a pair of tackles behind the line of scrimmage and Johansen and Brandon Scheitel each added another.



On the down side, Falls City hurt itself with five fielding errors and offensively drew one walk to seven strikeouts.



"Maryville has gotten a lot better from where they were a season ago," Bredemeier said. "It was nice to see our team play well on Parents



At this point, ESU 6 is billing all DVLG districts for payment, resulting in \$13,477 which was the USAC discount deemed ineligible. At this point, advice from legal council is to not pay the bill in August and wait until the group of schools impacted has a course of action and a legal recommendation. I will keep the board updated as this process develops.

2.4b Building & Grounds Update: Nearly all projects slated for completion over the summer months have been completed as projects are wrapping up. A couple of the more noticeable facility improvements include the installation of doors on the second floor of the middle school and the refinish of the high school competition gym floor. This process has taken a lot of hard work and patience as we have implemented change. And with any change, we have saw positives and ran into a few snags along the way. As we have reflected on our experiences in year-1 of implementation, we need to keep our focus on student success and respect the time of teachers and administrators. To that end, I will be working with the principals to reduce certain aspects of the evaluation model that have required additional time away from teaching, in an effort to allow teacher and administrators to maximize

Second Annual National Discover Your Optimal Health Day



"Our new, proposed facility will be able to accommodate up to 300 people. Our current facility is adequate, but is not user friendly for many patrons.
